### WANTON ACT OF CRUELTY REPORTED IN KENT COUNTY

An Obliging Colored Man Crushed Beneath a Wagon and Left Lying in Great Pain at the Wayside.

Oungah, May 18 .- One of the most glaring acts of inhumanity that has come to light in this vicinity or any other vicinity in recent years-an act conspicuous alike by the carelessness to which it owed its origin and the inhumanity by which it was attended-was perpetrated near Cooperville a short time ago. A party of men with teams went to Cooper's mill to get timber for a new barn. They loaded the loads and were on their way p e when the chain binding one of th loads became unfastened. A colored man named Jefferson, who was working in a field near by, was asked by the driver to help him fasten the chain. Jeffer-son crawled under the load and suc-

er teams? Did they pick up the in-jured man, carry him to his home and summon medical aid? Not so! Did they even pause to inquire how badwas hurt or offer a word of sympathy which would have cost them nothing? Not they! They passed by on the other side like the Priests and Levites and left him lying helpless on the road. Fortunately a little later a Good Samaritan came along, by whom Jefferson was taken to his home and Dr. Agar summoned to attend his injuries.

The River Thames is not an inviting looking nor convenient bathing-place at any time of the year; and, moreover, the use of its waters within the city cimits, and even beyond it, for that purpose, is prohibited, except under onerous conditions which practically shut out the young people, who, in reality, are the ones chiefly inter-

To teach the boy and the girl how to swim is held by many persons to be as necessary as to teach the young idea how to shoot. At all events , the acquirement of a noteworthy art is highly desirable as part of the education of boys and girls; and if there were public swimming baths in this city; this could be done without the risk attendant on learning as conditions now are.

The baths would also be a boon to many other persons, and would altogether conduce to the public health and comfort. An offer was made some years ago by The Chatham Dredging Company to lend the services of one of their dredges in the construction of bathing grounds at some spot on the river. One of the company's dredges is here now, and doubtless the offer yet stands good.

HUNTING FOR IMMORTAL SOULS

Rev. Dr. Talmage Urges All Christian Workers to Increased Fidelity and Shows How Much Effort at Doing Good Pails Through Lack of Adreit-

Washington, May 12.-In this discourse Ir. Talmage urges all Chris-tian workers to increased fidelity and shows how much effort at doing good fails through lack of adroitness; text, Genesis x, 9, "He was a mighty hunter before the Lord."

In our day hunting is a sport, but in the lands and the times interested of milders. fested of wild beasts it was a matter of life or death with the people. It was very different from our going

out on a sunshiny afternoon with patent breechloader to shoot rredbirds on the flats, when Pollux and Achilles and Diomedes went out to clear the land of lions and panthers and bears. Xenophon grew eloquent in regard to the art of hunting. In the far east people, elephant mounted, chased the tiger. Francis I. was called the father of hunting. And Moses, in my text, sets forth Nimrod as a hero, when it presents him with broad shoulders and shaggy approach and supproved face and arm

parel and sunbrowned face and arm bunched with muscle, 'a mighty hun-ter before the Lord." I think he used the bow and the arrows with great success practicing archery.

I have thought if it is such a grand

thing and such a brave thing to clear wild beasts out of a country if it is not a better and a braver thing to hunt down and destroy those great evils of society that are stalkng the land with fierce eye and bloody paw and sharp tusk and quick spring. I have wondered there is not such a thing as gospel archery, by which those who have been flying from the truth may be captured for God and heaven. The Lord Jesus in his sermon used the art of angling for an illustration when he said, "I will make you fishers of men." And so I think I have authority for using hunting as an il-

lustration of gospel truth, and I pray God there may be many a man enlisted in the work who shall begin to study gospel archery of whom it may after awhile be said, "He was a mighty hunter before the Lord." How much awkward Christian work there is done in the world! How many good people there are who

drive souls away from Christ instead of bringing them to him! All their ngers are thumbs-religious blundrers who upset more than they right. Their gun has a crooked barrel and kicks as it goes off. They are like a lumsy comrade who goes along with skillful hunters. At the very moment he or the to be most quiet racking an alder or falling over log and frightening away the game. How few Christian people have ever learned how the Lord Jesus Christ at the well went from talking about a cup of water to the most practical religious truths, which won the wo-man's soul for God! Jesus in the wilderness was breaking bread to the people. I think it was very good bread. It was very light bread, and the yeast had done its work thoroughly. Christ, after he had broken the bread, said to the people. ware of the yeast or of the leaven of the Pharisees." So natural a transition it was and how easily they all understood him! But how few Christian people there are who understand how to fasten the truths of

men! The archers of olden time studied their art. They were very precise in the matter. The old books gave special directions as to how an archer should go and as to what an archer should do. He must stand erect and firm, his left foot a little in advance of the right toot. With his left hand he must to hold of the bow in the middle, and then with three fingers and the thumb of his right hand he should lay hold the arrow and affix it to the string—so precise was the direction given. But how clumsy we are about religious work! How little skill and care we exercise! How often our arrows miss the mark! I am glad that there are institutions established in many cities of our land where men may learn the art of doing good-studying spiritual archery and become known as "mighty hunters before the Lord."

