" Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, he and deline was the

AM happy to be able to congratulate you on the condition of the Province.

The Harvest of the last season was, by the blessing of Providence, abundant; the price of, and the demand for, our Staple Export have improved; our Fisheries have been successful; and the increase which the Revenue of the past year exhibits, when compared with that of preceding years, is a gratifying proof of the revival of our Commerce and of the general prosperity of the people.

"Her Majesty's approval of the Act of last Session, entitled An Act to establish. the University of New Brunswick, has not, as yet, been notified to me, but it affords me satisfaction to be able to state that I have been informed that the Order in Council

confirming this Act will shortly be transmitted to message at the same and

"Her Majesty's Government recently placed at my disposal, for the use of the Militia of this Province, 3,000 stand of Enfield Rifles, and I have thus been enabled to arm, without expense to the Province, several Companies of Militia, whose offers to volunteer for drill and exercise, I have felt pleasure in accepting. I have reason to believe that similar offers will be received by me from many more Companies of Militia; and you will, I am sure, share the satisfaction which I feel at this proof of the undiminished spirit of the people, and of their wise determination to adopt those precautionary measures of self-defence, which are additional safeguards for the maintenance of Peace. "The progress which has been made in the construction of the Railway from Saint John to Shediac, gives me reason to hope that, in the course of next Summer, the whole line will be open for traffic.

"The interest manifested by the Agricultural population in the selection of Members of the Provincial Board of Agriculture augers well for the future usefulness of the Board, whose labours will, I trust, fully realize the expectations of the people.

"It cannot be doubted that intending Settlers on Wild Lands derive much advantage from combining together in their applications for Land: Tracts of Land suited for Settlements of this description will be surveyed in different parts of the Province, and Roads will be laid out.

" Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"I have given directions that the Accounts of the Receipts and of the Expenditure

of the past year, should be laid before you.

"You will observe with satisfaction that, placing out of consideration the proceeds of the Provincial Debentures and the Expenditure for Railway Works, the Revenue of the year exhibits an excess over the Expenditure during the same period.

"Estimates also of the Revenue and Expenditure of the current year will be sub-

mitted to you.

"Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, "Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"The adoption in Canada and in Nova Scotia of the decimal system of computation, will probably induce you to consider whether this system can be introduced with ad-

vantage in this Province.

"I have, in accordance with the desire expressed to me last Session by the House of Assembly, appointed Commissioners to prepare a measure for facilitating settlements between Debtors and Creditors. The Report of the Commissioners has not as yet been laid before me, but its presentation will not, I am informed, be long deferred, and, when it is received, I shall submit it for your consideration.

"It has been usual to take a Census of the Population at decennial periods. I recommend you to consider what Legislative enactments may be requisite to facilitate

a Census next year, and to ensure its correctness.

"The conflicting claims of the Lessees of the Crown and of the Owners of the Soil, for many years impeded or prevented the development of the Mineral resources of the Province. These impediments have been removed, and I recommend you to consider whether it would be expedient to institute a more searching enquiry into the real character and extent of these resources in different parts of the Province.

" I fervently hope that your deliberations will, by the favour of Providence, conduce

to the honor and welfare of the Province."

Mr. Chandler, a Member for the County of Charlotte, then proposed the Address to His Excellency in answer to the Speech, which he read; and the same being seconded by Mr. W. E. Perley, a Member for the County of Sunbury, it was handed in to the Chair, where it was again read, and is as followeth:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

1. We, the faithful Commons of New Brunswick, thank Your Excellency for your

6. We thank Your Excellency for informing us that there is reason to hope that the Railway in course of construction from Saint John to Shediac, will be opened for

We, the faithful Commons of New Brunswick, thank Your Excellency for your

Speech at the opening of the Session.

We are gratified to learn that during the past year Divine Providence has crowned the labours of the husbandman with an abundant Harvest; that there has been an increased demand for our staple export at improved prices; that the Fisheries have been productive; and to observe the evidence of reviving Commerce and the general prosperity of the people indicated by the increase of the Revenue.

We thank Your Excellency for the information that the Act to establish the University of New Brunswick will receive Her Majesty's assent, and we hope that the settlement

of this question will be productive of permanent good to the Province.

We are gratified to learn that Her Majesty's Government, in placing at Your Excellency's disposal three thousand Enfield Rifles for the use of the Militia of the Province, have enabled Your Excellency to arm, without any Provincial expense, the Companies of Militia whose offers to volunteer for drill and exercise, Your Excellency has been pleased to accept.

We unite with Your Excellency in the expression of our satisfaction that similar offers will be made by more Companies of Militia, evidencing the spirit which animates the People, and their determination to adopt those precautionary measures for self-

defence, which are additional securities for the maintenance of Peace.

We thank Your Excellency for informing us that there is reason to hope that the Railway in course of construction from Saint John to Shediac, will be opened for traffic

during the next Summer.

We agree with Your Excellency in the opinion that the interest manifested by the agricultural population in the selection of the Members of the Provincial Bor d, augurs well for its future usefulness; and we trust that the labours of the Board will be productive of advantage to that most important interest.

We agree with Your Excellency in the opinion, that intending Settlers on Wild Lands are benefited by combining together in their applications, and we are pleased to learn that Tracts of Land for Settlement will be surveyed in the different parts of

the Province, and Roads laid out through such tracts.

We thank Your Excellency for having directed the Accounts of the Receipts and Expenditure of the past year, and the Estimates of the current year to be laid before us, and it is a source of satisfaction to learn that the Revenue of the year exhibits an excess over the ordinary Expenditure.

We will give full consideration to any measure submitted to us for the purpose of providing for the introduction into the Province of the decimal system of computation.

We thank Your Excellency for the assurance that the Report of the Commissioners, appointed to prepare a measure to facilitate settlements between Debtors and Creditors, will soon be laid before us, and we will give to the subject that attention its importance demands.

We will consider the propriety of making provision for taking the Census at the usual decennial period, and what enactments may be required to effect that object.

"J. H. T. MANNERS-SUTTON.

"His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor lays before the House of Assembly, copies of Correspondence relative to the Joint Address to Her Majesty, of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, of the 9th April 1859, viz:--

"1. Despatch from the Lieutenant Governor to the Secretary of State, dated 12th

April 1859, No. 18:

RECIPROCITY OF TRADE AND REGISTRY OF SHIPS.

Reply to Address of last Session, Journal, page 231.

(Copy)-No. 18. Government House, Fredericton, New Brunswick, April 12th, 1859.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit to you, with the request that it may be laid at the foot of the Throne, the enclosed Joint Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly to Her Majesty.

The subject to which this Address refers, has been so frequently discussed in all its different bearings, and is moreover one, in the consideration of which so few points (comparatively speaking) of local importance alone can be raised, that I feel it unnecessary for me to submit to you any lengthened

remarks respecting it.

I may however observe, that the close proximity of the United States to this Province renders the exclusion of British Ships from the Coasting Trade of the United States a question of greater practical importance to the ship-owners of the Province than would otherwise be the case. And the same circumstance, especially when coupled with the fact (referred to in the Address.) that Ship-building is one of the most important branches of industry here, renders the exclusion of British built ships from Registration in the United States more injurious, in a practical point of view, to the Ship-builders and Ship-owners of the Province than it would be, if the Commercial relations of the Province with the United States were less intimate, the distance between the two Countries greater, and the people of the Province less extensively engaged in the business of Ship-building.

An Address from the House of Assembly, on the same subject as that referred to in the Joint Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly to Her Majesty, was presented to me at the

same time that the last mentioned Address was placed in my hands to be forwarded to you. I have the honor to forward to you a copy of this Address, and of my reply to it.

SIR,—The Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, have had under their consideration Mr. Elliot's Letter of the 17th May, transmitting for their opinion, by direction of Secretary Sir E. B. Lytton, a copy of a Despatch from the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, enclosing an Address from the Legislature of the Province to the Queen, on the subject of the effects of the repeal of the British Navigation Law.

This Address states that the repeal of the restrictions upon Foreign Shipping in the Foreign and Colonial Trades of the United Kingdom in 1850, and in the Coasting Trade in 1854, exposed British Shippowners to all the evil consequences of unequal competition with the shipping of most Foreign

Countries, and that in New Brunswick this grievance has been most severely felt.

It goes on to disclaim any desire on the part of the Provincial Legislature, for any alteration in the general Commercial policy of the British Empire, but it adverts to the retaliatory powers vested in Her Majesty by the 324th and 325th Sections of the 16th and 17th Vic. c. 107, and prays that measures may be adopted by Her Majesty in relation to this subject which will enforce reciprocal concessions

from those Foreign Countries which still withhold them from British Shipping.

With reference to Sir E. B. Lytton's desire to receive my Lords opinion as to the course which Her Majesty's Government may properly adopt in this matter, I am to request that you will inform the Duke of Newcastle, that the effects of the recent changes in the British Navigation Laws, both upon the British Shipping interest and upon the policy of Foreign Countries, were made the subject of careful enquiry by this Board, on the occasion of an Address to Her Majesty of the 22nd December last, from the owners of British ships and others, of a similar purport to that under consideration, and I am to enclose to you, to be laid before His Grace, a copy of a letter from this Board to the Home Department, of the 10th March last, containing the results of that enquiry, and the views of my Lords upon the subject.

I am to add, that in the particular case of New Branswick, which Colony is stated in the present Address to have suffered most severely from unequal competition with the Shipping of Foreign Countries, it appears to my Lords from an examination of the Shipping Accounts of New Branswick in their possession, that the only Foreign Country whose Shipping commands an important share in the Colonial Trade is the United States of America, and that so far as those States are concerned, the

remedial measures indicated in the Address are not applicable.

My Lords are not aware of any privilege affecting Shipping, in respect of which complete reciprocity does not exist between the United States of America and the Province of New Brunswick, the coasting trade being withheld in both from all but National Shipping except on the conditions of National Registry, which in New Brunswick allow of Ships built in the United States being registered as British, but do not allow of Ships built in New Brunswick being registered in the United States.

The retaliatory Sections of the 16th and 17th Vic. c. 107, to which the Address refers, and which are the only provisions of Imperial Law under-which Her Majesty can impose countervailing restrictions on the Shipping on non-reciprocating countries, enable Her Majesty to place such restrictions only in respect of the voyages in which such Shipping may engage, and the goods which they may carry.

It would not therefore be competent for Her Majesty under the present Law of the United King-

dom, to exclude Ships built in the United States from the British Registry.

I subjoin Returns of the Trade and Shipping of New Brunswick, which although they extend over too limited a period to enable this Board to express a conclusive opinion upon the point, do not appear to them to exhibit any very marked symptoms of permanent and progressive decline in the Shipping interests of the Province.

"SIR,—I am directed by the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 29th December, transmitting for their consideration, by direction of Mr. Secretary Walpole, an Address to the Queen, "from owners of British Ships and others interested "in the prosperity of British navigation, on behalf of the Shipping Interest, at various Ports of the "United Kingdom," and I am to request you will submit to Mr. Secretary Estcourt the following observations upon the subject to which it relates.

The Address begins by representing to Her Majesty the ruinous state of depression into which the British Shipping is plunged; it proceeds to attribute this depression in some degree to the unequal competition to which the British Shipowner has been exposed since 1854 with the Shipping of every Foreign State; and it concludes by recommending that, as the admission of Foreign Ships to all the privileges of British Ships "has not induced the Governments of many Foreign States to admit British Shipping to equality of privileges with their own Ships," the power of retaliation vested in the Crown by the 324th and 325th Sections of the 16th and 17th Victoria, Chapter 107, should be exerted against such Foreign States, by placing their vessels as nearly as possible on the same footing in British Ports as that on which British Ships are placed in the Ports of such Countries.

My Lords have given to this Address the careful attention to which it is entitled from the great importance of the interest concerned, and the character of the signatures affixed to it, and they have

directed their inquiries both into the present state of the legislation of Foreign States with fregard to British Shipping, and also into the condition and progress of British Shipping since the repeal of the restrictions upon Foreign Shipping in the Trade of the United Kingdom.

With regard to the first part of the inquiry, I am to observe that my Lords cannot but believe that some misapprehension exists on the part of the Memorialists as to the extent to which reciprocity in navigation has been withheld by the Governments of Foreign States.

So far as my Lords are aware, there are only three Foreign Governments which, as regards foreign

or carrying trade, have not extended complete reciprocity to British Ships.

They refer to those of France, Spain, and Portugal, in which countries partial restrictions upon Foreign Ships are still maintained.

In France, under the Treaty of 1826, British and French Ships are placed on a footing of perfect equality in the direct trade between the two countries; but in the indirect Foreign trade, in the Colonial trade, and in the Coasting trade, British Ships still labour under serious disabilities.

In Spain, British Ships were placed on a footing of absolute equality with Spanish Ships, as regards all Port and navigation dues, by a Royal Order of September 1852, having been previously subjected to heavy differential charges.

But an excess of 20 per cent is still charged on goods imported in Foreign Ships in the indirect trade, and to this extent British navigation is still unfairly treated there.

Restrictions are also maintained in Portugal upon Foreign Ships in the indirect and Colonial trades. In addition to the case of these three countries, it must also be mentioned that in Belgium there is still charged on salt, when imported in British vessels, a duty of ls. 14d. per 100 kilogrammes, while in Belgian and Sardinian Ships it is imported free.

In spite of this disability, the total tonnage of the two countries respectively, entered and cleared, with cargoes and in ballast, in the direct trade of the two countries, was in 1857-

There is no doubt that the restrictive policy still pursued in the three above mentioned countries would fully justify Her Majesty in exerting the power of retaliation conferred on Her by the 16th and 17th Victoria, Chapter 107, in regard to their respective Shipping; but the results exhibited in the following Accounts appear to show that the trade which by such a measure could be transferred from Foreign to British Ships is comparatively so small, that it could neither operate as an inducement to the countries in question to relax their present system, nor afford any material addition to the field of employment for British Shipping.

Not only do these figures show the small extent to which the shipping of these countries engage in the indirect trade with the United Kingdom, but they also show that in spite of the unequal restrictions which they maintain on British Shipping, there is a larger amount of British tonnage employed in the indirect trade with those countries than of the tonnage of such countries respectively in the indirect trade of the United Kingdom, into which they are admitted on equal terms with British Ships.

The Portuguese accounts are so much in arrear that it is ont of the power of my Lords to present corresponding tables of the relative employment of British and Portuguese Ships in the indirect trade of the two countries respectively; but the results which the accounts of the United Kingdom exhibit, are sufficient to afford conclusive evidence that the British flag in no respect suffers from the competi-

tion of Portugal.

The total tonnage of Portuguese Ships which entered and cleared in the direct and indirect trades of the United Kingdom in 1857, was 56,606 tons, while the British tonnage employed in the direct

trade with Portugal alone, amounted in the same year to 234,423 tons.

If a comparison be made of the relative employment of British and French Tonnage in the whole trade of France and the United Kingdom respectively, direct as well as indirect, it will be found that in 1857 the total amount of British Tonnage in French Ports was equal to two-thirds of the French Tonnage in its own Ports, while in the same year the total French Tonnage in British Ports was, of course, in a very small proportion indeed to the amount of British Tonnage in British Ports, and considerably less than one-half of the amount of British Tonnage at French Ports.

Similar results are shown in the case of Spain.

It remains to consider the case of the Coasting Trade.

The Costing Trade of the United Kingdom was opened of all Foreign Ships by the 18th and 19th Vict. cap. 7.

Previously to that measure British Ships were admitted on equal terms with national Ships in the Coasting Trade of the following Countries:—Hanover, Belgium, Oldenburg, Mecklenburg, Holland, Turkey, (except Foreign steamer for Bosphorus,) Monte Video, Paraguay, New Granada, China. In consequence of that measure, the Coasting trade of the following additional Countries was open

to British Ships on the same footing as national Ships:—Norway and Sweden, Denmark, Prussia,

Sardinia, and Tuscany.

The Coasting trade of the following Countries is still withheld from British Ships, being reserved for the national flag:—France, Papal States, Two Sicilies, Russia, Austria, Spain, Portugal, Greece, United States of America, (as regards goods.) Mexico, Peru, Chili, Brazil, La Plata, Venezuela, and Hayti.

Salara Maria da Salara da Araba

As in the case of the Foreign trade. Her Majesty might doubtless, with perfect justice, exclude the shipping of these Countries from the Coasting trade of the United Kingdom; but in this branch of trade, even more than in that of the Foreign trade, such a measure would be almost entirely valueless

to the shipping of the United Kingdom.

The following Table shows the Ships and Tonnage of each Foreign State engaged in the Coasting Trade of the United Kingdom in the year 1857, from which it will be seen that the share of that trade enjoyed by Foreign Ships is absolutely insignificant, and that for all practical purposes it may be said to be still virtually monopolised by British Shipping.

It will be observed that, both in the Foreign trade and in the Coasting trade, the Countries which have reciprocated the liberal policy of the United Kingdom are those which have been most benefited by the repeal of our restrictions, while the Countries which maintain unequal restrictions upon British ships, and against which alone could any measure of retaliation be directed, will be found to be precisely those which have derived little or no advantage from the opening of our trade.

There is one other point to which my Lords desire to advert in considering the question of reciprocity, which, although not specifically referred to in the present Address, has nevertheless been made the subject of frequent and just complaint, viz. the exclusion of British Ships from the Trade between

the Atlantic and Pacific Ports of the United States of America.

The Government of that Country has reserved this Trade to the national flag, on the ground of its being a Coasting Trade; and it must be admitted that this view is supported by the analogy of several other Countries under similar geographical conditions, e. g.:—

The Trades between the Atlantic and the Mediterranean Coasts of France and Spain.

Her Majesty's Government have, nevertheless, always contended in negotiations upon this question, that although the interoceanic trade of the United States might, in a strictly technical sense, be properly defined as a Coasting Trade, yet that on the broad ground of international equity it should rather be regarded as analogous to the trade between the United Kingdom and her distant dependencies, and

that British ships are fairly entitled to participate in the former, in return for the complete assimilation of the United States to the British flag in the latter field of profitable employment.

Negotiations upon this subject have recently been renewed between the two Governments, and my Lords are not without hope that the Government of the United States may be induced before long to

make this concession to British ships.

But if this hope should not be fulfilled, my Lords do not believe that any retaliatory measures could be adopted against the shipping of the United States which would be attended with any real advantage

to the British shipping interest.

They are of opinion that with reference to the technical difficulty to which I have already referred, it would not be competent to Her Majesty, under the retaliatory clause of the 16th and 17th Victoria, Chapter 107, to exclude United States ships from any branch of the British trade except the Coasting trade of the United Kingdom, and they have already shown that the share of this trade enjoyed by United States ships is so small, that such a measure could neither injure the United States nor benefit British shipping.

But independently of this consideration, my Lords are inclined to think that the value of this branch

of the American Coasting Trade has been greatly over-estimated.

In the first place, it is obvious that every year diminishes its importance, as it is not to be doubted that before long the bulk of the trade between the two seaboards of the North American Continent will be carried across the Isthmus of Panama, and will thus be placed at the disposal of British ships; but even during recent years it has never afforded employment to more than 200,000 tons even of American ships, as will be seen from the following Table, supplied by the British Consul at San Francisco.

The departures have been confined to four vessels for New York in 1854; six in 1855; eight in 1856; and twelve, measuring 16.814 tons, in 1857.

The admission of British Ships, therefore, to a participation in this trade, however desirable, cannot be regarded as a circumstance which could exercise any important influence on the Shipping interests of Great Britain.

My Lords desire also to remark, in reference to this question, that the reservation of the Coasting Trade to national vessels does not appear to apply to the carriage of passengers; and that Foreign vessels, so far as they are informed, lie under no disability in the transport of passengers coastwise from port to port of the United States of America.

It remains to inquire how far such depression can be attributed to the withdrawal of protection from British shipping, and to the consequent unrestricted competition with the shipping of other Countries.

It is only by an examination into general results that any satisfactory conclusions upon this question can be arrived at.

It is inseparable from the nature of all great changes of system that particular interests may occasionally suffer from causes which contribute to the general good, and in this instance it is probable that particular trades may have been injuriously affected, while the general interests of British

shipping have been promoted.

My Lords are fully aware that the statistical accounts of the amount of tonnage employed at any given time afford a very imperfect test of the actual condition of the shipping interest, as it is probable that shipping is often employed with very inadequate remuneration; but this remark does not apply to periods of time extending over several years; and they conceive that the shipping returns of the nine years which have elapsed since the repeal of the Navigation Laws must be held to supply sufficient evidence of the influence which that measure has exercised upon the permanent interests of British shipping.

The following Table, prepared in this Department, shows the total aggregate tonnage of British and Foreign vessels respectively entered and cleared, with cargoes and in ballast, at Ports of the United Kingdom, in each year from 1842 to 1857 inclusive, a period which comprehends eight years before and eight years after the repeal of the British Navigation Laws, which came into force on the 1st

January 1850 :-

It will be seen from this Table, that during the first period British tonnage advanced from 6,699,995 tons in 1842, to 9,669,638 tons in 1849, being an increase of 2,969,643 tons.

In the second period it advanced from 9,442,544 tons in 1850, to 13,694,107 tons in 1857, being an increase of 4,251,563 tons.

In the same period the progress in the employment of Foreign tonnage in the trade of the United Kingdom has been from 1842, 2,457,479 tons, to 1849, 4,334,750 tons; increase, 1,877,271 tons. From 1850, 5,062,520 tons, to 1857, 9,484,685 tons; increase, 4,422,165 tons.

It must also be borne in mind that these Tables only show the state of the trades which before the repeal were completely open to British, and only partially open to Foreign ships, and that in order to estimate the full effect of the measure upon British shipping, it would be necessary to show the amount of employment of British ships in the trade of Foreign countries, which were before either closed or hampered with unequal restrictions.

The incomplete nature of the statistical accounts of Foreign countries at my Lords disposal prevents them from exhibiting this result; but it cannot be doubted that the reciprocal relaxations which have been made by Foreign States have largely added to the field of employment for British ships.

The next Table exhibits the number and tonnage of sailing and steam vessels built and registered in the United Kingdom in each of the same 15 years.

There are two features in this account which deserve special notice.

^{1.} This account shows a larger relative increase than that of the previous accounts relating to the employment of tonnage, and it confirms the hypothesis that British Ships now find employment in the indirect trade of Foreign countries which does not in any way appear in the accounts of the United Kingdom.

While in the period of protection there was an actual decrease in the amount of tonnage built and registered, a large increase took place in the second period of open competition.

The next Account shows the number and tonnage of registered Sailing and Steam Vessels of the United Kingdom employed in the Home and Foreign Trades respectively, (excluding repeated voyages.)

Upon this account it is to be observed that there has been a greater progress in the employed tonnage engaged in the Foreign trade, where competition practically exists, than in the home trade, where that competition, although allowed by law, exists but to a trifling extent in practice, the latter having only advanced from 719,851 to 860,406 tons, while the former has advanced from 2.089,037 to 3,168,105.

It remains to consider the Shipping Accounts for 1858, which have just been completed. These accounts exhibit a slight decline as compared with those of the preceding years, and to this extent give indications of the depression to which the Memorial refers.

The accounts of December 1858, and January 1859, if taken separately, show that a favourable reaction has already commenced, and that British Shipping is at the present moment recovering from the depression exhibited above; a fact which goes far to confirm the opinion which has been expressed of the temporary and accidental character of that depression.

It seems to my Lords that the three accounts given above, when taken together, afford satisfactory evidence that down to the close of 1857 the progress of British shipping had suffered no check or reverse, and that the great development of the foreign tonnage employed in the trade of the United Kingdom during recent years is only partially attributable to the repeal of the Navigation Laws in 1849, the progress of foreign shipping in our trade having been not much less rapid in the period of eight years prior to that increase.

The fact undoubtedly is, that the employment of foreign tonnage has been steadily augmenting, independently of that measure, in consequence of the increasing requirements of British commerce, the interests of which, as distinguished from those of shipping, have of course been proportionately

benefited.

The reason of the decline exhibited in the accounts for 1858 must, therefore, be sought from other causes; and it appears to my Lords that the commercial history of the last few years amply suffices to afford the required explanation.

The extraordinary development of the Foreign and Colonial Trades of the United Kingdom during

the last ten years, is a matter of notoriety.

It is sufficient to refer, as an indication of this progress, to the fact that the exports of British produce have advanced in value in that period—

In the Foreign Trade, from 1847, £39,163,407, to 1857, £85,039,991. In the Colonial Trade, from 1847, £13,686,038, to 1857, £37,115,257.

The commercial crisis, however, which occuraed on both sides of the Atlantic at the close of 1857, necessarily operated injuriously upon the progress of our Trade, and consequently upon British Shipping.

It must also be borne in mind that the Russian War, and subsequently the disturbances in British India, created a large and abnormal demand for tonnage, which ceased with the termination of those temporary causes; and as tonnage employed exclusively in Government transport does not appear in the preceding account, it is probable that during the past year there has been a still greater check to the demand for tonnage than is expressed in those Accounts.

But this temporary depression is in no respect confined to the Shipping interests of Great Britain. My Lords believe that similar symptoms have manifested themselves in other maritime countries.

The Shipping Accounts of the United States of America, for the year ended 30th June 1858, show a corresponding decline in the employment of United States tonnage.

The total tonnage entered and cleared of United States ships in the two years 1856-7, 1857-8, having been-

It is also a matter of public notoriety, that the competition of British shipping in steam navigation has been the subject of loud complaint in America.

It will be found, however, that the decline in the building and employment of British shipping in 1858 has not been so great in proportion as that which is indicated by the annual accounts of the imports and exports of the United Kingdom for that year.

My Lords cannot close this portion of their remarks without adverting to one consideration, which, in the interest of British shipping, appears to them of great moment, with reference to the free supply of Foreign tonnage for the requirements of British trade.

If, during the exceptional circumstances of recent years, British commerce had been obliged to depend upon British shipping alone to the extent which was necessary before 1850, it is obvious that an artificial stimulus would have been given to the demand for British ships, which could not have been sustained, and the whole weight of the reaction would have fallen upon the British shipping interest, instead of being diffused, as it now is, amongst the whole tonnage employed in British Trade.

In conclusion, I am to state, that although my Lords, for the reasons given in the preceding part of this letter, cannot recommend a compliance with the prayer of the Address, and although they cannot attribute the present depression of British shipping to the effects of the increased competition of Foreign shipping in consequence of the repeal of the Navigation Laws, yet that, considering the peculiar importance of the Shipping Interest in a national point of view, it is very desirable that all partial and unequal burdens to which the Shipping Interest is still subject, should be removed as soon as is practicable.

With this view, they think that the repeal of the differential duty upon Foreign timber as the raw material of shipbuilding, and the abolition of passing tolls and other local burdens which appear to be still maintained without any equivalent in the shape of services rendered to shipping, are questions which deserve the careful consideration of Her Majesty's Government.

SIR.—Mr. Controller Smith has handed me the accompanying Letter, to be forwarded with my observations, as regards protection of the Revenue relative to the question named.

If a Controller is appointed for Fredericton, and allowed to clear Cargoes for Sea, such Vessels so

cleared would have a legal right to pass through this Harbour without reporting.

A Vessel loaded between this and Fredericton would most probably find her way to Sea without any clearance at all, and the door once opened, there would be serious loss of Export Duty, and a material diversion of the Lumber Export Trade from the hands of the supporters of the Revenue, both here and at Fredericton.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

The House went into Committee of the whole on—A Bill in addition to and in amendment of an Act passed in the twenty second year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act imposing Duties for raising a Revenue."

Mr. Gilbert in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee had the Bill referred to them under their consideration, and agreed to the same.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted and the Bill engrossed.

The Joint Address of the Honorable the Legislative Council and this House to Her Majesty the Queen, upon the subject of the admission of Wood Goods into the French Empire, was read as engrossed, and is as follows:—

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble and Dutiful Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, in General Assembly convened.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

We, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Your Majesty's Province of New Brunswick, beg leave to approach the Throne with renewed sentiments of attachment and fidelity to Your Majesty's Person and Government.

Your faithful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of Your Majesty's Province of New Brunswick, have learned, with much satisfaction, that Your Majesty is about entering into a Treaty of Commerce with His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, and they believe that such Treaty will be attended with great Commercial advantages to both Nations, and will have the effect of cementing more closely those ties which now bind them to each other.

They would however most respectfully impress upon the consideration of Your Majesty's Government, that it would be a matter of great importance to the interests of Your Majesty's subjects in the North American Colonies, if their staple articles of export,—Timber, Deals, and other Wood Goods,—were included in the terms of such Treaty, more particularly as Your Majesty's Government have proposed to Parliament to admit Foreign and Colonial Wood Goods into the United Kingdom upon equal terms.

We confidently trust in Your Majesty's desire to consult the wishes and feelings of your dutiful subjects, the People of Your Majesty's North American Colonies, and feel assured that their interests in the pending negotiations will not be overlooked.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, had made progress therein, and he was directed to ask for leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted and leave granted.

On motion of Mr. Hanington,

The House again went into Committee of the whole on-A Bill to incorporate the Westmorland Steam Boat Company.

Mr. Tapley in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them again under their consideration, had made further progress therein, and he was directed to ask for leave to sit again.

Ordered. That the Report be accepted and leave granted.

Mr. Wright, from the Joint Committee of the Honorable the Legislative Council and this House, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address to Her Majesty the Queen upon the subject of the admission of Wood Goods into the French Empire, and request that His Excellency would be pleased to transmit the same, reported-That the Committees had met, and waited upon His Excellency therewith, and His Excellency was pleased to reply—" His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor will forthwith transmit to the Secretary of State, for presentation to Her Majesty, this Joint Address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly."

Mr. Wright, also from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with an Address of this House of the 3rd day of March instant, praying that His Excellency would be pleased to communicate with the Governments of Canada and Nova Scotia, upon the subject of the admission of Deals, Timber, and other Wood Goods, into the French Empire, with a view of obtaining their co-operation in effecting that object, reported—That they had attended thereto, and His Excellency was pleased to say-" That he would consult his Council with respect to this Address.'

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The Honorable Mr. Watters in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, had made progress therein, and he was directed to ask for leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted and leave granted.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Dibblee informed the House that the Council had agreed to the following Bills, viz:—

The Bill to incorporate the Memramcook Freestone Company:

The Bill to incorporate the Westmorland and Albert Mining and Manufacturing Company:

The Bill to incorporate the Bathurst Mining Company:

The Bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Freestone Company: and

The Bill to incorporate the Saint John and Albert Mining Company;

Without making any amendments thereto.

Mr. Wilmot, by leave, presented a Petition from Henry Nice, Isaac Oliver, Senior, James Stackhouse, Oliver B. Cougle, Joseph O. Dunham, and three hundred and twenty two others, inhabitants of Carleton, in the City of Saint John, praying that no Act may pass to take from Freemen the Fishing rights they now possess under the City Charter; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. M'Leod, by leave, presented a Petition from Obadiah Purdy. John W. Carter, George Harding, and eighty three others, inhabitants of the Parish of Westfield, in King's County, praying that the Bill before the House for the erection of parts of the Parishes of Westfield and Kingston into a separate Parish, may not pass into Law; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Williston, from the Committee on the subject of the Fisheries, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, it was handed in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee appointed on the 10th ultimo, to take into consideration all matters relating to the Fisheries of the Province, having had before them several matters connected therewith, and having examined the same, beg to make the fol-

lowing Report, viz:-

"1st. Your Committee have had before them 'A Bill relating to the Salmon Fishery in the River Nepisiquid, in the County of Gloucester.' Your Committee having examined carefully the provisions of the Bill, and have heard the statement of the Members of the County, and an influential Gentleman from the locality, and have determined to report against the passage of the said Bill. for the following reasons:-The provisions of the Bill are novel in this Province, and calculated to establish a principle altogether at variance with established custom and existing Laws, and involves consequences which your Committee cannot recognize as applicable to one County only:—The Bill authorizes the Executive Government, for a nominal consideration, to lease and licence for such term and on such conditions, and under such restrictions as may be deemed meet, unto the Justices of Gloucester in General Sessions, and their Assigns, the exclusive right to take Salmon in all that part of the Big Nepisiquid River and its tributaries, which run through ungranted lands, with exclusive right to enter upon and make use of for Salmon Fishery, all the ungranted banks and shores of the said River and its tributaries, and also the Islands, bars, and rocks within the same; and further, that the Justices may divide such rights so assigned to them under the said Act, into such and so many Fishing Lots or Stations as they may see fit, and to make rules and regulations concerning the same; and may sublet such Fishing Lots or Stations for such term not exceeding the term to them granted, by public auction or private contract, and for such money consideration as they may deem expedient, which shall be payable to the County Treasurer, and shall form part of the Revenues of the County, to be appropriated, first in defraying all necessary expenses incurred in the protection and preservation of the Salmon Fishery, and the residue in the contingent expenses of the County; the Bill further authorizes the Sessions to set apart any portion of the said River, for the natural or artificial propagation of Salmon.

"Your Committee cannot adopt the principle as sound and advantageous to the County—. The Fisheries are the natural right of all; and your Committee can see no just reason for establishing a power in the Sessions to abridge or interfere with those

natural rights which are so highly prized by the people of this country.

"Your Committee fear the Bill would place in the hands of the wealthy and influential a monopoly which might be injurious to the settlement of that noble River and detrimental to the interests of the inhabitants, and which the Legislature should not

countenance by legal enactment.

"If the objects are the protection of the Fisheries, the present Law provides ample remedy for that purpose, by the appointment of Wardens, whose duties under existing Laws are quite sufficient to attain so desirable an object; and even their protection should not be attained by the extraordinary power sought for, and your Committee

very much fear, might result in conflicts and litigation.

The Executive Government laid before this House at the last meeting of the Legislature a variety of Documents, and vast amount of information, relative to the Fisheries of the River Saint Lawrence, having for their object the development and renovation of the Salmon Fisheries, which contained some of the elements of the foregoing Bill, but as the question involved a considerable expenditure of money, can only be dealt with by the Government, who are alone empowered (having the initiation of Money Grants in their hands) to grapple with the subject and mature some general measure for the Province for their protection and encouragement, and which measure will no doubt be dealt with fairly by the Legislature.

"As regards the Restigouche River, your Committee agree with the Report of the Superintendent of Fisheries of Lower Canada, that the Laws in reference to that River should, if possible, be assimilated, and that a joint jurisdiction of the Magistracy and other Officials, would appear to be desirable for their protection and preservation, and

it would be a great evil that so valuable a River should be destroyed for want of a little judicious management:—This subject your Committee trust will receive the attention of the Executive Government, in order that the measures recommended by

the Superintendent may be adopted.

"2nd. Your Committee have had before them two Petitions from the County of Charlotte; the first from—Wilford Fisher, Cochran Craig, and Magnus Green, Esquires, and ninety one others, inhabitants of Grand Manan, praying that set or long lines used by Vessels or Boats around the said Island may be prohibited;—the second from Wilford Fisher, Cochran Craig, and Magnus Green, Esquires, and eighty five others, inhabitants of the said Island, praying that measures may be adopted to prohibit parties from throwing overboard offal, (to the injury of the Fisheries,) except on the 'Gurry Grounds;' also a letter from John Haney, Esquire, of Deer Island,

containing much information and many valuable suggestions.

"Your Committee have examined into the foregoing Petitions and suggestions, and have heard statements on the subject, and agree with many of the arguments of the Petitioners, but as the Law now stands, the Government have ample powers by Section 6, of Chapter 101, Title xxii, of the Revised Satutes, "Of Sea and River Fisheries," to make Rules and Regulations for the prevention of the injuries complained of, around all Islands within the Bays of this Province to the extent of three miles seaward. Your Committee have prepared the Rules and Regulations requisite on the subject, which they herewith submit, and trust will be adopted and confirmed by the Executive Government, and published in the Royal Gazette, and such other notoriety given thereto as the Law contemplates.

"3rd. Your Committee have had before them the Petition of Joseph Wyard, Lewis Dingee, and sixty eight others; also the Petition of Elias Scribner, Gilbert H. Dykeman, and thirty four others, inhabitants of Queen's County, praying that the Regulations made by the Sessions of Queen's County, in January last, for the government of

the Fisheries in the said County, may not pass into a Law.

"Your Committee have examined the Regulations very carefully, as also the Law which empowers the Justices to make them, and find that such Regulations, before coming into operation, must receive the sanction and approval of the Executive Government; the Petitioners should therefore bring the subject before the Government, where the rights of the parties can be investigated and existing difficulties removed.

"Your Committee are disposed to give due weight to the deliberate acts of local bodies, who are supposed to adopt measures for the good of the County to which they are appointed; and on the subject of the Fisheries in particular, which must so materially affect the well being of the people of the County, your Committee cannot but believe that the Rules under consideration have been well considered; at the same time, your Committee cannot approve of Rule No. 10, as it is contrary to Law, and the Sessions had no power to adopt it; your Committee have no doubt that the Executive Government will give the Rules their best consideration, and disallow Rule No. 10.

" Your Committee have also had under their consideration, the subject of the protection of the Salmon Fishery generally, and especially at the head waters of Rivers where the Salmon resort to spawn: your Committee have examined testimony on the subject, and have received a vast amount of information as to the habits and resort of the fish at that particular season, and the injury that necessarily would arise if disturbed on their spawning grounds, and the probability of such disturbance driving them from the Rivers to which they usually resort. In the River Miramichi, the fish at particular seasons of the year pass through the County of Northumberland into the Counties of York, Carleton, and Victoria, in all of which Counties they more or less spawn; and in the latter Counties there are but few inhabitants, and those settled near the boundary of Northumberland, and parties not unfrequently resort thither and take large quantities out of season, to the manifest injury of the Fisheries. The authorities of Northumberland, viz., the Warden and Overseers, the former paid from the County funds as by Law required, are at present confined to their own Counties, and the destruction of the fish beyond their jurisdiction takes place with perfect impunity. The same state of facts as regards locality exists in other Counties; and it is a question of deep concern that a remedy should be applied, and this valuable branch of trade and industry be preserved from destruction.

"Your Committee had prepared a general measure on the subject, initialed 'A Bill in addition to and in amendment of Chapter 101. Title xxii, of the Revised Statutes, "Of Sea and River Fisheries," which your Committee presented to this House on the third instant, and which they trust may become a Law, and will in their opinion give sufficient power to the local authorities, if carried out in its integrity in connection with existing Laws, to remedy the existing evils and protect the Salmon Fisheries from destruction.

"This branch of trade and industry is assuming a vast importance to the northeastern section of this Province, creating a field for industrial enterprise and a large item of export, and as facilities offer for the transmission of Salmon to the United States and other places, the amount of export in this one article will be vastly increased, possibly doubled. Your Committee with this view would suggest and recommend to the Executive Government, that another Warden should be appointed for the County of Northumberland, whose duties shall be confined from Indian Town, on the Miramichi River, upwards; the present Warden from thence downwards, including the North West Branch.

"Your Committee would bring under the consideration of the Executive Government the Report of the Fishery Committee of last year, particularly 'A Bill to encourage the Fisheries of this Province.' This subject deserves due consideration, and your Committee cannot close their labours without again drawing their attention to the subject.

"The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of Benjamin Beveridge, Esquire, relative to a claim on the Canada Disputed Territory Fund, report—

"That having heard the evidence produced by Mr. Beveridge, and examined the various Accounts and Documents referred to in the Petition, they find that Mr. Beveridge paid into the Revenue of this Province on 4,150 tons of Timber cut on the Disputed Territory in the years 1844, 1845, and 1846, the sum of £685 3s.; and that he also paid to Canada, on the same account, the sum of £41 13 6, making in all £726 16 6; against which, the sum of £345 16 8 was chargeable as a Duty of one shilling and eight pence per ton, payable to the Canadian Government on the Timber, leaving a balance of £380 19 10 overpaid.

"That in the year 1847, Mr. Beveridge cut on the Disputed Territory 4,399 tons of Timber, which he sold to Messieurs Robert Rankin and Company, who gave a Bond to the Crown for payment of the Duty thereon, at the rate of one shilling and eight pence per ton. This Bond is signed by John Pollok, George Young, and Robert W. Crookshank, Junior, and is conditioned for the payment of £366 12 6, which is still unpaid.

"That the Cmmissioners, in adjudicating upon the claims on the Canada Disputed Territory Fund have, without hearing Mr. Beveridge, as he alleges, treated him as liable for the payment of that Bond, and deducted the amount of it from the balance of £380 19 10 overpaid by him on the Timber cut in the years 1844, 1845, and 1846.

"That from the evidence before us, it appears that it was agreed between Mr. Beveridge and Messieurs Robert Rankin and Company, that they alone were to be liable to the Crown for payment of the Duty on the 4,399 tons of Timber; that the sale was made to them at a reduced price in consequence of the Timber being subject to duty, and that Mr. Beveridge was neither legally or equitably liable for payment of the Bond: We are therefore of opinion, that Mr. Beveridge is entitled to receive the sum of £380 19 10 overpaid by him, without any deduction on account of the Bond.

"We further report, that notice of the meeting of the Committee was given to the Attorney of Messieurs Robert Rankin and Company, who stated that they did not intend to appear.

- "1. That the present system is more favourable to the larger and more wealthy capitalists than it is to the lumberer or actual operative.

"2. That the chances of monopoly under the Bill proposed will be much less than under the present system, and that Regulations can be so framed under such Bill as will materially lessen the prospect of an evil which is so much complained of.

"3. That by giving the first applicant the ground as provided in the Bill now under consideration, it would, in some measure, remedy an evil much complained of under existing regulations, by affording a reasonable prospect of securing to the actual operative who may cruise the piece of ground he may spend his time and means in discovering, and enable him to compete on more equal terms with the wealthy capitalist.

"4. That the change of system as provided for in the Bill, is desired by the lum-

bering population of the country.

"5. That the change proposed would not lessen the revenue derived from Timber Licences, but would be more likely to increase it.

"6. That it would lessen the cost of travelling and other expenses to applicants for ground in many cases, and would enable them with more despatch to ascertain whether they could obtain what they sought for.

"The Committee therefore beg to recommend the Bill to the favourable consideration of the House.

"The Committee to whom was referred for further investigation the Petition of Benjamin Beveridge, relative to a claim on the Canada Disputed Territory Fund, beg leave to Report-

"That having had delegated to them the powers conferred by the first and second Sections of the Act passed during the present Session of the General Assembly, intituled 'An Act to provide for the attendance and examination on oath of Witnesses before the Legislature or Committees thereof,' they have heard under oath the evidence of James A. Harding, Esquire, one of the Commissioners for adjudicating upon claims on the Canadian Disputed Territory Fund, and other witnesses produced on the part of Mr. Beveridge, and also examined various Accounts and Documents referred to in his Petition;—Francis Ferguson, Esquire, of the firm of Robert Rankin and Company, being present while the witnesses were examined, and the documents were before the Committee.

"It clearly appeared to the Committee that Mr. Beveridge took to Saint John the following quantities of Timber cut on the Disputed Territory, viz:—

the whole of which was seized by the Crown Seizing Officer on its arrival at Saint John each year. Mr. Beveridge sold the whole of this Timber to Messieurs Robert Rankin and Company, and gave the Seizing Officer directions to deliver the same to them, at the same time informing him that Messieurs Robert Rankin and Company would pay the Duty or Stumpage imposed by the Government on the Timber.

which amount they charged to Mr. Beveridge in account each year, and the same was so settled by him.

"Mr. Beveridge also paid in Canada under the Licenses he obtained authorizing him to cut a part of this Timber, £41 13 6.

"The Stumpage or Duty on all Timber cut on the Disputed Territory having been fixed at ls. 8d. per ton, Mr. Beveridge would at the end of 1846 stand thus, viz:—

Thus leaving the above sum to be refunded to Mr. Beveridge on the principles laid down in the Report of the Commissioners, had no subsequent transactions taken place.

"In 1847, Mr. Beveridge brought to Saint John a further quantity of 4399 tons Timber cut from the Disputed Territory, which was in like manner seized by the Crown.

"In November of that year, Mr. Beveridge sold this Timber to Messrs. Robert Rankin & Co. below the ordinary price at the time; they agreeing to pay in addition, the stumpage of 1s. 8d. per ton, and he directed the officer to deliver the Timber to them on payment of the stumpage. On the 21st September 1848, ten months after the sale, Mr. Beveridge had a final settlement of accounts with Rankin & Co. in which accounts the whole of this Timber was credited, and they signed a final discharge of all claims to that date. No charge was made for the stumpage of this Timber in those accounts, and it appeared to the Committee, that the practice in settling with the seller when Timber under seizure was sold, was to deduct the Stumpage from the proceeds.

"The Committee had further evidence before them that at the time of this settlement, Mr. Young, of the firm of Robert Rankin & Co. stated to Mr. Beveridge that they alone had to pay the stumpage.

"It appeared that instead of holding the Timber till the stumpage was paid, the officer on the 27th November 1848, upwards of a year after the sale, and without the knowledge of Mr. Beveridge, took a Bond to the Crown for the stumpage, at the rate of one shilling and eight pence per ton, from John Pollock, Geo. Young, and R. W. Crookshank, Jun. This Bond was conditioned for the payment of three hundred and sixty six pounds twelve shillings and six pence, and was payable on the 1st June 1849. That about the time of giving this Bond, Rankin & Co. wrote to Mr. Beveridge to furnish them with evidence of any of the Timber which was cut outside the disputed Territory, in order that they might not be required to pay more than they were justly liable to, and although these letters were written after giving the Bond, no claim was made by them on Mr. Beveridge, or any intimation given that they expected him to pay the amount when due. On the contrary, when an action was brought on the Bond,

Bond, Messrs. Rankin called upon Mr. Beveridge to attend as a witness on their

behalf, and they paid his expenses.

"That Mr. Beveridge attended before the Commissioners for adjudicating upon the Canada Disputed Territory Fund, and made his claim for the excess paid on the Timber cut in 1844 and 1845; that he had no notice of any claim being made to deduct the amount of the Bond from the excess coming to him; that Messrs. Rankin & Co. subsequently, and without the knowledge of Mr. Beveridge, appeared before the Commissioners and claimed to have the amount of the Bond paid out of the balance coming to Mr. Beveridge; that he never was heard before the Commissioners relative to such claim, and was not aware that such deduction had been made, till several months after the Commissioners had made their Report.

"The Committee are of opinion, that as the Timber was released without the sanction or authority of Mr. Beveridge, and a Bond taken for payment of the duty, the obligors of that Bond are the persons who should be looked to for payment, and Mr. Beveridge's right to the excess should not be prejudiced by the non-payment of the

"Your Committee are therefore of opinion, that Mr. Beveridge is justly entitled to receive the excess of £339 6 4, paid by him on the Timber seized in 1844-5-6, and if the sum of £41 13 6 paid in Canada, should in the first place be refunded by this Province, as decided by the Commissioners, that sum should be paid in addition.

SIR,—On Major General Sir Fenwick Williams, recently leaving England to assume the command of the Forces stationed in the North American Provinces, he favored Her Majesty's late Government with the full communication of his views on certain questions connected with their local defences.

These opinions derive their weight from the high reputation and abilities of the distinguished officer from whom they proceed, and also from his peculiar knowledge of the circumstances of that part of the British Empire, of which he is himself a native, and with which he has maintained

a familiarity.

Sir Fenwick Williams expressed himself anxious to receive instructions from Her Majesty's Government to land at Halifax on his way to the Upper Provinces, in order that by placing himself in communication with the Governor General of Canada, and also with Her Majesty's Representatives in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, he might be able to devise, in conjunction with those functionaries, and under their immediate auspices, a system for assembling in the Counties and Townships of those Colonies, the youth of seaboard and interior districts. He further stated that before repairing to the Upper Provinces, he hoped to be able to inspect and report to His Royal Highness the General Commanding-in-Chief the state of the Harbour Defences of those regions, and to make such suggestions as the result of his observations might produce with reference to possible events.

Sir F. Williams also added, that knowing the nature of those countries and habits of the people, he should prefer the short Rifle (now thrown aside by the Army,) as the arm for these new levies of Rifle Companies or Clubs. These Rifles, he stated, will carry a ball 300 yards, which Sir F. Williams believes to be the extent of vision in the wooded and partially cleared Colonies of North America, and the spherical bullet which is used can be easily east by the Militiaman himself, who will thus be induced to practice with his Rifle against the Deer and

Bear which abound in the woods.

The late Secretary of State for War informed Sir F. Williams verbally that he approved generally of his scheme. He added, however, that the particular class of weapon for which he applied was not, at present, at hand and available in this country, nearly the whole having been issued to the Militia.

My object in now writing is to make you officially acquainted with the views of Sir F. Williams, and with the concurrence of Her Majesty's Government in those views, in order that you may co-operate with that eminent officer, as I have no doubt you will readily do, should be place himself in communication with yourself and the local authorities.

My Lord Duke,—With reference to the subject matter of your Grace's Despatch of the 30th June last, No. 2, I have the honor to inform your Grace that some progress has already been made in placing this Province in a less defenceless position, (so far as the establishment of a local Military Force is concerned,) than heretofore.

Your Grace is aware, that although the Militia Laws of the Province are very comprehensive in their character, the operative sections of these Laws, (viz. those which refer to enrolment, muster, drill, and discipline,) have been for many years and are now suspended; and the issue by me, as Commander in Chief, of a Proclamation under the provisions of the 2nd Section of the Act 19 Victoria, Chapter 39, which Proclamation would have necessarily applied to the

whole Militia Force of the Province, (which includes with comparatively few exceptions, the whole able-hodied population of the Province.) would have been an unnecessary and therefore an unwise interference with the regular course of industry of the Province.

But no such objection could be alleged against my acceptance of the spontaneous offer of any portions of the several Regiments of Militia to volunteer in Companies for drill and exercise,

under the command of Officers of their respective Regiments.

I was of course aware that the length of the period which had elapsed since any part of the Militia had been mustered or even enrolled, would, to a certain extent and for a time at least, check any such spontaneous offers to volunteer; but I was confident that the people retained the same spirit which had on former occasions led them to volunteer, not only for the defence of the Province, but for the defence of the Crown elsewhere, and I therefore thought it right at once to communicate to Major General Trollope, commanding the Brigade in this District, and to Licutenant General Sir F. Williams, commanding Her Majesty's Forces in the North American Provinces, my expectation that I should shortly receive offers of the above mentioned description to volunteer, and my wish that a sufficient number of Rifles with Accourrements, and of guns of a suitable calibre for Militia Artillery Companies, and the requisite supply of amunition for practice, should be furnished to me.

In accordance with this request, Sir F. Williams has sent to me from Quebec 3000 stand of

Rifles with Accourrements, which are now in Store at Saint John.

It affords me satisfaction to be able to state to your Grace, that I have already received and accepted the offer to volunteer for drill and exercise at Saint John, of four Companies of the Militia Artillery Regiment. These Companies, who will also be instructed in Rifle practice,

are now being drilled.

I may add, that from the communications which I have received both from Saint John and from elsewhere, I have good reason to believe that this is but the commencement of a movement, (spontaneous on the part of the volunteers, and therefore highly creditable to them,) which will probably extend, and as I hope, with increased rapidity, as it proceeds in most if not all the more populous parts of the Province.

It will be my duty, when the arrangements now in progress are completed, to submit to Your Grace a full and detailed account of them. Meanwhile I trust that the steps which have

been taken will meet with Your Grace's approval.

I should not omit to state that both from Lieutenant General Sir F. Williams and from Major General Trollope, I have received every assistance which it has been in their power to afford to me.

vided, or at any Special Sessions to be for that purpose convened, to appoint such and so many fit person or persons within each Town or Parish within their respective Counties as they shall think expedient, to take an account of the Population under this Act, which person so appointed to take such account shall be liable in all respects to the same rules, regulations, penalties and forfeitures, as Town or Parish Officers are subject and liable to by virtue of any Law now in force for the appointment and regulation of Town or Parish Officers; provided that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John in Common Council convened, and the Municipality of the County when the County is incorporated, shall as soon as conveniently may be after the time appointed for this Act to come into operation, appoint such and so many fit person or persons as to them shall seem meet, to take such account within the said City and County, or Counties so incorporated as aforesaid, in like manner with the Justices of the Peace for the several Counties at their General or Special Sessions aforesaid."

"Whereas that part of the European and North American Railway from Shediac to Saint John is approaching completion, and will probably be finished by the 1st day of September next; and whereas a continuation of the same to Calais by the shortest and most feasible route is necessary to constitute it a paying line of Road; therefore

"Resolved, That in the opinion of this House, it is expedient and in accordance with the Third Section of an Act to authorize the construction of Railways in this Province that the Executive Government should as early as the month of June next employ a suitable number of competent Engineers to make an Exploration and Survey of the most direct route, with a view to the completion of the European and North American Railway to Calais."

To which Mr. Cudlip moved the previous question—That the question for going into Committee on the said Resolution be now put, and

Upon the question the House divided-

Mr. Steadman in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill referred to them under their consideration, had made an amendment thereto, and then agreed to the same.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed as amended.

Mr. Allen, from the Committee appointed on the 12th day of March instant, to take into consideration the several Papers and Documents relative to the Bridge at the Grand Falls, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee to whom was referred all matters connected with the Grand Falls

Bridge, beg to report-

"That they have examined the papers and documents referred to them; they have examined Mr. Tomlinson and Mr. Burrowes, in the presence of the Chairman of the Board of Works.

"By reference to the papers laid before the House in the Session of 1859, (see Appendix to Journals of 1859, pxcv.) your Committee find that the contract price with Mr. Tomlinson for building the Bridge across the Falls, including the Little

River Bridge, Approaches, &c. was £5000.

"That 'unobjectionable sureties' were taken for the performance of the Contract; that the main Bridge when completed all but the painting, and before being handed over and accepted by the Government, fell; that there had been at that time paid to Mr. Tomlinson on account of the Contract, £4,885. Two causes have been assigned for that failure—by Mr. Tomlinson, the inferior quality of the iron,—by Mr. Burrowes, the unsound principle of the construction. That there was nothing in the Contracts or otherwise, obligatory on Mr. Tomlinson to get the iron used in any particular place, or from any particular persons,—the selection was his own. From whichever of these causes therefore, the Bridge fell, the responsibility rests with himself.

"Your Committee find that Mr. Tomlinson was never called upon by the Board of Works to assign his reasons for the failure, or his sureties to indemnify the Province

for the loss.

"Your Committee find that in January 1859, after the falling of the Bridge, the Chairman of the Board of Works reports to the Government, (see same Journals, ncv.) that Mr. Burrowes, C. E., had been employed to visit the works at the Grand Falls, and make a thorough examination; that the Estimate of the expense to renew the portion of the works destroyed, upon the principle recommended by Mr. Burrowes, amounted to £2000, of which £530 would have to be borne by Mr. Tomlinson's sureties.

"They find that Mr. Burrowes (see Appendix, Dxcv.) recommended a Wire Suspension Bridge, and in a letter dated 31st January 1859, addressed to the Chief Commissioner of the Board of Works, (Dxcvi.) gives an approximate estimate of the expense at from £2,100 to £2,300, which sum he considered sufficient for a good structure.

"We find that about this time Mr. Tomlinson submitted a proposition to the Chief Commissioner, to build a Suspension Bridge on a plan of his own, for £2,800, in addition to what he had received; that the Chief Commissioner declined accepting this proposition, having previously engaged Mr. Burrowes to prepare Plans and Specifications for a new construction.

"That about the month of June 1859, Mr. Burrowes submitted Plans and Specifications, which were adopted by the Board, and on which the work has since proceeded; that with these Plans, Mr. Burrowes submitted no Estimate of the cost. We find that the materials are purchased by the Board, and the work carried on without Contract, under the superintendence of Mr. Tomlinson, who receives £2 per day for himself, his team and plant.

"That the Accounts and Expenditures are audited and checked by Mr. Curry, the

local Supervisor of the District.

"That there has been paid towards the new construction, for work and material, up to the 12th November 1859, £4,545 5s., and the total cost it is supposed will be about

£6000. (Vide Chief Commissioner's Report for 1859, page 38.)

"That it is alleged, that the value of the work done under the first Contract, and available for the new construction, including Little River Bridge and Approaches, &c. is about equal to the sum paid Mr. Tomlinson under that Contract, viz. £4,885. Thus, the total cost of the work when completed will be not less than £10,885.

"That Mr. Burrowes assigns as a reason for giving no Estimate with his Plans and Specifications in June, that he had no means of making a correct Estimate; that the Estimate made by him in his letter of 31st January, was an extremely rough one, made on a different Plan and an insufficient examination of the remaining works and grounds, in consequence of the depth of the snow and other causes, and that he can-

not say what the Bridge will cost.

"That by Mr. Tomlinson's evidence, it appears that the new Bridge, if built by Contract according to Mr. Burrowes' Plans and Specifications, could not be done at a less sum than it is now being built for, which he thinks will exceed the Estimate of the Chief Commissioner by £500, but that the Bridge when completed will be an extremely good one, though in some details, in his opinion, unnecessarily expensive; that the works were suspended in November last, with the intention of being resumed early in March, as Mr. Tomlinson alleges, and as he thinks, was necessary for their early and economical completion.

"That the resumption has not yet taken place.

"Your Committee have gone thus fully into the details, in order that the facts

might be clearly before the House.

"Your Committee are of opinion, that before undertaking works of this importance, a clear and exact estimate of the expense should be made; and though there may be instances where a different course might be consistent with the public interests, yet as a general rule, such Public Works should be carried on by clear and well defined

Contracts, the conditions of which should be strictly adhered to.

"Your Committee are also of opinion, that Mr. Tomlinson's second Plan should have been examined, and submitted to a competent Engineer to report upon, and further efforts made to see for what sum the work that had fallen could have been replaced, or other work on a sound Plan could have been substituted, before adopting Mr. Burrowes' Plans and Specifications; particularly, as with those Plans and Specifications there was no Estimate of the expense, and no sufficient examination on his part to show that a less expensive Plan would not have been sufficient.

"Your Committee, at the request of Mr. Tomlinson, have appended to their Report a statement made by him in justification of the principles on which the first Bridge was built, and assigning the reasons for its failure, which they recommend should be

published in the Appendix to the Journals.

"The Petition seriously reflects upon the official conduct of a Public functionary, and were the allegations proved to the satisfaction of the Committee, would not justify your Committee in recommending an amendment of the Law; looking at the case in

Mr. Tapley, Chairman of the Committee to whom was referred all matters relative to the European and North American Railway, submitted a Report signed by a majority of the members of the said Committee, which he read; and the same being handed in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee appointed on the 22nd day of February last, to examine and report upon all matters connected with the European and North American Railway, beg leave

to submit the following Report:-

"That having the Chief Commissioner and Chief Engineer's Report for 1859 before them, as also Plans and other Documents relative to the construction of the Railway Works, they proceeded, on the 9th of March last, to the examination of Witnesses who had been summoned before them, and have continued from that day to the 30th March inclusive examining Witnesses and taking evidence.

"That after the most searching investigation, which the time at the disposal of the Committee enabled them to make, there is no evidence to shew fraud or mal-appropriation of the public moneys, nor any thing like collusion between the Commissioners or Chief Engineer and the Contractors; on the contrary, it is the opinion of this Committee, that both the Commissioners and the Chief Engineer have endeavoured to act judiciously and prudently; the Commissioners, so far as the Committee can judge, have throughout exercised a sound discretion and maintained a careful supervision in the construction and management of this important work; it may be matter of opinion, however, if at the initiation of the work, an Engineer of greater practical experience had been selected to superin end the construction of the Road, whether some saving might not have been effected; we believe, however, that the Chief Engineer has performed the duties of his office to the best of his judgment and ability.

"That although the expenditure appears larger than the public were led to expect at the commencement of the work, the Committee believe that such extra cost has arisen chiefly from the improved and durable character of the Bridges, Culverts, and other structures on the line, and that consequently, although costing more at the outset, they will, in the maintainance of it, create less charge on the Revenue for its support and repairs, and less running cost. In some instances, changes have been brought to the notice of the Committee, involving considerable additional expense, but in all such cases they have improved the character of the Road, and this Committee are not prepared to say, that any Road of the same character and description has been built in any other country presenting the same engineering difficulties, for less than the cost

of the European and North American Road.

"That it appears from the Chief Commissioner's Report, as well as from the evidence before this Committee, that the sum of £1,067,171 is estimated to be sufficient to complete the Road from Saint John to Shediac in a thorough manner: It is the opinion of the Committee that the Commissioners should use every economy during the coming season in the completion of the work, so as to keep the amount within the estimate, and that no further sum or sums of money should be expended in completing the Road without the full sanction of the Government.

"From the evidence before the Committee, it appears that the expenses of the Board of Appraisers for the past year is £862; it also appears that the whole line was located before October 1858, and as it further appears, that the Board have not met since the first of November last, it is the opinion of the Committee that the Government should take this subject into their serious consideration, with a view to economise this service, and if the service will permit, discontinue their annual allowance and pay

for their services as required.

"From the evidence before the Committee, they are of opinion that in some instances the Appraisers have awarded too much Land damages, especially in the cases of James Smith, Esquire, Chairman of Appraisers, and Nelson Arnold, of Sussex; it is however

due to the Commissioners to state, that they resisted the claims for damages in the cases referred to, and are not, in the opinion of the Committee, in any way responsible

for the acts of the Appraisers.

"The Committee have confidence in stating that the numerous charges that have been made against the Commissioners and the Chief Engineer, of incompetency, bad management, and mal-appropriation of the public money, have not been sustained in evidence before this Committee; on the contrary, it appears from the evidence of Mr. Burrowes, that as the Road has been constructed in detail, no money has been wasted; and the Committee are of opinion that the character of the Road is such as will reflect no discredit on the country.

"The Committee desire to state that both the Chief Commissioner and the Chief Engineer manifested a ready and willing promptitude in affording information and

explanation whenever called upon.

"The Committee recommend that the Evidence be printed and circulated for the information of the country.

