#### A WINTER CAMPAIGN.

The Liberals in power have always exhibited a liking for methods which savor of the coup d'etat procedure made familiar in France. Now history is said to be likely to repeat itself and what occurred under the Mackenzie regime in 1874 be repeated by Sir Wilfrid in 1903. Then dissolution was suddenly sprung on the people, so sudden ly that it is on record that one of the newly appointed ministers was in a distant city en route to the Capital and only heard on the train, from an outsider, that parliament had been dissolved. At the present moment it is sufficiently notorious that members are on the tenterhooks of anxiety lest the morrow's papers tell them they are members no longer, cut off in almost the meridian of their parliamertary course, bereft of \$1,500 at least and possibly consigned once more to

The Toronto News, not unreasorably, protests against the hardship of a winter campaign being forced on the country. And it may be noticed that in Britain on one occasion when a winter dissolution was "sprung" one members protested that "if every other consideration were out of the way, the season of the year and depth of snow in the country ought to be an insuperable objection. There were physical difficulties in the way of a return of a new parliament and he who had the greatest muscular power would carry the election." And this in Britain! How much more so does such an objection hold force in Canada. In Britain on the occasion referred to so strong was the feeling that the King was petitioned not to exercise his dissolving prerogative, and acceded to the prayer of the parfiament-a fact which is perhaps not unworthy the consideration of the Canadian public.

Scurcely less worthy of the seriou consideration of the present dismayed and demoralized cabinet is the speech of Sir Robert Peel, delivered in 1846. when he said: "I do not think a dis-solution justifiable for the purpose of strengthening a party. The power of dissolution is a great instrument in the hand of the Crown and it must have a tendency to blunt that instrument if it were employed without grave necessity." And as Mr. Todd has justly pointed out, "it is not a legitimate use of the prerogative to revert to it , . . merely in order to maintain in power the particular ministry who hold the reins of gov-

#### PREMIER ROSS IN RENFREW.

The revolt in the Liberal ranks confronts the Ontario Government at every turn. Premier Ross left Toronto, where he had, affler mightly effort, equelched the muting in the Globe office, and made it say that the canker of corruption had not eaten deeply into the heart of Canadian politics, that the poison was not in the blood, and that the heart did not beat falsely. Nemesis no longer pursued the politicians, except the wicked Tories. There were no barnacles and parasitles, or in tere were there was no need to remove them with an iron hand. "The first duty of Liberals" was simply to call attention to the crimes of Toryism. Fresh from this, victory, Mr. Ross went into North Renfrew, expecting a lighte relief from the grumbling of Liberals. The Globe has ceased to bellow about corruption, and little did Mr. Ross think that the wearisome noise would be renewed by his old friend, Mr. James Findlay. "My old friend, Mr. Findlay, and mysclf," said the Premier, "were cramped in the same boarding house at Olitawa. Unmoved by these tender recollections, Mr. Findlay

DISCUSSED THE COLONIES. Lord Brassey and Others Make In-

teresting Speeches. ondon, Dec. 15.—Lord Brassey, speaking at a special meeting of the London Chamber of Commerce yesterday, dwelt on Sir Wilfrid Laurier's declaration to the Chambers of Commerce maintaining the fiscal independence of Canada, and Mr. Ellis' statement at the Manufacturers' Association that Canada had given preference enough. As a follower of the Duke of Devonshire and Lord Rosebery, he said there was no course more pracsaid there was no course more practical than an interchange of opinions as to the best way to help each other. Any financial discussions with the colonies in regard to Imperial defence should be avoided. The best way to strengthen the defences of the empire would be found in urging the colonial Governments to see that their local forces were efficient. Canada might give effective aid to the Imperial navy by providing men, and the Admiralty should provide drill-ships, with adequate pay for retainer. It was paltry on the part of the home Government, with an appropriation of £35,000,000, to wrangle with Newfoundland over the cost of a drill-shed. An extended system of British emigration was needed which the London Chamber on Commerce should devise. There should be a liberal subsidy from the Imperial funds for a fast ocean service to Canada, the crews of which service by training in time of peace could act on these vessels as the eyes of the feet in war time. He was strongly in favor of Lord S.rathcom's proposal for encouraging university students to travel to Canada. Mr. Brooks said he wanted the best postal arrangements would eventually close the market against British manufacturers.