God and religion to the souls

In the first place if you want to be effectual in doing good you must be very sure of your weapon. There was something very fascinating about the archery of olden times. Perhaps you do not know what they could do with the bow and arrow. the chief battles fought by the English Plantagenets were with the long bow. They would take the arrow of polished wood and feather it with the plume of a bird, and then would fly from the bowstring of plaited silk. The bloody fields of Agincourt and Solway Moss and Nevville's Cross heard the loud thrum of the archer's bowstring. Now, my Christian friends, we have a might-ier weapon than that. It is the ar-row of the gospel; it is a sharp ar-row; it is a straight arrow; it is feathered from the wing of the dove of God's spirit; it diese of God's spirit; it flies from a bow made out of the wood of the cross. As far as I can estimate or calcul-ate, it has brought down 400,000,-000 of souls. Paul knew how to bring the notch of that arrow on to the bowstring, and its whir was heard through the Corinthian theatres and through the courtroom un-til the knees of Felix knocked together. It was that arrow that stuck in Luther's heart when he cried out: "Oh! my sins! Oh. my sins!" If it strike a man in the head, it kills his skepticism: if it strike him in the heel, it will turn his step; if it strike him in the heart

strike him in the heart, he throws up his hands, as did one of old when

From the California stage you see, as you go over the plains, here and there a covote trotting alone almost within range of the gun-sometimes quite within range of it. No The good game is hidden and secluded. Every hunter knows that. So many of the souls that will be of most worth for Christ and of most value to the church are secluded. They do not come in our way. You will have to go where they are. You der they are down in that cellar Yonder they are up in that garret-far away from the door of any church. The gospel arrow has not been pointed at them. The tract distributor and the city missionary sometimes just catch a glimpse of them, as a hunter through the trees gets a momentary sight of a part-ridge or roebuck. The trouble is we are waiting for the game to come to us. We are not good hunters. We are standing on some street or road expecting that the timid antelope will come up and eat out of our hand. We are expecting that prairie fowl will light on our church teeple. It is not their habit. If the church should wait 10,000,000 years

for the world to come in and saved, it will wait in vain. The world will not come. What the church wants now is to lift its feet from damask ottomans and put them in the stirrups. I sometimes think that just as God blotted out the churches of Thyatira and Corinth and Laodicea because of their sloth and stolidity he will blot out American and English Christianity and raise on the ruins a stalwart, wide awake missionary church that can take the full meaning of that command: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved, but he that believeth not shall be damned"-a command, you see, punctuated with a throne of heaven and a dungeon of hell.

I remark, further, if you want to succeed in spiritual archery you must have courage. If the hunter stands with trembling hand or shoulder that flinches with fear, instead of his taking the catamount the catamount takes him. What would become of the Greenlander if when out hunting for the bear he should stand shivering with terror on an iceberg? would have become of Du Chaillu and Livingstone in the African thicket with a faint beart and a weak knee? When a Pan-

ther comes within 20 paces of you and it has its eye on you and it has squatted for the fearful spring, "Steady there!" Courage, O ye spiritual archers! There are great monsters of iniquity prowling all around about the community. Shall we not in the strength of God go forth and combat them? We not only need more heart, but more backbone. What is the church of God that it should fear to look in the eye. any transgression? There is the Bengal tiger of drunkenness that prowls around, and instead of attacking it how many of us hide under the church pew or the communion table? There is so much invested in it. we are afraid to assault it. Millions of dollars in barrels, in vats, in spigots, in corkscrews, in gin palaces with marble floors and Italian sop tables and chased ice coolers, and in the strychning and in th tables and chased ice coolers, and in the strychnine and the logwood and the tartaric acid and the nux vomica that go to make up our "pure" American drinks. I looked with wondering eyes on the "Heidelberg tun." It is the great liquor vat of Germany, which is said to hold 800 hogsheads of wine and only three hogsheads of wine, and only three times in 100 years it has been filled But as I stood and looked at it I said to myself. That is nothing—800 hogsheads. Why, our American vat holds 10,200,000 barrels of strong drinks, and we keep 300,000 men with nothing to do but to see that it is filled."

Sir Isaac Brock, when he heard that the western frontier of Upper Canada was being assailed by the Americans under Hull, hastened westward. The Manufacture of Plate Glass.
The casting table of a plate glass factory is about 20 feet tong, 15 feet wide and 6 inches thick. Strips of iron on each side afford a bearing for the rollers and determine the thickness of the plate to be cast. The molten glass is poured on the table, and the roller passing from end to end spreads the glass to a uniform thickness. The glass, after cooling rapidly, is transferred to the annealing oven, where it remains several days. When taken out, It is very rough and uneven and in that state is used for skylights and other purposes where strength is desired rather than transparency. The greater part of the glass, however, is ground, smoothed and polished.



We broke the cement, thoroughly flushed it and placed an elbow on the entrance pipe, turned it so as to give the sediment a chance to settle before it

ran into the sewer. It is now in a satisfactory condition.
