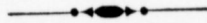

Statement by the Session.

The Session is convinced that much quiet and solid work, full of good results, has been accomplished during the year. Almost every one of our numerous organizations has been worked with commendable constancy and fidelity. It is very assuring, also, to know that there is an increasing earnestness among the leading workers of the Congregation for still greater efficiency and yet richer spiritual blessings.

We recognize, with deep thankfulness, the judicious and successful manner in which the Board of Management has conducted the temporalities of the Congregation, and the cordial relations existing between the Board and every department of our Church work.

We notice with much appreciation the efficiency of the Superintendents and Teachers of our two Sabbath Schools, and the high degree of good order and teaching power they have reached. Our thanks are due to Principal Merchant for relieving the Minister of the extra labor of conducting the Senior Bible Class, and for his discharging this duty with such marked ability and success.

We desire to emphasize our acknowledgments of the unselfish and beneficent labors of "The Ladies' Aid and Visiting Association."

We commend most cordially the noble work being done for the great Foreign Mission schemes of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by our Women's Foreign Missionary Society, the King's Messengers' Mission Band, composed of some of the best Christian workers among our young ladies and by the "Sunbeam Band" of little girls.

We would remember with thanks all who have implemented

their engagements to the special Mission effort among the Indians of Fort Pelly, N. W. T.

We notice, with increasing confidence the good work being done by the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, and believe that greater things will yet be done.

We cannot forget, in this glance at current events, that our thanks are due, and are hereby tendered, to the ladies and gentlemen of the Choir, under the leadership of Mr. Wheeler, for the good will and fellowship that have obtained among them, for the Christian department manifested by them, and for the able and pleasant assistance they have given the Minister in attracting congregations to the House of God, and rendering His worship more delightful.

Here we wish to gratefully thank the Board of Management and whole Congregation for providing our Moderator last summer with the acceptable and faithful assistance of Mr. Jas. S. Scott, of University College, Toronto.

We notice with approbation an extension of our work by the opening of a largely attended Prayer Meeting in the Oxford Street Sunday School building, every Wednesday evening, and hereby commend it to our people in that district.

The "In Memoriam," herewith published, is unusually large. Many dear old friends, some of them wise counsellors, some liberal contributors, some young, bright and full of promise, have passed into eternity. Our sympathy goes out to all who mourn. May God wipe the tears from their eyes.

In this connection we make special reference to one of our brother Elders, respecting whom the following minute has been put on our records:

We regret to notice that the aggregate of contributions for "the schemes of the Presbyterian Church in Canada" is not up to the mark of last year. Many, in very good circumstances, have contributed thereto little, some nothing at all.

The net gain to the Communion Roll is 42, making the present membership in full communion 796. But as the Roll has not been revised for two years this number is only approximate. The deaths have been 27. Of these 12 were communicants on the Roll. The Baptisms 30, all infants.

We close this brief review of the year 1891 with deep gratitude to God for the gracious way He has hitherto led us, and for the something He has enabled us, as a Congregation, to do for Him. We turn our faces to the future in Faith, Hope and Love, as "those that watch for the morning."

THE FORTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT
—OF THE—
BOARD OF MANAGERS
BEING FOR THE YEAR 1891.

The Board of Managers has to congratulate the congregation upon the fact that the ordinary sources of revenue under the envelope system have been very well sustained during the year. The amount raised by weekly contributions during the year were \$4,947.82, and by collections, \$547.44, making a total of \$5,495.26. In comparing the year 1890 with 1891, there is a slight deficiency in 1891 of \$202.63. The collections are about the usual sum. The Financial Statement for the year has been drawn up, and will show the total amount of receipts and disbursements, leaving a balance in hand of \$184.98.

The Auditors, Messrs. T. H. Purdom and C. R. Somerville, have examined the Financial Statement, with the vouchers and Treasurer's books, and their certificate will be found annexed thereto.

