SEVERAL changes have been made in the Professorial staff for the next Academic year.

No appointment has yet been made to the office of President, as the Governors are of opinion that further time is required, in order to enable them to obtain the services of one possessing the necessary qualifications for the position. Until the definite appointment of a President, the Professor of Divinity has kindly consented to act as President, and a Lecturer in Classics has been temporarily appointed.

The Rev. Isaac Brock, M. A., has been appointed Professor of Divinity. Mr. Brock is a First Class Honor man of Oxford, has resided several years in this country, and was formerly Principal and Professor of Divinity, Huron College, London, Ont.

G. T. Kennedy, Esq., M. A., etc., has been re-appointed Professor of Chemistry, etc.

C. G. D. Roberts, Esq., M. A., has been appointed Professor of English Literature and French. Mr. Roberts is well known for his literary attainments, and the friends of King's College are to be congratulated on having secured his services.

W. A. Hammond, Esq., M. A., of Harvard and Princeton, graduate in Classical Honours, who has been temporarily appointed Lecturer in Classics and German, comes to King's College most highly recommended by such well-known men as Principal McCosh, of Princeton, etc.

Professor Butler retains his former position in the Chair of Mathematics.

A movement has been set on foot, having for its object the thorough restoration of the main College building. It is intended to have as much of the work as possible completed before the winter sets in.

INTRODUCTION.

By the Royal Charter granted in 1802, all the privileges of a University were conferred on King's College, which thus became the first University of British origin established in the Dominion.

A Provincial Act incorporating the Governors of King's College received the royal sanction in 1853. It provides that the Royal Charter of Incorporation shall not be affected by it further than is necessary to give effect to its own enactments.

The Patron of the University is the Archbishop of Canterbury, to whose approval "all Statutes, Rules and Ordinances" of the Board of Governors are subject, but King's College is open to students of all denominations, and imposes no religious test either on entrance or on graduation in any Faculty, with the exception of Divinity.

In 1871 a Curriculum was issued for a course of Civil Engineering, and the University has subsequently granted degrees and diplomas in that science, as well as in Arts, Law and Divinity.

During the past Academic Year valuable donations have been made to the Library by the Hon. Dr. Ross, Premier, Province of Quebec; by the Hon. Senator Almon, M.D.; by the Radical Bay Club; by the Halliburton Club; by the Geological Survey of Canada; by Dr. Hearn; by the Royal Society of London; by the Royal Society of Dublin; by the Royal Society of Canada; by the Dominion government; by the Institute of Civil Engineers of London, G. B.; by the American Institute of Mining Engineers; by the Chief Engineers of the U. S. Army; by the Commissioner of Mines (per C. Carman, Esq.) and others,—a detailed account of which will be found on page 46 of the Calendar.

Candidates for matriculation may now be examined at distant centres, under special regulations, which will be found in the Calendar.

The aggregate outlay necessary for the three years' residence and study qualifying for a degree will of course depend much upon the tastes and economy of the student, but may be estimated at about \$300 to \$350 per year. The mere money payment demanded, need never, however, exclude a candidate really prepared to benefit by the course of instruction offered, inasmuch as many benefactors of the University possess the right of nomination. Each nominee is exempt from the payment of yearly fees, amounting to \$90 for the three years' course, besides the fee for a B. A. degree. There being some forty certificates conferring this privilege, it is easy for students to obtain it. If a scholarship is held besides, nearly the whole cost of the education will be covered. The Calendar supplies all necessary information with regard to these nominations.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The object aimed at is to secure a good general education for all matriculated students, while every facility is afforded for the prosecution of special studies. Accordingly every matriculated student, except under peculiar circumstances to be approved of by the College Board, is required to attend the Lectures of all the Professors until he has passed his Responsions, which is generally done in the sixth term of residence. After this he is at liberty to select three or more of the subjects lectured on to form the subjects of his B. A. Examination. If the student be desirous of taking Honours at his B. A. Examination he can do so in any one of the subjects lectured on after passing the ordinary Examinations. The precise regulations will be found under the head of Examinations.

Students who do not intend to take the degree of B. A. are permitted to attend the Lectures of any of the Professors, subject to all the usual Regulations, and can, moreover, under certain conditions, proceed to Degrees in Science and Engineering.

The schemes of Responsions and B. A. Examinations will afford a general idea of the usual Curriculum, which, within certain limits, is varied as circumstances require.

Numerous scholarships, Prizes, and Honorary Distinctions, (which are more fully referred to elsewhere in the Calendar), are open to be competed for by students in the several faculties, the principal of these being the following:—

Students.

There are three classes of students admissible to the College :

- 1.—*Matriculated Students in Arts.*
- 2.—*Matriculated Students in Civil Engineering.*
- 3.—*Elective Students*: who desire to attend during an Academical Year, or Term, one, two, or more courses of Lectures.

MATRICULATION IN ARTS.

Every student presenting himself for Matriculation in the School of Arts, shall be required to pass an examination in the following subjects :

I.—CLASSIOS.

THE GREEK AND LATIN LANGUAGES.

One Greek and two Latin books, to be selected and published by the College Board one year in advance. Latin Prose Composition.

NOTE.—By a "book" shall be meant one division of an author's work. For example, one book of Homer's *Odyssey* shall mean any one book out of the twenty-four into which the poem is divided.

II—MATHEMATICS.

ARITHMETIC.—The ordinary Rules of Arithmetic; Vulgar and Decimal Fractions.

ALGEBRA.—Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division of Algebraical quantities.

GEOMETRY.—The first two books of Euclid.

III—THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE.

Orthography: Writing from Dictation: The Grammatical Structure of the Language: Outlines of History of England, and General Geography.

IV.—THE FRENCH OR THE GERMAN LANGUAGE.

(At the option of the Candidate.)

One passage from some author for translation into English. The College Board to select the work and publish the name one year in advance.

Candidates shall not be approved of by the Examiners unless they pass in *three* of the above subjects, two of which shall be Classics and Mathematics.

Subjects for 1885-6 :—

Homer : Iliad. I, or Xenophon, Anab. I.

Cicero 1st against Cataline, and Horace Odes, II.

Latin Composition :—Arnold's Introduction to Latin Prose, to the end of the Passive Voice ; and a translation back again into Latin of a plain English version from the Latin of some easy author.

French :—Charles XII., Book II. First part of Otto's French Grammar.

German :—Adler's Reader, Part I. First part of Otto's German Grammar.

MATRICULATION IN ENGINEERING.

The same as in the School of Arts, with the omission of the *Classical Subjects*.

ATTENDANCE AT LECTURES.

Attendance at all Lectures, except those which shall be announced as optional, shall be compulsory upon all Under-graduates.

Professors will register, upon the Lectures Attendance List, the presence or absence of students immediately before beginning the exercises of the class ; any student entering thereafter will be noted as absent, unless a satisfactory explanation be given to the Professor.

No Student shall be allowed to absent himself from any Lecture, (except by special permission, obtained from the Professor,) nor from the Examinations in any Department in his course. All Students must procure from the Professors certificates of attendance, without which they will not be allowed to proceed to the Examinations held at the end of every term.

OF TERMS AND RESIDENCE.

The Academical year shall begin in October,* and shall contain three terms, in which all scholastic exercises shall be performed, and all degrees conferred. Michaelmas Term shall extend from the first Saturday of October* to December 22nd; Lent Term from the second Saturday of January to the Saturday before Palm Sunday; Easter Term from the Monday after Easter Monday to the last Thursday in June.

The following days shall be observed as Holidays in the University:—All Saint's Day, Ash-Wednesday, Ascension Day, Whit-sun Monday, and the Birth-Day of the reigning Sovereign.

In order to encourage school-teachers and others, whose engagements prevent them from attending the full course, and who desire to obtain the Degree of B.A., the following special arrangements will be made:—

Any such Student, on making proper application, will be permitted to come into residence during the first week of November in each year, and to remain until the end of the succeeding Lent Term, passing the regular examinations. This will be allowed to count as two Terms. After thus keeping eight Terms, he will be permitted to present himself for the B.A. Examination on any subsequent occasion.

DISCIPLINE.

The resident Students are under the immediate charge of the President.

A Register shall be kept of the attendance of all Students at Lecture and Chapel.

*In future the word September is to be substituted for October.

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No Student shall be out of College after 9.30 P. M., unless by special permission.

No visitor shall be allowed to remain in College after 9.30 P. M., unless by permission.

The President if authorized to impose fines or written exercises for infraction of regulations, insubordination or disorderly conduct; matters of a more serious nature shall be referred to the Board of Discipline, which shall meet once a week, or oftener, if required.

Each Professor shall keep a record of the attendance at his Lectures, to be handed in at a weekly meeting of the Board, and duly registered.

The Board of Discipline may deprive any Student of his Term for negligence of due preparation for Lectures.

In case of sickness a medical certificate must be produced, if required by the Board.

REGULATIONS FOR HOLDING MATRICULATION EXAMINATIONS AT OTHER CENTRES THAN KING'S COLLEGE.

Whereas it is desirable to meet the convenience of candidates for matriculation who reside at a distance from Windsor, it is *Resolved* that Matriculation Examinations may be held at other centres than King's College, subject to the following conditions:

I.—A Committee of not less than five members must be nominated by the Governors of King's College for the purpose of conducting the Matriculation Examinations in the city or town where it is desired that such examinations should be held.

II.—The said Committee must appoint a Secretary to conduct the necessary correspondence with the President of King's College.

III.—The following declaration must be signed by all the members of the Committee:

"We, the undersigned, having been nominated by the Governors of King's College as a Committee for the purpose of conducting Matriculation Examinations for King's College, N. S., hereby pledge ourselves to conduct such examinations according to the rules laid down by the Board of Governors for that purpose."

IV.—The examination questions shall be forwarded under seal to the Secretary of the Committee from King's College N. S., and shall be opened at the hour appointed for the commencement of the examination, in the room where the examination is to be held.

V. No candidate shall introduce, for any purpose whatever, any books or papers into the examination room.

VI.—No talking, and no communication whatever, shall be permitted amongst the candidates undergoing the examination.