" All of which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. Lawrence, a Member of the Railway Committee, then submitted a Report signed by a minority of the same Committee, which he read; and this Report being also handed in at the Clerk's Table, was there again read, and is as follows:—

"We, the undersigned members of the Committee appointed by Resolution of the House on the 22nd day of February last to report upon all matters relating to the European and North American Railway, beg leave to submit the following Report:—

- "1. At an early stage in our investigation, application was made for the books, estimates, and all plans shewing the land taken for Railway purposes, together with the monthly estimates of the divisional Engineers, as well as the certificates or book of copies of certificates of the Chief Engineer on which payments have been made; your Committee regret to state that only a portion of the information asked for has been laid before them; no books of any kind, nor certificates of the Chief Engineer, nor the monthly estimates of the divisional Engineers, (with the exception of one,) nor the Minute Book of the Board of Commissioners, nor the Plan of Track and Station grounds at Hampton, have been obtained. There is one document of great importance in an enquiry such as your Committee was pursuing, on which they feel it to be their duty to express their views strongly; - on the 21st March an order was given for the production of the Tables on which the estimate for the additional 15 per cent. or £139,000, is based; this Table was frequently asked for;—the testimony of the Chief Engineer in reference to it not only implicates himself in not having it before the Committee, but also the Secretary of the Railway Board who has had it in his possession, although called upon to forward it for the examination of your Committee; your Committee cannot resist the conviction that for some reason this important document has been withheld.
- "2. The financial statement in the Report of Commissioners is such as to afford but little satisfaction from its perusal. From the absence of the Books, no opportunity has been afforded to test its correctness. There is an item of £43,011 expended in 1859, for labour by Contract or otherwise, of which no details are given, as well as the large sum of £19,634 paid John Brookfield, on Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, Saint John; neither the date of the payment of this sum nor the particular service performed are given. From this fact, as well as for other reasons, your Committee would strongly recommend that a full and detailed statement of ull moneys expended in the construction of the Railway and for its equipment, specifying the name of the persons, the date of each payment, as well as the work done, or the service performed, down to the end of the fiscal year, to be laid before the Legislature, within ten days after the opening of the Session of 1861; the propreity of this suggestion must be apparent to all; for while every other Public Department of the Province is required to furnish the fullest information, there is no reason why the Railway Board should be exempted; as it is expected that by the close of the fiscal year the whole Road will be finished, the Legislature and the country ought to have the fullest information on all matters financial and otherwise connected with it.

- "3. Your Committee are strongly of the opinion, that the expenditure of no sum beyond the amount stated in the final Estimate of cost, viz: £1,067,171, should be sanctioned by the Government without the fullest enquiry into the manner in which the above amount shall have been spent, as it appears from both the evidence of Messrs. Light and Burrowes, a Road in every way its equal ought to be built for less money.
- "4. From the evidence before your Committee, it appears that the Appraisers of Land Damages have received for salaries, travelling expenses, and contingencies, for twelve months, the sum of £862, and that the Road was finally located October 1858, and that since the month of November they have had no meeting; your Committee are decidedly of the opinion, that no services have been rendered commensurate with the amount paid them, and would strongly recommend that their services be brought to a close; or if indispensable, they be paid only for the time they are actually occupied in the service of the Province.
- "5. Your Committee feel called upon to remark, that while in their opinion many persons who have received nothing have greater claims for compensation for damage done and for land taken for Railway purposes than Nelson Arnold, he appears from the plans submitted and evidence, to have had taken one acre and 24 perches, for which he received the sum £260. James Smith, Chairman to the Land appraisers, has also it appears received the sum of £200 for earth borrowed, the fee simple of which he still retains; the quantity of ground gone over is variously estimated from 1-40th to 1-4th of an acre. Your Committee feel that in the Accounts referred to great injustice has been done the Province.
- "6. There are cases on record of land taken by the Commissioners from individuals whose property has been largely increased in value by the Railway, and who have received compensation, when, in the opinion of your Committee, they were clearly not entitled to it. There is one case in particular, where an individual who appears to have been a frequent visiter at the Railway Office, and to have had access to Plans by which he was enabled to ascertain where the Hampton Station was to be placed, who went immediately and purchased the land, viz. fifty acres, for £5 an acre, and although he has received £100 for less than one fourth of an acre, the Commissioners had allowed him £50 for land taken for Railway purposes, notwithstanding it was by the expenditure of the public funds in the construction of a Railroad that this land was so materially increased in value. From the evidence before your Committee it also appears that crossings, or payment in lieu of crossings, have been made, while in cases where great and material damage has been done, none had been provided, nor any consideration, in the opinion of your Committee, paid in lieu thereof. When justice ceases to be "even handed" it ceases to be justice.
- "7. In examining into the Commissioners' and Engineer's Report of 1859, for the causes of the increase of the 15 per cent. over the estimate of the previous year, your Committee find that one cause assigned is the reduction of the Grades;—This reason is entirely fallacious, as it appears from the evidence of Messrs. Burrowes and Light, that the reduction was made in the year 1858, and from the testimony of the Chief Engineer, was provided for in the estimate of that year: Another reason assigned for the increased cost of the Road over the estimate of 1858, is the incompleteness of the survey, arising from the difficulty of obtaining an efficient staff;—this reason, in the opinion of your Committee, is far from satisfactory, as it appears from the evidence of Mr. Burrowes that there has been no scarcity of Engineers during the past four years, and from the testimony of Mr. Light, that the surveys made by Mr. Giles were "elaborate surveys;" and from the Report of 1858, it appears Giles' profiles and plans were of the greatest value. The unfairness of the reason assigned will be the more apparent on reference to page 6, Supplementary Report, 1858, from which the following is taken:—" On the 70 miles of Road let in "November 1857 and October 1858, the surveys have been carefully made, the location "revised, and the quantities calculated by the new specifications, there is no reason "to suppose that the cost will exceed the estimate by more than the usual per centage." The amount of per centage allowed generally is ten per cent., but on reference to Table A, No 1, page 72, Report 1858, it appears that fifteen per cent. was allowed for contingencies on the work unfinished.

- "8. Another reason assigned for the increased cost of £139,000 over the estimate of 1858, is the want of knowledge of the country and of the sudden changes of climate from frost to thaws and heavy rains. This declaration, in the opinion of your Committee, is a strong reflection on those connected with the management and oversight of the works, for it is unreasonable to believe that it would require three years to learn what any one of ordinary intelligence could have discovered in a less period. No evidence has been adduced to show that any material damage has been done to the works from any of these causes. In the estimates of 1858, £50,853 is allowed for contingencies on the balance of grading, masonry, bridging, &c., and if any increased expenditure had become necessary, in the amount named, there would be ample for that object; it must not be forgotten, that during construction the Contractors run all risk, and by the terms of their contract they are generally required to uphold the Road for the first twelve months.
- "9. From the Report of 1858, it appears that on the 31st December 1858, the amount of contract and other work remaining to be done was £185,126, for which there was provided in the estimate of that year 15 per cent. to cover any additional work in connection with it: An additional sum of £139,000 is stated to be necessary over and above the 15 per cent. of the previous year; this, in the opinion of your Committee, is a state of things far from satisfactory, for it appears from the evidence of the Chief Engineer that the estimate of 1858 for Rolling stock, Superstructure, and Stations, was sufficient, with the exception of from £5000 to £10,000 for the latter. There is in connection with the above, one fact to which your Committee wish to draw especial attention, believing that it will cause as much surprise to the Legislature and the country as it did to your Committee, viz. that while the estimated cost of the Road is £139,000 more than the previous year, it appears from the evidence of the Chief Engineer and others, that during the year 1859 important alterations have been made in the character of the Road, which ought to reduce in place of increasing its cost, for not only is the quantity of ballast used less than in the estimate of 1858, but slopes have been reduced from 2 to 1 to 11 to 1; cuttings have also been reduced in width, while embankments have been narrowed from 20 to 18 feet, and platforms substituted in some places for Station houses; it therefore appears that the Province is to pay an additional price for its Road, and to have an inferior one to that described in the Report and Evidence of 1858.
- "10. In connection with this branch of enquiry, your Committee could not learn whether the alterations were done by the authority and sanction of the Board of Commissioners; your Committee expected to have had the Record book, and have ascertained when these important changes were ordered, and the reason for altering the character of the Road. The Chief Commissioner in answer to the question,—Whether there was any record relative to the changes referred to, said 'He thought not.' Your Committee fear that there is not that system, consultation, and frequent meeting of the Board which the great Provincial interests intrusted to their charge demand.
- "11. In the Report of 1858, the Commissioners submitted a comparative statement of the cost of the Railways in Nova Scotia and in this Province. In the cost of the Nova Scotia Road the large item of interest amounting to over £74,000 was included, while in the cost of ours, that item was omitted altogether; this, in the opinion of your Committee, was doing not only injustice to Nova Scotia, but misleading the Legislature and the country as to the comparative cost of the two lines.—Laurie, in his Report from which the Table of cost of the Nova Scotia Line was taken, refers to interest as included in two places of his Report. Your Committee would draw attention to the large sums already paid as interest, amounting down to 1st March 1860, to over £90,000, which, added to the estimated cost of the Road, amounts to £1,157,000, to which must be added the interest due when the construction Account closes, less any profit which may be derived from the running of the Road.
- "12. Your Committee on referring to the Commissioner's Report for 1859, find it stated, that the gross Revenue for the year ending 31st October of that year was £14,797 15 1, leaving the net profit of £5,795 2 7. In the same Report is a Report from the Superintendent of the Road, shewing the expenses connected with the running of the Cars and Locomotives, as well as incidental expenses connected therewith, together with a detailed statement shewing the monthly receipts at the respective

Stations and Cars from passengers and freight, together with the receipts for storage and wharfage at the several Stations: From the same Report it appears that the sum of £5,998 17 1 has been received for Locomotives and Cars during the year ending 31st October 1859, without naming the parties from whom it was received, nor the amounts they respectively paid; for the details in this particular your Committee are indebted to the Auditor General's Report, page 189; in it will be found all the Tables in the Superintendent's Report from page 31 to 35, with the addition of the following:—

"Why this important Table should be omitted from the Railway Report, your Committee will leave others to decide; there is one fact in connection with it which is too important to pass by, viz. that Mr. Walker, of the Firm of Walker and Company, stated before your Committee, that the only amount charged them for the use of Locomotives and Cars was about £1,000: Your Committee will leave the Legislature to draw their own conclusions, after adding one observation, viz. that they fear the £5,795 2 7 net Revenue, as stated in the Report of the Chief Commissioner, is calculated to mislead the Public.

" From the evidence and official documents before your Committee, it appears that Section 5, Salisbury, was let to the Messieurs Walkers for the sum of £25,172, to be completed in the month of November 1859, and that in consequence of the Report of the Chief Engineer that they would not complete it within the time stated, the Section was taken from them and given to Mr. M'Bean, or Messieurs M'Donald and M'Bean, who it appears from the Report of 1859 of the Chief Engineer, has not completed the work yet, and who states 'that the grading will be finished early enough in the Spring to enable the Truck to be laid for the final opening without being entirely ballasted.' It would therefore appear that injustice has been done the Messieurs Walkers by taking the work from them; it also appears by the evidence that the contract ceased on the 1st January 1859, and they were allowed about £14,000; and that on the same Section Mr. M'Bean has been paid £22,621, while the value of the work on which he was entitled to pay, as reported by the Divisional Engineer, was only £19,621, leaving M'Bean £3,000 in debt to the Province; if we add the 10 per cent. which the Contract and the Law requires to be kept back as additional security for the faithful performance of the work, he is still a debtor to the Province. The whole proceedings in reference to this Section is very unsatisfactory: Your Committee believe that both Engineer and Commissioners are highly censurable, as they believe that injustice has been done the Messieurs Walkers, the Law violated by paying beyond the amount certified to by the Divisional Engineer, and an additional cost entailed on the Province in the construction of this Section.

"14. From the evidence of the Chief Engineer it appears that the sum of £7,407 was allowed the Messieurs Walkers during the Summer of 1858 for extras and the late delivery of the Cars, and which amount was knowingly kept out of the estimates in the Report of that year, with the knowledge and approbation of the Chief Commissioner; your Committee believe that such a proceeding in reference to any department, is calculated to cast suspicion and distrust upon any estimate or statement from the Railway Department.

"15. From the evidence of Messieurs Burrowes and Light, it would appear that a Road, in every way equal to the one from Saint John to Shediac, ought to be built for a much less sum than the amount estimated as its cost; and in a letter from the Chief Commissioner,

Commissioner, dated 29th December 1857, to Robert Reed, Esquire, his Co-Commissioner in England, your Committee find the following, viz:—'I believe we have got good men for the work, this will bring the 40 mile completed at under £5000 currency per mile, including rails and sleepers; as the remaining 30 miles are much easier, I 'have no doubt the whole Road will be completed at £6000 currency per mile.' And in a letter subsequently addressed by Robert Reed, Esquire, to the Messieurs Barings, bearing date 16th January 1858, it is stated—'I have much pleasure in informing 'you that the 40 miles of Road lately tendered for, has been taken at prices which, when completed, will cost, including rail, under £5000 currency per mile, and as the remaining 30 miles to connect Shediac with Saint John is much easier to construct, it 'is now estimated that the whole Road will be completed at £6000 currency per mile.' Your Committee are of opinion that no statements except of the most correct and reliable character should have been communicated to the Messieurs Barings, who are so deeply interested in the financial standing of the Province, and the integrity of her public men, especially those conducting her public works. It is quite evident Mr. Reed placed implicit confidence in the statements of the Chief Commissioner, and so communicated them to Messieurs Barings. Your Committee very much fear that the great advance of cost per mile on the construction of the Railway over the amount stated as above, will impair confidence in England toward this Province, and induce them to place but little value in the calculation of our public men with regard to the construction of our public works. Your Committee would further observe, that it has not yet been made apparent to them why the cost of the whole Road should be now estimated at about £10,000 per mile, exclusive of interest, a sum so much in advance of the statement of the Chief Commissioner. From the Report of Commissioners, 1858, the line from Moncton to Shediac, an Iron Girder Bridge included, is reported to have cost about £6,500 per mile, exclusive of Stations and rolling stock:—This work was done under the direction of the Honorable E. B. Chandler, and from the evidence of the Chief Commissioner, a portion of it at least is not surpassed for the ease with which the cars pass over the Road. The only evidence to show why the remainder of the Road is costing so much more, is that of the Chief Engineer, who, in answer to the question—If the control and management of the construction from Saint John to Moncton had been under your sole management, could not the Road have been built at a much cheaper rate? Answer—'I think it would, but that is an opinion of my own.' In answer to the question—If he was interfered with at any time so as to cause increased expense by the Commissioners? He stated—'That he considered the Commissioners had a perfect right to order and rearrange the works as they pleased, and they have several times told him so; considering them responsible, he did not think that they unnecessarily interfered; on the other hand, if they propose to hold him responsible, he was of opinion that they did interfere far too much." "16. Your Committee on refering to the Report of 1858, page 42, find 'that the

'grading, masonry, and bridging of the 28 miles from Sussex to Salisbury, were put under Contract on the 8th day of October 1858, and that the tracklaying and ballast-'ing was reserved to be let hereafter on a separate Contract.' That in the Tenders for the construction of this portion of the line, tracklaying and ballasting was expressly excepted. Your Committee further find from evidence before them that the tracklaying and ballasting of the 28 miles was never advertised, nor competition asked for the same, and the Contract was entered into with Mr. Stevens, signed by the Chief Commissioner, and the Specification attached signed by the Chief Engineer, and to which was also attached a Tender without any date, and that no security has been given by, or required from Mr. Stevens for the faithful performance of the work, which it appears is not required to be completed before the month of September next. The circumstance connected with this transaction involves a very important principle, whether the Railway Board or the Government can, without public competition, execute an important work of this description, involving an expenditure according to estimate in Report of 1858, of £19,000, thereby setting at nought the Law in reference to the construction of Railways; and as no sufficient reason has been assigned in the opinion of your Committee for such a departure from the Law, and as the excepting of the tracklaying and ballasting was calculated to mislead parties desirous of competing, your Committee cannot avoid expressing their disapproval of the course

adopted in conducting such important Public Works. In connection with this subject your Committee would remark, that the Chief Engineer in answer to the enquiry—What quantity of ballast was stipulated for or intended to be put on this portion of the line? stated, 'It had not been determined on.' This statement, in connection with the whole proceeding relative to this work, is calculated to impress your Committee with the belief that there is something wrong. To the whole testimony in reference to this transaction, your Committee invite the careful attention of the Legislature.

"17. In the Report of 1858, it is frequently stated that the first nine miles, from Gilbert's Lane to Salmon Brook, was completed; from the evidence before your Com-

mittee it appears that such statements are incorrect.

"18. Your Committee have had before them one of the Members of the Government who attended at Saint John in the months of December and January, to investigate matters connected with the Railway, and who stated that their enquiry related as well to the management of the work as to the claims of Contractors; and that after a full investigation, the Committee of the Government, with the concurrence of the Chief Commissioner and Engineer, came to the conclusion that the Road would cost about £1,000,000. That investigation must have been very imperfect, as it further appears from his statement that they did not examine particularly the monthly estimates of the Divisional Engineers, and did not compare them with the Certificates of the Chief Engineer, neither did they compare the Certificate of the Chief Engineer with the entries of cash, or examine the Books connected with the Works. Your Committee regret that the Committee of the Government did not make a more thorough investigation before arriving at the conclusion as to the cost of the Road, as it now appears from the Report of the Chief Commissioner and Engineer made subsequent to their investigation, that £67,000 additional would be required to complete the Road, exclusive of interest.

"19. Your Committee recommend the evidence which has been carefully taken down be published for the benefit of the country, as the deep interest felt in, and the heavy burden entailed on the people, entitle them to a full knowledge as to the way the Public Works have been constructed and managed, as far at least as has been

brought to light by the labours of your Committee.

"20. In conclusion, your Committee have to express their regret that after a protractive enquiry, marked with more than ordinary good feeling and harmony, they have not been able to close their labours with that unanimity which all feel would have been desirable. With the conclusion arrived at by those who were associated with us, it is not for us to find fault. The People and the Legislature are the judges; to their hands we commit our Report and await their verdict. We have endeavoured to rise above all party and personal feeling, and to do our duty in accordance with our convictions and justice to those whose Representatives we are, and to the country at large.

The Committee met and adjourned from day to day until the 9th of March 1860, Mr. Cudlip having, in the meantime, declined to serve on the Committee, and His Honor the Speaker having appointed Mr. Wright in his stead.

March 9th, 1860.

CHARLES A. EVERITT SWORN.

I own land in the vicinity of Ossekeag Station. I made several purchases, spread over a period of years, some of them as long ago as 1853. I speak from memory as

I think I purchased the land on which the Ossekeag Station stands in the Summer of 1858. I purchased the land after the Railway Commissioners had concluded to fix the Station there as far as I understood it. I cannot recollect that I had any communication with any Member of the Government with reference to fixing the Station there. I may have had but I do not recollect it. I know that there was a difference of opinion as to whether the Station should be at or above Groom's I did all I could to get it fixed above the Bridge. The difference of opinion was among the inhabitants and those interested in lands there. I do not know whether there was any difference of opinion among the Commissioners in reference to it. I signed a paper giving the right of way. I also signed another paper giving the right of a road way to connect with Hampton Ferry. W. K. Crawford, and I think George Crawford, and Joseph P. Siderquest, signed both papers. I think King Crawford did not sign the paper giving the right of Road to Hampton. The papers are in the Rail-There are no Railway buildings on Mr. Siderquest's land. I have signed receipts for fifty pounds, which I directed the Commissioners to pay over to the parties building an embankment across Ossekeag Marsh. I promised the Commissioners that I would do something towards the Road and embankment to Hampton, and directed the fifty pounds which I was to receive to be paid for that purpose. first arrangement I made with the Commissioners was twenty five pounds for land for the Station; I made a second arrangement for another piece of land at twenty five pounds more. The whole Road between Ossekeag Marsh and Hampton was built by individuals; Mr. Wetmore was to examine it after it was finished. The distance from Ossekeag to Hampton is about a mile. I had to do with paying the parties for making the Road; I presume Johnston and Blackie received the fifty pounds from the Commissioners: I do not recollect the cost of the Road. Wetmore was mutually appointed to examine the Road by the Commissioners and the private persons who were interested in the Road. I never received a document or promise from the Commissioners that the Station should not be removed from Ossekeag to the Bridge. From memory I think there was about two acres and a half of land for which I was to receive the first £25; I think the extract from the Records of King's County-"Deed from C. A. Everitt to the Queen for freight house and road thereto, fifty one square perches, £25," is correct; this was the second purchase; I think I only gave two deeds of land to the Queen. This second sale was after I had the land laid out in lots for sale, and after the Station house had been erected. James Vaughn owned the land on which the Station stands before I did; I purchased it from him; I am not aware that the Engineers and I were ever looking for a site for the Railway buildings. Mr. King Crawford and myself invited Mr. Jardine to accompany us to Hampton on one occasion, for the purpose of pointing out to him what we considered the best site for a Railway Station; Mr. James Vaughn then owned the land on which the Station now stands; Mr. Jardine went with us, he made us no promises; he saw and examined the different sites which we pointed out, and he returned home. We got no promise from him, nor any satisfaction from him on the subject. I called on Mr. Jardine frequently on the subject. Months after, I saw the Railway Plans, and then the site of the present Station was marked on it. I think this was the first information I had of the Station being fixed there; this I think was as late as June the next Summer; it was in 1858. I saw the plan in the Railway Office; I frequently asked for the plan of that Section; I think I picked it up in the Office of the Railway Secretary; I do not know that any one shewed it to me; I do not think the papers were considered private, as I saw other persons looking over them; I purchased fifty acres of land from Mr. James Vaughn; I paid him two hundred and fifty pounds for it; I think the value of the property is increased on account of the Station being built on it; I sold the land to the Commissioners; it was a matter of bargain between us. The second purchase was contrary to my wishes at first. Before I made the purchase from Vaughn, I had seen the plans, and knew the Station was fixed there; Vaughn was also aware of it. I had no arrangement with any member of the Government, or any one else, to purchase the land, and that they should have a part of it. About the time I sold the second piece of land to the Commissioners, I sold a piece of land to Nethery in that vicinity, 100 feet square, for one hundred pounds. I would not have sold the same piece of

land sold to the Commissioners for double the money, as I valued the land much higher at that time. Last Fall, I sold a piece of the land purchased from Vaughn to the Provincial Secretary; I sold him ten acres for one hundred pounds. I think it is about half a mile from the Station house; it is well to the rear of the lot. I think the Station buildings cannot be seen from this piece sold to the Provincial Secretary. My lot has a frontage of about thirty rods. I think from one quarter to one third of the lot, is in the rear of the land sold him. The Deed says £150, but I sold it for £100. It was my act, making the consideration in the Deed £150. I do not draw all my Deeds in this way; my reason was that my price was £15 per acre. Mr. Tilley was unwilling to pay this price, and I was so desirous of having him there, that I agreed to let him have it at £10 an acre. My Deed to Nethery stated the exact consideration. We agreed, myself and others, to build a Bridge over Ossekeag Marsh; the Commissioners built an embankment instead, and I paid or allowed the £50 which I was to receive from the Commissioners, to be paid towards the embankment. I paid more than the £50 towards the building of the embankment, and I have to pay more yet. I consider the plans which I saw in the Office of the Railway Secretary, shewing the quantity of land taken from each individual, Public Records. The Stations were marked on the plans; I frequently went to the Office to ascertain where the Ossekeag Station was to be built, but did not get it until I saw the plans. I saw the plans I think, shortly after they were completed. I purchased the land very shortly after seeing the plans. I purchased the land from Vaughn, in the presence of a number of persons; I told him then that the Station was located there. I told him he was foolish to sell, and that it was worth £1,000. He said he would sell to me for £250, and I bought it from him. I was anxious to know where the Station was to be built, because I had land there. Above the main road leading to Passekeag, Mr. J. P. Siderquest has a piece of land; on it there was a Spring, and the Commissioners purchased a piece of land from him at £25, including the Spring.

ALEXANDER L. LIGHT SWORN.

William Stevens has the Contract for the ballasting and tracklaving from Salisbury to Sussex. The reasons why the tracklaving and ballasting of that Section were not let at the time of the grading and masonry are given on page 42 of the Report for 1858, where it is stated that—"The tracklaving and ballasting being reserved to be let hereafter as a separate contract. This latter course was adopted in consequence of it being found that where these items were included with the other work the Contractors injured the permanent material, (rails, chairs, spikes, and sleepers.) by using them for their own temporary purpose in the construction of their work; the damage thus caused exceeded the additional cost of doing the work without such aid. The iron rails were frequently so injured in removing a few trifling yards of earth, from neglect in not 'packing' the sleepers, &c., as to render them unfit for permanent By referring to page 166 of this same Report of 1858, it will be found that there was a Schedule attached to all contracts let at that time, in which the Contractors gave a price to execute this description of work if required. Mr. Stevens being the lowest approved bidder for this work, the Government did require him to execute the tracklaying and ballasting from Sussex to Salisbury. He was notified to that effect, and has proceeded with the execution of the work. From Sussex to Salisbury, about twenty eight miles, Section 10 to 16, were divided into seven sections. Mr. Stevens had one section of the grading and masonry awarded to him; Mr. Stevens never had the use of rails, &c., until this Winter, when they were delivered to him on account of his contract. My experience taught me that it would be very injurious to sleepers and rails to allow the use of them to Contractors. I recommended to the former Commissioners the propriety of adopting a different course; I think I recommended the same course to the present Commissioners. There has been about 50 miles let on the plan that I had objected to; 40 miles has been let by the present Commissioners on the plan that I objected to. I stated to Messieurs Hatheway and Scovil very distinctly my objection; I did not make so much a point of objecting to the present Commissioners, as I had been over-ruled on the principle in the first instance. When the grading and masonry of all these Sections was let in October 1858.

1858, the Commissioners themselves, I presume, became impressed with the viciousness of the principle, and permitted me to return to the system adopted in the first letting of the work from Saint John to Kennebeccasis. I do not know what Newspapers contained the Advertisement asking for tenders for the 28 miles tracklaying and ballasting; it was not advertised. I think there is a contract between the Commissioners and Mr. Stevens for the grading and ballasting the 28 miles; if there is a contract, it, I think, must have been signed since October last. The statement, page 79, Report 1858, "tracklaying and ballasting from Sussex to Salisbury not contracted, &c., the 31st December, 1858," is correct. The estimate was £19,000; it will be Both the Engineer and Commissioner are responsible, to a certain extent, for letting the work to Stevens; I consider myself, morally, the most responsible of all for recommending Stevens to the Commissioner and the Commissioner to the Government. I adhere to the statement in the Report of 1859—that the Road will cost 15 per cent. more than the original estimate in the Report of 1858. In the Report of 1858, the estimate was £927,976; 15 per cent. added will make £1,967,171. I do not, in this estimate, include the payment of any Interest. I was not aware that Laurie had included the Interest in his estimate of the Nova Scotia Road when I made my estimate of the New Brunswick Road; I was not aware of it until this day. I made the comparative statement in the Report for 1858, and which statement was made up from the Nova Scotia Report; I read the Nova Scotia Report hastily; I don't know that I read page 32, I think it quite probable that I did. In Nova Scotia Report, item 12, placed in Mr. Light's hands and read by him, in which it appears that Interest on Debentures for the construction of the Railway is included, the amount is £74,634 10 9. I was not aware that Interest was included in the statement on page 55, Nova Scotia Report. Interest will form an item of the cost in construction of Railways. Mr. Light reads second and third paragraphs on page 55, in the Report of 1858. In making up the comparative statement already spoken of, there was no intention to deceive, although it is possible it may be incorrect, and I call the attention of the Committee to the fact, that the figures were copied from the last page of Mr. Laurie's Report. Mr. Light referred to page 14, Report 1858, and desires the whole of the Table therein to be inserted; and then Table 9 in Mr. Laurie's Report, page 55, to follow.

I am not aware that Interest is included in the New York statement; I never looked with a view of ascertaining what the items were which made the £986 13 7 "other items" of the Nova Scotia Report. The Comparative Statement appears in the Chairman's Report; I gave it to him. In estimating the cost of a Railway, the Interest should be included by some person. With the interest, in my opinion, I had nothing to do; on my part I consider it perfectly fair to make an estimate without including Interest. I think the Interest should not be charged to the Construction Account. I am responsible for the Comparative Statement, but not for the Interest; the Interest forms a part of the cost of the Road. I think that my estimate, with the full Tables that were then given, would convey to every thinking mind that Interest was not included. I asked Mr. Jardine if I had any thing to do with Interest, and he told me that neither he nor I had any thing to do with it. The 15 per cent. additional to be added to the estimate, has nothing to do with Interest, which must be superadded. The Interest will eventually appear in the Account of the whole cost of the Road. The estimate of the engineering includes all work previously done of every description, on Surveys on the North Shore and to Calais, and every where else I think is taken into account, in making up the estimate of £45,055 10s, in the Commissioners' Report of 1859. The Surveys to North Shore and to Calais are full and elaborate Surveys, and must have cost a good deal of money; not more full and elaborate than the Surveys from Saint John to Shediac. Mr. Light refers to page 17, Report for 1859. The Tables will apply, except that the Estimates are too low by 15 per cent. Mr. Light refers to page 27, Report of 1858. The amount stated there to complete the Road, £185,126 19s. 5d. must have been incorrect, as it will not do it. There must be added £139,194 and 15 per cent. as calculated or stated in Report of 1858. At the time I made the Report in 1858, up to 31st December, the grading and masonry of the whole line had approximatingly been let. The ballasting and tracklaying was all let, except 28 miles between Sussex and Salisbury. I included this 28 miles ballasting and tracklaying in my Estimate of 1858; the amount was £19,000; page 72. I also included the rolling stock. I do not think there is as much expended as was estimated for rolling stock. It was a pretty snug estimate, and sufficiently high for present traffic; the Stations were also included; the £50,853 18 2 contingencies, was added to cover any deficiency. I think the estimate I made for rolling stock and ballasting was sufficient. The Stations will I think exceed the estimate, perhaps £5,000. £50,000 was added over and above the Contracts entered into, to cover contingencies that might arise, not to make up the difference between my estimate and Contractors' prices. The contingencies consisted of probable settlement of entbankments in soft bottoms, increase of culvert masonry, and probable increase of rock in deep cuttings, over and above what any ordinary Survey would disclose; all these three items have been largely increased; I cannot say to what amount. In my Report of 1858 I estimated that the cost of the Road to complete it, would take £235,980 17 7. To this amount, I add in my Report of 1859, an additional amount of £139,194, which it will require to complete it. Most of this difference has arisen from unforeseen contingencies, and from Contractors' prices, upon which the estimate was made, being too low. The estimate I made in 1858 was based upon Contractors' prices, and not on my own figures.

Mr. M'Adam protests against any pay being given to any witness brought before the Committee, whose evidence may appear not to be relevant to its business, or touching Railway matters.

March 12th, 1860.—Committee met.

The Honorable S. L. TILLEY (not sworn.)

I think it was the Commissioners who settled the locality of the Station at Ossekeag. Petitions were received either by the Commissioners or the Government on the subject; some of them for having the Station at Groom's Cove, and some at Ossekeag. After the Petitions were received, the Engineers were directed to examine and report which site would be the best. I cannot say positively what their report was, but my impression is that they reported in favour of the present site. I own ten acres of land about five minutes walk from the Station. I cannot say the date of purchase; it was after the Road was opened to Hampton; I think it was the latter part of July or first

47

of August last. I never thought of purchasing until I was on the spot, and made no arrangement to purchase until after the Road was opened. I never directly or indirectly influenced the Commissioners as to their selection of the site. Mr. Everitt came to me once or twice, and stated to me the desirableness of having the Station near where it now is. I do not know of any arrangement made with any member of the Government and Everitt, for the purchase of land by him at Ossekeag. Mr. Johnson holds the office of authentication of Railway Debentures; he was appointed about the 1st November 1858; he has neither received fee, salary, or compensation. He was detained here last Fall two days to sign Debentures, and missed the Stage. I told him that if he would remain, as I wanted the Debentures, I would pay an express to carry him home. He has had no promise of compensation; the understanding is just the opposite. There was paid to Mr. Robinson the Provincial Treasurer, £100, for I think over two years' services; his labour was very much greater, a larger proportion of Debentures signed by him were for smaller amounts than those latterly issued and signed by Mr. Johnson The Government keeps a record of all Debentures given to, signed by Mr. Johnson, and received from him. To each Debenture he signs his name sixty one times; he signs some of them in Fredericton, and some in Miramichi. There are Debentures for £100 issued. The change was only made, when the Provincial Treasurer informed the Government that it was impossible for him to attend to it without neglecting other duty. I think the giving the contract for ballasting and tracklaying from Sussex to Salisbury, was submitted to and approved of by the Government; I think this was last Fall. In the original tenders for this Section, the Contract was taken for grading, masonry, bridging, &c., in which tenders were included the tracklaying and ballasting. After the first part of the contract was completed, then the subsequent work was done, and let to Stevens under the original tender. The tenders were received in the first instance in detached parts; and I think the Commissioners would be justified in giving the whole to one Contractor, notwithstanding it was tendered for in Sections.

Question.—Supposing Stevens to have been the lowest tender for one Section, for grading, masonry, and bridges, would it be right to give him the other six at the same rate?

Answer.—If he only tendered for one Section, and was lowest for that, and offered to take the others at the same rate, it would not be right to give them to him. If Mr. Stevens was lowest on one Section and highest on another, the Commissioners could not give him both at the price for which he tendered, but would have to refer the highest tender to the Government, and there might be reasons which would induce the Government to give him both; we have done this in one or two cases. If tenders are taken in 1858, for work to be completed in 1860, I think a portion of that might be taken separately at any period previous to the expiration of that time.

Question.—Do you think in reference to this 28 miles of tracklaying and ballasting, the tenders should have been taken twelve months before the work was to be com-

Answer.—I think under the circumstances, the Commissioners were justified in accepting the tenders which had been received the previous year, as it was connected with the Sections then tendered for.

Question.—Do you think it was fair to the other Contractors to give the whole of the Sections for tracklaying and ballasting to one man, on the tenders submitted in 1858, without giving them an opportunity of competing in 1859?

Answer.—I think it was fair to the other Contractors to give the whole of the tracklaying and ballasting on the seven Sections to Stevens in 1859, after it had been competed for in 1858, at his tender, without any other opportunity to compete.

Question.—If the Contractors were aware when they tendered for one Section, that in the event of their tender for plate-laying and ballasting being the lowest for one Section, it would entitle them to the whole 28 miles, do you not believe that the Contract would be taken less?

Answer.—I do not believe that it would have materially affected it.

Question.—If the Engineer recommended Mr. Stevens highly for tracklaying, would not the Commissioners and the Government be justified in giving the 28 miles all to Mr. Stevens, as the Engineer considered him a good man for the job?

Answer.—I think the Government would be influenced very much by the recommendation of those gentiemen, and if Mr. Stevens' tender was the lowest, would certainly give him the job. If tenders were not asked for the whole tracklaying and ballasting in 1858, it would not be right to let the work in 1859 without tenders.

March 13th.—Committee met.

HENRY E. SEELYE SWOTH.

I am Appraiser of Land Damages to the European and North American Railway. I have received £100 per year as Appraiser, and £100 per year as Secretary of the Board, and £30 a year as travelling expenses. I reside at Saint George, County of Charlotte; my salary is still going on. We last met in November last. In making up the valuation of land damages, we are guided by 19 Vic. Cap. 17: Mr. Seelye reads Section 10:—

"10. The Appraisers, in assessing the damages, shall take into consideration the benefit likely to accrue to the respective proprietors from the Railway running through or near their land, and the damages shall be reduced or extinguished accordingly."

We are guided by that Section; we take into consideration the whole Act. We had not the claim of Nelson Arnold, in Report of 1858, for £72, before us: it was paid him by the Commissioners; it was for Station ground at Sussex. We did award Nelson Arnold damages for Station ground at Sussex, subsequent to this. For additional ground at Sussex, we awarded him £260; in awarding him this amount, we were guided by the 10th Section of 19 Victoria. I do think that placing the Station on Mr. Arnold's farm, very much increased the value of it. In the first instance, I think there was 12 acres taken; at this time we awarded him the £260. I think there was about two or two and a half acres taken; this last was for addition to the Station ground. In the first instance the Commissioners settled with Mr. Arnold, and gave him I think £6 an acre. I have been called upon to value land this side of Mr. Arnold's. There has no claim been made for land damages for track, except one from Aiton, within six or eight miles of Arnold's. Aiton was not awarded any thing; we did not think him entitled to any damages. The question of benefit was settled in Mr. Arnold's case by the Commissioners. The Appraisers in awarding damages to Arnold, considered that the question of benefit had been offset by the small amount awarded by the Commissioners, as they gave him £6 an acre, and after the location of the Road, at the rate the land was selling there in lots it was worth £500 an acre. If the Appraisers had been called upon in the first instance to appraise the damages to Mr. Arnold, taking into consideration the increased value of his land by having the Station placed on his land, the probability is that we would have awarded him the amount he received. I do not know whether the land taken from Mr. Arnold in the second instance, was required for Station purposes or not. I do not know what number of acres are occupied by the Station buildings. The opinion of the Appraisers in valuing the land taken in the second instance, was that Mr. Arnold should have its enhanced value. When we awarded the damages in the last instance, I do not remember whether there were any of the buildings on the land last taken, or not. My impression is, that Arnold's lot was about fifty acres. I do not remember now what we were advised the value of the land was before the Railway was made there; I should think £20 or £25 an acre for land there previous to the Railway going there would have been a fair value. In the immediate vicinity of the Station lots have been sold at about £500 an acre; my impression is, that if no land had been taken from Arnold except for the track, he would not have been awarded any thing. The fact of the Station being on his land has increased its value very materially. James Smith, Chairman of the Appraisers, receives £100 per year as Appraiser, and £15 a year travelling expenses; he was awarded by the Appraisers £200 for land damages; I do not know the quantity of land taken from him. There was a dispute between Mr. Smith and Mr. Gilbert about the land; there was about a half an acre taken, but Mr. Gilbert claimed a part of it. The amount awarded to Mr. Gilbert by the Appraisers was £4,025; it was all for track. not now like to state the quantity, my impression is that there was over ten acres. We paid Smith at the rate of £200 an acre less than had been paid by the Commissioners for land in the same vicinity. There were plans of the land taken from individuals

individuals submitted to the Appraisers by the Commissioners. In awarding the £200 to Mr. Smith, it was for all the damage we considered that he had sustained by land removed or cut off from one point and filled up on the opposite side. In most cases the plans indicated the quantity of land taken from each individual; in this particular case it did not define the quantity; the damages awarded were in accordance with the value of land in the immediate vicinity. We made our award to Mr. Smith presuming that he was the owner of the land marked on the plan to him; Mr. Gilbert claimed a part of this land; the land taken from Smith was used for an embankment on the opposite side of the creek; we satisfied Mr. Gilbert by giving him £4,025 for his damage in ifull. In valuing Mr. Gilbert's damages, we estimated the value of the new land taken from the opposite side of the creek. We thought the land taken from Mr. Smith was a damage to him of £200; his land now on the creek has a straight front, formerly it projected into the creek. We could not have decided the claims for land damages within six months after the location of the Road; we could not have decided the claims in six months after the 8th October 1858. The Law provides that parties shall make application in writing for damages to the Commissioners in six months from the entry on the lands. I do say now that there are claims which cannot be settled until the Road is completed. I have received an application for land damages during the present month; Lewis Burns is the applicant; the application was made to me direct by Mr. Burns; I cannot define the nature of his claim; it is for additional damage. I have received applications for damages within three months for land taken for the track; I presume they are for the track. I do not think that we have adjudicated upon claims that have been made within six months; we have adjudicated upon claims made since the first of May last. The annual expense of the Board of Appraisers is about £862.

14th March, 1860.

HENRY E. SEELYE recalled.

The Appraisers in adjudicating upon James Smith's claim, paid him for a quarter of an acre. In my evidence yesterday, I stated that there was "about a half an acre taken from him."

16th March 1860.

RICHARD W. BURROWES SWOTH.

I am professionally a Civil Engineer. Latterly I have been engaged on the European and North American Railway; I held the office of Principal Assistant Engineer. Refers to page 58, Mr. Light's Report, 1858; reads the third paragraph as follows:-"A Principal Assistant Engineer of matured experience was also appointed, whose duty it was to take the general supervision of the whole of the works, and act under and carry out the particular views and orders of the Chief Engineer, and pass over the work as often as possible, consulting and advising with the several Division Engineers on the state of the works generally and on any particular difficulty that might at any time arise." The duties I was called upon to perform are there laid down as generally understood. In the month of December last I was over a portion of the works in my official capacity. Sections No. 1, 2, 3, and 4, page 21, Mr. Light's Report 1859, which are stated there to be entirely complete, is not correct in my opinion, according to Mr. Light's specification. The statement referred to is as follows:- "That portion of this division from Saint John to Salmon Brook has been treated of at large in the Report for 1858. It comprises Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4, and was opened for traffic in June 1858; it is entirely complete, and is of a superior character. The future cost of upholding will be very light. The embankment at Lawlor's Lake is permanent, the settlement being less than was originally anticipated." The Sections are not sufficiently ballasted. Mr. Burrowes is referred to and reads from page 14 and 15, Supplementary Report of Mr. Light for 1858. The statement there made may only be the cost of ballasting up to that date, March 8, 1859. Refers to the last paragraph on page 16, Supplementary Report:

"In conclusion, I have to say that the ballasting of these Sections has been done in a very thorough manner, and in a similar mode to that adopted on the Austrian

and Prussian Railways, with marked success, where the effects of frost had specially to be guarded against; (vide account of same in American Railway Times of Feb. 26, 1859."

This paragraph may mean the same as the former. (Refers to page 43, Report 1858.) Mr. Light here states that from Saint John to Salmon Brook, being Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4, are completed. The Road generally is laid off 100 feet wide; I do not know that any portion of the Road in the vicinity of Lakefield is laid off over 100 feet wide.

Question.—Are you aware that any unnecessary excavations are made in that vicinity?

Answer.—That being a matter of Engineering opinion, I decline giving an answer as a common evidence. Any question put to me involving a professional opinion, I decline to answer.

The maximum grade on the whole line at present is 45 to the mile. It was not so formerly; there were some grades 50 feet. I know of some of the Contracts having been let at 50; on Sections 4 and 5, Salisbury District, were 50; I do not know of any others over 45. The Road was opened for traffic before it was finally completed. It does the rails and chairs no good to open a Road for traffic before its completion. The injury to the rails and chairs was not caused principally by premature opening; the track was not improved by premature opening. I do not know that frosts, thaws, or heavy rains, have materially added to the cost of the Road; not more so the last year than previously, except a small expense incurred the last Fall to a small Bridge, by a Freshet in the Salmon River. The additional expense of frosts, thaws, and heavy rains, have not added 15 per cent. to the additional cost of the Road. The accident to the Bridge to which I refer, occurred on Mr. Brookfield's division; I cannot say whether the Province or Mr. Brookfield would bear the loss.

Question.—During the construction of a Section, assuming an embankment or part of it is carried away, who would bear the loss—the Province, or the Contractor?

Answer.—It would depend in the first place, on the conditions of the Contract, and

even then, from circumstances during its progress.

I have read the specification for Contracts in Report of 1858. Refers to page 149, Report of 1858, and reads:—"The Contractor is to take upon himself all risks and contingencies whatever, that may arise in respect of the works. He is to replace and make good at his own cost, any work which may fail from whatever cause; whether from bad workmanship or materials, or from slips, slides, or freshets." I do know of increased size of culverts, but do not know whether they were since the Report of 1858. They occurred on several Sections; they occurred on 7, 8, and 9, Saint John District, and 4 and 5, Salisbury District, and there may be others.

17th March, 1860.

HENRY E. SEELYE recalled.

The Appraisers have not adjudicated upon any claims for damages this Winter; last Winter we did. In 1857 we met in October, this was our first meeting; our second meeting was in November, third in December; January 5th, 1858, the fourth meeting; February, fifth; March, sixth; April, seventh meeting; the next meeting was in June; July we met again, and again in September; we met again in October; making in the twelve months, from October 1857 to October 1858, ten meetings. In October 1858 we met; in May 1859 we met again; July, met again; September, met again; November, met again; making in the year 1859 five meetings. As Secretary I received the applications from claimants, notify them of the time of meeting, notify the Commissioners, and when the time has not been fixed by adjournment, notify the other Appraisers. I keep the Records of the proceedings, and conduct all the correspondence; I make out the awards, and transmit them to the Provincial Secretary. It was the opinion of the Appraisers that I would, by drawing the awards, save all of my salary, instead of its being done by the Solicitor; I have drawn in all about 200 awards; we were informed that the fee for each would be a guinea. I made a form of award, which I submitted to the Attorney General, and he approved of it. We had claims for land damages from C. J. Hendricks, and J. and C. Ketchum, and we examined

examined the land and we did not award them any thing. I think their land was considerably damaged; they have long narrow farms, broad fronts, but not deep, and the Road runs through the best of their farms; I think they had good claims for damages; I think over one of the farms there is a high embankment; in these two cases I think we overlooked a very important point on account of adjudicating too There would have been no appeal from our decision if we had not laid down a different rule. In consequence of a heavy embankment they required a crossing which was not taken into account. On the 22nd July 1858, the following Resolution was passed by the Board of Appraisers: - "Resolved, That the Secretary be instructed to make out the Account Current of the expenses of this Board for one year ending the 11th day of August, including Appraisers' salary and expenses, with Secretary's salary and expenses of his office, and also office rent, and transmit the same to the Provincial Secretary and the Chairman of the Railway Board." I submitted the Account as required by this Resolution to the Chairman of the Commissioners; this Resolution was not afterward followed up, and each Appraiser keeps his own Account for salary and expenses with the Commissioners. Since I gave evidence on the 13th instant relative to the quantity of land taken from Nelson Arnold, I have received my Books, and on referring to them, I find the quantity taken from him to be as follows: 141 acres, paid for by the Commissioners, £72; and 11 acre, adjudicated upon by the Appraisers, for which we awarded him £260. The 142 acres were taken for track and station grounds, the 11 acre was for addition to the station grounds.

19th March, 1860.

RICHARD W. BURROWES recalled.

On two Sections of the Road, the grades were reduced in 1858. Mr. Burrowes is referred to Report of 1859, page 24, Sec. 4. Moncton was reduced in 1858. There has not been any scarcity of Engineers during the last four years.

HENRY E. SEELYE recalled.

The second application for land damages made by Gilliad Secord, was received on the 21st July 1859; he was awarded £80. The award was made on the 12th September 1859; it was for land in the Parish of Sussex. Extract from Record is as follows:- "Gilliad Secord-land situate in the Parish of Sussex, and described on Plan No. 9, for an extra breadth taken for track since the first award, and for about one acre of land taken for a gravel pit-the question of benefit being considered and settled in first award, the sum of £80." The first award was made to him on 23rd July 1858; the amount was £20. The amount awarded to J. & G. Ruland was £80, for extra damage for deep cutting across the farm in one part, and high embankment on the other. There is a note to this award as follows:-" This award does not include any extra breadth, nor any land that may be taken for gravelling or ballasting, outside of the 100 feet for track which is the basis of this adjudication." The application is dated 7th October 1858; the award was made May 20th 1859. Hon. John H. Gray made application for damages January 20th 1858, for deep cutting, and which divided his farm; we did not award him any damage. The award was made the 22nd July 1858. When the adjudication took place, it was understood by the Appraisers that Mr. Gray was to have a crossing; this we understood from Mr. Jardine.

20th March 1860.

ALEXANDER L. LIGHT recalled.

I wish to make the evidence which I gave on the 10th instant, perfectly clear to prevent mystification; and I now state that the estimate of cost of the whole Road, made by me was £927,976—the approximate estimate of 1858, and to this I add in my Report of 1859, 15 per cent., which will probably complete the whole Road. £50,000 for contingencies, was included in the estimated cost of 1858. My approximate estimate of the cost of the Road made in 1858, will be found Table A, No. 1, page 72, Report 1858, and is as follows:—

Total distance, including Moncton Branch, equal to 109.18 miles, making cost per mile £8,500 currency, or £7,083 sterling.

If the prices given for materials in Table A, No. 4, are not exceeded, the amount stated for construction of superstructure will be sufficient.

Question.—In adding the 15 per cent. to the amount of £927,976 9 2, did you add any thing in consequence of increased price of materials for superstructure?

Answer.—Not having my notes of the addition by me, I cannot distinctly state what amount of addition has been made on account of this item; I think it very probable that it has been proportionately increased.

Question.—What induces you to believe that it has been proportionately increased? Answer.—Because during the construction of the work more of the permanent material has been used than was allowed for in that estimate. The estimate for the points and crossings I think will be more expensive, more having been used than was anticipated, and a much more expensive class having been substituted in some instances.

Ouestion — Will those reasons assigned by you increase the superstructure 15 per

Question.—Will those reasons assigned by you increase the superstructure 15 percent.?

Answer.—As already above stated I cannot say.

Question.—Are you aware whether you made any addition to cost of Superstructure Account in your additional estimate in 1859?

Answer.—I think an addition has been made; I have no estimate here shewing the additions, but I have in Saint John.

Question.—Are the reasons assigned by the Commissioners in their Report 1859, page 14, for the increased cost of the Road over the estimate of 1858, correct?

Answer.

Answer.—I can hardly tell, as they don't give their reasons there without referring to other papers.

Mr. Light is referred to pages 5, 6, and 7. Supplementary Report of 1858.

Question.—What are the reasons assigned there by the Commissioners for increased cost?

Answer.—The reason given by the Commissioners, as far as I see, was the in ompleteness of the survey.

Question.—Was not the portion of the Road referred to, pages 5 and 7, completed last year when the Report was made up?

Answer.—That portion from Saint John to Salmon Brook was virtually completed at the date of the Supplementary Report, March 8th, 1859.

Mr. Light is referred to pages 27 to 33, Supplementary Report 1858.

Question.—Are not the reasons there assigned by the Commissioners for increased cost, imperfect surveys?

Answer.—Imperfect surveys is one of the reasons; the want of a sufficient Engineering staff, and a non-fulfilment of contracts by the Commissioners in furnishing rolling stock to Contractors, are other reasons.

Question.—Were not these facts known to the Commissioners and Engineer when the Report was made in 1858?

Answer.—They were to a certain extent.

Question.—Had not the damages arising from the late delivery of the Locomotive Engine and Cars been provided for in the estimate of 1858?

Answer.—It was not taken into account in my estimate in Table A, No. 1, 1858.

Question.—When you submitted your Report last year, Table A, No. 1, page 72, Report 1858, total cost £927,976, did you not know that £7,402 10 10 had been allowed to Messieurs Walker's for damage arising from late delivery of Locomotives and Cars, as well as the inadequacy of the latter?

Answer.—I did know it.

Question.—Do you not think that you ought to have put it into the Report as you knew it?

Answer.—I represented it to the Commissioners, and I think, to the Government; I think one Member of the Government was there when I represented it; I reported upon the Messieurs Walker's damage claims to the Government at the request of Government.

The 15 per cent. would not cover this damage; I think the 15 per cent. would not cover any damage on Sections 5 and 6.

Question.—In making up your estimate for 1858, did the Commissioners direct you to leave out the amount awarded to Messieurs Walker?

Answer.—It was talked of. The Commissioners were of opinion that the works could be economized on Sections 5 and 6; as these works were very heavy, the Commissioners were of opinion that a sufficient saving could be made to cover the damage.

The amount of Walkers' Contract on Section 5, Saint John, was £40,872 12 4. I do not know what amount had been paid them on this account down to 31st October 1859; I do not now know whether Mr. Jardine's figures are correct or not; I do not know whether the amount on page 6, Report 1859, paid Walker & Co. £59,741 19 3, is correct or not; I know what I certified for myself; I cannot now tell from memory how much I certified for down to 31st October 1859. Section 5 is not finished yet. I certified for a small amount to Messieurs Walker last week. The contracts require 10 per cent. to be kept back until the completion of the work. Section 6 is not quite completed, it is very nearly so; the amount of contract for Section 6 was £20,946. The contracts permitted the payment of the 10 per cent. to any Contractor from whom it had been kept back before the completion of the work, on the recommendation of the Engineer and on the approval of the Commissioners.

ALEXANDER L. LIGHT recalled.

Question.—What other reasons are assigned by you in your Report of 1859 for increased cost of Road on estimate of £927,976, in Report of last year, beside increased cost of grading, masonry, and bridging?

Answer.

Answer.—One of the causes given is, incompleteness of surveys; it causes difference between estimate and probable cost. I was not aware that all the surveys were incomplete at the time I made up my Report of 1858. In my Report of 1858, I

stated that there were 29 miles completed.

Mr. Light is referred to page 6, Supplementary Report, 1858. It is stated here by the Commissioner in his Report, that there were 70 miles let in November 1857, and October 1858. "The surveys having been carefully made, the location revised, and the quantities calculated by the new specification, there is no reason to suppose that the cost will exceed the estimate by more than the usual per centage." I do not recollect that I furnished this information to the Commissioners. The result would shew that this statement was not correct. The Engineering staff has been organized on the American system. I stated in my Report that the staff had been organized on a thoroughly efficient system. It has been so since about the beginning of 1858. The last 28 miles, Sussex to Salisbury, was let in October 1858. The reductions in the grade were made as near as I can recollect in the Spring of 1858. The reduction of these grades increased the cost of the Road very materially. The apparent cost of the reduction of the grades, I am of opinion, was added to the contingencies allowed When I made up my estimate in 1858, I added about £6000 for reduction in grades, and increased masonry caused thereby on Sections 4 and 5, Salisbury. In the estimate of 1858, I think the increased expense of Hammond River Bridge was also included in contingencies; I think the increased expense has, as near as I can remember, amounted to about £6000; I have in the office the original specification on which that Bridge was let. The specification under which this Bridge was built was altered to suit a revised and more economical style of work. The amount of the contract was £11,950. I do not exactly know what amount of money has been paid on account of this Bridge. There has not been £20,000 paid to Crosby on account of it now. Nothing has been paid on account of it without my certificate, at least I think not. The girders are not included in the contract. In the Commissioners' Report of 1859, I find paid to Small & Crosby for Hammond River Viaduct, £23,832 11s., of which from £1500 to £2000 is to be deducted for earth work. A diversion of the stream was made at this place which cost nothing additional; the earth work taken from which being principally required for the formation of the embankments at either end of the Bridge, the expense of which was covered by the £1500, or £2000. Thousands of yards of earth have been borrowed besides the quantity taken from this diversion, exclusive of the quantity required to complete the adjacent cuttings in the Railway. Mr. Light is referred to page 6, Report of 1859.

Question.—What are we to understand by Permanent Way, Abstract B, £250-

627 13s. P

Answer.—I cannot tell, not being conversant with the Commissioners' style of making up their Report. The Engineering difinition of Permanent Way is in contradistinction to the term Temporary Way used by Contractors. I had nothing to do with the figures in the Commissioners' Report of 1859; I had not been consulted about them; I do not now from memory know what Mr. Brookfield got £19,000 for; I certified for all that has been paid to him.; I think so from having seen his Accounts. Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, extend from Saint John to Salmon Brook. I think I have certified for a good deal more than the £19,000 within the last three years. I adhere to my Report 1859, of the state of the Road from Saint John to Salmon Brook, page 21.

"That portion of this Division, from Saint John to Salmon Brook, has been treated of at large in the Report for 1858. It comprises Sections Nos. 1, 2, 3, and 4, and was opened for traffic in June 1858. It is entirely complete, and is of a superior character: the future cost of upholding will be very light. The embankment at Lawlor's Lake is permanent—the settlement being less than was originally anticipated."

It may be recommended that a little more ballast be added between Gilbert's crossing and the Three Mile House. I cannot say from memory what amount of money has been expended on Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, within the last year for ballasting. I think there have been day's work done on these Sections lately; the nature of the work has been maintaining the track; it was done from the Car House west of the Station to Salmon Brook. I am not aware of any new tracks having been laid down except in the Depot grounds, and a temporary siding at Stewart's cutting, to procure

earth for the filling of the Engine House and grounds. In the Contract entered into with Mr. Brookfield, I think a certain amount of tracklaying was included, but I do not speak positively.

Question.—Are the statements which are set forth under the head of Estimated Cost, page 28 of Report for 1858, as regards the basis upon which Table A No. 1, is

farnished, correct?

Answer.—The Tables were intended to form the basis of Table A No. 1. Question.—What Tables are those referred to as furnishing the basis?

Answer.—From Table A No. 2 to Table A No. 9, inclusive.

Mr. Light is referred to page 28, Report of 1858, and reads under head of Estimated Cost, second paragraph; I presume the statement there made-"and the several Contracts, with but one exception, are finally closed and the Accounts settled"—is correct. The statement in Table A No. 2, was intended to be correct; Table A No. 3, is also correct. Some work has been done since under Table A No. 2. estimate in Table A No. 6, is not sufficient; it will require £5,000 to £10,000 more. Mr. Light is referred to page 27, Report of 1858. I think the materials purchased since the date of this Report are not of a more superior character than those purchased before. A much more expensive class of points and crossings has been used than was contemplated; I am under the impression that I have, since the 1st January 1859, given directions to the Assistant Engineer to have slopes reduced, width of cuttings reduced, the quantity of ballast reduced, and to economize in every possible way whenever he could find an opportunity to do so without injury to the work. There has not been any definite arrangement yet with regard to the quantity of ballast required to complete the divisions. Directions were given last Autumn to lessen the quantity, I think on three divisions from Hampton to Sussex. I do not think Stevens has as yet received any instructions with regard to the quantity of ballast. I think we will reduce the quantity of ballast, Table A, No. 4, page 74, Report 1858.

Ordered that the Railway Commissioners be called upon to furnish to the Committee the following documents:—

The Tenders for 1, 2, and 3, Moncton, and for 2, 3, and 4, Saint John.

The Contracts for the same.

The final Estimates of the same (in detail.)

The Tenders for all work at Saint John Station.

The Contracts.

The final Estimates or progress Estimates to date, in detail.

All papers connected with the transfer of No. 10 from Foster & Co. to John Brookfield, with the final Estimate of work done by Foster, and the last estimate of work done by Brookfield.

All papers connected with the transfer of No. 5, Salisbury, from Walker & Co. to Alexander M'Bean; the final estimate of Walker's work and Stock, and the last

Estimate of M'Bean on same Section.

A Return in detail of the quantity of work done by M'Donald and M'Bean on No. 4, up to the 31st October 1858, and the same up to 31st October 1859 or 31st January 1860, with an Estimate in detail from the Chief Engineer, of all work yet to be done or paid for to complete Nos. 4 and 5, Moncton, and the probable date of such completion.

The Contracts with John Brookfield for all work finished and work in course of

completion, from Mill Bridge to Salmon Brook.

The contract with William Stevens for ballasting and tracklaying 28 miles from

Sussex to Salisbury.

All Plans of land or Books describing the same, showing land belonging to or which formerly belonged to James Smith, in the vicinity of Saint John; To Nelson Arnold, Sussex; To Joseph Siderquest, Hampton; To Charles A. Everitt, Hampton;—taken for Railway purposes.

From the Record Office, King's County, a certified copy of all Entries and Deeds of land taken by Railroad Commissioners from Nelson Arnold, showing quantity taken at different times, and the amount paid for each portion; also a certified copy of all lands taken from Joseph Siderquest or Joseph P. Siderquest, shewing the quantity taken at different times, and the prices stated as paid for each portion.

Ordered

Ordered that Alexander L. Light produce the Tables shewing basis for cause of increase of 15 per cent. as per Report of 1859.

Murch 22nd, 1860.

Mr. LIGHT recalled.—Examined by Mr. Jardine.

I was appointed Chief Engineer in May or June 1856. I cannot exactly remember when Commissioners were appointed; I think it was in April 1857. I think the present Commissioners were appointed in August 1857. The first Contracts, Shediac Division, I think were let in August 1856; the second Contracts, 1, 2, 3, 4, Saint John, were let I think in December 1856; Hammond River Bridge and Sections 5 and 6, Saint John, were let in June 1857. The first Contracts were let on Mr. Giles' Survey, without any other Survey except a preliminary examination by myself. There had been partial Surveys of 1, 2, 3, and 4. Saint John, made by myself when the works were let; all the foregoing Contracts were let before the present Commissioners came into office. The tracklaying and ballasting from Sussex to Salisbury was recommended by me to be given to Mr. Stevens, upon his Tender made at a public letting in October 1858, which recommendation was adopted by the Government. Mr. Light is referred to page 30, Supplementary Report of 1858.

It will be seen that £7,402 10 10 as allowed to Walkers, only about one half was

for damages, and the balance for legitimate extras.

Question by Mr. Lawrence.—Are the Contracts on Sections 1, 2, 3, and 4, Saint

John, let by the former Commissioners, still open?

Answer.—They are not. I think there are no contracts on these Sections let by the present Commissioners, except the Depot ground and Station, and also tracklaying

and ballasting.

John Brookfield has the Contract for tracklaying and ballasting. Brookfield laid the tracks principally in the Depot ground and on these Sections. Brookfield's Contract for the Depot grounds did not include any specific quantity of tracklaying. We could stop him whenever we pleased. The tracklaying which has been done by other parties, has been done by day's work and is a very small amount. The final certificates for payment to Contractors, Sections 1, 2, 3, Moncton, were handed into the Commissioners in the Winter of 1857 and 1858, or early in the ensuing Spring. The reason the small amount of tracklaying was done by day's work was, that the Commissioners were anxious to close Mr. Brookfield's Accounts, and settle up with him. Mr. Brookfield got his final Estimate in the Fall of 1859. If any ballasting has been done beyon? Gilbert's lane, I am not aware of it.

Question by Mr. Lawrence.— Is there not ballasting required still to complete that

portion beyond Gilbert's Lane?

Answer.—I replied to this question yesterday.

Question.—Referred to page 80, Report of 1858. Was there 8,500 yards of rock-

cutting at No. 3, Moncton, as there stated?

Answer.—There was not. My Clerk, Mr. Stone, prepared Table A, No. 10. I did not authorize him to put that in; there was rock there; I cannot tell the quantity from memory; I discovered the error the last Autumn. The 8,500 yards of rock-cutting was not paid for; it is a clerical error; the figures are not correct; I do not think it is carried into the Estimate, Table A, No. 1.

Mr. Brookfield was not allowed rock price for frozen clay, but was allowed an extra price for clay on account of its being frozen. An allowance was made to Walker under similar circumstances, on Shediac Division. Henry Perley was Divisional Engineer at Moncton; I do not remember whether he reported rock-cutting in Brookfield's Section. Mr. Stone would make out this Table from Estimates and Schedules in his possession, given in by the resident Engineers. He sent the Tables to me and I published them, supposing them to be right. The Contractors are paid from the estimates. I know that small sums of money have been paid in my absence to Contractors by the Commissioners, which I have given pertificates for on my return, in all cases. I am not aware that any difficulties have arisen on account of money having been paid during my absence. I have no recollection of any dispute between myself and the Commissioners, on account of money paid to Crosby without my

consent.

consent. I am not aware of the Commissioners paying Crosby money after I refused to certify for him; as far as I know, the Commissioners were careful not to pay money without my certificate. Mr. Light is referred to pages 9 and 11, Supplementary Report of 1858. Estimated cost of embankment stated to be 65,000 cubic yards, page 11. Total estimated quantity required to fill Lake, 133,200 cubic yards. I know Mr. Boyd and I think Mr. Burrowes, made up these estimates; I have never discovered any clerical errors in these estimates. I cannot say whether the profile furnished the Contractors would show these quantities or not. Profiles will show correct quantities in ordinary cases. In extraordinary cases, like Lawlor's Lake and Robinson's Meadow, where the bottom is uncertain, figures marked upon the profile must to a certain extent be very problematical, as the degree of settlement is so uncertain.

