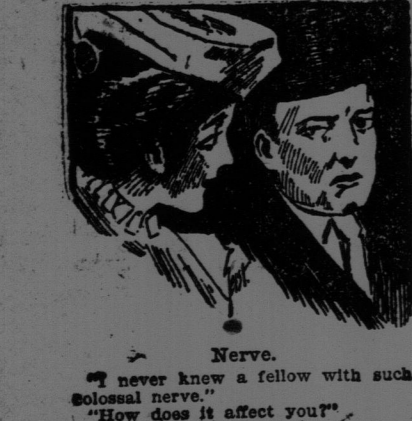

BISHOPS GREATLY SHOCKED BY REV. CLARK'S WORDS. Church Dogmas Good a Museum—Says Ministers Rule of Conduct is a Back Number

CINCINNATI, April 1.—Protesting against the manner in which the board of bishops has been trying the case of Prof. H. D. Mitchell, of Boston University, on a charge of teaching heresy, Rev. W. S. Clark, retiring president of the Methodist Preachers' Union of Cincinnati, in his farewell address to that body today, declared that theological dogmas are "curios that could well be kept on the top shelf."

COMMERCIAL. BIG PURCHASE OF GOLD. LONDON, April 2.—American houses today secured about two thirds of the gold available in the market. The amount offered was about \$4,500,000. The Bank of England got the balance. The price was unchanged.

BIEFR DESPATCHES.

KENT, Ohio, April 1.—Because everyone regarded an alarm of fire turned in as only an April fool joke, the Sperry House, a local hostelry, was destroyed early today, many one responding to the alarm and the house was soon in ruins.

CHICAGO, April 1.—Employees in the train service of the Western railroads tonight reduced their demands to a nine hour day and signified their willingness to accept the wage increase offered by the railroad managers.

BUCHAREST, April 1.—An official report, based on intelligence received from all parts of the country and issued today, indicates that tranquility is being restored generally throughout Rumania. Steps are being taken to open the hands of marauding peasants who are still active, but it is now said that the peasants are abstaining from pillage and incendiarism.

MADRID, April 1.—The coming of Queen Victoria, who is expecting confinement, precluding her participation in public functions, it is announced that the visit of King Edward and Queen Alexandra to Madrid, will be postponed until the autumn.

HELENA, Mont., April 1.—The Griffin gambling law which prohibits all games of chance went into effect today and for the first time since 1893, faro, roulette, poker, dice, card games of all kinds and even slot machines were forbidden in Montana.

BOSTON, April 1.—Thousands of persons attended the opening of the annual sportsman's show of the New England Forest, Fish and Game Association at Mechanics' building tonight. It was the intention of the organizers to open the building to the public Saturday night, but a postponement was necessary on account of a delay in the arrival of the exhibits.

EDMONTON, April 1.—Sixth among the cities of Canada in the volume of a year's building operations is probably as good a record as any Canadian town of 12,000 population ever made. Edmonton took that place last year in the present year.

THE PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT BUILDING. The Alberta Government will begin the provincial parliament building, whose cost will run well up to \$2,000,000. A site for this was chosen last year.

COMMITTED TO PUBLIC OWNERSHIP. A street railway, street paving, new automatic telephone service and extension of sewerage and waterworks systems are the city's largest undertakings in the present year.

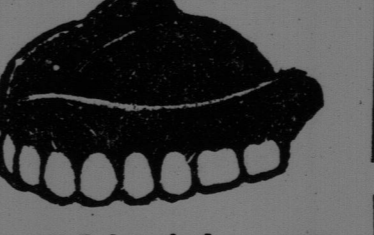