VII. Candidates shall write their answers on paper provided by the Committee for that purpose.

VIII. The days for holding the Matriculation Examinations shall be those appointed in the Calendar of King's College.

IX.—On each occasion when it is proposed to hold a Matriculation Examination at a distant centre, notice should be sent by the Secretary of the Committee to the President of King's College, one month before the date of the examination.

X.—Each candidate for Matriculation, at any distant centre, shall pay in advance a fee of five dollars.

XI.—The members of the Committee shall be present throughout each session of the examination, and shall sign the following declaration, which shall be transmitted, with the answers of the candidates, to the President of King's College:—

“We, the undersigned, having been present during the whole time of the examination, when the accompanying papers were worked, hereby declare that the examination has been in all respects fairly conducted, and in accordance with the prescribed rules.”

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EXAMINATIONS AND GRADUATION.

TERMINAL EXAMINATIONS.

Every student will be required to undergo an examination at the end of each term in all the subjects in which he has attended lectures.

Every Undergraduate, previous to presenting himself for any Terminal Examination, will have to obtain from each Professor whose lecture he has attended during the term, a certificate of attendance and good conduct.

No Professor will grant such certificate if more than two absences without leave, during the course of the Term, are recorded against the applicant, or if his conduct shall have been in any way reprehensible.

Such certificate will then be handed in by the Undergraduate to the Vice-President previous to the beginning of the examination, and no Undergraduate shall be allowed to present himself at any Terminal Examination, unless he shall have complied with these regulations.

The list of candidates who shall have passed the Terminal Examination shall be published in the hall after the close of the examination. The names shall be arranged in the order of merit. Any student whose name does not appear in this list shall forfeit his examination.

RESPONSIONS.

Every matriculated student is required to pass a public examination called Responsions, for which he cannot offer himself until he has completed his fourth term, and no term after the sixth can be reckoned until it has been passed. This

examination is held at the beginning of the Easter Term. The subjects are ordinarily as follows:—

1. *Classics*: Two Greek and two Latin Books and Latin Prose Composition. Honour Students in Classics must give also—a period of Greek and of Roman History; one Philosophical Book of Plato or Aristotle, and a Greek Play. Books for 1886: Plato, Sophist; Sophocles, Oedipus Tyrannus.
2. *English Literature*: Shakespeare, Richard III.; Milton, Paradise Lost, Books I., II., III.; Macaulay's Essays, Warren Hastings; Trench, Study of Words.
3. *Divinity*: One Gospel, or the Acts of the Apostles.
4. *Mathematics*: Algebra to the end of Quadratic Equations; Logarithms; Euclid; Books I., II., III., IV., VI.; and Definitions of Book V.; Plane Trigonometry.
5. *Chemistry (Inorganic)*, and *Physics*, (Heat, Light, Electricity and Magnetism.)
6. *Modern Languages*—any one:

French—The first two books of Charles XII., or an equivalent; the Etymology of the language according to Otto's Grammar; one of Racine's Tragedies.

German—The first part of Adler's Reader or an equivalent; the Etymology of the language according to Otto's Grammar; some of Schiller's Poems.

GRADUATION IN ARTS—B. A. DEGREE.

Undergraduates presenting themselves for examination for this degree, shall be required to produce satisfactory certificates of attendance and conduct during the whole of the three years' course. The certificates will have to be signed by the various Professors whose course of lectures they have attended, and no Undergraduate shall be allowed to present himself at any Degree Examination unless he shall have complied with the above regulations. Or, if they shall not have attended the whole time at King's College, they shall be required to produce similar certificates from the University they have attended.

The Examination shall be carried on mainly by written questions and answers, but the Examiners shall at all times have the power of examining *viva voce*.

A Public Examination for Degrees shall be held towards the end of Michaelmas and Easter Terms. Students shall not be permitted to offer themselves for this before their ninth term, except those who intend to offer themselves for Honors, who may be examined in the Ordinary Degree subjects in their seventh term, between the Responsions and this Examination. In such case, the student must pass an examination in the honor-subjects chosen by him before being admitted to a Degree.

Every candidate for a Degree must be examined on two days in at least three of the subjects on which lectures are delivered by the Professors, of which Classics or Mathematics must be one. The following (or their equivalents) are the subjects of an Ordinary Degree:—

Every candidate for a Degree must give notice, in writing, to the President of the University, of his intention to present himself for examination, such notice to contain a list of subjects prepared and to be sent not later than 21 days previous to the date published in the Calendar for the holding of Degree Examinations.

I. CLASSICS:

GREEK—Three Plays and one Book of Herodotus, or equivalents.

LATIN—Horace, Epistles; Cicero, De Oratore; Prose Composition.
A period of Roman and Grecian History; Geography of Ancient Greece and Italy.

II. ENGLISH LITERATURE:

Shakspeare, Henry VIII., Macbeth; Milton, Comus and Shorter Poems;
Macaulay's Essays; Addison and Hallam's Constitutional History;
Formal Logic; Composition of an English Essay.

III. DIVINITY:

Four Gospels, Bible History and Liturgy.

IV. MATHEMATICS:

Algebra (including Theory of Equations); Euclid, six Books; Plane and Spherical Trigonometry; Conic Sections; Elementary Mechanics of Solids and Fluids.

V. NATURAL HISTORY :

Analytical and Practical Chemistry, Geology and Mineralogy.

VI. MODERN LANGUAGES—any one :

FRENCH—The Forms and Syntax of the language according to Otto's Grammar. The whole of Bue's *Formes Idiomatiques Comparées* to be correctly and fluently read and translated. Candidates must be able to translate ordinary English prose into French without serious errors, and show some readiness in conversation, and some knowledge of the principal authors.

GERMAN—The Forms and Syntax according to Otto's Grammar. Adler's Reader ; some of Schiller's Poems, and one of his Tragedies. Easy prose to be translated into German, and some readiness in speaking to be shown.

All candidates for Honours in any branch must first pass the Ordinary Degree examination.

Every candidate for a degree in Honours shall be examined in one or more of the following subjects, at his own choice :—

I. CLASSICS :

GREEK—Sophocles, three plays; Thucydides, two books; Aristotle's Ethics, or Politics ; or equivalents.

LATIN—Terence's *Andria* ; Tacitus, six books ; Cicero de *Officiis* ; or equivalents ; Prose and Verse Composition (Lat. & Gr.) ; Formal Logic. Instead of Verse—Aristotle's *Poetics* or *Rhetoric*.

II. ENGLISH LITERATURE :

Shakespeare, four plays exclusive of those previously presented ; Spenser, *Faerie Queene*, Books I., II., III. ; Pope, *Essay on Man*, *Moral Essays* ; Bacon's *Essays* ; Smith's *Student's English Language* ; *History of English Literature* ; Whately's *Logic* ; Whately's *Rhetoric* ; Composition of an English Essay.

III. DIVINITY :

Hebrew and Greek Scriptures ; Evidences ; Ecclesiastical History ; Systematic Divinity ; Church Polity and Liturgies.

IV. MATHEMATICS AND MATHEMATICAL PHYSICS :

Algebra ; Euclid ; Trigonometry ; Dif. and Int. Calculus ; Conic Sections ; Mechanics ; Optics ; Acoustics ; Heat ; Electricity ; Astronomy or Engineering.

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V. NATURAL SCIENCE :

Inorganic Chemistry, in detail ; Analytical Chemistry and Assaying ; General Geology, including both Lithology and Palæontology ; Blow-Pipe work ; and one of the following subjects :—Practical and Determinative Mineralogy ; Organic Chemistry or Botany. The scientific collections of the Museum are available for study, and these are supplemented, when necessary, by the Professor's collection. Excursions for field work will be made when practicable.

VI. MODERN LANGUAGES—any two.

Candidates must show a good knowledge of the forms and syntax of both French and German. In French they must be able to read and translate the whole of *Buc's Formes Idioma-tiques*, and one of *Moliere's Comedies*, correctly and fluently, and to read and translate any French prose whatever, without much hesitation. Any ordinary English prose is to be correctly translated into French, and facility must be shown in conversation. In German, the whole of *Adler*, or an equivalent, most of *Schiller's Poems* and one of his *Dramas*, must have been read. The rest like French.

Modifications in the subjects to be made with the approval of the College Board.

Successful candidates for Honour and Pass Degrees will be classed as follows :

HONOUR DEGREES.

First Optime meruit.

Second Laudabiles progressus fecit.

Third Honores in . . . &c, adeptus est.

PASS DEGREES.

First Satisfecit nobis examinadoribus.

Second Examen subiit.

An Examination fee of One Dollar shall be paid by each candidate to meet the expenses of stationery,—for the examinations through the year,—which shall be provided by the University.

Elective Students may also obtain Pass Certificates, Honour Certificates, and Diplomas, in lieu of Degrees, which shall entitle them to the rank of Associate of Arts.

DIVINITY SCHOOL.

Students admitted to this department must be over 18 years of age. They must produce, on entering, Baptismal and Medical Certificates, and be free from such physical defects as would be likely to interfere with their usefulness as clergymen. Those who are not Students or Graduates in Arts of King's College, or Graduates in Arts of some other University recognized by it, are required to pass an Entrance Examination in which they must show at least a knowledge of Arithmetic, English composition, Modern History, Geography, Scripture History, and the elements of Latin and Greek Grammar.

Divinity Students are required to pass an examination at the end of each term in the lectures given during the term by the Professors of Divinity and by the Lecturers in Divinity appointed by the Visitor and the Board of Governors.

In addition to the Terminal Examination, they are also required to pass two General Examinations in the following subjects. Equivalents may be substituted for the books that are here specified, after due notice has been given. The Second Examination for the Diploma in Theology and for the Title of Licentiate of King's College, will be conducted by examiners nominated by the Visitor and Board of Governors. Every candidate for admission as a Divinity Student must produce a medical certificate as to his health, also a certificate from the clergyman of his parish, in the following form:—

I hereby declare that I have known _____ for _____ years, that I know nothing against his moral character, that he is a communicant in my church, and that he is, in my opinion, a fit person to be admitted to King's College as a Divinity Student with a view to Holy Orders.

This certificate must be endorsed by three communicants of the same parish.

Divinity Students are subject to the Rules of Discipline of the College. They are not at liberty to take duty as lay readers without permission of the Visitor or President, and they are required to submit the sermons they propose to preach to the Visitor or President for approval.

