FIRST EDITION. THE DRY DOCK. ENGINEER BOSWELL'S REPORT IN THE HANDS OF THE MAYOR.

What the Report Says in Regard to Mr. Leary's Plans and Specifications for a Dry Dock and Harbor Improvement Scheme.

The report of engineer Boswell on the plans and specifications for the Leary dry dock and harbor improvement scheme were received yesterday by his worship, Mayor Lockhart and the committee appointed to consider the plan.

After referring in general terms to the plans and specifications upon which he was asked to deal, the engineer's report speaks of the most important considerations to be kept in view in building a dry dock or wet dock as being: "That the gate or caisson should be designed so as to be readily closed or opened and so that it was in closed it would form a water tight joint."

After giving some details of construction for obtaining this result the report continues: "That the specifications provide for this by the construction of solid timber caissons within the caisson, but as these walls are not shown on the plan I would suggest that the plans be made to conform in this respect with the specifications."
