The four heavy fed, or Lot 1, were given 50 per cent. more roots and meal than were the four light fed, or Lot 2. Number of days in test 93; total weight at the beginning for Lot 1, heavy fed, 4573 pounds; at finish, 5295 pounds, an increase of 722 pounds. For Lot 2, light fed, at beginning 4206 pounds; at finish 4880 pounds, an increase of 674 pounds.