FIRST EXAMINATION.

Bible History, Symbola Ecclesiae, Augustini De Fide et Symbolo Liber.—(Dr. Heurtley's De Fide et Symbolo.)

Greek Testament, The Gospels, Acts of the Apostles, History, and Contents of the Prayer Book; Church History to A. D. 451.

SECOND EXAMINATION.

History of the Reformation; St. Anselm; Cur Deus Homo; Greek Testament; I. and II. Corinthians; Hebrews; Hooker, Books I. and V.; Butler's Analogy, Part I.; Browne on the Articles; Pearson on the Creed; Homilies; Evidences of Christianity; Canon Law.

In addition to the above, Candidates may also be examined in Hebrew.

GRADUATION IN SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING.—B. E. DEGREE.

Undergraduates presenting themselves for examination for the Degree of B. E. shall be required to have been duly matriculated; to have subsequently studied in King's College the course herein prescribed; and to have passed the (University) First Engineering Examination.

The course for Degrees in Civil or Mining Engineering shall usually extend over three years, and shall comprise attendance on the following Curriculum:

Attendance on these Lectures shall, in all cases, include passing such examinations as may be appointed by the College Board.

Candidates shall, on the recommendation of the College Board, be admitted to the Degree after two years' residence instead of three, if their previous acquaintance with a sufficient group of the subjects set down for study in the 1st and 2nd years be deemed satisfactory by the Board; and candidates shall, for special reasons, to be approved by the Board, be admitted to the Degree after one year's residence instead of three.

In such cases the Certificate of the Board will be accepted in lieu of attendance upon these classes, but will not exempt candidates from the University Examination in them.

Students who have completed their second year must present themselves at the (University) First Engineering Examination before rising to the third year; but students prevented by illness, and candidates who, having studied with diligence satisfactory to the Professors, shall fail to pass, will be admitted by the Board to a Supplementary Examination, if this can be creditably passed, the Terms kept in the meantime may be allowed. The (University) First Engineering Examination shall include:—

- 1.—English Literature, as for Responsions.
- 2.—Mathematics,—First and Second Courses.
- 3.—Experimental Physics.
- 4.—Mensuration, Levelling and Mapping.
- 5.—A Modern (European) Continental Language.

The First Course in Mathematics shall include:—Euclid, Books I, II, III, IV, VI, and XI, and Definitions of Book V.; Arithmetic; Algebra, including the usual rules, to the end of Quadratics; Proportion; "Binomial Theorem," for positive integral exponents; Geometrical and Arithmetical Progressions; and nature and use of Logarithms. Plane Trigonometry to the end of solution of Triangles.

The Second Course in Mathematics shall include: Algebra, with the "Theory of Equations"; Plane and Spherical Trigonometry; Analytical Geometry as far as the "Equation of the

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Second Degree"; Conic Sections; Differential and Integral Calculus.

Experimental Physics shall be represented by the Professor's Lectures to the Arts Students, and part of Deschanel's or Ganot's Physics.

The Second, or Final Engineering Examination, entitling the candidate to the B. E. Degree, shall embrace the following subjects:—

Engineering.
Mensuration.
Levelling and Mapping.
Mathematical Physics.

Natural Philosophy (applied).
Chemistry.
Geology.
Mineralogy.

Each candidate will be required to produce at this Examination the Field Notes and Drawings of a Survey made by him.

The course in Mathematical Science will be represented by such books as Newth's Mechanics, Todhunter's Mechanics for Beginners, Galbraith & Houghton's Hydrostatics, Optics and Astronomy.

The course in Natural Philosophy (applied) will be represented by:—Twisden's Practical Mechanics, Elements of Thermodynamics, and parts of Deschanel's or Ganot's Physics, Galbraith & Houghton's Steam Engine.

The course of Chemistry by:—Experimental Physics—(Deschanel's or Ganot's), Inorganic Chemistry (Wilson's), Practical Chemistry, Qualitative Analysis (Fresenius).

Mineralogy (Dana's Manual).

Geology (Dana's Text Book).

In the course for Mining Engineering, instruction will be given in Geological Drawing and Mineral Surveying, in addition to the work required for Students in Civil Engineering in the first year. In the second year there will be Analytical Chemistry and Assaying besides the Civil Engineering course. In the third year there will be courses of Lectures on Mining and Mining Machinery, Practical Mechanics, Geology and Mineralogy (with Blowpiping), Practical Chemistry and Metallurgy.

Among the subjects of Mining in which the Students will be instructed, are Blasting and use of Explosives; Quarrying and Hydraulic Mining; Boring, Sinking, Timbering and Tubing of Shafts; Driving and Timbering of Levels; Underground Conveyance and Hoisting; Drainage and Pumping; Lighting and Ventilation of Mines; Methods of Exploitation employed in working Coal Seams and Metalliferous Deposits, &c. The course in Geology and Mineralogy will be the same as for Honours in the B. A. Degree.

Each candidate must forward to the President on or before the 1st of June notice of his intention to offer himself as a candidate, and before entering on either of the two University Examinations must produce official proofs of having complied with the above-named regulations.

Successful candidates will be arranged in three classes.

The Fee for the Degree in Civil or Mining Engineering will be \$12.00. It must be lodged with the Bursar before the Examination begins.

OF EXAMINERS.

1.—The Examiners to conduct the Degree Examinations, and the Prize Examinations in each year shall be appointed by the Governors at their October meeting of the previous Academical year.

2.—These Examiners shall sign the Declaration, No. 4, in the Appendix to the present code of Statutes.

3.—The Examinations shall be conducted by means of printed or written papers, together with a *viva voce* Examination at the discretion of the Examiner, and shall take place at such a time as shall permit of the results being made known at the Encænna of that year.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING DEGREES IN DIVINITY.

1.—Candidates for the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity, other than those Masters of Arts who are of the standing required by the former Statutes, must be in Priest's Orders of not less than ten years' standing.

2.—They must produce certificates of having matriculated in some University established by Royal Charter, or especially recognized by the Board of Governors, or in lieu thereof diplomas from some recognized Theological College.

3.—Bachelors of Divinity of five years' standing, under these regulations, may proceed to the Degree of Doctor on passing the prescribed examination.

4.—The examination in Divinity will embrace the following subjects:—The Holy Scriptures (Hebrew and Greek), the Composition of a Latin Essay, the Evidences of Christianity, Church History, Ecclesiastical Polity, and Liturgiology.

5. The examination will be conducted in King's College in Easter Term, by a Board of Examiners, nominated by the Visitor and the President.

6.—The fee of \$5.00 is to be paid to the Bursar of the College before the commencement of the examination.

7.—Applications for admission to the examination must be lodged with the President on or before May 1st.

REGULATIONS FOR LOCAL EXAMINATIONS.

It is proposed to hold local examinations for candidates, male and female, who are not members of the University, in Windsor and other places where it may be requested and found expedient.

Every candidate who passes will receive a certificate specifying the subjects in which he or she has satisfied the examiners.

Local Committees wishing to have examinations held in their several districts may obtain all necessary information from the President of King's College, Windsor, N. S.

All such applications must be lodged with the President on or before March 1st.

REGULATIONS FOR JUNIOR CANDIDATES.

Every candidate will be required to pay a fee of \$2.00 to the Secretary of the Examining Committee.

I. All candidates will be required to satisfy the Examiners in—

- (a) Reading aloud a passage from some English author.
- (b) Writing from dictation.
- (c) Analysis and parsing of a passage from some specified English Poem.
- (d) Writing a short Essay.

II. Arithmetic—first four rules, Simple and Vulgar and Decimal Fractions and Proportion.

III. Geography—General Geography, as in Calkin's School Geography, (large edition.)

IV. Outline of English and Canadian History.

V. Bible History—One Book of the Old Testament and one of the four Gospels.

VI. Of the following subjects, one only is obligatory upon the candidates :—

- (1) Latin.—One Book of Virgil and one Book of Cæsar. Latin exercises, as in Principia Latina, Part I, or Henry's First Book.

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(2) Greek.—One Book of Xenophon, with the History and Geography involved in the book. Male candidates to give in also one book of Homer.

(3) French.—A passage will be set from Paul et Virginie for translation into English. Also another passage from some easy French author. Translation of any English sentences into French.

(4) German.—Adler's Reader, Part I. Translating easy English sentences into German.

(5) Mathematics.—Arithmetic; Euclid, Books I., II., III.; Algebra, to simple Equations, inclusive.

Successful candidates will be arranged in three classes according to merit. The schools in which they were taught will be stated.

REGULATIONS FOR SENIOR CANDIDATES' EXAMINATION FOR THE
TITLE OF ASSOCIATE IN ARTS OF THE UNIVERSITY
OF KING'S COLLEGE, N. S.

Every candidate will be required to pay a Fee of \$4.00 to the Secretary of the Examining Committee.

All candidates who have not obtained Junior certificates will be required to pass the obligatory subjects of the Junior examination.

Every candidate will also be required to satisfy the examiners in two at least of the following sections, of which one shall be A. or B.:

A. English.

- (1) English History during the Tudor period.
- (2) English Language and Literature—Sketch of History of English Literature during the Tudor period.
- (3) Shakspeare's Julius Cæsar.
- (4) Milton's Paradise Lost, Books I. and II.
- (5) Gray's Odes.
- (6) Selected Essays from the Spectator, or Macaulay's Essay on Addison.

B. Languages.—To pass in this section, the candidates must satisfy the examiners in one of the following languages:

Latin.—One book of Cæsar, one book of Virgil, one book of Odes of Horace; Writing—first half of Smith's *Principia Latina*, Part V., or Arnold's Latin Prose to the end of the Passive Voice.

Greek.—One book of Homer, one book of Xenophon, one play of Euripides, omitting the lyrical passages.

French.—Etymology and Syntax, according to Otto's Grammar; Racine's *Esther* or *Athalie*. A passage from some French author will be selected for translation into English. For translation into French an exercise of detached sentences will be set.

German.—Etymology and Syntax, according to Otto's Grammar; Schiller's *Marie Stuart* or *William Tell*. The rest as in French.