Regarding the election of Managers, in order that a judicious selection be made, the Board recommends the appointment of a Nominating Committee, composed of two Managers, not retiring, named by the Chairman of the Board, and three persons chosen by the congregation at its annual meeting (five in all), the duty of which will be to nominate suitable persons for election, and report back to congregational meeting for its adoption or amendment. Committee than the required number to fill the places of the retiring members, a ballot to be taken.

In accordance with a resolution passed at the last annual meeting, the Managers were authorized to borrow \$3,000.00 by a note, and pay off the large note and several small ones due by the congregation. The money was raised and notes paid off, consolidating the debt at \$2,800.00.

At a joint meeting of the Session and Board of Management it was agreed that an assistant be given Mr. Murray for the summer months of 1891. Mr. J. S. Scott, a Knox College student, was engaged, and preached and worked very acceptably from 1st June to 15th September.

The late Thomas McChlery, by his will left a portion of his estate to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Mr. Wm. Kent, Executor, owing to advancing years and ill health, applied to the Board of Management of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church to relieve him of the responsibility. The Board considered the request favorably, and placed the matter in Mr. T. H. Purdom's hands, who directed that Mr. Geo. A. Somerville, of the Huron & Erie, be appointed to take the estate in trust, and dispose of it (and this has been sanctioned by an order from Judge Elliott). The estate was sold for \$1,888.22, and applied on the Church debt and interest thereof, reducing the amount from \$2,800.00 to \$1,000.00. The half yearly interest of the estate, \$52 ⁵⁰/₁₀₀, will be paid to Miss McChlery during life.

A cordial vote of thanks is due to the members of the Choir for their regular attendance, and for the efficient manner in which the service of praise has been conducted by them, under the direction of Mr. Wheeler; and as Mr. Wheeler has applied for \$100.00 additional to his salary, the Board would recommend that the increase be granted.

A hearty vote of thanks is also due to the Ushers and Auditors for the valuable services rendered by them to the congregation.

The Managers who now retire by rotation are Messrs. Jas. McSween, C. McCallum, Dr. Macarthur, Geo. A. Somerville, James Mills, M. H. Rowland, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

26

The Forty-first Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, London, Ont., was duly held on Wednesday evening, the 20th January, 1892, in the Lecture Room of the Church.

The Rev. J. A. Murray, Pastor, opened the meeting with devotional exercises, after which Mr. Jas. McSween, Chairman of the Board of Managers, was, on motion, asked to preside.

Mr. McSween then took the chair, and requested the Secretary to read the minutes of last Annual Meeting, held on the evening of January 28th, 1891. The minutes were read and sustained.

The following resolution was moved by Mr. G. W. Armstrong, and seconded by Mr. H. E. Nelles :

That this Annual Congregational Meeting of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, London, Ont., desires to record its sympathy with the bereaved family of their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales in the loss of their eldest son, the heir presumptive to the British Throne, and prays that their Royal Highnesses may be sustained by Divine Grace and thus be enabled to endure this trial with resignation, and be assured that all events are overruled for God's glory and man's good.

The Chairman took up the Manager's Report, and on motion of Mr. Rowland it was taken as read and considered clause by clause.

The first clause was read and passed.

The second clause was read and passed.

The third clause caused considerable discussion.

The Chairman nominated Messrs. Cairncross and Gray from the Board of Managers, and the meeting nominated

Messrs. Nelles, Purdom and Irwin from the congregation (5 in all), to nominate suitable persons for election. While the committee retired to the Library to make a selection, the meeting passed the next three clauses. The committee then returned and reported the candidates on the blackboard numbering the names from one upwards to eleven. Voting cards had been passed around to elect eight members by the number of their names. Mr. T. H. Purdom and R. H. Morrison were appointed scrutineers, and after counting the votes reported the following gentlemen elected, namely: M. H. Rowland, Geo. A. Somerville, A. M. Gunn, Jas. McSween, Dr. Macarthur, John McMillan, Dr. Gardiner and James Mills.

The seventh clause created a warm discussion in regard to the Manager's recommendation respecting the names of seat holders being taken off the pews.

It was moved and seconded that the clause be struck out.

The motion was put to the meeting and carried almost unanimously.