Mr. B. Irving of Vancouver held that unless Britain forestalled the Americans the agitation for closer commercial union would mean danger ahead. Sir Albert Rollitt spoke of the marked loyalty of the Freuch-Canadians. Mr. Fraser said the danger was that British emigration to Canada was hopelessly outdone by that of the Americans.

A MINEOWNER'S DEATH. rious Charges Made Regarding Hi

New York, Dec. 16.-Inspector Mc Clusky, chief of the Detective Bureau is looking into the death Believue Hospital Thursday of week of Adolphus Drucker, who was at one time a member of the British

week of Adolphus Drucker, who was at one time a member of the British Parliament. Mr. Drucker was a wealthy mine owner, his interests being in British Columbia.

Drucker was placed in the prison ward of the hospital while suffering from alcoholism and died there. The present investigation was brought about by a letter written to Attorney Eugene Robinson, Drucker's lawyer, by James Murphy, now a prisoner in the Tombs, who had occupied a cot next to Drucker in the hospital. Briefly, Murphy charged that the attendants dosed the patient with frequents and heavy hypodermic injections of morphine, besides an internal dose of a narcotic known as "snipe" and also beat him about the head frequently and unnecessarily.

When Drucker died Murphy declares the attending nurse was asleep. Afterwards the body was hastily taken to the morgue, and, it is charged, the hour of death was misstated. Another charge is that, though friends of Mr. Drucker had several times telephoned to the hospital asking if Drucker was there, the answer was always that no such person was among the patients. It is also averred that when he was

there, the answer was always that no such person was among the patients. It is also averred that when he was brought to Bellevue Hospital he had valuable jewellery about him and that this has disappeared.

Coroner, Jackson announced to-day that he would hold an inquest. Thursday of next week to ascertain the circumstances surrounding the death of Drucker. Superintendent Mahon of the hospital says he wil have the District Attorney and the Board of Trüstees of Bellevue conduct an investigation.

KODAK'S CHARACTER SKETCH OF FRENCH-CANADIAN ORATOR.

dember for Labelle, Que., Not the Efferand Is Not Eternally Blowing Sear Bubbles-Handled a Huge Subject With Skill and Simplicity - An Analytical

Mr. Henri Bourassa, M.P. for Labelle, Que., delivered a lecture in Toronto on "The Loyalty of the French Canadian," the other night. Kodak's character sketch of the orator in The News is illuminative, and even if one does not entirely agree it broadens the horizon of Canadian understanding to read it. He says:

The only time I ever want to talk French is when listening to a Frenchman talk English—especially one like Mr. Henri Bourassa.

The most that some of us in that audience last night at Association Hall knew about the member for Labelle was that he opposed sending the Canadian contingents to South Africa. He was regarded as a typical French-Canadian, The war was generally nounder. Mr. Henri Bourassa, M.P. for La

French-Canadian, The war was generally popular. Therefore it was easy tacitly to impeach Quebec of Imperial disloyalty. So that for Mr. Imperial disloyaity. So that for Mr. Bourassa to speak on "The Loyalty of the French-Canadian" sounded like a paradox. Most of us like paradoxes. After the oration of last night it must also candidly be said that we extremely like Mr. Bourassa.