C. Mathematics.—Euclid, Books I, II, III, IV, VI, Def. of Book V.; Algebra, to the end of Progressions.

D. Natural Science.—The candidates must satisfy the examiners in one of the following subjects:—

(1) Astronomy.—Books recommended: First eleven chapters of Herschel's *Outlines of Astronomy*.

(2) Chemistry.—Books recommended: Roscoe's *Lessons, in Elementary Chemistry*, Barff's *Elementary Chemistry*, Galloway's *First Steps in Chemistry*. For reference: Miller's *Elements*.

(3) Physical Geography.—Book recommended: Page's or Houston's.

(4) Botany.—Books recommended: Asa Gray's "How Plants Grow." For reference: A. Gray's *Structural and Systematic Botany*.

(5) Geology.—Dana's *Text Book of Geology*.

THE WILLIAM COGSWELL SCHOLARSHIP.

(£24 sterling per annum. Open to candidates for Holy Orders, under the direction of the Trustees.)

THE DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIPS.

(Open to students for Holy Orders actually requiring assistance, and subject to the control of the Bishop of the Diocese.)

Eight in number—Thirty pounds sterling per annum.

THE BINNEY EXHIBITION.

(£50 per annum. Open to students in indigent circumstances, and of exemplary conduct.

In the year 1858, Miss Binney, sister of the present Visitor, and daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Hibbert Binney, in the name and on behalf of her father's executors, handed over to the Governors certain stock amounting to \$1000, to found an Exhibition at King's College, to be called "The Binney Exhibition," in memory of her said father.

The design of this scholarship is to assist students who may require assistance, and who shall have commended themselves by their exemplary conduct, although their abilities and requirements may not qualify them to be successful competitors for an open scholarship.

TERMS.—On or before the first day of May, in every year, the College Board shall nominate two students, in their third term, at the least, whom they may deem best qualified, having regard to their straitened means and the excellence of their character; and the President shall forthwith transmit their names, together with a brief statement of their claims, to the Visitor, who shall select one of them to be the Exhibitioner, and to receive the interest accruing for the following year, commencing July 1st. Or, at his discretion, if he consider the claims of the two nominees to be equal, or nearly so, the Visitor may adjudge that the amount be divided between them.

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THE McCAWLEY HEBREW PRIZE.

(£9 sterling. Open to all members of the University who are below the standing of M. A., and who have not already gained the first premium in Hebrew.)

This Prize is given out of the interest of a Trust Fund in the hands of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts. The Fund, and the conditions of the Prize, are thus stated in the Report of the Society :

"This fund arises from a gift of £150 sterling, in the British North American Bank, made by the Rev. George McCawley, D. D. Falmouth. Nova Scotia, the interest to be paid to the student of King's College, Windsor, N. S., who shall pass the best examination in Hebrew Bible and Greek Testament; the examination being under the direction of the Visitor and President.

THE BISHOP'S PRIZE.

(The Bishop's Prize of \$20 in books.)

Subject for 1886 :

Open to all members of the University of not more than twenty-one nor less than twelve Terms standing in June, 1885.

Essays to be sent to the President on or before June 1st, 1886.

THE ALMON WELSFORD TESTIMONIAL.

WILLIAM J. ALMON, ESQ., M. D., endowed King's College with \$400, the interest of which is appropriated as a prize to be competed for every June, by matriculated students, in their first year of residence. The prize to be presented by the President, in the College Hall, on the anniversary of the attack upon the Redan, in which MAJOR WELSFORD fell, on which day, in every year, his gallant and loyal deeds are to be commemorated in Latin. (N. B.—Day changed to first Monday in Michaelmas Term.

THE STEVENSON SCHOLARSHIP.

[Three of \$60 each.

THE REV. J. STEVENSON, M. A., (sometime Professor of Mathematics in King's College,) left a sum of money for the purpose of founding Three Scholarships, tenable for two years, and open to matriculated students in their second year of residence.

REGULATIONS.

(1) These Scholarships shall be competed for in the month of October, and shall be open to all matriculated students in their second year of residence.

(2) No student shall hold more than one of these Scholarships; and in the event of two being vacant at the same time, they shall be awarded to the first and second candidates on the list who shall have attained the proper number of marks.

(3) No student shall be admitted as a candidate who is not prepared to undergo an examination in at least two of the Departments recognized in the Professorships, and who cannot produce satisfactory certificates of moral conduct.

(4) No Scholarship shall be awarded to any candidate who shall not have made at the examination 50 per cent. in two Departments. For the purpose of this examination the subjects indicated by asterisks shall be taken to be Departments.

(5) In arriving at a decision on the merits of the candidates the following shall be assigned as full marks in the various subjects named; but no subject shall count in which less than 25 per cent. shall have been obtained; and subjects limited to those making up 800 marks.

THE MCCAWLEY SCHOLARSHIP.

This Scholarship is given out of the interest of a fund raised by subscription for a Testimonial to the Rev. G. McCawley, D. D., on his retirement from the office of President.

(1) The competition shall be confined to matriculated undergraduates who have completed their first year of residence.

(2) The examination shall be conducted by the Professor of Classics, assisted by such other person as the Governors shall appoint for the time being, either within or without the University, as assessor.

(3) The examination shall be confined principally to such classical works as the Professor of Classics shall have appointed at the beginning of the Michaelmas term preceding, and shall include the translation, grammatical construction and relation to the context of the passages selected, together with such critical papers in prose and verse as may be set at the examination.

(4) The examination shall be subject, in respect of the number of marks required, to the general regulations of the University with reference to prizes and scholarships.

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(5) In the event of there being no competition, or on failure in the examination, the year's interest shall be expended in the purchase of classical books for the library from a list selected by the Professor of Classics, having in view in the first instance the completion of a collection of the works of all the classical authors, and of the best edition of the respective works, whether English or Foreign, and also of books illustrative of the same, at the discretion of the Professor.

(6) This Scholarship shall be competed for in the Lent Term.

THE AKINS HISTORICAL PRIZE

T. B. AKINS, ESQ., D. C. L., Barrister-at-Law, and Commissioner of Public Records, has vested in the Governors, as Trustees, a sum of money sufficient to found a Prize of Thirty Dollars, annually, for the best Paper or Essay on the County History of Nova Scotia, embracing matters derived from all local records, and traditions relating to the early and progressive history of each County. The Essays must be given in to the Secretary of the Governors on or before the 1st June, 1886. The decision on the merits of the Essays to rest with the Governors, or such persons as they may appoint, and to be announced at the Encenia.

Each Essay to be distinguished by a motto, and to be accompanied by a sealed paper, bearing the same motto on the outside, and containing the name of the writer. The subject for 1886 is

In case of a joint certificate, the above form must be complied with, and the same must be signed by all the holders.

Each nominee is exempt from the payment of yearly fees amounting to \$90 for the three years' course, besides the fee for a B. A. Degree. If a scholarship is held besides, nearly the whole cost of the education will be covered.

At the request of the Associated Alumni, nominated Students are required to pay the annual Library Fee of \$5, unless specially exempted on nomination.

CONDITIONS ATTACHED TO THE NOMINATION CERTIFICATES.

1. That on death or transfer the certificate is to be delivered up, and a new certificate obtained. Fee \$2.
2. That the right of nomination belongs to the executors, administrators, or assigns, of the original holder, and not to the heirs.
3. No nomination will be accepted which is not signed by the person or persons in whose name or names the certificate is registered.

*The words "except Library Fee," may be omitted, at the option of the Nominator.

The University Library.

The foundation of the Library is due to the efforts of the first Bishop of Nova Scotia, and may be placed in the year 1780. Several contributions in money had previously been received, but it was not till that year that efforts were made to obtain books.

The original fund at the disposal of the Governors was not more than £250 sterling, and was intrusted to Mr. Inglis (afterwards Bishop), son of the Bishop, and a graduate of the University, who repaired to England in 1800, for the purpose of purchasing books. The names of Dr. Moore, Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Porteous, Bishop of Rochester, Wm. Wilberforce, Sir S. Bernard Morland, John Eardly Wilmot, M. P., and others, thus became connected with the early history of the Library.

Munificent gifts from the University of Oxford continued to increase the value of the collection, which was further enriched by gifts from various English gentlemen, and from others settled in Nova Scotia.

The room in the College building set apart for many years for a Library Hall, was completed in 1810 at the expense of Sir Thomas Strange and the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Subsequently valuable works were presented by Drs. Bayard and McCulloch, and by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge.

Among later benefactors may be mentioned Dr. Greswell, of Worcester College, Oxford; The Smithsonian Institute; The British and Foreign Bible Society; The Dean and Chapter of Westminster; T. B. Akins, Esq., D. C. L.; The Society of Incorporated Alumni of King's College; E. Binney, Esq.; C. Cogswell, Esq., M. D.; The Dominion Government; The Radical

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Bay Club ; The Halliburton Club ; The Secretary of the Interior, United States ; The Institution of Civil Engineers ; The Society of Engineers ; The Royal Society ; The Religious Tract Society ; The Rev. George McCawley, D. D. ; The Rev. Canon Hensley, D. D. ; General Sir W. F. Williams, K. C. B. ; the present Bishop of Nova Scotia ; the Right Rev. Dr. Rigand, late Bishop of Antigua ; the Rev. George Morris, and Her Majesty the Queen.

This large collection of books, now numbering about 8000 volumes, contained till the year 1870 in a single room in the College Building, was then removed to the new Hall specially built for the purpose and presented to the University by the Incorporated Alumni. It contains a large number of standard works of reference in Theology, which is by far the richest department in the Library, and a fair selection of the great Greek and Latin classics.

In Modern History and Belles-Letters it is very poorly supplied.

In Science some recent standard works have from time to time been added, and, next to Theology and Classics, this is the largest department. The languages of Modern Europe are not so well represented.

In spite of many blanks, the Library is one of the largest in the Province, and contains all the elements requisite for making it a thoroughly well appointed and efficient Reference Library.

There is no special Library fund except the fee from students, and the collection can only be increased by grants of money from the Governors, the occasional lapsing of the Welsford prize money, and the benefactions of friends of the University.

The Museum.

NATURAL HISTORY.

GEOLOGY AND MINERALOGY.