A notice of motion for the next meeting was given by Dr. Gardiner and D. Smith, "That the names of the occupiers of the sittings be put on the seats as heretofore, but that all seats not actually occupied be put at the disposal of the pew committee, to be by them disposed of as they see fit."

The resignations of Mr. John Ferguson and Mr. T. Somerville were read by the Chairman and accepted.

Votes of thanks were tendered to the Choir, Ushers and Auditors.

Mr. Charles E. Wheeler, Organist, applied for an increase of \$100 to his salary. The same was granted.

It was moved by Mr. Wm. Stevely, and seconded by Mr. Robert Allan, "That a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to Mr. Geo. W. Armstrong for the beautiful gift of a lecturn, &c., made to the congregation to adorn the platform in front of the pulpit.

We regret that no effort has been put forth during the year for the better equipment of our School. It is hoped that some united action will be taken at an early date for the better arrangement of at least the Lecture Room. With a comparatively small out lay the seating could be so arranged that the teachers could do their work much more efficiently.

There is a slight decrease in the membership, with a corresponding decrease in the average attendance of scholars. The decrease is accounted for, chiefly, by the removal of a few families from the city.

The ordinary collections for Missions amounted to \$305.02. Besides this, one class (boys) contributed \$11.39, and one class (girls) contributed \$1.00, for the Welland Canal Mission. These sums were over and above their regular Sabbath collections and make the aggregate collections for Missions during the year, \$317.41, which is \$13.66 less than was contributed in 1890. We recommend that it be divided as follows :

Foreign Missions, including \$48 to Fort Pelly and \$21.31 towards Mr. Laird's expenses, \$85.31; Home Missions, including \$24 to the Provincial S. S. Association, \$24; Augmentation Fund, \$25; Point Aux Trembles, \$65; French Evangelization, \$12; Welland Canal, including special, \$6.

the School has lost an efficient and faithful worker. For a number of years Mr. Muir was Superintendent, which position he filled very efficiently. During the past five years he has taught, with a great deal of acceptance, the Young Men's Bible Class. While we regret his departure from amongst us we pray that the Master will bless him and use him for His glory where he has gone.

Two of our scholars were removed by the hand of death, Charles Purdom, of the Infant Class, and John Turner, of the Intermediate Class. They were both great favorites with their classmates. The parents and their families have our prayers and sympathy in their bereavement.

During the year our Pastor had the pleasure of receiving twelve of the older scholars into church membership.

On the 28th of June and the 13th of December instead of the usual session of the Sabbath School public meetings were held in the Auditorum of the Church. The former was addressed by Mr. J. W. Scott, B.A., and Mr. G. W. Armstrong, and the latter was addressed by Dr. Carson, of Detroit. The collections on these occasions, \$21.31, were applied towards defraying Mr. Laird's travelling expenses.

We held two written examinations during the year, one in July and the other in December. In July only five pupils, all girls, wrote, one from the seniors and four from the intermediate classes, and in December only three, all girls, wrote, one from the seniors and two intermediates. The papers put in at both examinations were very creditable. Owing to the small number of pupils who availed themselves of these examinations we are not inclined to recommend a continuance of them.

On the 10th of July we united with the other Presbyterian Sabbath Schools of the city and spent an enjoyable day at Port Stanley.

The Chinese class has been well sustained during the year. The pupils appear to be taking more interest in their

THE FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT
 OF THE
 NORTH PRESBYTERIAN SABBATH SCHOOL
 IN CONNECTION WITH
 ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, LONDON, ONT.

To the Session of St. Andrew's Church, London, Ont. :

BRETHREN,—We now submit to you the Fourth Annual Report of our North Mission Sabbath School for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1891, as follows: We would express our sincere gratitude to God for another year of guidance and blessing in His service, and for cheering evidences of the work of the Holy Spirit among us, as indicated by the increased interest in spiritual things shown by some of our scholars. The general good conduct, regular attendance and interest shown in the study of the Word of God has been gratifying.

