ROYAL PARTY IN CALGARY

Given Rousing Send Off by Veterans on Leaving City—Duke Welcomes American Settlers to West.

DAIRYING IN THE DOMINION PROSPEROUS

Department of Agriculture Publishes Commissioner's Report—Butter Production Not Sufficient.

OUTLOOK, HE SAYS, EXCEEDINGLY GOOD.

Fruit Law Violations Fewer and Inspections More Frequent.

Ottawa, Sept. 5.—The Department of Agriculture has made public the report of J. A. Ruddick, the dairy and cold storage commissioner for the year ending March 31, 1912. Mr. Ruddick in the course of his summary of the features of the year makes some interesting remarks on the subject of the home market.

After noting that the unfavorable weather of 1911 caused a shortage of butter and cheese Mr. Ruddick says: "It became apparent early in the winter that stock of stored butter in Canada, plus the winter production, would be insufficient to supply the demand until the new season's output would be available. As a result, a large quantity of butter was imported, principally from New Zealand, the total quantity coming from that country down to date (March 31) being 2,729,644 pounds. There has also been imported during the year 929,318 pounds from the United States."

Dealing with the export market, he says: "Germany continues to grow in importance in the international trade in dairy produce, every year importing larger quantities of butter."

He adds: "The outlook for dairying at present is exceedingly good and there is every encouragement from the market point of view for Canadian farmers to increase their production."

DISPUTE TO BE AROUSED

Trouble Over Election of Directors of Banque Nationale du Canada Has Settled in Court.

Montreal, Sept. 5.—The dispute over the election of the board of directors of the Banque Internationale du Canada was advanced a stage yesterday afternoon when French interests, constituting 55 per cent of the total shareholding, secured a quo warranto against the present officers of the bank, an application for an injunction to restrain the present board of directors from making a call for payments of additional instalments on the stock was dismissed with costs, the court in the main pointing out that the petitioners, as far as their second application was concerned, had failed to show that in the absence of an injunction, they would suffer irreparable injury.

ARRANGING FOR ESTIMATES FOR INTERCOLONIAL

Two and Quarter Million Will Be Required by Road from Current Revenue—Managing Board in Ottawa.

Ottawa, Sept. 5.—The Intercolonial Railway Board of Management is in the city in connection with the preparation of estimates for next year. It is learned that about two and a quarter millions will be asked for, mainly for new rolling stock, rail renewals and other improvements. The road is now being operated on such a basis as will permit of the projected outlays being paid out of current revenue in place of charging to capital account.

NOVA SCOTIA CADETS TAKE KING'S PRIZE

Coveted Trophy Captured by "Bluenoses" at Toronto in Competition with the Empire.

NEWS CABLED TO HIS MAJESTY.

Canadians Jubilant on Announcement that Cup Remains in Dominion.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 5.—By a score of 147, the Nova Scotia cadets won the King's prize at the Long Branch ranges this morning, the final contests being fired off under ideal weather conditions. At the end of the 100 and 400 yards contests, on Saturday, the New Zealanders were in the lead, but by good work in the final stages the "Bluenoses" crept up and finally managed to carry off the coveted prize.

The scores were as follows: Second stage—Nova Scotia, 59; England, 54; British Columbia, 51; New Zealand, 42; Australia, 33; Alberta, 26; Woodstock, 21. Total scores—Nova Scotia, 147; England, 136; British Columbia, 137; New Zealand, 131; Woodstock, 95; Australia, 92; Alberta, 75.

The two leading teams used the long kooas. The competition this morning consisted of snip shooting at a figure target 28 inches in height at the 400 yards distance. Thence the contestants had to advance to the 100 yards, firing two rounds at the intermediate stages. They were allowed one minute to complete the performance.

The announcement that the King's prize would remain in Canada caused great rejoicing among the Canadian cadets. The English No. 1 team, at the commencement of the cup was looked upon as a winner owing to the reputation of the members as marksmen. It was expected that the experience they have had at Bielew would give them an unsurmountable advantage.

