Campaign Planned For Soldiers Overseas.

Knights of Nova Scotia Emulate Achievements of Americans.

Recent war work of the Knights of Columbus in the United States in which they succeeded in raising \$15,000,000 for Army Huts and won the praise of such men as President Wilson, Theodore Roosevelt and William Jennings Bryan is going to be duplicated on this side of the border.

Meeting at Antigonish recently, the Knights of Columbus resolved to raise \$100,000 from the Maritime Provinces to build and equip army huts that will serve as homes for Canadians of all classes, creeds and colors overseas. As the money was to be spent broadly, it was felt a broad appeal should be made and accordingly everybody will be asked to contribute.

Army Hut costs from \$2,500 up in England and France. Those in France will be placed not only at points of embarkation, but along the route right up to the edge of the firing line.

All will bear the sign Everybody welcome and Everything Free—actually all the provisions—cigarettes, chocolate bars, coffee, etc.—that these huts contain will be free to men of all ranks, provided only that they are allied soldiers. In addition these huts will provide a place where men will spend social hours—a home from home.

It is not the intention to duplicate work now done by the Y. M. C. A. Each has its own field and they both have special qualifications for doing their own work that the other must necessarily lack. The fact that the United States recognizes the Hebrew Relief Associations, the Y. M. C. A. the K of C as well as the Red Cross shows that each of these has its own work to do. And besides is there any danger that there will be crowding of the men at the front?

The campaign starts August 19th, and will wind up the following Saturday. Men of all denominations—seasoned campaigners in Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and Victory Loan drives—have volunteered to assist.

The Canada Food Board has removed temporarily, the restriction on the consumption of pork. Such action has been made possible by the pork production and conservation efforts in Canada and the United States, and the Food Board's order, just passed, provided that pork including bacon and any part of the carcass may be served at any time in public eating places operating under Canada Food Board licenses. In announcing this the Food Board stated that as a result of conservation measures and increased production, net exports of pork from the dominion have been increased by 125,000,000 pounds per annum, which is an increase of 571 per cent over a five year pre-war average.

This surprise which the enemy has given us should cause us to redouble our efforts in the training of men supplying of munitions and food for our armies and also supply food to the needy in Europe so that their men may be spared to join the firing line in defence of their invaded countries of Belgium, France, Italy, Serbia etc.

The supreme task now is to bend our every energies toward winning this war to save ourselves from the yolk of the oppressor. After that we can take up our ordinary work again.

German Armies in Full Retreat. Offensive Was a Complete Failure.

Second—Their reserves are badly used up.

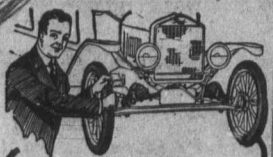

The Old Homestead drew a large crowd for the third evening over 1600 people were present and several hundred had to stand. The play was strongly rendered and was pleasing throughout. The Brooks Musical Club excelled in the music it rendered both on Sunday evening and Monday afternoon.

Dr. Wood as Superintendent gave vigorous, instructive and interesting talks on all occasions and was delighted with Chautauqua's reception in Kings County.

The Opera Robin Hood was the strong musical feature of the program and an audience of 2000 people faced the performers and went away pleased. The singers were artists of high rank and many who heard it thought it with The Old Homestead worth all of the price of a season ticket. The closing musicale vent was the concert of the Pietro Mordelia Co., and the audience could hardly be satisfied with having several recalls.

"Liberty's Torch" presented by the Company and the children of the town who had been trained each morning was a most pleasing occasion and excellent program.

Military pay is considerably more than these employers realize. Let us suppose a case. The pay of a married private in the Canadian army is \$41.50 a year. The Quaker Oats Company of Peterboro have installed a mill to produce corn flour, corn meal and oat flour, at the rate of 7,000 barrels a day. Two mills to produce 200 barrels of substitute flour per day are being installed in London and Penetang, respectively.

California Letter

3601 Telegraph Ave., Oakland Calif.
July 24th., 1918.

Dear Mr. Editor of the Advertiser: I thought it would interest the readers of your paper if I should send you some items that have been published in regard to ship building and navy yards on this coast by the government.

There are a number of ship building plants in the state of Washington which are turning out ships rapidly. A number of ship plants also in San Francisco which are doing good work.

This city in which I have lived since 1875, since the war opened has been brought into great prominence as a ship building center.

