FIRED AT HIS CHIEF DEGRADED.

A Yankee Officer Plugged Canada's Citizenship Is Four Bullets from His Revolver.

How Police Matters Are Conducted In the Town of North Adams, Massachusetts—A Good Story.

TORONTO, Dec. 16.—Rev. Dr. Carman was the principal speaker at the public temperance meeting in the Berkeley street Methodist church last evening.

His subject was The Duties, Dignity and the Dangers of Citizenship. The venerable general superintendent of the Methodist church expressed joy in entering into the "conflict of centuries," so to speak.

He thought there was about as much need of a revival in the church as there was of a revival of religion.

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RECIPROCIITY NO BENEFIT.

Mr. Tarte Confutes Arguments of Liberal Legislators.

NAPIERVILLE, Que., Dec. 15.—A very largely attended meeting of the voters of Naperville and Naperville was held here today.

It was called for the purpose of laying the political crisis of the day before the electorate, but Mr. Monet, liberal M. P. for the county, put in an appearance and demanded to be heard.

Whereas in Canada the market would be their own, Mr. Monet, who has a reciprocity bill on hold for a reciprocity treaty with the United States, Mr. Tarte replied, and when he had finished with his speech, Mr. Monet's remarks the substance of what the liberal member had said was fully dissipated.