Question by Mr. Lawrence.—In making up an estimate for the object set forth in pages 9 and 11, with the view of showing the comparative cost of two ways of crossing a Lake and filling up a Meadow, ought not reference to have been had to the plan in the office which is a copy of the one furnished the Contractor?

Answer.—In making up their estimate, I doubt not that the Engineers, Boyd and Burrowes, referred to all authentic plans and profiles. I think it was not necessary to give the plan and profile to the Contractors, as they were paid by the yard, and an Engineer was always on the ground to show how the work was to be done. Mr. Giles was so particular that he would not mark any figures on the side stakes to prevent the Contractors becoming too wise. The profiles on which this work was let was Giles' survey and was incorrect, as it did not represent the true depth of Lawlor's Lake by 50 feet. The location of the line at Robinson's Meadow was changed from Giles' original Survey to where it is now located, and the figures marked on that profile would not represent the quantity had it been built where it now is; Lawlor's Lake was lowered twenty feet.

Ordered that the Railway Commissioners furnish the following documents, books

and papers, viz:—

All the Certificates of the Chief Engineer on which payments have been made, and which have been furnished to the Commissioners in accordance with Section 8, 19 Vic. Cap. 15, from 1st day of August 1857 to the time of last payment inclusive, March 1860.

All the Monthly Returns of the Assistant Engineers, of works done on the line from 1st day of August 1857, to the last Return, March 1860, from which the Chief Engineer made out his monthly Certificate.

The Monthly Certificate Books of the Chief Engineer, of the value of work done, &c. The Cash Book, Day Book, Minute Book, Record Book, and all other Books of Account connected with the European and North American Railway.

DAVID JOHNSTON SWORN.

I was a Contractor on No. 7, from Groom's Cove towards Sussex, a little over seven We did work outside of our Contract; I believe there was a mile more of plate-laying; the masonry was exceeded. We made an embankment for a Road leading from the Station towards Hampton; I do not recollect the value of this latter work, something I think about £300; I was not in the Province at the time. excavations were made at the Stations, and the earth removed to the Road embankment across the Marsh. The £300, or thereabout, was paid us for the quantity of earth, at one shilling and three pence the cubic yard—our Schedule prices. only allowed for the excavation at one shilling and three pence the cubic vard. The arrangement was made by my partner Mr. Blackie, and I cannot say positively as to its exact terms. There is a Contract for the Station Buildings, beside our original Contract. We have been instructed during the past year to reduce some of our slopes from two to one, to one and a half to one. When the Engineer ordered the slopes reduced, I did it. Some of the cuttings I think, have been reduced from their original width. I have written instructions from the resident Engineer, about reducing the quantity of ballasting; I am not sure whether I have any written instructions

ordering a reduction in slopes. The reduction of slopes was staked out by the Resident Engineer. The Resident Engineer, Mr. Rankin's, instructions are here produced, and are as follow:—

"European & North American Railway, Engineer's Office, Passekvag, 13th Oct. 1859.

"Messrs. Johnston & Blackie, Section 7, Gentlemen,—It is the wish of the Chief Engineer, that only half the Schedule quantity of ballast be put on the Road this season. You will therefore have the goodness to direct your Foreman to put but six inches of ballast under the Sleepers, thus raising the track to within 8½ inches of permanent rail level, as marked by a red line on the stakes; the width must not exceed 12 feet on the average, at present. This order applies only to that portion of Section 7, east of Ossekeag Station.

I am Gentlemen, your obedient servant,

WM. H. RANKIN, Div. Engineer."

Putting the ballast on at two different periods in accordance with these instructions would cost a good deal more, because we have to put a running top on the Road with six inches of ballast, as well as if we had the whole quantity on; and it is worse to maintain the Road, because the frost and rains have a greater effect on six inches of ballast than they would have if the whole quantity was on. It is a material loss to us to be compelled not to finish the ballast. The Contract, I think, gives the Commissioners power to alter the work, but not without making good any loss to the Contractor according to the Contract. The Governor in Council has the power to suspend the work at any time. The Chief Engineer has the power to order the work done at such times and seasons as he may direct. When we got the notice above referred to, the time for completion of our Contract was not up. I had time to complete the work agreed for, but in consequence of receiving instructions to do extra work the time must be extended; I think both masonry and grading governs the completion of the Contract; If the work was increased I do not think that I would be obliged to complete the work in the time stipulated in the Contract. According to the spirit of the Contract I think I would have had time to complete the work. Mr. Johnston is referred to pages 151 and 152, Report of 1858, and read therefrom as follows: -- " For the simplification of the monthly measurements, it is understood that the various kinds of excavation will be classified under two heads, viz: Earth and Solid Rock, and paid for as such. Earth, comprising all material of every kind except solid rock. Solid Rock, comprising all rock in places which requires blasting, and all detached stones or isolated masses measuring more than five cubic yards." expense of maintaining the Road for twelve months after completion devolves on the Contractor.

Mr. Johnston reads the following letter from Mr. Rankin, the Divisional Engineer:—
"European and North American Railway Office, 24th Nov. 1859.

"Messrs. Johnston and Blackie, Gentlemen,—I beg to notify you that I will require six men with each Section Boss, to be exclusively employed keeping the track up for running, who must obey the instructions give by Mr. William Rannie the Trackmaster.

"I am your obedient servant,

WM. H. RANKIN, Div. Engineer."

Question by Mr. M'Adam.—When you got instructions last October from the Divisional Engineer not to finish the ballasting, could you have completed then?

Answer.—I think I could. To carry out the instructions contained in the two Letters of 13th October 1859, and of 24th November 1859, I think will involve an expense of above £500. I have frequently gone over the line. We were the original Contractors for Section 7; I have the original profile given to us to tender upon; we made out a tender from it. The quality of the material differed very much from that represented on the profile. The profile is produced. The cutting at Station 130 is marked on the profile to be "sand and gravel" and it turns out to be clay, very hard, mixed up with boulder stones. The cutting marked at Station 300 on the profile.

50

is also marked "sand"; it turned out to be rock and clay. The cutting at Station 340, marked on the profile to be "ballast," turned out to be clay, and such stuff as Mr. Light would not allow us to put on the Road for ballast. I now produce another profile which Mr. Blackie signed sometime after having received the Contract; I do not know how long after. We tendered on the first profile. On the second profile at Station 340, the cutting that was marked "ballast" on the first profile, is marked "gravel and clay" on the second. The cutting at Station 300, marked "sand" on the original profile, on the second profile the letter "Y" has been added to sand, making the word "sandy." The cutting at Station 130, on original profile marked "sand and gravel," is marked on the second profile, "sandy and gravelly earth." We were paid for erecting a temporary bridge over Patticake or Passekeag. When I applied for the girders, I was informed that they had been lost coming to this country, and in consequence it was necessary to erect a temporary bridge. I learned the loss of the girders from the resident Engineer. The temporary Bridge was ordered to be erected by the resident Engineer, and was to be so built as to serve as a staging to erect the girders upon. We had the Contract for building the bridge at Passekeag; we did not put the girders on; it was not included in our Contract. I do not know how the profiles are made out; I suppose they are made out from actual explorations. In our Section, test pits had been sunk to ascertain the nature of the material. The profile that we tendered upon was not a truthful representation of the work to be done, as it did not represent correctly the nature of the material to be excavated. I wish it distinctly understood that the amount for extra work which I am now about to state, is taken from Engineer's Returns, and not the actual amount of work done by us. For Station building, making Reservoir for water, and bringing the water down to the Tank House, amounts to something about £2,300 paid to us. The amount of our original Contract was £32,457 19 9, which does not include the Stations and sleepers, farm crossings, outfall drains, extra tracklaying for sidings, and other things which I do not recollect; and for these extras we have received about £9,800 or £10,000, beside the amount which we received for Station buildings. We offered to open the Road from commencement of Section 7, Hampton District, to the Depot opposite Hampton, for not to exceed £500. See Supplementary Report 1858, page 26.

Telegraphic Despatch to R. Jardine is here submitted, as follows, viz:—"To R. Jardine, Esquire, 30th May, 1859.—Track from commencement of Section 7 to Hampton Station, ready for traffic; shall we clear Road to-night. (Signed) Johnston & Blackie."

Station, ready for traffic; shall we clear Road to-night. (Signed) Johnston & Blackie."

Mr. Johnston is referred to Supplementary Report, 1858, page 27, and reads therefrom:—"The only extra work done under the above agreements was some "gulleting," tracklaying, and the purchase of timber for temporary bridges, most of which will be otherwise available. The expense has not yet been ascertained. As Section 7, from Groom's Cove to Hampton, was not required by contract to be completed before 1st November 1859, the same extra expense would have been needed to open it on 1st June as on 1st January."

I was an arbitrator in the case of M'Bean and M'Donald. The arbitrators had access to their books. I did not investigate the Books myself. I received a little amount of supplies from Jardine & Co. In April 1859, found that we were in debt to the amount of £2,400; the first thing I did was to go to Mr. Jardine's Store and pay him off what we owed him, about £40, for the firm. Mr. Blackie's private bill was about £60. We only purchased from Mr. Jardine when we could purchase from him as cheap or cheaper than elsewhere. If Mr. Jardine had not been Chief Commissioner we would have dealt more with him. I paid Mr. Jardine off so that we might feel quite independent of him. The amount of debt I think was contracted in consequence of the works we had on the Railway in New Brunswick having been misrepresented on the profile from which we made up our tender. We had a Schedulc of prices, and if on the profile sand was marked, and it turned out to be clay, we would only be paid as if it had been sand; but if it turned out to be rock, we would be paid at Schedule prices for rock. Mr. Jardine never talked to me about his private business. The original Contract for grading, masonry, and bridging, is dated 4th Mr. Johnston is referred to Supplementary Report 1858, page 6, and March 1858. reads therefrom, as follows:—"On the remaining seventy miles of Road let in November 1857, and October 1858, the Surveys having been carefully made, the location

location revised, and the quantities calculated by the new specification, there is no reason to suppose that the cost will exceed the estimate by more than the usual per centage."

ROBERT JARDINE SWOTH.

The Law says that the Engineer is under the direction of the Commissioners and receives instruction from them. The Law says that the Commissioners shall build the Railway by Tender and Contract, after the plans and specifications therefor have been duly advertised. I have acted in accordance with what the Commissioners considered the spirit of the Law.

Question.-Has not Mr. Brookfield done ballasting and tracklaying which has not

been duly advertised?

Answer.—The tracklaying from the Three Mile House to the end of Section 4, was advertised and let to Mr. Brookfield. I think the tracklaying in the Station ground, Saint John, was advertised and let to John Brookfield; 1 do not recollect of any other tracklaying he did, than what was done under these Contracts. The procuring of the gravel ballast for the nine miles from Saint John, was advertised and let to John Brookfield. The laying on of that ballast was done by John Brookfield, under an arrangement made with him by the Chief Engineer, as Contractor on Section 4, in virtue of a clause in the Contract which the Chief Engineer considered entitled him to make the arrangement. Brookfield I think put some ballast on the Station ground, which might or might not be included in the Contract. The tracklaying from Saint John to the Three Mile House was done in the Spring of 1857, previous to the opening on Saint Patrick's Day, and before any Commissioners were appointed. I never knew of any advertisement for that work, and think it was done either by day's work or private Contract; but as it was before my time, I have no positive knowledge on the subject.

Question.—Was not that portion of the track from Gilbert's Lane to the Three

Mile House, taken up afterwards by the present Commissioners.

Answer.—I think not; if it was taken up at all, it was by the former Commission-

ers. Mr. Jardine is referred to page 12, Supplementary Report 1858.

Question.—The Commissioners there state that they found the ballasting on Section 1, extending from the Mill Bridge to Moose Path, a distance of about three miles, completed; is that correct?

Answer.—I refer to page 14, same Report, and quote the following paragraph:—
"In the early part of last Summer it was thought advisable, for the purpose of finishing the ballasting, and as a saving of wear to the rolling stock, to put on a dressing of gravel, and on the 17th June, tenders to furnish gravel were advertised for."

Question.—Does not the paragraph just quoted, refer to the preceding paragraph

on same page?

Answer.—I think I intended it to refer to all; for this reason, that Section 1 had as much need of a dressing of gravel to make smooth running, as the other Sections; Section 1 was fully ballasted with stone ballast before then. There are two kinds of ballast—stone and gravel. Mr. Jardine is referred to page 16, Supplementary Report 1858.

Question.—It is there stated that the ballasting on these Sections has been done in a very thorough manner; was the ballasting on these Sections done in a very thorough manner with the two kinds of ballast referred to when this Report was made?

Answer.—That statement and Report were furnished to me by the Chief Engineer, and are quoted as such in the Supplementary Report of 1858, from the last paragraph on page 14, to the end of the statement on page 17; I believe, however, that the statement was substantially correct.

Question.—Has Mr. Brookfield received payment for any work between Gilbert's Lane and the Nine Mile House during the last year, or has he done any work there during that time?

Answer.—He has. He has cleared out some ditches and rebuilt a culvert that was too small, and done some other finishing work to a small extent.

Mr. Jardine is referred to Report 1858.

Question.—Can you point there to any money that was paid to Mr. Brookfield, from 31st October 1857 to 31st October 1858, on Sections 1, 2, 3, Saint John?

Answer.—On page 10, Report 1858, there is charged to John Brookfield, Abstract 1, sundry Contracts, the sum of £2,186 13 9, as payment on Station grounds and buildings, &c. Saint John, this I presume covers the work above mentioned.

Question .- Has there not been Cars and Locomotives built without having been

advertised for?

Answer.—The first Cars built, I think the year before last, were built by private contract, because I had great difficulty in getting any person in the Province to build them at all; since then the Cars have been advertised for and let by public competiton to the lowest bidder in the Province; the Locomotives that have been built in the Province have been by private contract, as I had to coax Fleming & Humbert to undertake them at American prices. I do not think it would be prudent to build Locomotives by taking tenders and giving them to the lowest bidder, as public safety might be thereby compromised. I am not aware that Locomotives are ever built by tender.

Question.—When was the tracklaying and ballasting the 28 miles from Sussex to

Salisbury advertised for ?

Answer.-The construction of that portion of the Road was advertised for in the Fall of 1858, and prices by tender were then taken for tracklaying and ballasting the same. William Stevens obtained one of the Sections; his price for tracklaying and ballasting was I think the lowest in the accepted tenders for all the Sections. As this ballasting had to be done by locomotive power, it was deemed right that one man should have the ballasting of all the Sections, and on the recommendation of the Chief Engineer and the Commissioners to the Government, a Contract was made with William Stevens in terms of his tender. The copy of the advertisement can be easily obtained. The Carleton Sentincl of the 18th September 1858, placed in Mr. Jardine's hands. I believe the following is a copy of the advertisement:-" European and North American Railway. Notice to Contractors-Sealed Tenders will be received at this office until Friday 8th October next, at noon, for the grading, masonry, and bridging, of that portion of the European and North American Railway between Sussex and Salisbury, a distance of 28 miles; the line will be laid out in seven Sections of about four miles each, for which separate tenders will be received; materials and plant of all kinds to be furnished by the Contractors. Tenders must be accompanied with names of responsible parties willing to become security for the performance of the Contract. The Commissioners do not bind themselves to accept the lowest tender. Plans, specifications, and forms of tender may be seen at the Engineer's Office on and after the 20th September; the line is favorably located and now ready for the examination of Contractors. By order of the Board.

Question.—Was there ever any advertisement for tracklaying and ballasting for the 28 miles from Sussex to Salisbury, let to Stevens?

Answer.—There never was any other advertisement for any portion of the construction of that 28 miles than the one copied above; but the forms of tender referred to in that advertisement, and which Contractors making tenders were required to fill up, asked for prices at which tracklaying and ballasting would be done by them if required.

Mr. Jardine is here referred to page 164 to 167 inclusive, Report 1858, and is as follows:—

Mr. Jardine is referred to page 27, Report 1858, and reads therefrom as follows:—
"The Contracts under which these works are being executed, (with some exceptions,) provide for the entire completion of the Railway, including grading, masonry, bridging and tracklaying, upon each Section, for a gross sum; the Contractors "maintaining" the works for a twelvemonth after their final completion; the Government finding iron rails, spikes, chairs, and iron girders for bridges, and the Contractors furnishing all other materials of every description; provision being made for additions and deductions by a Schedule of fixed prices, by which the contracting parties are bound, should any alterations in the alignment become necessary, by which the quantities or nature of the work would be unavoidably altered."

Question.—Is the specification on those 28 miles for grading, masonry and bridging, the same as on which 4 and 5, Salisbury, are let?

Answer.—I think they differ in some respects.

Mr. Jardine is shewn a copy of a Contract.

Question.—Is this a correct copy of the Contract on which Section 4, Salisbury, was let?

Answer.-I believe so.

March 26th, 1860.—Committee met.

Mr. Jardine states that before receiving directions from the Committee to produce the Books, the Accountant was engaged in making up a Return to an Address from the Legislative Council; that the Return will not be finished probably before Thursday next, after which time the Accountant will come up with the Books.

Mr. Jardine's evidence continued.—What is considered a full quantity of ballast, is by Mr. Light's Estimate, 4,350 cubic yards per mile, which will be from 20 inches to 2 feet in height I believe from the road bed; this may be either of broken stone or gravel. The track between Gilbert's Lane and Trafton's, that has been spoken of as not fully ballasted, was graded in the Winter of 1856-57, while the ground was frozen, and was ballasted in the following Spring with broken stone. This ballast

sunk very much into the Marsh, and had to be frequently renewed. I believe that there is much more than the full complement of ballast on this portion of the Road already, and I think it is now raised quite above the influence of frost. With reference to the tracklaying and ballasting on the 28 miles, I have to say that only the principal items of the work to be done were inserted in the advertisement for that or any other work. Fencing for instance, was included in that Contract, but was not mentioned in the advertisement. The advertisement referred to the form of Tender, which required to be filled up, and which showed all the items of the work in detail.

Question.—Why was the advertisement for the 28 miles, in October 1858, different

from the other advertisements for work done on Sections 5 and 6, Salisbury?

Answer.—The work advertised for was let in short Sections of 4 miles each, and it was deemed advisable that the tracklaying and ballasting should not be let with the other work on each of these Sections separately, but prices were asked for at which this work should be done if required.

Question.—Did you ever receive tenders from any person for those 28 miles track-

laying and ballasting?

Answer.—I think not; each person tendered separately for each Section.

Question.—Why was there nothing in specification of work advertised for in October 1858, about tracklaying and ballasting?

Answer.—That item, I presume, was omitted from the specification because it was not intended that it should be included in the contracts then about to be entered into.

Question.—Why in the tender for work advertised for October 1858, is tracklaying

and ballasting excepted ?

Answer.—For the reason above given it is marked as being excepted on the first page of the tender, but on the third page it is required that prices shall be given at which it shall be done if required.

Mr. Jardine is here referred to page 27, Report 1858, and reads as follows:—

"The Contracts under which these works are being executed (with some exceptions,) provide for the entire completion of the Railway; including grading, masonry, bridging, and tracklaying upon each Section, for a gross sum; the Contractors "maintaining" the works for a twelvementh after their final completion; the Government finding iron rails, spikes, chairs, and iron girders for Bridges, and the Contractors furnishing all other materials of every description; provision being made for additions and deductions, by a Schedule of fixed prices by which the contracting parties are bound, should any alteration in the alignment become absolutely necessary, by which the quantities or nature of the work would be unavoidably altered."

Question.—If deemed advisable that the 28 miles ballasting and tracklaying should

be done by one person, why was it not advertised in that way?

Answer.—The Commissioners considered that prices for that work having been obtained at public competition, the object of the law was fulfilled; they thought it for the interest of the Railway to accept the tender that had been given by William Stevens, it being the lowest, and he being in the opinion of the Chief Engineer, as stated to me by him, the best tracklayer amongst all the offerers; the Commissioners would not however have adopted this course without the sanction of the Government, which they obtained.

Question.—Has not the tracklaying done by Brookfield, Walkers, Myers, Johnston & Blackie, and King, such as the specification required, and such as ought to be done

on a first class road?

Answer.—I have received no official report to the contrary, that I recollect of; but I have been informed that Stevens was himself a practical tracklayer; and I have myself noticed that on his Section between Shediac and Moncton, you could tell by the smoothness of the running when you were on his Section.

Question.—When did you make this discovery?

Answer.—I think my attention was called to it both last Summer and the Summer before.

Question.—Is not the tracklaying between the Nine Mile House and Saint John such as is required for a first class Road?

Answer.—I believe it is.

Question.—Have the reductions of slopes and width of cuttings been done by order of the Commissioners?

Answer.

Answer.—I think all reductions have been made with the approval of the Commissioners. It is not likely that a direct order would be given in each case.

Question.—Will your Minute Book shew the date when orders were given to Mr. Light to make reductions in slopes and cuts?

Answer.—I think it is not likely, but I will look over it and ascertain.

Question.—Have you ever sent instructions to Barings or any other person in the old country within the last twelve months, to send out a lighter rail than that first intended, or such as has been used in the year 1858?

Answer.—The only rails ordered within the last twelve months, were the balance required to finish the Road, I think about 3,000 tons. I believe they were to be of the same pattern exactly, as the lot previously ordered. I have no recollection of any orders having been given to Barings or any other person to reduce their weights, but the correspondence respecting the make of the rails was conducted between Mr. Light and Mr. May, the person appointed to inspect them in England, and I cannot say what may have passed between them, but I have never heard of any such change. I refer to page 74, Report of 1858—Mr. Light's approximate estimate; I think the weight given there—63 lbs. to the yard, was the maximum weight. I think the specification on which they were made, required that they should be from 57 to 63 lbs. per yard, and rails always do vary in weight.

Question by Mr. Wright.—Was there a consulting Engineer appointed by the Government on the Road, to consult with the Chief Engineer to recommend any savings that could be made on the Road?

Answer .- There was.

Question.—Are you aware that any such saving was suggested and carried out, without a direct order from the Commissioners?

Answer.—I think there were several suggested by Mr. Parker, and which met with the approval of the Commissioners. I do not think there was any formal order given by the Commissioners; they were always willing to sanction any saving that could be made.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—Are you aware of any instructions given by Mr. Parker or Mr. Light to any of the Contractors to reduce the slopes or cuttings, without having been first laid before the Commissioners or the Chairman of the Railway Board?

Answer.—I am not aware of any, and have always endeavoured to keep myself informed of all that was going on. The inclination of the slopes would depend upon the nature of the soil and springs in each cutting, and it is not likely that the Commissioners would be consulted on every variation of slopes that would be required.

Question.—Do you believe that Messrs. Parker or Light made any important changes in the line without consulting the Commissioners?

Answer.-I do not think they did.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—What is the reason the Commissioners would not have adopted the course they did with reference to Stevens' Contract, without first having obtained the sanction of the Government?

Answer.—In all matters relating to letting of Contracts, and any thing beyond the usual routine, the Commissioners have been in the habit of consulting the Government in terms of 19 Victoria, Chapter 16, Section 13, which states as follows: "The Governor in Council may inspect all contracts and proceedings of the Commissioners, and examine their Accounts at all times." It was not quite clear to the Commissioners that they had a right to close this Contract with Stevens without the sanction of the Government, as there might be a doubt whether it was strictly in accordance with the Law.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—Do you believe that if you had advertised in the Summer of 1859 for the tracklaying and ballasting of the 28 miles, you would not have got it done cheaper?

Answer.—The fifth Section of the Railway Act provides that the Commissioners may accept the Tenders of any such Contractors as shall appear to them to be possessed of sufficient skill, experience, and resources to carry on the work. I do not believe that any Contractor of skill and experience would have taken the work lower than Stevens tendered for it. Before recommending the matter to the Government,

I looked through almost all the Tenders for tracklaying and ballasting on the whole Road, and I think his offer was among the lowest, if not the very lowest that that kind of work had ever been taken for on any portion of the Road.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh. - Had you any written authority from the Government

to give the Contract to Stevens?

Answer.—I think I submitted it in writing and got an answer in writing from the Provincial Secretary.

Question by Mr. M'Adam.—Have you been in the habit of trading with the Con-

tractors generally on the Railroad?

Answer.—When I took office I was a Partner in the Firm of Jardine & Co., and have not given up my connexion with the firm; some of the Contractors have very likely bought goods from the firm, as the doors are open to all who come to buy; but I have since I took office devoted my whole time, thoughts, and energies to the Railway, and have not given any attention to my private business; I have never asked a Contractor directly or indirectly to deal with my firm, or spoken to any of them a word in regard to my private business. Persons have on several occasions tried to broach the subject to me, and my invariable answer was, I have nothing to do with the shop. In one or two instances persons bidding for small Contracts have proffered to buy goods from me, in these cases I told them I would leave word at the store that goods should not be sold to them even for cash. I believe if I had not been Railway Commissioner the dealings of the Contractors with my firm would have been at least ten times what they have been, as in that case I would have imported goods, such as iron, powder, and implements, &c., to suit the Railway trade, which I have not done.

Question.—Do you know what gave rise to all these statements of your making so

much money out of the Contractors?

Tuesday, 27th March, 1860.—Committee met.

Mr. Jardine's evidence resumed.—In reply to the last question put to me yesterday, my answer is—That I have reason to believe that these and other such slanders were concocted by a band of hired moral assassins, circulated in the lowest haunts of vice, and published in Newspapers adapted by their low tone of morality and style of language for such circles. As I do not frequent such places, do not associate with such men, and carefully avoid contact with such Newspapers, I have no positive knowledge on this subject, and offer this merely as my opinion.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—What induces you to believe that the parties referred

to were hired, and by whom do you believe they were hired?

Answer.—Since I took office I have had occasion frequently to resist claims for money made for land damages, and on railway contracts, which naturally would give rise to feelings of disappointment and a desire to punish me for standing between them and what they considered their rights. As I have no means of identifying the anonymous writers, I have formed this opinion chiefly from inference, but without positive knowledge. In the way of hiring, I do not refer to the Press.

Question.—Have any of the Railway Contractors kept an open Account or had a

Credit Account with the Firm of Jardine & Co.?

Answer.—Very likely Contractors have bought from that firm on short credit.

Question.—Can you form any correct idea as to what amount?

Answer.—As I stated yesterday, I have since my connection with the Railway paid little attention to the business of the firm, and do not recollect having opened a Book during that time belonging to the firm. I warned my brother, who is my partner and takes sole charge of the business, to have as little dealings with the Contractors as possible, not to give them long credits, or allow them to get into debt; and I have reason to believe he acted on my advice. I do not know the particulars of any single Account with any of the Contractors.

Question.—Were you made aware by your brother, or in any other way, of the

amount of dealings of the Contractors with your firm?

Answer.—I see my brother almost every day, and cannot say positively what may have passed between us on that subject during the three years I have been in office; but I have a general idea that we spoke little on the subject, and that the amounts were never large, as I do not recollect ever to have had communication with any of the Contractors on the subject. I could not well have got the information from any other source.

Question

Question.—Has your brother ever consulted you in reference to crediting any Contractor?

Answer.—I think he has; and my answer to him as far as I recollect, invariably was—if I were you, I would not credit one of them.

Question by Mr. Wright.—Have there been at different times, attempts to throw the trains off the track, and what steps did you take to find out the guilty parties?

Answer.—I recollect three instances that were reported to me of such attempts having been made, the first two were by spiking broken chairs to the Rails at a curve near the Three Mile House, I think shortly after the line was open to the Nine Mile House in June 1858. These attempts were found out by the Trackmen before any accident occurred. I set a watch by the Police to find out but did not discover any of the guilty parties; the attempt was not repeated there more than twice. Again I think after the opening to Hampton it was reported to me that an obstruction was put on the line on Section 5, but I did not succeed in finding out the guilty party in this case either.

Question.—Do you think the present mode of paying the Appraisers a good one, and why?

Answer.—I think it was better that they should be paid by salary than for the work done, as in the latter case there might have been a temptation to get as much work as possible.

Question.—Have you as the Law requires obtained a certificate of the Engineer

before paying moneys to Contractors?

Answer.—To the best of my knowledge I have, excepting when the Engineer was absent from the City, in which cases the certificates were obtained on his return, or where there were Contracts which in the opinion of the Commissioners did not fall under his controul, such as cars, rails, chairs, &c.

Question.—Did you pay to Mr. Crosby the sum of £900, for work done on the

Hammond River Bridge, without the Chief Engineer's certificate?

Answer.—I did not; but Mr. Crosby might have thought so, as occasionally certificates came to me direct from the Chief Engineer, without passing through the Contractor's hands. In this instance, the monthly Estimate when first brought in, shewed little or nothing to Mr. Crosby for his month's work, and he complained that the Inspector, Campbell, had not made a proper measurement. I think two Engineers were sent out by the orders of the Chief Engineer, to re-measure the work and materials, and on their Report Mr. Light felt himself justified in giving a certificate for £900. I do not recollect a single instance in which money was paid to a Contractor when the Chief Engineer was in town, without his certificate being first obtained, or promised in a few cases where the Bank was about to close and the check might have been sent over while the certificate was being written.

Question.—As the Road has been located six months since, should not the services

of the Appraisers be discontinued?

Answer.—I think not, as land damages may yet arise from the operations of the Railway.

Question.—Why was it that such high rates of freight were paid for rails imported last Fall?

Answer.—The 3,000 tons ordered were contracted for to be delivered at Liverpool; 1,000 tons 1st September 1859, 500 tons by 15th September 1859, and 1,500 tons by 15th October 1859; these rails were shipped—627 tons on September 14, 758 tons October 15th, 900 tons November 10th, 804 tons December 7th; the rails not having been delivered at the time agreed upon, the Commissioners have claimed from the Contractors the loss arising from difference in freight and insurance arising from their breach of contract, and the claim is still in abeyance. Mr. Jardine is referred to Supplementary Report 1858, page 46. This Account was made up by Crookshank and Johnson, Clerks in the Railway Office under my supervision.

Question.—Does this Account shew a true state of the case, or was it made up in

such a way as to mislead the public?

Answer.—It was made up, as far as I know, with a full intention to give the most exact and full information to the public, and I knew of no question being raised as to this, until my attention was called to this Table last Fall by Mr. Reed personally, my

former

former Co-Commissioner. The first thing he called my attention to, was that on the third and fourth columns of the Table; there are dotted lines instead of ditto, ditto, as it should have been. I sent for the Printer, and was informed that he said that it had been his mistake in putting the dotted line in. Another alleged mistake pointed out by him, was that the Montezuma was engaged by William & Richard Scovil instead of by him. I referred to his letter to me, of the 9th April 1858, in which he states, "On the 23rd I wrote Messrs. Boyson, Hover & Taggard, to have a Vessel ready for the iron to go to Shediac by the 1st April. On 30th March they wrote me they were unable to procure a Vessel at such short notice. I tried my hand at the business; the first one I mentioned it to said he would take it. Mr. William Leavitt's Ship Montezuma being nearly ready, he went up to London and fixed." That paragraph led me to conclude that he had engaged the Vessel, and the Table was made up accordingly. The only other point that I recollect Mr. Reed called my attention to, was that in some of the shipments bridge materials were mentioned, and in others, girders; which he alleged conveyed an impression injurious to his reputation as affecting the freight paid to his Ships. I referred to the Bills of Lading, and found that the Clerk had copied the description of material from them.

Mr. Jardine is referred to Report, 1858, page 125.

Question.—What amount did Nelson Arnold receive for the Station ground at Sussex?

Answer.—It appears by this Table he received £72. Refers to page 58, Report 1859, where it is stated that he has since received for additional land £260, the last land taken I presume is on record.

Question.—Is the last land taken from Nelson Arnold nearest to the Station House or the Post Road?

Answer.—It is between the two, I do not know which it is nearest to.

Question.—I find by certified copy from Record of King's County that the consideration for the first piece of land is £87, what is the extra £15 for ?

The following is a certified copy from the Records of King's County, of land taken for Railway purposes from Joseph Siderquest, Joseph P. Siderquest, and Nelson Arnold:

Deed Registered the 24th day of June 1858. Dated 19th of June 1858. Consideration twenty five pounds.—Described Joseph Siderquest, To the Queen. as follows:—Beginning on the northeastern side line of Lot number seven. (7) at the northwestern side of the highway leading to the Patticake; thence by the magnet north forty degrees west on said side line eighteen rods, more or less, to the northwestern side of the said Railway; thence sonthwesterly by a line parallel to the centre of the said Railway thirty rods, more or less, to the northeastern side line of lands owned by Charles A. Everitt; thence south forty degrees east along the said side line twenty rods, more or less, to the before mentioned highway; thence north sixty two degrees thirty minutes east along the said highway thirty rods, more or less, to the place of beginning, containing three acres and one half an acre, more or less: Also a further piece of the said land beginning on the northwestern side of the said Railway, at the northeastern side line of lands owned by Charles A. Everitt; thence northeasterly by a line parallel to the centre of the said Railway two rods; thence north forty degrees west eighteen rods, more or less, to the proposed abutment of a Bridge across the Assacake Marsh and Creek; thence at right angles southwesterly to the before mentioned side line of lands owned by Charles A. Everitt; thence south forty degrees east eighteen rods, more or less, to the place of beginning; the last described piece of land to form a portion of a highway to connect the before mentioned Bridge across the Assacake Creek with the highway to Patticake; all which said lands shall be kept enclosed by the Commissioners for the construction of Railways, with good and sufficient fences; to have and to hold all the said lands hereby released, or intended so to be, unto Her Majesty the Queen, for Railway purposes, for ever.

Joseph P. Siderquest, 2 Dated the 5th day of July 1859. Registered the 7th day To the Queen. Deed. 5 of July 1859. Consideration twenty five pounds. — A certain piece or parcel of land of fifty feet square, as staked out by Engineer Rankin for a Reservoir for the European and North American Railway, the same being situate

in my field, in the Parish of Hampton, on the southerly side of the main highway, and distant therefrom three hundred and feet more or less, and in the vicinity of the Hampton Railway Station.

Nelson Arnold, Registered the 6th day of May 1858. Consideration eighty seven to the Queen. Spounds.—Beginning on the eastern side line of Lands owned and in possession of Isaac Bunnel, and on the centre line of the Railway; thence by the magnet north four degrees and thirty minutes east along said side line forty six feet three inches, or a sufficient distance to make forty three feet six inches at a right angle from the centre line of said Railway; thence north seventy four degrees and forty five minutes east, parallel to said centre line fifty three feet six inches; thence north four degrees and thirty minutes east one hundred and seven feet three inches to a post; thence north seventy four degrees and forty five minutes east, parallel to the centre line as aforesaid, twenty four chains and seventy four links, crossing a piece of land held by Alexander Shives for a road in the distance to a post; thence south fifteen degrees and fifteen minutes east one hundred feet, or to a point forty three feet six inches at a right angle from the centre line of the said Railway; thence north seventy four degrees and forty five minutes east five chains and thirty links to the eastern side line of the said Nelson Arnold's Lot; thence south five degrees west along said side line one hundred and five feet crossing the centre line of the said Railway, in the distance to a point fifty five feet six inches at a right angle from the centre line of the said Railway; thence south seventy four degrees and forty five minutes west, parallel to said centre line four chains and seventy two links; thence south four degrees and fifteen minutes east one hundred and sixty seven feet four inches to a post; thence south seventy four degrees and forty five minutes west. parallel to the centre line aforesaid twenty six chains and twenty eight links, recrossing the road held by Alexander Shives in the distance to a post; thence north four degrees and thirty minutes east one hundred and seventy four feet nine inches to a point fifty five feet six inches at a right angle from the centre line aforesaid; thence south seventy four degrees and fifty five minutes west, parallel to said centre line fifty three feet six inches to the eastern side line of Isaac Bunnel aforesaid; and thence along said side line north four degrees and thirty minutes east fifty nine feet, or to the place of beginning; containing fourteen acres, two roods and nine poles, more or less .--Dated the third day of May 1858.

I certify that the above is the description, with the price of all the land, deeded to the Queen for Railway purposes by Joseph Siderquest or Joseph P. Siderquest, and Nelson Arnold. All the other lands taken from the parties by the Commissioners, no price stated.

Answer.—The quantity originally bought from Nelson Arnold by me was 12 acres, at £6 an acre, £72. I find in this deed that the quantity taken is 14 acres, 2 roods, and 9 poles, which at the same rate is about £87. The 12 acres was bought without measurement in the Winter of 1857, and when it came to be surveyed I presume the quantity required was found to be about 141 acres as above.

Question.—Why is it stated in the Report of 1858 to be £72, when it appears £87

was paid?

Answer.-I cannot account for it at present.

Question.—From your own knowledge of the progress of the Railway from Saint John to Shediac, do you think the amount as estimated by the Chief Engineer in his final estimate of 6th February 1860, viz: £927,976, with fifteen per cent. added on that amount will be sufficient to complete the Road as stated in Report?

Answer.—I have no knowledge except from the information derived from others; but I think, if the work is conducted economically, that the amount named should

complete the Road.

Question.—From your knowledge of Mr. Light as an Engineer, and from three

years connection with him, do you place implicit confidence in his estimates?

Answer.—My experience has taught me to place implicit confidence in no estimates; but I believe Mr. Light, from my knowledge of him, would not wilfully and knowingly make a wrong estimate.

Question.

Question.—Are you satisfied with the manner in which the Chief Engineer has discharged his duties?

Answer.—I have not been satisfied with the fact that the cost is going to exceed the estimate, and have found out that Mr. Light has faults and failings like other men, and would, I think, build another Railway, from the experience he has acquired, cheaper than he has this one; but as the Government thought proper to employ a young Engineer, at a small salary, I do not think we have any right to complain.

Question.—Do you think that from either incompetency, want of knowledge, or

some other cause, Mr. Light has made the Road cost more than it ought?

Answer.—I have no right to judge of the first of those causes, not being qualified to form an opinion; as to the second, more experience would give more knowledge, and the want of that knowledge has no doubt caused loss.

Question.—Did you ever express dissatisfaction to the Government, or to any

Member of the Government, with reference to Mr. Light?

Answer.—I have never officially complained to the Government respecting him. In my almost weekly intercourse with Members of the Government respecting Railway matters, I have no doubt frequently expressed dissatisfaction at what I did not like.

Question.—Did you ever order work not to be done at Hammond River Bridge,

which Mr. Light afterwards ordered to be done contrary to your instructions?

Answer.—I have ordered work not to be done, which afterwards was done, and which I presume was ordered by Mr. Light.

Question.—Did Mr. Light consult you as to amount of per cent. he might add to

his estimate of 1858, for contingencies?

Answer.—He did not consult me beforehand that I recollect of, but he shewed me a rough draft of it, made up with I think 10 per cent. added to the whole amount. I pointed out to him that it would not do to add 10 per cent. to work already finished. He said I think, that it would require that to finish it, and I advised him to increase the per centage on the unfinished portion of the work, which would come to about the same thing.

Wednesday, 28th March, 1860.—Committee met.

Mr. Jardine's examination resumed.—With reference to the question asked yester-day respecting a sum of £87, being in Mr. Arnold's Deed of the Station Grounds as the consideration for 14½ acres of land at £6 an acre, while the Report of 1858 showed only £72 paid, I have to state that I am informed by Telegram from Saint John, that the receipt for the £72 is in Mr. Arnold's own haudwriting, and that the Bank check is for the same sum. I think the difference must have occurred in this way: Mr. Arnold must have inserted in the Deed the land taken for the track which he had previously signed the right of way Deed for; and as I had bargained with him that this should not be included, I probably objected to pay the sum named in the Deed. The Deed had been signed by his wife before he brought it down, so that the amount mentioned in the Deed could not be altered. Mr. Jardine having just received a telegraphic despatch, submits the same, which is as follows:—

"Whole tract, 14½ acres; 2½ fell upon land through which I had previously given right of way; I took pay but for 12 at £6."

N. ARNOLD.

Honorable Albert J. Smith, (not sworn.)

Question.-When in Saint John last Fall did you and other Members of the

Government examine all matters connected with Railway management?

Answer.—I, in association with other Members of the Government, I think Messrs. Brown, Fisher, and Connell, were not there. If I am not mistaken all the other Members of the Government were there when we commenced the enquiry. I think after about two days they all lest except Mr. Mitchell and myself; Mr. Watters remained in the City and was in attendance; we continued our examination I should think 10 or 12 days; our enquiry related as well to the management of the Works as to the claims of Contractors. I think all the Contractors who preferred claims were before us. I think we attended there at the request of the Chief Commissioner.

Question by Mr. Wright.—Will you state to the Committee whether after your examination you think there was any collusion with any of the Contractors and Mr. Light, or the Commissioners?

Answer.

Answer.—I can state, and that it was a very gratifying feature of our enquiry, that there was not only an entire absence of any evidence to shew fraud or collusion, but there was evidence to shew that there was not. My mind was particularly directed to that point, not because I had any suspicion of any person on the Road, but from what I had heard of frauds having been practiced in other countries, I was apprehensive that something of the same kind might have taken place here. We found the Chief Engineer and I think almost all the Contractors in antagonism. They were making claims for damages and extras, and he was resisting them.

Question by Mr. Wright.—After making the investigation do you think it was to the interest of the Province to retain Mr. Light as Chief Engineer until the Road was finished.

Answer.—I believe Mr. Light to be a clever man in his profession, but I think when he commenced this Road, being a young man, he had not that experience which he ought to have had to carry on so large and extensive a work. I had confidence in his integrity as an Engineer, and I am satisfied that there was no fraud between him and any of the Contractors; and I think I express the opinions of the other members of the Government who participated in the enquiry. At this time, there was existing in Saint John a good deal of prejudice against Mr. Light, arising from causes, many of which I think subsequently proved to be untrue. The question of Mr. Light's dismissal had the most anxious consideration of the Government; we considered under all the circumstances, that it would be decidedly to the interest of the Province to Mr. Light had initiated the work, and as it were, grown up with it; and possessed a vast amount of information which it was necessary for the Commissioners and Government to have, not only in regard to completing the work, but in settling claims of Contractors. I think Mr. Light has improved very much from the experience he has received here, and would finish the Road as well and as cheaply as any other person that could be got, with the knowledge and information he has acquired on the Road. Mr. Light was directed from time to time to build the Road as cheaply as possible, consistent with the public interest and safety. Mr. Parker, the consulting Engineer, I think generally approved of what Mr. Light had done; I think he suggested some alterations, which were adopted.

Question.—Did you in your examination compare the monthly estimates of the

Divisional Engineers with the monthly estimates of the Chief Engineer?

Answer.—I cannot say particularly. We did not compare all these estimates; whenever there was a dispute or doubt about a matter brought to our notice by the Chief Commissioner we investigated, and did what we believed to be right.

Question.—Did you compare the Chief Engineer's morthly Certificates with the

Entries of Cash paid Contractors?

Answer.—We ascertained the amount that had been received by the Contractors, and compared that with the work which had been done, with a view to ascertain whether there was any thing due them, and did not examine any entries in Cash Book at all. I think some changes had been made by Mr. Light's directions, which, if he had had more experience, might not have been necessary. The alterations in the grade on Sections 4 and 5, I think, was a benefit to the Road. I think the principle dispute between the Chief Engineer and the Commissioners was as to the time the grade was altered on Sections 4 and 5.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—Was there any dispute between the Commissioner

and Chief Engineer about Hammond River Bridge?

Answer.—I cannot recollect any particular point of dispute about any alteration in Hammond River Bridge; there was a great deal said about this Bridge, and our principle object in this was to ascertain whether there was any thing due to Mr. Crosby. Mr. Jardine complained to us of Mr. Light making some alterations without first consulting him. My own opinion is, and has been, that a Railroad to answer the circumstances of our country might have been built for less money, and my desire and object was to have it built as cheap as possible.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—Do you think that you examined the Books and Accounts, and progress of the work on the Road, sufficiently to enable you to arrive

at any conclusion as to cost of Road when completed?

Answer.—I did not examine the Books and Accounts particularly; we ascertained from Mr. Jardine how much had been expended, and from my own knowledge I

cannot

cannot say how much it will cost to finish the Road. I have always been fearful that it would cost as much as a million of money currency. I think the cost of the Road was discussed at the time of the enquiry, and the opinion was, I think, that it would cost about a million of money; I think this was the opinion of the Chief Engineer at that time.

THOMAS A. WALKER, SWORN.

I and my brother had a Contract for Section No. 5, Salisbury; it was to be finished I think, 1st November 1859. I have not the Contract now; I believe Mr. M'Bean has it. It was taken out of our hands by the Government; the amount of that Contract was between £25,000, and £26,000. Mr. Walker is here referred to page 24, Report 1859. I anticipated having the work in a more forward state than it is here reported to be, had not the Contract been taken from us. £8,875 was the amount reported by the Chief Engineer to have been performed by us on this Contract up to 31st December 1858. The Contract work on that Section ceased on that day; while this work was being measured and valued, we continued in possession of the Contract, and were paid the men's wages for the month of January 1859, £712.

Thursday, 29th March, 1860.—Committee met.

Thomas A. Walker resumed.—On reference to papers, I find the whole amount for the month of January, wages and powder, £730 4 7. We have received on this Section, (No. 5, Salisbury,) within a few pounds of £14,000. (A paper is here put into Mr. Walker's hands, signed by W. J. Croasdale.) He is the divisional Engineer at Moncton; every divisional Engineer signs the Estimates. This paper purports to be a monthly statement of work done on No. 5, Salisbury; the value of work as reported on this Estimate, less 10 per cent. is £19,621 10 4. The amount reported by this Estimate as having been paid, £22,621 16 3; this sum appears by this paper to have been paid to Alexander M'Bean. We have had the use of Locomotives and Cars from the 1st November 1858 to 1st November 1859; two or three Locomotives all the time. We were charged for Locomotives and Cars, from 1st November 1858 to 1st November 1859, on Sections 5 and 6, something under £1,100.

Alexander L. Light recalled.—Mr. Light is referred to page 13, Report of 1858, and asked the following question:—The Commissioners state they have every reason to believe that the final cost of the Road will not exceed the sum of £927,976, in which estimate there is included, as appears from Table A No. 1, page 72, £50,853 for Contingencies, viz: 15 per cent. on £339,026. Did you wish to add a larger per centage for Contingencies?

Answer.—I did wish to insert a larger per centage, and was loth to put in so small a one. The Chief Commissioner and myself had several anxious conversations on the subject. I was reconciled to inserting so small an amount, as we both agreed to economize in every possible way generally, and particularly by omitting altogether or largely reducing the ballasting, the width of some of the embankments from 20 feet to 18 feet, and by inserting Platforms instead of Stations on the remainder of the work. By this means I hoped that the amount stated for contingencies might approximate to completion.

Question.—Would you have inserted a larger amount if you had not been interfered with?

Answer.—I should.

Question.—Can you state what amount?

Answer.—I cannot state what amount exactly I would have put in.

Question.—Have the Commissioners supported Contractors contrary to your wishes?

Answer.—Never but in one instance.

Question.—Can you name the instance?

Answer.—Messrs. Walker, Saint John District, Sections 5 and 6, as nearly as I remember.

Question.—Can you assign any reason why Commissioners did so?

Answer.—They considered the matter carefully, and being of opinion that the terms of the Contract not having been fulfilled on the part of the Province, they reluctantly sustained

sustained them, (the Messrs. Walker) I differed with them in opinion at the time, and if I had had sole control, I should have discharged them from the Works, as I was of opinion then and am so now, that they were very inefficient, and made their works cost from 10 to 20 per cent. more than they should do; considering the matter in all its bearings I afterward agreed with the Commissioners and the Government, that under all the circumstances they could not do better than to sustain them. I further state that this matter I believe had the very anxious consideration of both the Government and the Commissioners.

Question.—Have any reductions of cuttings or embankments been made on Section No. 7, by order of Commissioners, which are injurious to Road without reducing its cost? Answer.—I am not aware of any reductions of cuttings or slopes on Section No. 7 having been made by order of the Commissioners.

Question.—Did you, as Chief Engineer, superintend the construction of line from Shediac to Moncton?

Answer .- 1 did.

Mr. Light is here referred to Table A No. 3, page 73, Report 1858, and the following question is put.—You state there that the cost of Road is £6,485 per mile: Can you assign any reason why the line from Saint John to Moncton cost so very much more per mile?

Answer.—One reason, and the principal one is, that stations, rolling stock, and land damages, are not charged in that Account, Table A No. 3.

Question.—Is this the only reason?

Answer.—As these works were carried on principally under my own supervision, I decline given any other reason.

Question.—Is this the only reason you can assign for increased cost?

Answer.—The works on that division are not of so expensive a character as the works on the rest of the Road; the masonry is not so good; the bridges, built by myself, are all of wood, and the stations, by way of economizing, were compiled from buildings erected by Jackson & Co., arranged in position, and finished off in their present shape; all these items will make a difference in cost of work. There is one iron girder bridge on this division; it was not designed by me, but was completed by me, and its cost is included in Table A No. 3; it is not so expensive as the Hammond River Bridge. The Bridges on that division I do not think would be a fair average cost of bridges on the rest of the line. Mr. Light is referred to Journals House of Assembly 1859, Appendix Dvi, and reads as follows:—"2nd, Superior Bridging, and 3rd, the addition of six under and over Bridges in the Town of Moncton, not contemplated in the original specifications, substituted for level crossings. 4th. The addition of a Track or extension of the Railway three quarters of a mile to the wharves at Moncton." I think the word superior has reference to comparison of works as done to what was intended to be done by Jackson & Co.

Question.—Do you believe that the interference of the Commissioners with you as Chief Engineer, has added to the cost of construction of the line from Saint John to Moncton?

Answer.—I object to answer this question, as it would be merely putting my own opinion against the opinion of the Commissioners. The Commissioners act under the Law, and I am under their directions, and have in every instance acted under and carried out their orders and management; and therefore whatever the results may be, I conceive that they are the responsible parties.

Question by Mr. Williston.—If the control and management of the Road as to construction from Saint John to Moncton had been conducted under your sole management, the same as from Moncton to Shediac, would not the Road have been constructed at a much cheaper rate?

Answer.—I think it would, but this is merely my own opinion.

Question by Mr. Williston.—Was your superintendence interfered with so as to cause extra expense?

Answer.—As I read the Law I consider the Commissioners had a perfect right to order and manage the works as they pleased, and they have several times told me so, which of course I acquiesced in, properly conceiving them to be, as they themselves often stated, responsible to the country. Assuming them to be responsible, I do not consider

consider that they unnecessarily interfered. On the other hand, if they proposed to hold me responsible, I am of opinion that they did interfere far too much. As regards their interference causing extra expense, it is a matter of opinion; and it is my opinion that it did.

Mr. Light is referred to copy of Letter from R. Jardine to Robert Reed, in Debates of House of Assembly 1860, page 12, dated 29th December 1857, and quotes as follows:—"This will bring the 40 miles completed at under £5,000 currency per mile, including rails and sleepers. As the remaining 30 miles are much easier, I have no doubt the whole Road will be completed at £6,000 currency per mile."

Question.—Was the information referred to in this letter as to the cost of line,

furnished by you?

Answer.—I do not remember any thing about it; I never heard of it until now.

A paper is handed to Mr. Light, and he is asked if it is the Contract of William Stevens for the 28 miles, Sussex to Salisbury?

Answer.-I think it is.

The following is the Contract:-

NEW BRUNSWICK RAILWAYS, 18

European and North American Railway Contract, Section No. -

Articles of Agreement made and entered into this sixteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, and made in pursuance of the Act of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, to authorize the construction of Railways in the said Province, in duplicate between William Stevens, Railway Contractor, of Salisbury, in the Province of New Brunswick, of the first part, and Her Majesty Queen Victoria, represented herein by Robert Jardine, Chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners of the Province of New Brunswick, appointed under

Act of Assembly, 19 Victoria, Cap. 15, of the second part:

Witnesseth, that the said party of the first part, for and in consideration of the payments to them in hand well and truly made, as hereinafter set forth by the said party of the second part, do hereby for himself, his heirs, executors, administrators, and assigns, covenant, promise, and agree to and with Her said Majesty Queen Victoria, Her heirs and successors, represented herein as aforesaid, to construct, build, complete, and finish in a good, substantial, and workmanlike manner, under the superintendence of the Chief Engineer appointed under the said Act, and in every respect to the satisfaction of the said Board of Commissioners, and the said Chief Engineer for the time being, all the work contained from Section No. 10 to 16 inclusive, on the Sussex and Salisbury divisions of the European and North American Railway, commencing at a Station numbered two thousand two hundred and sixty seven, and extending to a Station numbered three thousand seven hundred and seventy seven, being a distance of twenty eight miles, one thousand and forty six yards, more or less, according to the Specifications and Plans hereunto annexed and referred to, and to provide all necessary plant and materials therefor, of the very best description, and to do all said work, and to provide all said plant and materials, subject to the inspection, supervision, approval, and rejection of the said Chief Engineer, and upon the terms and conditions hereinafter specified.

The whole ballasting to be completed and finished, and in every respect ready for use, on or before the first day of September one thousand eight hundred and sixty, and to be conducted and carried out upon the terms, conditions, and stipulations hereinafter specified, and which terms, conditions, stipulations, specificatious, and plans are to be considered in every respect as part and parcel of the Contract.

In consideration whereof, Her said Majesty Queen Victoria, represented as afore-said, doth promise and agree to pay to the party of the first part, the rates and prices mentioned in the Tender attached, of the lawful currency of New Brunswick, the said sum to be paid, the part of the first part by monthly instalments as the work proceeds, according to the rates and prices in the Tender and Schedule herewith attached:—

TENDER FOR CONTRACT.

To the Chief Commissioner of the European and North American Railway.

Sir,—I do hereby offer to contract for the construction and completion of the track-laying, ballasting and lifting from Section 10 to 16 inclusive, on the Sussex and Salisbury districts of the European and North American Railway, to furnish all plant, haul materials, and all things requisite for the due completion of the same, on or before the first day of September, and consider the prices as separately enumerated in the Schedule of Quantities hereto attached, and to which I have affixed my name, as sufficient compensation for the completion of the work in accordance with the plans and specifications which were exhibited to me in the Engineer's office, and which I have carefully examined; and should any addition or diminution be considered expedient, such addition or diminution shall be regulated by my Schedule of Prices.

And should my Tender be accepted, I hereby bind myself, when called upon, to sign a contract, together with the plans, specifications, bills of quantities, &c., and all papers requisite thereto.

CONDITIONS.

Materials.—Firstly, That the party of the first part shall receive and use in the work herein contracted for, such timber, iron, stone, cement, or lime, and other materials, as shall be furnished by the said Commissioners, and allow therefor such sum or sums of money as the Engineer may deem equitable, provided the same is not included in Schedule of Prices attached to this Contract, and that the amount thereof shall be deducted from the amount of work done under this contract.

Work to be done according to Specification.—Secondly, The constructing and finishing of said work is to be done in all respects according to the directions and instructions contained in, which may be implied from, or are incidental to the specifications hereunto annexed, and any plan or plans referred to in the said annexed specifications; which specifications and plan or plans therein referred to, are hereby mutually agreed and declared to be incorporated in and form part of this Contract.

Payments.—Thirdly, The payments of the prices hereinbefore mentioned shall be made monthly by the said Commissioners upon Certificate being received by them from the Chief Engineer, and approved of, that the work for or on account of which such payments shall be claimed, has been duly and faithfully executed; such certificate to be given by the Chief Engineer within ten days after he shall have received an estimate from his assistant Engineer, or Officer in charge of the work, specifying the

Retained Money.—But that, nevertheless, it shall be lawful for Her said Majesty to withhold from the party of the first part, and retain 10 per cent. out of the amount of the estimates until the perfect completion of the work to the satisfaction of the said Commissioners, which 10 per cent. so withheld and retained, shall be paid with the last instalment, after the Engineer or Officer in charge shall have delivered to the Chief Engineer his final estimate of the work performed and materials furnished in virtue of these presents, with detailed measurements, weights, &c., and upon approved Certificate by the said Chief Engineer, of the work having been fully completed and finished; provided, that in forming his final estimate, the Engineer or other Officer, shall not be bound or governed by the preceding monthly estimates, which shall be taken and considered merely as approximate; provided always, and it is further agreed, that Her said Majesty, from time to time by the said Commissioners during the progress of the work, may pay to the party of the first part, the whole or any portion of the 10 per cent. so withheld and retained.

Work not to obstruct adjoining Contracts.—Fourthly. That the work hereby contracted for to be done by the party of the first part, shall as far as may be required by the said Engineer, be prosecuted so as to facilitate and not to incommode or obstruct the prosecution of Contracts for adjoining or contiguous works.

Work to be prosecuted as the Engineer directs.—Fifthly, That this Contract shall in every respect be prosecuted in such order and in such places in the work, and at such times and seasons as the Chief Engineer shall direct.

Chief

Chief Engineer may take from Contractor, and re-let the same.— Sixthly, That if by report of the Engineer or Superintendent employed by the Commissioners in that behalf, it shall appear that the es ablishment and rate of progress at and in the said work, are not such as to insure the completion of the same within the time herein prescribed, or if the party of the first part shall persist in any course violating the provisions of this Contract, Her said Majesty shall have the power at her discretion, by order of the said Board of Commissioners, without previous notice or protest, and without process or suit at law, either to take the work or any part thereof, out of the hands of the party of the first part, and to re-let the same to any Contractor or Contractors without its being previously advertised; or to employ additional workmen, and provide materials, tools, and other necessary things, at the expense of the party of the first part; and the party of the first part in either case, shall be liable for all damages and extra costs, and expenditure which may be incurred by reason thereof, and shall in either of such cases, likewise forfeit all moneys then due under the conditions and stipulations, or any or either of them herein contained.

Failure in Contract.—Seventhly, That in case of sailure in the Contract, the party of the first part shall thereby sorfeit all right and claim to the said ten per cent. or any part thereof remaining unpaid, as well as to any moneys whatever due on this Contract.

All Work and Materials to be inspected.—Eighthly, That all work of every description may be inspected during construction, either by the Chief Engineer or such Officer as he from time to time may appoint to superintend the same, and should any work be disapproved of, it shall immediately be removed or taken down, and replaced by such as shall be satisfactory to the Engineer or Officer in charge. And no further Estimate shall be made upon the same Section, so long as any work shall remain imperfect; and any omission to disapprove of any work at the time of a monthly Estimate being made, shall not be construed to be acceptance of any defective work; likewise any material disapproved of shall not be used in the work, and if not removed by the party of the first part, when directed by the Chief Engineer or person in charge, then the rejected materials shall be removed by the aforesaid Chief Engineer or person in charge, to such place as he may deem proper, at the cost and charge and at the risk of the party of the first part. And it is hereby expressly declared and agreed by and between the parties hereto, that all materials of every nature and description, and the property therein which from time to time may be procured and furnished by the said party of the first part, to be used in and about the construction of the said works hereby contracted for, so soon as the same shall be inspected, approved of, and marked by the Chief Engineer or his Officer for the time being in charge of and superintending the said works, shall absolutely vest in Her Majesty the Queen, and the same may be included in the Estimate of the Engineer or Officer in charge; all which materials so inspected, approved of, and marked, shall not thereafter in any way be liable or subject to the debts, contracts, or engagements, or otherwise affected by any act of the said party of the first part, to the prejudice of the said party of the second part. But it is distinctly understood and agreed, that the inspection and approval of materials shall not in any way subject Her said Majesty to pay for the said materials or any portion thereof, unless employed or used in the said works, norprevent the rejection afterwards of any portion thereof which may turn out to be unsound or unfit to be used in the work, nor shall such inspection be considered as any waiver of objection to the work on account of the unsoundness or imperfection of the materials used.

Contractor to dismiss workmen, &c.—Ninthly, That, in the opinion of the Engineer, should any overseer, mechanic, or workman, employed on or about the work, give any just cause of complaint, the party of the first part shall immediately upon the application of the Chief Engineer, or person in charge, dismiss such person or persons forthwith from the works, and he shall not be employed again thereon without the consent of the Chief Engineer; and should the party of the first part continue to employ such overseer, mechanic, or workman, the party of the first part shall forfeit to Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Successors, the sum of five pounds current money aforesaid, for each and every day during which such overseer, mechanic, or workman, shall be employed on the works after such application as aforesaid; and all the sums so forfeited, shall be deducted from and out of the amount which the party of the first

part may be entitled to receive from Her said Majesty at the commencement of the month next ensuing such forfeit, or at a later period, as Her Majesty may deem proper.

Engineer to determine quantities, interpret Specifications, &c.—Tenthly, That to prevent all disputes, it is hereby mutually agreed that the Chief Engineer for the time being shall, in all cases, determine the amount or quantity of the several kinds of work which are to be paid for under this Contract, and the amount of compensation, at contract prices, which are to be paid therefor; and also, that the said Engineer shall, in all cases, decide as to the construction to be put upon any part of the plans or specifications, or any other question which can or may arise relating to the execution of this Contract, and his measurements and decisions shall in all cases be conclusive and binding between all parties, subject however to the final approval of the said Commissioners.

Eleventhly, That if any change or alteration, either in the position or details of any part of the work, shall be required by the said Chief Engineer during the progress thereof, the party of the first part is hereby bound to make such alterations or change; and if alteration or change shall entail extra expense on the said party of the first part, either in labour or materials, the same shall be allowed the said party of the first part; or should it be saving to the said party of the first part, either in labour or materials, the same shall be deducted from the amount of this Contract; in either case the amount is to be determined by the estimate made by the Engineer or Officer in charge; but no such change or alteration, whatever may be the extent or quality thereof, or whatever time the same may be required to be made pending the said Contract, shall in anywise have the effect of suspending, superseding, annulling or rescinding this Contract, which shall continue to subsist notwithstanding such change or alteration, and every such change or alteration shall be performed and made by the said party of the first part, under and subject to the conditions, stipulations and covenants herein expressed, as if such change or alteration had been expressed and specified in the terms of this Contract; and should the said party of the first part be required by Her Majesty, represented as aforesaid, to do any work, or furnish any materials, for which there is not any price specified in this Contract, the same shall be paid for at the estimated prices of the Engineer, subject to the approval of the said Commissioners; but no change or alteration as aforesaid whatever, and no extra work whatever, shall be done without the written authority of the Engineer in charge, given prior to the execution of such work, nor will any allowance or payment whatever be made for the same in case it should be done without such authority. All bills for extra work, when ordered by the Engineer, must be returned monthly, or within one week from any time that they may be called for by him; failing so to do, payment of them shall be discretionary with the said Commissioners.

