"Why?" I wondered. "He has done splendidly for me."

"Yes, I know it and I used to have great faith in him myself," rejoined the lady from across the way. "You know everyone says that if it hadn't been for him, Willie would have lost his eyesight after he had the scarlet fever and he certainly did a lot for Madge's deafness, but do you know I've been taking his eye medicine for two or three weeks now and my eyes don't seem to get one bit better."

"Why, when did you go to him for your eyes?" I thought you told me yesterday that you hadn't been to a doctor for over a year. How did you get the medicine?"

"Well, I haven't," she responded promptly. "This medicine is what he gave me the last time I went to him for my eyes. When Willie was teething, I went, and he's four, so that must be about three years ago."

And she's losing faith in the doctor because the medicine that he gave her three years ago doesn't cure her eyes to-day of what may be an entirely different trouble.

She'd better be thanking her stars that her foolishness hasn't done her eyes actual harm—that is, if it hasn't. Everywhere are people that do that sort of thing—have the prescription

that the doctor gave them for a stomach ache three or four years ago, filled to cure to-day's stomach ache.

And just as like as not the two aches are from entirely different sources and need quite different treatment.

There are, of course, certain standard remedies that any woman can be her own doctor and apply without asking the advice of her physician each time. It's perfectly safe to fill up and empty the liniment and the peppermint bottles as often as you like. It's entirely proper to take down the sulphur and molasses each spring, or at least our grandmothers always found it so.

But when a doctor prescribes a remedy for a specific trouble in some part, it isn't always a wise plan to use that remedy for any ache or pain that develops in that part during the next decade.

Perhaps you are hitting it right when you think you feel exactly the way you did when the doctor gave you that liver medicine, the spring you nearly had jaundice, but considering that that spring was five years ago the chances are that you can't possibly remember exactly how you felt then.

And if you take the remedy he gave you then it may simply do you negative harm by keeping you from going to the doctor's and getting a proper remedy, or it may be something that will do you active harm.

Of course it costs to ask the doctor every little thing, but it often costs more not to.

But whatever else you do, if you don't go to him, for justice sake don't blame the poor doctor if the medicine he gave for one sickness doesn't cure another.

HOUSEHOLD NOTES.

Towels should be perfectly dry before they are placed in the linen closet, or mold is liable to form upon them and cause skin diseases.

Neuralgia may be often relieved by applying a cloth saturated with essence of peppermint to the seat of the pain and leaving it there.

To keep tulips, used as table decorations, from opening wide a tiny bit of wax should be dropped onto the calyx of each of the flowers.

Bent whalebone, the genuine article, may be straightened by soaking before used in boiling water for a few minutes and then ironing it straight. If mutton chops simmer in just a little water on the back of the stove before being broiled or fried, the flavor will be quite like lamb chops.

For a slightly and tasty addition to the salad, sprinkle it lightly with finely minced green pepper or finely shredded pistachio nuts.

Chiropodists say that a shoe that will not allow the great toe to lie in a straight line should not be worn if it is desired to avoid bunions.

It is wise to break eggs one at a time into a cup and to transfer each one as it is broken. Then, if one proves bad, the whole dish will not be spoiled.

A very weak solution of ammonia water is excellent for cleaning a diamond. It should be applied to the under side, and will make it very brilliant.

It is possible to buy remnants of fine carpets very cheap, and these cut into rug length and with a fringe added, make excellent and handsome rugs.

While the whole eggs are generally used for dipping croquettes, the yoke alone, with a little water added will be found quite as satisfactory.

Scratches on polished wood, if not too deep, can be removed by rubbing gently with fine sandpaper, and then with a mixture of olive oil and vinegar.

When next making tomato soup, try some of the tomato paste rather than canned tomatoes. It will be found delicious and much more economical to use.

Baby bottles may be cleaned by filling them with hot water and fine ashes or baking soda. Shake well and rinse. The bottles will be perfectly clean.

The simplest of puddings, such as chocolate, bread or rice, can be made much more tasty by adding a little cocoanut, a few chopped nuts, or some chopped figs.

