Great Britain and France would put upon soviet demands of Poland in the From Flames arranging of an armistice are set to in a notification which has been dispatched to the Warsaw government patched to the Warsaw governments, by the British and French Governments, it was learned here today. Poland requested the views of Great Britain and France on possible armistice terms, and the governments at London and Paris have notified the Polish Government that they will not permit Poland to

Germany and Russia.

As bearing on the military situation, it develops that vast stocks of munitions from the Allies are moving towards Warsaw today from Danzig, on the Baltic, and from Rumania and Czecho-Slovakia. These munitions were, for the most part, originally dispatched for the army of Gen. Denikine, but were delayed on the way until too late to be available for his use. The munitions being sent from Danzig, however, were shipped recently for the especial use of Poland. Other munitions are expected to be in process of shipment from Great Britain and France for Poland within a few days. Hungary has asked the per-





It was shown in the report that a pensioner who was disabled to such an extent that 5 per cent of the \$900 allowance would be received, he would draw in a lump sum \$300, whereas, if he took his pension by the month he would receive by the time the \$300 was up, \$720. A man drawing a disability pension of 10 per cent a year, or \$90 a year, would get \$1,440 if he took his pension by the year. ct. Capt. Chester Butler was appointed

Byfield and Daniels of the University of Iowa have observed that when the daily dose of orange juice given an infant was increased from a tablespoonful (half an ounce) to three tablespoonful (half an ounce) to three tablespoonfuls (one and one-half ounces), infants whose weight had preounces), infants whose weight had pre-viously remained stationary for a num-ber of days began to gain in weight. This indicates that a liberal allowance of orange juice stimulates growth, for a mere increase in the strength of the food given such babies failed to pro-



Other raw fruit and vegetable juices probably possess a similar growth-promoting power, and both raw and cooked vegetable broths have been fed babies on the bottle with happy results for generations past. 



COMPLETE AGREEMENT. France and Italy are in complete agreement regarding negotiations with the Russian Soviet Govern ment, despite statements to the contrary made by sensational and inaccurate newspapers, declared Premier Lloyd George in the House of Commons today, in replying to questions concerning the Boulogne

WARSAW, July 29 .- (By the Associated Press).-The Polish Committee of National Defence sent a wireless message to the Soviet supreme com-mand on July 27, stating that it would send delegates on July 30 with full ower to negotiate an armisticc.

The message informed the Soviet command that the delegates would appear at 8 p.m. on the road between Brest-Litovsk and Baranovitch, the Brest-Litovsk and Baranovitch, the time and place requested, where they would meet an advance post of the Soviet army.

"Moreover," Litvinoff added, "in face of the lessons already learned we cannot rely upon mere assurances, even of the great powers. We are firmly resolved not to impose harsh terms on Poland, and do not intend to abandon the cherished principles of the self-determination of peoples because the fortune of war has favored us."

Litvinoff claimed that Russia had given generous and honorable terms to Esthonia, Georgia and Litvania, when she stood victoriously over those states, "thereby showing ourselves the true friend of small nations."

"Poland," Litvinoff continued, "has nothing to fear from us as long as she is prepared to live in peaceful and neighborly relations. Our peace conditions with Poland will show an absence of aggressiveness and our essentially peaceful aspirations. There is not a single man influential in soviet circles but desires Immediate peace to rest with the world."

Paris, July 29.—The Franco-British ission to Poland has made a report on the military situation in that country, which it declares is not so desper ate but that it can be retrieved without great difficulty if the mission's three main'recommendations are followed.

The Bialystok Raifroad extends northwest through Ossovers to Graiovo, which apparently takes Bialystok within the Bolshevik lines. Kamieniets Litovsky is 40 kilometers north of Brest-Litovsk. The Poljsh withdrawal on the extreme left indicates that the Reds are well beyond Poland's line set by the supreme council, an 1 50 kilometres from the line in the region of Brest-Litovsk. The withdrawal in the centre also continues, owing to the northern pressure. Along the Styr and Sereth the communication says, the Poles are regrouping for a counter-offensive on this front, where the Reds are reported to be reinforcing with the design of launching one big push with Lemberg their objective before an armistice is signed.





Washington, July 23.—This is the time of year when the poison ivy cases begin to reach for a record as people get out into the open and explore the wonders of nature, says the American Forestry Association. But poison ivy is not a thing to be fooled with, and the association points out that soap and hot water in wholesale applications comprise the best measure of relief.

The poison, after being deposited in the skin, requires some time to penetrate, and if this penetration can be prevented by thorough washing, eruption and irritation will not result. While exposed parts should be cleansed in this manner as soon after exposure as possible, it is worth while to make the attempt even 12 or 20 hours afterwards in the hope that at least a portion of the poison may be removed.

A heavy lather should be produced and the washing should be continued several minutes. Severe scrubbing with a brush is not advisable, but several swabs or small compresses of gauze may be used, discarding each in turn, so that the poison may not be distributed by the cloth.

Bathing with alcohol diluted with an equal amount of water is also an effective preventive. Where exposure has been more general, a bath for the entire body, followed by a change of clothing, is good preventive measure. The hair should not be neglected. Bathing, if not accompanied by sufficient changing of water or rinsing, may result in spreading the rash to skin that had not been infected. In cases that are at all serious a physician should be consulted.

Ointments should not be used in the acute stage of the disease. In the later stages, however, soothing and astringent ointments may be of value in allaying irritation and hastening cure. The extent to which it is desirable to use solutions of permanganate of potash hyposulphite of soda, sulphate of magnesium (epsom salts), and other remedies, is also discussed.

MAKING CARTOON FILM TEDIOUS UNDERTAKING

When the little animated cartoon figures jiggle across the motion picture screen to caricature human foibles and then suddenly fade away after ten minutes of silent, artificial hilarity, it is difficult to believe that it has taken longer to create them than to make a five-reel feature picture.

It takes about seven weeks to complete the animated cartoon, whereas pictures photographed from life are often finished in five weeks. Animated cartoons are a series of drawings that are photographed individually. The photographing process is an application of the kodak use of the roll film, which is turned for each succeeding exposure. The animated cartoon of 500 feet consists of from 1,200 to 1,500 original drawings. The success of the picture depends more upon the artist's ability to gauge the number of different drawings necessary to represent a single action than upon his art work. All drawings are made on transparent paper, and may be photographed several times in different parts of the cartoon.




