





## MICHIPICOTEN

Capitalists Securing the Good Claims -Ontario Government Acts Promptly.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Sept. 8 .-The north shore steamer arrived from Michipicoten at 11:30, but brought no passengers or letters from Lake Wa wa. Capt. Ganley learned from In-dians that two Port Arthur capitalists had arrived at the gold fields and were buying all the claims that looked romising, paying spot cash. The elegram leaves at 2 o'clock with beween 50 and 60 passengers, many of whom are from outside places. About 20 Sooites will go up, and there are 15 or 20 outsiders who will be on the passenger list today. Numerous telegrams have been received by Ainsworth & Ganley to reserve berths for later trips. At least 20 of those going today will sleep on cots tonight. Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Prof. A. B. Will mott, who has been assisting Prof. Coleman, the provincial geologist during the past two seasons in geological exploring in northwestern Ontario, will leave on today's noon train for the Michipicoten gold field. He is sent out by the Bureau of Mines. He will enter the district of Missanabie Station, on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway,on the north side of Dog Lake, and will descend the Michipicoten River to its mouth. He will then visit the gold locations in the vicinity of Lake Wawa, and proceed northward by a series of water stretches, and come out again at Miss-anable. Thence he will go west by the railway to the crossing of the Magpie River, and will descend waters of that river to the Hudson Bay Company's post at its mouth. In this way the country will be crosssectioned three times from north to south. Numerous excursions will be made inland up the tributary streams. It is expected that the work will oc cupy four weeks' time. Upon his return Prof. Willmott will probably is sue a preliminary report of his ex-ploration for the benefit of explorers interested in Ontario's new gold field.
