

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6. The report of a great battle on the left bank of the Seine is confirmed. The battle was fierce and lasted several hours; but as far as can be ascertained no decided results were gained. The loss of the Prussians very heavy. The French troops showed remarkable spirit and daring. The bombardment of the southern forts of Paris commenced at 9 o'clock on Thursday morning. Gold 110.

LONDON, Jan. 6. The British Government has ordered 80,000 Royal rifles, and Russia has ordered the recruiting of 1,000,000 reserves. Trebuches the garrison of Acren with contemptible success. At the request of Bismarck Austria will accredit a representative to Versailles. The Treaty between Mexico and Italy has been signed by latter power.

LONDON, Jan. 6. Austria is reported to be very much dissatisfied with the project to be submitted by England at the coming Conference. The Russian Government has secured the Sullime Porte of its fidelity to the Treaty of 1856. Bismarck expressed reluctance to accept Gravel's demand of violation of neutrality. The released Frigate left for New York by the Cuba from Liverpool on Saturday. Trebuches issued another proclamation to reassure the Parisians that Bourbakis marching on Nancy and Belton. Letters from Paris indicate danger of a riot. French approximate losses at Bapaume at 9,000 Germans, and 4,000 French. The Germans evacuated Bapaume on Friday. The German forces beyond Vendome met two French corps on Friday. Both sides claim a victory. The Prussian losses were heavy.

THE CROWN LANDS.—Complaints are made in several of the Counties where lumbering is carried on, of trespassers cutting and hauling logs without permits from the Crown Land Office. This is an old story, and is no part of the Province has it prevailed to a greater extent than in Charlotte County. The remedy (if not too late to adopt it) lies in the power of the Government; let the Seizing Officer be paid an annual Salary to look after the Government Domain; and above all, they should be selected from men who are independent of and unconnected politically or otherwise with the members of the Government, or the Lumberers. In some instances, the Seizing Officers, who are also Deputy Surveyors, are in the employment of the lumber merchants, as clerks, or surveyors of lumber. It is probable that such men will quarrel with their own "breed and butter." Will they not wink at trespassing, and perhaps after surveying lots, report to their employers tracts of good timbered lands for purchase, or if their master is not particular, for the purpose of cutting without license.

THE REGULATIONS impose a penalty of \$1 per thousand for Logs, and rates on other lumber but without license, the Seizing Officer receiving one quarter for seizing. The performance of the duty however, is more "honored in the breach than in the observance." And even when the officer performs his duty, the guilty party, who, perhaps, a member of the Government, and would work the business in such a way as to get clear; if it might be some political friend of his, whose interest would be broken at election times and the seizure must be got rid of by the small payment which the seizing officer was entitled to.

Unless the officers are furnished with maps of the lands in the different Counties which are granted or leased for the purpose of lumbering, it would be impossible for them to know who were trespassers. All the valuable Crown Lands have been bought by speculators; and we only utter an old repeated truth, when we say that there has been gross mismanagement in the disposal of the public domain both by the labor Act and in granting licenses.

EDUCATIONAL.—The Governor of the State of Maine in his Annual Address to the Legislature, says: "There is one thing above another that commends our institutions to the approval of the civilized world, it is our common school system by which the means of education are brought within the reach of the people. Its creation was the crowning act of the wise men who laid its foundations; and its surest guarantee of national prosperity and progress, and a pledge of the increasing grandeur of our republican form of government. We are paying about three-fourths of a million dollars annually to support our common schools, which should cost not more than a few millions, counting the amount of the State, and other improved instrumentalities, but not to produce good results. We are actually beginning to realize the benefits of