When I first came here in some parts of the towns the streets wound in and out among groves of oak, now this is all changed the oak groves have about all disappeared. We have finely paved streets and nice cement side walks and claim a population of over 200,000.

Oakland is directly east from San Francisco across the bay, a distance of four miles and making out of the bay is an arm of the sea about two miles long which is called the Oakland Estuary.

As the streets have been graded and carried down to tide water, it was decided that the sewers should be emptied there but when this was accomplished, it was found that there must be a rapid current created.

Across the Estuary is another city called Alameda and around this flows the bay of San Leandro. The government deepened the Oakland Harbor and dredged a canal some eleven miles opening into the eastern part of San Leandro bay thus overcoming this trouble and making miles of waterfront available for ship building plants. There have been some two or three small plants in operation for a number of years but now we have six plants in operation.

On the fourth of July of this year there were nine steel ships launched from these yards, one ship was completed in thirty days and within an hour after the ways had been cleared, another keel had been laid.

The government has taken over several acres near the mouth of the harbor as a navy yard and it is said will spend ninety million dollars. We expect work will be commenced by the first of the year.

The government is building ships and has others let that will aggregate seventy-five million dollars.

This coast has a beautiful supply of timber and vast coal fields that only need to be opened up.

The government has a navy yard at Vallejo some thirty miles north of San Francisco and now employs some twelve thousand men

Other industries coupled with this great outlay of money are making the Pacific coast very prosperous. We look for an increase to our population of some fifty thousand peoples.

There are two training camps on the San Francisco side of the dam one in San Francisco and the other called camp Fremont about thirty miles south. These camps are kept filled with men, as soon as one contingent is sent away another comes to take its place. Our streets have come to present a military aspect.

With our ships, our soldiers and our Red Cross units, we are doing all we can to help the government.

As there has come tons from time to time through the daily print an account of the bravery of the Canadian soldiers, we have felt a thrill of pleasure and admiration for their bravery and I rejoice that I was born in Canada and find myself repeating those old lines "Lives there a man with soul so dead, who never to himself has said, "This is my own, my native land."

I would say to the young people of Kings county there is no spot on this wide peopled earth where the prospects for success in life are better than in dear old Nova Scotia.

Our men are being conscripted. They have no rights to their own bodies in this regard.


Our hotels and households are being required not to use certain foods at certain times. None of us have rights to choose our own eating.

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these presents shall come or whom the same may in any wise concern,—GREETING :

A Proclamation of conditional amnesty respecting men belonging to Class I under the Military Service Act, 1917, who have disobeyed our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, or their orders to report for duty, or are deserters or absent without leave from the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

WHEREAS consider- able numbers of men belonging to Class I under our Military Service Act, 1917, called out on active service in our Canadian Expeditionary Force for the defence of Canada under Our Proclamation of 13th October, 1917, although they have thus become by law soldiers enlisted in the Military Service of Canada,

AND WHEREAS we desire, if possible, to avoid the infliction of the heavy penalties which the law imposes for the offences of which these soldiers have thus been guilty, and to afford them an opportunity within a limited time to report and make their services available in Our Canadian Expeditionary Force as is by law their bounden duty, and as is necessary for the defence of Our Dominion of Canada.

AND WHEREAS we desire, if possible, to avoid the infliction of the heavy penalties which the law imposes for the offences of which these soldiers have thus been guilty, and to afford them an opportunity within a limited time to report and make their services available in Our Canadian Expeditionary Force as is by law their bounden duty, and as is necessary for the defence of Our Dominion of Canada.

NOW KNOW YE that we in the exercise of Our powers, and of Our good will and pleasure in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare and cause to be published and made known THAT THE PENALTIES OF THE LAW WILL NOT BE IMPOSED OR EXACTED as against the men who belong to Class I under Our Military Service Act, 1917, and who have disobeyed Our Proclamation aforesaid; or who have received notice from any of Our registrars or deputy registrars to report for duty on a day now past and have failed so to report; or who, having reported and obtained leave of absence, have failed to report at the expiry of their leave, or have become deserters from Our Expeditionary Force, PROVIDED THEY REPORT FOR DUTY ON OR BEFORE THE TWENTY FOURTH DAY OF AUGUST 1918.

At Our Government House, in Our City of OTTAWA, this FIRST day of AUGUST, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eighteen, and in the ninth year of Our Reign.