The Geological Specimens, many of which are very fine, illustrate the most prominent features of general Geology but the majority have been collected in Nova Scotia and are especially adapted to show the characters of the Fossil Flora and Fauna of the province. There are several collections, which may be discriminated as follows:—

1. The W. B. Almon Collection, presented over forty years ago by Mrs. W. B. Almon, of Halifax, contains, with many minerals and a few shells, a considerable number of rock specimens and a few fossils, chiefly from Scotland, collected by the late W. B. Almon, M. D.

2. The Governors' Collection consists of coal fossils obtained in 1860, at the expense of the Governors of the College; these were collected by Professor How with the valuable assistance of a party headed by Richard Brown, Sr., Esq., then agent at the Sydney Mines, who from long study was familiar with the district. Many of the specimens are exceedingly fine, and some are of large size.

3. The Alumni Collection consists of Silurian and Devonian Fossils, chiefly from Arisaig, N. S., collected, named and arranged stratigraphically by Dr. Honeyman; purchased and presented in 1861 by the Alumni of King's College.

4. The Australian Collection consists of specimens obtained through Col. Nelson, in 1863, from Sir William Denison, then Governor of New South Wales, in exchange for Nova Scotian specimens from the College Cabinet, sent by Professor How. It contains some beautiful fossils, and is arranged stratigraphically; its value is increased by an accompanying large detailed colored

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section made by the Government Examiner of Coal Fields under instructions from Sir W. Dennison.

A collection of British Fossils' chiefly Silurian and Devonian, obtained through Dr. McCawley in exchange for Nova Scotian specimens sent by Professor How from the College Cabinet, in 1860, to Captain, now Sir James Anderson.

6. A collection from Europe, illustrating chiefly the nature of crystalline and sedimentary rocks, purchased by the Governors.

7. Several collections, some of which are unnamed, and single specimens, given and obtained by exchange at various times; of these it will suffice to name: Reptilian Tracks of great geological interest, presented by the widow of their discoverer, the late Dr. Harding; valuable Fossils, chiefly carboniferous, presented by H. Poole, Esq.; Silurian Fossils from Arisaig, presented by H. Hill, Esq., Sheriff of Antigonish; Coal Plants from Cumberland County, presented by Rev. Mr. Townshend, Rector of Amherst; Cretaceous Fossils from England, presented by C. B. Bowman, Esq., and Dr. Honeyman; Silurian and Carboniferous Fossils of Nova Scotia from Professor How; Rocks and Minerals from the Dominion Government; Devonian Corals of Ontario and Canadian Rocks from Professor Spencer.

The mineralogical specimens represent the most important species of minerals,—some of them are of great beauty. They consist of those in the collection, of Zeolites collected at the expense of the Governors, and of various others obtained by gifts and exchange, as mentioned with regard to the geological department. Sir Rupert George; Rev. Dr. Robertson, Rector of Wilmot; H. Brown, Esq., Director of the Geological Survey of Victoria, formerly a distinguished student in science at this College; Rev. Mr. Ambrose; Rev. J. C. Cochran; C. B. Bowman, Esq.; J. Bowman, Esq.; Rev. D. W. Picket; Hon. W. Odell, and Professor How, have presented interesting specimens.

ZOOLOGY.

The Willis Collection consists of specimens fully illustrating Nova Scotia Mollusca, named, arranged, and presented by J. R. Willis, Esq.; A collection from the U. S. Government.

The department is further illustrated by a collection of foreign shells, some interesting skulls and skins, and a limited number of preserved animals.

BOTANY.

The Cogswell Herbarium, bound in five Imperial folio volumes, contains a fine systematically arranged collection of Phænogamous and Cryptogamous Plants of Great Britain, presented by Dr. Cogswell.

The Gossip Herbarium consists of a small number of Scottish Plants, presented by Dr. Gossip.

The Willis Herbarium consists of Nova Scotia Algæ and Terrestrial Plants, presented by J. R. Willis, Esq.

The Strange Herbarium consists of a considerable number of East India Plants, presented, in 1805, by Sir T. Strange.

The Ball Herbarium of Nova Scotia, consisting of about 250 species, presented by Rev. E. H. Ball.

There are also a few woods, barks, leaves, and fruits—from various sources—presented by C. B. Bowman, Esq., Hon. W. J. Almon, M. D., and other benefactors.

THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

The General Collection consists of various curiosities from different parts of the world, and a small but choice cabinet of coins. Other interesting curiosities are the beautiful Indian Pipe from Queen Charlotte's Island, the models of the leaning Tower and the Baptistry at Pisa, and the memorials of Gens. Williams and Inglis, which include the sword worn by the former throughout the siege of Kars, and that used by the latter during the defence of Lucknow. There is also a model of the Cawnpore Memorial Cross, formed of wood from the house in the court-yard of which the women and children were massacred.

The College possesses also a number of autographs of royal and distinguished personages; one of Thomas Moore, the poet

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inscribed in a copy of Lucian, presented by him on the occasion of his visit.

The Coins illustrate the Numismatics of Rome, and most of the countries of the modern world.

The different departments of the museum are arranged in twenty-four flat cases, supported by the balustrade surrounding the gallery, and five large table cases, all glazed and provided with lock and key. The large specimens which could not be conveniently placed in cases are arranged on shelves or distributed in different parts of the Hall.

The friends of Science in Nova Scotia and elsewhere are respectfully requested to contribute specimens to the Museum of King's College. The steps which have been lately taken by the Governors to provide suitable cases for the arrangement and display of the contents of the Museum in the fine Hall erected at the expense of the Alumni, offer a guarantee that the liberality of donors will be carefully recognized and fully recorded.

It is particularly requested that donors will send their contributions of Books, Coins and Curiosities, addressed to the Librarian, and of Natural History specimens to the *Natural History Curator*, King's College Museum, Windsor N. S. in order that the receipt may be duly acknowledged, and the donations acknowledged in the yearly Calendars as heretofor.

A superb collection of Loyalist China, over three hundred pieces, arranged in three cases, was presented by Judge and Mrs. Weldon, on the 79th anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists in New Brunswick.

REPORT.

THE Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni of King's College, Windsor, on their Thirty-eighth Anniversary, beg leave to submit the following Report.

Your Committee, from time to time, as occasion required, have met to transact such business as was brought before them.

At the last Annual Meeting the enthusiasm of Mr. Ruggles, and the satisfactory account he gave the Association, led us to hope that, though the progress of the Endowment Fund had previously been retarded, it had received a new impetus, and the College would soon be established on a firmer basis than ever.

In October, when your Committee held their usual meeting, the first intimation of serious trouble arising out of the contention respecting the Professor of Modern Languages, which, for the previous two years had been brought before the Association, was given to your Committee in a letter from the President of the Board of Governors, as follows :

“ HALIFAX, October 13th, 1884.

“ MY DEAR SIR,—As the Alumni called the attention of the Governors of King's College to current objections to Professor DeFourmentin as inefficient, I think that it may be right to inform their Committee, through you, what has been done in consequence of their action.

“ The Governors decided to test the effects of the Professor's work by requiring from all his pupils a translation from English into French, to be submitted to a disinterested examiner in Halifax, who gave a very satisfactory report, which was communicated to the annual meeting of the Alumni, at Windsor, in June, and no objection was made, so far as I remember, to the character of that examination, although the mover of the resolution of 1883 was present.

“ It afterwards, however, transpired, that the Rev. H. How, the seconder of that resolution, who was not present this year, called the First Year Class of nine, and had obtained from seven, signatures to a paper specifying a few cases in which it was alleged that help had been given by the President. Of this the first intimation was given to me by Professor Wilson, at the *Conversazione*, on the Wednesday evening, who said, ‘that examination was a fraud, and How is ready to prove it.’

"I only remarked, 'he ought to have made his statement at the meeting this morning, if he had anything to say,' and refrained from further conversation upon the subject.

"However, I immediately wrote to Mr. How, as Visitor, telling him of Professor Wilson's statement, and received from him the evidence obtained from the students. As the vacation had commenced, I could take no further step before the return of the students to College.

"But, on Thursday, 2nd inst., I received from Professor Wilson a threatening letter, enclosing a statement based upon Mr. How's, with these words, 'unless your Lordship can give me an *immediate* assurance that an investigation is, at an early date, to be held, it is determined to circulate printed copies of this statement before Monday, 6th inst, among the Governors of King's College, and among the Bishops and Clergy of these Provinces, and the principal lay constituents of an institution which only truth and honesty can save.' I answered that the Governors would be ready to receive his evidence at their meeting, to be held as usual at Windsor, on the second Wednesday in October.

"He then appeared, but stated that he had not had time to collect evidence, and would leave the statement of the case to Mr. How, although he had himself sent me a statement ready for publication, of which it would appear that he had never investigated the truth.

"However, the Governors were ready to hear all that could be adduced, and he and Mr. How called their own witnesses (the students of the First Year who had been examined) and questioned them as they pleased. It was made evident that the students had understood the object of the special examination, and purposely did *not* do their best, and the President, as it appeared, with good intentions to counteract this spirit, had suggested *two* or *three* words in French idioms, of which most of them denied that they had availed themselves; and, after full consideration of all the evidence, the enclosed resolution was passed :

"*Resolved*, That in the opinion of this Board no assistance was given to the students examined in French, by the President, in June last, calculated materially to affect the result of the examination as a test of the students' knowledge; but that the mode in which the President conducted the examination was, in some respects, 'injudicious and improper, and that the directions of this Board in relation to said examination were not fully carried out.

"And further *Resolved*, That the Board is fully satisfied that such examination was not in any respect fraudulent."

"Mr. How also stated in his charges submitted to me, as Visitor, with reference to the meeting at which he obtained the signatures of seven out of the eight who had been examined, 'others present declined to sign for fear of future plucks and lest their Scholarships would be taken away. The effect of intimidation was very evident.'

"I presume that your inference from the above will be the same as my own, that there must have been at the least three or four *others*, perhaps more, who refused on account of intimidation; whereas, on investigation, it came out that there was only *one* who *could* have signed, that *he* had no Scholarship, but only some allowance from the Bishop of Fredericton, entirely independent of the College authorities, and that there was not the slightest trace of 'intimidation' in any way whatever.