He is not the effervescent Frenchman, eternally blowing soap-bubbles. Rather he is the kind of French mind Rather he is the kind of French mind that makes mathematics or studies theology. He has brain. No merely emotional orator could—as he did—trace the French-Canadian people from a colony of 60,000 peasants in the sixteenth century on the St. Law-rence, to a nationality of three millions in 1903, half of them figuring



MR. MENRI BOURASSA, M.P. as a pivotal asset in the future des tiny of half a continent. The subject is huge. Mr. Bourassa's method was simple. The problem is to the common mind as bewildersa's method was simple. The problem is to the common mind as bewildering foggy as the binomial theorem. He treated it as lucidly as Prof. Tyndall lectured to New York audiences on the science of light. A question of this kind is necessarily fraught with dangerous emotions—such as are luridly pictured in Carlyle's French Revolution. Mr. Bourassa kept his head clear, and punctuated his periods with graceful jests. He was courtly, yet convincing: persuasive, but usually calza, and always dignified. On a subject so native to him as French-Canadianism, he was at times quite as dynamic as D'Alton McCarthy used to be in his polemics against dual languages. Graceful in gesture, with the full-arm sweep and the rhythmical swing of his body, he was also musically fuent in a language that sometimes causes even English orators to trust luck for the next word. This must be conceded a triumph in oratory. Mr. Bourassa was determinedly analytical. He was bound to have us see that on the question of imperialism it is the descendants of the United Empire Loyalists who are emotional, and the descendants of the

ed Empire Loyalists who are em tional, and the descendants of the French mountaineers who have the "sang froid." Local self-government as the axis of colonial patriotism was the motive principle of his lecture. The Normandy and Picardy peasants were local self-government.

was the metive principle of his lecture. The Normandy and Picardy peasants were local self-governed communities. The French-Canadians, their offspring, are like them. While we rush off to Imperial wars, the habitant "coolly" considers the whys and wherefores, and stays on the St.Lawrence. While we argue the advantages of fiscal union for the Empire according to Mr. Chamberlain, the compatriots of Mr. Bourassa "rationally" figure out bushels of Canadian wheat and miles of Canadian railroad. We in Ontario have reproached England with bartering our Alaskan boundary for American good-will. Mr. Bourassa contends that a war with the United States would be suicidal both to England and Canada. And, according to the same dispassionate analysis, there never can be such a chimera as an Imperial Council, and the dream of Imperial unity can never in the name of geography be realized.

This is the message which the loyal descendant of the French mountaineer brings to loyalist Toronto. This is the chivalrous French-Canadian's version of "Canada First." And to complete the paradox, the member for Labelle, the accredited apostle of the French-Canadian people, winds up a dispassionate lecture on history, geography, political economy and war, by indulging in a pretty eulogy on woman. Shades of Jean Paul Blouet!

#### MR. FOSTER AT MONTBEAL

A SPEECH ON THE BRITISH FISCAL CAMPAIGN.

He Argues that the Colonial Premiers Gave Mr. Chamberlain the Mandate to Strive For Imperial Preferential Trade-Mr. Charlton Criticized-Mr. Tarte Moves a

Montreal, Dec. 15.-Hon. George

E. Foster, at the Windsor Hall, under the auspices of the Sir John A. Macdonald Club, delivered his first speech in Canada on the political sit-uation in England as seen by him dur-ing his recent participation in Mr. ing his recent participation in Mr. Chamberlain's campaign. He extended Chamberiain's campaign. He extended his views so as to include Canada and the other colonies. The hall, which seats about fifteen hundred persons, was packed. On the platform were prominent local Conservatives, and in the front row sat Hon. J. Israel Tarte. After Mr. Foster had hurri dly summed up his remarks in oather. after Mr. Foster had hurri-dly summed up his remarks in order to catch the night express for Toronto, there was a shout for Mr. Tarte, and the ex-Miniser of Public Works stepped forward, and, with a few protectionist remarks, moved a resolution of support to Mr. Chamberlain, which carried.