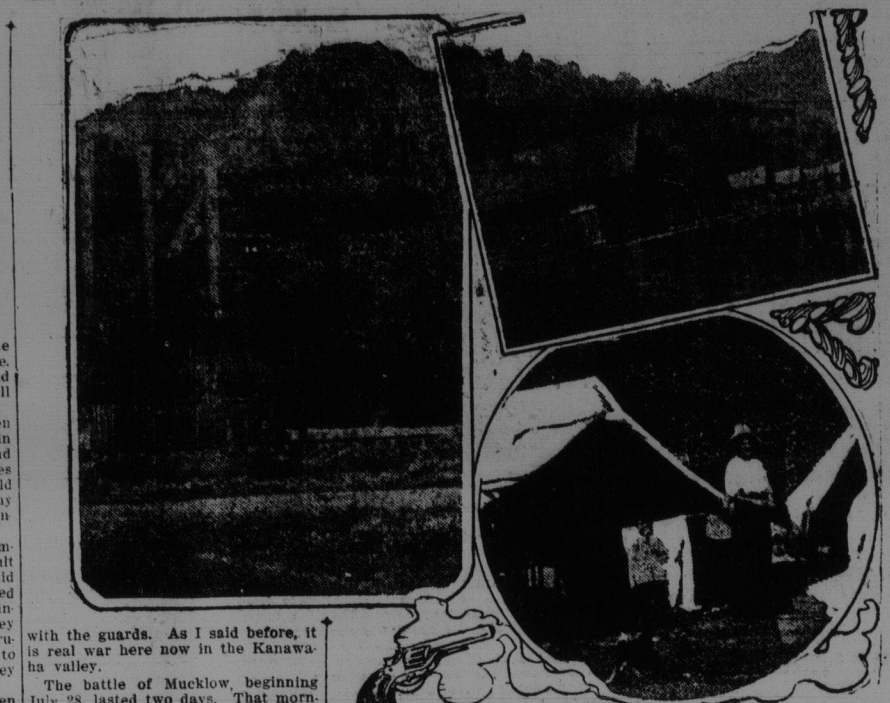

SPEED IN AVIATION.

The greater the speed of the airman the greater his safety, is the opinion of M. Jules Vedrines, who will compete at Chicago next week in the international race for the Gordon Bennett Cup. This daring Frenchman certainly has the courage of his convictions. The New York Sun reports that in the elimination race in France M. Vedrines flew for one hour ten minutes and fifty seconds at the rate of more than 105 miles an hour, to the wonder and apprehension of those who witnessed the performance. When he made a landing people pressed about him and shook his hand in congratulation as if he had escaped by good luck a tragic end. "How can you fly at such a speed?" they asked him. "Don't you realize what you are doing?"

As a husband and the father of children the foremost French aviator says that he has no right to court death, and so he chooses the safer way by flying as fast as he can, he hopes to attain a speed of 250 kilometers or about 156 miles an hour. M. Vedrines disposes of the idea that control of an aeroplane projected through the air at express speed must be difficult by saying that his experience is that the higher the speed the greater the stability of the machine. "As I go ten times faster than the wind," he says, "it is I who trouble the wind; well, it is my turn." Brave men have ascended with M. Vedrines, and he has convinced them of the security, comfort and exhilaration of being propelled through space "like a bullet." "Once in the air," says this daring aviator, "the faster one goes the less one needs to touch the controls. I am certain, and I repeat," he adds, "that the future of aviation rests on speed."

One of the most annoying, as well as one of the most dangerous nuisances in the summer time is the common house fly, and many experiments have been made by health departments to find a way of ridding society of this pest. Physicians the world over recognize the disease-bearing properties of flies, and many ways have been devised to exterminate them. In Brookline, New York, it is believed that a possible solution of the problem has been reached. At the beginning of warm weather and the start of the fly breeding season, the division of health installed a number of traps of a new design on breeding places. Since that time about forty traps in all have been installed in the town, with results that have been astonishing. Results that have far exceeded the expectations of Dr. J. A. C. Nyhen, director of the division. Since their installation these traps have been emptied on an average of once every two weeks, and the average field in dead flies per trap at each emptying is estimated at 10,000 per trap. On a basis of forty traps, this means that approximately 400,000 flies in Brookline have been killed every two weeks, or over 5,000,000 since the season started. The method by which these results have been obtained, is very simple. The sanitary inspectors of the division have compiled a list of all the likely breeding places and efforts are being made to induce owners of the property to install these fly traps. So successful have been the results this season that next year an attempt will be made to interest householders in the placing of these traps on garbage cans and out houses, which, are among the most fertile breeding places for flies. The trap itself is known as the Orion Trap, and is the invention of Dr. Orion of the Worcester State Hospital. It consists of a square box, usually painted yellow, the sanitary color, which is placed over a large wire cone with a smaller cone at the bottom for the entrance of the flies. In other words, it is simply an adaptation of the old balloon fly trap to stable pits. At the top of the box over the cone is a square hole. When this trap is placed in position the only light which enters the stable pit comes through this opening and acts as a bait to the flies when they wish to leave the pit, attracting them into the cone, where they are caught. While the trap has yet to be perfected in a number of ways, Dr. Nyhen feels confident that this will ultimately furnish the solution of the problem.

