BOY CHARACTER.

It is the greatest delusion in the world for a boy to get the idea that for the king boys among their fellows his life is of no consequence, and that the character of it will not be noticed. A manly, truthful boy will shine like a star in any community. A boy may possess as much noble character as a man. He may so speak and so live the truth that there shall be no discount on his word. And there are such noble Christian boys; and wider and deeper than they are apt to think is their influence. They are the king boys among their fellows, having an immense influence for good, and loved and respected because of the simple fact of living the truth.

Dear boys, do be truthful. Keep your word as absolutely sacred. Keep your appointments at the house of God. Be known for your fidelity to the interests of the Church and Sunday school. Be true to every friendship. Help others to be good to good—Child's Paper.

Our girls do not realize how much the happiness of home depends on them. The mother has been called the benefactress of the household, and I think girls can be called the better-half of mamma in more senses than one. Do not be too dependent on your mother for the directions of your ideas. Study them out yourself. If you have plenty of time on your hands, do not roll around, and wander from room to room after mamma, but read awhile to grandma who is too dull-eyed to read to herself. FAMILIAR PHRASES.

How often do we come across expressions familiar to us from babyhood, yet if called upon by a foreigner to explain their origin we should be puzzled. Take, for instance, one with which we are pretty sure to be long too well acquainted—'Eating humble pie.' 'Umble' are the heart, liver and entrails of the deer, and are the huntsman's perquisites. When the venison party was served on the table in 1721. The expression was so constantly used—'Oh, dear me!' is a corruption of the latin 'O, Deus meus!' 'Oh, my God!' 'A rum fellow' comes from the Saxons' 'rom' and was first applied to Roman Catholic priests, subsequently to other clergymen. Swift speaks of 'rusty old rams,' i. e., county parsons. As they were quaint and old fashioned, 'a rum fellow' at last came to signify any one odd or peculiar in his manner or habits. 'Out of sorts' is a printer's expression, being out of type of a particular letter.

Farm and Household.

EDUCATION OF YOUNG HORSES.

There is entirely too little attention paid to the training of horses which should begin with the colts. The importance of breeding all understand but too many are spoiled by the handling.