We regret having to record a falling off in our membership since our last report. This has been caused by the removal from our part of the city of several families whose children attended our School, and also by the systematic work done by the two congregations now occupying new churches which have been lately built in the northern part of the city, and who have claimed all our scholars whose families are in any way connected with the Methodist or Episcopal churches. These causes have reduced the number on our roll and also our regular attendance, but we have, we believe, now felt the full effect of the influences referred to and look forward to soon regaining our former position as to membership. Since last report (28) twenty eight scholars and (7) seven teachers have been removed, and (9) nine scholars and (6) six teachers

added, making our present attendance as follows: Teachers, (15) fifteen; Officers, (3) three; Scholars, (119) one hundred and nineteen; total, (137) one hundred and thirty-seven, as compared with an attendance of (157) one hundred and fifty-seven in last report.

Our Library contains 273 books; 40 were added during the year and about the same number worn out.

Our weekly Teachers Meeting' has been regularly held and has been fairly well attended.

Our usual Anniversary Entertainment and midsummer picnic were held. Both were successful and enjoyed by all who participated in them. Our scholars have been fairly diligent in the study of the regular lessons and in memorizing the Word of God and the Shorter Catechism with the following approximate results: There has been committed to memory 8,500 verses of the Bible; about 1,500 questions of the Shorter Catechism; about 700 questions of the Smaller Catechism; about 100 Psalms, Paraphrases and Hymns. Several of the larger scholars have repeated large portions of the Gospel of St. John and other portions of the New Testament.

The Mission Band and Band of Hope in connection with our School have been working along their special lines with good results.

The Mission Band has raised the sum of twenty-five dollars during the year, which has been appropriated as follows:

effort was made in the early summer by several of our classes towards the reduction of this debt. This resulted in a contribution from these classes of \$121 for this purpose, which, with other contributions from friends interested, has materially reduced the debt, as shown by the Treasurer's report.

Several interesting letters have been received from "Our Missionary," Miss Jean Gordon, at Satara, British India, and also from Miss McKellar, our Medical Missionary at Indore. These letters have, as usual, been full of information about our Missionaries' life and work in that land.

Full supplies of the "Westminster Lesson Helps" and "Northern Messenger" have been provided for the School as usual.

In May last, by the sanction of the Session, a Weekly Prayer Meeting was organized in connection with the work, but owing to the midsummer holidays coming on soon after it was discontinued for a time, as so many of our people were away, and in November last it was again started by our pastor, and has been continued regularly every Wednesday evening since with encouraging results. The attendance has averaged about 40, the smallest being 32 and the highest 54. We hope that this Prayer Meeting will now take its place as one of the regular services of the congregation and be heartily sustained by our people in that section of the city.

By the liberality of friends in our congregation and others our School has lately been presented with a beautiful large map of Palestine, which will be a valuable help in our teaching work.

The necessary expenses of carrying on our work for the current year will be about as follows: Janitor, \$60; Fuel, Light and Water, \$90; Sunday School Supplies, \$45; Total, \$195. As our only source of revenue for this purpose is the contributions of our Sunday School classes, and is not sufficient to meet those necessary expenses of our work, we would suggest that the Managers be requested to increase the amount granted to our School from \$50 to \$100.

To all our teachers, officers and friends co-operating with us we tender our sincere thanks.

Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor.

The total membership of our Society at the end of last year was 82, the total now being 145, making an increase of 63 members, several of whom have joined the Church during the last year.

Our Society has been the means of getting young people who were not in the habit of attending any of the services of the Church, except on the Sabbath, to become active workers amongst the young people of the Congregation, and who are ready to take part in the Prayer Meeting or any other Meeting in which they are called upon to engage.

I might here state that we take our turn with the other Societies of the City in holding a weekly Prayer Meeting at the Convalescent Home, which has proved very interesting and beneficial to the members who have attended. We have also had charge of several meetings in the North End Branch, and one in our own Church during the Week of Prayer, which I think were enjoyed by those present.

Our Society supported Mr. J. F. Scott, a student who was appointed by Knox College to do Missionary Work in the Northwest during the summer months, and on his return he came up and gave us a splendid address on the work done in his field of labor. Mr. Gauld, President of the Knox College Missionary Society, addressed us also, giving us a brief account of the work done by students during the summer months.