The ex-Finance Minister claimed hat every great growth in a nation's distory must hist have its soil prepared, and then that some great must arise to give it expression. that he harked back to the conference of colonial Premiers, from which he said Mr. Chamberlain, as Colonial Secretary, received from the colonies, through their representatives, the mandate for Imperial preferential trade. In picturing how the Colonial Secretary had pleaded the case with his colleagues, had resigned and gone forth to carry out the wishes of the colonies. to carry out the wishes of the c lomes, the speaker roused the real enthusiasu of the meeting, and elicited immense

Applause.

At that climax Mr. Foster said with all his oratorical force: "I put it to every mother's son of you, when Mr. Chamberlain has done what he has to Chamberlain has done what he has to carry out what you proposed to him, where ought you to be in this contest? It is the policy to which the Premiers of the colonics have put their seals, the policy that their confrere, Mr. Chamberlain, is trying to have adopted by the senior partner. I can go farther, back, to the Government of Canada, to the people of Canada, who have had in operation for five years a preference without a dissenting voice almost."

Mr. Foster also advocated a Canadian navy, denied the possibility of treaty-making power without independence and separation, claimed that independence would mean for Canada the gloom and shadow of an overwhelming power, in whose heart of hearts there is imbedded the tradition, as o'd as the war o' revolution, that

hearts there is imbedded the tradition, as o'd as the war o' revolution, that the destiny of Canada is to become a part of the United States, and that the destiny of the United States is to rule the whole of North-America.

He did not attack Mr. Charlton as a private citizen, but thought that before his campaign for reciprocity should continue much longer he should resign.

The audience were attentive throughout. Mr. Foster spoke with his usual precision, but towards the close his voice became hoarse.

ENGINEER KILLED.

C. P. R. Train Runs Into a Heavy Drift Near Killarney, Man.

Winnipeg, Dec. 15.-A serious acci dent occurred on the Deloraine section of the C. P. R. a few minutes after 8 o'clock. Engineer Graham of Winnipeg was killed, and Fireman Chambers and Baggageman Nicholson, both of this city, were injured. The accident occurred about four and one half miles east of Killarney and one-hall miles east of killarney. Passenger train No. 14, with Engineer Graham at the throttle; was ploughing its way through the small drifts of snow that had falen, when the engine struck a drift that had been packed down hard and solid. The engine left the track, derailing with it the baggage car, mail and smoking car. Two passenger coaches and a tongist car on the senger coaches and a tourist car on the train did not leave the track. None of the passengers on the train, which was not very heavily loaded, were injured.

Engineer Graham was badly cut up and was instantly killed. The injuries to Fireman Chambers are serious, and he will probably die. Nicholson was but slightly injured. The dead engineen leaves a wife and three children in this city.

#### CONSERVATIVES WON.

RESULT OF THE BYE-ELEC TIONS IN BRITAIN.

Majorities in Two Constitue Largely Reduced by the Liberals -Fight Turned on Fiscal Ques

London, Dec. 16.—The two bye elections vesterday were carried by the Conservative candidates. In the Borough of Lewisham, Major Coates has been elected by a majority of 2, 012. In the Dulwich division of Camberwell F. Rutherford Harris has been

elected by a majority of 1,437.

The deaths of Mr. John Penn and Sir John Blundell Maple respectively rendered these by elections necessary. Since 1885 both constituencies have been Conservative, Lewisham has not been conservative, Lewisham has not been contested by the Libertal not been contested by the Liberals since 1802, when the Conservative majority was 2,414. There was no opposition in Dulwich in 1900. The Conservative majority in 1895 was 3,082, and to-day's result shows a reduction of 1,645.

The fiscal question was prominent throughout the campaigns

throughout the campaigns, Joseph Chamberlain inter-with letters in suppport of the Conservative candidates.
Chinese labor into South Africa
was used by the Liberals at Dulwich
as an anti-Harris slogan, while the as an anti-Harris slogan, while the Conservatives even dragged in the King's name, attaching the words "Edwardus Rex" to posters in such a way as to create the impression that his Majesty was a supporter of Mr. Chamberlain's fiscal proposals. The Liberals telegraphed to the King on the subject, and promptly came a reply authorizing the statement that no permission had been given to use the King's name in any way.