Ardent Spirits.—Twelfthly, That the party of the first part, will not by himself or his agents, give or sell any ardent spirits to his workmen, or any other person on or near the said work, or allow any to be brought on the work by labourers or other persons.

Work not to be sub-let.—Thirteenthly, That the party of the first part shall not in any way dispose of, or sub-let, or re-let any portion of the work embraced in this Contract; but the whole shall be done by labourers under his immediate superintendence, with the exception of procuring materials.

Serving Notice.—Fourteenthly, That any Notice or other paper connected with these presents, which may be required or desired on behalf of Her said Majesty, to be served on the party of the first part, may be addressed to the party of the first part at his residence, or usual place of business, or at the place where the work hereby contracted for is carried on, and left at the Post Office in Saint John or Salisbury; and any paper so addressed and left at the Post Office, shall to all intents and purposes be considered legally served.

Non-completion of work within time specified.—Fifteenthly, That should the party of the first part not complete the work herein contracted for, at the period agreed upon as above mentioned, the said party of the first part shall be liable for and shall cause to be paid to the party of the second part, all salaries of wages which shall become due to the person or persons superintending the work, on behalf of the said Chief Engineer, from the above named period for completion, until the same shall be completed and received.

In

In case the Chief Engineer permits Contractor to proceed with work if not completed within time specified.—Sixteenthly, That in case it shall happen that the said party of the first part shall not fully complete the work herein agreed for within the time hereinbefore specified, the said Commissioners may, if they shall think fit, permit the said Contractor to proceed with and complete the said work as if such time had not elapsed; and that in such case, such permission shall not be deemed to be a waiver in any respect of any forfeiture or liability for damages, or expenses otherwise incurred by said Contractor in consequence of such failure to complete this Contract within such time, or incurred by him under any of the stipulations or provisions contained in this Contract, or in the annexed specifications; but this present Contract and every such forfeiture and liability so incurred, shall still continue in full force against such Contractor, as if such permission had not been granted; and the said work shall in such case be performed, completed, and paid for, in every respect according to the terms, stipulations, and conditions contained in this Contract, and in the specifications annexed, subject to the same forfeitures, liabilities and deductions, as are herein mentioned, which had been incurred by virtue hereof before such permission, and subject also to such forfeitures and liabilities, and the deduction of all such costs and expenses as shall or may, by the decision of the Chief Engineer, have been incurred after such permission, by reason of the non-completion of such work within the time hereinbefore specified for its completion, or by reason of the breach by such Contractor of any of the stipulations contained in this Contract, or in the annexed Specifications.

Discharged Men.—Seventeenthly, That the party of the first part shall not hire any men that may be in the employ of, or have been discharged for misconduct, from any other Section of the work, unless by consent of the parties who discharged them. It is likewise distinctly understood, that the Contractors themselves will make such arrangements as shall establish a uniform rate of wages throughout the works, and that such arrangements shall not be departed from, except by a majority of the other Contractors.

Eighteenthly, That the said party of the first part shall pay all labourers in his employ, monthly, and in case of failure of the party of the first part so to do, the said Commissioners shall have full right and authority to retain in their hands, for the payment of the workmen employed by the said party of the first part on any work hereby contracted for, such an amount of any monthly Estimate, as the said Engineer may report to be requisite for that purpose; and the said Commissioners may adopt such measures for the disbursement of such retained money, as they may consider the most judicious for the interest of all parties concerned.

Suspension of work.—Nineteethly, It is hereby also expressly conditioned and understood that the Governor in Council may suspend the progress of the said works hereby agreed for, or any part thereof, according to the provisions of Act of Assembly 19 Victoria, Cap. 15, intituled "An Act to authorize the construction of Railways in this Province;" and in case the execution of this Contract shall be suspended as aforesaid, at any time and for any cause, no claim for prospective profits on work not done, shall be made or allowed, but such an allowance for actual expenses incurred, as the said Commissioners, upon the report by the said Chief Engineer, may deem fair and reasonable, which amount, when settled by the said Commissioners, shall be conclusive upon all parties; but the party of the first part shall have the right to complete the work when the party of the second part shall order it to be resumed.

SPECIFICATION FOR TRACKLAYING.

The Track will be laid in the most approved manner, and in accordance with the Drawings.

The Contractor is to furnish all the labour and tools necessary, with the exception of the gauges, and three dozen shims for expansion. He must do all the work under the especial direction of the Inspector appointed by the Chief Engineer, who will take

the management and direction of the work, and it must be done to his entire satisfaction; or if the Engineer shall think the Contractor has not sufficient skill or inclination to execute the work properly, then in that case the Contractor shall merely furnish labour, tools, and materials, and the Inspector shall have the sole charge of the workmen, and execute the work under his own management.

The sleepers, spikes, and prepared Iron rails, will be furnished by the Government. The sleepers and iron rails will be delivered at the Depot at Sussex, and somewhere near the western end of Section 5, Salisbury District, and must be conveyed from

thence to their destination by the Contractor, free of extra charge.

The net quantity of spikes and chairs will be delivered to the Contractor at the above mentioned places, and the Contractor will be held responsible for any waste or deficiency, and the Contractor must take particular care to select such chairs as will fit each rail, there being a considerable difference in the sizes; any chairs broken from a neglect of this precaution, will be charged against the Contractor.

Nine sleepers will be laid under each pair of twenty one feet rails, exactly parallel and equi-distant; the largest hacmatac sleepers must be reserved for the joints, on which the cast iron chairs are to be carefully bedded, the upper surface of the sleepers

being adzed off to a templet, to receive them.

Care must be taken over all the Sections, to reserve and carefully distribute a portion of hacmatac sleepers sufficient to lay one hacmatac not less than 11 inches wide at each joint, and two intermediates,—three to every length of rail,—every third sleeper being a hacmatac.

The expense of this selection and distribution shall be paid for extra, at the Engi-

neer's Estimate.

The sleepers must be carefully lined from one side, the web of the rail being uniformly eighteen inches from the end of the sleeper.

The track must be laid exactly to centres given by the Engineer or Inspector, and

bedded with the formation level.

Great care must be taken to keep all the joints of the iron exactly opposite to one another; not more than 1½ inches difference will be admitted in passing around a curve. When the outside rail gets more than 1½ inches behind, it will be brought ahead by inserting a 21 feet 3 inch rail, and care must be taken to select and point the ends of such a proportion of these long rails from the piles as will carry the track properly around all the curves, without cutting the iron. From a deficiency of rails, or other causes, should rails require cutting, they will be cut by the Government.

Three dozen expansion irons, of 1-S and 1-16 of an inch in thickness, must be furnished by the Contractor, and not less than ten of them kept on the track at a time, measuring from the last rail laid, and the ends of rails must be kept close up to them, as no more than the requisite expansion will be allowed, viz. 3-16 being used in cold,

1-8 in cool, and 1-16 in warm weather.

All the spiking, both at the joints, middle, and intermediates, must be done with an approved permanent clasp gauge, two of which will be furnished by the Government as patterns by which all the rest must be made.

Great care must be taken to lay all the rails with the bevel inclining inwards; if any are put in wrong, the Contractor must remove them immediately, and he shall be

charged with the spikes damaged.

In driving the spikes, the Contractor must be careful to drive them true and plumb and properly home into the web of the rail; no bent or goose-neck spiking will be permitted, and when such occurs, they must be withdrawn, and fresh supplied at the expense of the Contractor.

The work to be done always at such points only as shall be permitted and pointed out by the inspecting Engineer, and prosecuted as fast as the grades is completed, and proceeded with at such rates as will insure the whole being laid, including the necessary sidings, on or before the 1st day of July 1860.

Should the rails not be delivered by the 1st October 1859, an additional month shall

be added to the time of completion for every month's delay after that period.

Where points and crossings are necessary the Government will furnish all the iron work, including the crossing guard rails and switch work; the Contractor will provide switch frames and lay in the work complete for the bulk sum in his Tender.

The ballast shall be the best material that can be found in the neighbourhood, and such as shall be approved of by the Engineer; it shall be laid on at a certain price

The Contractor is to state in his Tender the price per lineal yard of track laid.

The tracklaying (exclusive of the ballasting and lifting) to be completed as fast as the grading is completed; the whole to be finished on or before the first day of July 1860.

The ballasting to be finished on or before the first day of September 1860.

Question.—What was the date of the Tender? Answer.—The Tender does not appear to be dated. Question.—Who is the security for this work?

Answer.—I am not aware who the security was; I understood security was given for his Contract, Section 14. His Schedule of prices for this work, the tracklaying and ballasting having been adopted and accepted, further security was unnecessary. There is no Schedule of prices in this Contract, with the exception of tracklaying and ballasting; this is not the Schedule I referred to above. I conceive that it was unnecessary to have made this Contract, as his Schedule prices for Section 14 would have sufficiently covered the whole ground. The prices named in this Contract are 11d. per lineal yard for tracklaying, and 1s. 9d. per cubic yard for ballasting, including hauling and spreading. The total amount of Contract will be governed by the work done, which is optional with the Commissioners.

Question.—In Stevens' Contract, Section 14, is not the tracklaying and ballasting

excluded?

Answer.—I think there is a clause to that effect in the specification, and also in the

Question.—Do you believe that you could hold sureties responsible for tracklaying and ballasting of 28 miles, namely 7 Sections, on a Bond signed by them as surety for the grading and masonry of one Section, the tracklaving and ballasting of which is

excluded from specification, tender, and Contract?

Answer.—This being a legal question, I decline to answer. I cannot say when the Contract was signed, but suppose it was the day it bears date. I cannot say if it was the day Stevens concluded the Contract, but think it was. W. J. Crosedale is the resident Divisional Engineer at Moncton. I recognize Estimates signed by him, and on them I grant the certificates. His Estimates for work done by Alexander M'Bean, I believe to be correct, and on which I granted certificates.

Question by Mr. Walker.—Had you not a very high opinion of the Walkers up to: the end of 1857, and did you not repeatedly state so to the Commissioners and others?

Answer.—I do not at present remember; I may have done so.

Question by Mr. Walker.—Had you not a personal quarrel with Thomas A. Walker, in December 1857, on account of his stating that the lowest or best Contractors had little chance of getting work, as you was sure to give it to your favourites?

Answer.—I am not aware of having had any personal altercation with Mr. Thomas Walker at the time referred to.

HENRY G. C. KETCHUM SWOTH.

I am principal Draughtsman in the Saint John-Railway Office, and have been there as such since last August, but was there as assistant Draughtsman before. I went to Strediac in August 1856, as Rodman, and was on location from Saint John to Kennebeccasis, as Rodman afterwards; came to the Saint John Office when it was opened, I think in December 1856, and continued there until June 1858, when I was appointed Topographer on survey and location between Sussex and Salisbury; then I returned to the Office at Saint John, and continued as assistant Draughtsman until March 1859. I was then appointed second assistant Engineer on Lakefield Division, and in the same capacity upon Sections 7 and 8, when I received the appointment of principal & Draughtsman, which I still hold.

Question.—Have you brought with you all the plans relating to land taken for a Answer.

Railway purposes?

Answer. - I sent all the land appropriation plans which I could find in the Engineer's office; I could not find the whole of them; I noticed that plan designated as Track No. S was missing; I made proper enquiries for it, but could not find it. I think I have no plans here shewing Hampton Station; the tract would appear on No. 8, but the Station might be on a separate plan, which is often the case. There is a plan in the Engineer's office shewing the present form of the ground and site of the Station buildings. I did not bring it with me because it was not strictly a land appropriation plan. The plans made by me from the surveys of Mr. Arnold were more particularly for the purpose of showing the land taken for the track, as by law required, and not so much to shew the station grounds. I enquired of Mr. Crookshank, the Secretary, for the missing plan; I did not enquire of Mr. Jardine, nor did I tell him that it was missing. I reported to Mr. Jardine here that plan of Track No. 8 was missing; I do not recollect of his making any remark at the time. I sent the plans by the Chief Commissioner. Mr. Crookshank said he brought all the plans to me that he could find. Mr. Ketchum is referred to a plan, and asked if this plan shows land taken from James Smith.—I do not think that this is the official plan of the land taken, because it does not shew the grounds as at present taken for station purposes. It shews width of the track the same as on this plan, and this plan is signed by the late Railway Commissioners, and dated 1st July 1857, but like the other plan it does not shew the land as at present taken for station purposes; what I consider the official plan is a plan shewing all the grounds as at present taken for railway purposes.

The first plan referred to shews land belonging to Mr. J. Smith; the land lies between the Marsh Creek and the Marsh Road, so called. The witness is then referred to the plan, and puts his scale on it, and says that there is about 8 perches or 1-20th of an acre including the slope, and exclusive of the slope a little less than

1-40th of an acre.

Question.—Are there any other plans shewing land taken in this locality by Commissioners, for track, Station, or ballast ground?

Answer.—There may be other plans in existence shewing his property, but I do not recollect of any at present.

Mr. Ketchum is referred to Plan No. 14.

Question.—Do you know that all the lands marked as taken from Nelson Arnold and James E. White, and W. H. White, as shewn on the Plan, were taken from them?

Answer.—I cannot say positively.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—Did you receive instructions from Mr. Light to bring

papers to Fredericton P

Answer.—I received instruction from Mr. Light to assist in collecting and to bring with me to Fredericton, some papers of which a list would be furnished to Mr. Thomas by Mr. Jardine. I received no definite instructions from Mr. Light to bring up any Tables shewing the basis of the Estimate in his Report for 1859. I think there are such Tables in the Office, but I am not positive; Mr. Light asked me after my arrival here, if I had brought them up.

Friday, 30th March, 1860. - Committee met.

Henry G. C. Ketchum recalled.—With reference to Plan No. 1, spoken of by me yesterday, I wish it to be understood that although it is the official Plan of the late Commissioners, shewing the grounds as then taken by law, it is not the correct Plan of the grounds since purchased for Station or other purposes. I think there have been alterations made in the grounds, as shewn in this Plan, since the present Commissioners came into Office, but I do not think the Plan itself has been altered. I think the land was taken from Mr. Smith after this Plan was made, but cannot state so with any certainty. I do not actually know that any land was taken from Mr. Smith; I only judge from hearsay. I do not think that there could be any official Plans in the Drawing Office without my knowledge.

Mr. Jardine recalled.—What is considered by us as an official plan is the plan which shews the land taken for Railway purposes under the Act, a record of the land so taken being put into the County Registrar's Office. Track No. 1 is the plan from which the record was made. I do not think the land as marked on this other plan

taken.

taken from Mr. Smith, was ever put on record. I think the surface was taken off it under a written authority given to the Contractor, and therefore it would not be necessary to have an official plan of it at all. The fee of the land remained in Smith. This plan is dated November 12th 1857; it is made by Minette. I don't know what this plan was prepared for; I do not know any thing of this plan. Plan No. 14, shewing Sussex Station, I believe is an official one. The Commissioners bargained with Mr. Arnold before the Station ground was determined upon, for 12 acres of land at £6 an acre.

Henry G. C. Ketchum recalled.—I make the additional quantity of land as marked on Plan No. 14, taken from Nelson Arnold, on both sides of the track, about one acre and 24 perches. I did see and assisted in preparing drafts of Table A No. 1, in Report 1858; I saw in one of the rough drafts of that Table, 10 per cent. added for contingencies upon the total amount of contract work, as shewn in Table A No. 9, £557,100 12 1. Mr. Jardine wished to have it 10 per cent. upon the unfinished work, assigning as a reason, that it was not proper to charge contingencies upon work which had been completed. Mr. Light remonstrated at this being done, stating, I think, that it was not sufficient. After some discussion it was finally agreed to put 15 per cent. on the amount then under construction, as is now shewn in the Table. As far as I can recollect, this is all I know about it.

Question by Mr. Light.—Did I express a good deal of reluctance, as a professional man, at having so small an amount for contingencies?

Answer.—I think you did.

Mr. Jardine recalled. Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—In your evidence before the Railway Committee in 1859, you state that Mr. Light is still the Engineer, and the Road is still constructed under his advice as to alignment and alterations, and that you have perfect confidence in his competency. Has your confidence, as to competency, been shaken since that time?

Answer.—I have already said in my evidence that I am not qualified to judge of an Engineer's competency, but I have no reason to believe that Mr. Light is not a com-

petent Engineer.

Richard W. Burrowes recalled.—I think a Road the same in every respect as the Road from Saint John to Shediac, could be built much cheaper if it was let on tenders, and the Contractors had the sole management, employing their own Construction Engineers. My reason is, that the Contractor being the party financially interested in the construction of the Road, would adopt the most economical means of constructing.

Question.—Would a Road built in that way, the Contractor having the sole management, and being interested in saving as much money as possible in the construction, be as good and permanent a Road as one contracted upon the same principle as the European and North American Railway is now being constructed upon?

Answer.—I think it would, if under proper inspection. I never was on a Road which from the experience acquired in its construction, money could not have been saved. As the Road has been constructed in detail, I do not think one penny has been thrown away or wasted. I do not know how often the plan of the Bridge at Groom's Cove was changed. I am not prepared to say that it was changed, except that it was changed from a Culvert to a Bridge. If a culvert could have been built, I would prefer it. I cannot say as to the relative expense the Contracts would show.

Question.—Are you aware of any material alteration having been made in the size

of culverts since 1st January 1859?

Answer.—I cannot say exactly what time the alterations were made; some, I know, were increased last Summer, the freshets of last Spring having proved them to be too small. The alterations I refer to, would be, in my opinion, less than £20,000. I have been engaged on other Railways as Assistant and Divisional Engineer in America.

Question by Mr. Wright.—Have you ever known a Road to be surveyed, located, and plans and specifications made from such survey, which were found to be correct in all particulars, and which would require no subsequent alterations?

Answer.-No.

Question by Mr. Lawrence.—Do you not think that an abundance of time has been afforded for an efficient survey of the line from Saint John to Shediac?

Answer.—I cannot answer this question as to the whole Road. I came to this Province in December 1857, and some of the surveys had been made prior to that time. The surveys were all completed then except that from Sussex to Salisbury.

Question by Mr. Light.—Do you think Messrs. Jackson & Co. would have given us

as good and substantial a Road as the one now built?

Answer.—I think they would if properly restricted as to construction.

Question by Mr. Light.—Have you seen their plans of location, plans of construction, including wooden tressel bridges over all secondary streams?

Answer.—I have not seen them all; I have seen all the plans of location, I think,

and some of the plans of construction.

Question.—Presuming those plans to have been acted upon, do you conceive that

it would have made as safe and as permanent a Road?

Answer.—As regards location, it is a mere matter of opinion and calculation. In Mr. Light's alterations I have not entirely coincided; the present structures generally are superior.

Question.-Have you ever examined the structure at Chandler's Marsh near the

deep cutting, Cook's Brook, and over the Little Scadouc?

Answer.—Yes I have.

Question.—Do you not consider them the most temporary description of Bridge it is possible to design?

Answer.—No, I have seen worse.

Question.-Were they not deficient in material and workmanship?

Answer.—If constructed with the intention of hereafter putting in colverts and embankments, they were not.

Question.—If left as finished structures, what is your opinion of them?

Answer.-No wooden structure can be considered permanent.

Question.—From your general knowledge of Railway matters, is it reasonable to suppose that Jackson & Co. intended to insert stone culverts and fill them up with embankments, prior to delivering them up to the Government?

Answer.—I cannot say, as it depends upon the condition of the Contract.

Question.—Would such proceeding as before stated, be a reasonable and econo-

mical mode of completing any Contract?

Answer.—That would depend in the first place as to the time allowed in contract before opening the Road, and the facilities for procuring material, either for construction of culverts or embankments.

Question.—Supposing as in this case material was very convenient and within a short haul, is it likely economical Contractors would have built these bridges first and filled them in afterwards?

Answer.—It would then depend upon the time of opening.

Question.—Do you know the final cost of the Canada Grand Trunk Line per mile?

Answer.—The entire cost per mile is £10,000, including the proportion of stock taken by the Contractors; I cannot say whether it was sterling or currency. I do not know exactly what amount they took in stock.

Question.—Do you consider the Grank Trunk Line in general arrangements in grade and alignment, as good as they are on European and North American, so far as

completed P

Answer.—I will speak only of the portion of the Road that I know intimately, being that portion on which Mr. Farr and myself constructed the whole of the stations, viz., from Stratford to Trenton. The portion I know best is from Toronto to Trenton, and this portion I consider at any rate equal to the European and North American Road. I have been from Toronto to Pertland; I went over it in a car and cannot say whether it is as good as the European and North American Road.

Question.—Do you know the final cost of the Great Western Road from Niagara

Falls to Windsor, opposite Detroit, as it now stands on the Company's Books?

Answer.—I do not know, and no other person can know, as the Construction Accounts are incorrect.

Question.—Were you ever engaged on this Road?

Answer.—I was. I was engaged there from November 1852 to March 1854.

Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—Were you engaged on the Road from Saint John to Shediac P

Answer.- I was.

Question.—Do you know what it has cost, or what it will cost?

Answer.-I do not.

Question.—Do you know how many wooden Bridges there are on the Road from Saint John to Shediac?

Answer.—I know of ten under crossings, including those built by Jackson; there are short spans with masonry abutments and wooden tops, on the Grand Trunk Road. I believe all the Bridges over a certain length, were to be iron and stone; I cannot speak positively as to length. I see Jackson's specification specifies 24 feet width of roadway in cuttings, and 15 feet width of roadway in embankments, both having slopes 1½ to 1. A Road constructed under this specification would of course be more economical than the Road as now constructed. Mr. Burrowes is referred to Report 1858, page 54. I find the price per mile there stated to be £6,500 sterling, or £7,800 currency, per mile.

Alexander L. Light, recalled. Question by Mr. M'Intosh.—Have you received the Tables furnishing basis of Report for 1859, which this Committee ordered you to produce on the 22nd instant?

Answer .- I have not.

Question.—Did you give the head of your office the necessary instructions to produce them?

Answer.—All the officers of my Department were subprened here by Committees of the House of Assembly, with the exception of the Messenger. I telegraphed to him on the 26th March to give these estimates to Mr. Crookshank, to forward here immediately; that telegraph was written at this table and given to Mr. John Richards, one of the Clerks of the House. I put it in an envelope, directed it to my Messenger, Mr. Kinder, and requested Mr. Richards to see it forwarded. He mistook my meaning, and dropped it into the Post Office instead. In the evening I went to the Telegraph Office, as I was surprised at not receiving a reply; at that time the line was down. I immediately wrote another telegraph, and dated it next morning, March 27th, and requested the operator to send it the first thing in the morning, to the following effect:—

"MR. SIDNEY KINDER, Railway Office, Saint John.

"I telegraphed you yesterday (but message missent) to give Mr. Crookshank the papers, but keep list so that I may get them again from Committee.

(Signed)

ALEX. L. LIGHT."

At the same time I telegraphed to R. W. Crookshank, Esquire, as follows:-

" Please look in pigeon holes in my office for file of approximate estimates by several Assistant Engineers, they are all fastened together; forward by Mail.

(Signed)

ALEX. L. LIGHT."

The next morning, same date, I telegraphed to Kinder again as follows:-

"Have telegraphed Mr. Crookshank to send me approximate Estimates in pigeon holes my office; look for them and give them to him.

(Signed)

ALEX. L. LIGHT."

I am aware that Mr. Crookshank has these Estimates, as he called at my office and got them, as my Messenger wrote me to that effect.

Question.—Did you write to Mr. Ketchum subsequent to receiving the order referred to above from this Committee and previous to his leaving Saint John?

Answer.—I think I wrote twice to Mr. Ketchum before he lest Saint John; more on private matters than on public business.

Question.—Why did you not instruct him to bring these Estimates?

Answer.—I thought it was possible I had them with me, but was not sure.

Henry G. C. Ketchum recalled.—After I came to Fredericton, I received a Note from Mr. Light; I cannot say positively as to its contents, I think he mentioned these Estimates in it.

Letter submitted by Mr. Jardine, which is read as follows, received by him this morning from Mr. Thomas, for the consideration of the Committee:—

Question.—How many days after you received the order to produce the papers, did Mr. Ketchum remain in Saint John?

Mr. Light objects to the letter from Mr. Thomas to Mr. Jardine being published, lest it should produce a wrong impression on the public mind in regard to Mr. Kinder, who evidently had not received his telegram of the 26th March, as he conceives he, Kinder, was merely doing his duty in not allowing Mr. Crookshank to search in my private Office without orders from me, he having been left in charge.

Mr. Light asks the Committee to allow him to furnish certain Documents as an Appendix to his Evidence, and to which the Committee accede. After the close of the Evidence and after the Reports were submitted, he handed in the following:—

APPENDIX.

MR. LIGHT'S EVIDENCE.

EUROPEAN AND NORTH AMERICAN RAILWAY.

As there is an impression prevalent that a portion of the cost of this Railway is due to alterations and changes in grades, slopes and structures, made by me or by my advice, I take this opportunity to state, that these have all been judicious and absolutely necessary for the security and stability of the Road.

They have increased the original estimate, it is true, but it has not been shewn that any actual loss has been caused thereby, the alterations having been decided upon before any work had been done upon original designs, and the additions paid for at

reasonable prices upon well regulated Schedules attached to each Contract.

It will be observed on reference to the following extracts from the Report of James Laurie, Esquire, late Chief Engineer of the Nova Scotia Railway, dated January 17, 1860, that similar alterations have been made there, but which were not ascertained to be necessary until the works had been completed, and after the Railway had been opened for traffic, thereby incurring a much greater expense in proportion than has been occasioned here from those causes, most of that work, as will be seen, having been done over again:—

"Had any doubts previously existed, the experience of last spring proved conclusively, that clay cuttings in Nova Scotia will not stand at a slope of 1 to 1,—many of

them having run down and assumed inclinations of from 11 to 1 to 2 to 1.

"Local circumstances determine in a great measure the requisite slope. The same kind of material requiring to be much flatter in a wet than in a dry situation. The more or less exposure of the banks to the rays of the sun, and consequent thawing and freezing, has also a material influence. On sidelong ground, and along the valleys of streams, it is generally observable that the side of the cutting next the highest ground is that most liable to slip, caused by the natural springs issuing from that side

keeping the banks always saturated with water.

"In the course of the winter and spring it became evident that a large amount of additional work, by widening the cuttings and flattening the slopes, would be necessary to render the road secure; and as this work could be done more cheaply and satisfactorily by using the locomotives and cars belonging to the Province, it was considered advisable that it should be executed under the superintendence and management of the employees of the Commissioners. The contractors therefore were settled with, and the upholdance of the works taken off their hands. During the past season six to eight ballast trains have been employed under the direction of the Superintendent and management of the road masters; and a large amount of material has been removed from the cuttings, so that many of them have now a slope of nearly 2 to 1.

"A severe freshet occurred on the 8th January, 1859, by which considerable damage was done to the Railway. One of the piers of the Beaver Bank Bridge, on contract No. 5, was injured, also a number of culverts and drains on various parts of the line. The principal damage, however, was on contract No. 11. Here the openings of the bridges and culverts were too small to pass the water, and a number of them were undermined, or sustained other serious damage. The embankments also along Mill Brook were submerged,—some of them not only during this freshet, but on two subsequent occasions during the spring. As the Contractors could not be called upon at their own cost to repair these damages, and as they asked extravagant prices for work not embraced on their contract, it was deemed advisable to take it out of their hands.

"The water-way of most of the Bridges has been increased fully two-fold, by removing one of the abutments and adding another span.

"Brook diversions have also been made so as to give the flood waters free scope alongside of the Railway, without passing through two of the bridges which have not been enlarged, the excavation being used for raising the embankments.

"Had these diversions been made originally, the bridges would not have been

required. The expenditure on account of this work has been large, but was necessary for the permanent and safe use of the road. The work done by contract amounts to

£5.589 18 2.

"An arch culvert under a twenty feet embankment which withstood the freshet, although sustaining some damage, has been repaired. To have enlarged it properly would have cost say £1,000. It will pass the water until a higher freshet occurs than

the last, but a slight increase beyond will involve its being carried away.

"Some repairs have been found necessary to one of the bridges on No. 3, W. B. One of the piers had to be taken down and rebuilt, and some temporary support is now being placed to one of the abutments. The failure of this work is partly due to the foundations not having been laid deep enough, and partly to imperfect workmanship. The timber work of Nine Mile River Bridge, also proving too slight for the heavy locomotives, has been strengthened. A number of new culverts, both on the Main Line and Windsor Branch, have been constructed, and others which were injured have been repaired. These works have been executed under the supervision

of the road masters and Superintendent.

"It will thus be seen that the operations of the past year have been confined mainly to the perfecting and completing the road. The cuttings have been widened to such an extent that probably no very serious expenditure will be required to keep them in order, although it is certain that for several years more or less work will require to be done in the spring, especially where the road is through clay soil. The drainage also will require considerable additions ere the work can be considered perfect. There are many of the culverts of too small opening. Economy in this important item of railway construction has been carried to an extreme, and the size, position, and execution of the works, in many instances, left to the discretion of unqualified inspectors. Another cause of the failure of many of the culverts and drains, arises from their having been built nearly on the surface earth without either planking or paving, the current of water gradually undermining the foundations, and the openings being too small to admit of workmen getting inside, they cannot be repaired. In such cases they must be rebuilt from time to time, as they become unsafe or unserviceable."

A Message was received from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned-



No. 2. Is an Account shewing the number of Prisoners admitted into and discharged from the Prison during the year. Two hundred and twenty six Male Prisoners have been admitted, being an increase of six; and seventy nine Female Prisoners, being an increase of twenty two as compared with the number committed in the preceding year.

repairing and improving the Prisons and Dwellings.

The Male Prisoners have been employed in making up Clothes and Shoes for Prison wear; in general labor, in Summer months in cultivating and improving the Grounds, in Winter in preparing fuel; but principally throughout the year in the manufacture of Brooms, Pails, Tubs, Brushes, and other articles for sale.

The Females have been exclusively employed in culinary duties, and in manufacturing Homespun and making it into Prison clothing.

No. 3. Is an Inventory of Manufacturing Stock and Manufactured Articles on hand at this date, amounting to £2,172 15 7; and is greater by £234 15 3 than at the same period of last year.

No. 4. Is an Account shewing the nett carnings of the Prisoners employed during the year in the Manufacture of Articles for sale, amounting to the sum of £102 19 8. This result is the most unsatisfactory Return shewn for several years. Advance throughout the year in price of Broom Corn is equal to fifty per cent., without corresponding advance in price of Brooms; loss on Pails and Brooms sent to test the Halifax market; and smaller profits obtained on what has been sold at public sale, will in a measure account for such a small return from so large an investment.

The Commissioners will endeavour to introduce more economy into this department. To succeed in this, they should always have funds at their disposal to enable them to purchase materials on the very best terms and at the proper season; and with greater care and economy

in the making up of the raw material, they can entertain promise of better results.

The Commissioners have been unable to provide as yet suitable labor for the class of Prisoners admitted on short commitments. The Grounds of the Establishment contain nothing that can give profitable employment; and for stone breaking and stone dressing, as has been suggested, materials must be bauled at considerable expense.

The Commissioners beg again to refer to the necessity of providing funds to meet the expenses of the Institution, whatever they may be. The Expenditure is swelled by the sum of £114 15 9 paid for interest on advances to which their Secretary has been subjected, and they close their Accounts with a Balance due him of £1,994, leaving at the same time Accounts unpaid amounting to about £225.

The amount drawn from the Treasury last year was £2,800, or £925 less than the amount

asked for.

The amount necessary for the coming year to meet the current expenses, may be estimated at £2,000, in addition to the balance of £1,994 now due, and the amount of unpaid Accounts.

The Accounts of the Railway Construction Expenditure are furnished in detail under classified heads, and are correctly made up and vouched; the outlay under each class of Expenditure from the commencement of the work is shewn in the Capital Account for 1859, and the Expenditure during the Fiscal Year of 1859, classified in like manner is shewn above. The receipts from the Treasury from the commencement of the work are credited by the Commissioners at 2s. 10d. more than the Treasurer charges; this arises from 2s. 10d. having been received in 1856 for an Auger sold, which sum, in lieu of being deducted from the gross outlay for General Stores, was inadvertantly introduced into the Accounts as money received from the Treasury.

The Net earnings of the Railway to the 31st October 1858, amounted to £747 19 4; which sum was paid into the Provincial Treasury in 1859; the Net earnings during the year 1859 amounted to £5,795 2 7, and forms part of the over-expenditure in the Capital Account of that year, as shewn in the General Balance Sheet of the Commissioners for 1859.

The Books and Vouchers of the Traffic Department were inspected at Saint John by my Chief Clerk in the months of August. September and November last. The system introduced into that Department is very clear and effective, and the Account of Earnings is correct.

PUBLIC WORKS.

General Report of the Chief Commissioner of Public Works for the Year 1859.

Office Public Works, Fredericton, February, 1860.

To His Excellency The Hon. John Henry Thomas Munners-Sullon, Liculenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In accordance with the provisions of the Act 18 Vic. Cap. 7, Sec. 2, establishing a Board of Works in this Province, and requiring the Chief Commissioner to make an Annual "Report to the Governor in Council of all the Great Roads, and any other Provincial Work upon which Public Money has been expended," the undersigned has the honor to submit this General Report for the year 1859, to which are appended the following Statements:-

- No. 1.—Statement shewing the amount paid on Government Buildings in Fredericton, from 1st November 1858 to 31st October 1859.
- No. 2.—Statement shewing the amount paid for improving the Inland Navigation during the year.

GREAT ROADS AND BRIDGES.

The seventeen additional Lines of Road referred to this Department by the House of Assembly in the Session of 1858, and particularly set forth and described in last year's annual Report, having all been placed on the Great Road establishment by Act of the Legislature, the total number of Roads is therefore increased from forty three to sixty, and the total extent in miles from one thousand six hundred and fifty six to two thousand two hundred and one.

As the Act establishing the additional Lines as Great Roads came into operation only on the 1st day of November last, no expenditure was made on them by this Department during the past year.

The total amount of expenditure incurred during the year ending 31st October last for the maintenance of this branch of the public service has been £17,859 11 10.

Of this amount £485 was paid to rebuild the Bridges and Culverts carried away

and to repair those which were injured by the ice freshet in March last.

The sum of £6,674 18 5 has been expended in special Bridge Contracts, most of which were entered into by the Board early in the year. The sum of £2,000 5 3 has been expended in the erection of smaller and less important Bridges, and £1,208 4 9 in planking and other improvements or repairs on Bridges which required the same; leaving the sum of £7,431 3 5, which has been expended in renewing Culverts, turnpiking, gravelling, and such other repairs and improvements on the several Roads as seemed most necessary. No. 1

No. 1.—From Saint John to Nova Scotia Line. -132 miles.

The repairs of this line of Road during the past season have been more extensive than usual.

On the section from Saint John to Hampton, distance about 22 miles, they have been generally as follows:—Near Saint John considerable damages were done by the ice freshet in March last, during which the Bridge at Davidson's Cove and several large culverts were carried away, all of which have been renewed. The structure at Davidson's Cove has for several years past required repairs from time to time in consequence of the inefficiency of the original construction. It has now been rebuilt with earthen embankments, cedar abutments, and pine superstructure; and the roadway is well gravelled with coarse material. The appearance of the work is such as now to afford assurance of its ample strength and durability.

The "Marsh Road" from the old Saint John Aboidean to the Farm of Mr. Jardine has been gravelled by contract; and from thence to the Railway crossing the holes

and ruts have been filled with broken stone and gravel by days work.

Several other portions of the section from Saint John to Hampton have been repaired by renewing the road surface, including putting on gravel and replacing cross-drains; and new plank, railing, &c., have been supplied to the Bridge at Groom's Cove.

As the Railway is now opened to Hampton, the heavy traffic will be very much reduced and the road consequently relieved from much of the wear and injury to which it has heretofore been subjected.

The next section extends from Hampton Ferry to Hayward's Mills, a distance of about 43 miles. On this two new Bridges have been erected; one at Hoyt's Brook, 40 fect in length, built of spruce and hemlock at a cost of £12; and the other at Barbarie's Mills, 70 feet in length, consisting of a stone culvert and earthen embankment, at a cost of £28 10s.

The Bridges at Ward's Creek, M'Gee's Brook, Jeffrey's Mill Brook, Raymond's Brook, River Bridge (Portage,) and Leck's Brook, have all received more or less repairs, amounting in all to the sum of £61 18 9. The principal expenditure during the past Summer on this section of the Road, has been in repairing detached portions of the same. The wetness of the season and the extraordinary amount of heavy traffic from Hampton to Sussex imposed by the carting of Railway Iron and other material, so injured the Road that continual attention was necessary to repair the damages thus occasioned.

On the remaining section, extending from Hayward's Mills to the Nova Scotia Line, distance about 67 miles, no new Bridges have been erected during the past season.

In the month of January last it was found that the tide had removed a part of the foundation from the western pier of the new Bridge over Sackville River. Immediately on learning the circumstance arrangements were made with Mr. Hugh Gallagher to secure the pier by means of brush and stone; the expense of which amounted to £25.

The Bridge over Boundary Creek has received new plank covering four inches in thickness, and some other repairs, amounting in all to £76.

The Bridge over the Petitodiac River has also been new covered at a cost of £16. The Crossway or Aboideau at Westcock has received repairs to a small amount; one third of which was paid by this Department, and the balance by the Marsh-owners of the district.

Nine hundred and eighteen rods of turnpike have been renewed on this section at an expense of £84 6s.; and two hundred and fourteen rods have been gravelled at an outlay of £36 10 6.

The expense in temporary repairs has been unusually great; especially on that part from Hayward's Mills to the Bend, amounting to £172. This increased expense in repairing turnpike, culverts, &c., arises from the increased traffic aggravated by the heavy weight of loads conveyed along the line by Railway Contractors, as experienced also on the western end of the line.

Arrangements were made in February last with the Marsh-owners of Sackville, for the repairs of the Aboideau over the Au Lac River, based upon the understanding that the Government would defray one third the expense, and the proprietors the remaining two thirds. Copies of the correspondence relating to the same will be found in the Appendix to this Report.

Plans

Plans and Specifications for a new Cedar Bridge over Morton's Brook in Upper Sussex, have been prepared with a view of entering into a Contract for its immediate erection. Nearly all the other Bridges on this Road are in good condition.

No. 2.—From Saint John to Saint Andrews.—66 miles.

All the large and expensive Bridges on this line of Road are in good condition. Two small ones will require rebuilding next season.

The repairs and improvements made during the past season consist chiefly in improving the turnpike and replacing cross-drains. Eight hundred and nineteen rods have been gravelled at a cost of £49 10 9, or about 1s. 3d. per rod. Four hills have been improved by cutting down and removing 600 cubic yards of earth. The sum of £5 15s. was expended in removing rock. The balance of expenditure was made in skirting the sides of the Road, repairing Bridges, and in such other repairs and improvements as the continued wear of the line required.

No. 3.—From the Bend of Petitoodiac to Shediac.—15 miles.

No new Bridges have been erected on this line during the past year. One has been repaired at a cost of £10. The balance of the appropriation has been laid out in renewing culverts, filling up holes and ruts, and in such other repairs and improvements as appeared most necessary.

The rail cars have been running regularly between the Bend and Shediac during the past season, and have taken a very large part of the traffic that formerly passed over the turnpike Road.

No. 4.—From Dorchester to Shediac.—16 miles.

No new Bridges have been erected, or old ones repaired, on this line during the past season. The expenditure has therefore been all made in improving the Road. One hundred rods of the turnpike have been made new, and three hundred and thirteen rods have been gravelled at a cost of £44 2 6. The remainder of the appropriation has been expended in skirting, making leading drains, &c.

All the Bridges are in good condition except that over Tait's Brook, which will require new covering and some other small repairs.

No. 5.—From Shediac to Richibucto.—36 miles.

None of the large Bridges on this line of Road have been rebuilt during the past year, but a considerable amount has been spent in repairs.

The abutments of "Weldon's Bridge" have been raised and otherwise repaired, at a cost of £4 5s. The flooring on Richibucto Bridge has been partially renewed. The Chockpish Bridge has been in part renewed with hemlock logs, at an expense of £29 10s. The Bridge at Bastrache's has been repaired by rebuilding 82 feet in extent from the foundation, and partially renewing other portions of the structure, at an outlay of £40. The Big Buctouche Bridge has had the channel pier raised with hemlock logs; the stringers over two spans have been renewed, and other repairs have been added, amounting in the whole to the expense of £41 11 10. The Little Buctouche Bridge has received four new stringers, and repairs to covering and railing, at a cost of £8. The Bridge at Howard's Creek has been partially renewed by building and repairing 135 feet in extent, at a cost of £26 10s. The Bridge at Peter Aubert's Creek has been raised, brushed, and gravelled, at a cost £7 10s. The two channel piers of Cocagne Bridge have been raised; the stringers have been replaced over two spans; new covering has been supplied over 103 feet, and other repairs have been added, amounting in all to an expense of £62 6 10. The Shediac Bridge has received trivial repairs to the amount of £3 12 6. The balance of the expenditure has been in small Bridges, cross-drains, and in general repairs on the Road.

With a view to the rebuilding of the Bridge over the Shediac Stream early in the ensuing Summer, arrangements are in progress for supplying the timber during the

A large extent of the Road along this line is low and flat, and should have a considerable expenditure during the next season applied to the renewal of the turnpike and to gravelling certain portions with good material.

No. 6.—From Richbucto to Chatham.—40 miles.

Repairs to a considerable extent have been made on this line during the past season. Six culverts or small Bridges have been renewed at a cost of £14 7 3. These were built wholly of cedar, except one, which was built in part of cedar and in part of hemlock. The sum of £20 5 10 has been expended in repairing Kouchibouguacis, Kouchibouguac, and other Bridges of the smaller class. The extent of seven hundred and thirty six rods has been turnpiked, at a cost of £22 10 6; and an extent of five hundred and thirty eight rods has been gravelled, at a cost of £20 8 9. About one and a half miles have been skirted, on which and such other repairs as appeared most necessary, the remainder of the appropriation has been expended.

This Road is now in good condition, excepting a short distance near Richibucto. This end of the line is low and flat, and the turnpike requires to be renewed by

raising and coating with gravel for several miles.

The Bridges are all in good order, except those over Big and Little Bay du Vin and Napan Streams. Two of these will require repairs, and that over Little Bay du Vin may require renewal.

No. 7.—From Miramichi to Pokemouche.—62 miles.

The only Bridge of the larger class erected on this line of Road during the past year, was that over the River Decache. This Bridge is 90 feet in length, was built of cedar logs, with roadway made of the same material, and covered with gravel. The work was let in two separate contracts; one for the material to be furnished during the Winter season, at the cost of £30 2 10; and the other for erection and completion in the Spring, for the sum of £14 13s.

Five small Bridges or culverts were erected, and covered with cedar poles and gravel, at a cost of £7 2 9. A new scow and rope have been furnished for Big Tracadie Ferry, at an outlay of £24 1 4. A rope was furnished also for the Ferry at

Pokemouche.

The following Bridges have been repaired, viz:—At Bartibog, Storach's Brook, Garden's Creek, Burnt Church River, Little Tracadie River, and that at the west side of Tabusintac, at a total cost of £12 10s.; and sixteen small culverts have been covered with cedar poles and gravel, at an expense of £8 3 10.

The sum of £172 4 I has been expended in improving the Road, including two thousand eight hundred and eighty rods of new turnpike, and nine hundred and

twenty eight rods of gravelling.

In addition to the foregoing material improvements, the Road has been kept

generally in very good condition during the season.

The Bridge over John Boy's Brook, 120 feet in length, will require rebuilding, for which arrangements are in progress. The cost will be about £40. The railing for Tabusintac Bridge is also in course of being put on.

No. 8 — From Bathurst to Pokemouche.—51 miles.

The principal expenditure on this line of Road during the past year has been in the erection of new Bridges. The one at Caraquet Ferry, referred to in last year's Report, has been opened for use, and is a very great accommodation to the inhabitants of that part of the Province.

A new Bridge has been erected over Teague's Brook, consisting of cedar logs, floored with poles of the same material, and covered with gravel. It is 250 feet in

length, 13 feet in height, and 20 feet in width. The total cost is £108.

The Bridge over Grand Ance Stream has also been renewed. This structure is 75 feet long, and about 13 feet high, built in a manner similar to that over Teague's Brook, of the same description of material, and at a cost of £45. In addition to these, a small Bridge, 37 feet in length, was erected, also of cedar logs, over Dempsey's Brook, at a cost of £10.

About £50 have been laid out in renewing and repairing culverts and in renewing and gravelling the turnpike at those places along the line which most required such attention.

A marked improvement has been made on this line of Road during the two past years. A number of the old and decayed Bridges have been replaced by substantial structures of cedar and other durable materials; whilst an extensive portion of the road surface has been put in good order and covered with good gravel.

No. 9

No. 9.—From Buthurst to Belledune.—23 miles.

This Road having heretofore been well made and gravelled, requires but a small

sum to keep it in good travelling condition.

The Bridge over Big Elm Tree Brook, 422 feet in length, has been thoroughly repaired by renewing the flooring, railing, and one of the abutments. The other abutment and the piers, having been built of cedar logs, were found to be sound and good. The whole is now in good condition and will stand at least twenty five years. The timber employed consists wholly of cedar and pine, and the flooring is of cedar poles covered with gravel. The total outlay for repairs was £75 2 6.

The long Bridge over Bathurst Basin has also received material repairs in order to

make it safe during the present year.

Plans and Specifications have been prepared for a new structure at this place, with the view of immediately entering into a contract for its erection during the coming Summer, and thus affording the intervening Winter for procuring the cedar logs and other necessary material.

No. 10.—From Belledune to Melis.—62 miles.

No new Bridges have been erected on this line of Road during the past season.

Eel River, Campbellton, and Clark's Bridges, have been repaired at a total cost of £92 5s. The principal part of this expense has been incurred at Eel River Bridge. During the last two years this Bridge has been considered unsafe; but upon examination, the abutments and stringers proved to be sound. The binders, covering, and railing have been renewed; the whole cost of repairs amounting to £77 10s.

Seven hundred and thirty three rods of the Road have been turnpiked at a cost of £45 0 10; and one thousand six hundred and twenty six rods have been gravelled

at a cost of £95 4 5.

The hill at M'Neil's has been improved by cutting down the top and removing the excavated material to the foot where it forms the surface of the Road, which is raised by cedar logs to fill up the depression which occurs at this point. The expense of this work was £38 15s.

The sum of £3 5 4 has been laid out in clearing ditches and repairing culverts; and the sum of £40 14 10 has been paid for filling up holes and ruts, and for other temporary repairs.

The repairs have been vigilantly attended to on this line of Road, and nearly its

whole length is now gravelled and in good condition.

No. 11.-From Newcastle to Bathurst .- 50 miles.

From Newcastle to Tabusintac, about 21 miles in distance, the Road has been considerably improved. The Bridge over Bartibog Stream, referred to in last year's Report, has been finished. Its length is 205 feet; it is built of cedar and hemlock timber, and has cost £210.

The Bridge over the Little Escadillac Stream has been repaired by renewing two of the stringers, gravelling the abutments, &c., at a cost of £9 4s. Five smaller Bridges have also received repairs at a total cost of £9.

No new Bridges will be required on this portion of the line during the coming

From Tabusintac to Bathurst, a distance of about 29 miles, the Road is in good condition. Over Lord and Foy's Brook a new Bridge has been erected, which is 350 feet in length, 12 feet in height, and 20 feet in width. The material is cedar with flooring poles of the same, and covered with gravel. All the materials are of the very best quality, and the work is well done. The total cost is £109.

About two miles of the Road have been skirted, and several culverts have been renewed, which with other repairs amount to the expense of £26 2 6.

No. 12.—From Fredericton to Newcastle.—102 miles.

The first section of this line is from Fredericton to Boiestown, a distance of 39 miles. The freshet in March last occasioned extensive damage on that portion which runs along the right bank of the Nashwaak River, by carrying away portions of the breastworks which at intervals form the lateral foundation and support of the Road. These

have all been thoroughly repaired, and the Road is now in good travelling condition. The Bridge over Garden's Creek, referred to in last year's Report, has been rebuilt and finished.

On the section from Boiestown to Newcastle, comprising the remaining distance of 63 miles, the sum of £574 2 6 has been expended on Bridges. The new Bridge at Boiestown, referred to in last year's Report, was completed early in the Summer, and is constructed in a very durable manner; it is 280 feet long, built of large cedar logs, and covered with gravel. The cost was £400, but an additional sum was afterwards laid out in protecting the abutments and piers, making the total outlay £421.

An earthen embankment with a cedar waterway has been made over Arbo's Brook, at a cost of £73. A small cedar Bridge has also been erected over A. M'Laggan's Brook, at an expense of £14. The Bridge at Elm Tree Brook, 30 feet in length, has

also been renewed of cedar and covered with gravel at a cost of £14.

The covering of the Bridge at Price's and of that at Nelson's Mill Brook, have been renewed at a cost of £9. The North West Bridge, Doak's Bridge, and two others of a smaller class, have severally received more or less repairs, amounting in all to £40 2 6.

Seven hundred and forty one rods of the turnpike have been renewed at a cost of £46 6 3. The sum of £25 8 9 has been expended in cutting down hills and skirting the sides of the Road; and the sum of £41 17 6 has been laid out in day's work in making such temporary repairs along the line as were most required.

Arrangements are in progress for renewing the Bridge over Cook's Cove. It is to be built of cedar timber, and the cost will be about £120. Several other Bridges on

this line will require repairs during the coming season.

No. 13.—From Fredericton to Saint John.—66 miles.

On the section from Fredericton to Queen's County Line, three thousand five hundred and fifty four rods of the turnpike have been renewed and gravelled at a cost of £183. The small Bridge over Kenney's Brook has been renewed with pine and hacmatac timber, which, with several new cross-drains and the repairs of others, amount to the total cost of £11 5s. This part of the line is now in very good condition, with the exception of about five miles near the City of Fredericton, which is low and flat, as well as out of repair, and should receive special attention during the coming season.

On the section extending from the lower line of Sunbury through Queen's to King's County, a large proportion of the expenditure has been in the building and repairing of Bridges. The principal Bridge which has been renewed, is that over Queen's Brook. It is constructed of cedar, floored with poles of the same material, and covered with gravel, at the cost of £59. Four hundred rods of the turnpike have been renewed at a cost of £17; and the sum of £33 has been laid out in cutting down hills, making and repairing cross-drains, removing stones, and in such other labour as appeared

necessarv.

On the remaining section, extending from Queen's County to Saint John, two new Bridges have been built; one over Nase's Brook, of the length of 136 feet, built of pine and cedar timber, at a cost of £170; the other over Stevens' Stream, of the length of 35 feet, also built of pine and cedar timber, at a cost of £40 10s.

The Bridge over Brandy Point Stream was partially destroyed by the ice freshet of March last. Upon examination it was found necessary to renew about 75 feet in the centre of the Bridge. Pine and spruce timber was immediately procured, and the

repairs made by day's work, at the total expense of £48 10s.

One hundred and thirty three rods of the turnpike have been renewed at a cost of £21 17 10, and two hundred and seventeen rods have been gravelled at an expense of £29 16 11. In addition to the foregoing, about £100 have been expended in renewing a small Bridge, on new cross-drains, and on other repairs and improvements distributed over this section of the line.

Nearly the whole of the distance of this line of Road is now in good travelling condition. All the larger Bridges are good and many of them new. Three Bridges of the smaller class will require renewing at an aggregate cost of about £40.

The Draw in the Oromocto Bridge has not been so easily raised and managed as

was anticipated. It is therefore intended to have it reconstructed before the ice leave the River in the ensuing Spring, with the view of rendering it less difficult to raise for the passage of vessels.

No. 14.—From Fredericton to Woodstock.—63 miles.

This line of Road has been materially improved during the past season, and at the close of the year was in better condition than at any former period since it came under the control of this Department.

The two Bridges contracted for early last Winter have been finished. That over Burdon's Brook is 200 feet in length and 33 feet in height from the bed of the ravine. It is erected in one continuous block of large cedar logs, with only the necessary opening for the water-way, and is covered with cedar poles and gravel. It has been substantially and durably built, at the cost of £197. The other Bridge, which is over Joselyn's Brook, is 50 feet in length and about 12 feet in height, and has been built in the same manner and of the same description of material as the former, at a cost of £45.

Four of the old Bridges have had the covering renewed, and several others have undergone material repairs.

The Road through the Sheogomock woods, referred to in last year's Report, has been gravelled.

The Stone Bridge at the upper boundary of the City has been completely repaired, and the Road from thence to Mr. Garden's has been thoroughly re-made and gravelled with a heavy coating of shore gravel.

Two of the old Bridges will require replacing during the coming season, and arrangements have been made for the erection of the new ones, which will be of cedar, on such terms that the contractors may procure the material during the Winter, and put up the work in the Spring.

No. 15.—From Woodstock to River du Chute.—40 miles.

This line of Road passes through a thickly settled and fertile country nearly the whole distance. The land is rough and hilly, but the soil is good and well adapted for farming purposes.

The total expenditure on this line during the past year has been £278 9 1. Of this sum, £33 12 6 was laid out in the erection of four small Bridges, viz: over Drier's, Shaw's, Clark's, and Buttermilk Streams. They are all built of cedar, and will be very durable. A large number of Bridges have been repaired at a total cost of £86 3 3. One hundred and thirty two rods of turnpike have been renewed at a cost of £17 2 6, or about 2s. 8d. per rod; and two hundred and thirty six rods have been gravelled at an expense of £18 4 6.

The truss over the northern span of the Big Presqu'ile Bridge has so far settled as to throw an undue strain on the stringers and roadway, and render the same unsafe. The Supervisor has therefore attached a large chain to the frame work, so as to sustain it until the injury can be repaired in a more substantial manner. The abutments are all of cedar, and perfectly sound.

No. 16.—From River du Chute to Grand Fulls.—33 miles.

Irvine's Brook Bridge, seventy feet in length, has been rebuilt during the past year. The material is cedar, including the flooring of the roadway, which is covered with gravel; and the total cost is £29.

The Bridges over Little River and Clemo Goslin's Brook, have both been repaired; the former by the erection of two new bents, and the latter by partial renewal of the plank covering; the total cost being £15. Two hundred rods of the turnpike have been renewed, and a small portion gravelled, at a cost of £42 10s. An extent of forty rods along the bank of the River Saint John, near the Tobique, has been built up on the lower side with cedar logs, and filled with brush and gravel, at a cost of £50. And a further sum of £10 2s. was expended in making temporary repairs early in the Spring.

No. 17.—From Grand Falls to Canadian Boundary.—50 miles.

Two new Bridges have been erected on this line of Road during the past year; one over the Quisibis River, with cedar abutments and pine superstructure, at a cost of

£313; the other over Remo Therault's Stream, 210 feet in length, with cedar abutments, floored with round cedar poles, and covered with brush and gravel, at a cost of £75.

The Bridge over Mill Creek has been repaired by securing the foundations of the abutments and repairing the truss work, at a cost of £13 17 6. The Bridge over Power's Creek has also received repairs amounting to £2 5 3. The planking of Grand River Bridge has been repaired, and a small sum has been expended on the approaches of Little Falls Bridge; making a total expenditure for repairs on Bridges of £23 2 6.

The balance of the appropriation has been laid out in renewing cross-drains, and in repairs to the turnpike at such places along the line as most needed attention.

No. 18.—From Little Fulls to Saint Francis.—32 miles.

This line of Road passes over a rough and hilly country and requires numerous Bridges, but chiefly over small streams. One new Bridge has been erected during the past season at a cost of £25, and eleven have been repaired at a total cost of £58 16s.

The sum of about £150 has been expended in renewing culverts, turnpiking, skirt-

ing, and such other repairs as seemed most desirable.

The Bridge over Little River of about 200 feet in length, and that over Crock's Brook of 150 feet in length, are old, and will probably require renewing during next season.

No. 19 .- From Grand Falls to American Boundary .- 3 miles.

The West Bridge has been repaired by renewing two of the old bents, and repairing a third with cedar, brush, and gravel; the whole by day's work, at a cost of £7 10s.

The remainder of the appropriation has been expended in cutting down hills, and in improving the turnpike.

No. 20.-From Pickard's Store to American Line.-5 miles.

No expenditure has been made on Bridges during the past year, nor apparently will such expenditure be required during the coming season. The sum of £22 10s. has been laid out in blasting and removing rocks, and in cutting down and improving the hills. The remainder of the appropriation has been expended in gravelling the Road and in other repairs and improvements along the line.

No. 21.- From Butternilk Creek to American Boundary .- 9 miles.

Extensive repairs have been made on this line of Road during the past year. Four difficult hills have been improved by cutting down and reducing the grades, at a cost of £28 5s. Two hundred and forty nine rods have been turnpiked, at a cost of £10 ils. 6d. or about 10d. per rod; and seventy four rods have been gravelled at a cost of £9 18 3, or about 2s. 8d. per rod.

This, though a short line, is a very important one. Its course is from the American Boundary through a fine farming country, for a distance of about nine miles, to a place on the River Saint John heretofore known as Buttermilk Creek, but latterly by the name of Florenceville. Here numerous buildings have recently been erected, and other extensive improvements are going on. Amongst the latter a public Road has been opened to the River, on the bank of which a Wharf and a Steam Mill are in course of erection.

No. 22.—From Woodstock to Houlton.—11 miles.

It has in former Reports been deemed proper to represent the importance of this Road, as a principal link in one of the great lines of communication between this Province and the United States, and in particular as connecting the frontier Town of Woodstock on one side with that of Houlton on the other, and both with the numerous flourishing and widely extending Settlements by which they are surrounded. The heavy and increasing traffic to which this Road is ordinarily subjected, necessarily demands a large annual expenditure to keep it in good order. For the past year the expenditure has been for temporary repairs in the Spring, and for renewing and improving the turnpike during the Summer.

No. 23.—From Fredericton to Suint Andrews.—78 miles.

From Fredericton to the Magagnadavic River, a distance of about 40 miles, no new Bridges have been built, or any repaired. The expenditure on this part of the line has therefore been confined to improving the Road.

The extent of two thousand five hundred and sixty rods has been turnpiked, at a cost of £162 13 11. Twenty four new culverts have been made, at an expense of £12. The balance of the outlay on this division was incurred in repairing cross-drains, and in skirting the sides of the Road.

The section from Magaguadavic to Saint Andrews is about 3S miles in distance; on which one new Bridge has been erected over Jones' Brook, 177 feet in length, consisting of cedar and pine; and repairs have been made to three others.

An extent of eight hundred and eleven rods have been turnpiked, and ninety seven rods gravelled. Eleven culverts have been renewed, and several others repaired.

The improvement which has been made, especially between Fredericton and Magaguadavic, on this line of Road, is such as to have placed it in good travelling condition.

No. 24.—From Waveig to Saint Stephen.—9 miles.

This line of Road has been well made and was in good condition at the close of the year. The sum of £25 has been expended on the same during the past season. It is a short but important line, connected in its course with the Fredericton and Saint Andrews Road, the Roix Road, and the Woodstock and Oak Bay Road; and connecting these severally both with Saint Stephen on one side of the frontier and the City of Calais on the other.

No. 25.—From Roix's to Ouk Bay.—16 miles.

The sum of £109 was expended on this Road last year in making culverts, turn-piking, and gravelling, and in repairing Bridges and causeways. Though comparatively new the Road is now in fair travelling order. The "Glenelg Bridge," built over the Digdeguash when this line was a Bye Road, having become unsafe from age and decay, a new one has been designed and contracted for to replace the old one during the present Winter for £132 los. This Road is crossed by the New Brunswick and Canada Railway a few miles from Oak Bay.

No new Bridges have been erected on this line of Road during the past year. The existing Bridge over Three Brooks is old and will require renewing next season, but the cost will be only about £20. The Bridge at Brown's Mill will require new covering and some other trivial repairs.

The extent of one thousand six hundred and seventy two rods of turnpike has been made at a cost of £149 3 5. The balance of the appropriation has been laid out in blasting and removing rocks, renewing and replacing culverts and cross-drains, and in such other general repairs and improvements as were most necessary. In addition to these sums, a considerable amount has been expended by the Commissioner under the Labour Act.

This Road is still unfinished, and much of the ground though level, being rocky and swampy, the cost of construction is far higher than the average rate. It is one of the most important Roads in that part of the Province, and very desirable that it should soon be completed.

No. 27.—From Lead Water Brook to Saint Stephen.—17 miles.

The part of this Road yet unopened, extending from Dead Water Brook to Digdeguash, a distance of four miles, was surveyed and marked out in June last, and has since been cleared as a sled Road for winter travelling. From Digdeguash to Moore's Mills the Road is passable; and from thence to Saint Stephen is good, with the exception of the Upton Bridge, which is very old and has become unsafe. During the past year the sum of £90 has been expended in clearing, turnpiking, making culverts, gravelling, and in repairing Bridges and causeways. A contract has lately been made for rebuilding the Upton Bridge for the sum of £99 15s. A new Bridge over the Digdeguash and a large additional outlay will be necessary to complete this line.

No. 28.-From Lower Trout Brook to the Town of Magaguadavic. -38 miles.

Three small Bridges have been built on this line during the past season; being those respectively over Lake S ream. Seeley's Brook, and Cedar Creek, at an aggregate cost of £10 19 7. Young's Bridge has been repaired by renewing one pier and four of the stringers, and by repairing the flooring and railing, at a total cost of £31 4 1. Two other Bridges have received small repairs amounting to £5 2 7.

The extent of one hundred and forty seven rods of turnpike has been made, at an expense of £12 17 3, and one hundred and twenty seven rods gravelled, at a cost of £10 13 S. The remainder of the appropriation was laid out in removing rocks and windfalls, renewing cross-drains, and in such repairs generally along the line as were most required.

It is not expected that any of the Bridges will require renewing during the coming season.

The lower end of this Road is now in a fair state, but the upper end, being comparatively new, is hardly passable, and a large outlay will yet be required in order to put it in a good travelling condition.

No. 29 .- From Salisbury to Harcey .- 44 miles.

Extensive improvement has been made on this Road during the past year. Between Salisbury and Hopewell Court House, sixteen hundred rods have been turnpiked at a cost of £75, and three hundred and twenty rods have been gravelled at a cost of £20. The general condition of the Road has been well attended to, by continually filling up holes and ruts as rapidly as they were occasioned.

The covering on each of the two Bridges at Bennett's is old, and has become decayed. They have respectively received some repairs during last Summer, and both will require new planking during next season.