In November last we held our anniversary, at which Rev. J. C. Tolmie, of Brantford, was invited to address us. A general invitation was given to all the Christian Endeavor Societies of the city, and a very pleasant evening was spent.

We were very sorry to lose some of our most active members who have left the city during the year, but we are glad to learn that several of them have connected themselves with other Christian Endeavor Societies.

The Flower Committee of our Society beg leave to thank the Board of Managers for their kindness in supplying them with Fancy Flower-pot and Rose Bowls, to hold the flowers supplied every Sabbath by this Committee. They also wish to tender a vote of thanks to Mrs. John Elliott, Miss Cameron and others for the assistance rendered by them in securing the flowers from Sabbath to Sabbath during the summer months.

In regard to finances we are behind, owing to the extra printing, flowers for the pulpit during the winter months, and other small items which are necessary to carry on our work successfully in the Congregation. In order to reduce the debt we have adopted Mr. Fullton's pledge scheme, which consists of a book in which each member signing their name is pledged to pay two cents per week, beginning with the 1st January, 1892.

The Provincial Convention of the Young People's Societies of Christian Endeavor will be held in this City in October, 1892, and we hope that a hearty invitation may be given them from our Congregation, and if requested by the Committee that the Church may be placed at their disposal in which to hold their meetings.

Several members have not yet paid their subscriptions for the second half of the year, but are ready to do so when called on. Even when all available funds are collected there will be a considerable deficit. This is due to various causes, the principal being a growing lack of interest in the Mission, reduced circumstances of some members, removals to other places and death. The loss of Dr. J. M. Fraser, the President of the Society, and one of the most active in its support, has been a heavy blow.

Notwithstanding these reverses it is thought that if the Congregation as a whole would take up the matter for the one year 1892, after which the obligation incurred would cease, a very slight effort would suffice to carry the project to a successful issue. Seeing that the Congregation has the reputation of supporting a Missionary, surely it is not too much for the Society to expect a more general support this year. The Foreign Missionary Society has been calculating on the five years' salary promised, and for the credit of the Congregation it is desirable that the enterprise should not be allowed to fail when so nearly accomplished.

The Sunbeams' Mission Band.

The "Sunbeam Mission Band" was organized by Mrs. Murray in April of 1890, for the purpose of interesting the children and girls of our Sabbath School in the Mission work of our Church. It was simply organized as a Mission Band, not a Foreign Mission Band. This was considered the most advisable way at present, thereby giving the children and girls an opportunity of choosing their own mission field to work for. Having a short time previous to this become interested in the "Crowstand Mission," on account of Mr. and Mrs. Laird's visit here, they concluded to take up that work for the present, and as a result of their labors forwarded a box of useful articles, valued at \$15, in November of 1890.

In May, of 1891, a successful kindergarten concert was held, the proceeds of which has enabled us to carry on the work. And this year we hope to forward another box as the result of our winter's work. Our meetings are held on Monday of every week from four to five o'clock, the first Monday of every month being devoted to Missionary instruction, intelligence, prayer and praise.

For the first year Miss Mary McMillan kindly acted as President, with the assistance of Miss Gunn and Miss Macdonald, but not being able to continue this year, owing to other duties, Miss Macdonald has taken charge, with the assistance of Miss Gunn and others.

We would kindly ask parents who wish their children to become interested in the Mission work of our Church to send them to our meetings. The Mission fee is small, being only five cents per year. Any other offering to be purely voluntary on the part of the children themselves.

St. Andrew's W. F. M. Auxiliary, 1891.

In presenting the Thirteenth Annual Report of St. Andrew's W. F. M. Auxiliary we shall give a brief sketch of the work done during the year.

At the commencement of the year 1891, a committee of eight members, with the officers of the Society, was formed, who held meetings once a month at the homes of the different members; these were opened with devotional exercises, the President presiding; the programme for the monthly meetings was arranged, and we are pleased to state that all the members have taken part in Bible readings, prayer, or prepared papers on Missionary subjects.

