sion as if lives depended on it. THE TIDE OF EMIGRATION. London, June 16 .- The St. James' Gazette says: The emigration figures for Ireland show a large decrease, and bethe rise. There have been 28,000 emigrants for America this year, as against 38,000 in the same time last year; while the corresponding figures for South Africa have gone up from 4,500 to 7,000. We are glad to see that Canada is attracting more settlers, the figures being 4,218, against 3,963, and the total emigration has gone up from 66,000 to 69,000.

TURKISH CRUELTY.

Constantinople, June 16 .- An American lady from the town of Marash states that after she had succeeded in making arrangements for securing a home and providing for the education of 45 orphans, whose parents had been massacred, the Turkish authorities refused to allow the children to leave, saying that they would look after them. She says she has had the greatest difficulty in bringing her own three children from Marash, the officials saying that they were Turkish subjects, as they were borne in Tur-key. Both the lady and her husband are Americans.

IN THE TRANSVAAL Pretoria, June 16.-President Kruger has received a monster deputation,

consisting of the mayors of all the towns of South Africa, which had been organized for the release of the memers of the Johannesburg committee Since the prisoners were released it was decided that the deputation should visit Pretoria and tender thanks to President Kruger for his clemency. Replying to the deputation, President Kruger pointed to the Bible, with the remark that there was his guide. He then referred to Cecil Rhodes, who, he said, was acting as if he were egging on a dog fight. He who had caused the trouble, was still unpunished. THE SULTAN MAY GO TOO FAR.

Berlin, June 16.-Under an arrangement with the other ambassadors to the Porte, Baron Saurma Von Jeitsch, the German ambassador to Constantinople, obtained an audience with the Sultan, and read to his Majesty a note warning Turkey against the certainty of losing the good-will of the powers by permitting the continuance of atrocities in Crete. The Macedonian committee, which is sitting in Sofia Bulgaria, has decided to make a demand for the autonomy of Macedonia, and is practically conspiring to bring about an insurrection. It is believed that Austria has asked the Sultan to consent to the occupation of Macedonia by Austrian troops in the event about an insurrection. 

HANDS OFF THE MOON! A Telescope That Will Bring It So Close That Observers Will Want to Touch It.

London Daily News. The huge block of crystal which will become the mirror for the great tele-scope has safely arrived in Paris. If all goes well the exhibition of 1900 will be able to boast of a distinct feature. Whether the moon's features will be equally distinct is another question. Prof. Loewy thinks not, but M. The whole finishing process will cost £6,000. The silvering will not cost anything to speak of. The mirror will be mounted on two arms ten metres long, and will be set in motion by machinery of the usual sort. The rays gathered from planetary space will be reflected horizontally through a mammoth tube 60 metres long, laid on piles of masonry. The lenses of flint and crown glass will be 1 metre 25 centimetres, the largest in the world, and the images, enlarged 6,000 times, will be thrown on to a screen, which thousands of people will

view at a time. The moon will, if all goes well, be brought within 38 miles, but it is doubtful whether images on this scale will prove correct. M. Loewy, the assistant director of the Paris Observatory, who has submitted some splendid photographs of the moon, believes that the limit of 94 miles he has reached is the utmost practicable for a long time to come. 

Opposed to Separate Schools but Favor Reasonable Redress for the Minority.

Assembly Saturday Principal Caven presented the following resolution on the Manitoba school question:

"That the General Assembly, while in common with former assemblies attaching great importance to the reilgious character of public education, is strongly opposed to the restoration of separate schools in Manitoba as in-volving the application of public funds to sectarian purposes, a thing deemed public management at Ottawa, argues both inexpedient and wrong in principle.

"The Assembly expresses disapproval of any legislation or governmental ac-tion in the matter of education which is intended to confer privileges upon The Canada Presbyterian says: "One not accorded to all. In particular, the one section of the community that are of the undoubted signs of hardened Assembly disapproves of any attempt to remove alleged grievances connected with the establishment of national schools in Manitoba by remedial action er of conscience. Once in a while medial legislation, such as has been as corrupt politicians thought they quired by it, is at variance with its spirit, and is almost certain to be followed by very hurtful consequences. 

Toronto, June 16 .- At the Methodist General Conference this morning was submitted the report brought in by a special committee appointed to report on the Manitoba school case. The report affirmed that while the Methodist Church did not identify itself with any political body, or assume to dictate to its members how they should vote, yet as a conference it was deemed its duty as laymen and ministers to place on record their uncompromising opposition to any attempt of any Federal Parliament in endeavoring to re-establish separate schools in Manitoba, and that any measure carried by coercive and hierarchial influences violated the spirit and principles of free representative government, which it is the

duty of all to defend. Dr. Ogden moved the adoption of the report, and J. F. Ockley seconded it. After a short discussion the motion was put to the conference and carried without a dissenting voice.

The report on the state of the work showed an increase of 700 members. The use of bicycles on Sunday was mentioned and disapproved of. The committee on temperance de-plored the action of members of the Dominion Parliament at the last session, and declared that no liquors should have been available.