President Yuan of the Chinese Republic in a recent interview, spoke with intense earnestness on the evils to his countrymen of the opium traffic and of the determination of his Government to stamp it out of every Province of China. The war against opium is by no means confined to China. At the Hague last January an international opium convention was drawn up and the United States pledged itself to endeavor to obtain the signatures of the governments of Latin-America. Twelve of these countries have now notified the United States Government of their intention to sign the convention. The Latin-American countries which have thus pledged themselves to join in the suppression of the opium traffic are Mexico, Guatemala, Ecuador, Honduras, Cuba, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Salvador, Bolivia and Chile. It is stated that the other Latin-American countries are expected to sign, but no reason is given for the delay in such leading South American Republics as Brazil and Argentina not to mention Colombia, Venezuela and Peru. It is much, however, that such great progress has already been made toward an agreement among nations to suppress the traffic in the most deadly drug that has ever menaced the welfare of the human race.

A CURIOUS COMPLICATION. In view of possible complications over the Panama Canal Act and the claim that the United States controls the situation, it is instructive to note that at the present time the United States neither owns nor completely controls the Panama Zone. Under the Panama Treaty of 1904 the United States has a perpetual lease of the Zone, excepting the towns of Panama and Colon, and other words the ownership and possession of the entrances to the canal are not vested in the United States and a large yearly rental will have to be paid for the waterway between these terminals. An attempt to remedy this curious condition of affairs was made when the Panama Treaty was in the Senate years ago. A substitute arrangement was offered which provided: That the United States should pay the French claims, buy the entire State of Panama, pay Colombia and Panama for it, and take a quit claim deed; the money paid Panama to go to the treasury of the territory of Panama thereafter to be set up as a fund to pay more attention to the leaders, and we show the novelties in dark Grey and Silk Toppings, all Suede and Cabbages, Dull Calf and Tans with Cloth Tops.

TO ENCOURAGE CATTLE RAISING. The Western Provinces, aided by the railroads, are undertaking a campaign of education to induce farmers to pay more attention to the raising of beef. It is believed that with the present high prices, and the possibility of a meat famine, there is opportunity for a profitable change. The present summer has brought copious grain crops, which might tend to discourage any move in the direction of livestock; but at the same time the hay crop have been record breakers, and have naturally turned the attention of alert farmers to new possibilities. In recent years the livestock industry in Western Canada has not advanced rapidly. As the country becomes less and less a new land the tendency is to shift from grazing to the raising of grain. Experts see in this tendency one cause for the high price of meat products. The Canadian Pacific Railway has created a department of livestock raising, and have sent consignments of cattle into the Western Provinces to be sold by auction. The effort is praiseworthy as an endeavor to solve a real and difficult problem.

Current Comment The Heart of the Empire. (Winnipeg Tribune) Those little islands across the sea have sent British born millions to the United States. Canada, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand and to other lands, foreign and British, and on this continent there are tens of millions proud to claim their descendancy from Britain. Notwithstanding the immense outpouring of her sons and daughters, Great Britain continues to grow in population and in trade, and comparative figures show her to be more than holding her own with many other countries across the water. Anything Canada can do to maintain the prestige of the greatest nation the world has ever known should be done willingly and without unseemly party wrangling.

No Arbitration for Panama. (Vancouver News-Advertiser) The announcement that the United States Government will decline to send the Panama Canal question to the Hague Tribunal is not surprising. President Taft defined his own attitude when he signed the bill, and wrote his message concerning it. The President who takes office next March may be willing to stand by the treaty as judiciously interpreted, but he is not likely to arbitrate on behalf of Panama, or other nations, or other Presidents. He is evidently not any more bound by his own declarations than he believes the United States nation is bound by its own contracts.

Where Danger lurks. (Stratford Beach) Twenty-two per cent of the claims paid for accident insurance last year was paid to the victims of automobile accidents, a fact which gives additional proof of the danger connected with this necessity of modern times. It is said drivers of automobiles are not paying enough for insurance, but are pedestrians, many of whom are run down by these machines because of reckless drivers. To have their accident insurance raised too? The danger of accident is certainly increased. It is a nice question for the accident insurance companies to settle.