The Bridge over Saw Mill Creek in Hopewell has been renewed. The whole length of this structure, including the approaches, is 180 feet. The abutments are of timber, consisting of birch, beech, and maple, and rest on pile foundations. The stringers are of pine; and the flooring, which is 50 feet in length, consists of three inch spruce plank. One Bridge has been repaired at a small expense, and the remainder of the outlay has been in removing stones, renewing and repairing crossdrains, and generally in such other improvements and repairs along the line as were most urgently needed.

No 30.—From Isaac Derry's to Point Wolf.—25 miles.

The Bridge over Salmon Creek, adverted to in last year's Report, has been rebuilt with spruce timber and floored with plank of the same material. The new structure of 120 feet in length, with 100 feet of planked roadway, has been completed at a cost of only £21.

A small amount has been expended in repairs to the covering of Salmon River Bridge.

An extent of nine hundred and twenty rods of turnpike has been made at a cost of £105 12 6, or about 2s. 3d. per rod; and two hundred and seven rods have been gravelled at a cost of £23 12 3, being also at the rate of about 2s. 3d. per rod.

The remainder of the appropriation has been made in cutting down hills, and generally in the most necessary improvements and repairs along the line.

It is not expected that any of the Bridges will require renewal during the coming season, and but little will be necessary for Bridge repairs.

This line of Road, as noticed in former Reports, runs along the shore of the Bay of Fundy towards the County of Saint John, over ground so rough and hilly, as to render the work exceedingly difficult and expensive. It will therefore require more than an average rate of outlay to bring the Road into moderately good travelling condition.

No. 31.—From Saint John to Crooked Creek, County of Albert.—73 miles.

From Crooked Creek to King's County Line, a distance of about 22 miles, six hundred and fifty nine rods of turnpile have been made at a cost of £82 2 4; besides other repairs, consisting of the removal of stones, filling up holes, gravelling, &c.

The German Brook Bridge unexpectedly gave way, so as to require rebuilding;

the cost of which, not being provided for, necessarily reduced the amount intended for the general repairs of the Road. The new Bridge is 60 feet in length, with abutments of hemlock timber, and superstructure of spruce, and has cost £29 Ss.

From John M'Manus' to M'Laughlan's, a distance of about 71 miles, was described in last year's Report as in exceedingly bad condition. This part of the line has since been greatly improved. Fifteen hundred and seven een rods have been turnpiked, at about five shillings per rod, or a total outlay of £363 13 2. Several small Bridges and cross-drains have been repaired, at a cost of £27 2 6. In addition to the foregoing, a small sum has been laid out in such temporary repairs along the line as were from time to time found to be necessary.

Two small Bridges over Sherwood's and Schooles' Streams will require attention; but all the remaining structures are in fair condition and not expected to require any

expense during the coming season.

The settlement of the land along the M'Manus Portage is rapidly going on, and the travelling is very much increased, giving every year increased importance to this line of Road. It should therefore be placed at least in moderately good condition. The country over which it passes is rough and hilly, and a comparatively large amount will be necessary to place it in a state equally as good as that which prevails on other lines in the Province.

No. 32.—From Saint John to Quaco.—30 miles.

No new Bridges have been built on this line during the past year. Three small ones have been repaired at a cost of £26 1 10. Five hundred and forty six rods of the Road have been gravelled at a cost of £78 8 2, or about 2s 10d. per rod.

The improvement between Tisdale's Farm and the old Aboideau, commenced and advanced to some extent in 1858, has been finished, and that part of the line which was formerly in an extremely bad state is now excellent, and the turnpike is high, dry, and smooth.

There are no Bridges of importance that will require renewing on this line during

the coming season.

No. 33.—From Great Road, near Hayes's, to Belleisle.—5 miles.

This line was placed upon the Great Road establishment by Act of Assembly during the last Session of the Legislature, in place of the line heretofore from Hampton to Belleisle, and is a shorter and more direct route. The sum of £27 17 5 has been expended on this Road the past season, in making turnpike, building cross-drains, and other repairs and improvements along the line.

No. 34.—From Scribner's to Belleisle.—25 miles.

Two Bridges of the smaller class have been erected on this line; one over Groom's Brook, and the other over Kierstead's Stream.

The sum of £9 16 7 has been laid out in Bridge repairs. A large number of cross-drains has either been renewed or repaired, at an expense of £14 12 6. The remainder of the amount expended, has been in improving and repairing the turnpike on various parts of the line.

There are two Bridges that will require attention next year; one over Salmon Creek, and the other at Kingston, to renew both of which will cost about £100.

No. 35.—From Nerepis to Gagetown.—23 miles.

The old Bridge over Merritt's Stream was carried away by the freshet last Spring. A new one has been erected with abutments two feet higher than those of the old one, at a cost of £65 5s.

The Bridge over Crozier's Stream has also been renewed, with cedar abutments

and superstructure of pine and hacmatac. It is 140 feet long, and cost £95.

The sum of £8 was expended in repairing culverts, and in filling holes and ruts, and the sum of £16 17 6 in renewing the turnpike; making a total expenditure of £185 2 6.

No. 36.—From Fredericton to Jemseg.—30 miles.

This line of Road has been very much improved the past year. The arrangements for opening the Road and for protecting the bank along the River near Estey's Creek,

as adverted to in last year's Report, have received attention. The fences have been moved and the Road enlarged to the width agreed upon. The piles have all been driven and the brush and stone are being put on during the present Winter. The expense of the timber for piling was arranged and paid in 1858. The cost of placing and driving the piles was paid last year, and amounted to £277 1 5. Other improvements and repairs have been made in various places where most required.

The floating Bridge o er Esty's Creek has been renewed, and is built of cedar, pine and hacmatac timber. It is made in six pieces attached together transversely by heavy hinges, so as to permit the Structure to raise and fall with the water. The

total cost, including approaches, was £155 7s.

The Bridge over Trout Creek has also been renewed. It is 140 feet in length, and cost £50.

There are no Bridges along this line which are likely to require renewing next year. Some repairs will probably be necessary to the Jemseg and to two other Bridges of the smaller class.

The Road may now be considered in good travelling condition throughout its entire length.

No. 37.—From Jemseg to Finger Bourd.—29 miles.

The two Bridges adverted to in last year's Report, respectively over Blair's Brook and Sherwood's Mill Stream, have both been renewed. The Blair's Brook Bridge is erected on hacmatac pile bents, with pine and hacmatac superstructure. The length, including approaches, is 168 feet, and the cost, £46 The Bridge over Sherwood's Stream has a span of 25 feet, and a total length, including approaches, of 150 feet, and cost £21 17 6.

Two hundred and seventy five rods of the turnpike have been renewed, at a cost of £21 14 3; and one hundred and nineteen rods have been gravelled, at a cost of £6 19s. The remainder of the appropriation has been laid out in making six new cross-drains, and in putting stone and gravel on soft places.

In addition to the foregoing, the sum of £23 3s. has been expended on this line

under the Labour Act.

The Bridge at Belleisle, which was injured by the early ice-freshet of last Spring, has been thoroughly repaired. All the Bridges are now in good condition, except that over Summerville Mill Stream, which will require new railing, and other trivial repairs. The Road is also in good travelling condition for the whole distance.

No. 38.—From Cole's Island to Cape Tormentine.—40 miles.

No expenditure has been required for the erection of new Bridges on this line the past year, and only £4 11s. has been laid out in Bridge repairs.

Three hundred and forty four rods have been turnpiked, at a cost of £46 16 8. The balance of the sum of £125 has been expended in general improvements and repairs along the line.

No new Bridges are likely to be required on this line the coming season. The

Gaspereau Bridge will need repairs to the extent of about £8 in expense.

The Road is in fair condition, and with the usual expenditure may be kept in good travelling order the coming season.

No. 39.—From Fredericton to Kent County Line.—56 miles.

On that portion of this Road extending from Barker's Landing to Queen's County Line, the expenditure during the past season has been £90. For this sum two small Bridges have been built, four hundred and seventy four rods turnpiked, and the line generally repaired and much improved since last year. The most of the expenditure has been between Little River Mills and the Landing, where it was most needed, and where further outlay is still required. A large number of the worst places has been well turnpiked at a low price, and the Road thereby greatly improved.

The principal fault extending through the whole 56 miles of the line, is the imperfect

draining, much of the ground being nearly level.

On the remaining portion of this line, extending through Queen's County to Kent County Line, the expenditure has been £132 8 7. Of this sum £98 11 7 has been for turnpiking, £12 for gravelling, and the remainder for repairing Bridges. The

whole line is now open for travelling with the exception of about two miles. A great part of the Road is good, and much has been done at comparatively small cost.

No. 40.—From Kent County Line to Richibucto.—44 miles.

A large portion of the expenditure on this Road during the past year, has been laid out in turnpiking and gravelling; being to the extent of two hundred and ninety one rods under the tormer head, and four hundred and seventy three rods under the latter, at an aggregate cost of £97 7 2, or about an average of 2s. 4s. per rod.

The condition of the Road on this line is still inferior to that of many others in the Province, but is yearly improving. As there are no Bridges that will require either renewing or material repairs during the coming season, the whole appropriation can be applied to the repairs and improvement of the Road.

No. 41.—From Tilley's Lunding to Little Ricer.—12 miles.

The sum of £233 5s. has, during the last season, been expended on this line; of which £47 6 6 has been for three new Bridges; £85 3 9 for repairs, chiefly on the great Bridge over the thoroughfare between the two Lakes; £76 14s. towards completing the long causeway, and the remainder in turnpiking and general repairs. The new line across the intervale has been opened, and the old one discontinued. A large addition has been made to the causeway near the thoroughfare, but it is not yet completed. The large Bridge has been new covered and otherwise repaired, and is in good condition. A new cedar Bridge has been built and well finished. The Road generally, though much improved since last year, requires yet several alterations to avoid hills; and much of it is flat and imperfectly drained.

No. 42.—From Sussex Vulc to Upham.—12 miles.

The expenditure on this line of Road has been principally in making and renewing turnpike and cross-drains, and in general repairs.

The Bridge over M'Monagle's Brook, and two others of a small class, have been

repaired at a cost of £5 8s.

Seven hundred and sixty four rods of turnpike have been renewed at a cost of £66 6s.

None of the Bridges will probably require entire renewal during the ensuing season. That over Price's Stream will require new stringers and covering, and another of small size will need repairs to a slight extent.

No. 43.—From South West Bridge to Gaspercau River.— 26 miles.

This is the new line of Road which was explored and located by Messieurs Parker and Burpe in 1858. On the southern end, commencing near the Gaspereau Bridge, the sum of £156 17 10 has been expended, of which £149 7 10 was in turnpiking, and £7 10s. for building a Bridge. About five miles of this end of the line have been opened and fitted for travelling. The work is in general well done, though several difficult hills are encountered.

On the northern end of this line four miles have been opened and prepared for turnpiking, by cutting out the forest 20 feet in width, clearing off all roots, stumps, &c., and levelling or grading ready for making the turnpike. This work was let by contract at 2s. 6d. per rod, amounting in all to the sum of £157 5s.

The foregoing system of Great Roads will require during the current year, the erection of twenty three new Bridges, and repairs to a large number of others, the estimated expense of which is £5,860. And for necessary repairs and improvements, extending over the whole of the several lines, including the erection of small Bridges, cross-drains, &c. the estimated expense is £7,640.

THE ADDITIONAL LINES OF GREAT ROAD

which, since 1st November last, came under the control and management of this Department, are severally distinguished by letters A to Q in last year's Report, and therein fully described. They have continued in the same state, with the exception of such slight repairs and improvements as may have been made by means of small appropriations

appropriations from the Bye Road Grants, and do not seem to require further observation at the present time. They comprise an extent of about 550 miles, and for the current year the sum of £4,500 will be requisite for the erection of necessary Bridges, and for maintaining the several lines in ordinarily good condition.

The foregoing estimates are exclusive of liabilities and balances due on special Bridge contracts already existing.

BRIDGES BUILT BY THE BOARD OF WORKS.

No. 1.—Caraquet Bridge.

This Bridge, the particulars of which were given in last year's Report, was not fully completed at the time specified in the contract, but was sufficiently advanced to admit of its use by the public.

The erection of this Bridge has reduced the number of Ferries on this line of Road to two; being those of Big Tracadie and Pokemouche; the former 1,400 feet, and the latter 1000 feet, in width.

The erection of Bridges at these Ferries is very desirable, and should be attended to as soon as the necessary funds can be conveniently provided.

No. 2.—New Canaan Bridge.

The new Bridge at this place, which was particularly described in the Report of last year, has been completed in a very satisfactory manner. Since when, a small sum has been expended in placing a quantity of brush and stone around the foundations of the abutments and piers for their more perfect security against undermining. Unless this structure should be injured or carried away by some extraordinary freshet, it will stand fit for use during at least fifty years.

No. 3.—Garden's Creek Bridge.

This Bridge is situated on the line of Road leading from Fredericton to Woodstock. Its re-construction was contracted for by Mr. Alexander Thompson for the sum of £367 10s. The new Bridge is to be built immediately below the site of the old one. The total length will be 183 feet, to consist of one small truss with a span of 37 feet, resting on two abutments, with an approach supported on three blocks formed of cedar logs, and connected by an earthen embankment with the old roadway. The width of the Bridge between the trusses will be 18 feet 6 inches, and of the approach between the posts 19 feet. The height of the flooring plank will be 22 feet above the bed of the stream; or on a level with the high part of the handrail of the present Bridge.

No. 4.—Putterson's Brook Bridge.

This Bridge is situated on the Road from Fredericton to Woodstock. The total length will be 85 feet, and the abutments will be 14 feet apart at the base and 18 teet at the roadway. The width of the roadway between the posts is to be 19 feet 9 inches, and its elevation from the bed of the ravine, on the up-stream side, 26 feet, or three feet higher than the roadway of the present Bridge.

The abutments are to be built of round cedar logs, not less than ten inches diameter at the smaller end, and carefully notched down with a bearing of not less than three inches on each other. The floor timbers over the span are to be double, consisting of seven logs in each tier, to be alternately fitted into the first and second cross logs on each side. The floor is to be formed by placing transversly at intervals of ten feet apart, cedar poles of 26 feet 9 inches in length, squared seven inches to the extent of five feet from each end, and fitted to the floor timbers as sills to sustain the posts of the railing and to afford outside footings for the braces on each side; the intervening spaces to be covered and fitted with cedar poles 21 feet in length, and eight inches diameter at the smaller end. A curb 12 inches square is to be extended in contact with the inside of the posts throughout the length of the Bridge on each side, and to be bolted to the timbers below. The intervening space is to be filled up throughout with gravel to the depth of 12 inches on the sides, increasing to 21 inches in depth in the centre of the roadway.

The reconstruction of this Bridge was let by public competition, and a contract entered into with Mr. N. D. Palmer for the completion of the same for the sum of £85.

No. 5. - Morton's Brook Bridge.

This Bridge is situated in Upper Sussex, in the County of King's, on the Road from Saint John to the Nova Scotia Line. A contract was entered into on the 12th day of January last, with Mr. Warren W. Price, of the Parish of Salisbury, in the County of Westmorland, for its reconstruction. It will be 160 feet in length, with a roadway 20 feet in breadth between the hand-railing, and 25 feet in height at the centre, with a water-way 8 feet in width and 12 feet in height. It is to be erected of round cedar logs, not less than 10 inches in diameter at the smaller end; the flooring to be of cedar poles not less than seven inches in diameter, with pine cap-sills and hand-railing, and a covering of one foot of good gravel; the whole to be completed for the sum of £215.

No. 6.—Bathurst Busin Bridge.

Plans and specifications have been prepared for a new Bridge at this place. The length will be 2,500 feet, and the height of the finished roadway above the flats, 12 feet. Commencing on the south side of the basin, the order and general dimensions of the work are as follow:—first, a shore block of 145 feet in length, succeeded by a span of 40 feet; then five blocks of 267 feet each, separated by as many spans of 16 feet each, which cross the first flat to the margin of the channel. The channel is crossed by nine blocks of 22 feet each, connected by nine spans of 16 feet each, and one span of 34 feet. Thence succeed a block of 262 feet, a span of 40 feet, and a shore block of 238 feet. The breadth between the railing to be 20 feet. The blocks will severally have a batter of two inches to a foot in height, so as to terminate in a breadth of 20 feet at the top. The shore blocks will be 24 feet wide at the base, and the channel blocks sufficiently wide to carry up the same batter.

All the shore blocks are to rest on a close-laid flooring of spruce poles, five inches in diameter at the smaller end, and 36 feet in length; and all the channel blocks are to rest on a like flooring of poles 40 feet in length. The four bottom courses of the shore blocks, and the channel blocks to the same common level, are to be of hemlock;

the remaining height of all the blocks is to be of cedar.

The shore blocks are to be well ballasted with stone to the uniform depth of two feet six inches, resting upon a ten inch cedar flooring laid three feet below the top of the several blocks; and the channel blocks are in like manner to be well ballasted with stone to the uniform depth of four feet six inches, resting upon a like flooring of cedar, laid five feet below the top; the whole to be covered with a hand laid coat of brush, of sufficient depth, extending also over the flooring of the several spans, the three large spans excepted; and the whole to be finished with a covering of good gravel, seven inches in depth at the sides, well packed to the levelling pieces, and increasing in depth to thirteen inches at the centre of the roadway. The three large spans are to be covered with four-inch plank. The hand-railing will be three feet five inches in height in eight feet panels, constructed of cedar and pine, in a thoroughly substantial manner.

The roadway of the Bridge is to be level from end to end, and to be united with the present Streets at the Town and Village ends respectively with a filling of good stone ballast, well covered and finished with gravel.

No. 7 .- Stoney Creek Bridge.

Plans and specifications have been prepared for a new Bridge at this place, and arrangements entered into with Mr. John Duffy for its erection for the sum of three

hundred and sixty five pounds.

This Bridge will be 275 feet in length, with one span of 38 feet. The face of each abutment will rest upon a foundation of piles. The material for the construction of both the abutments and approaches is to be hard wood, consisting of beech, birch, or maple, from the foundation to the ordinary level of high water, and cedar is to be used from thence upwards to the height of the flooring inclusive. The superstructure is to be of pine, and the covering of the roadway is to be of fine brush, overlaid with a

coating of gravel one foot in depth at the sides, increasing to eighteen inches in the centre. The whole to be completed on or before the 15th day of July next.

No. 8 .- Mactaquack Bridge.

A thorough examination of this Bridge was recently made, by which it was ascertained to be very much decayed and entirely unsafe. It was therefore decided that it should be rebuilt. Plans and specifications have been prepared, and tenders have been invited by public advertisement, with a view to a contract forthwith for the erection of a new Bridge. It is intended that the blocks shall be entirely of cedar logs, well ballasted, and covered with cedar poles and gravel, and that the super-structure shall be of the best white pine.

No. 9.—Grand Fulls Bridge.

The designing and arranging for the new structure at this place were referred to R. W. Burrowes, Esquire, Civil Engineer.

Upon examination of the location and the remaining works, in the Spring, the Board, although anxious to incur the least possible additional expense, decided to have a permanent Bridge constructed, even if the expense should amount to more than at first contemplated—one that would require the renewal of the roadway only, the remaining parts being composed of imperishable materials.

Plans and a specification were therefore prepared and furnished by Mr. Burrowes in June last.

The design for the new work is that of a Wire Suspension Bridge, with stone towers, and wooden roadway.

The cables will be formed of the best charcoal iron wire, of abundant strength, suspended on towers of the best description of masonry. The span between the points of suspension will be 214 feet, but owing to the distance of suitable anchorage on the eastern side, the whole length of each cable will be 420 feet. The roadway will consist of wooden trussed framing, 15 feet in clear width, and 198 feet in length between the towers.

Immediately on receiving the plans and specification from Mr. Burrowes, the work was resumed by Mr. Tomlinson, and continued until the 12th November, when it was found that it could not be completed during the remainder of the season. It was therefore suspended with a view to resuming the same in the Spring, and finishing it early in the Summer.

The removal of a considerable portion of the old masonry was found to be necessary in order to prepare suitable foundations and extent of base for the new towers.

The masonry of the new foundations is now all finished, and that of the towers partly advanced. The stone for the latter is quarried, and a considerable portion of it dressed and ready for laying. The only suitable stone to be found in the vicinity is difficult to quarry and expensive to prepare, but when finished makes superior work. Single blocks have been obtained of sufficient dimensions, or 5°0" x 5'6" x 1'2", when dressed, to form the cap pieces of the towers.

The anchor pits have been sunk to the depth of 20 feet. The irons and other materials for the anchorage of the cables have all been furnished and placed on the site. The wire for the cables has been purchased, and the materials for the trusswork of the roadway have all been prepared and placed on the ground ready to be put together.

The total cost of the new work, when completed, will be about £6000.

INTERNAL NAVIGATION.

DREDGING MACHINE.

After undergoing the necessary repairs at Oromocto, the Dredge was taken to the head of Grand Lake, and commenced working on the 13th day of May to deepen the water at that place. After having removed 28,050 cubic yards of material, the water became too low to permit the excavation to be continued so as to complete the improvement desired. The Machine was consequently on the 25th day of July removed to the Washademoac, where it commenced deepening the channel through a shoal at that place. After having removed 14,675 cubic yards, the water became so low that the operation could not be continued, and the Machine was consequently laid up at the same place for the winter. About twenty five days work will be required to finish the cut, so as to afford the depth of water necessary for the passage of Wood Boats with cargoes.

The Dredging Machine was built and fitted up in 1855, and commenced working on the 24th day of August of that year. It has been every season since that time, employed in deepening the water successively at the following places:—The outlet of Grand Lake, Oromocto Shoals, Ferry at Fredericton, Wharves at Steam Mills above the Falls at Saint John, Steam Ferry at Carleton, in the Harbour of Saint John, at Salmon River, Head of Grand Lake, and at Washademoac.

As it was late in the season of the first year before the Machine commenced working, only 28,000 cubic yards were removed. The following statement will shew the amount of work done, and the expenditure in each year:—

It will be seen by the foregoing statement, that during the five seasons specified, the total quantity of 239,023 cubic yards of material has been excavated and removed, at an aggregate cost of £9,838 16s., including the whole original cost of the Machine. Though it would appear that the above valuation of Is. 3d. per cubic yard, is about one half less than the contract price of similar work in Canada; yet, at this low estimate, the value of the work performed is equal to £14,938 18 9, leaving a net profit to the Province of £5,100 2 9, exclusive of the present worth of the Machine, which may be stated at £2,500.

The wear which the Machine has now sustained renders necessary a more thorough repair than heretofore. The endless chain, connecting the buckets, and which weighs nearly two tons, was repaired last Spring, but will now require entire renewal. Several of the buckets must be replaced and others repaired. The hull needs much repair before it can again be used, and the scows must be recalked. The total expense of these repairs is estimated by Captain Barker at £250, which sum, with £1000 for working expenses and ordinary repairs, is considered by the undersigned as necessary for the work of the ensuing season.

SAINT JOHN RIVER.

The improvements in this River during the past year, have been made chiefly at two places. At one, under the supervision of Thomas C. Atherton; and at the other, under the supervision of Stephen Glazier.

Those

Those under the management of Mr. Atherton have consisted principally in the blasting and removal of a large number of sunken and other boulders, which obstructed the safe navigation of the Meduciic Falls.

The work performed under Mr. Glazier's direction, was that of widening and deepening the channel at Bear Island Bar. Reports of these improvements will be found in Appendix (C.)

In addition to the foregoing, a small sum has been expended above Woodstock,

principally in improving the tow-path.

Through information derived from those interested in the navigation of the River, the undersigned is of opinion that a degree of improvement commensurate with the expense has been effected, both at the Meductic Falls and at the above mentioned Bar.

It is desirable that the sum of £400 should be appropriated to this service for the

current year.

SOUTH WEST MIRAMICHI RIVER.

The improvements on this River have been prosecuted by the former Commissioner,

Mr. Swim, who has extended them up stream a distance of forty miles.

From his Report, (Appendix C.) in which is fully described the character and extent of the improvements, it will be seen that the principal outlay has been required in blasting and removing from the channel large boulders, and in deepening the water over shoals and bars by means of the plough and scraper.

The season having been dry and the water extremely low, the work was done to

much greater advantage than in ordinary seasons.

The whole expenditure for the last year has been £156 14 5.

LIGHT HOUSES.

On the 29th day of April last, a Contract was made with Mr. Jonathan R. Stevens, of Harvey, in the County of Albert, for the erection of a Light House and a Keeper's House on Grindstone Island, at the Head of the Bay of Fundy, as adverted to in the last Annual Report. These Buildings have been finished, and the Lantern and Lighting apparatus, consisting of Lamps, Reflectors, &c. have been furnished, at a total cost of £851 13 9.

The Light of this Station was first shown on the 20th October last, and has since been continuously exhibited from sunset to sunrise; and from the reports of Masters

of Vessels, and of others interested in the Trade, gives general satisfaction.

A Contract was also made with Mr. P. M'Kay, of the City of Saint John, for the construction of a Light House and a Keeper's House at Swallow Tail, on the Island of Grand Manan. These Buildings have been very nearly finished, as will be seen by Mr. Woodward's Report, (Appendix D.) It is expected that the Lantern and Lighting apparatus will be ready and placed upon the Tower early in the ensuing Spring, and the Light then exhibited.

Both of the foregoing new Lights are in the Bay of Fundy. No additional ones have been erected on the Gulf Coast during the past year. Complaints have been

made of the want of Lights at Richibucto and Shediac Harbours.

The several Light Houses both in the Bay of Fundy and on the Gulf Coast, were during the past year kept in an efficient state by such ordinary repairs as were found necessary.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

The Buildings and Premises comprise-

- 1. The Residence of the Lieutenant Governor—(stone.)
- 2. The several out-buildings in the immediate vicinity of the same—(chiefly of wood.)
- 3. About 40 acres of ground variously sub-divided, and principally enclosed by wooden fencing.

The

The expenditure on the above during the past year has been confined to that required by ordinary repairs and improvements. The cost of Carpets and other Furniture provided for the Public Rooms in 1858, is included in the outlay for the past year, amounting to the total sum of £361 7 5.

Legislative Buildings and Public Offices in Fredericton.

These Buildings consist of—

- 1. Legislative Building—(wooden)—comprising Legislative Council Chamber, with President's Room, Clerks' Room, and two Committee Rooms; Assembly Hall, with Speaker's Room, Clerks' Room, three Committee Rooms, Ladies' Gallery, Reporters' Gallery, and two public apartments, Library Rooms, and the Hall and other Rooms appertaining to the Supreme Court.
- 2. Crown Land Office—(stone with an addition of wood) containing five apartments and a fire proof vault.
 - 3. Secretary's Office—(stone)—containing four apartments and a fire proof vault.
 - 4. Executive Council Chamber—(wood) two rooms.
 - 5. Education Office—(wood)—two rooms.
 - 6. Audit Office—(wood)—three rooms.
 - 7. Fredericton Post Office—(wood)—two rooms.
 - 8. Clerk of Pleas Office—(stone)—two rooms.

The Office of Public Works and the General Post Office are in buildings rented from private owners.

The whole expenditure on the foregoing Public Buildings during the past year has, it is believed, been smaller than for many previous years, having amounted to only £221 14 2. The several Buildings have been kept in their usual state of repair, and the above amount includes the cost of the Carpet, &c. mentioned in last year's Report.

The sum of £66 19 8 has been paid for Wood and Coal for the Legislative Council

and the House of Assembly.

In order to meet the necessary expenditure on the foregoing Buildings during the current year, the undersigned would recommend that the usual sum of £750 should be placed at the disposal of Your Excellency.

Brick Buildings, &c. in the City of Fredericton.

In the following Table is presented a Statement relative to certain securities, consisting of fire-proof Buildings and other Property in the City of Fredericton, bought in at Sheriff's Sale on 16th April and on 1st June last, under Executions in favour of the Crown, issued out of the Supreme Court, on proceedings instituted to recover Interest due and in arrear on Loans made in aid of the erection of such Buildings under the provisions of the Local Act 14th Victoria, Chapter 17.

It is not probable that the immediate resale of any of these Buildings would realize the whole claim of the Crown affecting the same. In the meantime the due super-

vision and eventual disposal of the property require attention.

PROVINCIAL LUNATIC ASYLUM.

The Buildings provided for the above Asylum, were placed under the control of this Department by Act of Assembly, during the last Session of the Legislature.

The sum of £196 9 9, has been expended on the same during the past year; of which the sum of £157 6 10, was for the erection of roofed enclosures adapted to afford respectively to the male and female inmates, necessary exercise and recreation in the open air at all seasons and under all conditions of the weather.

The slate roof of the main or centre Building was found to be in a leaky state near two of the chimneys, and in other places where slates had been blown off. These defects were remedied by replacing the slates and applying lead around the chimneys, at an expense of £20 9 \hat{z} .

In addition to the foregoing, there has been a small expense incurred in painting the roofs and fencing of the new enclosures.

The repairs which will be necessary throughout the establishment during the coming season, are particularized in the Medical Superintendent's Report to this Department, which will be found in the Appendix (G.) From personal knowledge, after careful inspection of the Buildings and Grounds, the undersigned is of opinion that such necessary repairs are very correctly stated.

Dr. Waddell strongly urges the importance of completing the original design of the Building, in order to furnish the additional accommodation which the increasing number of patients appears to require. The cost of the work, according to the estimate of a competent mechanic, will be about £3,500. The propriety of the proposed enlargement was sufficiently manifest to the undersigned, in the overcrowded condition of some of the apartments when he visited the Institution.

PROVINCIAL PENITENTIARY.

The additions or improvements to the Buildings connected with this Institution during the past year, have been of small extent; consisting principally of a trunk drain 250 feet in length, a tank under ground outside of the workshops, to contain water for the supply of the steam boiler, and certain necessary repairs, amounting in all to the sum of £60. The Secretary has furnished a Report, (Appendix I.) stating the further repairs which have become necessary, and the expediency of replacing the present defective wooden Storehouses by a permanent building of stone or brick.

All the foregoing is respectfully submitted.

APPENDIX B.

DREDGING MACHINE.

Report of James M. Barker, of the work performed by the Provincial Steam Dredge during the Year 1859.

Sir,—Having finished my labours with the Provincial Dredge for this year, I have the honor to lay before you, herewith, a detailed statement of the labour performed at Salmon River and at Washademoak, shewing 28,050 cubic yards excavated at the former, and 14,675 cubic yards at the latter. On account of the low state of the

water, our labours were brought to a much earlier close than usual.

I commenced repairing Dredge, Scows, and Chains, on the 23rd day of April, arrived at Salmon River on the 13th day of May, and continued to work until the 23rd of July, except during a delay of seven days, occasioned by the breaking of a cog wheel. The work at this place was as follows: The first cut, from Stewart's to Briggs', was 85 rods long, material sand, excavation 7 feet in depth. There is some doubts whether it will be permanent. The next cut was at Mistake, clay bottom, 30 rods long, 55 feet wide, 5 feet deep. The next was at Curley's, 15 rods long, 55 feet wide, 5 feet deep; also clay bottom. The Dredge will be required eight weeks on Salmon River to complete the channel from M'Donald's to D. Briggs'. On account of the lowness of the water, we were obliged to remove from Salmon River to the Washademoak on the 25th day of July; commenced operations on the 28th, and continued without intermission to 27th August, and were then obliged to suspend our labours on account of the water being so low. The work at this place was a cutting 150 rods long, 55 feet wide, and from 4 to 7 feet deep, bottom clay, and when completed will be a permanent job. The Dredge however will be required at this place from three to four weeks to make a thorough finish.

The repairs on the Dredge have heretofore been small, but to put her in thorough working order for the next season, will require an outlay of fully £250.

APPENDIX C.

THE RIVER SAINT JOHN.

Report of Thomas C. Atherton, Commissioner for improving the Navigation of the River Saint John at the Meductic Falls.

Southampton, December 1, 1859.

SIR,—The work of improving the Meductic Falls was commenced as early as the state of the water permitted. By means of small Boats and the aid of six men, I judged that the tops of some of the most dangerous boulders in the Falls could be reduced by blasting, with economy and dispatch.

In this labour we were to some extent successful, but soon found that in order to remove those large boulders from the bed of the channel, it was necessary to construct a temporary breakwater to be placed above the boulder, in order to divert the force of the current during the process of removal.

Such

Such a breakwater was consequently made, and the Crane Boat was at the same time repaired, to be used in mooring the breakwater where required, and in hoisting it as each boulder should be removed.

The expedient proved to answer well, and I am satisfied that without it we could not have beneficially applied our labour to the large boulders which by its aid we successfully removed. By the close of the second week we had removed three or four of such boulders from the bed of the channel, thus proving the practicability of removing all those which had heretofore impeded the passage of Steamers at low water.

During the third week a second breakwater was therefore constructed, by which additional facility and a force of 18 men, we succeeded in removing twelve of the most dangerous boulders from the channel, varying in weight from 5 to 30 tons by estimation, and some of which had received fifty blasts from 18 to 36 inches in depth, and from one to two and a half feet under water. By the close of the fourth week, with the same arrangements and number of men, we had succeeded in removing some thirty large boulders from the bed of the channel, making the Falls much smoother and quite safe, so that in my opinion a Steamer of no greater draught than the "Bonnie Doon" could without risk pass through at the lowest pitch of water.

It is at the same time necessary that the channel should be made wider for the convenience and safety of ascending Steamers, which owing to the rapidity of the

current sometimes lose steerage way, and swing round.

With this object and in order to remove projecting points of rock, and to give boats a straight run, the succeeding four weeks were employed, with an average force of eleven men. During this period some of the boulders were reduced and some of the most dangerous removed, the labour being employed nearer to the shore or the bed of the channel as the rise or fall of the water permitted.

Additional work of the same kind remains to be done, in particular at Betts' Rapids

and at Shaw's Rocks. The tow-path is also in much need of improvement.

Report of Stephen Glasier, Commissioner for improving the Navigation of the River Saint John, at Bear Island Bar.

Fredericton, 11th January, 1860.

SIR,—Having been authorized by you to improve the Navigation of the River Saint John at Bear Island Bar, I, in company with Captain Smith of the Steamer Bonnie Doon, in the month of August last, made an examination of the River. We found the deepest water at the breach or break in the Dam, where the channel was before the Dam was built. Notwithstanding it was somewhat crooked, we came to the conclusion that it was best to open that channel, as the main body of water passed through it.

It would cost a large sum of money to repair the Dam, and when repaired, in my opinion, would never stand. The break in the Dam was about fifty feet; we enlarged it sixty feet more, which made a channel of about one hundred and ten feet. We now find, by running the Steamer through it, that it should be made still larger. I would recommend that fifty feet of the Dam should be taken off on the west side, or at the Point of Hog Island, and also remove some of the Bar on the east side, which would help to straighten the channel. I think that the sum of £150 would be sufficient to make that part of the River navigable for Steamers of light draught of water during the Summer season.

In reference to the channel that has been used since the Dam was built, I think it can never be opened so as to make it passable without a very large expenditure of money, and then subject to be filled up by the ice. The Bar is enlarging and will continue to do so unless the cause is removed. This can only be done by changing the course of the water by building a Wing Dam from the head of Bear Island towards the eastern shore, and also from the head of Long Island to the western shore, so as to turn the water down between the two Islands; but such alteration would cost a large amount of money.

SOUTH WEST MIRAMICHI RIVER.

Report of Robert Swim, of the improvements of the South West Miramichi River, during the Year 1859.

Blissfield, 17th November, 1859.

SIR,—My labours as Commissioner for improving the South West Branch of the Miramichi River, having been brought to a close for the present season, I now report thereon for the information of your Department.

In order that you may have a correct idea of the nature and extent of the work done under my supervision, I proceed to give a detailed statement of the places improved, from the head of the tide to the "Quaw Leach," (a distance of 40 miles,) and the

nature and extent of these improvements.

In commencing operations I began at the "Quaw Leach," eight miles above the Doak Bridge. This part of the River to the Bridge had several large rocks which interfered very much with the navigation, namely-at "Quaw Leach," " Half Moon Cove," and at Nelson's. All these were removed by blasting, and a material improvement made in this portion of the River. From the Doak Bridge down to "Bull's Rapids," (22 miles.) the work was more thorough in its character. The large sunken rocks were blasted, and those of a smaller size, with the larger fragments of those blasted, were raised by grapnels and removed from the channel by scows. The "Bars" differ very much from each other in the materials that enter into their formation. From Doak's to Cain's River they are principally gravel bars, and from Cain's River to the head of the tide they are formed of round granite rock, resting on a clay stratum. These were improved by removing the rocks in scow loads and using the plough and scraper. By this course of proceeding an additional depth of water was obtained varying from nine to fifteen inches. I would particularly notice the following Rapids and Bars thus improved: At "Swim's Rapid" removed three scow loads of rock, which increased the depth of water nine inches. At "Robinson's Rapids" blasted seven large rocks, removing the fragments and several scow loads of smaller size; in the vicinity of this Rapid improved a gravel bar by the plough and scraper, which increased the depth of water one foot. At "Harris' Rocks" blasted a large number of granite and free stone rocks of large size, and cleared the channel by the aid of the grapuel—a short distance below blasted a large granite rock and removed several others. In this vicinity deepened "Arbo's Bar" by means of the plough and scraper, and the depth of water was increased considerably. At "Bull's Rapids" blasted three large rocks and removed the smaller size to the extent of several scow loads, deepening the water fifteen inches. In consequence of the protracted drought the water was very low in the River, which made it a favourable time to blast those large sunken rocks in the "White Rapids," which could not be got at so advantageously in an ordinary season. Having an improved apparatus for under-water blasting, I was the more anxious to improve this Rapid, by far the most difficult and dangerous on the River. Accordingly I blasted six large granite rocks and one free stone, removing the fragments in the manner already described. Further down the Rapid there was a large granite rock known as the "Heckle." Years ago several attempts were made to remove this dreaded impediment, but were ineffectual. Some idea may be had of its immense size from the fact that it required 32 charges, all of which took effect, to reduce it so as to be removed by means of grapuels. A mile further down I blasted three large rocks, removing the fragments, and a short distance above the tide blasted the "M'Kenzie Rock," and several others in that vicinity. Whilst employed in this locality a freshet came on, and nothing further could be done to advantage the remainder of the season. I, however, employed a part of the time in improving the tow-path around the Rapids, which for the purposes of navigation is as necessary as blasting and removing the rocks.

The action of the frosts and the heavy rains on the clay hills in this locality and for some miles above frequently loosens large portions of the soil, causing land-slides which carry down with them large trees, and completely block up the tow-path. Three of these "slides" were removed this Summer, and the tow-path improved for several miles above the Rapids. I expended a portion of the Grant above Boiestown, blasting

blasting those rocks that were the greatest impediment in that part of the River. The improvements made embraced a distance of 20 miles, viz: from "Rocky Bend" (18 miles above Boiestown,) to the chain of rocks above the "Narrows." The places thus improved were "Rocky Bend," "Burnt Hill," "M'Millan's Pond," "Poff's Defeat," "The Narrows," and the chain of rocks above.

The above statement embraces the nature and extent of the improvements made by me for the present season, which have materially benefited the Navigation, more particularly from the head of the tide to the Doak Bridge. In proof of this I would remark, that from Indian Town to the Forks of Cain's River, on an average, an additional depth of fifteen inches of water has been obtained on the Bars and Rapids already referred to, and from the latter place to Doak's, the channel has been deepened on an average nine inches.

There are several places along the River which yet require to be improved, viz: "Mahoney's Rapids," "Harris' Rapids," "Black Rapids," "Grey Rapids," and "Underhill's Rapids" The rocks in these Rapids are all large and sunken, and can only be blasted at very low water. The sum of £200, in my opinion, would make all the improvements on the Bars and Rapids from the Doak Bridge to Indian Town,

that could be made without the aid of the Dredging Machine.

From the Doak Bridge to Boiestown, (17 miles) several rocks would require to be blasted, and others removed by the means of grapules; the Bars which are principally formed of gravel could be very much improved by the plough and scraper. The sum of £100 could be judiciously expended on this part of the River. Above Boiestown, "the chain of rocks" is now the greatest obstacle. The inhabitants are very anxious that this part of the River should be improved, and a small Grant, say £50, could be

expended here to good advantage.

In drawing this Report to a close, I would observe, that a very extensive business is done on this River, far exceeding that of any other in the Province—the Saint John excepted. Large quantities of merchandise are transported in tow boats to Boiestown, and frequently many miles above; and as the navigation of the River improves, the traffic will proportionally increase. In addition to the large and increasing population on the banks of the main River, several of the larger tributaries are thickly settled, particularly the Bartholomew's, Cain's, and Taxes Rivers. The population of these tributaries increase the general traffic on the River, and are as much interested in the improvement of the navigation as if living along its banks. When the Road from the Doak Bridge to the Gaspereaux River is opened up, and a thriving settlement springs up along the line, a very great impetus must be given to the River trade, which will demand all the increased facilities which an improved navigation can furnish.

Report of I. Woodward, Superintendent of Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy, on the completion of the Grindstone Island Light House.

Commission of Light Houses, St. John, N. B. Dec. 12, 1859.

Sir,—Since my communication to you of the 13th October last, on the subject of the Light House at Grindstone Island, I have now to report that the work was completed, the Station lighted on the 20th of that month as reported, and since continuously exhibited from sunset to sunrise. From reports by Masters of Coasting Vessels and others, it is represented as showing a good light, and useful to those navigating that part of the Bay.

I enclose you a "Notice to Mariners," containing a description of the Light House, with bearings and distances of certain points in the vicinity, with instructions for

running

running into the anchorage near the Light House, known by Coasters as the "Five fathom Hole." For the bearings and distances, and the instructions for sailing into the anchorage, I am indebted to Captain Shortland, R. N., in charge of the Surveying

party in the Bay of Fundy.

Copies of the Notice are posted in the Treasury Office at this Port, and at the different Deputy Treasurer's Offices in the Bay of Fundy, say at Saint Stephen, Saint Andrews, Saint George, Harvey, Hillsborough, Moncton, Dorchester, Sackville, Bay of Verte, and North Joggins; also sent to the Board of Works, Halifax, Nova Scotia, and to the Harbour Department, Admiralty, London. I had also the Notice inserted once in the daily Papers of the City.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

GRINDSTONE ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE.

Notice is hereby given, that on and after Thursday Night, the 20th October instant, a fixed White Light will be exhibited from sunset to sunrise in the Lantern on the Wooden octagonal Light Tower, sixty feet above the level of high water, lately erected on the western point of Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in latitude 45° 43′ 13″ N., longitude 64° 37′ 25″ W. The octagonal Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 50 feet to the eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House, as follows:-

Cape Enrage Light, by Compass, S. 611° W. 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of Saint Mary's Ledge, by Compass, N. 40° W. 6 1-10 miles.

The point of low water off the Light House, by Compass, S. 78° W. 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10° W. 3-10 mile, it dries at low springs, and has about 2½ fathoms

on it at half-tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15° W. 6 1-10 mile, it has 11 fathoms on its shoalest part at low

water springs.

To enter Grindstone Island Anchorage—when in a fair way off Cape Enrage, steer nearly for Grindstone Island Light, keeping it a little on the starboard bow, until it is about one mile distant, when haul a little more to the northward, taking care on the one side not to approach the Light nearer than 4-10 mile, and on the other to keep Enrage Light open of Saint Mary's Point (which avoids Saint Mary's Ledge) until Grindstone Island Light bears S. 30° E. when the vessel will be passed Saint Mary's Ledge, and can haul more to the northward, towards Shepody Mountain, and anchor any where off and near to the middle ground.

There is a Light House and Keeper's House erected at the Swallow's Tail, on the northeastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy, which will be lighted next season. The Light House is 45 feet from base to deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel, between Brier Island and Grand Manan. Both Houses are painted white.

Report of I. Woodward on Light House on "Swallow Tail," Grand Manan.

Commission of Light Houses, St. John, N. B. Dec. 15, 1859.

Sir,—I have to report, that in accordance with your request made to me in the month of June last, that I would proceed to Grand Manan, taking with me Mr. John P. M'Kay, and select a site for a Light House at the "Swallow's Tail," which he had contracted

contracted to build, we left Saint John on the 27th June by Steamer for Eastport, where, joined by Captain Robinson, R. N., Commissioner of Light Houses, we proceeded to Grand Manan, where, on the 28th and 29th, we selected a spot on the Point known as the "Swallow's Tail," for the contemplated Light House and Keeper's House, and made an arrangement with the owner of the land, Mr. James Small, residing at Sprague's Cove, as follows:—

Grand Manun, N. B. 29th June, 1859.

I do hereby agree to sell and convey to the Government of this Province, for Light House purposes, so much of my land at the outer Point known as the "Swallow's Tail," as may be required for a Light House Establishment, at the option of the Government, quantity not to exceed four acres, for £6 5s. (\$25) per acre.

We then selected and marked the precise spots for the Light House and Keeper's House, and directed Mr M'Kay to go on with their erection under his Contract, according to the Plans and Specifications, which he did, and completed the same with the exception of the deck, which has to remain until the Lantern is ready, when it will be completed and finished with the placing of the Lantern on the Tower. The Lantern will be prepared and ready as early the ensuing Spring as the season and weather will permit.

I have paid Mr. M'Kay according to your instruction and with the consent of his Sureties, William Wright and William V. Robertson, from time to time, as the work progressed, in all up to this period, £448 6 5, out of the amount of the contract of £495, besides which there will be a small amount of extra work not included in the

Specification, and some alterations, not to exceed £40.

I visited the Point while the work was in progress, but at the time of finishing or closing the work for the season I was prevented by the weather from getting there in time to meet the Contractor, who, in the mean time, had closed up and returned here, bringing with him, at my previous suggestion, a Certificate from Mr. Small, a man of good judgment, and from Mr. Drugan, a carpenter, in whom I think confidence may be placed, as follows, viz:—

Grand Manan, October 29, 1859.

We, the undersigned, having been called by Mr. John P. M'Kay to examine a Light House and Keeper's House, built on "Swallow's Tail," and having examined the Specification, we find the work done in accordance therewith, in every respect, in substantial workmanlike manner, with the exception of the outside of the Light House, which is specified to be clapboarded, but is shingled with the best pine shingles, which we consider is a much superior job and is done in a faithful workmanlike manner.

I am now preparing Drawings and Specifications for the Lantern and Lighting apparatus, and expect to have it all furnished here with the exception of the parabolic silvered Reflectors, which will have to be imported from England or the United States. I estimate the cost of the Lantern, Glass, Lamps, Reflectors, &c. will be about £500, making the whole amount for the erection and completion of the Light Station about £1000.

Sir,—I am directed by the Commissioners to forward to you, with the request that you will lay the same before His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, copies of a Letter from Mr. T. T. Vernon Smith, C. E., of the 26th April last, in answer to my

enquiry on the subject of a Steam Whistle on Partridge Island, as a guide to Passenger Steamers and other Vessels approaching this Harbour in foggy weather, with a tracing of the Engine, Boiler, &c., for producing the sound from the whistle; also of an offer from Messrs. Fleming and Humbert, of the 3rd May, ult., to put the same in operation for £300, with a guarantee that the Whistle shall be heard at the distance of six miles.

Those documents were submitted by me, under the direction of the Commissioners, to the Chamber of Commerce, at a meeting of that Body on the 10th of May ult., and by them referred to a Committee for their report on the subject. On the 9th instant they were returned with a note from the Secretary, covering Resolution of the Chamber, with Report of their Committee of the 24th May, copies of which are annexed.

The Commissioners respectfully recommend that they may be allowed to accept and carry out the proposal of Messrs. Fleming & Humbert, particularly as there will not be any expense incurred unless the Whistle should be effective for the purpose contemplated.

DEAR SIR,—I beg to enclose you a tracing of a Whistle Signal adapted for the entrance of a Harbour, to guide Vessels during toggy weather. The Whistle is a six inch diameter sharp toned bell whistle, similar to those in ordinary use on Railways, but much larger, and intended to be actuated in the same manner, and by steam of the same pressure. Locomotive Whistles are seldom made over four inches in diameter, giving a whistling circumference of 12 linear inches, measured on the rim of the bell. This I propose to be six inches in diameter, giving a circumference of nearly 19 inches exposed to the steam, and creating consequently a much larger and louder volume of sound. The steam is admitted to the whistle bell by a self-closing valve pressed down by the tail of a lever, the other end of which is raised by a succession of cogs on a movable clutch, set according to previous arrangement, and understood by the Shipping frequenting the Port. As shewn in the drawing, the whistle lever would be raised three times in the first 15 seconds, giving three short shrill alarms. It would then for half a minute give a scream that would be distinctly audible from eight to twelve miles out to sea. In the next 15 seconds, four short whistles would close the diapason, and for two minutes the whole affair would be silent. Of course these distances and times could be altered, but as the consumption of steam would be very great, I do not think that a longer period of whistling would be advisable per hour on the average, than I have given above, or one quarter of the whole time.

A vessel approaching at the rate of ten miles per hour would hear this whistle for an hour before she passed Partridge Island, and during that time she would have twenty distinct rounds of the signal to assure her that nothing else but the Partridge Island Signal was causing the whistling.

The Boiler is what is called in England a four horse Agricultural Boiler, which is worth, complete with furnace bars, chimney, gauge cocks, spring balance, and water pump, with 27 21 inch iron tubes, Lowmore firebox, and every thing complete, £145. The small Trunk Engine to supply the Boiler with water and actuate the whistle, would be about £65, including the worm and spur wheel, or altogether £210, exclusive of house and well, neither of which may be necessary. In addition to this, to guard against the effect of echo and to intensify the sound, I would recommend a Russian or galvanized iron speaking tube about ten feet long, with a reflector at the back of the whistle, to throw the whole of the sound of the tube. I think that the expense of the whole affair need not be over £250. The consumption of fuel would be probably about 30lbs, of common coal per hour, or 6 cwt. per day of 24 hours, if worked continuously. It would require feeding about once an hour, and with the addition of a governor to regulate the speed, would be as near automatic as possible.

The men attending the Lights would soon know all there was to know about it, and as I understand from you that about 10 weeks would be all that would be required per annum, the annual expense of fuel, oil, wear and tear, and every thing, would not amount to over £25 per annum.

SIR,—The Committee named at a late meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, to make enquiries and report on the utility of having a Steam Whistle placed on Partridge Island, to assist Steamers and Sailing Vessels to enter the Harbour more safely in thick and foggy weather, beg leave to report—

That your Committee have availed themselves of the opinion of several scientific men, as to the practicability of constructing an instrument of sufficient power on which reliance at all times could be placed, and from the evidence of the Commanders of the American Steamers plying between this and the Port of Boston, as to the distance the ordinary Whistle in use on board Steamers on the coast may be heard to windward when blowing fresh, they, your Committee, are fully convinced that a Steam Whistle may be so constructed and placed on Partridge Island, that in all cases of thick and foggy weather, Steamers and Sailing Vessels may safely approach to within hearing distance, and be so guided by its sound, as to enter the Harbour comparatively in safety; and your Committee would strongly recommend that the Chamber of Commerce do urge the immediate undertaking of the work, believing as they do, that it will be of far greater service than any of the appliances now in use for the purpose.

Str,-I beg to inform you that the Steam Whistle built by Messrs. Fleming and Humbert, has been taken down to Partridge Island, and on Saturday was at work from 12 M. to 41 p. M., to test its powers. From the accounts of the Captains of Vessels at sea, it appears to have been distinctly heard by a schooner at Pasirinco, by the Conqueror Steamer, and the Lampedo Packet Ship, six miles south of the Island, and as far as can be ascertained, for a circuit of at least five miles. There was but little wind at the time, but that little was S. W. to W., so that Pasirinco-ten miles distant, was to windward. The Whistle is not at present protected by any house; the Whistles themselves have not been gauged to the proper height for eliciting the best sound, as such can only be done experimentally, for which adjusting screws are provided; and what is of more consequence, the reflector to concentrate and throw the sound out to sea, has not been placed in position to effect that, and cannot be so, till a proper house is erected over it. In the trials on Saturday, the effect of the wind on the exposed Whistles was evident, and the sound was diffused and spread in all directions, instead of being concentrated and thrown out to sea. The working of the machinery was perfect, and the ability of the Boiler to raise the requisite amount of Steam on a light consumption of fuel sufficiently demonstrated.

Extract from Chapter 20 of the Revised Statutes, for "The Regulation of Light Houses"

"There shall be paid to the Queen for the support of Light Houses erected or to be erected upon any of the coasts of the Bay of Fundy, or Islands, or Rocks adjacent, a Duty of three pence per ton, according to the Register, of all Vessels which shall arrive at any place within such Bay, except such as may be one hundred tons or under, on which shall be annually paid as follows:—Not less than seventy five tons, thirty five shillings; not less than fifty tons, thirty shillings; not less than thirty five tons, twenty five shillings; and all under thirty five tons, twelve shillings; but on Vessels arriving from any place without the Bay of Fundy, and visiting several places within the Bay to complete the voyage, the Duties shall not be levied more than once, and in no case shall a vessel be liable for Duties oftener than six times in any one year."

Sir,—In accordance with your request dated 24th November, relative to the running of the Steamer Arabian, I beg to say, that the Steamer in question made ten full trips from Quebec to Shediac, and called, both ways, at Rimouski, Gaspe, Paspebiac, Dalhousie, Bathurst, Chatham, Newcast'e, and Richibueto, the dates and particulars of which you will find under, viz:—

Trip No. I. down.—Left Niagara on 28th May for Quebec, at which place was detained until 3rd June to get Boiler tested, and Brass Cocks and Water Gauges put on same. Left Quebec on 3rd June, called at Miramichi, and arrived at Shediac on 7th.

NOTE.-Was detained at Shedine from 7th to 15th June repairing Air Pump Rod which had got damaged going down.

Trip No. 1, up.—Lest Shediac on Wednesday the 15th June, called at all the Ports, and arrived at Quebec on Sunday 20th.

Trip No. 2, down.—Left Quebec on Wednesday 22nd June, called at all the Ports, and arrived at Shediac on Sunday 26th.

Trip No. 2, up.—Lest Shediac on Wednesday 29th June, called at all the Ports, and arrived at Quebec on Monday 4th July.

Trip No. 3, down.—Left Quebec on Wednesday 6th July, called at all the Ports, and arrived at Shediac on Sunday 10th.

Trip No. 3, up.—Left Shediac on Wednesday the 13th July, got aground in the Harbour of Richibucto, had to lighten Steamer, and put Barges under to get off; was three days aground. Called at Chatham, and pushed on to Quebec to get on regular day of sailing, arriving on Tuesday evening the 19th, and by putting on extra crew was enabled to leave again on 20th.

APPENDIX G.

PROVINCIAL LUNATIC ASYLUM.

Report of the Medical Superintendent.

Provincial Lunalic Asylum, St. John, N. B. Dec. 31, 1859.

At your request, I beg to report to you on the subject of new work completed, repairs made, and amount expended by your instructions in connexion with this Institution, during the last year; also on buildings, furniture, fences, and repairs required, with an estimate of probable cost.

New

is Completely with

New work done.—A fence for the purpose of an enclosure for the benefit of the patients, has been erected around the north wing. (or Lodge,) eight feet four inches in height, and one hundred and seventy feet in length. This fence is boarded on both sides with inch pine, with base on the outside, and the posts are cedar. Around three sides of this yard, to the extent of one hundred and forty eight feet, a shed roof covered with pine boards and cedar shingles has been put on, for the purpose of affording shelter to patients from summer sun and winter storm, when exercising in open air. This roof is ten feet on the rafter, and supported by the fence in the rear and cedar posts on the front, and finished with arch-work from post to post. On one side of the yard, under the roof, there is a floor of two inch stuff seventy six feet long and eight feet wide.

From the yard above described, a fence has been built eight feet six inches high, running south one hundred and fifty feet, across the rear of the main centre building to a corresponding enclosure around the south wing, (or Lodge.) This sence is made with cedar posts, and boarded on both sides with inch pine, with cap and base board on both sides, with a large gate and a small one in the centre, entering the large square yards in the rear of the main building. The enclosure on the south is larger than the one on the north, and is divided into two yards, the one for females and the other for

males in the south wing.

The fence surrounding these yards on the south side, is of the same material and the same height as the new one described, and was built a few years ago. Around three sides of it, and to the extent of two hundred and twenty seven feet, a roof of the same material and dimensions and finish, and supported in the same manner, has been recently put on; and for the whole length of the roof, two hundred and twenty seven feet, a floor has been laid of the same width, and with plank of the same thickness, all corresponding with work of the same kind on the north.

For these roofs, fences, and floors, a large quantity of scantling has been used for

plates and rafters, ribbons and sleepers.

The ceiling in the basement of the lodge on the north has been lathed.

These jobs have been done, in a very satisfactory manner, by James Quinton, Esquire. His bill for labour and materials is herewith forwarded, amount £157 6 10.

The painting of the fences and roofs above described is being done by Mr. Isbister. He furnishes all materials, oil and metallic paint, and performs the labour, for two coats, on a rough surface, at eight pence per yard.

Repairs made.—The slate roof, on the main centre building, was in a very leaky state at two points, near two chimneys, and every gale some slates are blown off. As no repairs had been done since last winter, the whole roof, centre building and wings, required a slate here and there; and to make a satisfactory job at the chimneys, some lead was required. The materials were furnished, and the labour performed, by Messrs. Crosby, and their Bill is now forwarded, amount £19 2 2.

Plastering.—The ceiling in the basement in the men's lodge has been newly plastered, and the broken plaster through the whole establishment has been repaired. Besides this, all repairs of every kind in the masons' department, have been attended to, preparatory to winter. This work has been done by Mr. Hopkins, and his Bill for labour and materials now enclosed, amounts to £20 0 9.

New work required.—A three story building, forty by thirty six feet, on the northeast corner, with a two story wing, sixty by thirty feet, to connect on the south with the main centre building, and another two story wing, seventy by twenty eight feet, to connect on the west with the three story building now designated "The Lodge," on the northwest corner, to complete the north wing.

Annexed is Mr. Crosby's note on the subject of probable cost.

Owing to the unfortunate circumstance of the walls in the main centre building having been originally plastered on the brick, many of the rooms have become so damp, and the plaster so much destroyed, that they are now unfit for use. Two of these rooms 18 x 19, 12 feet high, are parlours connected with the halls occupied by patients, and their condition is such as to render it absolutely necessary for the health and comfort of the occupants that they should be lathed and plastered anew. Messrs. Quinton and Hopkins estimate the expense at £21 for each room. 82

The furniture in the best halls, is very deficient, and ill-adapted to the purpose to which it is now put, and a small sum is required to supply what is urgently needed to make the apartments comfortable and respectable.

From the corner on which Mr. Graham's Cottage stands, along the line of the road to Mr. Avery's corner, thecce along Avery's line to a point near the River at the Suspension Bridge, thence westerly around the grounds till it joins the fence erected on the upper side of the road to the Suspension Bridge, a new fence of the same height and description of the one referred to, and which it is to join at both ends, is much needed, to prevent the escape of patients who might be entrusted to enjoy themselves within such an enclosure, and who ought not to be allowed to go at large. Probable expense about £14 per one hundred feet.

Should the erection of this sence in the meantime be deserred, then the old one will require in repairs, alterations, and extensions, an expenditure of about from £20 to £25.

General Repairs.—Around a large establishment like this, many repairs in the course of the year are likely to be required, that it is impossible to foresee and specify, but for which it would be prudent to provide.

APPENDIX H.

LIGHT HOUSES IN THE GULF OF SAINT LAWRENCE.

Report of the Commissioners.

Miramichi, 7th January, 1860.

Sir.—Herewith we beg to hand you account of expenditure for the support of Escuminac and Miscou Lights during the past year, amounting, with Commission, to the sum of £211 2 4.

Some necessary repairs have been put on the Keeper's House at Escuminac, and the Light House was painted; both of which were absolutely required for the preservation of the buildings.

At Miscou it was found that in calm weather there was not sufficient draft to carry off the smoke from the Lantern, and tin tubes or smoke conductors were procured, similar to those already in use at Escuminac. These have fully answered the purpose, saving much labour and material formerly required in cleaning the glass, and adding to the brilliancy of the light. These improvements have added a little to this year's expenditure, but will be of permanent benefit; and we are glad to be able to state that the lights continue to give the utmost satisfaction, and have been of great service to the Shipping and Gulf Steamers during the past season.

An iron tank will be necessary to hold the oil at Miscou Light, which we will feel authorized to have provided early next season. The expense will be from £15 to £20.

APPENDIX I.

Report of the Secretary of the Provincial Penitentiary.

Saint John, 1st February, 1860.

Sir,—In reply to your communication of 9th ultimo, calling for a statement of new crections added to, and repairs made on the Buildings of the Provincial Penitentiary during the year ending 31st October last, also a description and estimate of cost of what may be required to be done the present year, I have the honor to report—

That the expenditure during the past year has been confined to some alterations and repairs to the Out-buildings, and the building of a Tank connected with the Steam Engine, and amounts to about £60.

That in the present year it will be necessary to repair the palisade sence on the southern side, about one thousand seet of which must have new posts and stringers, involving an expenditure of about £100. The southern end of the granite Building requires to be sheathed, or pointed with oil putty. This cannot be delayed another year without serious injury to the masonry, and will require an outlay of about £40.

A new Building of stone or brick, about one hundred feet in length by twenty five in breadth, and two stories in height, is very much needed for the safe keeping of Manufacturing Stock and Manufactured Articles, &c. a portion of which has now to be stowed in an old and insecure wooden Building outside the palisade fence,—estimated cost, £550. If this be not proceeded with, the sum of £50 should be appropriated to make the present wooden Buildings weather-proof, and capable of sustaining the weight of what they will be required to contain.

A cedar sence to replace the present dilapidated picket sence on the side of the lot fronting on the highway is much needed, the expense of which will be about £40.

APPENDIX K.

GRAND FALLS BRIDGE.

Statement of the principal dimensions and relative strength of the Grand Falls Suspension Bridge, according to the Specification.

The Towers.—The masonry of the towers is of the best coursed ashlar, built upon foundations of like description, rising from the solid rock.

The height of each tower from the base to the cap-piece is 21 feet 5 inches, and including the latter. 22 feet 7 inches. They have each a total batter of 15 inches, rising from a base of 7 feet by 6 feet 6 inches, and terminating in a space of 4 feet 6 inches by 4 feet below the cap-piece, presenting a bearing surface of 2,592 superficial inches. The greatest probable load likely to rest upon the four towers, equally distributed, is estimated at (167×2) equal to 334 tons; or 831 tons, or 187,040 lbs. to each tower; or about 72 lbs. only of crushing force per superficial inch.

