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





Making Cod Liver Oil

1st. The manager in charge of factory must see that the livers are fresh; that all brown or poor livers are thrown out; that there is no gall bladder attached to any livers.

3rd. The pan in which the livers are boiled must be perfectly clean inside, before any livers are placed in it.


4th. Before you start to boil any livers, you must have suffi cient steam,

for the quantity of livers you have in your pan. Boil until the white scum floats off (which will take about thirty minutes.) Don't forget tostir the livers, and see that those in the bottom and those around the sides are brought into direct contact with the steam all the time.
