Reports to be Read at This Evening's Meeting Will Show That Much

past winter and more than the ordinary amount of relief work has been necessary. The circles have been busily engaged in making new garments and remodelling old ones for distribution among the poor. A junior circle consisting of little girls raised, by their unaided efforts of the members, \$40 which has been distributed in charity. The various circles have held a large number of entertainments at the Home for Incurables, Old Ladies' Home and other institutions. During the year there have been an average of twelve permanent boarders at the Guild and in the busy season sixty transients were accommodated. Altogether the year has been a very busy one.



# MACKENZIE KING PLEASED WITH RESULTS OF HIS TRIP

Believes a Satisfactory Canada's Interests to be

OTTAWA, Ont., April 26.-Mr. W. L. MacKenzie King, Deputy Minister of Labor returned to Ottawa yesterday; after an absence of six weeks in London, whither he went as special envoy of the Canadian government to confer with members of the British government and officials of the Colonial and India and Foreign offices, respecting the large question of Oriental immigration into this country. The mission was one fraught with very considerable importance to Canada and involved frequent interviews with many members of the British government and high officials of state. That Mr. King has accomplished his mission and made the return voyage in the short period of six weeks is an evidence of the energy with which he acted, and also of the sympathetic and thoughtful manner in which the British government accomplished his mission. ### Big Theft in New York Reported in London - Bags Taken After Leaving the Steamers.

LONDON, April 26—The London postal authorities have learned that two bags of mail from this city, containing securities and other valuables worth \$500,000, were stolen in New York the latter part of last month. According to the reports received here, one of the bags was destined for St. Louis and was shipped by the Majestic, which arrived in New York on March 26; the other destined for Brooklyn was shipped by the steamer Philadelphia, which arrived at New York on March 29. Both bags disappeared in transit between the steamers and the post of fice. It is said that they were handed over to the mail boats and receipted for. Efforts have been made to keep the theft a secret while the investigation has been going on.

# DEATH LIST IN THE QUEBEC LANDSLIDE IS THIRTY FIVE

MONTREAL, April 27.—The number of dead up to noon today in the landslide disaster was stated to be thirty-five, another being found missing this morning. Some families have lost cruelly by death. Stories of the almost miraculous escape of the survivors continue to come from La Salotte but it is impossible to verify many of these as no corroboration can be obtained. One little girl, Grace Destardine, escaped death by drowning by hanging on to a window, but she died later yesterday from exposture and the terrible bruises she received from the ice blocks and the debries, as she was swept down by the torrent. 