In our monthly meetings we are deeply indebted to Miss Gunn, who kindly gives her services as organist.

We were not represented as an Auxiliary at Glencoe. This year the Presbytery will be held in St. Andrew's Church, and we hope the women of our Church will be largely represented.

In February a paper was sent from England asking us to sign a petition to be forwarded to the Emperor of China petitioning him to prohibit the use of opium in his Empire.

Circulars were placed in the pews giving a list of the articles required in our Indian Mission Schools.

At the suggestion of the Presbyterial Society \$3.00 was paid to purchase a Magic Lantern and views of Mission Stations for the use of Auxiliaries.

In June Mrs. Fletcher gave a Lecture in aid of our Society, on "Our Mission Schools of the North-west, and the Religious Condition of the Chinese in Vancouver and British Columbia."

In August the gifts sent to India by the different Auxiliaries in the London Presbytery were exhibited in the Bible Class room. The value of articles sent by us was \$53.49.

Our Thanksgiving Service was but meagrely attended. Invitations were given to every family in the Church, but though the attendance was small, the meeting was a helpful and a hopeful one to those present. The Thanksgiving offering was \$27.35.

In a congregation of 364 families we have a membership of 43, and an average attendance at our monthly meetings of 21.

The amount collected from all sources is \$155.29; a small increase over last year.

In closing this report we would ask, are we satisfied with our work as an Auxiliary for the Master we profess to serve, and the Society to which we belong, whose motto is, "The World for Christ"? This work will go forward as surely as he is "King of Kings" and "Lord of Lords." Will we share with Him the work He has so graciously offered us to do for Him, or will we cast this wonderful service aside and allow others to sow where we might have sown, and reap blessings for ourselves and others where we might have gathered?

REPORT OF 1891.

In presenting our Fifth Annual Report, we feel called upon to acknowledge the Lord's goodness; His hand has led us safely through the year, and we trust that in some small measure He has used us as instruments in His glorious work.

Much of our work has been carried on in the lines of previous years. There are 44 names on the roll. We are sorry to record a decrease here, but we are glad to know that the members who left us are working in another part of the Lord's vineyard.

Twelve meetings have been held with an average attendance of 31, being two better than last year. The interest has increased, if we may judge by the number who take part; every member has done something, however little, to add to the success of the meetings.

The monthly letter leaflet is now subscribed for and read by every family represented in our Band. We have therefore discontinued reading the letters in our meetings, saving a brief synopsis just to stimulate further perusal. It is worthy of note that we had fine weather for every meeting except one during the year. Short and plenty to do is the chief characteristic of our sessions.

The sources of our revenue were as follows: In January last a cent a day circle was started, each member giving a cent a day and an earnest prayer for missions. Twelve of our number took part in this.

In June we held our annual Open Missionary Meeting when we were addressed by Rev. Mr. Winchester of Berlin ; financially this meeting was not a success, but spiritually it was the best we ever held.

In September we held our Annual Praise and Mite Meeting when the attendance and collection were both good.

The proceeds from sale of our Missionary Calendar of Prayer for 1891 were handsome, and we believe this blessed little monitor has had something to do with the increased attendance throughout the year.

In June we had an Open and Informal Social Meeting, when a lantern exhibition was given showing views of our Mission Stations in India.

In May it was announced that the work of preparing gifts for the scholars in India had been allotted to the Mission Bands, and we at once set about doing our share. By August 128 dolls had been neatly and prettily dressed. In this we were helped by a few who are not members of our Society, and to them we owe our kindest thanks.

And now we desire with grateful hearts to take courage and go forward ; we are far from being contented with present attainment.

We feel that our report would be incomplete if we failed to renew our pleading for more workers. We will not venture to say how many of the young women of our Church should be interested in this work, but surely there should be more than 44. We cannot all join the laborers in the foreign field, but here is a share of the work at our very door. It is not all giving either, we would remind you there is he that scattereth and still increaseth, and the little acts of self-denial we are called upon to practice make our lives richer and better, and win for us the approving smile of Him who sits over against our treasury and watches as the gifts are brought.