The Cables and suspended Roadway.—The span between the points of suspension of the wire cables is 214 feet, and the deflection or versed sine is 21.4 feet. The length of the suspended roadway is 198 feet, and the clear width 15 feet, making a superficial area of platform equal to 2,970 feet. The number of cables is two, consisting of 931 wires each, or 1,862 wires in all; subject to a test of 1,400 lbs. per wire; or equal to an ultimate direct strain of 1,164 tons for both cables; or when suspended at an angle of 21° 46′, equal to the support of a vertical load of 863 tons. The vertical stiffness of the roadway is provided for by a trussed railing 4′ 3″ in height on each side.

The whole weight of the suspended materials, including the cables between the towers, is estimated at 78,105 lbs. or nearly 35 tons of permanent load.

The extreme incidental load which it is probable could ever be imposed at one time may be stated at 100 lbs. per superficial foot of platform, or (2,979 ft. x 100 lbs.) equal to 132 tons nearly, making, with 35 tons of permanent weight, a gross maximum load of 167 tons, or below one-fifth of the specified strength of the cables, or equal to less than 280 lbs. tension to each wire equally distributed.

The Suspending Rods—Have a total sectional area equal to 26.5 inches, which at 60,000 lbs. per inch will sustain 709 tons, or upwards of 4½ times the assumed maximum load of 157 tons, equally distributed over the platform, including the permanent load, less 10 tons for the weight of the cables between the towers.

The Anchor Irons—Have a minimum united sectional area of 63 inches, which at 60,000 lbs. per inch would sustain before breaking a direct strain of 1,687 tons, or 15 times the maximum vertical strain upon the cables between the towers.

The Transverse Beams—Have a length of 15 feet between the points of suspension, and a mean depth of 10 inches by a breadth of 3½ inches, and should sustain before breaking a weight uniformly distributed, equal to nearly eight tons each, or for the whole number of 58 beams a total of 443 tons, or 3½ times the maximum load of 100 lbs. per superficial foot of roadway.

The relative strength indicated by the above statement will be more clearly understood, when it is considered that the assumed maximum load of 100 lbs. per superficial foot is more than eight times the test applied in 1853, according to the Report of Mr. Light, in order to prove the safe useful strength of the Saint John Suspension Bridge. This test was 70 tons nearly, equally distributed over a platform of 13,340 superficial feet, or about 12 lbs. per foot.

The regulation test in France in like cases is stated to be a load equal to 200 kilogrammes per square metre of platform, or about 41 lbs. per foot, imposed during 24 hours.

Under any of these proportions it will appear that a large excess of strength has been provided for by the specification.

Early in the year, the Commissioners asked the sanction of the Government to the expenditure during the year of a sum larger than authorized by law, with a view to having the whole Road opened in the Summer of 1860, and this having been granted, the amount in excess has been £89,255 17 11. The Road will probably be ready for traffic about 1st July next.

On reference to the Report of the Chief Engineer, it will be observed that the cost of the Road when completed, will probably exceed his original estimate by about fifteen per cent.

Some of the causes which have led to this, were brought under your notice by the Commissioners in their Supplementary Report of last year, at pages 5 to 7, and 27 to 33. The others are given at length by the Chief Engineer.

In last year's Report it was stated that "there is good reason to suppose that with the extension of the Railway, a more than corresponding increase in the profits may be expected, and the Commissioners feel satisfied that when Hampton and Sussex are reached, a considerable per centage on the cost of the Road, over working expenses, will be realized."

The Line was opened to Hampton on 10th June last, and the following statement shews the result:—

£5,795 2 7, the Nett Revenue, is equal to 30s. 8d. per cent. on the cost of 42 miles of Railway, say £378,000.

Or if 9 miles of Railway in five months, gave £667 8 9, 23 miles in the same time, and in the same proportion, should give £1,705 13 5, it has given £2,758 11 9.

The line was opened to Sussex on 10th November a further distance of 21 miles, and up to this time there has been more than a proportionate increase of traffic.

All the Station Buildings, Locomotives, and Passenger Cars, have been kept insured against fire, and the premiums of insurance charged to Traffic Account.

In conformity with instructions from the Government, the Commissioners have taken Tenders for, and put under contract two Bridges across the Kennebeccasis River at Norton and Millstream, to bring the more settled portions of King's County, north of the River, in connection with the Railway.

APPENDIX.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

To Robert Jardine, Esquire, Chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners.

SIR,—I have to submit the following Report upon the Works of the European and North American Railway during the past year.

At the date of my last Report, the whole of the line had been put under Contract. The principal features and characteristics of the Road, both as regards location and construction, were described therein; and estimates of the probable cost of the different Divisions, Stations, and Rolling Stock, furnished. Tables also of the alignment and gradient, had been carefully and minutely prepared. Those details will, in most cases, and the Tables will altogether apply to this year; and I have deemed it unnecessary to enter into any further particulars, as it would be almost a recapitulation of what had been already done.

In my Report for 1858, at page 28, I stated that "the sums at which the unfinished Divisions had been taken by the several Contractors had been assumed, and as usual in Railway estimates, fifteen per cent. on the whole then under construction, had been added for contingencies." On referring to that Report, at page 35 to 42, and pages 27 to 33 of the Supplementary Report, it will be observed that the first Divisions of the work were let on an incomplete survey. In consequence of this, and of the usual difficulty in ascertaining with precision, the amount and kind of work required to be done in constructing the Railway, through a new country, and without surveys more accurate than from various causes I had been enabled to make, it has been ascertained that the allowance for contingencies was too limited, and that the ultimate cost will probably exceed the estimate by about fifteen per cent. As the works are nearly finished, I have the means of knowing that this calculation is very nearly correct.

At all the lettings of these works there was much competition, and the proposals were generally much under my estimate of the value of the work. The lowest offers having in nearly all cases been accepted, several of the Contractors (as they allege) have lost money, and have preferred claims for extras and damages. I have felt it my duty to resist these claims, so far as they were not based, in my opinion, upon just grounds having relation to the contracts; and it has afforded me great satisfaction, that in taking this stand—amidst the storm of obloquy to which I was exposed—I have been supported by the Commissioners and Government.

It is the rule, and not the exception, that there should be large claims for extra allowance on Railway works, as they are let, upon this Continent, as even where surveys have been made in the most elaborate manner, unforeseen contingencies will always arise. I have no reason to believe that upon this Railway they have been greater than usual.

All the claims that, in my view, had an equitable basis, have been allowed and settled.

It may not be improper to state that one of the principal causes of the difference between my original estimate and the probable cost of the Railway, was the incompleteness of the surveys, caused by the great difficulty in procuring a good and efficient staff at that time, as already stated in the Report of 1858, pages 37 and 38, and in the Supplementary Report, pages 30 to 32.

Every country has its own peculiar difficulties in the way of Railway construction. No one can build in New Brunswick, or elsewhere, without adding to his former experience. The sudden alternations of climate, from frost to thaws and heavy rains, is one of the peculiarities of the portion of this country through which the Railway is located.

I would not now think of putting a Road under bulk sum contracts, or making an estimate of the quantities of work to be done, or the probable cost, until a sufficient portion of the Summer season, with a full staff of competent Surveyors, had been occupied in perfecting the location; and a Winter and Spring devoted to observing the

fall

fall of rain and effect of freshets. It would require all the information derived from these sources, to enable an Engineer to calculate the requisite height of embankments, width of cuttings, and necessary quantities of culvert and bridge masonry, so as to render but few changes of plan necessary; and I would here state that no bulk sum contracts can be carried out satisfactorily unless based on an accurate survey, and in full knowledge of all the work to be done.

As already stated, the probable cost of completing the Road will exceed my estimate last year. In further explanation of this increase, I have to state that, in the lettings generally (especially the more recent ones,) the Commissioners required me to observe the strictest economy, and that in seeking to conform to their wishes, several of the grades were left quite up to the maximum allowed, which grades being for short distances only, would mar the equable working of the Railway in those parts; while in some instances the grades were left above the maximum of other parts of the Road, and this to some extent would increase the expense of freightage upon it. When the remainder of the Road came to be located, it was found that the steep grades were all confined to a distance of a few miles; and as those above the maximum elevation would tend to diminish the working properties of the Road throughout its whole extent, it was, after mature deliberation, resolved to reduce those exceptional grades to a conformity with those on other parts of the line.

Besides this, some of the masonry in the first divisions was estimated and let for a quality, which although it might answer for the intended purpose, was below what a due regard to the safety and permanency of the Road was deemed to require.

Another deficiency was in the size of some of the Culverts and Bridges. The surveys were made in the Summer, and the Engineers in charge of surveying parties, although men of experience generally in such matters, were to a certain extent deceived with regard to the quantity of water passing in the time of floods. The freshets of last and the preceding year, have shewn it to be necessary to increase the water courses to a great extent. The country drained is larger than was supposed; and besides, the whole line from Passekeag to Sussex runs along the foot of a range of hills from which the water comes with sudden flushes, and on this account requires

frequent openings through the Road.

The line from Moncton to Salisbury likewise crosses a range of table lands intersected at intervals by ravines, some of them from 40 to 60 feet in depth, running at right angles to the general course of the line, extending back and drawing the waterfall from an extensive range of high land. At the time of the survey, these ravines had very little water in them. From this cause the quantity of masonry has been, on these sections, more than doubled, and that of a much more expensive character than at first contemplated, has in many cases been substituted. The original specification, in several places, simply required box culverts of from three to four feet span. These were found to be insufficient; and as this kind of culvert is not suitable for large sized openings, six feet arches had to be substituted in many places, and this required, not only an increase in the quantity, but involved the necessity for a much more expensive kind of masonry. The increase in the size of these culverts was found to be absolutely necessary, and it was thought requisite to improve the quality of masonry in the culverts generally, that no chance of failure in the Road should remain that it was possible to avoid.

It would have been more satisfactory had all these facts been known at first; but it should be understood that these additions have not materially increased the ultimate cost of the Road beyond what the estimate would have shewn if all these facts had been known, as there had been little or no change of line, and no work has been thrown away. They have amounted to a considerable sum, and come now under the denomination of "Extras;" but, if they had been arranged for in the first letting, they would have entered into and become a part of the regular contract. They were determined upon before the work had proceeded so far that they would involve loss, so that the expense of them is but little greater in the one case than it would have been in the other.

The advantages of these changes are—that in the parts of the Road where the gradients have been reduced, the passenger trains will travel with less risk; the danger of collisions will be greatly lessened, by the view not being intercepted by intervening

intervening summits; a freight engine will carry over the whole Road a train increased from 2 to 3 additional loaded freight cars with but little increase of expense; the Road will be perfectly safe from the action of floods; the permanency of the structures and the security of life will be greatly increased; and the masonry of all important structures is of that permanent description which will last without dilapidation or failure.

It is true these necessary improvements were attended with a considerable outlay in the item of grading and masonry; but this work once done, would hereafter have attending it but little contingent expense, and the beneficial effects of it would last during the continuance of the Road. On the other hand, if those changes had not been made, the heavier gradients would have governed the traffic during all future time. It is therefore believed that the expenditure was a judicious one.

During the past Summer 34 miles of new Road have been added to those already in operation, making a total of 64 miles in working order; and 45 miles now in course

of construction and yet to be opened for purposes of traffic.

The division from Kennebeccasis to Hampton, also that from Hampton to Sussex, have been successfully opened; the former on the 8th June, and the latter on the 10th November last, making a total length of open Road from Saint John of 44 miles. This portion is in good order, when the newness and incompleteness of parts of it are taken into consideration.

I will now review the progress of the work on the several Divisions and Sections, enumerating from Saint John.

SAINT JOHN DIVISION.

SAINT JOHN TO OSSEKEAG STATION.

That portion of this Division from Saint John to Salmon Brook, has been treated of at large in the Report for 1858. It comprises Sections Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, and was opened for traffic in June 1858. It is entirely completed, and is of a superior character; the future cost of upholding will be very light. The embankment at Lawlor's Lake is permanent, the settlement being less than was originally anticipated.

On the portion formerly known as Lakefield Division, tracklaying and masonry are completed, and the grading is nearly so; there remains a portion of the ballasting, some rip-rapping of embankments on Section 6, and other minor work, to finish it. There has been a considerable quantity of work done during the past summer, and although the Road was opened in June, the daily passenger trains were so ordered as not to interfere to any great extent with the workmen and ballast trains.

Hammond River was first passed by a temporary trestle bridge erected at the expense of the Contractor. The viaduct was finished in time for the opening in November last, and is now entirely complete. The girders have been put together in a substantial and careful manner, and in conjunction with the masonry, form a most durable structure. Before being opened to the public it was thoroughly tested.

HAMPTON DIVISION.

From Ossekeag to Sussex.

Section 7, from Groom's Cove to Norton Ferry, is in good order. The tracklaying is finished and the masonry and grading nearly so, a portion of the ballasting and riprapping is still to be done. The iron work for the Passekeag Bridge has arrived from England, and is now being erected.

Section 8 is in about the same state of forwardness. The superstructure for the Bridge over the Moosehorn has been erected and properly tested, and is now passed

over by the trains.

On Section 9, the grading has been sufficiently completed to admit of the track being permanently laid, but the embankments in several places will require widening in the Spring from the adjacent cuttings to complete them. The track is in pretty good order, considering that but a small portion of ballast has been laid on. Two out of three Bridges are still to be built: the Contractor has however erected substantial temporary structures at his own expense, by the aid of which the line was safely opened in November. He is delivering stone this Winter preparatory to commencing the erection of the permanentt structures in the ensuing Spring, which can be done without interfering with the traffic.

SUSSEX DIVISION.

FROM SUSSEX TO HEAD OF PETITCODIAC.

Section 10 was let October 8th 1858, to Messra. Beckwith, Foster & Co. but as the work did not progress in a satisfactory manner, it was in September last taken out of their hands and re-let to Mr. John Brookfield, who was the next lowest bidder. The latter has endeavoured to make up for the time that was previously lost, by pushing the work as fast as the season would permit.

On this Section are two of the most important Bridges upon the Division,—Trout Creek Viaduct of three spans of 80 feet; and Salmon River of two spans of 100 feet each, and of Warren & Kennard's Patent Iron Girder. The former had been originally designed for two spans, but it was found that there was not sufficient waterway for the periodical freshets in that stream; and another span and three feet additional height were accordingly added.

The abutments and piers are, with the exception of the extra three feet, completed and in readiness for the girders, which have not yet arrived from England. The

masonry is of the best description, no better exists on the line.

At Salmon River the works had been so delayed, that it is very questionable whether any reasonable exertion will succeed in completing the Viaduct in time for the general opening of the Road next Summer; but by resorting to the construction of a temporary Bridge,—the materials for which may be delivered at a small expense this Winter—the opening need not, on this account, be delayed.

Sections 11 and 12 are nearly completed and in readiness for the rails, with the exception of a portion of the grading on the former Section, where the line passes over the intervale of the Salmon River; this gap was caused by a scarcity of earth at this point which prevented the embankment from being completed. The opening of the line to Sussex has enabled the Contractor to deliver rails from Saint John, which have been laid down; the requisite amount of earth, to complete the embankments, will be hauled early in the ensuing Spring.

On Section 13 the grading is nearly finished, but cannot be properly formed until the opening of the Spring. This will prevent the sleepers from being distributed in a proper manner this Winter. A considerable proportion of the culvert masonry is still

to do upon this Section.

Section 14. All the grading and musonry have been completed and thoroughly dressed and finished, with the exception of a small portion at the western end of the Section. A part of the track has already been laid, and all the sleepers have been delivered and distributed.

Section 15 is in about the same state of forwardness as Section 13; some of the grading and masonry is not yet completed, and the formation cannot be dressed off until the frost comes out in the Spring. This will also delay the distribution of sleepers and iron, and the laying of the track.

MONCTON AND SALISBURY DIVISION.

HEAD OF PETITCODIAC TO MONCTON.

Section 16. The grading and masonry are considerably advanced upon this Section, except upon the heavy embankment near the eastern end. The latter point however

is the key of the work, and has been neglected by the Contractors.

Section 5, Salisbury, was let in December 1857, to Messrs. Walker and Company, but, in December of the following year, it became evident that the work was not progressing in such a manner as to ensure its completion within any reasonable period. The works were taken out of their hands in January 1859, and re-let to Mr. Alexander M'Bean, the Contractor for the contiguous Section, who has since done all in his power to forward the work. The dilatoriness of the former Contractors, in not finishing the culvert masonry in time to receive the heavy embankments, as already stated in the Supplementary Report of last year, page 47 to 49, has caused so great a delay, that no subsequent amount of energy would permit this Section being opened for traffic by the time specified, viz. the 1st November last. The whole of the masonry, by dint of great exertion, has been completed during the past Summer, and the grading will be finished early enough in the Spring to enable the track to be laid for the final opening, without being entirely ballasted.

Section

Section 4, Moncton, was let in December 1857, to Messrs. M'Donaid & M'Bean. Subsequently to the letting it was deemed desirable to make some changes in the gradients, which have been already enlarged upon in a former part of this Report. The principal grade was marked upon the original contract profile as 50 feet per mile; but, as it had been decided that 45 feet per mile should be the maximum grade on the line in every other instance, it was determined that there should not be an exception in this case. This decision necessarily increased in a considerable degree the quantities of earth work; and in order to expedite the work the Contractors went to considerable expense in purchasing a steam excavator to push these heavy points.

The masonry which comprises several large arch culverts under deep embankments, was completed early last Summer, and there is now no reason to doubt that the grading will be sufficiently advanced by the opening of the Spring, to permit of a

continuous track being laid over the whole Section.

The platelaying and ballasting from Sussex to Head of Petitcodiac was let in October last to Mr. William Stevens, his being the lowest tender for this work. The Contractor has formed a superior ballast pit near the line on Section 11 and is about opening it, which will much facilitate the completion of this part of the work. He is likewise energetically delivering sleepers and iron from Moncton and Sussex simultaneously, and distributing them over all the Sections that are ready for their reception.

MONCTON AND SHEDIAC STATIONS.

This Division is in about the same condition as it was at the date of my last Report, to which I beg to refer. See page 30, Report 1858.

STATIONS.

ST. JOHN.—The contract for the grading and preparing of the Depot ground has been approximately completed, within the amount stated in the last Report; and it may not be out of place to state, that these grounds thus far have been found very convenient, and will probably be all that will be required for the purposes of the traffic for many years to come, whilst their central position renders them very accessible.

The engine house, which is a circular building of brick, and 170 feet in diameter, as well as the car house, have been finished during the past year. These buildings are

permanent and of a substantial description of their kind.

A wood shed and supplementary building for the cars at the Mill Pond, as also a freight shed, have been erected. The latter will answer all the purposes of traffic, until an increase of freight will warrant the expense of erecting a permanent freight building. Besides this it will require some experience of the nature and extent of traffic, to determine upon suitable buildings for the purpose.

All the Stations mentioned in the last Report as Class No. 2, comprising those at Kennebeccasis, Ossekeag, Salisbury, Moncton, and Shediac, have been completed. The Sussex Station, with freight house, engine house, tank, wood shed, and turn-table, is now nearly finished.

The Class No. 3 Stations, namely, Norton, Apohaquie, Penobsquis, Annagance, and Petitcodiac, are now under contract. In arranging the plan of these structures, the main building has been made to answer for the accommodation of freight and passengers, a convenient and economical arrangement.

In conclusion, it is a matter of congratulation that no failure has taken place upon any of the completed structures, and that although the freshets of the last Spring and Autumn were unusually severe, not a single failure worth mentioning has occurred. The embankments, when complete, stand well, the masonry is good, and the iron rails and fastenings, as well as the Bridge superstructures, prepared in England, are all that can be desired.

The perfection of the alignment and gradients, and the solidity of the Road, may be judged of by the fact, that since the opening of the several divisions of the Road for traffic, covering a period of nearly three ymax, as appears by the Superintendent's Reports, not an accident has occurred, by which injury has been done to persons or property.

I may remark that no credit is given in the Account to either Division for carrying the Mails, for the reason that no definite arrangement with regard to the amount to be charged had been concluded with the Post Office Department up to the close of the year.

The Canadian rate for this service is \$30 per mile of Railway per annum if by day,

and \$40 if by night.

The Accounts omitted, if credited here, at this figure, would stand as follows:-

Conveying the Mails between Shediac and Moncton, 17 miles for one year, exclusive of the Winter months, say from June 1858 to 31st October 1859, at \$30, Conveying the Mails between Saint John and Ossekeag, 23 miles for 5 months, say from 8th June to 31st October 1859, at \$121,

which would be equivalent to an increased revenue of something more than 1 7-10th pence per mile run for Shediac, and a fraction over 58-100th of a penny per mile run for Saint John.

The Statements E, F, G, at the credit of "Revenue," shew a Monthly Summary of

the Traffic Receipts for the present year.

The credit for "Locomotives and Cars," is made up of charges against Contractors and Construction, per Account rendered, for the use of these Machines during the

For one Engine and ten Platform Cars the average rate is £5 per day where found by Contractor, or £7 10s. the Railway furnishing necessary supplies, which may be considered very low, particularly when the state of the Road over which Construction Engines are sometimes made to work, the high rate of speed at which they run, and consequent wear and tear to machinery, is taken into consideration.

The following extract from a Letter which I have received from a Gentleman well acquainted with Railway management in Canada, will suffice to shew the Rates there

charged :-

"On the Grand Trunk the last two years we charged \$32 per diem for a Locomotive, finding men, oil, tallow, waste, fuel, and water; and forty six cents per Car, either Platform or Ballast. The day to be twelve working hours; every 21 hours beyond

that being taken as a quarter of a day extra.

"The Buffalo and Lake Huron charge the Welland Railway \$35 per diem: the Buffalo and Lake Huron finding men, oil, tallow, &c. but the Welland wood and water. The Buffalo and Lake Huron charge, on their own line, \$30 per diem for an Engine, which includes every thing; and fifty cents per Car per diem. Of course, [he adds] Contractors have the Cars supplied handed over in first class order, and are bound to deliver them in the same, including wheels and brasses. I think [he further adds] you will find these charges of the Grand Trunk Railway about the correct thing.

It will thus be seen, that if 25s. (the price per day of ten Cars at 2s. 6d. each,) be taken from the highest price charged per day by this Railway, when finding every thing for a Locomotive and Cars, the balance will be £6 5s., equivalent to \$25 per diem, being \$7 lower than the Grand Trunk, and \$5 cheaper than the lowest price charged in Canada for these services; without considering the fact that in our case the number

of hours per day is not limited.

It should also be remembered, that when the completion of the several contracts permits the carrying trade to be properly developed, and these Locomotives otherwise employed, the rate will bear no very small proportion to the amount which either of them will earn; that while the Revenue derived from this source will be larger in proportion to the mileage, the expenses will be less.

The debit side of the "Revenue" Account constitutes the entire expense to the Railway for operating the Road, not only the Passenger and Freight, but the Con-

struction Trains also.

The whole is shewn under four general heads, viz:—"Locomotive Power," "Merchandize and Passenger Cars," "Maintenance of Way and Buildings," and "General Charges." Abstracts A. B. C. and D. shews a comprehensive summary of particulars of each heading referred to.

A shews the amount of wages paid for working all the Locomotives, the firewood consumed by all the engines except those which have from time to time been working upon Sections 5 and 6 Saint John, 8 and 9 Hampton, and Section 4 Salisbury; and all the wood consumed in Shops, Engine Houses, and Tank Houses on the line; all the Oil, Tallow and Waste used by all the Engines, and in all the Workshops and Engine Houses in use, except those upon Stations 5 and 6, and 8 and 9; all the repairs done to the Locomotives, except those with which the Contractors have been charged; repairs to Workshops, &c, water for the use of these Machines, and the wages for Watchmen for all the Engines, as well as the small stores, and other miscellaneous items for their use and benefit.

B shews the amount of wages paid to Conductors and Brakemen on the several Passenger and Freight Trains, as well as to Porters and labourers employed in loading the Cars; the amount for Oil, Tallow and Waste consumed; the repairs to Cars in use, on construction upon Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, and 7, as well as for Passengers and Freight; amount of wages paid Switchmen; wood consumed in the Cars; small stores, and other miscellaneous charges in connection therewith.

C gives the amount paid for maintaining the Permanent Way, &c., for the year on the line between Shediac and Moncton; and on that portion between Saint John and Kennebeccasis since the 1st of June last, the date at which the Contractors' maintenance expired.

D shews amount paid Superintendent, Book Keeper, Station Masters and Freight Clerks, for their services the past year; the advertising and printing done, and Stationery used, as abstracted from the Bills as far as rendered; the premium of Insurance paid on Buildings and Locomotives and Cars; the amount paid for damage to Freight; Watchmen at Stations; Fuel for Stations; and all other charges of a miscellaneous character, not included under the other principal headings.

The result shews a loss, on the face of the Account, in the operation of the Line at Shediac, of £431 7 10, and a gain at Saint John of £6,226 10 51, and the Nett Revenue to be £5,795 2 71.

It has always seemed to me very necessary to shew the exact expense of working and maintaining cuch Locomolive, each description of Curs, cuch Stution, and maintaining the Permanent Wuy, as well as the exact expense of running each Truin, whether Construction, Passenger, Freight, or either, and the proportion of each per mile run; but asseries of difficulties have hitherto prevented the accomplishment of this desirable object. No correct statement of the whole expenses in these particulars can be given until the conclusion of present arrangement with Contractors throws upon the Railway the finding every thing, for unless the Stores and the Repairs are provided from one source, it is evident that those supplied by the Road will bear no proper proportion to the mileage; nor can comparisons be instituted between one Machine and another, elsewhere found so profitable in Railway management.

I am enabled, however, to give the hours in steam, miles run, and, where found by the Railway, the cubic feet of wood consumed by each Engine, as well as the oil, tallow, and waste; and transposed, the same particulars, as applied to the Passenger and Construction Trains. These will be found on reference to the Abstract of Engine Returns before given.

From this and the Accounts, I beg to offer the following Table, shewing, in addition to the average number of miles run by the Locomotives, in each service, during the year, and the average number of miles run to the specified consumption of wood, oil, tallow, and waste, and the average number of Cars, the approximate expenses per mile run for each service,—with the actual total cost to the Railway, per mile run,—the actual receipts per mile run, in each case, and approximately the gain or loss,—with the actual gain to the Railway per mile run on the whole. The Table is as follows:—

The expenses to Railway for the several services per mile run, as here given, may he considered as correct; the calculations have been made with care, and after mature consideration.

With regard to the loss shewn as the result of the operations of the line at Shediac, I beg to say, that while the comparative statement given exhibits an increase in the traffic, the expenses were necessarily much greater than the previous year, and the circumstance of the loss of the "Maid of Erin" in April upon the second trip to Moncton, and consequent large diminution in the through traffic until July, when the "Princess Royal" was placed upon the route to the Bend, seriously affected that revenue, which is almost exclusively dependent upon the through trade, created by the connections which are formed with the Railway by the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of Saint Lawrence Steamers.

But in order to shew more clearly the increased traffic on the extension to Hampton, as compared with that to Kennebeccasis, I have deemed it desirable to ascertain, as near as practicable, the receipts and expenses per mile run for the five last months of each of the two past Fiscal Years.

The statements are approximate, but may be esteemed as very nearly correct; they are as follows:—

Some portion of the surplus arising out of the other transactions spoken of, will be requisite to place these Locomotives in the necessary good order, for the next season's operations, to what extent I am of course unable to sav.

Reference to the monthly statement given, will shew the number of Passengers arrived east and west over both divisions of the line, to be one hundred and ten thou-

sand five hundred and eighty one.

The number of Passengers carried one mile, has been ascertained at one million one hundred and eighty seven thousand five hundred and ninety five; and the average number of miles travelled by each passenger to be $10\frac{739594}{1000000}$ The average rate per mile charged per mile has been l_{10000}^{9549} cents, a fraction less than the rate established for second class fares. This reduction has been frequently caused by the inducements held out to excursionists during the Summer, which has proved in every way advantageous.

It may be said concerning the first, that three Locomotives have been added to the Stock on hand at the close of the last year. Two of them built by Messrs. Fleming and Humbert, of the Phoenix Foundry, in this City, are pronounced by competent judges, to be first class Machines; the third, purchased at a reduced rate in Canada. will require some repairs; all the others at the close of the year were in comparatively good order; but during the Winter, as they can be spared off the works, will be overhauled, and such repairs put upon them as may be found necessary to fit them for the ensuing season's operations.

The Rolling Stock, in other particulars, has been increased by the addition of six first and two second class Passenger Cars, forty Platforms, six Hand Cars, and one Snow Plough, at Saint John.

The Stock at Shediac is the same as given in the last Report.

Upon the opening of the extension to Hampton, in June last, a second Passenger Train having been considered necessary, was put on in charge of Mr. Conductor Gonce; this, together with the increased traffic which speedily grew up, necessitated an addition to the Staff. Full particulars in relation to the extent as well as the salaries and wages of each, at the close of the year, is given in Statement here furnished.

The Locomotive Foreman has since been superseded by the appointment of Mr. George Watkins, late of the Locomotive Department of the Grand Trunk Railway at Longuiel. Montreal.

At the close of this Report will be found a Statement of the principal Freight forwarded from each Station.

The Tariffs have been twice revised in the course of the past twelve months, and as sar as I can learn, give very general satisfaction.

During the past year the average speed of Trains has been—Including stoppages. 15 miles per hour; without stoppages, 23 miles per hour. They have been run with care and regularity.

The Officers and Servants have been diligent and attentive, and performed their

respective duties to the best of their judgment and ability.

No accident whatever has occurred to Passengers or others, as will appear by the usual "Statement of Casualties" before given. Cause may be found for congratulation in this circumstance, but sincere thanks for that protection which has bitherto been afforded us is due to an all-wise and overruling Providence.

Before the close of the ensuing Summer it may be fairly supposed that both Divisions of this Railway now in operation will be joined together by the completion of the present unfinished portions between Sussex and Moncton, and one uninterrupted Line of Railway communication thus formed between Saint John City and Shediac Harbour.

It is therefore proper, at this time, to consider what should be done, in order to render this enterprize the greatest possible henefit, not only to this City and the

Counties through which it passes, but the Province at large.

In the natural course of events, with ordinary care and attention, the Railway will get the full benefit of all the local trade; with facilities granted, as they are found from time to time to be necessary, it will doubtless steadily increase; but the through traffic should be fostered and encouraged by every legitimate means within our reach. 'Tis not enough that the Railway has been built, the traffic must be brought to it. The 70,000 inhabitants of Prince Edward's Island, the 14,000 in Kent, the 18,000 in Northumberland, the 14,000 in Gloucester, and the 5,000 in Restigouche, with the large and extensive District of Gaspe, and the northern side of the Restigouche, the inhabitants of Newfoundland, Cape Breton, and the flourishing Districts along the northeastern shores of Nova Scotia, should be brought into immediate intercourse with Saint John, and the Northern States of America, by means of this Road. Sufficient communication should be established, Maps furnished, and information profusely afforded on every hand. Means should be adopted as far as practicable, to secure to the largest possible extent, the carrying of the Produce of those Districts, and of the Fisheries in the Gulf; to induce the supplies requisite being sent upward over this Road to their destination; to induce tourists to and from Quebec, in the Autumn months of the year; and to make our American neighbours, as well as others, more familiar with the value and richness, in point of mineral wealth and agricultural capabilities, of this interesting and beautiful portion of the American Continent.

Shediac Harbour is situate about forty miles from the northern entrance to the

Straits of Northumberland; is distant in round numbers from-

And from Boston, via Steamer, to Saint John and over this Railway, 350 miles, and is well calculated from its natural position to form the centre of a large and flourishing trade.

During the last few years Steamers have been run, twice per week each way, between Shediac, Bedeque, Charlottetown, and Pictou; and the Steamer Lady Head during the Summer of 1858, made fortnightly trips upon the route between Pictou, Shediac, Miramichi, Dalhousie, and Quebec; and this present year the Steamer Arabian has been run between Shediac and Quebec, calling at Richibucto, Miramichi, Bathurst, Dalhousie, and Gaspe, en route; she has carried a large number of passengers, with full freights, and it is believed has been run with satisfaction to the public and profit to the owners. But while the accommodation thus afforded may hitherto have been considered all that was necessary, it is not reasonable to suppose this will be found sufficient for the future. Upon the completion of this Railway, instead of the present semi-weekly communication with Bedeque and Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, and Pictou, Nova Scotia, departure from each place should be of daily occurrence, and a connection formed with the Steamers running from Pictou to Sydney, and with the Stages from Truro. On the other hand, in lieu of the present semi-monthly communication with Quebec and intermediate Ports, it should be weekly, with an additional Steamer twice per week at Richibucto and Miramichi. These, with the anticipated weekly call of the Canadian Ocean Steamers, via Newfoundland from Liverpool, are among the facilities which will be found necessary in the Gulf to afford accommodation for the increased business which will assuredly be the result of the completion of this portion of the European and North American Railway.

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

FOURTH REPORT OF POSTMASTER GENERAL OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

To His Excellency The Hon. John Henry Thomas Manners-Sutton, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I have the honor to lay before Your Excellency the Fourth General Report of the Post Office Department, and with it, to submit Returns shewing the operations of the Department during the Year ended 31st October 1859.

On the 1st of November 1858, I was appointed by Your Excellency to the office of Postmaster General, since which time various matters of interest have arisen in con-

nection with the Department.

I found on assuming office that the Financial and Stores Department of the service were under the management of Mr. Howe, at Saint John, and in order as much as possible to consolidate the various branches of the service, I had them removed to the Head Office at Fredericton during the first quarter of the year.

MAIL COMMUNICATION WITH CANADA.

During the past Summer my attention had been directed to the state of the Mail Route between Grand Falls and River du Loup, and in September last I travelled over this Road in order to make myself personally acquainted with its condition.

From Grand Falls to the Canadian Boundary the Road is good and suitable for the running of a four horse coach, and to the foot of Lake Temiscouta, a distance of ten miles, the Road is in good condition, but from thence to within about 15 miles of River du Loup, with the exception of about twelve miles near the head of the Lake, the Road is almost impassable for any vehicle, which renders it impossible to carry out

satisfactorily any system of Mail communication between those places.

When in Canada the desirableness of having a regular Mail made up in England for New Brunswick to go by the Canadian Steamers, was suggested to me; but until the state of the Road above referred to is materially improved, such an arrangement could not be satisfactorily carried out. The subject, however, demands serious consideration, and I have reason to believe that the importance of a better means of communication between Canada and this Province is now receiving the careful attention of the Canadian Government.

The subject of Mail communication with England being one of great importance, any mode that could be successfully adopted to shorten the time of transit to New Brunswick, would be of paramount importance to the commercial community. If an arrangement could be made with the Canadian Government to have their Steamers call at or near Shediac, or to be intercepted by a Steamer, it would give to New Brunswick the nearest terminus on this side of the Atlantic, and correspondence so brought could be transmitted to St. John in a few hours by Railway.

MAIL COMMUNICATION WITH NOVA SCOTIA.

The Mail communication between Saint John and Halifax, N. S., engaged my attention immediately upon my accession to office. The heavy charge imposed on the Revenue of this Department in conveying Express Mails between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, amounted during the year 1858 to £829 5 6. The method which suggested itself to my mind, as being best adapted to obviate the existing evils, was the establishment of a Daily Mail, which, after correspondence with the Nova Scotia Government, (the time being approved of,) was carried into operation on the first day of June last, with satisfactory results, affording increased Mail accommodation, and at less expense than during the previous year for Expresses alone.

In giving effect to the preceding arrangements, I have received the ready assistance of the Postmaster General of Nova Scotia.

I have endeavoured as far as practicable, to carry out the wishes of the Government, by using the European and North American Railway for Postal purposes, but owing to the difficulty (during bad travelling) of making the connections, it has not proved so great an accommodation as could be desired, nor will it be otherwise until the completion of the Road to the Bend, when no doubt it will become a decided advantage to the commercial community, by the increased facilities for the rapid transmission of the Eastern and Northern correspondence.

The existing arrangements for the conveyance of the Mails between this Province and Nova Scotia across the Bay of Fundy are very unsatisfactory, nor can I hope for any improvement under the present Contract, which ends on the first day of May 1862. Its chief advantage during the past Summer has been in carrying the Supple-

mentary English Mail from Saint John to Windsor.

POSTAL ARRANGEMENTS WITH THE UNITED STATES.

During the year I have made arrangements with the Post Office Department at Washington, with reference to the expense of transmitting the Mails between various points on the Boundary Line, whereby a certain portion of the expense heretofore borne entirely by New Brunswick, will in future be sustained conjointly by the United States and this Province.

GULF STEAMERS.

Orders were given for the conveyance of Mails by the Steamers plying in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, calling at Dalhousic, Bathurst, Mirimichi, Richibucto, and Shediac, and which, I am happy to state, has resulted in contributing largely to the convenience of the inhabitants of the northern portion of the Province.

POSTAL ARRANGEMENTS IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

During the year I have visited nearly every part of the Province, in order to ascertain the nature of existing evils in connection with the Postal arrangements, and to apply the necessary remedies; and at the present time I consider that the Postal accommodation throughout the Province is as satisfactory as possible under existing circumstances.

PARCEL POSTAGE.

Deeming it advisable to establish a Parcel Post system, I made arrangements towards accomplishing so desirable a purpose, and on the first February last it came into operation. The regulation has proved a great convenience to the public, and when its advantages are thoroughly understood, will add materially to the Revenue of the Department. Care has been taken to restrain its uses within proper limits.

The charge for a parcel packet is 1s. 3d. per lb., not to exceed three pounds in

weight, and must be prepaid by postage stamps.

A parcel may be registered on payment of an additional 3d.

PRE-PAYMENT OF ENGLISH POSTAGE, &c.

An arrangement was made during the year with the Department in England for the pre-payment of all correspondence to and from the United Kingdom; it came partially into operation on the first of August, and fully on the first of November last. Immediately after the latter period some inconveniece arose by returning to the writers all letters not pre-paid, but since the first December I have made such arrangements as will prevent a recurrence of the inconvenience. The working of the system appears to give general satisfaction.

Similar regulations exist in Canada and Nova Scotia, and in my opinion, the adoption of the pre-payment system generally, would prove advantageous, causing a very considerable saving to the Revenue of the Department in keeping Accounts, &c., and

when fully understood, would be regarded by the public as most convenient.

In Canada and the United States the system has been adopted with satisfactory results. In the former the regulation is to charge an additional two cents on letters not pre-paid, and in the latter the rate of postage within certain limits is three cents,

and

and Must be pre-paid, but to New Brunswick the rate is ten cents, pre-payment optional. - Pre-payment, however, being so generally understood in that country, leaves the balance against this, Department, as will be seen by reference to the Returns.

It is evident that unless some change be made, the Revenue of this Department

must suffer loss.

I would recommend legislation on this subject, and that power be given to the Governor in Council to fix the rates of postage generally, authorizing the Postmaster General to make such arrangements as would be most beneficial to the public service.

SUNDAY LABOUR.

On my assuming office I found that a large amount of unnecessary labour was performed in this Department on Sunday, and feeling anxious to discontinue it, I directed my efforts to accomplish so desirable an end, and am happy to add, with the most satisfactory results: there being no service performed in any Post or Way Office in this Department, and no Mails dispatched from any Office on that day; this being accomplished without any loss to the public or injury to private interests.

REGISTRATION, &c.

Every person must admit the importance of sending and receiving letters of value by Post, free from danger of miscarriage. No system of Registration can afford protection from thest or robbery, but a letter when registered can be traced where an unregistered letter cannot; and the posting and delivery, or non-delivery, can be proven. A Registered letter is thereby secured against many of the casualties, such as imperfect address, misdirection, or denial of the reception of the letter, or other error that may affect an unregistered letter.

It is of the highest importance in order to insure a speedy transmission and delivery, that all correspondence should bear a full and clear address, giving the name of the party addressed, the Post or Way Office, and the County in which the Post or Way

Office is situated.

Complaints are frequently made of the non-delivery of Newspapers; but I have found upon enquiry into the cases brought under my notice, that the fault in almost every instance lay with the parties directing the papers. Great carelessness is manifested by publishers, who should, if they desire a prompt transmission and delivery of their papers, direct them in full, giving in plain characters not only the name of the party, but the particular Post or Way Office from which the paper is to be delivered. This is comparatively easy to do, as every publisher can provide himself with a copy of the Post Office Directory, which is furnished upon application; unless my suggestions are attended to, the Department cannot be held responsible for the delivery of Letters and Newspapers improperly or imperfectly addressed.

RETURNS.

For the further information of Your Excellency, are submitted the following Returns, embracing full particulars of every branch of the Department, with some explanations and suggestions attached.

Account Current .- Statement of the Receipts and Expenditures of the Post Office

Department, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

A reference to this Return will shew that £500 less than the estimate has been drawn to meet the proper current expenses of the year. Included in this account, is the sum of £536 19 4, paid to the Imperial Government for Packet Postage, due for the year 1858; also £175 paid to Messrs. Hatheway & Small for Mail Service, during the same year, Warrants for which were issued, and will appear in the Accounts. These amounts form a legitimate charge against the Revenue of that year. Additional expense has also been incurred during the past year, by the establishment of such new Mail routes and Way Offices as were necessary to meet the evident wants of the

Financial operations for 1859.—Statement shewing the financial operations for the Year ended 31st October, 1859. This Return will shew at once the financial operations of the year.

Inland

Inland Postage.—Statement in detail, shewing the amount of Inland Postage collected at the several Post Offices during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Way Letter Postage.—Statement shewing the amount of Way Letter Postage collected at the several Post Offices during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Ship Letter Postage.—Statement shewing the amount of Ship Letter Postage collected at the several Post Offices during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Postage Stamps sold.—Statement in detail, shewing the amount of Postage Stamps sold by Postmasters during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

The sale of Stamps during the year has amounted to the sum of £1,378 16 101. There are now in the hands of Deputies, unsold, Stamps to the value of £495 18 101, and at the Head Office, Stamps to the value of £3,346. The principal part of those remaining on hand are unfit for sale, having been damaged by being stored in the vault of the Post Office in Saint John, which was so damp as to cause them to mould, and the colours to run. Consequently, it became absolutely necessary to procure a new supply, to meet the requirements of the service, which I have taken particular pains to ascertain the best and most economical mode of procuring.

When in New York in September last, I made personal enquiry, and have since held correspondence with parties in London, in order to ascertain the cost of procuring Plates and Stamps, the result being that I have ordered from the American Bank Note Company the necessary supply, of the respective value of 1, 5, 10, and 12½ cents each; being those decided upon by the Government, in anticipation of adopting the decimal system of currency, thereby saving the expense of procuring other Plates, when the same may come into operation.

British Postage Received.—Statement shewing the amount of Postage collected on Unpaid Correspondence received from, and Paid Correspondence sent to the United Kingdom, Bermuda, and Newfoundland, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Errors to Debit.—Statement of the amount of Errors to the debit of Postmasters, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Refused, Redirected, and Missent Letters, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Miscellaneous Receipts.—Statement of amount of Miscellaneous Receipts, including money in unclaimed Dead Letters, during Year ended 31st October, 1859.

The various amounts found in these unclaimed Letters will be paid to the owners, on their producing the necessary proof that they are entitled to receive them.

Transportation of Mails.—Statement in detail of all payments made, and charges incurred for Mail Transportation (including Ferriages for the year 1858,) during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

A reference to this Return will afford every information relative to the cost of that service. I would observe that, in future, no payment will be made for Ferriages; expenses of that kind will not form a separate charge against the Department.

Salaries.—Statements in detail of all charges for Salaries, shewing in each case the name of the person, the service or duty performed, and the amount paid, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

During the past year a number of applications was received from Deputies, for an increase of salary; in some cases a compliance may be necessary. In England, as in Canada, the employees of the Post Office Department are the poorest paid of any of the public departments; and the reasons given are, that the persons so employed throughout the country have time to attend to other business pursuits, in connection with their office duties; and, in my opinion, this reasoning is correct, the same arguments being applicable to this Province.

Commission on Postage Stamps.—Statement in detail, shewing the amount paid to Postmasters for commission on the sale of Postage Stamps, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Being desirous to encourage the use of Postage Stamps, I propose, as soon as the new supply is obtained, to afford additional facilities for the sale of them, by the Way Office Keepers throughout the country; and as an inducement to the public to use

Postage Stamps, I propose to dispose of them to all applicants who purchase above a certain amount, at a discount.

Ship Letter Gratuities.—Statement in detail, shewing the amount paid as gratuities on Ship Letters during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

British Postage paid.—Statement of the amounts paid to Great Britain for Packet Postage, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Travelling Expenses.—Statement shewing the amount paid for Travelling Expenses, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Tradesacci's Bills.—Statement in detail, of the amounts paid Tradesmen, for work done for the Post Office Department, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Stationery and Blank Forms.—Statement in detail, shewing the amount paid for Stationery, Blank Forms, and Printing, for the use of the Post Office Department, and the several Postmasters and Way Office Keepers, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

This Return shows an excess of expenditure during the past year, over that of the year previous, or what may reasonably be expected during the present year. Upon the removal of the Stores Branch of the Department from Saint John, I found the supply totally inadequate to meet the requirements of the service, and was therefore compelled to incur additional expense in providing for this branch of the service. Upon economical grounds, it is most advisable to have from six to twelve months supply always on hand.

Office Stamps for Post and Way Offices.—Statement in detail, of the amounts paid for Office Stamps, Stamping Pads, &c., supplied to Post and Way Offices, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

This Return shews that an expense to the amount of £296 has been incurred in outfitting the various Offices, which was necessary to ensure their efficient working.

Mail Bags, &c.—Statement in detail, of the amounts paid for making and repairing Mail Bags and Portmanteaus, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

I found this branch of the service poorly provided for, and a new supply very necessary, which I have endeavoured to procure in the most economical manner, consistent with a due regard to the requirements of the service. The whole amount expended is £91 6 9.

Fuel and Light.-Statement of the amounts paid for Fuel and Light for Post Office Department, and Post Office, Saint John, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Rents and Taxes.—Statement of the amounts paid for Rents and Taxes for the Post Office Department and Saint John, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

The lease of the Building at present occupied as a Post Office in Saint John, is nearly expired, and will not be renewed unless at a large advance of rent. It is, in all its arrangements, entirely unsuited for its present purpose, and cannot be rendered suitable, unless at a great additional expense, which I have not deemed it advisable to incur; and have therefore made the necessary arrangements to have a suitable Building provided.

Miscellaneous Payments.—Statement in detail, of miscellaneous Payments made at the Post Office Department, and at the Post Office, Saint John, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Errors to Credit.—Statement of amount of Errors to the credit of Postmasters, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Names of Postmusters.—Report shewing the Names of Postmasters, Clerks, Assistants, and Letter Carriers, connected with the Post Office Department; together with the Name of Office, Date of Appointment, Annual Salary, and the Revenue collected by Postmasters during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Names of Way Offices.—Statement shewing the Names of Way Offices, the Counties in which situated, Name of Way Office Keeper, Number of Bags made up, Number of Night duties, and Amount of Revenue collected during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Offers for Conveyance of Mails.—Report of all offers made for carrying Mails upon Contracts advertised for public competition during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

This Return will shew a full and complete statement of all offers made during the Year for the Conveyance of Mails in this Province. The lowest Tender being accepted, but in some instances the parties have declined entering into Bonds; in such cases it has been offered to the next lowest tenderer, or such other arrangements have been made as would best subserve the public interest; which has generally proved satisfactory.

Existing Contracts.—Report of all existing Contracts for the conveyance of Mails in the Province, shewing the Name of each Contractor, the Routes embraced and length of each, the number of miles contracted for per annum, and annual payment per Contract, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

A reference to this Return will afford full information of the present state of this branch of the service. The Contractors, generally, have performed their services in a satisfactory manner, excepting from Saint John to the Nova Scotia Line. I have reason to believe, however, that in future this service will be more satisfactorily performed.

In some parts of the Province, in the Spring and Fall, it is almost impossible for Contractors to fulfil their time within the strict letter of their agreement. In such instances, while I have made every reasonable and proper allowance, I have urged the necessity of being prompt to time in view of the important interests involved.

New Post and Way Offices.—Report of New Post and Way Offices established, with the Name of the persons appointed, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Appointments.—Report of all New Appointments made to fill vacancies occurring by resignation or otherwise, during the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Fines.—Report of all Fines imposed, and deductions from the pay of Mail Contractors, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

Statement shewing the estimated number of Letters and Newspapers, the number of Registered Letters, and number of Parcels, with the amount of Postage, for the Year ended 31st October, 1859.

The free transmission of Newspapers appears to be duly appreciated by the people of this Province. In Canada and the United States, all Newspapers (excepting Exchanges) are subject to Postage; and it is a question whether it would not be advisable to adopt a similar policy with regard to Newspapers coming into New Brunswick from those places.

United States Correspondence.—Statement shewing the amount of Postage collected on Paid and Unpaid Correspondence, sent to and received from the United States during the Year ending 31st October, 1859.

The Revenue during the past year shews a considerable increase over that of former years, and when the intended arrangement is made with regard to the issue and sale of Postage Stamps, it is hoped that it will have a very material influence in increasing the Revenue during the coming year.

Report of Dead Letters of value.—Statement of Letters of value received at the Post Office Department, and returned to the writers, during the Year ended 31st Oct. 1859.

In submitting this my first Report, I have endeavoured to give the most full and complete information with reference to the Post Office arrangements, financially and otherwise.

The accompanying Returns of the various branches connected with the Department, have been compiled with great care, and will afford to Your Excellency, the Legislature, and people of the Province, every information necessary to form a correct opinion of the advantages and importance of a Department, in the satisfactory administration of which the public are so much interested.

MADRAS SCHOOL.

Fortieth Report of the state of the Madras School.

Incorporated by the name of the Governor and Trustees of the Madras School in New Brunswick.

During the past year no material change in the state of the Schools under the supervision of the Madras Board has taken place. All the Schools existing at the date of the last annual Report still continue in operation, and the returns shew that they continue their efficiency, and that the benefits of the Madras system are duly appreciated. The School at Saint Andrews, the Board have much pleasure in stating, has been re-established under most favourable auspices.

The number of pupils attending the Schools as compared with the corresponding period of last year, shews a decrease of over eighty, but as the greater portion of this arises in one locality, Carleton, it is to be hoped, that with the superior accommodation afforded by the thorough repair of the School-house during the Summer, these Schools will in a short time attain their former standing. Whilst so many Schools are being established in the Province under new and improved systems, and fostered by Government allowance, so small a diminution in the number taught in the Madras Schools afford a gratifying proof of an increasing and studied desire on the part of the people of this Province for the blessings of education for their children.

SAINT JOHN.—Central School.

By the Returns for the Quarter ended 30th June last, the number of Boys at this School is 236, being twenty four less than the same period last year, and the number of Girls 216.

The capabilities of Mr. Rynd in the Male department, and of Miss Vickery in the Female department, have now been so well tested and acknowledged, that it is unnecessary to reiterate the statements of former Reports. The Schools still continue to afford the highest satisfaction; and the Rev. Mr. Scovil, who attended the examination in June last, reported to the Board as follows:—

"That at the semi-annual examination there were present 228 Boys and 188 Girls. The male School under Mr. Rynd was examined by divisions in Reading, Grammar, Geography, Mental Arithmetic, and also with the slate, in all of which they acquitted themselves very satisfactorily. In Parsing and Geography, as also in History, many Classes excelled, and the School generally bore evidence of continued improvement. Prizes were distributed to the Boys in the several Classes whose general good conduct and proficiency as indicated by the register for the year entitled them to it. The annual Silver Medal was given to Daniel Derniss.

"The Female School under Miss Vickery also acquitted themselves very satisfactorily. The first Classes in the first and second divisions excelled in Reading and Grammar, and they were also very proficient in Geography, History and Arithmetic—great improvement was also observed in the writing. Prizes were also distributed in this School according to the respective merits of the pupils as shewn by the register. The Silver Medal being given to Miss Jane Elliott.

"It is satisfactory to state that the Teachers speak well of the general conduct of their pupils during the year, and I think the Board may congratulate themselves that the Central Schools are truly Model Schools of the Madras System in the Province.

There are cleven Classes in the Boys' School and ten in the Girls School.

PORTLAND.

The Schools under the charge of Mr. and Mrs. Middlemore are in a very satisfactory condition, and the number of scholars have increased, the Boys numbering 199 and the Girls 157. During the Quarter ending 30th June last, sixteen Boys left and forty-three were admitted. There are six Classes in each department, and in addition to the requirements of this system, Mr. Middlemore states—"The senior Classes receive the usual instruction in English Grammar, Geography, Natural History, and Recitation. All the pupils are instructed in Vocal Music, and repeat the Catechism and a number of the Collects daily." The Girls also receive instruction in needle work.

Mr. Middlemore in his Report calls attention to the state of the School-house; but as on application of the Local Committee, funds have been provided for the thorough repair of the building, this cause of complaint will be entirely removed, and increased comfort afforded the pupils.

CARLETON—(SAINT JOHN.)

The Returns from this School do not appear encouraging. In Mr. Ritchie's department, by the return of June last, there were fifty two Boys and fourteen Girls, and in Miss Peters' department twenty one Boys and forty three Girls, shewing a falling off

in the attendance during the year of forty eight Boys and twenty eight Girls.

Mr. Ritchie in his Report states—" The great falling off of the number of pupils attending this School is attributable to various causes, the first draft being drawn to the fisheries and mills. There is another cause, that of ten or eleven Schools all around us of various denominations; and lastly, the repairing of the School-house has operated against us in some degree." He also adds—"In addition to the Madras School Books, we use the First, Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth Books of Lessons, and although our School is greatly diminished, we have a remnant of the various

classes which keeps the School in full operation." * * *

No doubt one great cause of the diminution in number of the pupils attending this School was the dilapidated state of the building, but the Board have pleasure in stating that during the Summer the School, under the judicious supervision of the Local Committee, has been put in thorough repair. On the 24th August, the Rev. F. Coster writes—"I have much pleasure in being able to report to the Madras Board, that Mr. Campbell, the District Inspector of Schools, inspected the Madras Schools in this place during the past week. Nothing could be more satisfactory than the opinion he expressed in the efficiency of the Schools, and the state of the building. He told me it was everything that could be desired, and added, that if money were put into his hands to expend in the improvement of the rooms, he should not know where to lay it out." Under these circumstances a fair expectation may be reasonably entertained, that these Schools will soon regain their former number of pupils.

FREDERICTON.

The several departments of this School still remain under the charge of Mr. and Miss Moore. The number of Boys at the Report on the 30th June were 166, and Girls 109. The steady increase in each year of the number of pupils in attendance on these Schools, is in itself ample testimony to the efficiency and energy of the Teachers. In Mr. Moore's department there are seven classes, the Junior class comprising two divisions, and in the Girls' School there are six classes, and also a class of fifteen Boys between the ages of five and seven years.

SAINT GEORGE.

Mr. A. T. Tayte still continues the charge of this School. There were forty two Boys and seventeen Girls attending during the Quarter ending 30th June last. They are divided into four classes. The usual Report in regard to this School from Rev. Mr. M'Givern has not been supplied this year.

CHATHAM.

The Returns of this School, still under the charge of Mr. George T. Smith, shew a very favourable condition. There are thirty one Boys and twenty one Girls attending the School, and divided into six Classes. From the number of subjects taught in this School, Mr. Smith shews an indefatigable spirit and a praiseworthy consciousness of his duties. The Rev. Rector states,—"An Examination was held by the Frustees on the 29th instant, which tended to confirm the favourable opinion they have ever entertained of the School. The Scholars read with great propriety, and the knowledge of Arithmetic, Geography, Scripture, History, and indeed all the branches of Education in which they are instructed, reflects great credit upon themselves and their preceptor. By a reference to the Schedule, the Board will perceive nine Scholars have entered since our last return."

SHEDIAC.

Mr. R. A. Simpson has taken charge of this School in place of Mr. J. J. Tuthill. The number in attendance appearing by the return of June 30th, were Boys nineteen and girls five.

GAGETOWN.

This School still continues under the charge of Mr. James Reed. There are nineteen Boys and fifteen Girls attending his School. It is to be feared this School is not in as flourishing a state as might be desired.

CLIFTON.

The pupils receiving instruction at this School are fourteen Boys and sixteen Girls, indiscriminately divided into five classes, under the charge of Mr. David P. Wetmore, who has replaced the former Teacher, Mr. M. Boyd. Of this School, only two years in existence, Rev. W. E. Scovil writes—"The School has been so well conducted as to give all connected with it great satisfaction, Parents and Inspectors being alike con-

vinced of the Teacher's fidelity and efficiency."

On the 5th August last, the Visiting Committee examined the School and reported: This School has been taught for the last six months by Mr. David P. Wetmore, and is at present in an efficient condition. There were thirty five names on the roll on the day of visitation, and present twenty one, eleven Boys and ten Girls, whose ages vary from five to seventeen years. These are divided into five classes, which were all examined by your Committee. The first or highest class acquitted themselves well in English Grammar, Spelling and Etymology, Geography and Arithmetic. In this last branch they solved problems with much facility, accuracy and dispatch, in Proportion, Practice, Interest and Vulgar and Decimal Fractions. writing, though a little too small and close, was very clean and neat, manifesting considerable care and attention. Their reading was not quite so satisfactory; their deficiency was pointed out and amendment promised. The junior classes also acquitted themselves tolerably well for their age and state of progress. The Teacher seems to be diligent, and if he had a little more life and energy in examining his classes, his success would be much more marked. Still the School, as already stated, is in a satisfactory state, and your Committee have no difficulty in recommending it to your continued patronage.

PARISH SCHOOLS.

EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT ON THE PARISH SCHOOLS.

EDUCATION OFFICE, Fredericton, 28th February, 1860.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In submitting the Eighth Annual Report on the state of Public Instruction in New Brunswick, I feel how much the unexpected position in which I find myself placed calls for the indulgence of the Legislature and the country; and I owe it to myself not to pass over in silence a recent event which, I trust, will go far to obtain it.

not to pass over in silence a recent event which, I trust, will go far to obtain it.

It is my first and painful duty to deplore the death of my esteemed friend and predecessor, the late Henry Fisher, Esquire. Viewed in whatever light it may, this sad occurrence must be regarded as a great public calamity. The knowledge of the state of education in the Province, acquired by the labours and experience of nearly two years, as well as the plans he may have formed for its improvement, have died with him. Appointed Chief Superintendent at the enactment of the present Shool Law, Mr. Fisher entered upon his laborious duties with all the ardour of his nature, and, by the versatility of his talents, and assiduous application, he mastered in a very short time the details of an office, to the routine of which he had been hitherto a stranger. His sole thought was the great work in which he was engaged—to raise the standard of education and to diffuse its blessings among the great body of the people. As a means to an end, as well as a highly praiseworthy object in itself, he laboured hard to ameliorate, in every way, the social condition of the Teacher, while his uniform courtesy and urbanity of manner secured the willing co-operation of Inspectors, Trustees, and other subordinate officials throughout the Province. In short, if a more enlightened public opinion prevails on the subject of popular education than formerly; if society has been brought to look with increased respect and favour upon Teachers and their profession; if Teachers themselves are beginning to appreciate more fully the dignity and importance of their calling-and these are no mere suppositions,—then is the credit in a great measure due to the energetic efforts of the late Chief Superintendent. These labours, it is true, were of a short duration, but they have produced a deep impression on the public mind; they have made education the subject of discussion in the social circle, and a familiar theme at the firesides of the people. The man who in so short a time was instrumental in bringing about such pleasing results, merits our gratitude, and his memory will be cherished for the good he did; while our regrets are awakened by his untimely removal which left his work

The difficulties of my position are greatly increased by the fact, that the late Superintendent lest no Report behind him. This is a matter of great regret, but of no surprise. Neither are there any materials at hand, except the Reports of the Inspectors and Training Master, with a few statistics, from which to make a compilation that shall exhibit with any thing like certainty, the state of our educational institutions during the past year.

Teachers.

Teachers.—In glancing over the Reports of the District Inspectors, amidst much that is gloomy and discouraging, I find not a little calculated to cheer and inspire the friends of education with hope for the future. There are yet, no doubt, many Schools of a very inferior description, under the management of Teachers possessing neither the physical, moral, nor intellectual qualifications necessary to ply their task with success; but on the other hand, there are many who are not only thoroughly qualified for their work, but are, and have been for years devoting themselves to it, with a selfdenying zeal which is certain to command success. Witness too, the steady increase of trained Teachers issuing periodically from the Provincial Training School, who, besides receiving instruction there, the better to fit them for the discharge of their important duties, are at the same time entitled to an augmentation of salary, both locally and from the public chest. No mean consideration this, be it remarked. A comparison of Abstract Tables A and B, will show the average number of regular Teachers employed during the year to be 806; of whom 411 are trained, or a little more than one half. If to these latter figures be added 208, the number admitted to the Training School and licensed in 1859, the total of trained Teachers will be 619; a result, approximately correct, and one that, assuming the Teachers and the training to have been what they should be, must shortly tell most favourably upon the Schools of the country.

It is proper to remark, that these figures show an increase in the number of Trained Teachers only. Of all classes the number is probably not greater than it was a few years ago, and this state of things is brought about, in many places, by the deliberate action of the people, who, rather than have Schools as they once had them, are content for a time to have none at all.

School-houses.—Not a few School-houses still exist, such as are described in the Report of last year; but it is a source of pure gratification to notice the efforts put forth by the people in many parts of the Province, sometimes, I doubt not, at the expense of personal comforts, in the repairing and construction of School-houses. Mr. Inspector Duval, from the District under his charge, reports no less than twenty six new School-houses, some of them of a very superior description, as having been built, or in the course of construction, during the year. From the Southern District, Mr. Campbell tells us, that in Saint Stephen alone, no less a sum than £1,100 was expended in the erection of two large and elegant buildings to be devoted to school purposes, besides £100 raised and to be similarly applied, in two other districts of the same In the County of Queen's also, progress seems to be the order of the day, and nine new buildings have been added to the number of School-houses within the year. In the Western District, Mr. M'Lauchlan informs us verbally, that twelve new houses have either been completed or are in progress; while in the Northern District, a good number of the old buildings have been repaired, some new ones are in contemplation, for which funds are being raised, and five have actually been built or opened within the last twelve months. Thus there are fifty four new School-houses for the year; and, taking the data furnished by Table A as nearly correct, in a few vears, at the same rate, we should see a great many of the old and worn out buildings displaced by new and better structures. I venture to say, that better progress than this has not been made in any former year.

The better to enable parties about to build, to do so with economy to themselves and advantage to the service, plans of School-houses, well adapted to the country, were prepared by my predecessor, and distributed pretty extensively over the Province. A fair proportion of the new houses has, I have reason to believe, been built after these models, (in some cases improving on them,) and the proportion would no doubt have been larger had the plans been issued earlier. Copies of these plans, with speci-

fications, &c. are bound up with the present Report.