A Tribute to Mr. Borden. (Pall Mall Gazette) He is the embodiment of a great wave of Imperial feeling and filial love. Where he and Canada lead there can be little doubt that Australia, New Zealand and South Africa will follow. For the practical result of Mr. Borden's mission we must wait a while, but in the confidence that a great step forward will be taken toward the establishment of that Empire of peace which is the destiny of the British race to establish.

AROUND THE CITY

Leading Deals. The steamer Pontiac arrived at Campbellton on Sept. 1st from Liverpool. She will load deals for the United States.

Normania Expected. The steamer Normania is expected to arrive soon from Sabine Pass. The Normania has on board 4,000 tons of sulphur for J. T. Knight and Co.

Fall Millinery Opening. The annual fall millinery opening commences today at F. W. Daniel & Co., corner of King street. A most interesting display of pattern hats and millinery novelties.

Largest Lath Shipment. The bark Matanzas, J. T. Knight and Co., is clearing today for Washington with the largest cargo of laths ever shipped in a single bottom, there being four million.

Creditors Met. A meeting of the creditors of H. C. McBeath was held in the office of C. F. Sanford yesterday afternoon, but as the inspectors appointed at the last meeting had not completed their report no action was taken.

Brush Factory Site. Yesterday the city authorities had a survey made of the site on Duke street wanted by the Canada Brush Company, and a deed of transfer will be made at once. The company intends to go ahead with the construction of a large factory without delay.

The exhibition management has made arrangements to give the youngsters all the enjoyment possible and they will certainly have a delightful time.

Wholesale Grocers. St. John wholesale grocers are up in arms against the Canadian Canners Co. A communication has been forwarded to the head office of the concern at Toronto protesting in emphatic language against the treatment which is being meted out to the dealers down here. The complaint of the wholesale grocers is that the company is acting in a high-handed manner, refusing to quote them prices on canned goods, or inform them what percentage they will be allowed on their sales or to fill their orders.

Blamed for Effort to Boost Prices of Circulation of Reports of Shortage of Supplies. The managers of the concern, with it is said, the intention of boosting prices, are trying to create the impression that there will be a shortage of supplies of canned goods this year. One grocer of the city who recently ordered several hundred cases of canned goods was told that he could only have about 50 per cent. of the cases he ordered.

INQUIRY INTO THE DEATH OF RAILWAY ACCIDENT VICTIM

Engineer of Locomotive which Killed Eloi Lirette Saturday Testifies at Inquest -- Gateman and Other Witnesses Called--Adjourned Till Thursday Next.

The inquiry into the death of the man who was run over and killed by an engine at the Gilbert's Lane crossing last Saturday evening, was resumed before Coroner D. E. Berryman in the court house last evening.

Blair H. Leger, of Middle Sackville, was the first witness, and testified that the body was that of Eloi Lirette, of Middle Sackville. He knew he came to St. John last Saturday morning and the deceased was 49 years of age.

John Ferguson, of Sackville, was called and said at first he thought the body was that of George Pond, but he was now sure he had been mistaken.

Gates Closed. James Kincaid, gate tender at Gilbert's Lane crossing, testified that he put the gates down when he saw the train coming and did not see any person on the track when the engine was stopped. He saw the body lying by the track.

W. N. Ingraham, the engineer of the Point du Chene express, said his engine was backing in the yard when he felt the body under the locomotive, he stopped the engine and on going back discovered the body. He did not

see the man when the engine was approaching. The coroner here said it was dangerous to back a locomotive into the yard without a light on it. Arthur E. Cook, fireman on the engine, corroborated Engineer Ingraham's evidence.

Saw the Body. T. L. Irvine, yardmaster, said he was on duty and while passing along saw the body after the accident had happened. Robt. Trenholm, who was on the engine, said he went back after the engine stopped and with the others discovered the body.

Oscar Roberts, of Erip street, said he was returning home from the park and while he was on the crossing the engine was only about one hundred yards away and the gates were not down then. He saw a man standing on the side of the track as if he was waiting for the engine to pass. After the engine passed he did not see the man standing there. When the engine stopped he went with the others and saw a man lying dead on the track.

The inquiry was adjourned until Thursday evening next at seven o'clock when Engineer Ingraham and Fireman Cook will be recalled.
