Export Embargoes Give Americans Advantage Over Canadians, and Wants Two Governments To Go Fifty-Fifty On Raw Material.

Montreal. June 12.—A vigorous defence of the present fiscal system for Canada, a protest against what was styled the propaganda being waged against manufacturers and a denunciation of the alleged violation of the war-time political truce by western grain growers, who are accused of agitating against the tariff, form the features of the address delivered this afternoon to the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, in annual convention at the Windsor Hotel, by S. R. Parsons, president, of Toronto.

Mr. Parsons recommended the appointment of a trade board to confer with the Government in tariff changes. A plea for better relationship between labor and capital in the working out of after-the-war problems was also contained in Mr. Parsons' speech.

Montreal, June 12.—A pooling of resources between the United States and Canada is recommended by the tariff committee, which reported to the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at the opening session today in the Windsor Hotel at its annual convention.

The committee complains that behind embargoes placed on certain raw materials by the U. S. Government, American manufacturers are able to dominate and undersell Canadians in the dominion market. The committee alludes to legislation at Ottawa last year as "representing the opposite of protection and as stiffing domestic industry while stimulating and encouraging the importation of foreign manufactures."

19-YEAR OLD **ANSWER CALL** BEFORE FALL

Not Likely To Be Required To Actually Report For Some Months.

Ottawa, June 12 .- Call to the colors of 19-year-old men is delayed. When the proclamation requiring these men to register was published, it was intimated that they would not be required actually to report for duty before July. It is now considered improbable that many, if any, of the men will be summoned before September or October. HUN DIVISION CUT TO PIECES.



COUNCIL ECONOMY SHOWS SOME RARE "QUTBREAKS" NOW

Garbage Strike Cited as One Instance of Its Work.

\$300 Was Lost and \$300 "Saved" by Firing and Rehiring of Superintendent.

Tuesday night, however, the board of works disposed of two interesting and doubtful cases of sconomy, the garbage strike and the rehiring of Paving Superintendent W. R. Hunter. It is just eight days since there has

It is just eight days since there has been any garbage collected in London. The cause of it all was \$4.75 cents a week. The city did not want to pay this, and the council allowed the ment to go on strike. It has cost the city \$172.80 to feed the garbage horses to date, while they have not been working. True, the city did not pay out the sum of \$600 that would have been due the collectors had they worked. But to offset this, there is, is addition to feeding the horses, the wages of the stableman, the engineers at the incinerator, and the cost of fuel to heat the hospital, omitting the fact that no garbage was collected in the city, and that when the collections resumed extra efforts will have to be put forth for a few, weeks until the collectors catch up. In addition, the money paid out to feed the horses is a direct loss. Not a cent's worth of work has been received in return.

The proposal to dismiss Mr. Hunter was first broached in February, It was in the air until well on in May. During that time Mr. Hunter was fired and not fired several times. Mr. Hunter was drawing \$150 a month salary. For two months he has done nothing but hark time. He was waiting for what seemed the inevitable dismissal. For two months he did not know where he was at. It is safe to say the city got dittle for the \$300 paid in wages. Mr. Hunter never knew where he was at. How could he work? Now he is hired lagain, after his dismissal from his \$1,800 a year job goes into effect on June 30. His new salary will be \$1,200. He got \$900 for the second, \$1,500 in all. This makes a grand saving of \$300 to the city for the year, and the city lost year.



QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send In Your Problems and They WIII Be Answered From Official

Information by The Advertiser AMERICAN: Q.—1. I am an American; have been here 4 years. Am unmarried, was born 1892. Will I have to register here, and if so, where will I apply for my birth certificate?

2. An American was born 1881, has been here 4 years, and is married. Will he have to have his marriage certificate and birth certificate? Where will he have to register? He has six children.

A.—1. In both questions the national

tificate? Where will he have to register? He has six children.

A.—1. In both questions the national registration on June 22 is confused with registration under the military service act, which is going on all the time. Every person over 16 years o age, resident in Canada, must register June 22 at the booths provided for the purpose of national service. This applies to everyone no matter what their nationality. They need no certificates or anything else for this, but both must register at any booth they wish. With regard to military service every man who appears to be of the age liable for military service must carry some papers to show, in case he is questioned by a police officer, that he is not liable for service.

The American born in 1892 should have papers to show that he is a citizen of the United States, and, therefore, not liable to the act here.

The American born in 1881 should have the same papers, or either his marriage or birth certificate would do, as he is married and over the age for class 1.