Libraries.—Next in importance to the School is the establishment of the School Library. It is not merely a useful auxiliary, but an essential part of the School itself. The desire for knowledge is almost a passion in the young mind, and as it is the duty of the educator to guide and regulate that desire, he should have the means at hand of administering judiciously to its gratification. Even if a boy's education began and ended at school, which it does not, he would still profit largely, while yet a pupil, by 100 the

the perusal of books relating to interesting objects in the world around him. But when it is known and admitted that hundreds of our children leave school annually without acquiring either a correct or extensive knowledge of the subjects taught there, it becomes important to inquire how we shall best continue what the school has but partially begun. The remedy for the deficiencies of the School will be found in the Library, if the pupils have only acquired along with the ability the wish also to make use of it.

The law has wisely and liberally provided for the formation of Libraries, but they have not been established in such numbers as could have been wished. This circumstance, however, will excite the less surprise, when the difficulties of procuring books at an easy rate, and suited to the wants and wishes of different parties, as well as the trouble and expense of forwarding them, perhaps, long distances, are duly weighed and considered. But a recent order of the Board of Education, by which every School District establishing a Library of the minimum value of £7 10s., including the Provincial bonus of fifty per cent. on local contributions, becomes entitled to receive a copy of the new Map of the Province gratis, holds out such an inducement that I am satisfied the people will not much longer defer availing themselves of so great a privilege. The Inspectors will reflect credit upon their office, and confer a lasting benefit upon the country, if, by all the lawful means in their power, they can persuade the people to move earnestly in this matter.

I have had gratifying proof within these few days that the Library spirit is beginning to spread, and I feel assured that the next Report will in this respect be more satisfactory than the present; and yet during the year something has been done. It will be seen on reference to Table F that in the Eastern District one Library has been established; in the Western, six; and in the Northern, seven; numbering in all 946 volumes, and costing £116 18s., one third of which was paid by the Province.

School Books.—Great inconvenience having been frequently experienced in remote districts from the difficulty of procuring the authorized School Books, additional Agencies for the sale of these Books have within the year been established at the following places, viz:—Carleton, Saint John, Bay Verte, Salisbury, Sackville, Hillsborough, Boiestown, Buctouche, and Campbellton. By means of these, and a few other Agencies that may still be necessary, all further inconvenience, it is hoped, will be obviated.

French School Books were last Summer imported from Canada to the amount of £53 10s. This is part of a sum of £100 voted for that purpose some years since by the Legislature. Portions of them have been sent to the Agents in these localities of the Northern District where they are required; and, but for unforeseen circumstances, the whole would have been distributed long ago. The Books consisted of a Syllabaire or First Book, Geography, Grammar, and Arithmetic, and, I am happy to say that, where they have been introduced, they are much valued by the Teachers, and likely to be of considerable service.

Teachers' Institutes.—The formation of Teachers' Institutes engaged, during last Summer, a large share of the time and attention of the late Chief Superintendent. Calling Teachers together from the outskirts to the most central part of their respective Counties, he pointed out to them the advantages likely to result to themselves and to the cause of popular education, from the establishment amongst them of these friendly societies. Although, as was anticipated, success did not in every case attend these efforts, yet the mere fact of Teachers meeting and discussing together, even for a short time, the different modes of school management and other matters appertaining to their profession, has been so far productive of beneficial results, that many of them returned to their daily toil with renewed ardour, and with more enlarged views of their individual and social importance.

Five Institutes in all have been organized; one in the City of Saint John, and one in each of the Counties of Charlotte, Queen's, King's, and Northumberland. They hold periodical meetings, some monthly, others quarterly, at which one of the members usually reads a paper on some subject of practical education, after which follows a discussion, which, properly conducted, is well calculated to confer upon all the benefit of the truth, "as iron sharpeneth iron, so doth the face of a man his friend."

Superior Schools.—The number of Superior Schools now in operation, the amount of local and Provincial support, the branches taught, with other items of information respecting them, will be found in the Appendix at pages xlv. and xci. and their condition in the Reports of the Inspectors.

The Superior Schools are calculated and intended to effect more than one object. Besides affording to the different Parishes, where they may be established, educational advantages not formerly possessed, they at the same time provide over a hundred respectable situations for young men of good education, who, unallured by the dazzling but as often deceptive prospects of distant countries, may thus be induced to remain at home, and enter a service, in which talents, learning and industry, will enable them to reap no inconsiderable harvest for themselves, and confer many and great blessings upon their country. With good Common Schools, the Superior Schools, and the University, each mutually nourishing and fostering the other, there will be opened up to the sons of rich and poor alike, and within the bounds of our own Province, a direct road to such an education as shall fit them for the proper discharge of all the ordinary duties of life, as well as for the highest offices of the State.

Training School.—The Report of the Training School will be found annexed. Mr. Mills has pointed out what I believe to be one of the chief defects in that Institution. Generally speaking, the previous education of the candidates has not been such as to enable them to profit, to the full extent, by the exercises of the Model School. This evil is not of recent discovery, and necessarily involves such a departure from the original design of the Institution, that if possible, a speedy and effective remedy ought to be applied. It is perhaps premature for me to offer suggestions just now, but I cannot help thinking that a stricter preparatory examination of candidates will go far to diminish the evil complained of.

The School, it will be seen, continues to be numerously attended by pupil Teachers. Perhaps if the number was smaller, the quality would be better. In this connection, I cannot view without concern the great and growing disproportion between the number of male and female Teachers; though ready to acknowledge and do full justice to the talents and abilities of a few of the latter. I shall not here discuss the comparative merits of these two classes of Teachers; but, taking that part of the Province with which I am familiar as a criterion of the rest, content myself with simply stating the conclusion at which I have arrived after careful observation and inquiry, that we have more female Teachers already than the country wishes to employ, or is likely to profit by.

It will be my duty to visit the School as soon as the business of the Office will permit, and I hope, though my hopes are not very sanguine, with the co-operation of the Training Master and his Assistants, to render it in some degree worthy of the country, and of the important end for which it was established.

The Reports of the Inspectors are given entire. They contain a great deal of general and local information, which is very valuable, and will repay perusal.

The circumstances in which I entered upon the duties of this Office, as well as the hurried manner in which this Report has been got up, will at once account and be my best apology for any omissions, inaccuracies or inelegancies it may contain. To Mr. Thompson, of the Education Office, I am much indebted for his assistance in conducting these sheets through the Press.

I cannot conclude better than in the words of my predecessor,—"I sincerely trust that the effort now in progress may, through the Divine blessing, issue in the establishment of a sound Educational System, which will be a means of permanent usefulness to the rising generation of New Brunswick."

INSPECTORS' REPORTS.

I. COUNTIES OF KING'S, ALBERT, AND WESTMORLAND.

Inspector Duval.

Sir,—Having made two complete tours of Inspection of Schools in the South Eastern District during the year, I proceed to lay before you my Report.

During the first tour I visited 211 Schools. During the second tour I visited 208

Schools.

I am frequently asked "Whether or not our Schools are improving?" I have sometimes felt, for obvious reasons, some delicacy in replying to this question; yet, if my opinion must be given, I can only say that "In my judgment they are." But, to bring our Schools to the state in which they ought to be, will, for many reasons, be a work of time. Many impediments to full success are yet in existence, the removal of which can only be gradually effected. I am, however, of opinion, that the present system, steadily carried out, will be increasingly productive of beneficial results. Experience will, unquestionably, suggest further improvements that may be necessary in order to bring our educational system nearer to perfection.

Among the impediments to the advancement of popular instruction in the Province,

may be enumerated,—

Ist. The frequent interruptions occasioned by the discontinuance of Schools.—A Teacher, either of moderate or superior abilities, is engaged; he teaches for six months, and the advancement of the pupils sufficiently indicates the value of his services, but at the end of his term, two or three of the proprietors think they shall need the services of their children, and decline renewing their subscriptions; the School is consequently closed, and, perhaps, not re-opened till the expiration of six, twelve, or eighteen months, by which time the pupils have well nigh forgotten what they had previously learned. In many cases this cannot be avoided, but it must impede progress.

2nd. The frequent detention of Scholars at home, while the School is in operation.—This too, is often a case of necessity, though frequently by care and forethought it might be avoided. Whatever the cause, it is manifest that the education of the pupil cannot advance if he is not at School. In almost all cases too, there is a change of pupils with the season,—the elder attending in the Winter, and the younger branches of the family in the Summer; this, however necessary, interferes with advancement, and is

a great discouragement to industrious and intelligent Teachers.

3rd. The frequent change of Teachers.—During my second inspection of this year, I found that out of 208 Schools, there had been 119 changes since my previous visit. Sometimes this is necessary, but often is the result of mere caprice of some of the proprietors, though it not unfrequently results from a desire of change on the part of the Teacher. Proprietors and Teachers are of course free to act in these matters,—no one can interfere with them; but these frequent changes must of necessity retard the education of the Province.

4th. Insufficient inducements to good Teachers to continue in the service.—Many of the best Teachers, after a short term of service, relinquish their Schools for some other, and generally, more lucrative employment. There is a general impression that the Legislature does as much as it ought to do, but that the people do not sufficiently appreciate the worth of the Teacher. A desire still exists in many localities to get a cheap Teacher, than which nothing could be more impolitic. But there are in very

many districts cheering signs of improvement in this respect.

Though no Legislative enactments can remove the impediments above enumerated, I have no doubt that they will ultimately cease to exist. The public mind is already considerably awakened; the importance of education is more generally and more fully felt; the circumstances of the rural population are becoming easier, and, as a consequence, they will in time be better able to spare their sons, and give a more satisfactory compensation to Teachers. Teachers will then regard their employment as a permanent profession, and will endeavour to secure those qualifications that will give the occupation as high a place in the estimation of the public, as it already has in the minds of reflective men.

Much may be done by untiring effort on the part of those who are officially charged with the advancement of Educational affairs, but patience must be exercised by the friends of progress while the requisite improvements are being gradually effected.

Perhaps nothing in our Province has produced a more unfavourable impression on the minds of strangers than the wretched condition of our School-houses. It is, however, pleasing to find that a decided improvement is being effected in this respect. Some of the old edifices are disappearing altogether, several are being repaired and improved, and in twenty six places, in the District under my care, new buildings are erected, or are in the course of erection. Nearly all of these are of a very creditable character,—larger than suggested by the plans issued from the Education office. In nearly all cases attention is paid to external appearances and to internal comforts. Among these, one at Norton occupies, at present, the foremost position. It is beautifully situated on an eminence, but with a somewhat difficult approach in the winter scason; considerable taste has been displayed in external decorations, while the internal fittings have received careful attention. To deaden an echo, the floor has been covered with cocoa-nut matting, which contributes also to its comfortable appearance; it is well furnished with maps and apparatus, which will render important aid to the Teacher, who has for some time been favourably known in the neighbourhood, as an able instructress of youth. A School-house of a similar character is being erected, also, at Lower Norton, while another, in the same Parish, intended for a Superior School, but not yet commenced, will, if the designs of the originators are fully carried out, far exceed either of those already alluded to.

These improvements in our School-houses will not only wipe away a standing reproach against our Province;—they will also indirectly lead to, or be followed by, improvements in other respects, which it may be hoped, will ultimately issue in gaining for our Schools a reputation beyond our present expectations.

The following are the places where the new School Buildings are being erected, viz:-

In the commencement of this Report the Schools were spoken of as in a progressive state, notwithstanding the impediments that still lie in the way of complete success. I have made every effort to improve the state of our Schools by urging that a practical direction be given to the most useful branches of study, so that the education received by our youth shall be adapted to their circumstances; believing it to be far more important that our young people shall be able to understand, and be led to develope the rich and abundant resources of their own country, rather than be induced to seek some uncertain or imaginery good in other lands. To accomplish this object more fully, it is very desirable that instructions in the theory and practice of Agriculture, should be given by, at least, our Male Teachers, in their respective Schools. It would also be well that lessons in practical Geology were also given, that our youths might be led to appreciate our Mineral resources, the extent and value of which, few of us, at present, have but little conception of.

The branches that receive the principal attention in our Schools are chiefly of an elementary character, Orthography, Reading, Penmanship, Arithmetic, Geography, Mathematics are also taught, but only to a limited extent. Of the and Grammar. 2,829 pupils actually attending the Schools during my last visitation, there were only 35 studying Mathematical branches. As, however, the lower branches are of more practical value to the general mass of pupils, it is well they should receive the largest share of attention, every facility being at the same time afforded to those students who have leisure and inclination to pursue the higher branches of study.

Besides inspecting Schools, I have in accordance with my instructions, delivered

Lectures as opportunity allowed, on the subject of Education.

Lectures have been delivered during the year at the following places, viz:-Dorchester Corner, Point de Bute, Cape Tormentine, Murray Road, Baie Verte, Shediac, Hillsborough, Lower Cape, Hopewell, Cape Moiselle Creek Road, Harvey Corner, North Joggins, Shemogue, Hammond, and Smith's Creek.

The attendance has been almost invariably large, and one cannot but hope that good must result from these efforts to awaken public attention to one of the most important subjects to which our minds can be directed. At several of the above places, some of the auditory have responded to the invitation given them to take part in the meeting; and as the result, practical Addresses have been given, frequently having reference to matters of local interest, that a stranger could not have dealt with in so

satisfactory a manner.

The subject of Teachers' Institutes was mentioned in last year's Report. It is pleasing to find that in some Counties, the Teachers are giving their attention to this matter. King's County is the only one in my District that has, as yet, moved in this I have been able hitherto, to attend at only one of these meetings, but shall endeavour to make such arrangements as shall enable me to be generally present at their future meetings. If properly conducted, I am persuaded that many advantages must result from such gatherings; a greater uniformity will be secured in the mode of communicating instruction, and new life and vigour be given to the Teachers, who often have to prosecute their labours amidst many discouragements. sions may be deduced from the active interest taken in the meetings by some of the most intelligent Teachers in King's County.

There is at present only one "Superior School" in operation in the South Eastern District, namely at Moncton. During part of the year there have been three, two having been kept by young men who are now prosecuting their collegiate studies.

There are very few cases where the Teachers have to complain for want of uniformity of books, the authorized set being generally used; the French Schools, however, must be excepted from this remark, there being in them an almost endless diversity The Teachers, however, in many places, are loud in their complaints that their pupils are so badly supplied with suitable books, by which their progress is seriously retarded. This generally springs from the negligence of the parents, but sometime from the circumstance that they cannot readily be obtained in the neighbourhood.

I am happy to report that the Trustees as a general rule cheerfully discharge their somewhat onerous duties. I am frequently accompanied by one or more of them in my inspection, which would be the case more generally, did not their business

imperatively require their attention.

In comparatively few cases are there Committees appointed in accordance with Section 7 of the Act. Trustees frequently issue the requisite Notice and attend for the purpose of conducting the meeting, when not a single proprietor of the School makes his appearance. This is a painful proof that the excellent provision of the Law is not appreciated; but when the public mind is better informed on the subject, I am persuaded that this clause in the Act will not be permitted to remain a dead letter.

On the subject of assessment for the support of Schools, I have written so much in my reports of former years, that I scarcely can have any thing new to suggest. conviction still is, that its adoption would operate more powerfully than any thing else in improving the state of our Provincial education. All the evils that now exist would not be cured by assessment, but it would remove many of them. It is, however, gratifying to know that under the present system, with all its drawbacks, improvement

Whether public sentiment is becoming more favourable improvement is going on. to assessment I cannot positively say, my own impression is, that such is the case; but I fully believe that it will never be permanently adopted until it is made compulsory; to make it so, would incur considerable responsibility, considering the influential position of most of the opponents of the plan.

I may be mistaken on the point, but I think that a majority of the rate-payers throughout the Province are favourable to assessment; and that if a vote was submitted to the Province at large, the principle would be affirmed; but in nearly every separate District there are a few individuals that oppose its adoption; and the majority, rather than to come into collision with neighbours whose feelings they respect, torego

their own views, and adhere to the system of subscription.

Much of the opposition to assessment, I am persuaded, arises from misconception. But it is opposed strongly, with a perfect understanding of its merits, by wealthy men, who would pay the largest proportion of the rate; and by others advanced in years, who, having educated their own children now grown to maturity, feel that it is a hardship to be compelled to contribute to the education of others. Perhaps, if persons beyond sixty years of age at the time of the enactment of an Assessment Law were exempted, less opposition would be manifested. Such exemptions, though objectionable on some grounds, would have at least the appearance of justice to support them.

I rejoice, however, in the reflection, that whatever difference of opinion may exist as to the best mode of supporting Schools, whether by subscrip ion or assessment, that progress is and will be the order of the day. The labours of the past have not been without effect. Our Schools present an entirely different and greatly improved aspect, and the Teachers are better qualified persons than those who formerly occupied the field. Much has been done, though much still remains to be accomplished. Former laws were useful, but the present one is, in my judgment, more efficient than any of them; and I am persuaded that the active measures which have been recently adopted to give it effect, have given to our educational movements an impulse, which will be felt in a continually enlarged degree, till our Common Schools will be looked upon with pride and pleasure by every enlightened and patriotic inhabitant of New Brunswick.

11. COUNTIES OF QUEEN'S, CHARLOTTE, AND SAINT JOHN. Inspector Campbell.

Saint Stephen, 1st November, 1859.

In making this my second annual report upon the Parish Schools in the Southern District, although not prepared to record any decided improvement in their general character, I have much pleasure in stating that in several Parishes there is a marked change for the better as compared with the Schools in operation the previous year, while throughout the three Counties there are evident indications of a growing desire to render the Schools more satisfactory and efficient.

In the matter of School-houses, in many Parishes efforts are being made for the erection of edifices where none have before existed, and for the enlargement and improvement of those now in use. In Charlotte County three new School-houses have been completed and occupied. In the Parish of Saint Stephen a very superior building has been erected by the Corporation of Christ's Church, after the model and plan, No. 1, issued from the Department. A public School-house in a most central and pleasant locality, of large dimensions, (30 by 45 feet, with 25 feet posts,) and calculated for a School in each flat, is rapidly approaching completion. This building will reflect credit upon the District, and will be second to no other in the Province. The cost of the edifice with the site will not fall short of £500. The new Roman Catholic School-house, now completed, is 60 by 30 feet, with 16 feet posts, and is constructed in a style of architecture and furnished in a manner highly creditable. This building will also be used as a Chapel. Thus we have an expenditure of some £1,100 in this one Village, while in two other districts in the Parish £62 10s. and £37 10s. have been raised for the erection and repair of School-houses by the ladies. In Queen's County, nine new buildings have been erected, several of them already completed and occupied. In Saint John County efforts were made to raise by assessment in the City and Lancaster, liberal sums for the erection of School-houses, but owing to unexpected opposition, appeals were made against the legality of the preliminary proceedings, and the subject is now, I believe, before the Judges of the Supreme Court. It is much to be regretted that so little attention has been paid to this matter in the commercial emporium of our Province. On the Eastern side of the Harbour there is not a public School-house, and on the Western side but one. 35 Schools were in operation in the City in private buildings rented or provided for the purpose by the Teachers themselves, and no doubt in many cases the rent paid would absorb the amount of the Provincial allowance received by the Teacher. This is a grievous tax upon persons already but poorly compensated for their labours. I should hope some course may be adopted whereby those engaged in the School service would be relieved from so serious a burden, more particularly as the Law anticipated a different state of things.

The prevailing defects in the construction of our School-houses have been a want of proper regard to health, convenience and comfort, the choice of location, interior construction, and method of lighting, warming and ventilating. The plans and models prepared by the Chief Superintendent, if adopted, and I have every encouragement that they will be, will obviate these defects in future erections. The School-house should be made a place of agreeable rather than painful associations. That children enjoying every comfort and luxury at home can be expected to profit by the instructions received while confined to the uncomfortable benches and impure atmosphere of the School-house is an absurdity. If parents would but realize their responsibility in this respect, many of the edifices now occupied would be abandoned, and more suitable and convenient buildings erected. The late Dr. Warren of Massachusetts, in a Lecture before the American Institute some years since, said "In the course of my observation I have been enabled to satisfy myself that about one half the young females brought up as they are at present, undergo some visible and obvious change of structure; that a considerable number are the subjects of great and permanent deviations, and that not a few entirely lose their health from the manner in which they are reared." And among the causes leading to such results, he enumerated "The unnatural elevation of the right shoulder, the habit of bending the neck, and the stooping posture of the body when engaged in writing or similar exercises at School."

In a work recently published in Boston, the author, after referring to the injurious effects upon the health of the females employed in the factories, from the impurity of the atmosphere, and the want of proper ventilation in the several departments in which they are month after month confined, says: "In the School Room the same poisonous process goes on day after day; and if the work is less summary, it is in the end more extensively fatal than in the Black Hole of Calcutta. Any man or woman who received any portion of their education in the Common School, can testify to the narrow dimensions, and low ceilings of the School rooms, and to the discomfort arising from the close, stagnant, offensive atmosphere which they were obliged to breathe. Who does not remember the comparative freshness and vigour of body and mind with which the morning's study and recitations were began, and the languor and weariness of body, the confusion of mind, the dry skin, the flushed cheek, the aching head, the sickening sensations, the unnatural thirst, the thousand excuses to get out of doors, which came along in succession as the day advanced, and especially in a Winter's afternoon, when the overheated atmosphere had become obvious to every sense?"

Let any one who is sceptical on this point, visit the School of his own District, where his own children are perhaps condemned to a shorter allowance of pure air than the criminal in the prison cell, and he cannot fail to see in the pale countenances of the pupils, the langour and weariness manifested especially by the younger children, and exhaustion and irritability of the Teacher, a demonstration that the atmosphere of the room is no longer such as the comfort, health, and cheerful labour of both Teacher and pupils require. It cannot be doubted that this has been the means of compelling many worthy and competent Teachers to quit the employment.

If it is true that "the child is father to the man," that "as we sow, so shall we reap," it is an all-important question, as bearing on the future character of our Province,

vince, "who shall be our Teachers?" If it be true that the children of the present day, are to be the future arbiters of our Province's destiny, wisdom would dictate that those who are to prepare them for their high designation, should be capable, honest, moral.

The successful operation of a Training and Normal School, through which and through which alone Teachers should be licensed, will go far toward a remedy for the evils existing from the number of Teachers of limited qualifications now in the School service. Many of the Teachers now employed are eminently qualified for the calling by education, energy, and experience; still more are of the right material, but are deficient in consequence of inexperience and ignorance of the art of teaching, while there are others possessing no one desirable qualification. This latter observation will apply more particularly to the Female Teachers; scattered as it were "broad cast" throughout Charlotte County, and retarding the progress of Education in many Districts where, otherwise, competent Male Teachers could be more profitably employed.

The organization of "Teachers' Institutes" throughout the Province cannot fail of securing the most beneficial results. The most skillful and experienced Teachers in Charlotte, Queen's, and Saint John, have entered most heartily into the movement. If the Institutes are made what such Teachers are competent to make them, by "giving Lectures on the general principles of School government, of discipline, classification, and the most improved methods of teaching in the various branches usually taught in public Schools." By making the Institute, when time permits, a Model School, where the young Teachers are presented with a living illustration of a School as it should be, it will afford to them a practical exemplification of the principles of government and teaching. It will be theory reduced to practice. And all will be benefited. That the Institutes will prove a success, cannot be doubted.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY.—Total number of Schools returned, 101. Teachers employed: MALES-First Class, 7; Second Class, 13; Third Class, 16. Females-First Class, 14; Second Class, 8; Third Class, 45. Number trained, 41; untrained, 60. Total number of pupils upon the School Registers, 3,337. Average daily attendance, 1,718. This would give an average to each School of 33 on Register, and 17 in daily attendance. 52 Schools were without Black Boards, 87 without Maps, and all without Globes or other apparatus. 38 Districts were without School Committees, and in two Parishes none were elected. The sanction of so many Schools as are in operation in the more populous Districts is a serious evil. If in such Districts one half the Schools were closed and the most competent Teachers retained, and provided with suitable School rooms, with an average daily attendance of from 30 to 40 Scholars, the Schools would be in a much more efficient state. The pupils would be actually receiving instruction, and the parents would not be called upon to pay toward the compensation of the Teachers more than they now contribute to sustain small and ineffective Schools. The erection of the new edifices in Saint Stephen, before alluded to, will have a favourable tendency in this respect, and it is to be desired that the example shall be followed in Saint Andrews and Saint George.

I have held twelve Educational meetings in the populous Districts in this County, and have endeavoured to improve the occasions by impressing upon the people the necessity of providing better School-houses, of more discretion in the selection of Teachers, and of manifesting more interest in the prosperity of the Schools when competent Teachers have been engaged. And also by urging upon the Teachers the propriety of giving more attention to the various branches of Instruction. In very many of the Schools, Grammar and Geography have been wholly neglected, and but little attention given to Arithmetic.

QUEEN'S COUNTY.—Number of Schools in operation, 64. First, Second, and Third Class Male Teachers respectively 12, 17, and 19; and of Females, 8, 3, and 5. Total number of pupils upon the Registers, 1,729. Average daily attendance, 864; or an average of 27 per register, and 14 in daily attendance for each School; 29 without Black Boards; 40 without Maps; all without Globes or other apparatus. Two Parishes had elected no School Committee, and in 36 Districts none had been chosen.

A lively interest in the whole question of Education is springing up in all parts of

this County. Laudable efforts are being made to provide more suitable School accommodations, and more liberal encouragement given to Trained and competent Teachers. In two Parishes efforts have been made to establish "Superior Schools," but for reasons explained upon the Duplicate Returns I have not yet been able to sanction them, but feel encouraged that at my next visit I may be justified in doing so. I was only enabled to hold two Educational meetings in this County. But the well attended and highly appreciated Lectures of the Chief Superintendent were doing a good work.

SAINT JOHN COUNTY.—Number of Schools in operation, 87, viz: 18 First, 18 Second, and 14 Third Class Male Teachers; and 24 First, 5 Second, and 10 Third Class Females. 74 Trained, 15 Untrained. Whole number of pupils upon the Registers, 3,471; in daily attendance 2,070; being an average of 40 in Register and 24 in daily attendance for each School. 34 without Black Boards; 44 without Maps; 3 with Globes, and 6 with other School apparatus.

The "Superior Schools" in Saint John, Carleton, and Indian Town, were in a condition highly creditable to the fidelity and zeal of the Principals, and the diligence and application of the pupils. In the City and Parish of Portland several capable and zealous Teachers have been added to the School service, while in other parts of the County there has been but little change to notice. Two of the Male Teachers who had full and successful Schools, have since my visit to the City been removed by death.

I visited many of the Schools in this County at an unfavourable period. In several districts the attendance at the Schools was much diminished, owing to the prevalence of small pox and scarlet rash, while in others the Schools had not been fully organized after the Summer vacation.

In many of the Schools throughout the Southern District the supply of Books was very deficient. In some Parishes in Charlotte County many American works have been introduced, and in some cases the requirements of the Board of Education unheeded. This, however, is being remedied by the introduction of the Books sanctioned by the Board. If a provision could be made for the supply of Books to children whose parents are unable to procure them, upon the certificate of the School Committee that such is the case, the trifling cost would be money well expended.

I found but three Schools supported by assessment—two in Saint David, and one in Saint James, Charlotte County. The principle has however been adopted in several other Districts, as applicable to the erection of School Houses. The number of Schools kept in private buildings was, in Charlotte, 42; in Queen's, 9; and in Saint John, 64. The most favourable estimate of the character of the Schools in operation in the different Counties would be—Charlotte, 18 good, 43 average, and 40 bad; in Queen's, 26 good, 13 average, and 25 bad; in Saint John, 31 good, 30 average, and 27 bad; in the City of Saint John, 17 good, 14 average, and 5 bad.

The data for estimating the "value of Public School property," and the "number of children of suitable age not attending School," is so meagre and unsatisfactory, that I have not carried forward the figures from Schedule 3, into the General Returns.

In closing this Report, I would beg leave to tender to the Trustees of Schools and School Committees throughout the District, my sincere thanks for the uniform kindness and valuable assistance I every where received from them. If the Teachers' Returns were more full, they would have exhibited the gratifying fact, that the Schools have been much more frequently visited by the gentlemen acting as Trustees, and more zeal manifested in their success, than at any former period. I would also express my sense of obligations to the Chief Superintendent for the many favours received, and to his attentive and obliging Secretary, for the prompt and courteous manner all applications to the Department have been complied with.

III. COUNTIES OF VICTORIA. CARLETON, YORK, AND SUNBURY.

Inspector M'Lauchlan.

DEAR SIR,—I beg to hand you the following Report on the state of the Schools in the Western District.

I find that 222 Teachers have been employed during the past year; of which number

30 are Male Teachers of the First Class,
25 " " Second Class,
62 " " Third Class,
31 are Female Teachers of the First Class,
10 " " Second Class,
64 " " Third Class.

Of these 102 have attended the Training School, while 120 have not availed themselves of the instructions to be derived by attendance at that Institution.

Of the Male Teachers, 60 are married, and 57 are single; of the Female Teachers, 16 are married, 89 are single.

209 Schools have been in operation, at which 3,211 male pupils, and 2,936 female pupils received instructions; to which add 1000 children (which I think a low calculation) that do not attend any School—some in new settlements, deprived of such advantages, and others not sent by their parents, who appear to have very little interest in the matter; and we have in round numbers 7,147 children in this District for whom education has to be provided.

4 Schools are supplied with Globes, 85 with Black Boards and Maps, 13 with Maps only, 43 with Black Boards only, and 68 have neither Maps nor Black Boards.

School rooms are of the following description, 181 framed buildings and 28 log buildings; 80 of these are comparatively good, and 129 inferior; 40 are private property, of which number 21 are rented.

In the District there are 256 School-houses, including private property used for that purpose, of which 35 are log buildings, and 221 framed buildings; 99 of these

are generally called good, and 157 of a very inferior description.

You can readily understand the cause of the apparent discrepancy between the number of Teachers employed, and the number of Schools in operation during the year. There is no uniformity in the commencement of School engagements. ers and employers very frequently consult their own convenience to the exclusion of all other considerations; and hence it is that School engagements may be found commencing in any month, and on any day (Sundays excepted) throughout the year. Another serious difficulty to be encountered by the Inspector, and one that retards the progress of education, arises from what may be termed the nomadic habits of Teachers, and this prevails extensively among the young and unmarried, particularly in the Counties of York and Carleton. There is such a desire for change-such a wish for novelty, that necessarily induces a spirit of restlessness and discontent, the effect of which is such that you can scarcely hear of a young Teacher making an engagement for a longer period than six months. They move from District to District -sometimes after the Inspector has paid his usual visit; sometimes a few days before: and in two instances I happened to visit localities where Schools had commenced on the very day of my arrival at those places. It is not a rare thing to find two Teachers occupying the same School room, and instructing the same Scholars during the year. The effect of this, it is evident, must militate against the progressive improvement of the pupils of any School thus situated. Every Teacher has a method of his own. True, every trained Teacher has a general similarity of system, but when that system gets reduced into detail it undergoes a process of modification according to the disposition or peculiar views of the Teacher. Hence the pupils of any School, subject to such frequent changes, may be said to be alternately learning and unlearning systems. to the neglect of the various branches so essential to the formation of a thorough practical education. To a young man who can devote only a few months to the improvement of his mind, the loss of so much time is a matter of serious consideration. This desire for "change" is not confined to Teachers. The inhabitants of several sections of the country appear to be averse to long engagements. They argue that

Teachers get careless towards the close of their term, and therefore urge the propriety of making "short agreements." This may be the case in some instances, but my observation and experience convince me that such is not always the case.

There will appear to be a discrepancy between the Tabular Returns and my Statistics. But you will please bear in mind that my information has been carefully collected during personal visits to every School in the District, with the exception of a few where the Teachers' engagements had terminated before the time appointed for an examination of their Schools, and some four, of whose existence I had no knowledge, not having been furnished with the usual certificates. The deficiences in such cases I supplied from the semi-annual Returns. Another reason of difference arises from the fact that all Teachers do not make return at the close of the scholastic term, from the reason that their agreements had not been completed. When it is understood that the Tabular Returns are merely a synopsis of information furnished by Teachers at the close of their term, the difference will be easily accounted for.

Teachers.—I have remarked that there are 102 Trained Teachers in this District. A large portion of these are fully competent to their task. They appear to be really devoted to their profession, and are labouring with a commendable zeal to advance their pupils in the different branches of education. There are many discouragements with which they have to contend; among which I may mention the apathy of the people, more or less of which may be discovered in almost every section of the country; the scarcity of books, of which there is much cause of complaint; cold and uncomfortable School-houses, which must necessarily retard their exertions for the improvement of those entrusted to their charge; and last, although not least, the inconvenience and delay they experience in collecting the stipulated amount "subscribed" for their services. While I can report thus favourably upon a large portion of the Trained Teachers, I have to observe that there are a few, and I am happy to say that their number is small, whose lethargy and inactivity would almost incapacitate them for such an important and responsible office, and I can only wonder how such people ever mustered sufficient energy to secure a First or Second Class License.

It will be seen that more than half of the Teachers of this District are of the Third Class. Many of these are worthy of a higher grade. Several who have not had the advantages of training instructions, prove themselves well adapted for the office of Teacher. Nature appears to have furnished them with a large amount of mental activity and physical energy, which I consider among the most essential requisites to form a successful Teacher. The most efficient of the Third Class Teachers, I find are either those who have attended the Training School, or such as have received instructions from Trained Teachers of competent attainments. The general similarity of their system leads me to this conclusion; and this induces a suggestion that might be worthy of consideration, viz: - Whether it would not be advantageous to the School interests to require all suture candidates for Third Class License to produce certificates, from Teachers of known competency, that such candidates had been for three months, at least, under their instruction. The result, it is obvious, would be to introduce a greater uniformity of system, and that with scarcely any, perhaps no additional expense. A large number of this class are sadly deficient in a proper method of communicating ideas. They appear, however, to be industrious, and willing to pay attention to any suggestion of the Inspector, and are, in many instances, employed in preference to others, simply, I believe, because their services can be procured at a much cheaper

Schools.—I had some intention of reporting upon the state of the Schools in every Parish separately, but I find there is so much similarity in their situation, and in all their circumstances, that I am induced to speak of them in general terms. A careful examination convinces me that a very great improvement has taken place among a large portion of the Schools during the past year. This is more particularly observable in Districts where Teachers have been engaged and continued in the same situation for a number of consecutive terms. Even Teachers of very inferior qualifications furnish evidence of the fact that progressive improvement is more facilitated by steady and constant instruction under one uniform system than by a frequent change of Teachers. The different branches required by law are generally well taught. Fundamental prin-

ples are being well established: and one of the most pleasing features, perhaps, in the present system, is the spirit which animates Teachers generally, to make their pupils "understand what they learn."

It would afford me much pleasure could I report in the same terms of commendation on all the Schools in my District. A large number are in a very inefficient state. Some are taught by incompetent persons, while others are conducted by Teachers of undoubted merit. This, perhaps, may require explanation. The desire among the people for a "change" compels many an excellent Teacher to provide himself with another situation: and when visited by the Inspector some two, three, or perhaps four weeks after his commencement, he is found imparting a knowledge of the "rudiments" in some locality where there had been no school for years before, or he may be labouring most assiduously to remove the evil effects of a former injudicious system of teaching. His school had scarcely been organized, but its exact state, when visited, had to be reported; and consequently it is classed among the "inferior." visit, and such a school would present a different aspect; but before the time appointed for that purpose has arrived, the Teacher "has left to seek a home elsewhere;" and thus it is that the names of very competent instructors are often associated with Inferior The characters of Teachers must be materially injured under such Schools. circumstances.

There are twelve French Schools in Victoria County. Some of the Teachers are active and industrious, others are naturally indolent. The majority evidence a satisfactory state of improvement; Teachers and scholars have commenced to study the English language. Little progress is perceptible as yet, but the result I hope will be productive of much good.

Superior Schools.—Five Superior Schools have been in operation, viz: one in York, one in Sunbury, one in Victoria, and two in Carleton. Those taught by Mr. Robert Hallet, Queensbury, Mr. George Stewart, Burton, Mr. Ivory Kilburn, Richmond, deserve to be specially noticed, from the successful manner in which they have been conducted. These gentlemen seem to be peculiarly fitted for their office. They possess superior attainments, and combine a happy mixture of firmness and dignity, with a pleasing and familiar manner of securing the attention of their pupils. They have been engaged for many years in their present profession, and during that time have imparted instructions to a number of young men and young women who are now successful in their occupation as Teachers. The School at Grand Falls, taught by Mr. Owen M'Lauchlan, is progressing under favourable circumstances. That taught by Mr. Robert Caldwell, Woodstock, afforded satisfaction: it has been discontinued. The branches taught are those required by the Regulations for the government of Superior Schools.

School-houses.—I have remarked that eighty School-houses are comparatively good. By this I mean that they are warm and comtortable. They do not, however, come up to the standard that I hope to see adopted ere long,—that recommended by yourself. Their ceilings are low, and badly ventilated. There is a growing desire for better buildings. The scarcity of money seems to retard the necessary improvement. Twelve new buildings of a more commodious description, are in a state of progress; and I am assured by parties interested in the matter, that many of the present dilapidated School rooms will soon cease to be an "eye-sore" to the friends of education.

School Furniture and Apparatus.—Schools in Towns, Villages, and populous Settlements are, in general, tolerably well supplied with furniture and apparatus. The furniture is not, in many cases, who would be desirable. The desks are inconvenient, and the seats are without backs; causing a rather painful position to the child who has to occupy them day after day. New Settlements are still worse provided.

You will perceive that Globes have been introduced into a few of the Schools. I hope they will come into general use. A goodly number are supplied with Black Boards and Maps; some have Black Boards only; others have Maps only; while a large number have neither. You can readily appreciate the difficulty experienced by any Teacher, labouring diligently under such circumstances to promote the improvement of his School. He is expected to devote a portion of his time to explanation and illustration, which would be very much facilitated by the use of these necessary aids to instruction.

Several public examinations have been held, at which Proprietors, Local Committees, and sometimes Trustees, have attended, and appeared to manifest an increased interest in the prosperity of their Schools.

Trustees and Clergymen of different denominations have my warmest thanks for the kind and cheerful manner in which they accompanied me to the several Schools in their respective Parishes; for the interest which they manifested, as well as for the

assistance which they rendered at the different examinations.

I have thus summed up in brief terms, the more prominent features connected with the state of the Schools in this District. I might have enlarged. I might have pointed out defects, and suggested improvements; but I am reminded that that is not my province, and I therefore forbear. A careful consideration of the working of the system during the year just ended, convinces me that much good has been done. People have been stirred up to the importance of the subject. Teachers have been stimulated to increased diligence; and I trust the day is not far distant when it can be said "of a truth," that the New Brunswickers "are an educated people."

IV. KENT, NORTHUMBERLAND, GLOUCESTER, AND RESTIGOUCHE.

Inspector Bennet.

SIR,—In addition to the special Report on each School within the Northern District already sent in, I have now the honor to lay before you a more general view of the whole. But as no great or material change has taken place, either in the support or working of the Schools since the date of my former Report, and as that Report dealt principally with generalities, it is considered proper now to enter into more minute and specific details, in order that the public, thus informed of existing defects, may be induced, and the better enabled, to cast about for such remedies as lie within their reach. From the migratory habits of a considerable number of our Teachers, my remarks, though founded on observations made at both my visits, will have reference chiefly to my last; and I shall take up the several Parishes in the order in which they were visited.

COUNTY OF KENT.

Carleton.—At both my last visits to this Parish, I found but one School in operation, namely, that at the Village of Kouchibouguac, which, notwithstanding the large school-going population in the neighbourhood, the actually good attendance at the time of my first visit, and its being under the management of a Teacher who had enjoyed the advantages of the Training School, did not succeed so well as its supporters and the friends of education could have wished. It is now conducted by another Teacher; and we can only hope that with the change there may come some improvement. A Library has within the year been laid in connection with this School. A Globe and set of Maps are much needed. I fee! confident provision will shortly be made for these needful appendages.

Besides this School there are two others in the Parish which have been vacant for upwards of twelve months. At the time of my visit to them in the Summer of 1858, they were in every possible point of view wretched affairs, and the Districts can have sustained but little loss from their discontinuance. The Trustees should, before ratifying the engagement of any Teachers for these Schools, insist upon the old houses being either thoroughly repaired and furnished, or replaced by new ones.

PALMERSTON.—In this Parish there are three Schools in operation, one of which is conducted by a First Class female Teacher, who has the rare faculty of being able to teach both English and French with almost equal ease and accuracy. The branches required by her license are here actually taught, to which indeed may be added the elements of algebra. The discipline is good and the order excellent. The two others

are wholly French Schools, and are still inferior, though it must be admitted that considerable improvement was manifest, especially in one of them, in the increased care bestowed upon the penmanship, and in the cleanly and tidy manner in which the house is now kept. There is, however, room for improvement still, especially in arithmetic, to secure which the lately imported l'rench Treatise on that subject will greatly and speedily contribute. The Trustees are, I believe, faithfully doing their duty, and one or all of them usually accompany me at my periodical visits to their Schools.

RICHIBUCTO.—The Schools in this Parish are as follow:—

The first of these Schools, situate in a rural district, is wholly French, and its condition is inferior, though perhaps the smallness of the house, and the want of proper furniture, books and other appliances, quite as much as any defects in the Teacher's qualifications, may tend to keep it in this state. The only other School in the Parish taught by a man is that in the Town of Richibucto; and whatever may be said of the Teacher's method, which is somewhat antiquated, or of the discipline, which is rather lax, it must be admitted that the School is well attended, that the Teacher, a hard working man, gives general satisfaction, and that considerable improvement is evident from time to time, particularly in penmanship and arithmetic. But the School-house, and it is the only one in the Town which is public property, is in its present state but ill calculated to reflect credit upon that part of the community which supports it. Both internally and externally, repairs are greatly needed. Of the two Female Schools in the Town, one is a rented house, which is comfortable, and is tolerably well conducted; the other is the private property of the Teacher, and far too small. In the latter, English Grammar is nominally taught, but the Teacher, whatever she may have done formerly, cannot now impart a correct knowledge of this branch to her pupils. Two of the others are but lately in charge of their present Teachers; two remain as to method, disipline, &c. nearly as I first found them; but that at the Lower Village, which is almost entirely French, has greatly improved under the charge of its present Teacher.

Weldford.—This Parish has the following Schools:—

Of the two first, one is teaching in a different district from that in which I first found him, and is doing somewhat better in his new place than formerly; the other, with many good and amiable qualities, has never shown much aptness to teach. Two of the Schools taught by Females are succeeding pretty well, though one of them numbers but few scholars and is kept in a private house; the others are not such as the wants of the districts require. Libraries have been laid in connection with two of these Schools; but these, however useful, are not more necessary than maps, which still remain to be furnished, or than good School-houses, which the present ones cannot be made without considerable repairs. Such improvements might be surely made without considerable repairs. Such improvements might be surely made without a very great sensible sacrifice by a Parish, which, in almost every article of material wealth, is the first in the County; and I cannot help thinking that such would shortly be effected, were there any reasonable prospects that the Schools so furnished and repaired, could be filled with well qualified *Male* Teachers.

Wellington.—This Parish had the following Schools in operation at the time of my late visit, viz:—

Of these eight Schools, two are entirely French.—the one tolerably, the other miserably conducted; and two mixed, i.e. partly French and partly English, taught, it is to be observed, by English Female Teachers; the one well, the other very indifferently. In the Schools purely French, I have seen no improvement since my first visit. Little or no writing or arithmetic is taught in them, and the time of the poor pupils is killed over dull reading lessons, from books of many different sorts, and resembling each other in no particular except in their unfitness to awaken or interest the youthful intellect. The three English Schools conducted by Females, are only lately in charge of their present Teachers; and the remaining one, which from its situation and the excellence of the house should be the most important in the Parish, has for some time been going on from bad to worse. A First Class Male Teacher is much wanted for this School; and indeed might have been secured long ago, but for the prejudice of some and the apathy of others. New efforts are about to be put forth, which I hope may be crowned with success.

Dundas.—I found the Schools of this Parish as follows:—
3 conducted by 3rd Class Male Teachers.
1 "Female"

Of these, three are French, and only one of them conducted with any degree of success. One of the other two has been labouring ever since my first acquaintance with him, under many and great disadvantages, but has failed chiefly from incompetence. The other has also difficulties to contend with, in the poverty or indifference of parents, in not providing their children with suitable and sufficient materials, such as books, paper, &c.; and until these obstacles are removed, we shall look in vain for any improvement in this School. The remaining one is English, taught by a young man whose vernacular is French, and conducted as well as under these circumstances

could be expected.

In this Parish, and in several others in the Northern District, the practice prevails of employing Teachers not possessed of the legal qualifications. To enumerate all the evils attendant on this much-to-be-deprecated system, would be unduly to extend this paragraph; but at the risk of being tedious, I cannot help reminding the Board of the fact, that many, if not the whole of these Teachers, succeed, through interest with the Government in one way or other, in drawing as much money from the public chest as those who by law are entitled to it; at the same time that the Trustees and Inspector, from a desire to discountenance the irregularity as much as possible, do not visit or examine these Schools. Nobody, therefore, is officially responsible for the character and qualifications of such Teachers, or for the condition of their Schools. They may teach almost when and how they please, while their occupancy of the public School-house necessarily precludes for a time—and that is in some cases for no inconsiderable period,—the possibility of inducting legally qualified Teachers. How the anomaly is to be remedied, I do not presume to say; but I may be allowed to express my conviction, that the cause of public instruction will suffer till it be finally abolished.

NORTHUMBERLAND.

HARDWICKE. - In this Parish there are three Schools in operation, two of which are conducted by Third Class Male Teachers, and one by a First Class Female Teacher. These Schools are pretty nearly average ones. In one of the two taught by masters, there is too little examination, in another, too much, or more correctly speaking, too The houses are small but othermuch lecturing, which does not and cannot interest. wise pretty good. These two are supported by assessment, the principle having been carried by a considerable majority of the rate-payers. Of course there are some who, having no families to be educated, or families whose school going days are over, feel or think themselves aggrieved by being obliged to pay for the support of institutions from which they derive no direct benefit. But I am not aware that the opposition has been such as to interfere with the harmonious working of the Schools. The remaining School is kept in an old Church, and is tolerably well attended. Preparations were made some time ago for the erection of a new building, and considerable materials were actually collected for the purpose, but from want of mutual forbearance in the choice of a site, and perhaps from other causes not known to me, the building has

has not been proceeded with. But till a new house is erected, and furnished with some regard to convenience and to the physical comfort of the children, the School will not reach that degree of prosperity and success which it might otherwise attain.

GLENELG.—In this Parish there are five Schools, four of which are conducted by Third Class Male Teachers, and one by a Female of the same class. One of the former is supported by assessment, and, considering the Teacher's qualifications and experience, pretty fairly taught. Another, as to most of the branches, is in an average condition, but superior as regards penmanship. One has been only a short time in charge of its present Teacher, who has not yet succeeded in raising it from its inferior condition; and the fourth was so ill-managed that the Teacher was advised to resign his license, which he has since done. In that taught by the Female, along with some defects, is displayed a considerable degree of intelligence, and altogether the School is tolerably well conducted. Repairs, Maps and other apparatus are needed in all these Schools.

CHATHAM.—This Parish has the following Schools:—

All of these are conducted by Male Teachers.

The Superior School having failed to meet the object of its establishment, has been for the present discontinued as such. The Roman Catholic School which was a considerable time vacant has but lately been re-opened. The first class School is numerously attended, has a good many pupils well advanced in grammar, geography, and arithmetic, is moreover kept in the best and perhaps the most suitably furnished School-house in the Parish, and were the discipline a little less lax, would be fairly conducted. The Madras School is under the management of an energetic Teacher. though it presents a few defects arising perhaps from inadvertence, which I trust will shortly disappear. But the house, whether regarded externally or internally, is glaringly unsuitable. Even some little repairs made not long ago upon the premises, were made, if I mistake not, at the Teacher's own expense. Is this as it should be? The School is supported by the allowance of the Madras Board as well as that of the regular School service—an anomaly which, as the whole subject of these Schools will probably ere long demand the attention of the Government, does not call for further remark at present. The other second class School, notwithstanding the miserable condition of the house, has for some time been steadily improving; and that conducted by the Third Class Teacher is, all things considered, pretty successful.

Of the seven Schools taught by Females, only two are kept in houses which are public property, and of these two, only one is strictly speaking public school property, and even this one has through time and neglect become so much decayed that the public might bear the loss of it with a great deal of equanimity. The others are either the private property of the Teachers, or rented, and are all too small and otherwise unsuitable. The only really good one is that in the Temperance Hall. As a natural consequence, no great success attends the labours of these Teachers, and they are not, with one exception, what the educational wants of such a Town as Chatham require. The fact is there are too many Schools in the Town, and the people will consult their own and their children's interests by diminishing their number, by erecting buildings of suitable dimensions, furnished with proper apparatus, under Teachers liberally and punctually paid. How these changes are to be effected I am not prepared to say, but effected they must be, in some way or other, before the Schools reach the standard of excellence which it is so desirable they should attain.

NELSON.—The Schools of this Parish are as follow:—

The first of these Schools is numerously attended, tolerably well furnished with maps, apparatus, &c., and well conducted. The other four Male Schools are variously taught; that on Barnaby's River, though considerable difficulties still impede its progress, is yet managed with praiseworthy assiduity. Of those taught by Females, one has been only a very short time in charge of its present Teacher, who, if she will but add energy to her other qualifications, will soon see the rewards of her labours in a flourishing School. Both the others are inferior, and one of them, I fear, hopelessly so. The School-houses of this Parish are with one or two exceptions very much in need of repairs.

BLACKVILLE.—At my last visit to this Parish, there were in operation four Schools taught by men, and one by a female. None of these Teachers rank higher than the Third Class. There are a few districts vacant, or, as in one instance, filled by Teachers not possessing the legal qualifications. What may be the state of the School-houses which are vacant I cannot say, but those in actual use are perhaps the poorest in the whole County. One in particular is so low that a person of ordinary stature cannot stand upright in it; and when it is added that its other dimensions are quite in keeping with its height, it will be readily conceded that such a building is scarcely suitable for a Public School. I took the responsibility of recommending the Trustees to withhold their consent to its continuance beyond the Term, and until a new house of proper dimensions shall be erected. The School in charge of the Female Teacher I have seen but once, and have little favourable to report of it as yet; two of the others would be better were other things equal to the Teachers, and the remainder are about as good as I ever expect to see them. The Trustees are anxious to do their duty, and are sufficiently alive to the importance of education. Would the people but do things as well, the Schools would soon improve.

BLISSFIELD.—The Schools of this Parish are as follow:—

1 conducted by a 2nd Class Male Teacher.

1 " 3rd " "

1 " 3rd Class Female Teacher.

The first of these Teachers, with some good qualities, lacks sufficient nerve and energy to ply successfully the task of public instruction; yet his scholars make some progress, and the people are generally satisfied. Some existing differences of opinion regarding this School, will, I trust, soon be adjusted to the satisfaction of all parties. The School-houses of this Parish are none of them large, but to the credit of the people be it said, they are all well finished and comfortable. There are some vacancies, which I trust will not long be so.

NORTHESK.—There are six Schools in operation in this Parish, viz:—

2 conducted by 1st Class Male Teachers.

2 " 3rd " "

2 " 3rd Class Female Teachers.

Of the first two, one has succeeded very well, and I very much regret, and the District has reason also to regret, that the Teacher has resigned his charge; the other, from perhaps several causes, has not yet come up to the mark. Of the second two, one has of late been improving a little, and the house has been repaired; the other is, I am afraid, hopelessly inferior. The two last are conducted by Teachers who are faithfully and to the utmost of their abilities, discharging their duties. One of them is in a lately erected house and district, and the progress of the scholars is exceedingly gratifying. In the other district, I hope the people will soon see it to be alike their duty and their interest to erect a new house to replace the present shattered and ugly structure. The Trustees are zealous in the discharge of their duties, and at all times ready to co-operate with me in any scheme for the public utility.

Considerable

Newcastle.—This Parish numbers the following Schools, viz:—

1 Superior School.

1 conducted by a 1st Class Male Teacher.

Considerable success has attended the establishment of the Superior School. It is well and not too numerously attended by pupils of a proper age. The house and furniture are suitable. There is a good supply of Maps, and lately it has been furnished with an excellent eighteen inch Terrestrial Globe. The required branches are actually taught, besides Latin, which, to be of any real service to the learners, will require more time and attention than there has yet been found opportunity to bestow upon it. The discipline, as far as I can judge, is very good, and Mr. Hardie deserves well of the community for his diligence.

The School conducted by the First Class Teacher has but lately been opened, though under very favourable circumstances, and we may reasonably look for a cor-

responding degree of success.

Of the two Second Class Schools, one is very numerously attended, and is conducted with much zeal, if not with distinguished ability; the other, not long opened, and visited under circumstances by no means favourable, is perhaps in an inferior condition, and no way equal to the two Third Class ones, which, in some respects, and especially in penmanship, are superior to Schools of far higher pretensions.

The four First Class Female Schools are all of them susceptible of improvement; and such, I am happy to say, is taking place in at least one of them. One only of the three Third Class Female Schools has attained mediocrity; the others are decidedly inferior, and the people by continuing such Teachers among them, are suffering the

legitimate consequences of their short-sighted policy.

The School-houses of this Parish are, with about three exceptions, comfortable and suitable buildings. The Trustees pay regular visits to their Schools, and one or more of them generally accompany me in mine.

ALNWICK.—This Parish had at my last visit only three Schools in operation, two taught by men, and one by a semale. Of the sormer, one is French; and from want of books, and perhaps not less from want of energy and skill on the part of the Teacher, has not succeeded well; the other, which is in a new District, and has been but lately opened, already affords reasonable prospect of success. That conducted by the Female Teacher, I have never seen to advantage, and may possibly be in a better state than I can of my own knowledge affirm of it. There are several vacancies, which the people are using their best endeavours to have filled up.

GLOUCESTER.

SAUMAREZ.—In this Parish there is in operation only one School, taught by a French Master, and attended by pupils the majority of whom is French. The house is good and comfortable; and at my last visit, the School, having changed its Teacher, was both as to attendance and management, in a somewhat better state than formerly.

INKERMANN.—There are two Schools in this Parish at the present time; one English, and one partly English and partly French, both conducted by Male Teachers, of the Third and Second Classes respectively. The former has in every way disappointed my expectations. Defects formerly noticed and pointed out, are still unremedied. The children are naturally as talented as any I have ever met with; and it is pitiful to see them taught to prefer, as by the mismanagement of this School they must needs be taught to prefer, dirt and confusion to cleanliness and order. The other School is better every way.

SHIPPEGAN.—In this Parish there are two Schools, one of which is wholly French, the other almost entirely so, and both conducted by French Teachers. Neither has yet attained any degree of success, but one of them has within it the germs of improvement.

CARAQUET.—At my last visit there were four French Schools in this Parish, conducted by Male Teachers of the Third Class. One of these School-houses was built within the year, and though not large, is very neat, clean, and comfortable. The defects of these Schools are the defects of almost all the French Schools in the Northern District; too much time is spent in mere reading, which after all, may be more a matter of necessity than of choice, from the unduly multiplied number of classes, caused by want of uniformity in text-books. Few or none of the children in these

Schools are studying their native tongue grammatically, few know any thing of geography, and their acquaintance is far too slight with even the vulgar elements of writing and arithmetic; though to their credit be it said, some improvement has lately taken place in the last named branches. It is seriously contemplated to erect before long an English School of a superior character in this Parish, with a view of giving an English education to the French population.

New Bandon.-In this Parish are the following Schools:-

- I conducted by a Male Teacher, lately promoted to a 2nd Class.
- 4 " 3rd Class Male Teachers.
- 4 " 3rd Class Female Teachers.

The first of these Schools is on the whole pretty well conducted, though there are deficiencies which should have disappeared since the master's return from the Training School. Three, two taught by men and one by a female, were crowded within the distance of some five miles, and were so hopelessly poor, that I took the responsibility of advising the Trustees to discontinue them, and throw the three districts into two. This suggestion the Trustees at once saw the propriety of, and acted on it; and it is to be hoped that the people by mutual forbearance will soon permit the Department to furnish them with two well qualified Teachers. Of the remaining five, one is but poorly attended, and another perhaps is superfluous; the three others are properly located, and, all things considered, not ill-conducted, though one of them lacks energy on the part of the master. One of these houses, always small, and now old and decayed, is shortly to be replaced by a building which will be both ornamental and useful.

BATHURST.—The Schools of this Parish at my last visit were as follows:—

- 3 conducted by 3rd Class Male Teachers.
- a 2nd Class Female Teacher.
- 5 " 3rd Class Female Teachers.

Of the first three, one has been only a short time in charge of its present Teacher, who is making a fair beginning. The other two, whether as regards the houses with their appurtenances, or the Teachers with their qualifications, are sad evidences of how much the people have yet to learn in the matter of their children's education. One of these has been closed, never, I trust, to be re-opened in the same house or by the same Teacher; the other has lately been put in charge of a man who will bring things into better shape. Of the six Schools taught by females, two only, (and those of the third class) are tolerably well conducted. Several vacancies still exist; that in the Village of Bathurst, where there is a new and excellent School-house, will soon I trust be provided with a well qualified Teacher. There are no less than seven School-houses in this Parish very ill-adapted for tuition purposes, and should be repaired, where repairs will answer the end, or replaced by new and more commodious buildings.

Berrsford.—There are three Schools in this Parish in charge of Masters of the Third Class, one of whom was lately absent attending the Training School. That in the Dunlop Settlement is affording gratifying tokens of improvement; the third is still inferior. Besides these, there are five Schools taught by females of the Third Class. Only one of these is English, the others French or nearly so. The English School, though not numerously attended, is pretty well conducted; only one of the others is in an average state.

RESTIGOUCHE.

This County, with all the energy and intelligence of its inhabitants, and notwith-standing the advances it has of late years made in almost every branch of practicable industry, has never yet put forth an earnest and hearty effort to elevate the character and condition of the Common School. Time was when the people could not build good School-houses and maintain good Teachers, and now they don't, though improved circumstances have given them the power. Campbellton is happy in the possession of its Superior School, and so is and will be Dalhousie while its Grammar School is conducted by its present excellent Teacher; but when I have said this, and made an honorable

honorable exception in favour of three or four of its common Schools, I have said all I can say favourably of the state of education in this otherwise pattern County. Its Schools have not kept pace with its other improvements. It has the credit of having the best roads in the Province; then let it smooth a little the way to learning.

During the Term there have been altogether only fifteen Schools in operation in this County, distributed among the different Parishes as follow:—

ADDINGTON.—In this Parish the Superior School at Campbellton is the only School at present in operation. A new house is in contemplation for this institution, and an extensive and valuable addition is just about to be made to its Library. It is still in charge of its able Teacher Mr. Crocket. Two Districts, with the only really good public School-houses in the County, have been vacant for a considerable time; but efforts are being made to have them filled up.

Dalhousie.—This Parish has six Schools, three of which are taught by men, and three by semales, all of the Third Class. Of the former, one would be better were the Teacher more favourably circumstanced as regards the house and other appliances; the two others are every way inserior. One of the Female Schools was conducted by a well educated Teacher, but is discontinued. Another was inserior, and from its situation could not well be otherwise. It too has been discontinued, and but little loss would accrue to the district were the third to follow its example.

Colborne.—There are three Schools in this Parish, one of which is on Heron Island, and is by no means what it should be, considering the liberal allowance made to it from the public chest. Along with the Trustees I have done what I could to induce the people to replace the present decayed and comfortless house by a new one; but I have nothing better to record than good intentions. The others are inferior and shew no signs of improvement.

DURHAM.—This Parish has five Schools conducted by Male Teachers of the Third Class. Two of these Schools continue to give pretty general satisfaction; the others, from various causes, are not so prosperous.

This statement is given in addition to the usual statistics, as indicating an increasing desire among the young people of the Province to profit by the means of improvement afforded by the Institution. This desire for improvement should be met by corresponding efforts to render the Establishment as efficient as possible, and such as the country requires.

The right training of Teachers for the instruction of the youth of the Province is a work of great importance, and is generally regarded as such by those who feel an

interest in the progress of Education.

The late Superintendent of Public Schools in Boston, in his first Quarterly Report for 1857, remarks—"I have acted under the conviction that the quantity and quality of education imparted in School, depend upon the character and qualifications of

Teachers, more than upon all other means and appliances combined."

And further, p. 34—"I regard it as a fixed fact, as certain as any thing that can be known, that all our Primary Schools can be brought up to the requisite standard of excellence only by insisting upon it as a thing indispensable, that every Teacher either before or after entering the service, shall be properly trained and instructed in the art of keeping a Primary School. The Teacher makes the School; it is training that makes the Teacher."

There is no deficiency of natural talent amongst the youth of this country, and many possess "aptness to teach," and the faculty of acquiring knowledge, in a remarkable degree; and with proper training, there would not be wanting an ample supply of valuable Teachers for the rising generation, and for successive generations, who would be an honour and a blessing to their country.

The year is divided into four Terms of twelve weeks each.

The Spring Term commences January 17.

Summer " " April 11.

Autum-1 " " August 1.

Winter " " October 24

The examinations of Teachers and Candidates for Licences, are held in the last week of each Term.

At present, the period of attendance embraces but a single Term; and as in numerous instances the previous education has been defective, and barely sufficient to secure admission, the time of the pupil Teachers is chiefly spent in endeavouring to increase their knowledge of the branches required by Law to be taught in their Schools, that they may be able to show on examination such a degree of proficiency as will entitle them to receive a First or Second Class Licence.

This is in a great measure a departure from the original design of the Training School, the leading object of which is to give instruction in the art of teaching—to qualify Teachers for arranging and instructing Parish Schools in the best manner, and may be remedied to some extent, by requiring a higher standard of qualification on admission; thus rendering it necessary for young persons desirous of becoming Teachers, to make suitable preparation before seeking admission into the Training School.

The Superior Schools, intended by a wise provision of the new School Law, to be established in the several Parishes throughout the Province, and already in operation in many places, are designed to supply this kind of instruction. Still, after entrance, much would require to be done for the intellectual improvement of many of the pupil Teachers, before they could be induced, without reluctance, to devote much of their

time to teaching. To have a thorough knowledge of the branches to be taught, which is indispensable to every good Teacher, is the chief aim of these young persons; and it has been deemed advisable for the present, to yield somewhat to the necessity of the case, without however entirely neglecting the practical cultivation of the art of teaching.

The pupil Teachers in the Male Department are required to instruct, in turn, Classes

in the Model School, and also to conduct the daily exercises in their own room.