"That Professor de Fourmentin has incurred the ill-will of the students is evident, but there is no proof of his inefficiency. In November last year these same students presented a memorial complaining that he required too much from them considering the amount of work to be done in other departments, and I have obtained their papers written at the regular Terminal Examination last June, from which I hope to obtain some definite evidence as to the progress made by them under his tuition.

"We have not the slightest wish to retain the present Professor if he ought to be removed, but we must not sacrifice him to unfounded prejudices on the part of the students.

This letter your Committee acknowledged, but deferred its consideration until their next monthly meeting, when another letter, from the President, of the 5th November, informing them of the action of the Board and their vote, 8 to 2, dismissing the Professor of Classics, for a letter published by him in the *Herald* newspaper on the 20th October, and also informing them that the Board had decided to investigate certain charges made against other members of the Faculty, whereupon your Committee passed the following Resolution:—

"*Resolved*, That in the opinion of the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association, it is deemed not only injudicious, but also inexpedient, for any action of deprivation to be passed upon the Professor of Classics before he has had an opportunity of defending himself in person with regard to any charge brought against him, and a full investigation has been made into all the alleged difficulties at present surrounding the College, as well with regard to the incompetency of one or all of the Professorial Staff, as to its general management; and further, that the Committee realizing the critical position in which the College is now placed, will gladly coöperate with the Governors in bringing about a speedy and amicable settlement of the present trouble."

This Resolution was duly forwarded to the Board, from whom the following series of resolutions, accompanied by a letter from their

Secretary, was received and considered at a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, held on the 18th November :—

“ DEAR SIR,—I am instructed by the Board of Governors King's College, Windsor, to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of 12th inst., containing copy of Resolution passed at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Alumni, held on the 11th inst., and to thank them for their offer of assistance, which they will be glad to avail themselves of should occasion arise.

“ I am also instructed to enclose you copies of Resolutions passed, which will explain to the Committee the action of the Board of Governors and the present position of the case to which the Committee refers.

Resolution passed at meeting of Board of Governors, King's College, Windsor, held 12th November, 1884 :—

“ *Whereas*, a memorial presented to this Board by Professor Wilson, at the regular meeting in October last, was deferred for consideration at the next regular meeting ; and *whereas*, in the meantime, that is to say, on the 20th October, a letter was published by Professor Wilson, including the said memorial ;

“ *And Whereas*, the said letter has been fully discussed at a meeting of this Board specially called for the consideration thereof, on the 4th inst., and the conduct of the Professor (in publishing that letter) has been condemned by a large majority, viz., by eight against two, as entered upon the minutes of the Board ;

“ *Therefore Resolved*, That a copy of the said Resolution, with the numbers voting, be forwarded to Professor Wilson, in answer to his memorial.

“ *And whereas*, the said memorial alludes to charges made against the Professor, the Board affirms that no charge against him had been made by the Board, and that any publicity given to the private letter of enquiry by the Visitor, is entirely through the act of the Professor himself.

“ That the Board, as is apparent by the Visitor's letter, had not decided to hold an investigation, and that if such an investigation had been deemed necessary after the receipt of a reply to that letter, it would have been

conducted as a matter of internal discipline, with all reasonable facilities to Professor Wilson for establishing his own views of the merits of the case."

Resolution passed at meeting of the Board of Governors, King's College, 4th November, 1884 :—

"Whereas, the Rev. Professor Wilson has published in the daily papers, viz., October 20th, 1884, a letter containing disparaging statements relative to the Visitor, the Governors and the President of King's College, expressed in language unbecoming his position as a Professor ;

"And whereas, such conduct cannot but be subversive of discipline in the College ;

"Therefore resolved, that Professor Wilson be informed that his services will not be required after ———."

Passed 8 to 2.

On the 15th November the following Resolution was received through the President of the Association, accompanied by this letter from the Secretary of the Board :—

"HALIFAX, 15th November, 1884.

"DEAR SIR,—I enclose you herewith, by instruction of the Board of Governors King's College, copy of a Resolution passed at the meeting of the Board held yesterday.

"Whereas, the condition of the affairs of King's College, Windsor, has become so complicated as to necessitate a new basis ;

"Be it resolved, That all the members of the Faculty be requested without delay to place their resignations in the hands of the Board of Governors, but that each Professor be eligible for re-appointment if so decided by the successors in office to the present Board.

"And further resolved, That all the members of the Board of Governors appointed by the Alumni tender their resignations to a general meeting of the Associated Alumni called for the purpose of choosing their successors."

After due consideration, it was thought advisable to call a special meeting of the Association, of which due notice was given by the

following advertisement, which your Committee have embodied in their minutes as a formal Resolution :—

“ALUMNI OF KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR, N. S.

“A Special General Meeting of the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, will be held at St. Luke's Hall, on Thursday, 27th inst., at 3 p. m., to consider the proposed resignation of certain members of the Board of Governors, and to transact such other business in the interests of the College as may be deemed advisable.

“By order.

The members of the Association in large numbers met as notified, and after long and deliberate consideration, the following Resolution passed, 28 to 13 :—

“Resolved, That in consideration of the present state of affairs in King's College, the Governors be requested to notify the Faculty of King's College that their services will not be required after June 30, 1885.”

This Resolution was immediately communicated to the Board of Governors, who on the 8th December sent the following Resolutions to your Committee :—

“DEAR SIR,—I enclose you by instructions of the Board of Governors King's College, copy of Resolution passed at meeting held on Friday last.

“Resolved, That whereas it is found to be impossible, owing to the state of the finances, to continue the present number of the staff of King's College, the Executive Committee of the Alumni be requested to appoint a committee to confer with a committee of this Board as to the possibility of raising sufficient funds, or as an alternative, the propriety of reducing the number of Chairs.”

“Resolved, That the Governors beg to acknowledge the receipt of the Resolution passed by the Alumni on the 27th November last, and inform

them that they have taken such steps as in their opinion are in the interests of the College."

These Resolutions were considered by your Committee at a special meeting called for the purpose on the 16th December, when, after mature deliberation, the following Resolution was passed and forwarded to the Board :—

"Whereas, The Board of Governors have asked for the appointment of a Joint Committee to consider the possibility of raising sufficient funds to continue the present Staff of King's College, or the reduction of the number of Chairs; therefore be it

"Resolved, That while the Executive Committee consider that they have been treated, both in the meeting of November 27th and also in the Resolution of December 5th, with scant courtesy by the Board of Governors, in that they have failed to take this Committee in the least degree into their confidence, they nevertheless do hereby appoint the committee as requested, and do nominate ——— as such committee, with the understanding that the subjects to be discussed be not limited to the two topics named in the Resolution of the Board of Governors; and further

"Resolved, That the Executive Committee be and are hereby appointed that committee."

A joint meeting was accordingly held, and the several matters referred to were fully discussed.

The Treasurer's account for the past year is herewith submitted.

The following notice of motion, handed in by Dr. Almon at the last annual meeting, calls for your consideration, as well as the one following it, given by Mr. Wilson at the special general meeting :—

"That a general meeting of the Associated Alumni be held in Halifax yearly, on the second Wednesday in June, and that at that meeting (in addition to any other business which may be transacted) the names of the candidates for Governors of King's College, to be elected at the ensuing annual meeting at Windsor, be proposed, and that no person whose name has not been proposed at this preliminary meeting in Halifax, shall be eligible for election as Governor at the regular annual meeting at Windsor.

"That persons entitled to vote by proxy, may at the preliminary meeting nominate candidates in writing.

"That the Secretary of the Associated Alumni, as soon as possible after the preliminary meeting, shall notify, by postal card, or otherwise, all

persons residing in the Maritime Provinces entitled to vote, the names of the persons proposed at the preliminary meeting for election.

"That no proxy for the election of Governors of King's College be valid unless it specifies by name the candidate in whose behalf it is to be used."

"HALIFAX, N. S., 27th November, 1884.

"I give notice that at the next annual meeting of the Alumni I will move that members of the Faculty of King's College shall be ineligible for the position of Governors of the College."

Your Committee beg leave to recommend that application be made to the Legislature for the repeal of "the Act to amend the Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to Repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing and Maintaining a College in this Province."

(Passed the 7th day of May, A. D. 1866.)

"Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows :

"Sections 2 and 3 of the above named Act are hereby amended by adding to the 3rd Section the following words :

"But no person shall be re-elected to the office of Governor of said College until after the period of at least eleven months from the time he shall have last served as such Governor."

The question of confederation of King's College with Dalhousie College having been much discussed during the past year, your Committee consider it a matter of vital importance, and though they have nothing to report, they yet trust the subject may receive the most careful consideration at this meeting.*

This year we have to again announce the demise of several of the oldest members of the Association.

ADMIRAL BAYFIELD, of Charlottetown, P. E. I.

JOHN C. HALLIBURTON, Esq., of Halifax,

and the Hon. LEWIS M. WILKINS, D.C.L., of Windsor,

who matriculated in 1815, was made B.A. in 1819, and an Hon. D.C.L. in 1874, and who, after a long and honorable career, has left a name of which the College may justly be proud.

In addition to the other business of the day, you will have to elect four Governors to fill the vacancies caused by the resignation of John P. Mott, Esq., elected at the last annual meeting, but who declined to serve; the demise of the Hon. Lewis M. Wilkins, D.C.L., and the

Senator, and Henry Pryor, Esq., D.C.L.

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An Act to Incorporate the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

(Passed the 30th day of March, A. D. 1848.)

WHEREAS, a number of persons having associated themselves under the name of the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, for the promotion of education, and have raised by private contribution sums of money which they are desirous to expend in aid of the funds of the said College, and the Collegiate School, at Windsor, connected therewith, in or towards the maintenance and support of the teachers therein, or in such other way as may best conduce to the end which they have in view, and they are desirous of obtaining assistance from the Legislature, by the passing of an Act of Incorporation for enabling them to hold property, and to manage their affairs with greater ease and convenience.

I. Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly; That John T. Twining, James B. Uniacke, Henry Pryor, Hugh Hartshorne, and all and every such other person and persons as now are members of, or in the said Society, and their successors, shall be and are hereby appointed a body, politic and corporate, in deed, and in name, by the name of "The Alumni of King's College, Windsor," and by that name have succession and a common seal, and by that name shall sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, at law and in equity, and in all courts and places, and be able and capable in law to have, hold, purchase, get, receive, take, possess and enjoy, lands, tenements, hereditaments and rents, in fee simple or otherwise, and also goods and chattels, and all other things, real, personal and mixed, and also to give, grant, sell, let, assign or convey the same or any part thereof, and to do and execute all other things in and about the same, as shall or may be thought necessary or proper; and also shall have from time to time and at all times full power, authority and license to constitute, make and establish such.

by-laws, rules and ordinances, as may be thought necessary for the rule and good management of said Society, the establishing of officers proper for the management of its affairs, and declaring the extent, duration and authority of the offices and officers of the Society, and their mode of appointment, and generally for promoting the objects of the Society, provided such by-laws, rules and ordinances be not contrary and repugnant to the laws and statutes of this Province, or those in force within the same, or to the laws and statutes of King's College, Windsor, respectively, at the time such by-laws, rules and ordinances may be constituted and established, or to the provisions of this Act; and provided, also, that the said Society shall not hold at any time lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods, chattels, property or effects, of greater value than ten thousand pounds.

II. And be it enacted, that all persons paying an annual subscription of twenty shillings or upwards, or making at one time a donation of twenty pounds or upwards, shall be entitled to be members of the said Society, having been duly admitted, pursuant to the by-laws thereof, provided that such annual subscription or donation be actually paid into the funds of the Society, and provided that no person now a member of the said Society, or who, hereafter, may become a member of the same, shall at any time hereafter continue a member of the same, unless he shall have heretofore paid, or shall hereafter pay at one time into the funds of the said Society a donation of at least twenty pounds, or shall hereafter annually, and from year to year, pay into the said funds the sum of twenty shillings or upwards; and if such annual subscription, or payment of any such annual member, shall not be paid on the first day of May in each year, such member shall thereupon cease to be a member of the said Society, until such annual subscription or payment shall be actually paid, or until such person shall otherwise become a member of the said Society, or under some by-law or rule thereof.

III. And be it enacted that the said Society shall be governed, and its affairs managed by a Committee of nine, comprising a President, Vice-President, and seven other members, a Secretary and Treasurer; the said Committee to be henceforth called the Executive Committee, and such other officers as the said Society may from time to time think proper.

IV. And provided, and be it enacted, that John T. Twining, D. D. now the President of the said Society, shall, after the passing of this

said Act, be the President of the said Society; that the Hon. Henry Hezekiah Cogswell, now the Vice-President, of the said Society, be the Vice-President of the said Society after the passing of this Act: that Samuel L. Shannon, Esquire, now the Secretary and Treasurer thereof after the passing of this Act; and Samuel P. Fairbanks, Henry Pryor and James B. Uniacke, William J. Almon, Robert Fitzgerald Uniacke, Mather B. Almon and Charles Twining, now the Managing Committee of the said Society, shall, after the passing of this Act, be the Executive Committee of the said incorporated Society, until an Executive Committee be elected under this Act.

V. And be it enacted, that all persons, without regard to religious denomination or difference of religious sentiment, may be, and at any time hereafter become members of the said incorporated Society, being in all other respects entitled to be and become members of the said Society, and now, and at any time hereafter, may hold any of the said appointments, or any other offices and appointments in the said Incorporated Society, being duly elected and appointed thereto, pursuant to the bye-laws thereof, anything contained herein, or in any rules, regulations, or bye-laws of the said Society to the contrary notwithstanding.

VI. And be it enacted, that the said Society, incorporated as aforesaid, shall have power from time to time hereafter, to appoint the President, Vice-President, and Executive Committee, at some general meeting of the said Society by a majority of the members of the Society present, the whole number present being not less than twenty members, according to such regulations concerning such appointments as may hereafter be made by any bye-laws of the said Society, to be made by virtue hereof.

VII. And be it enacted, that the Secretary and Treasurer of the said Society, and such other officers as may hereafter be required for the management of its affairs, shall be appointed in such manner as shall be declared by the bye-laws and rules of said Society, to be made by virtue hereof.

VIII. And be it enacted that all donations to the said incorporated Society, to constitute life members or otherwise, if not less than twenty pounds, shall be invested under the direction of the Executive Committee of a permanent fund for the benefit of the said Society, and that the funds of the said incorporated Society shall from time

to time be laid out and applied by the Executive Committee in such way and for such purpose only as any general meeting of the said Society may direct or appoint, and that the Executive Committee shall be bound and are hereby required annually to account to the Society for all their acts, receipts, expenditure and doings whatsoever, in the said office, and to make a report annually to the said Society, at its general meeting, of the progress and state of the Society, and of its affairs generally.

IX. And be it enacted, that a general meeting of the said Society shall be held once, that is to say, some time within the last ten days of the month of June, in each year, and as much oftener as may be directed by any rule or bye-law of the said Society.

X. And be it enacted, that the Executive Committee of the said Society shall meet and assemble as often as there may be occasion, and any three members shall form a quorum.

An Act to Incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing and Maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 4th day of April, A. D. 1852.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows :

1. The Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of his late Majesty King George the Third, entitled "An Act for founding, establishing and maintaining a College in this Province," is hereby repealed.

2. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, the Honorable Brenton Halliburton, Reverend George McCawley, D. D., the Honorable James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, Esquire, together with eight persons, being members of the Church of England, to be elected at a general or special meeting of the "Alumni of King's College, Windsor," shall be Governors of the College hereby incorporated.

3. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia, for the time being, shall be always *ex officio* a Governor, President of the Board and Visitor, the

said Brenton Halliburton, George McCawley, James B. Uniacke, and Lewis Morris Wilkins, shall be Governors for the term of their respective lives; and of the eight persons to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, two shall, in each and every year, successively, in the order of their election, go out of office, but such two Governors may be re-elected.

4. All vacancies hereafter occurring, whether by death, resignation, removal from office, or otherwise, amongst the Governors, from time to time, shall be filled up by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor, in manner hereinbefore appointed, but the Governors shall always be elected from among members of the Church of England, and every person hereafter elected on any such vacancy, shall, as to his tenure of office, be subject to the regulation hereinbefore prescribed touching the eight persons to be elected by the Alumni of King's College, Windsor.

5. For the better management of the College, and for more completely executing the purposes of this Act, the Governors appointed, and to be appointed from time to time by virtue hereof, shall be a body politic and corporate in deed and in name, and have a common seal and succession for ever, by the name of Governors of King's College, Windsor, and by that name shall make bye-laws and ordinances for the regulation and management of the College, and shall also have, hold and enjoy, for the use and benefit of the College and the purposes of this Act, all the goods and chattels, and all the lands which are now had, held, occupied, or enjoyed by "the Governors of King's College, of Nova Scotia," or by "the Governors, President and Fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia," or by any person in trust for them or in their behalf, in the same manner as if the same had been duly conveyed and transferred to the Governors hereby incorporated, by virtue of a statute of this Province, authorizing the conveyance and transfer thereof, also shall have the power to purchase, receive, take, hold, and enjoy for the use and benefit of the said College, and the purpose of this Act, and other goods, chattels, or lands, so as the said last mentioned lands shall not exceed in value ten thousand pounds, and also at all times hereafter shall have power to sell, lease, mortgage, or otherwise dispose of the lands belonging to the College, or any part thereof, for the benefit of the said College, as to the Governors, thereby incorporated, may seem proper, any law to the contrary notwithstanding.

6. The Governors hereby incorporated, at any general meeting assembled, shall, from time to time, and as they shall think fit, make and establish such statutes and ordinances for the instruction, care and government of the students, the management of the property of the College, the appointment of the President, Professors, Fellows, and Scholars, (the President always to be a member of the Church of England), and also touching any matter or thing respecting the College, which to them shall seem meet.

7. The College hereby incorporated shall be taken to be an University, with all the usual privileges of such an institution, whether relating to the conferring of degrees and honors, or otherwise.

8. From the time of this Act coming into operation until the appointment of a full Board of Governors, by virtue thereof, the present Governors shall, notwithstanding this Act, continue to exercise all the powers which are now vested in them, by the Act hereby repealed, and the royal charter which they now hold.

9. All academical honors and degrees, all rights, powers, privileges and authorities now had, held, or exercised by any person, by virtue of the Act hereby repealed, or of the charter hereinbefore referred to, except so far as they may be necessarily taken away, altered, abridged or affected by, or in consequence of this Act, shall be had, held, and exercised, in relation to the College hereby incorporated, as fully as now had, held, or exercised.

10. The Royal Charter, incorporating "the Governors, President, and Fellows of King's College, at Windsor, in the Province of Nova Scotia," shall not in any manner be affected by this Act, except so far as may be necessary to give effect to this Act.

This Act shall not come into operation until Her Majesty's assent be signified thereto.

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An Act to Amend the Act to incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor, and to repeal the Act for Founding, Establishing and Maintaining a College in this Province.

(Passed the 7th day of May, A. D. 1866.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows :—

Sections 2 and 3 of the above named Act are hereby amended by adding to the 3rd section the following words :

“ But no person shall be re-elected to the office of Governor of said College until after the period of at least eleven months from the time he shall have last served as such Governor.”

An Act to amend the Act to incorporate the Governors of King's College, Windsor.

(Passed the 19th day of April, A. D. 1883.)

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as follows :—

1. The number of the Governors of King's College, Windsor, shall be increased to fifteen by the addition of two Governors, who shall hereafter be elected from time to time by the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia and shall be members of that Synod at the time of their election. Such additional Governors so to be elected, shall hold office for four years and shall go out of office alternately, and one of such Governors shall be elected at each regular Biennial Session of the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia. Until such election can take place, J. Norman Ritchie, and Charles James Stewart of Halifax, Esquires, who have been nominated by the said Synod for the purpose at its last Session, shall be, and they are hereby appointed Governors of King's College, Windsor; the said Charles James Stewart to continue in office until the Session of said Synod in 1884 and the said J. Norman Ritchie until the Session of said Synod in 1886. In case of the death or resignation of any of said additional Governors, the vacancy shall be filled at the next ensuing Session of the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia, and the Governor then elected shall hold office for the residue of the term of four years.

