UNITED FARMERS. NAME THEIR MAN
Victoria County Bye Election.

The United Farmers of New Brunswick met at Woodstock Sept. 2nd, and nominated T. W. Caldwell as their candidate in the bye election to be held to fill the vacancy in Carleton-Victoria, caused by the resignation of Hon. Mr. Carvell.

The following is the manifesto issued—

Under the heading of Communications, His Worship read a telegram from the C. N. R. authorities at Moncton offering to take electric current from the town for lighting their engine works here, also some electric current for motors at a cents per kilowatt hour, under a five years contract. His Worship stated that the matter was being referred to the matter of the railway and the electric current. He had stated that the railway electric plant here was not now large enough to supply the desired amount, and it was just a question of how to take it from the town or installing a larger plant when the one now here would be moved to Moncton.

So far as current for power purposes was concerned it was not the intention to run the plant exclusively by it. The manager of our electric system who was present was asked what was the lowest rate it would be advisable for the town to supply the current at. He thought the town should not sell it at less than 6c per kilowatt hour, nor should it undertake to supply more than 20 horse power for power purposes. On motion the town clerk was instructed to notify the railway and the electric company that a 6c rate would be given them, and that power for motors would be given them, not exceeding twenty horse power.

A communication was read from Mr. J. R. Hachey in which he stated he was 75 years of age, and had been taxed and had paid a poll tax here for some ten years which he should not have been called upon to do. He asked for a refund covering the amount. Referred to town treasurer to report thereon.

A communication was read from Mr. M. B. Dickson, Secretary of the N. B. Executive enclosing Form of Agreement and Certificate of Incorperation in connection with the Government's Housing Scheme. The communication pointed out that before money would be advanced it would be necessary for the council to appoint some person to whom plans and specifications of proposed buildings should be presented. The appointment of a person would have to be approved of by the Lieut. Governor-in-Council also, before money would be advanced.

The town clerk was instructed to notify all applicants wishing to build this fall to submit their plans and specifications to him not later than the 15th of this month.

A deed from Mr. A. F. Chamberlain to a piece of land with which to extend Duncan street west was presented to the council and ordered to be registered in the Registrars' office at Dalhousie.

The usual departmental accounts were passed and ordered paid.

Councillor McKay from the Assessment and Appeals Committee reported recommending that the request of Mr. Geo. A. Wallace and Mr. Wm. M. Ferguson to be relieved from paying an income tax this year be not granted.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING TUESDAY
Town Building Plans Submitted.

A meeting of the town council was held Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor Murray in the Chair, with Councillors Matthews, Dickie, Ingram, Devereau, McKay and Campbell present.

Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed.

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WILL DISCUSS. TOWN BUILDING
Plans of Proposed Fire Station and Combined Buildings Now Ready.

Another meeting of the ratepayers is called for Tuesday evening next to again discuss the matter of erecting a fire station or a combined fire station and town hall.

It is to be hoped that this matter will be decided shortly. The fall is here and as yet no start has been made, and it will require considerable expenditure to put the present quarters in shape for another winter.

So far as the Graphic is concerned we are wedded to no particular scheme, but are anxious that something be done without delay. We need a fire station. That is admitted by the most conservative citizens. At the same time we need new quarters for the police force. The present lockup is a disgrace to any community, which would be condemned in any civilized country, yet we have put up with it because better could not be procured. But now is the time to provide suitable quarters.

If we build a fire station only, the town will in a very short time be called upon to erect a town building. If we need both why not build both when a considerable amount can be saved in the ultimate cost.

The matter of a site seems to be the main obstacle but surely the ratepayers of Ward 11 or any particular ward should not be selfish. There is at present a hose reel situated in the upper end of Ward 11, and another at the lower end of Ward 1. Would it be fair to the large business interests of the town to build a fire station at the upper line of Ward 11?

The chief objection to the building of a town building of fire station is that the location of the Town offices should be in the business district, while the fire station should be in the centre of the town. This is a very poor argument as there is hardly a minute more time consumed in reaching any district west of the Subway from a site on Water Street, while all that district east of the Subway can be reached in equal time or in much shorter.

This is a matter of concern to every ratepayer and great interest should be taken in the meeting, and everyone study this matter from the town's best interest standpoint, and leave selfish objects entirely out of it.

ADLY GORED BY FURIOUS BULL
D. Lavoie of Salmon Lake in Hospital Here in Serious Condition.

Tuesday-afternoon train men near Salmon Lake about fifty miles west of Campbellton, noticed a man lying near the railway and upon investigation discovered that he was severely injured. He was tenderly picked up and rushed to the Hotel Dieu Hospital here and medical attendance rendered. It was found that he was D. Lavoie, a prosperous farmer of Salmon Lake, and that he had been probably fatally gored by an angry bull.

Enquiry at the hospital to-day elicits the information that Mr. Lavoie is in a very serious condition and not likely to recover.

SURPRISE VISIT BY INSPECTORS
Two Prohibition Inspectors Here Last Week and Get Convictions.