The Female Department occupies a separate Building at a short distance, in which there is not sufficient School-room accommodation for a Model School. As a substitute, the pupil Teachers themselves, under the eye of their Teacher, conduct portions of the daily exercises, thus developing their capacity for imparting instruction.

The branches taught are-Spelling, Reading, Etymology, Writing from dictation, English Grammar; Geography, Mathematical, Physical, and Political; Use of the Globes, History, Book Keeping, Algebra, Geometry, Mensuration, Trigonometry, Land Surveying, and Navigation; also, weekly Lessons in Vocal Music, and weekly Compositions on various subjects connected with the theory and practice of teaching.

The order in which these branches are usually pursued, may be seen by the follow-

ing general

Thursday-Dictation and Spelling, Geography, Grammar, Object Lesson, Descriptive letter, History, Derivation, Parsing.

Friday-Dictation and Spelling, Geography, Grammar, Arithmetic, Compositions or Recitations, History, Parsing.

Afternoon.

Monday, Arithmetic and Vocal Music; Tuesday, Reading and Parsing; Wednesday, Geography; Thursday, History and Vocal Music; Friday, Reading and Spelling.

It sometimes happens that pupils are admitted who prove indolent or indifferent; such rarely become good Teachers, and are a serious drawback to the prosperity of the School. It is desirable that such pupils should be given to understand that they cannot be permitted to remain, unless they show a satisfactory degree of diligence and improvement.

There is belonging to the School a small Reference Library, selected by Mr. Duval, containing about 75 Volumes, among which are 12 Vols. of the Encyclopedia Americana; Hume's History of England, 5 Vols.; Macaulay's do. 1 Vol.; Robertson's Works; Johnston's Notes on North America, 2 Vols.; Lardner's Lectures on

Science

Science and Art, 2 Vols.; Roget's Animal and Vegetable Physiology, 2 Vols.; Trimmer's Geology and Mineralogy, 2 Vols.; Arnott's Physics; Fowler's English Language; Worcester's Dictionary; Webster's do. unabridged; Leverett's Latin Lexicon; Liddell and Scott's Greek and English Lexicon; Smith's Classical Dictionary; Whately's Logic; Whately's Rhetoric; Barnard's School Architecture; Page's Theory and Practice of Teaching, with several other excellent works; and Fowle's Teachers' Institute, Mahew on Popular Education, Stow's Training System, and Holbrook's Normal, added during this year.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of a large and beautiful Map of the United States

from the Honorable the Provincial Secretary.

In the beginning of the year arrangements were made for the instruction of the Model School on the plan of Stow's "Training System," but from various causes it was found necessary to return to the methods by which the School had previously been conducted. Physical exercises are retained.

Miss Duval, Teacher in the Female Department, continues to perform her duties in

a manner creditable to herself and beneficial to the Institution.

I am far from believing that the Training School has arrived at a state to produce the best results, but by faithful and diligent labour on the part of the Instructors, aided by the countenance and support of the Honorable Board of Education, it may by successive improvements be made to contribute largely to the extension of the blessings of sound education throughout the Province.

All necessary comforts are extended to the unfortunate inmates, whilst strict economy is used in the management of the Institution. The comparative average cost on the aggregate expenditure for Maintenance for Patients appears for the year 1859 to be £32 18 6, for 1858, £82 12 4, for 1857, £35 11 11, for 1856, £33 11s., for 1855, £34 12 9, for 1854, £33 15s.

The Commissioners have much satisfaction in reporting to Your Excellency, that Fencing and other works, so much required, have been materially improved and

advanced this year, under the direction of the Board of Works.

The Commissioners beg to state, that they are negotiating with the Carleton Water Company for a full supply of Water for all purposes connected with the Asylum, and as soon as the Spring opens will commence operations for the introduction of the same.

The Commissioners continue desirous that an effective plan for warming the Institution should be attained, whereby the safety of the buildings and comfort of the

Patients may be better secured; the present mode of heating being by open grates and close wood stoves, to which of necessity the Patients have access.

The Commissioners would mention, that the Holdings of the parties on the shore line of the Asylum grounds, have been purchased and possession taken by the Commissioners, with the exception of the claims of one party, which is in the hands of the Honorable the Attorney General.

The improvements in the ornamental Grounds and the Farm continue to have particular attention, affording healthy employment to a large number of Patients, and the Commissioners consider that extension of grounds for agricultural purposes would be advantageous, and should be secured if practicable.

The Commissioners have much satisfaction in reporting the progressive serviceable state of the Institution, and the high character it is obtaining for the relief of the Insane

under the able and practical superintendence of Dr. Waddell.

They would urgently submit for the consideration of the Executive, the appropriation of a sufficient sum to erect, complete, and fiurnish the North Wing, according to the original plan, the necessity of which they have in their previous Reports fully brought under the consideration of Your Excellency.

The Commissioners mention with pleasure the continued gratuitous services of the Reverend William Scovil to the spiritual wants of the unfortunate inmates of the

Institution.

REPORT OF THE MEDICAL SUPERINTENDENT.

At the date of last Report, 31st October, 1858, there remained on the Record one hundred and fifty five—Men, eighty eight; Women, sixty seven. Since that time there have been admitted seventy nine—Men, fifty four; Women, twenty five; making a total under treatment in the year, two hundred and thirty four—Men, one hundred and forty two; Women, ninety two.

During the year, 1859—Men, forty three; Women, sixteen, have been discharged; and twenty one—Men, ten; Women, eleven, have died. Of those discharged, twenty nine—Men, twenty; Women, nine, recovered; eight—seven Men and one Woman, much improved; eighteen—Men, thirteen; Women, five, improved; four—three Men and one Woman, unimproved.

No epidemic of any kind has prevailed in the Institution since last Report. Mortality in all cases has occurred from those ordinary influences which operate on the chronic insane, and which ultimately exhausts their vital powers, and under which they gradually sank.

There now remain on the Record one hundred and fifty four—Men, eighty nine; Women, sixty five. Of these, two—one Man and one Woman, are recovered; fifty one—Men, thirty one; Women, twenty, are improved; one hundred and one—Men, fifty seven; Women, forty four, are unimproved.

The average is one hundred and sixty one—Men, ninety three; Women, sixty eight. The greatest number at any one time, (31st March,) one hundred and sixty nine—Men, ninety eight; Women, seventy one. The smallest number at any one time, (31st October,) one hundred and fifty four—Men, eighty nine; Women, sixty five.

With two exceptions, one of each sex, Nova Scotia patients have been discharged, and still it will be seen from the statistics, that the number of inmates is within one of being as high as it was a year ago. The average, too, has risen from last year, one hundred and fifty four, to one hundred and sixty one this year, shewing a steady and increasing demand for admission.

For many years in my Annual Report, allusion has been made to the unfinished state of the Institution,—the evils consequent upon overcrowding,—the want of proper facilities for classifying,—the dangerous and imperfect heating arrangements, &c., &c., and I have appealed to the Provincial Authorities on the grounds of economy in some cases, and humanity in others, for these essential additions and improvements. Year after year, you have fully endorsed my views, and urged their being carried into effect; and the Government Commissioners appointed in 1857, to enquire into the management and requirements of the Institution, and who reported in March, 1858, while of the former, they write in terms of commendation, of the latter, they use very strong language, urging the necessity of completing the building, and furnishing us with increased facilities for carrying on the great work committed to our care.

On this subject, at this time, I intend to say nothing, simply referring to previous Reports, and earnestly asking attention to the figures comprising the statistics of the present year, trusting that the conclusion at which they point, may forcibly, if not eloquently, press our claims.

Circumstances, in the course of carrying on some improvements in the rear of the building, have rendered it necessary to remove the outside water closets. Owing to the deficient supply of water running through the sewers inside the building, these water closets were considered indispensable, now, that they are removed, it affords an additional argument, by which, to urge the immediate introduction of water from the Carleton Water Works.

An Act of the Legislature, passed at its last sitting, relieves you from the trouble and responsibility of superintending the extension of buildings, repairs of buildings, erection of fences, &c. &c., and places this department under the control of the Provincial Board of Works. They have assumed their functions, and commenced operations, and the work done by their instructions, will form the subject of report to the Chief Commissioner of that Board, and to that Report I refer you for particulars. But in parting with you in this branch of labour, I desire to record my grateful appreciation of the cordial support you have at all times given me, in endeavouring to push forward much needed extensions and improvements, and for the aid you have invariably afforded me, to the utmost of the means at your disposal, successfully to contend with the difficulties, incident to a condition of things, that you had not the power to remove.

The new arrangement may be considered a good one. The members of the Board of Works are at the same time Members of the Government, thus we come more directly in communication with the Executive. If the Board of Works are convinced

of the necessity or propriety of certain expenditures, the Government receive their information and impressions from their own Members, and the views they may urge are likely to be adopted and acted upon. Hence, we may anticipate much assistance from the Board of Works. If we succeed in securing the attention of the Chief Commissioner to our wants, and he regard them from the humane aspect of the question, I feel assured that the new wing will be commenced without much delay. In this, I have an earnest, in the active and liberal manner in which he has commenced im-

provements now in progress.

Throughout the Province, and among all classes, there is evidently a steadily increasing confidence in the idea that the Asylum is the proper place for managing their friends when they happen to be overtaken with mental disease, and as a natural result from such a conclusion, almost every case requiring treatment, is immediately committed to our care; occasionally, however, valuable time is lost in the first of the attack, by unsuccessful experiments at home. I would desire it to be undersood by every person, and seriously considered too, that the chances of recovery are greatly increased by right treatment at first, and when patients are to be sent at all, it should be done with the least possible delay. Relatives, from a variety of considerations, and these considerations differ in different families, do not always, at once, send their friends to a Hospital, where the means of proper treatment should be provided, but keep them at home, where they can have no suitable arrangements for their management, till, after fruitless efforts to accomplish on object quite beyond their power, and after disturbing domestic comfort, and submitting to great inconvenience and loss, finally conclude to send their friends to a Hospital as a dernier resort, and, claim great credit for keeping them so long. This is reversing the order of things. The Hospital should have the first opportunity of doing what can be done; if it fail, then the friends might very properly perhaps make an effort to provide for them in some other way.

On the subject of treatment, I may say that, as a general rule, insanity depends upon an atonic condition of the system, and in many of these cases there is great excitement, and if treatment is based on the erroneous idea, (as it sometimes is) that by lowering the system the excitement will cease, incalculable mischief may be done. Every step in such a course increases the violence of the symptoms, and if persisted in, the patient will either sink from exhaustion in the acute stage, or, if he possess vital powers sufficient to resist the evil effect of such treatment, it is in many cases but to decline into a state of hopeless imhecility. Insane persons, therefore, should be subject to the best treatment at the earliest moment after the disease is distinctly

declared.

Occasionally insane persons are found in our vicinity having no friends here, and under circumstances leading to the suspicion that they may have been sent from beyond the bounds of the Province by parties interested in getting rid of a burden. This question has now assumed an importance requiring legislative enactment to check the imposition.

Three such persons entail an annual tax upon the revenues of the Province of at least £100 per annum, as long as they live, and from the best judgment that I can

form, there are now six of that class on the Record.

The garden and ornamental grounds are much improved during the past year, and as plans are developed, the improvement will from time to time become still more apparent.

The Rev. Mr. Scovil has discharged the duties of Chaplain, as usual, in his very obliging manner, and in that way promoted the comfort and best interests of the

inmates.

Doctor Henry Ward, of Carleton, has continued to assist me at all times when required, and has laid both the Institution and myself under many obligations.

The "Christian Visitor," "Church Witness," "Religious Intelligencer," "Courier," and Halifax "Presbyterian Witness," have been kindly and gratuitously continued.

The "Christian Messenger," through the Editor, Mr. Seldon, and the first and second volumes of the "Journal of Education and Agriculture," through the Rev. Dr. Forrester, of the Normal School, Truro, Nova Scotia, have been added.

To all the parties interested in these valuable journals, I tender grateful thanks.

To Miss Dix, also, I desire to express acknowledgments for a few pictures, presented by her to amuse the patients, and also to the Brussels Street Juvenile Missionary Society, for a lot of small papers, such as "The Family Casket," "The Child's Paper," &c., &c., containing a kind of reading much enjoyed by some of the patients.

Miss Dix, of the United States, whose philanthropic interest in the insane is so well and so widely known, visited the Asylum in September last. She spent a few days with us, exhibiting the liveliest interest in everything concerning the prosperity of the Institution, and the comfort of the inmates, while by kind words and womanly sym-

pathy, she did much to encourage us in our work.

I am now completing my tenth year's official connexion with this Institution. I do not intend to recapitulate what has been accomplished in that time, referring all who may take an interest in the subject to our annual returns, and leave it for others to judge of results. One remark, however, may be permitted, such as they are, these results have been attended by an amount, and peculiar kind of labour, attended by anxiety and perplexity, of which, officers directing the affairs of a fully developed and fully equipped similar Institution, cannot be supposed to know anything. For ten years of the most vigorous portion of my life, I have been working on in the midst of indescribable difficulties, ever hoping that they would soon be removed, and notwithstanding that my hopes have been year after year deferred, still my sanguine nature prompts me to believe that they shall yet be realized, in seeing the Institution complete and adapted to the wants of the Province.

If it happen that I should be disappointed in my expectations, and that the Government still delay the completion of the building, then it will be absolutely necessary to limit the numbers to be received, for nothing can be more unreasonable, than that an unlimited number must be continued to be crowded into a space becoming every year

relatively less and less.

Five years ago, when cholera prevailed in this neighbourhood, I called attention to the horrors that would likely ensue from the introduction of that epidemic among our crowded inmates. Hitherto we have escaped; now, small pox is in the City and vicinity, and if that loathsome contagious disease were admitted into our midst, I may venture to predict that the result would be fearful indeed. But it should not be forgotten, that in over-crowding, we violate the laws of nature which apply to the preservation of health, and it is only reasonable to anticipate that these laws will be vindicated.

Deeply grateful to a merciful Providence for past preservation, and hoping in His goodness for continued favours, truly thankful to the Commissioners, their Secretary, and all others engaged with me in the conduct of the business of the year, for sympathy under domestic affliction, and for assistance in the discharge of official duty, I respectfully submit my Annual Report.

LAZARETTO.

Report from the Monorable John Davidson for the Year 1859.

Miramichi, November 11th, 1859.

Sir,-I beg leave to Report, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that since my Report of the 8th November last, on the subject of the Tracadie Lazaretto, two of the patients have died, three new cases have been admitted, and there are now remaining in Hospital, twenty, viz. eleven Males and nine Females, shewing an increase of one since November last. There is no material change connected with those unfortunate people; new cases occasionally appear, and the disease appears to be confined almost exclusively to Tracadie and its vicinity. Since the first establishment of the Lazaretto, in the year 1844, only three cases were received from other places, one Stewart and his two nephews Tingley's, from the North West Branch of Miramichi River. They were of Scotch descent, and in no way connected The Board have now little or no trouble in inducing infected persons to come to the Hospital. The arrangements and buildings are comparatively comfortable, and the patients appear to be satisfied and resigned to their fate. The Accounts with vouchers have been sent to the Auditor General, shewing an expenditure during the past year of £614 18 61. This expenditure includes a stock of provisions and other necessaries which will last until next Spring, except firewood, beef, and some other articles contracted for on the 3rd inst., and it will require about £650 to meet the expenses of the current year, including the balance in my hands and the salary of the Medical Officer.

MARINE HOSPITAL.

Annual Report on Marine Mospital, saint John, 1859.

To His Excellency The Hon. John Henry Thomas Manners-Sutton, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Commissioners of the (Kent) Provincial Marine Hospital, at the Port of Saint John, beg leave to present their Annual Report of the Hospitals under their charge, and the specific Returns of the Medical Officers, for the year ending 31st December 1859.

The expenditure for the Kent Hospital and for the Pest House on Partridge Island, for the year ending 31st October 1859, was nine hundred and seventy four pounds ten shillings and ten pence, (£974 10 10,) and the balance due Commissioners 31st October 1858, was one hundred and ninety one pounds and nine pence, (£191 0 9.)

The Commissioners have received from the Sick and Disabled Seamen's Fund for the year, the sum of one thousand pounds, and the balance due Commissioners 31st October 1859, was one hundred and sixty five pounds eleven shillings and seven pence, (£165 11 7.)

At the Kent Hospital there were remaining on the 1st January 1859, twenty one patients under treatment; two hundred and thirty five new cases were admitted, making

two hundred and fifty six pullants for the year ending 31st December 1859.

Of this number, two hundred and twenty six were discharged cured, two cases with small pox were sent to the Pest House on Partridge Island, and one case of small pox was admitted in the City Hospital on 23rd December, which from the inclemency of the 109

the weather, could not be sent to the Pest House. Nine deserted, three died, and sixteen remain under treatment.

Particular reference is made in the Medical Officer's Returns to the nature of the

respective diseases.

The comparative admissions in the Kent Hospital for the year 1857, were one hundred and eighty five, and seven deaths; for the year 1858, were one hundred and seventy seven, and five deaths; for the year 1859, were two hundred and fifty six, and three deaths.

At the Pest House on Partridge Island only three Seamen were admitted, two from the Kent Hospital, and one from a coaster with small pox, all of whom were discharged cured, and it is a subject of congratulation that no sick seamen were landed by Shipping from foreign ports; this disease was brought here by one of the western Steamers, over which our Medical Officer at Partridge Island had no control, she not being then subject to his inspection at Quarantine.

The comparative admissions in the Pest House in the year 1857 were eight, and one death, in the year 1858 were five, and one death, in the year 1859 were three, no

deaths.

The Commissioners continue well satisfied that the Hospitals under their charge are conducted by the Medical Officers and Steward in an efficient manner, and that the Seamen have all the comfort and proper treatment that can be provided for them, compatible with the restricted accommodation available in the present Building, which they beg to state is wholly unfit to sustain the large and increasing commerce of this Port; and a more commodious Hospital is required, where proper classification of disease, separation of disease from casualty, and of convalescent from invalid can be accomplished, which cannot be done in the present Building where sick and well, disease and casualty, are all crowded in the same apartments.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

Annual Report of Commissioners of Board of Meulth, St. John, 1859.

To His Excellency The Honorable John Henry Thomas Munners-Sutton, Lieutenard Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Board of Health for the City and County of Saint John respectfully submit for Your Excellency's consideration the following Report:—

During the month of May last, a passenger infected with Small Pox came in the Steamer from Boston to Saint John. The Board received no official information of this introduction of the disease; after about ten days, it accidentally heard the rumour, ascertained the truth, and adopted the means within its power to prevent as much as possible the extension of the pestilence.

Affected persons were either removed immediately to the Quarantine Station; or, in cases in which removal was inexpedient, such parties were placed under surveillance to prevent intercourse, and white flags with the inscription "Small Pox" on them, pendent from the windows of their rooms, and placards on their houses, notified the public of the existence of small pox in them, and also of the penalty to which intrusive offenders would be liable; cleanliness and ventilation were enforced, and fumigations adopted in every house before the flag was removed.

The office of the Board of Health has been opened twice a week for free and public vaccination, and the Physician employed has vaccinated 920 individuals; and owing to the present alarm respecting small pox, the applicants at the office for vaccination daily increases in number. The Physician has also furnished Vaccine Lymph, free of charge, to persons requiring it in different parts of the Province.

Nothwithstanding the preventive efforts of the Board, 90 individuals have been attacked with the disease in the City and its vicinity since May last, of whom 27 were persuaded to go to Partridge Island. The dread of being sent to the Island has induced many to conceal the outbreak of the pestilence, and has consequently operated unfavourably against the exertions of the Board, by generating unsuspected "plague-spots" for the spread of the disease. The Board does not feel warranted to coerce removal, as it would increase the evil of concealment, and in some instances endanger the life of the patient, especially during this inclement season of the year. And moreover the Board would respectfully observe that coerced removal adopted invariably would excite public dissatisfaction and resistance.

The mortality of the pestilence has been comparatively small, as there were only 9 deaths among the 90 patients, being less than 9 per cent.; whereas in similar attacks of natural small pox, the statistical percentage has been from 30 to 35; hence it would appear that the means adopted have lessened the mortality of the disease. And we may reasonably infer that the spread of the disease has been restricted, inasmuch

as 90 cases in 6 months out of a population of 35,000 is a small number.

The Board of Health would respectfully refer to its opinions and suggestions fully expressed in its former Reports relative to the establishment of a Provincial Hospital. Each succeeding year, and the recent outbreak of small pox in this City, furnish additional evidence of the urgent necessity for one. And if proof were wanting, it may be found in the fact, that very recently persons from the country have been found wandering about the streets labouring under small pox, unable to procure an asylum of any kind.

Hospitals are indexes of public philanthropy, public progress, and civilization, and of public regard for public health and safety. Those Hospitals which are open for the reception of patients generally, and suffering under every variety of disease and accident, certainly prefer a paramount claim for governmental, legislative, and social consideration and support, inasmuch as they receive the largest proportion of human sufferers, and restore to society the largest proportion of useful, important, and valuable operatives. In proof of the assertion, it may be observed that the Hospitals in London contribute medical aid to nearly 200,000 individuals yearly.

Whatever may be the advance of our Province in other departments of improvement, it must be confessed that progress is not in the right way for the relief of the diseased, if our incompatible compound of "Hospital and Almshouse" is the "metre"

and indication of it.

The Board therefore begs leave to recapitulate some of its former remarks upon this subject, shewing that the Province is singularly destitute of a General Hospital with suitable accommodations and conveniences for patients suffering under diseases or accidents:-that curable diseases have occasionally terminated fatally in consequence thereof: - that the union of an Almshouse and Hospital is an incongruity, and that the injurious and frequently fatal consequences of it were unmistakably apparent during the ravages of Emigrant fever in 1847:—that the population of Saint John, the emporium of the Province, and its commercial intercourse with every part of it, and with foreign countries, imply the want of a Public Hospital, and the justice of Provincial assistance towards the erection and establishment of one:- that £1,800 had been generously offered by a few gentlemen to encourage the undertaking:—that the history of Hospitals demonstrates that success has generally followed the benevolent determination to succeed:—that a poll-tax would be an equitable measure, and that it would bear lightly upon those who would be principally benefited by it:-that Hospitals in other countries have been aided by liberal donations and bequests, and that we may reasonably anticipate similar good feeling and charitableness:—that the cost of a suitable Hospital would be about £10,000, and that uniting the Marine Hospital with the proposed establishment would save an outlay of £2,000 or £3,000 for the purchase of grounds, and a large expenditure for Hospital contingencies:-

and that Hospitals with modern improvements and government have promoted the comfort and recovery of the sick, and the progress of medical science.

It appears that one twelfth of the population of London receives medical aid through the Hospitals in that City: an equal proportion in Saint John would amount to about

3,000, who appeal for relief.

The inclement season of the year; the distance of the Quarantine Station from the City, and the difficulty of transport, have made it imperative to discontinue sending patients to the Island: consequently the Board feels called upon to procure a house in the City for a temporary Hospital: diligent search has been made for a suitable building for that purpose, but without success, as persons owning houses fear the depreciation of their property consequent upon its use as a Hospital.

EMIGRATION.

Annual Report of the Emigration Officer for 1859,

(Copy)

Government Emigration Office, St. John, Feb. 2, 1860.

Sin,—I have the honor to submit for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, my annual Report on the Immigration to the Province for the Year 1859.

During the past season fourteen vessels have arrived at the Port of Saint John bringing passengers: two only of this number have come under the restrictions of the Imperial Passengers' Act. Two hundred and forty one passengers were landed at Saint John, but I have not been able to ascertain the numbers at the Out-Ports.

By Messieurs Page, Richardson & Co's. line of Liverpool and Boston Packets, twenty eight passengers arrived. These Packets, which are of a superior class, sail from Liverpool for Boston every fortnight, and passengers for New Brunswick receive tickets for their conveyance to Saint John and arrive here by the Boston Steamers.

The class of Immigrants who were landed in the Province were chiefly from the farming districts, and as a large portion of them were agricultural laborers, they found remunerative employment immediately on their arrival. I regret to add, however, that the supply of this description of labor was not sufficient to meet the demand. In the immigration of the past season a very encouraging feature is to be remarked, namely, that it was composed of young, vigorous, and healthy persons, who invariably make good settlers. The passengers generally seemed satisfied with the treatment they received, and the quantity and quality of the provisions provided for them while on shipboard. I regret, however, to state, that I was compelled to report to Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioner at Galway, that proper attention had not been shewn to cleanliness by the Master and officers of the Ship "Hiawatha." It is nevertheless gratifying to add that this is the only instance where I have had occasion to call the attention of Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners to a neglect of duty on the part of the Commanders of ships landing passengers in the Province.

A number of the Immigrants by the "Hiawatha" having paid their passages to Boston and New York, were forwarded thither by the Master of the ship, but with this exception I am satisfied that all of this year's immigration is still in the Province.

A number of families arrived and settled in various sections of the country who had emigrated several years since to the Western States of America. Several of these persons stated their reasons for leaving to be the inadequacy of the Laws in the United States, and further, that the extreme heats of Summer had told unfavorably on their constitutions.

The quantity of land which has been applied for and taken up under the Labour Act has been very large, and the breadth that will be brought under cultivation during the coming season will furnish strong and conclusive proof of the increased interest that is taken in the cultivation of the soil; affording to all who choose to follow it with energy and industry, the surest means of a comfortable livelihood and a freedom from the embarrassments of city life consequent upon the fluctuations of commerce.

Fortunately for this Province the class of immigrants to which it offers but little encouragement do not come here in numbers worth naming. I allude to those who have no business or fixed calling—lawyers, clerks, merchants, and all who are unaccustomed to labour, as well as to those persons who in the old country have excelled in particular branches of mechanics, and are wholly unfitted for any other; and others whose sedentary occupations have weakened their constitutions and unfitted them for the work required here. Of clerks and professional men there need be no fear of a scarcity, the native growth being always equal to the demand. But at the same time it must not be forgotten that New Brunswick offers a good field to such as are possessed of capital, and who can combine industry and experience in the employment of it. The strong and hardy immigrant, however, has nothing to fear even if he should have no resources to fall back on. Every man who can follow the plough, or use the hoe and axe, will meet with ready employment and good wages.

I have found it difficult to answer the many inquiries addressed to me in the correspondence which I have to keep up with persons in the old country proposing to emigrate and seeking advice; and in order the more efficiently to furnish the information sought for, I have prepared a Circular which comprises both advice and information to intending Emigrants, and I have every reason to hope that its contents in a general way, will furnish such knowledge of New Brunswick as will be acceptable, and aid materially in affording correct views to those who are intending to emigrate

to this country.

Another year's experience has more fully impressed me with the advantages that will accrue by carrying out the suggestions which I had the honor to offer for His Excellency's consideration last year; namely, the opening up by Roads of eligible tracts of good land, and the granting of alternate lots under the provisions of the Labour Act to actual settlers exclusively, the value of the remaining lots will thus be greatly enhanced and will suffice for all the cost attending the opening of such Roads.

the previous year of £1,284 14s.

The income of the Fiscal Years 1858-9 has produced sufficient to provide for the ordinary expenses of the nine Light House Stations, also £318 10 4 for extras for those Stations, and building, completing and lighting on the 20th October last, a new Light Station at Grindstone Island; also building a Light Tower and Keeper's House at the "Swallow's Tail" on the Island of Grand Manan; leaving a balance of £623 12s. 11d. of income over expenditure, which being added to the rest or balance of the Fund of 31st October 1858, makes it £6,686 15 4 on the 31st October 1859.

The extra expenditure of the past year, as detailed in the foregoing Abstract, was required for the following purposes, viz:—

On the Iron Bell Buoy for a chain and auchor, the old chain having parted, and neither chain nor anchor could be recovered; bringing the Buoy into the Harbour, fitting and painting, and replacing it at the former station, £84 13 9.

Amount extra expended at the Quaco Station, was for a new deck on the Light

Tower outside of the Lantern, and coppering the same, £49 16 10.

Amount expended at the Gannet Rock Station, was for new water barrels and painting new water butts, and bricks for repairing chimney in the Keeper's house, £20 15 6.

Amount expended at the Cape Enrage Station, was for glazing and painting the Lantern, £9 7 3.

Amount expended at the Saint Andrews Station, was for repairs to the Light Tower and Keeper's House, and painting both, £53 17s. The Wharf or Block on which this Light House is placed, will require some repairs the ensuing Summer.

The Gas Light at Partridge Island has been furnished at a small reduction on the previous year, consequently it is within the cost of the oil light, and as such, we recommend the continuance of it.

The estimate of expenditure for the support and maintenance of the nine Stations in the Bay of Fundy, belonging to this Province, for the current year, is as follows:—

The different Light House Stations were all visited and examined by Mr. Woodward during the season, and found in good order, the Keepers and Assistants discharging their various duties satisfactorily.

A Statement of the dimensions and calculated strength of, and the effect of the temperature upon the Bridge at Grand Falls, that fell on the 18th of December, 1858.

I make this statement because I think there have been much misapprehension and some incorrect statements about the Bridge and the principles of its construction.

It ought to be borne in mind that in the above calculations the weight allowed was

double the amount that was ever likely to be on the Bridge at one time.

As regards the strength of the Western Truss-work, it was calculated to carry itself and load one third the length of the span, without the support of the two intermediate posts; and the posts which were placed at one third the distance from each end of the Bridge, were prevented from rising or falling by the diagonal bars at the centre of the Bridge.

The section of the chords was more than necessary for the strength of a Truss of the length mentioned, one third the span of the Bridge, but it was needed to resist the compressive strain of the chains. The chains brought their whole horizontal strain against the chords. There was no attempt made, or ever intended to be made, to transmit part of the strain to the anchor chains. The anchor chains were only used to suspend the main chains until the chords were constructed, when the ends of the main chains were fastened to the ends of the chords, and the whole strain was thereby transferred from the anchor chains to the chords. The keys which united the anchor chains to the main chains were withdrawn sufficiently to prevent their coming into play until needed for the support of the main chains, in case the wood work of the Bridge had at any time given way. No attempt whatever was made to leave the strain of the Bridge upon the anchor chains; if the attempt had been made to transfer a part of the strain to the anchor chains, at a low temperature, they must have borne the whole strain, and at a high temperature, when all the parts of the Bridge were expanded, the strains would necessarily have been borne by the chords.

There was not that degree of rigidity in the Bridge which I had expected, and the only alteration, which, after I had completed the Bridge, I thought needed in the plan, was the introduction of posts in the centre, so as to have two sets of diagonal bars extending one quarter the span on each side of the centre, instead of the single set, extending one sixth on each side of the centre.

Before going into a consideration of the exact calculated effects of temperature in altering the relative position of the parts, I wish to state that it cannot be shewn that the alteration that could take place in the shape of the Truss, by the contraction of the chains, would increase the strain on the chains; on the contrary, it would, if anything, have a slightly contrary effect, because the strain is in proportion to the length of the span and the distance between the chains and the truss. The effect of the contraction of the chains is to lift the end posts very little, and the centre post most, drawing the ends of the truss slightly together, and making the truss slightly shorter, while the vertical distance remains the same. For all these movements I had made every necessary provision, by planed cast iron surfaces and sheet lead, to avoid friction. know that they all performed their legitimate functions as intended, as I had to slack off and tighten up the screws that attached the ends of the chains to the wood work to regulate the whole and bring it into adjustment. There would be no extraordinary strain brought upon a six feet truss 194 feet long by raising or lowering it six inches from its normal position; that is to say, if it was framed for five feet of camber, and when raised it was placed with 41 or 51 feet of camber, the joints at the ends of chord timbers would not be strained perceptibly.

The most reliable authorities state the linear extension of White Pine to be for one degree of temperature .0000022685; for 130 degrees the extension would be .0002949; and for the length of the chords, 194 feet, it would be .0572 feet, equal to $\frac{11}{16}$ inch.

The linear extension of Bar Iron for each degree is .00000698; for 130 degrees .0009079; which would give for the length of the chains, 197.92 feet, .18 feet, a fraction over 2½ inches.

The versed sine of the bottom chord of the wood work was five feet. Assuming, for the present, that the contraction of the chains would increase it to 5½ feet, the chord of the arc or span becomes 193.96 feet, shorter by .04 feet, or nearly ½ an inch.

The span is therefore actually reduced by increasing the versed sine of the chord, and by the contraction of the timber, to 193 9028.

The length of the chains having become by contraction 197.74, and the span 193.9 feet, the deflection of the chains is found by calculation $\sqrt[4]{(\frac{19774}{2})^2-(\frac{1919}{2})^2}$ 16.786 feet.

The total rise of the truss, therefore, caused by the reduction of the temperature 130 degrees, is the difference between 17 feet and 16.786 feet, or $2\frac{11}{16}$ inches. It will be seen that this small amount of movement would never produce any injurious effect upon the chains or framing, as every needful precaution had been taken to allow of these movements taking place freely on their several bearings.

It must also be remembered that there was no time from the completion of the Bridge to its fall, that the snow did not lie on the ground, so that the extreme variation

of temperature of 130 degrees could never have taken place.

In conclusion, I can state with truth, that I never performed a piece of work more conscientiously. I did not endeavour to make it pay a great profit. I looked upon it as only a little job that would be a stepping stone to future advancement. I spared no expense to get the best of materials of every kind; my first bargain for bolts was at 31 pence per pound, but when I found I could get a better article at 41 pence, I begged off the first contract and entered into arrangements to get the best at an additional cost, which could not have been less than £25. I may also state that I never had any experience that led me to suppose that iron could be so bad as this has proved to be. The general condemnation of iron chains I can only attribute to unworthy motives or ignorance, as practically, we cannot construct a Bridge of any magnitude unless we depend upon iron. What does the present structure depend upon but iron links, in most respects similar in shape to those that failed in the former Bridge. Moreover they cannot be tested until the structure is considerably advanced towards completion. The loss of the Bridge has in no wise destroyed my confidence in Wrought Iron as a suitable material to use when great strength is required at a very

low temperature; the good iron in the Bridge was strained and bent in every direction, but I only saw four bolts that were broken, and they broke off at the thread as if the ends outside the nuts had been struck sideways; two of them were broken off outside the nuts and the other close to the nuts inside. I found three bars of English refined iron, 4 inches wide by & thick, they were bent edgeways but only broken at the eyes, where poor iron had been welded to them. A har of good wrought iron, 20 feet long, will stretch several inches before breaking, when submitted to a sufficient tensile strain; and that good iron will stretch at a low temperature was proved by the manner in which the iron is bent. I do not consider it a proof that good iron has less tensile strength at low temperatures, because a poor quality of iron breaks more readily by a sudden jar, in extremely cold weather. I do not remember ever having seen iron that broke when used at a low temperature, either in chains or bolts, but what shewed a crystalline fracture. Hara wire is 14 per cent. stronger than annealed wire; so is steel much stronger than iron, yet it is more brittle. Some authorities state that the cohesive power of iron is diminished 1/3000 by every additional degree of heat, I am not aware however, that experiments have been made descending from ordinary temperatures to extreme low ones. As far as I can judge, the best of refined iron is as strong at 30 degrees below zero as it is at 80 above.

I shall have as much or more confidence in iron in the future than I ever had before, because I shall avoid as much as possible using iron in the more important parts of a structure, without first having it tested; but in case I am obliged to use it without being previously tested, the whole structure must be thoroughly proved before I allow

it to go out of my hands.

BANKRUPT LAW COMMISSIONERS' REPORT.

Report of the Commissioners on the Bill relating to Bankruptcy.

To His Excellency The Honorable John Henry Thomas Manners-Sutton, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, Sc. Sc. Sc.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,-

We, the undersigned Commissioners appointed by Your Excellency, in pursuance of a Resolution of the House of Assembly at its last Session, to prepare a Bankruptcy Law, respectfully Report:—

That immediately on receiving intimation of our appointment, on the twentieth of October last, we sent to England to procure copies of the Scotch Sequestration Acts, the English Bankruptcy and Insolvency Laws, and of the Bills introduced at the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, by Lord John Russell and Lord Chelmsford;—availing ourselves of the information to be derived from these, from the Insolvency Laws of Massachusetts, from a Bill recently introduced into the Canadian Legislature, and from other sources, we have prepared a Bill relating to Bankruptcy, which we now beg leave

to submit to Your Excellency.

We have bestowed upon it all the care and consideration which the time allowed us, and which the pressure of other avocations would permit. When we regard its scope and object, however,—when we consider that it embraces within itself a code defining many of the duties and rights of Debtors and Creditors, and affecting, in some degree, all the transactions of Commerce, and that it professes to regulate even the morals of Trade, by relieving and protecting the unfortunate and the innocent, and punishing the fraudulent and the guilty, we cannot hope that it is entirely free from defects. Every measure of the kind which has hitherto been brought forward, even when applied to the circumstances of older countries, where its promoters have had the experience of centuries to guide them, has been found to be susceptible of many improvements. No thoroughly digested Bankrupt Law has ever existed in this Province, and we have laboured under the disadvantage of having to frame one without the opportunity of seeing any of its principles in practical operation and fairly tested.

We think, however, that the Bill which we have now the honor of submitting to Your Excellency, will be found adapted in its general features to the present circumstances and wants of the Province; and if some defects in detail should hereafter develope

themselves, they can easily be remedied by future legislation.

The Act of 1842, we regard as only a temporary measure, which was resorted to to give immediate relief under the pressure of an almost unexampled crisis in the trade of the Province, and which was repealed as soon as the emergency was past. The unfortunate Debtor's Act of 1844, and the Insolvent Law of 1858, were passed under somewhat similar circumstances. The failure of these Acts to give public satisfaction shows the danger of dealing with the subject in periods of great commercial depression, when the unfortunate Debtors for whose relief they are passed, have been reduced not only to a state of irremediable insolvency, but almost to destitution. Bankrupt Laws are not intended to be mere acts of grace. They are not made with a view to exonerate people from the payment of their debts, after they have squandered all their property in fruitless, but perhaps very honest endeavours, to extricate themselves from their difficulties. object is quite the reverse. Their policy is to prevent such a state of things from occuring; to stop the Debtor from wasting his time and means in unavailing efforts to avert a catastrophy which is inevitable, and to secure a fair and equal distribution of his property before it is all gone. These Laws, indeed, do not profess to absolve any man from the moral obligation which he is under to pay his debts. But having regard to an adventitious state of society, induced by the growth of credit and the extension of trade and commerce

commerce, their object is to relieve such persons as, from circumstances which they could not well control, may have become helplessly insolvent. It is prejudicial to the interest of society that any of its members should remain in a position where their exertions are paralized under the weight of responsibilities which they cannot discharge. The design of the Bankrupt Law is to relieve such people, in order that they may resume their different callings, and become again useful members of society.

The difficulties which arose in the administration of the Law, under the Acts to which we have referred, exemplify the futility of partial legislation on this subject. The Bankrupt Laws comprise a system, and like every system it should be complete within itself. They had their origin not in the wants of society at large, but from the peculiar requirements of the commercial element in society. Their policy is in many respects different from that of the Common Law, and they are not administered through the ordinary tribunals of the country. The course of proceeding under them is also different from that pursued in the Common Law Courts, and is regulated entirely by the rules prescribed in the Acts themselves.

Influenced by these considerations, we have endeavoured to prepare a Bill which, if it becomes a Law, will not be a temporary or partial measure, but which may comprise within itself the leading principles of a system, and afford the foundation for any future legislation on the subject, that the various changes in the aspect of trade may hereafter

require.

With a view to perspicuity we have arranged the different Sections of the Bill under certain general heads; and in this arrangement we have endeavoured to preserve as far as possible, the regular sequence of the Bankruptcy proceedings.

1. The first of these relates to the Officers by whom the Law is to be administered;

Commissioners, Official Assignces, their jurisdiction, duties, and fees.

The first Section of the Bill authorizes the appointment of six Commissioners of Bankruptcy, and divides the Province into six Districts, to be subject to their respective jurisdiction.

The second, groups the Counties together to form these Districts. In arranging these Dirtricts, we have had regard to the local position of the different Counties, and we have endeavoured to consult the public convenience as far as we could do so, without requiring the appointment of an unnecessarily large number of Commissioners. Restigouche alone is not as well grouped as we could wish, but from its locality it could not be placed in any other District. This however, we believe is not a matter of much consequence,

for, if we are correctly informed, a Bankruptcy seldom occurs in that County.

The following three Sections prescribe the oath to be administered to the Commissioners, and define their tenure of office and jurisdiction. Considering the responsible offices which the Commissioners will fill, and the very large powers with which it is necessary to invest them, in order to carry out the provisions of this Bill, we think that they should be placed beyond the reach of political or other influence, and we have therefore made their tenure of office to be during good behavior. We have not however deemed it prudent to entrust them with the exercise of an authority so extensive, without any supervision or control. We have therefore given an appeal from their decision to the Supreme Court in Equity; and we have at the same time endeavoured to guard the exercise of such right of appeal against abuse, by subjecting the appellant to costs in the event of his appeal being unsuccessful.

The effect of an adjudication of Bankruptcy is to divest the Bankrupt of his property; and inasmuch as time and an opportunity must be afforded him to contest the adjudication in the event of its being improperly made, it becomes necessary to appoint some person ad interim, to take the care and custody of his property until the adjudication be annulled, or the creditors' Assignce be appointed. The twelfth Section of the Bill for this purpose, requires the Commissioners to appoint official Assignces, who are to be sworn, and to give security for the proper discharge of their duty. These officers are merely the servants or agents of the Commissioner, who may dismiss and replace them at his pleasure. The ten following Sections of the Bill define their various duties.

These officers, the Commissioners, and the official Assignees, comprise the whole machinery which we have thought it necessary to introduce, in order to carry into effect the provisions of the Bill.

Had

Had it been practicable, we would have preferred that these officers should have been paid stated salaries. But the objections to this mode of remunerating them at present, appearing to us insurmountable, we have left the official Assignee to be paid out of the Bankrupt's Estate such an amount as the Commissioner, having reference to the nature of the services done, may order. And by the twenty third Section, and the Schedule therein referred to, a scale of fees is established for the payment of the Commissioners and Solicitors.

2. Under the second head, is considered who are liable to become Bankrupts. The 24th and 25th Sections enumerate the persons who are liable to do, so.

As we have already said, it is not the policy of a proper Bankrupt Law simply to exonerate people from payment of their just debts. Whenever a man by proper exertions, can extricate himself from his difficulties, and discharge his liabilities, he ought to do so.

And nothing but extravagance, folly, or fraud, can place the farmer, or the official, or professional man, in a state of hopeless insolvency. We have not thought it expedient therefore to include these amongst the class of people who may have the benefit of the Bankrupt Law.

3. The twenty sixth and five following Sections define the acts which will constitute a person a Bankrupt. We think that, having regard to the object of the Bill, any trader who shall have committed any of the acts enumerated in these Sections, may be regarded as inextricably involved, and it should be in the power of the creditors to proceed at once to procure a distribution of his property before it is lost, or squandered in litigation.

The 26th Section specifies generally the acts of Bankruptcy to be as follows:—Whenever a Trader is arrested on Mesne Process, and does not give bail on or before the return day of the Process; or when he shall abscond to escape such arrest; or be imprisoned or confined on the limits of a Gaol for more than thirty days; or escape from such imprisonment, or depart from the Province, or remain concealed therein, to avoid being served with Process, or with intent to defraud his creditors; or who shall make any fraudulent conveyance or gift of any of his lands, goods or credits, or evidences of debt; or fraudulently procure himself to be arrested, or his goods, chattels, lands or tenements to be taken in execution, or remove or conceal his goods to prevent their being taken in execution, or who shall wilfully waste or improvidently dispose thereof.

The 27th Section makes the filing of a Declaration of Insolvency by a Trader who has been a resident of the Province for twelve months previously, in the manner therein prescribed, an act of Bankruptcy; and the 28th attaches a like effect to the payment by the Trader of any money to the petitioning Creditor, or the giving of any security to him, with a view of giving him a preference. The 29th Section provides that if judgment be recovered against a Trader, and the Plaintiff shall be in a position to sue out Execution thereon, if the Trader, after twenty one days notice, shall not pay, secure or compound, to the satisfaction of the Plaintiff, he shall be deemed to have committed an act of Bankruptcy. The 30th Section attaches the same consequences to the non-payment by the Trader, after notice, of money ordered to be paid by Decree in Equity or Rule of Court, a day being first fixed by the Court for that purpose. The 31st Section we have taken from Lord John Russell's Bill, and it describes a particular manner in which Members of the Legislature may commit acts of Bankruptcy. The 33rd Section provides that no Trader shall be adjudged a Bankrupt by reason of an act of Bankruptcy committed more than six months prior to the filing of any Petition for adjudication.

4. Under the fourth general heading is described the mode of procedure to obtain adjudication. This is done in Sections 34 to 46 inclusive. The proceedings are commenced by Petition to the Commissioner in whose district the Bankrupt resides, if he be a resident of the Province, and if he be not, then in any County where he may have property. The 34th Section, and the Schedules therein referred to, prescribe the forms of the Petition and the Affidavits in verification thereof. The 45th Section provides that, whenever a Petition may be filed before a Commissioner, and it is proved to his satisfaction that there is probable cause for believing that the person against whom it is filed is about to quit the Province, or to conceal his property to defraud his creditors, the Commissioner may issue his Warrant, directed to such person as he shall see fit, giving him authority to arrest the person against whom the Petition is filed, and to seize his

books, papers, goods and chattels, and to bring such person before the Commissioner, and to keep his books, papers, goods and chattels, until the time allowed for adjudication on the Petition shall have expired. And the Commissioner is by the same Section empowered, on the person being arrested and brought before him, to commit him to the Gaol of the County in which such Commissioner resides, there to remain until adjudication on the Petition, or until the time for adjudication shall have expired.

It is imperatively necessary, for the purposes of the Act, that the Commissioner should be invested with the authority which is given to him by this Section. The Bankrupt is not divested of his property till adjudication, and if he be permitted to convey away, secrete and dispose of all his property, and then abscond, before he is adjudged a Bankrupt, the whole object of the Law would be defeated. The 46th Section enables the Commissioner to summon before him all persons possessed of any information in connection with the Bankrupt's business, for the purpose of proving the facts necessary to obtain an adjudication of Bankruptcy, such as the trading and the act of Bankruptcy.

5. Under the fifth head, the adjudication, its consequences, and proceedings there-under, are treated of. The details are to be found in Sections from 47 to 77 inclusive. It is provided by the 46th Section, that a Trader may be adjudged a Bankrupt on his own Petition, on proof of the filing of the Declaration of Insolvency already mentioned. And the 47th Section enacts, that under a Petition filed by a Creditor, the Commissioner may adjudge a person Bankrupt.—

1st. On proof of petitioning Creditor's debt, the act of Bankruptcy, and the trading of

the person against whom the Petition is filed:

2nd. Should the petitioning Creditor fail to proceed, then in case another Creditor

shall apply for adjudication, and shall prove the requisite facts:

3rd, When the petitioning Creditor shall prove the service of the summons to appear, after mentioned, and the person served shall not appear before the Commissioner at the time appointed, there being no lawful impediment:

4th. When the Debtor does appear before the Commissioner and admits the demand upon which the summons issued, but does not pay, secure or compound for the same to

the satisfaction of the Creditor:

5th. In case he appears before the Commissioner and refuses to admit the whole of the demand, and does not one or other of the following things, that is to say, pay, secure or compound for it, or make a deposition on oath that he believes he has a good defence upon the merits to the whole of such demand; and if required by the Commissioner, enter into a bond, with two sureties, and pay such amount, with costs, as shall be recovered in any action brought, or to be brought; or pay, secure or compound for part of such demand, and as to the residue, make such and the like deposition, and it so required by the Commissioner, enter into such bond:

6th. In case he appears and admits a part of the demand, and does not pay, secure or

compound for the part admitted:

7th. In the event of his appearing, admitting and paying a part of the demand, and not paying, securing or compounding for the unadmitted part, or making such deposition as

to a good defence to the unadmitted part, and entering into such Bond.

The provisions contained in the 3rd, 4th 5th, 6th, and 7th paragraphs of this Section, will have a salutary effect in preventing the wasting of the Bankrupt's Estate in useless litigation. There is no doubt of the fact, that many people, after they have become too far involved to extricate themselves do make sacrifices and defend actions at Law in order to gain time, and in the hope of being able to avert the disgrace and odium which they conceive to be attached to a failure in business. These defences are well known in the legal profession, as defences for time. They are resorted to where the defendant has no answer to the action on the merits, but where, being unable at the time to pay the amount claimed, he seeks to postpone the time of payment. In this manner his Estate is wasted in the payment of costs, and when, after perhaps a long and fruitless struggle, he is obliged to succumb, there is little or nothing left for the Creditors.

Justice to the Creditor and mercy to the Debtor, alike require that, when the latter can neither pay, secure or compound, a debt which he admits to be due, his property should be taken from him, and he should be relieved from payment of his debts, and from wasting his time and energies in an unavailing attempt to do so. It will be observed,

that the Debtor is not required to pay the debt, but only to secure or compound it to the satisfaction of the Creditor. And it is never to the interest of the Creditor to make a man Bankrupt. Any security whatever would be preferable to the chance of a dividend out of his Estate, reduced as it would be by the expense of perhaps protracted proceedings in Bankruptcy. We cannot, indeed, conceive a Trader in any business, reduced to such a state that he can neither pay, secure or compound a debt, which he acknowledges he owes, unless he be in a state of Insolvency.

6. Under the last head, we dealt with the adjudication, its effects and consequences: under this one, will be found enumerated some transactions which are not affected by

the Bankruptcy.

By the 78th Section, Payments, Conveyances, Contracts, and Executions are declared to be valid, if made, entered into or issued without notice of a prior act of Bankruptcy; and the 79th Section provides, that a bona fide purchase, even if made with notice of a prior act of Bankruptcy, shall not be impeached unless a Petition for adjudication of

Bankruptcy shall be filed against the vendor within six months.

7. In the three following Sections, we have made some provisions with regard to warrants of Attorney and Cognovits, which, we think, will remedy some of the abuses which now prevail in the use of these instruments. We regard their introduction, at all, as securities, to be exceedingly detrimental to the interests of trade. Credit should always be founded upon confidence, and this confidence should be inspired only by a knowledge of the position and character of the Debtor. The fact of a Creditor's taking a Bond and Warrant of Attorney repels the notion of any such confidence. It implies the contrary, and the use of these securities has led to a false system of credit, and has often been productive of ruinous consequences.

8. From Sections 83 to 140, inclusive, will be found the course of procedure after the adjudication, and until the Bankrupt's final examination. Immediately after the adjudication of Bankruptcy, the Commissioner is required to call a meeting of the Bankrupt's Creditors. At this meeting the Creditors are to choose an Assignee, and from that time until the application for a certificate of Conformity, they take the management of the Estate into their own hands, subject from time to time to the order and direction

of the Commissioner, if required.

9. Sections 141 to 148, inclusive, empower the Commissioner to make certain allowances to the Bankrupt for his support. Following the English Acts in this respect, we have thought it advisable to make the amount of these allowances to depend in some degree upon the amount of the dividend which the Estate should pay. In other words, we have made the Bankrupt a creditor of his own estate. This will be some inducement to the Debtor to disclose his insolvency before he has wasted his estate by making forced sales and sacrifices.

10. Under the next head, the Bill, in Sections 149 to 160, inclusive, prescribes the mode of obtaining the certificate of Conformity, and describes the circumstances under

which it shall be granted and confirmed, suspended or refused.

Here the proceedings of Bankruptcy close. The Bill proceeds to make regulations for the protection of Debtors from process, in certain cases, and provides for arrangements with creditors, to be made under the direction of the Commissioner. In these instances we have left the Bill open for all Insolvent Debtors, whether Traders or not.

By Sections 181 and 182, the Bankrupt may, after his last examination, offer a composition, and if it be accepted by a majority in number, and four fifths in value of the creditors, the Commissioner shall annul the adjudication and dismiss the petition.

After making various provisions for the regulation of proceedings at meetings of Creditors, and relating to Evidence, the Bill proceeds to define the punishment for offences against the Bankrupt Law. This it does in Sections 206, 207, and 208. The punishments to be inflicted are not as severe as those imposed by the Bill of Lord John Russell. When too severe, they often fail to accomplish the purpose for which they are designed, because convictions cannot be obtained. And in the present circumstances of the Province, we should very much doubt of the policy of imposing greater penalties than those mentioned in this Bill

Any person acquainted with business transactions must be convinced of the necessity for some stringent measure to check the frauds which are daily being perpetrated.

Merely

Merely to refuse a Debtor his certificate of conformity is not sufficient. An unprincipled man, and of course it is only of such that we are now speaking, if he seeks the benefit of the Act, will endeavour to conceal whatever has been dishonest in his dealings, and in the attempt to do so, he will too often commit another crime of even greater magnitude. Fraud and perjury are usually associated together. And they are not to be restrained or suppressed by the mere refusal of a certificate of conformity. The certificate would he of little value at the antipodes; and the crimes of the Bankrupt are unknown, and if known, are disregarded in California and Australia.

We have endeavoured to frame such a Bill as will enable every honest unfortunate debtor to obtain relief; but we have sought to visit fraud, when detected, with the severest

penalties which can be inflicted.

No Law can be framed which will dispense with the exercise of ordinary prudence and discrimination on the part of business men. If they will place confidence in people whose characters and circumstances do not justify it, they must expect to suffer. If, leaving the legitimate operations of trade, they will enter into reckless speculations, and will embark in gambling adventures, they must be prepared to take the consequences. No legislation can protect them.

But, without pretending to any thing of that kind, we think that this Bill if it becomes, a Law, will have a salutary effect in restraining such evils; that it will promote a

healthier condition of business here, and will tend to establish our credit abroad.

The Joint Committee of the Legislative Library have prepared the accompanying Rules for its government; and in submitting them to the Legislature for adoption, have to remark, that in consequence of the number of Books missing, the setts broken up, and the manner in which many of them that have been issued and returned, have been abused, they have determined to enforce a strict observance of the Rules.

The Committee append a Report of their Secretary, which shews the necessity of adopting more effectual measures in order to preserve the valuable Library placed under

their charge.

They beg to call the attention of the Members of the Legislature to this subject, and

to solicit their support and concurrence.

I have signed the above Report because as a whole it has been agreed to by the Library Committee, though I do not agree to all the recommendations.

CHARLES FISHER.

I beg to report, for the information of the Joint Committee, that during the last Summer I examined the several portions of the Library, and found the following state of facts:-

The Catalogue shews a total of 6785 Volumes of all classes, belonging to the Library, prior

to the last importation.

When I inspected the Library, and the Record of issues, there appeared to be absent 669 Volumes, of which 173 Volumes had not been charged to any person, and 496 Volumes charged to Members and others as issued in the following years-

RULES

For the regulation and government of the Joint Library of the Legislature.

1st.—The Library shall be under the immediate care and control of a Committee of Six Members of the Legislature, each House to appoint three.

2nd.—The Committee may, if they deem it expedient, appoint a Secretary, who shall have the general care and supervision of the Library, but who shall receive no compensation for his services, except the privilege of access to the Library and of taking Books therefrom.

3rd.—The Committee shall appoint a Librarian, who shall at all times be under the direction of the Standing Committee and of their Secretary: It shall be his duty to attend in the Library daily during the Sitting of the Legislature, from the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon until five o'clock in the afternoon, and from seven o'clock until nine o'clock in the evening; and he shall also be ready at any other time to open the Library at the request of a Member of the Legislature.

4th.—The Librarian shall be held accountable for all the Books in the Library: He shall keep a Register in which he shall enter the number of every Book issued out of the Library, and the name of the person to whom it has been issued; and no Book shall on any pretext be taken out of the Library until the Librarian shall have entered the same; and it shall be his duty also to see that all Books taken out be returned.

5th.—No person shall be allowed to take any Book from the Shelves but through the Librarian.

6th.—No person shall be admitted into the Library for the purpose of reading while it is open, except upon the introduction (personally or by letter) of a Member of the Legislature; the name, &c. of the person so introduced shall be recorded by the Member or by the Librarian, in a Book to be kept for that purpose in the Library; such introduction shall not continue in force longer than one week, and it shall not entitle the person so introduced to receive Books from the Library.

7th.—No Books shall be issued from the Library except to the following persons, and no more than two Volumes shall be issued to each of them at any one time, which may be kept out one week during the sitting of the Legislature, or two weeks during the recess:-

Members of the Legislature;

Master of the Rolls and Judges of the Supreme Court;

Executive Councillors who are not Members of the Legislature;

Solicitor General, Province Treasurer, Auditor General, and Receiver General; Officers of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly;

Clerk and ex-Clerks of the Executive Council;

Governor's Private Secretary and Staff Officers; Commandant and Officers of the Garrison in Fredericton;

Former Members of the Councils or Assembly; Clergymen stationed in the City of Fredericton; Professors of the University of New Brunswick;

Principal Master of the Collegiate School, and of the Baptist Seminary;

Chief Superintendent of Schools;

Queen's Printer, and the High Sheriff of York.

8th.—The Librarian shall issue to each Member of the Legislature who may wish it, not more than four Volumes, or any one Work, from the Library, to be taken from the Town during the recess by such Member. Before taking the Books, the Member to give a written memorandum to the Librarian of the Books so taken; on such Books being returned and others taken, a new receipt to be given.

9th.—No Books shall be taken from the Library but those marked in the Catalogue with an asterisk.

10th.—An Apartment called the "Members' Room," having been appropriated for the reception of Laws, Journals, Parliamentary Debates, and other works necessary for a Legislative Library, it is ordered that no Book, &c. belonging to that Room be issued to any person except for occasional reference during the Session of the Legislature; and the Committee request that Members do not occupy the said Room for Committees or private consultations, to the exclusion of other Members who desire access to the Works contained in it.

- 11th.—Persons residing in Fredericton and its vicinity, not farther than five miles distant therefrom, may have the privilege of taking Books from the Library upon the following conditions, viz:—
 - 1st. The individual must be recommended in writing by a Member of the Joint Committee, or other Member of the Legislature:
 - 2nd. The annual payment for such privilege shall be twenty shillings currency, payable in advance to the Secretary of the Library:
 - 3rd. The days for issuing and receiving Books during the recess, shall be Tuesdays and Fridays, between the hours of 10 A. M. and 4 P. M.:
 - 4th. No Work shall be issued to any such person until it shall have been upwards of three months in the Library:
 - 5th. The retention of a Book beyond the proper time for its return, (vide Rule 7) shall cause the forfeiture of such privilege; and if a Book be lost or injured, it must be replaced by a similar one of equal quality and value, or the cost of replacing it paid to the Secretary: If it be one or more Volumes of a Sett, the whole Sett must be replaced or paid for as above.
- 12th.—The Newspapers taken by the respective Houses shall be deposited during the recess in the Library, and kept there on file for the use of the Members of the Legislature.

Note.—On comparing this return with the similar one of the preceding year, it will be seen that the increase of Tonnage, carrying away cargoes from New Brunswick, in 1859, over 1858, is 141,989 tons; of this amount the increase on Foreign tonnage was 98,006 tons, while the increase on British tonnage was only 48,983 tons, shewing that foreigners are rapidly taking advantage of their privileges, and are entering into keen competition with British Shipowners, in the carrying trade of this Province. Of the Foreign tonnage carrying away cargoes, a large proportion belong to Foreign Europe, and shew a heavy increase over the previous year. In 1858 only 71 vessels, 27,119 tons, of Foreign Europe, carried cargoes from New Brunswick, while in 1859 they had increased to 182 vessels, 67,341 tons, shewing an increase of 111 vessels, 40,222 tons. At the Port of Saint John, the principal part of the Foreign vessels carrying away cargoes belonged to the United States, while at the ports on the North Shore the most of them belonged to Foreign Europe. It will be seen by the above return that of the vessels belonging to Foreign Europe, which carried cargoes from this Province in 1859, the Norwegians secured the largest share.

Note.—The amount of New Tonnage Registered, &c., in New Brunswick during last year, shews an increase of 18 vessels, 12,067 tons, over 1858,—the quantity of New Shipping Registered in 1858 having been smaller than in any of the previous years since 1848. The prices obtained for the New Vessels sold in England during 1859, were still unremunerative, although a shade better than in 1858. Taking into consideration the fact that a large proportion of the Vessels built last Year, were of the highest Colonial grade, £7 Sterling per ton might be taken as a fair average value for the New Vessels, although a few sold as high as £8 10s. Sterling per ton. The New Tonnage built last year, viz. 38,330 tons Register, would represent about 41,000 tons old, or Carpenter's measurement, (which is the tonnage by which Vessels are usually bought and sold,) and estimating them at £7 Sterling per ton, it would make their total value about £287,000 Sterling, without the first freight home to England, which is equal to about 10s. Sterling per ton after paying disbursements. The prospects for this branch of business in the Colony are still discouraging, and so far as can be ascertained, the amount of New Tonnage to be built during the current year will scarcely equal that of 1859. The value of the New Ships should be taken into consideration when comparing the value of the Imports with the Exports, as the outfits of these New Vessels appear in the Account of Imports, but do not appear in the Accounts as articles of Export.

The total value of Exports from New Brunswick in 1859 was £1.073,422 Storling, and in 1858 it was £810,779 Storling, showing an increase of £202,618 Storling on last year over NOTE.—The following named Wood thools, viz: Boards, Chap-boards, Laths, Pickets, Sash and Door Staff, Shingles, Pine Timber, and Curtain Sticks, which appear as Exports from Now Branswick, but not the Produce and Manufacture of the Colony, were entered autwards as the Produce of those parts of the State of Maine which are watered by the River Saint John or its tributaries.

The principal part of the Coal exported from Now Brunswick is the produce of the Abert Maes, and is of a very valuable quality, used for making Albertine Oil in the United States. The Coal is worth upwards of E3 Sterling per ton at Hillsborough. the provious year.

Note.—The Imports and Exports from and to the United Kingdom shew a large increase in 1859 as compared with 1858. The Exports to Canada are also rapidly increasing, while there is a slight decline on the Imports from that Country. The Imports from Prince Edward Island in 1859 are about the same as in 1858; but there is a large increase in the Exports to that Colony in 1859. The Imports and Exports from and to the United States still continue to increase heavily, although the Imports have increased much more than the Exports. The value of the Imports from the neighbouring Republic still continues to exceed enormously the value of the Exports to that Country. The Imports from Nova Scotia into this Province are much increased by large quantities of British Haberdashery being imported into Saint John via Halifax and Windsor, by Rail and Steamer. The Imports from the United States are also somewhat increased by the importation into Saint John of British Haberdashery via Boston and Portland.

The great apparent disparity between the value of the Imports and Exports of this Province, is explained by the fact that the value of the New Ships built in 1859 and nearly all sent for sale to England, with the first freight home, would amount to about £300,000 sterling. The outfits for these Vessels, as also pitch pine, &c. are all included in the Imports,

while they do not appear as Exports.