London, Dec. 16. — There was great rejoicing last night among tariff reforms over the election to Parliament of Dr. Harris and Major Coates in the Metropolitan divisions of Delwich and Lewisham. Both are sterling advocates of the principle underlying Mr. Chamberlain's fiscal proposals. There were other issues involved in the campaign, but in the last three days attention has been concentrated upon the tariff to the exclusion of almost all other questions. Where other issues were urged it was for the purpose of diverting the tariff reformers. Letters were published yesterday from Mr. Chamberlain urging the voters to support the tariff reform candidates, and, on the other hand, earnest appeals for the free trade candidates were made by the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Lord Goorge Hamilton, Mr. Ritchie, Lord Goschen and Lord Rosebery.

CHEAPER CABLE MESSAGES.

Successful Test of the Orlings Speed Accelerator.

#### GAMEY AND MACKAY.

VIOLENT SCENES AT A BEACH-BURG MEETING.

The Man From Manitoulin Takes Part in the North Renfrew Campaign-Gathering Ends in Disorder.

Beachburg, Dec. 16 .- Mr. Gamey was received with open arms by the Conservatives on his entrance to the North Renfrew campaign. He was met at the station in Pembroke by the leading members of the party and driven to the residence of Mr. Dunlop, where a reception was held. In the afternoon he drove out here, accompanied

by a dozen loads of Conservatives, to speak for Mr. Donlop. The little hall was packed to the doors.

At the opening of the meeting Dr. Forbes, a local Liberal, asked whether the meeting was open to discussion. Mr. Dunlop, the Conservative candidate, claimed that Mr. Hale, his opponent, had refused to take part in any joint meetings. After a lively discussion on the point it was agreed to alsion on the point it was agreed to allow Dr. MacKay forty minutes. Before he rose Mr. Peter White, jun, spoke on the issues of the campaign.

Dr. MacKay was then called upon, but was met at the start by the accuration that he

cusation that he was a Government officia. He admitted that he was local registrar of the High Court, but justified his appearance on the ground that he was a ratepayer and because the Conservatives had to win this election on "Gameyism." He then pro-ceeded to outline the Gamey case, and claimed that Mr. Gamey was discredit-

ed in his own evidence.

The crucial point, he said, was Mr. Gamey's flight to Buffa o, a fugitive from invities.

Mr. Gamey jumped up excitedly and exclaimed, "You said I fled from justice. You are a liar."

Three was a great uproar in the audience. Mr. Gamey walked to the front and shook his fist in Dr. MacKay's face, and the Chairman was obliged to separate them.

Dr. MacKay, when order was restored, said "that shows the character of the man. Swearing and cursing and threatening to smash my face."

Mr. Gamey jumped up again and exclaimed, "I didu't curse."

Mr. Gamey exclaimed, "That is nice manuage," and another row was im-minent when the Chairman once more interfered.

the evidence, justified his appearance on the platform on the ground that he did so not as a question of Grit or Tary, but to expose the character of the man who was brought here to influence the electors.

Mr. Gam'y was loudly cheered on rising. "I am not a Sullivan," said he, "or anything like one, as Dr. Mac-Kay said, but I have a little Irish in me and I won't et any man in shoe leather say I am a lugitive from justice. I called him a liar, but I withdraw it."

Continuing, he said he would not have come here if he had not been so urgently invited. He was not on trial, and that was why his Isish rose and he told Dr. MacKay he would slap his face.

Dr. MacKay—You are not able. Continuing, Mr. Gamey said he certainly would slap the lace of 'any one who said he was a fugitive from justice. The vote in Muskoka, he claimed, showed that the people be lieved him rather than Mr. Stratton. He did not take credit for winning Muskoka, for no one man could.