2. Whenever and so soon as the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton shall by resolution declare King's College at Windsor to be the College

approved by said Synod for the education and training of the Divinity Students of the Diocese of Fredericton, the Governors of King's College, Windsor, may by resolution, duly passed at a meeting called for that purpose, still further increase their number by the addition of three more Governors, one to be the Lord Bishop of Fredericton for the time being who shall then be *ex officio* a Governor of King's College, and the remaining two to be elected from time to time by the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton in such way and for such term as the said Diocesan Synod may from time to time limit and appoint, and to be members of that Synod at the time of their election. But if at any time thereafter the approval and support of the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton shall be withdrawn from King's College, or the Divinity Students of that Diocese shall cease to attend said College, the persons so elected by the Synod of that Diocese, and also the Bishop of Fredericton shall thereupon cease to be Governors of King's College, Windsor, and the number of said Governors shall be reduced to that extent, which reduction shall be effected by a resolution of the Governors of King's College, Windsor, passed at a meeting called for that purpose.

3. Whenever, and so soon as the Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland shall by resolution declare King's College at Windsor to be the College approved by the said Synod for the education and training of the Divinity Students of the Diocese of Newfoundland, the Governors of King's College, Windsor, may by resolution duly passed at a meeting called for that purpose, still further increase their number by the addition of two more Governors to be elected from time to time by the Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland, in such way and for such time as the said Diocesan Synod may from time to time limit and appoint. But if at any time thereafter the approval and support of the Diocesan Synod of Newfoundland shall be withdrawn from King's College, or the Divinity Students of that Diocese shall cease to attend said College, the persons so elected by the Synod of that Diocese shall thereupon cease to be Governors of King's College, Windsor, and the number of said Governors shall be reduced to that extent, which reduction shall be effected by a resolution of the Governors of King's College, Windsor, passed at a meeting called for that purpose.

4. All Governors elected by virtue of this Act shall as regards their eligibility for re-election be subject to the regulations of the Synod by which they have been elected respectively, notwithstanding the provisions of Chapter 100 of the Acts of the Legislature of Nova Scotia for 1866.

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BYE-LAWS

OF

THE ALUMNI OF KING'S COLLEGE, WINDSOR.

Passed at a General Meeting held at the Halifax Hotel, June 27th, 1848.

I. Besides the Annual General Meeting of the Incorporated Society, it shall be competent for the Committee at any time, either of their own accord, or upon a requisition signed by at least ten of the members of the Association, upon giving seven days' notice in the public papers, to call a Special General Meeting of the Association, specifying the purpose for which it is called, and in which meeting it shall be competent for the Association to transact any such business as may be required. Ten members shall be deemed a quorum for the transaction of business.

II. That the books, accounts and papers of the Association shall be open at all times for the inspection of members, and the Secretary shall furnish an account of the affairs of the Association whenever required by the Committee.

III. That the Treasurer and Secretary, and such officers as shall be requisite for the Incorporated Society, shall be annually appointed by the Executive Committee.

IV. That at the Annual Meeting of the Association, the President and Vice-President shall alternately go out of office, accompanied by the first three of the Committee, and that all or any of them having a majority of votes shall be eligible to be re-elected.

V. That at any meeting, members not present may vote by proxy in writing, to be held by any other member; provided that no member shall be entitled to vote either personally or by proxy, whose dues are not all paid up for the preceding year.

VI. That the funds of the Association will be appropriated for the payment of one or more professors or lectures, and one or more scholarships at the University of King's College, or one or more teachers or exhibitions in the Collegiate School at Windsor, to be denominated the Alumni Professorships and scholarships, respectively.

VII. That the Association will scrupulously apply such donations as may be made to them to such specific objects in aid of King's College as may be directed by the donors respectively.

VIII. That all meetings of the Incorporated Society shall be opened with prayer.

IX. (*Passed at general meeting of June 21st, 1849.*) That the election of members of the Incorporation shall be by ballot.

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RULES PASSED AT DIFFERENT TIMES.

1. That no resolution or proceeding inconsistent with or modifying any resolution or proceeding adopted by a general meeting be entertained by the Executive Committee in Halifax, except upon a month's notice to the Committee being given by the person proposing the same, and that no such resolution or proceeding be carried into effect until the same shall have been confirmed by a general meeting to be summoned for the consideration thereof, if necessary to be arranged before the annual general meeting.
2. A month's notice shall be given of all resolutions affecting the rights of members, or creating new offices or salaries.
3. No individual shall be entitled to vote under a parochial certificate unless he be authorized by a parish meeting.
4. All annual general meetings of this Association shall be holden at Windsor.
5. That the Treasurer make up his annual account to the 30th of April in each and every year.
6. In the election of Governors all the names proposed shall be put on the same ballot, out of whom those having the highest number shall be declared elected; provided that no person shall be declared elected as Governor unless he have a majority of votes cast.
7. That in the election of Governors the order of names be such as to place the name of the candidate obtaining the smallest number of votes at the head of the list, and so on in succession.
8. That the ballot be not sent round for any officers of this Association, or of the Board of Governors, whose name has not been previously proposed and seconded by some member of the Association; and that the ballot be not taken until all the names of all persons intended to be proposed for any office be given.

9. That the Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni be empowered at their monthly meetings, during the interval between one annual general meeting and the next, to elect members of the Incorporation, provided that no black beans be cast against them.

10. That honorary certificates be granted in the several departments instead of the prizes as heretofore.

11. That any member of this Society whose annual subscription shall remain and be unpaid for three years shall cease to be a member of this Society, and can only be admitted as a new member by being proposed and seconded and duly elected pursuant to the bye-laws.

That the Alumni adopt for Life Members' donors of \$200 and upwards to the Endowment Fund.

That a statement be made to the Alumni at their annual meetings of the funds and appropriations of the College.

That efforts be made to increase the number of Alumni, and that Graduates and Students be solicited to become members.

That Graduates of the College be *ipso facto* members of the Association, on payment of subscription, without election.

That the annual subscription be Two Dollars, and that the payment of the sum of Twenty-five Dollars by any person at any one time may entitle him to life membership; but "That while the payment of Two Dollars annually confers every privilege of membership, all are earnestly requested to remember the urgent need of the College, the important work the alumni are associated to advance, and that they need not necessarily limit their amount to the sum above named."

"That no member be permitted to hold more than one proxy."

NOTICE OF MOTION.

"That with the consent of the Governors, a circular to the following effect be sent to the holders of Nomination Certificates now in force:—

"In consequence of the withdrawal of the Government grant, and the evident inability of the additional endowment now being raised meeting the present necessities of the College and maintaining the staff

of Professors absolutely necessary to its efficiency, the Associated Alumni earnestly request all future nominations be made conditional, upon payment by the nominee of Ten Dollars in the first week of December of each year into the general funds of the College, in addition to Five Dollars given to the Library."

NOTICE OF MOTION.

Deferred to 1886.

That a General Meeting of the Associated Alumni be held in Halifax yearly, on the second Wednesday in June, and that at that meeting, (in addition to any other business that may be transacted,) the names of the candidates for Governors of King's College to be elected at the ensuing Annual Meeting at Windsor, be proposed, and that no person whose name has not been proposed at this preliminary meeting in Halifax, shall be eligible for election as Governor at the regular annual meeting at Windsor.

That persons entitled to vote by proxy may, at the preliminary meeting, nominate candidates in writing.

That the Secretary of the Associated Alumni, as soon as possible after the preliminary meeting, shall notify, by postal card, or otherwise, all persons residing in the Maritime Provinces entitled to vote, the names of the persons proposed at the preliminary meeting, for election.

That no proxy for the election of Governor's of King's College be valid unless it specifies by name the candidate in whose behalf it is to be used.

KING'S COLLEGE SCHOOL,

WINDSOR, N. S.

HEAD MASTER: The REV. C. E. WILLETS, M. A., D. C. L.

Graduate and formerly Scholar of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge.

This School is in direct connection with King's College, and is carried on under regulations prescribed by the Board of Governors.

The object of the School is to provide a sound, religious, classical, mathematical, and general education, in conformity with the principles of the Church of England; but it is open to all denominations without restriction.

Pupils belonging to the Church of England attend the Sunday Services in the College Chapel, but those of other Denominations, may if required by their parents, attend the Sunday services of the Denomination to which they belong. In the latter case certificates of proper attendance will be required from the Minister.

While ample provision is made to prepare boys for the University and high Civil Examinations, the utmost attention is devoted to imparting such a training as may fit them for all pursuits and professions, and enable them to take that position in society which is conceded only to men of liberal education and refined habits.

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

The course of instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, German, French, English, etc.

TERMS.

The School Year is divided into three Terms:

Michaelmas, Lent and Trinity Terms.

Michaelmas Term begins the first Saturday in September.

Lent Terms begins the third Saturday in January.

Trinity Terms begins the first Saturday in April.

FEES.

Boarders	\$200 per annum.
Day Scholars	40 "

The fees are distributed over the year, as follows :

Boarders—Michaelmas Term	\$80
Lent and Trinity Terms	60 each.
Day Scholars—Michaelmas Term	16
Lent and Trinity Terms	12 each.

Modern Languages—Boarders and Day Scholars—Michaelmas Term, \$5. Lent and Trinity Terms, \$3.50 each.

A half Term's notice must be given in writing, or a half term's Fee paid previous to the removal of a pupil.

There are two exhibitions connected with the School, one of \$40 and the other of \$20, and a prize of \$10 for French.

RULES REGULATING THE COLLEGIATE SCHOOL PRIZES OR EXHIBITIONS.

"The exhibitions shall be annually contended for, the first prize to be open to the Senior form alone; the second to all the forms of the School except the Senior."

The exhibition of forty dollars shall be awarded to the pupil of the Senior form who shall stand first on the list of Examiners, and the second exhibition of twenty dollars to the pupil of all the other forms who shall stand first on the list of the Examiners.

No pupil shall be entitled to the highest exhibition unless the examination he has passed shall be such as to qualify him to matriculate at King's College, though not compulsory for him so to do.

Several years ago a third prize was added to the number, viz., one of ten dollars for the best scholar in the French language, open for competition to the whole school.

The Committee in charge of this prize fund offer for the year 1886, a prize of fifteen dollars for the best scholar in French, open to all the school, and five dollars for the best scholar in German, also open to all the school.

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
