## TO THE PUBLIC.

I INTENDED to write a Preface to my Almanack for two reasons:—First, as the name of Theophrastus is so little known now a-days, I supposed there would be a general enquiry “Who is the new Almanack maker?” For a few days, or a new name, or, in short any thing that is new, will generally attract the attention for a time: Hence in a great measure has arisen the old proverb, “That every dog has his day,” that is, as I take it, of being talk’d about; but I really do not know in what else the proverb holds true. Praise or scandal falls to the lot of every one.—My second reason was, that I might, as most authors do, speak very modestly of my abilities—beg you to be kind and indulgent to a young beginner—and to tell you that whatever errors might have crept into the present publication, should be carefully avoided next year.—But my design is frustrated—for on examination, I find there only half page to crowd it in. I am therefore obliged just to acquaint you,—That my father is a plain honest farmer—but possessed of more learning than generally falls to the lot of that useful description of men. He is, however, exceedingly positive and whiny.—Attached to a particular Almanack-maker—by his Almanack he regulates his planting, sowing, reaping, &c.—and I happening to be born in an autumn, when, by following this method, he had reaped an abundant harvest, he came to the determination to name me Theophrastus after a famous old Grecian Almanack maker, a translation of whose writings my father had read with much approbation.—In spite of all the opposition of my mother, Theophrastus I was called.—But notwithstanding this, my father considered the design he had formed from the first moment of my birth, ne-

but half accomplished. As I grew in years, and my mind began to open itself, he seemed pleased with my abilities. And I remember one day, when I had said or done something which particularly delighted him, he exclaimed with vehemence, "The Boy will not disappoint me." He did not communicate his intention to me till I was nearly fourteen years of age; when with a much longer preface than I have room to write, and putting on a solemn countenance, he told me, that having given me as much learning as the state of the country would afford, he now intended my time in future, should be devoted to the study of Astronomy—told me his reason for my name—pointed out the fame my namesake had acquired in Greece—and hoped I would not slacken my diligence till I had reached the same reputation.—This short history, will sufficiently account for my commencing the publisher of an Almanack.—Should my present attempt be received with candor, you will the next year hear further from
