DREADFUL DISASTER.

Great Loss of Life and Property.

WILMINGTON, Del., Oct. 8.—Several startling explosions in quick succession at 3:30 p.m. announced a disaster at the Dupont Powder Works, on the Brandywine, seven miles from here. One of the magazines went off first, and the rolling and drying mills were immediately afterward destroyed. There were at least seven successive explosions. Every dwelling in the neighborheod is reported wrecked or unroofed and buildings within a radius of half a mile are damaged. Following is a partial list of

The Dupont Powder Mills extend along the Brandywine, chiefly on the west bank and close to the water for about two miles. There are some 50 buildings clustered around what is known locally as the "upper yard." These were inhabited by the employes of the powder mills clustered here, and they are all wrecked. The damage to property cannot now be thoroughly estimated. The force of the concussion broke windows in some parts of Wilmington four or five miles away. The office of the Dupont company is a complete wreck, and six mills are in ruins. Several members of the Dupont firm were injured, but none seriously.

fire. It was a matter of life and death to the whole population that this fire should be extinguished before it communicated with the powder the building contained. Taking their lives in their hands, the Dupont fire brigade fought the flames, which had caught the roof. It was touch and go between success and destruction, but the firemen won. Had the roof failen it, it is doubtful if any man, woman or child in the vicinity would have escaped death or serious injury. About 59 families are rendered homeless by the disaster.

An Envoy of Peace and Hope.
London, Oct. 8.—John Morley delivered an address at Swindon last night. Replying to criticisms on his recent speech at St. Helens, he ridiculed the idea that because he had been a Cabinet Minister he should blindfol himself to affairs in Ireland. He said what pleased him more than being a Minister was being an envoy of peace and hope from the democracy of England to the democracy of Ireland. Every word he had told Englishmen about happenings in Ireland was true, and he was glad to have helped in the expose of the magisterial authorities. Whether rightly or wrongly, the government of Ireland was a personal government. The Ministers responsible ought to be in constant touch with the agents. He blamed the Ministers for the condition of the estimes court in Tipperary. After describing the distress in the congested districts of Ireland, Mr. Morley suggested that a remedy was available by renewing the proposals as to the Irish Land Bill made in 1886, and inviting the co-operation of the Irish landlords.

London, Oct. S.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, president of the Board of Trade, speaking at Gloucester yesterday, described Mr. Morley's statements regarding his experience in Ireland as "a traveler's tale." The Government had taken measures to prevent any extended suffering on account of the Iallure of crops, and was willing to accept any suggestion made in good faith from all quarters for the promotion of comfort and peace among the poor in the land. In his opinion the problem must be solved by helping the seeple to save themselves. Right Hon. Stanhope, Secretary for War, made a speech at Horneastle in a similar strain. He declared the alleged famine in Ireland only existed in the imagination of the Parnellite leaders and American anglers for the Irish vote.

Preaching against Capital Punishment.
KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 7.—Rev. W. W.
Carsen, in the pulpit of Sylenham street

capital punishment, saying: "I do not believe in capital punishment for the following reasons: I do not think that the State
is justified in taking from a citizen what it
idid not give, and what it cannot restore.
The State gives citizenship, liberty,
and protection to person and property.
When a citizen abuses one of these or
uses any one of them for improper pur
poses the State has the right to interfere,
and, if necessary, deprive him of liberty ocitizenship. But the State did not give life.
It is the gift of God, and the State cannor
restore life if once it is taken. Therefore I
do not think it has any right to destroy life
by inforcing the law of capital punishment.
If that kind of law were to be applied te
each one of us in proportion as we have the Methodist churches in Napanee yester-day, and Rev. A. B. Chambers, L.L.B., was strong in his advocacy of capital punish-ment. It was not of man's origin, but was divine, God having in the dawn of history ordained that a murderer should suffer death.

Day, Who Pushed His Wife Over a Precipice,

Welland, Oct. 7.—The principal case of interest at the Assizes, before Judge Rose, was the trial of Arthur Hoyt Day, charged with murdering his wife by pushing her over the bank at the Niagara River. The grand jury returned a true bill against Day, who, when placed in the prisoner's box, pleaded not guilty, and stated he was ready, in the prisoner's box, pleaded not guilty, and stated he was ready.

HISTORY OF THE CASE.

Day was first arrested in Rochester for blgamy, having shortly before Mrs. Day's disappearance married Miss Lizzle Breen, 228 Plymouth avenue, Rochester, under the name of Arthur Hoyt. Detective Furtherer in his search for the missing wife inquired of Mrs. Quigley, who stated that on July 27 they had gone to the Falls together, the three of them; that Day and his wife quarreled, and the last Mrs. Quigley saw of Mrs. Day she stated to a distant dwelling for a drink of water. The detectives, suspecting foul play, then induced Mrs. Quigley to come to the Falls and show them where Mrs. Day had been last seen. When the party came to a place on the edge of the cliff, 200 yads below the whirlpool rapids elevator, Canadian side, she nearly fainted. When she was able to speak she said: "There lies the body of Deseriah Day." Two hundred feet below, lying among the rocks and trees, could be seen a bundle of clothing, which, upon examination, was found to be the mangled body of a woman. Mrs. Quigley afterwards told Magistrate Hill that she, Day and decensed had come to the Falls on Sunday, the 27th July, and had gone almost directly to this lonely spot. She said she was some distance away when she last saw the pair together, and that the next time she looked Day was signalling to her to come up, and that he then told her he had "shoved her over." Day, who was then already a prisoner in Rochester on the charge of bigamy, was told that the body of a woman had been found at the Falls and that the authorities were arrivous to have her identified. He said he would like to know whether or not it was his wife, whereupon the officers took him over at his request to satisfy his curjosity. When shown the clothing taken from decased he denied that they belonged to his wife. The Canadian authorities then arrested him.

THE TRIAL.

The first and chief witness for the Crown was Mrs. Mary E. Quigley, who testified that ahe was the sister of the prisoner and lived in Rochester. The prisoner also lived there. 