Two strangers, visited various sections of Restigouche County recently and besides getting evidence against a number of illegal dealers found some "moonshine" whiskey and the owner was fined \$100.00.

At Dalhousie, last week, twelve cases of Wilson's Invalid Port Wine consigned to the Clifford Pharmacy of Dalhousie were seized at the railway station and the Pharmacy refused to admit ownership of the same. At Campbellton fines totalling \$280 were imposed. One man was wound with intoxicating liquor in his possession and was fined \$100.

EXEMPTION FOR SOLDIERS.

In many of the cities and towns throughout the Maritime Provinces the matter of exemption from taxes for the boys who fought overseas has been up for discussion and in all such discussion we note a deep appreciation of the fine work our soldier boys have done and an earnest desire to do something for them which will be helpful to them.

In St. John the matter was up for consideration and was favorably dealt with.

In the city the following has been agreed upon.

"No soldier who has received or who will receive his discharge this year will have to pay civic taxes, unless he happens to be a property owner, in which case the property is supposed to be good for the real estate tax. No tax based on incomes will be collected from the returned men who scarcely have had time to settle down to civil life. This decision was reached at the conference between the city commissioners and Major Norman P. McLeod, president of the St. John branch of the G. W. V. A., which was held in the mayor's office yesterday morning."

This is the proper course and should be made the basis for action in all other towns and municipalities in the province.

Another year when the boys have had time and an opportunity to look around and get settled is time enough to tax them.

EXHIBITION.

At a meeting of the different committees having charge of the Labor Day celebration, the success of that undertaking was a source of gratification to all and the sentiment of all was that Campbellton should aspire to something larger, that we should form an Exhibition Association and have a regular live stock and farm products exhibition each year or every other year.

The suggestion was unanimously approved and a committee was formed to take the preliminary steps and after certain information was obtained call a public meeting to discuss the matter.

We hope there will be little delay in getting the matter under way.

WINTER SHIPPING IN

ST. LAWRENCE

London's Anxiety for Trade with Quebec.

Quebec, Sept. 2.—Speaking at a dinner at the Quebec Exhibition tonight given by the Industrial Committee of the Quebec Board of Trade, Hon. Dr. Pellier, representative of the Province of Quebec in London, touched on the question of winter shipping from the port of Quebec and said that the city of London was prepared to subscribe fifty million dollars to close the Straits of Belle Isle and thus enable the shipping trade in the St. Lawrence to be continued all the year round. Such a project had succeeded at Key West, and why not at Labrador and Newfoundland? The Ottawa and Quebec governments, he said, should unite in bringing this about, and if the scheme was carried out the only cost that shippers would have to bear would be one shilling for every ton of freight that passed the gulf from the month of November to the month of May.

Mr. H. R. Foster, vice-president of the Canadian City Bureau, Toronto, who also spoke, said that he had been told in Ontario by prominent business men that they looked upon the province of Quebec as the bulwark against the introduction of Bolshevism into the Dominion.

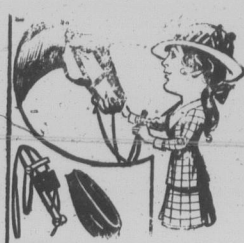

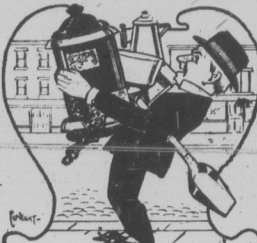

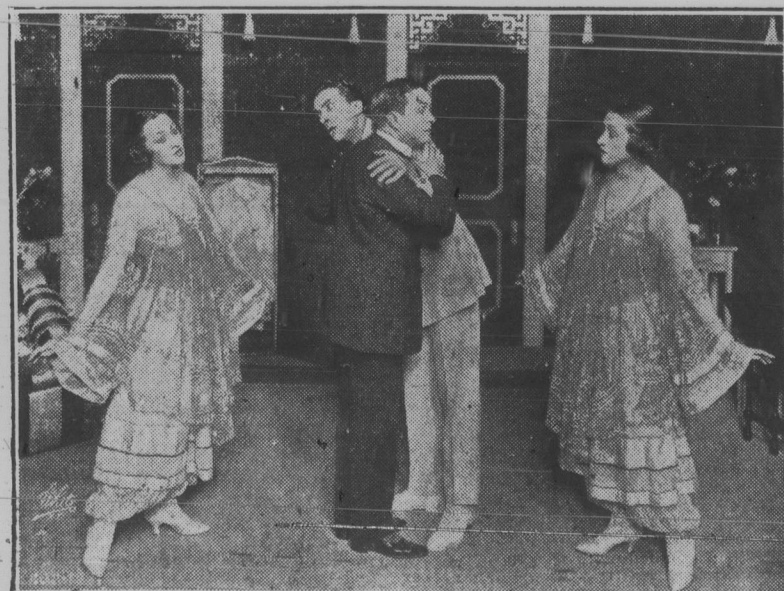
