American President Thrills American Labor Convention at Buffalo With Call to Crush the German World Menace.

Auditorium, Buffalo, N. Y., Nov.

12.—President Wilson today delivered a message to the workmen of the United States in an address before the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor. His entrance to the convention hall was the signal for a tremendous outburst of cheers from the six thousand persons assembled to hear him.

Samuel Gompers, president of the federation, in introducing Mr. Willson, referred to him as "this man of destiny, spokesman for freedom, interpreter of the aims of spirit of our time, leader of thought and action among the nations of the earth."

Must Draw Together.

Mr. Wilson began by saying he esteemed it a privilege and an honor to be present, as it seemed to him a time above all others for common council, "a time for drawing the energies of the nation together."

The president referred to the present as a "time more critical than the world has yet known."

Edmonton, Nov. 12.—Six hundred delegates, representing every constituency in Alberta, attended the provincial Liberal, convention held in this city Saturday. Stirring addresses were made by Hon. Frank Oliver, Hon. A. G. MacKay, M. P. P. for Athabasca, and dozen other Liberal leaders of the province, including Mrs. H. C. Knight and Mrs. J. R. Knell of Edmonton, who denounced the Government for its partial disfranchisement of women and others.

Hon. Arthur Sifton was singled out as a mark by his former associates, and the appearance of Sergt. Holmes Jowett, late of the Princess Patricias, who as a Labor candidate is opposing Mr. Sifton in the Medicine Hat riding, was greeted with a hurricane of appleause.

A Dramatic incident of the whole convention at the very close, was the appearance on the platform of Jos. A. # CANADIANS WIN MIGHTY BATTLE IN WESTERN WAR

For Twelve Hours Rival Batteries Fought Until the Germans Quit.

Canadian Headquarters in France, Nov. 10-Via London, Nov. 11.-(By W. A. Willison, special correspondent of hours of continuous desperate fighting Canada stands secure on Passchendelle Ridge, having consolidated all the posi-tions gained in the splendid advance his morning, when our infantry stormed its way along the heights for another six hundred yards, taking Venture Farm, Vindiclive crossroads and Exert Farm.

From dawn until dark the salient has re-echoed to the roar of our guns in what has been the most tremendous artillery duel in the history of Canada in Flanders. 

COPENHAGEN, Nov. 10.—The first German newspapers containing comment on the Russian coup d'etat to arrive here make no attempt to jump at conclusions and predict speedy peace with Russia. On the other hand, the impression prevails quite widely that the Maximalists may be compelled by the force of circumstances to follow much the same policy as the Kerensky regime as soon as they find that a hon-annexation peace is not to be attained, early by proclaiming their readiness to conclude such a peace.

Several newspapers refer to the fact that the declared policy of the Maximalists is for a general peace, not a separate one, and this on the basis of oliutely no annexation. It is generally assumed, however, that the developments at Petrograd spell the end of the Russian army as an offensive factor in the present war.

Hans Vorst, an expert on Russian affairs, says in the Tageblatt that there is now only one party in Russia, the Bourgeols, which is strong enough to challenge the mastery of the Bolsheviki, and that such a reaction could be successful only if the military leaders of the movement were to have enough authority over their armies to lead them against the capital. Herr Vorst regards this as highly doubtful. He says Nikolai Lenine will not bestate to introduce a reign of terror in the name of the proletariat.

SAM CHARTERS IS munication issued by tonight reads:

"Belgian Communication.—In the night of November 9-10, our artillery shelled the German communications near Eesen. The enemy bombarded our trenches and our advanced works south of Dixmude. and Invalided Home-Community Idea Is Working to

A practical demonstration of the manner in which Middlesex County at home is doing its bit to win the war by conserving food and supplying sick and wounded soldiers with canned and jammed "comforts" has been in progress in the pretty little town of Parkhill ever since the middle of July. At that time a Women's Institute and Red Cross Community Canning Centre was opened in the armories as an answer to the injunction of the Government, "Eat all you can, and can all you can't."