READER: I was born in the year READER: I was born in the year 1866, and am 52 years old where should I apply for registration papers to prove the date of my birth. I don't know whether I was registered or not; in a case of this kind how could I prove the date of my birth?

of my birth?

A.—You do not state where you were born. If you do so we can then advise you where to apply for the information. A certificate signed by two reputable citizens having knowledge of his age would do.

R L M.: Q.-I am 22 years of R. L. M.: Q.—I am 22 years of age, and am called to report for service under the M. S. A. Three years ago I purchased a farm at \$2,300, for which I paid \$700 in cash; there remains \$1,600 of a mortgage against It. I have given several promissory notes, payable in the fall. If I were left on the farm I would be able to meet these liabilities. What provisions are made to preserve this property and protect these securities?



FOCH STRIKES HEAVY BLOW TAKING PRISONERS AND WINNING BACK SEVERAL PO

German-Held Ground to a Depth of Mile and Quarter Is Carried by Dashing Advance of the French Troops On Tuesday-Mery, Belloy, Genlis Wood, Heights Between Courcelles and Mortemer Stormed and Outskirts of St. Maur Reached—Good Gain Also in Centre—Americans Below Ourcg River Capture Belleau Wood and Three Hundred Prisoners.

Paris, June 11.—The French have struck the Germans a hard blow ale a front of about seven and a half miles between Rubescourt and St. Maur, recapturing Belloy, Genlis Wood and the heights between Courcelles and Mortemer.

The official announcement by the war office tonight of this gain says that the Germans suffered heavy losses and left more than a thousand prisoners and some guns in the hands of the French.

Several violent enemy attacks on Chevincourt were repulsed, but the Germans gained a footing in Machemont and Bethancourt, which were bitterly disputed.

"South of the Ourcq River the American troops this morning brilliantly captured Belleau wood and took 300 prisoners.

"Our day bombing machines continued their operations on June 10, despite the bad weather, against points of an ore exposed nature on the battle-field. Airplane groups flying low dropped projectiles on enemy concentrations, dispersing reinforcement roops and causing considerable losses. "Certain squadrons made sorties, and during the day eight tons of explosives were employed in this manner, giving the best results.

As Told Officially.

The text of the official statement follows:

"The battle continued today from Montdidier to the Oise.

"On the left our troops, supported by tanks, counter-attacked this afternoon along a front of twelve kilometres, between Rubescourt and St. Maur, and despite desperate resistance on the part of the enemy reached the southern approaches of Le Fretoy, captured the heights between Courcelles and Mortemer, and carried our lines more than two kilometres to the east of Mery.

"We have also retaken Belloy and Genlis wood and reached the southern outskirts of St. Maur.

Over 1,000 Prisoners.

"The enemy, who suffered heavy losses, left more than 1,000 prisoners and several guns in our hands.

"In the centre the Germans, who had succeeded in pushing forward to the south of Loge farm and Antheuil, were driven back beyond these two points by our troops, acting in concert with adjoining units.

"On the right the enemy increased his pressure, seeking to gain the Matz valley. Several violent stacks launched against Chevincourt were repulsed.

"The enemy succeeded in gaining a statement follows:

"Cretain squadrons made sortles, and during the day eight tons of explosives were employed in this manner, giving the hest results.

"On the night of June 10-11 the bombing of the enemy's rear areas was continued actively. Our escadrilles dropped twenty tons of projectiles on convoys, cantonments and railway stations, as well as on two munitions depots. Procedure of Registration

On June 22nd every person residing in Canada, male or female, British or alien, of sixteen years or over, must attend one of the registration booths located in his or her district, and there observe the procedure explained below.

Where to Register

Every person required to register has the privilege of registering at any of the public places provided for that purpose. The location of all such places will be specified in proclamations posted conspicuously.

In Cities and Towns, many of these places will be open for registration purposes prior to Registration day. Where such arrangements are made, the local papers will supply full information.

Large industrial and business concerns are being asked to provide facilities for registering their employees. Where they do so business will not be interfered with, and employees will suffer no loss of time.

How to Register

The procedure of registration is simple. The questions upon the registration card can be answered very easily, but they must be answered truthfully and fully.

The card shown in the illustration is a facsimile of the registration card for males. An advertisement showing the card for females appears in another paper.

Study the questions carefully so that you will be able to answer them promptly when registering. If you have any special qualification, or feel that your services would be more beneficial to the country in some other line of work, say so.

While all are compelled to register on Registration Day, it is not contemplated by the Government to force the sick, feeble and aged to turn out. If such persons will notify the Registrar prior to June 22nd of their inability to attend at a place of registration, an effort will be made to register them at home, provided the request is reasonable and justified.