Even the fragments of fruits and vegetables have been made into appetizing jams, preserves, pickles, chow-chows and soups for home consumption. Better still, hundreds upon hundreds of jars of fruits, vegetables, pickles, soups and delicious chicken have been shipped to the Red Cross headquarters in Engisland, and cases upon cases more will soon be on the way.

Still Very Busy.

After all the weeks and months of strenuous effort, the fire blazes merrily almost every day in the week in the upright boiler in the lean-to; donations of raw materials and occasionally of money come rolling in from all parts of the county and beyond its limits, and still patriotic women and girls cheerfully lay aside all other work and engagements when an emergency arises or a big canning drive is on.

Early in the afternoon they were in their places, some preparing the chickens for the "steam vat"; others cutting up the fowls already cooked; others placing the meat with scientific accuracy in jars, still others filling in chinks with the hot stock in which the birds had been cooked, adding to each jar a heaping teaspoonful of salt and an eighth of a spoonful of white pepper. (Black pepper discolors). It is told that a member of the Emergency Corps has been known to get out of bed at night in response to 'a call from the canning centre. Washing, ironing, sweeping, even getting bread into the oven are secondary considerations when the canning centre signal is given for volunteers or after members of the "permanent force" to do emergency canning for the boys overseas. No More Trouble.

It is understood that a woman conceived the brilliant idea of placing a hot water reservoir away up near the ceiling. In any case, it has been dubbed, "A woman's folly and a plumber's delight."

The first grand operations in the canning centre took the form of a community canning of blueberries. Peaches, corn, Swiss chard, beans, beets, carrots and other things followed in rapid sucscession. In the early days, one of every ten cans was left for the Red Cross. When a community group secured the centre for a day, it was understood that a donation should be made to the Red Cross, or the sum of \$5 paid-to cover expenses of operation. A practical demonstrator, Mrs. C. K. Bluett, of this city, was appointed by the department of agriculture to take charge at first, and so valuable has her work proved that she has not been permitted to withdraw. Every recipe used in canning, jamming, pickling, soup-making, has been tried and thoroughly tested by her in her own home. Otherwise, she wouldn't take the risk of using it when elimination of all waste is so urgently needed, and also when it is Canada's gallant heroes who are to sample so much of the "pack."



Many thousands of them lie in graves hallowed by their blood and glorified by their suffering. Pride in their valor and their achievements mitigates the sorrow which passes so many of our homes. Through what they have done we have a new revelation of patriotism. The nation is clothed with new dignity. But how meanly we shall stand at the bar of history, if for fallure of ours, the cause for which they fell does not precause for which they shall be judged if their living comrades in the trenches are not supported, shame and humiliation will be our portion. They will have all a price for us beyond our desert. What they showed in honor, we shall reap in dishonor.

Says Voluntariam Falled.

"When it became apparent that the voluntary system was not providing adequate reinforcements for the army, it became necessary to consider the provisions of the militia act, empowering the Government to enforce compulsory military service upon all male citizens of Canada between ages of 18 and 60 inclusive. The selection under that law is to be made by ballot, that is by chance. Under present conditions the public interest cannot be served by a chance selection, but it demands instead an intelligent selection based upon a wise and careful consideration of the country's needs, both in the fighting line and at home. Immigration and colonization will receive careful and continuous attention, always with a sympathetic regard for labor and in full recognition of the necessity for greater production.



A.—It is a loan of money by the people of Canada to their Government,

A.—To help finish the war.

A.—It is spent in Canada to buy supplies for the soldiers, ammunitions for the guns and a thousand other things.

Q.—When I lend my money to the Government what do I get in return?

A.—You get a promissory note given by the Government. This note is called a "bond." It is nicely engraved and on it is the Government's promise to you have representative.

A.—Your security is the whole power, strength and wealth of the Domini

Q.—What interest do I get? A.—You get 5½ per cent a year, payable every June 1st and every December

Q.-You mean \$5.50 on every \$100 bond?

Q .- But I saw that my interest would be 5.81 per cent. A.—So it is. You see you pay for the bond in installments while the Gov-ment pays you a full half year's interest the 1st of June next. Q.—I notice that there are 5, 10 and 20-year bonds. What does that mean?