If a simple brown frame for a photograph seems too dark, it may be greatly lightened by introducing a tiny moulding of gold just inside the inner edge of the frame.

A good disinfectant is made by applying a hot poker to a lump of camphor gum in a saucer. The strong fumes will clear the room of offensive odor in a few minutes.

A "Beach Stone" Bill.

The latest in "givings-out" is the grant of beach stones. The Atlantic Pebble Co., Ltd., see money in exporting them, so they have prevailed on the Government to exclude any one else from exporting them for three years, and obtained the exclusive right to the beach stones on Crown lands of Conception Bay inland within 300 feet of high water mark for the next 25 years. It is a grant absolutely free from any rent to the Crown. The company does not pay a cent to the Government for the monopoly. They have the further privilege of importing certain machinery and all sacks and sacking free of duty. The Government may make regulations to prohibit their working in certain places; nor does the monopoly exclude the taking of ballast by fishermen.

The company are under obligation to spend on labour \$10,000 a year for the first ten years; \$25,000 a year for the next ten years; \$25,000 a year for the last five years. Mr. Harold Bishop is the President of the company.

The agreement is before the Legislature for confirmation.

What next?

In the Assembly.

Yesterday Mr. Clapp presented petitions from Rocky Harbor and Lobster Cove on education, as did Mr. Grant from Ship Cove and Robin Hood. Mr. Morison had one from Squid Tickle about a road and others from Charlottetown and Bunyan's Cove on education. Mr. Clift presented one from Cape Shore, G. B., about the Game Laws, and from New Bay for a road.

Sir Edward Morris made another attempt to capture the Ice King. He introduced a new set of Cold Storage Resolutions. The Government propose to guarantee for 15 years 5 per cent on \$500,000 of the capital of any company engaging in the business, and to permit them to import material for plant and the machinery duty free. The Government is also to be empowered to assist in the construction and maintenance of public cold storage plants, the location and plans to be approved by the Governor in Council. The Minister of Fisheries is to be the inspector in chief of them.

The Model Farm and Election Bills were put through their final stages.

Halley's Comet Getting Nearer.

Special to Evening Telegram.
 CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Mar. 10.
 Halley's comet may now be seen on nights when conditions are favorable with the aid of an ordinary field glass. The most favourable time to look for it is between 6.30 and 7.30 p.m., with glass somewhere above where the sun sets. The Harvard observatory forces have the wanderer focussed nightly on their big telescopes, and some photos of its movements are being made. Prof. Pickering, Director of the Harvard Observatory, says the comet is at present in the Twilight region. It is in the line of the sun and its brightness is dimmed by the lustre of the great centre of the Solar system. Besides it has not yet attained its maximum brilliancy—that will be May 18th. It will be visible all throughout April but at its brightest in May. About that time if clouds do not obscure it, it will be a dazzling sight. About a third of the heavens will be covered with a fiery gold, its great flashes of light will be remembered for generations. Halley's Comet has been noted for its brilliant displays.

Will Keep the Power of the Purse.

Special to Evening Telegram.
 LONDON, March 10.
 The Ministers adopted a new device in the war between the Lords and Commons by asking Parliament today to vote supplies for six weeks only, instead of four to six months, as has been the practice for the last fifteen years. The fact is not concealed that this device is intended to keep the power of the purse in the House of Commons in readiness for such constitutional crisis which is expected in the month of May when the Lords probably will reject the resolutions curtailing their power to veto so as to bring about the resignation of the government. If supplies were voted for six months Mr. Balfour could then take office and carry on the Govt. but with necessity of coming to the House of Commons for a new vote on supplies he would be defeated. The Conservatives in the House of Commons today indignantly denounced the Govt's action as a shabby trick in its policy of evasion and chicanery. Their newspapers echo this sentiment, Chancellor Lloyd George frankly admits that it is his intention thus to keep effective control over the executive from whichever side of the house that executive is drawn and it is understood that the Laborites and the Nationalists will support the Govt. In the meantime to guard against surprise and the possibility of defeat by a snap division the Govt. which have issued a circular to all of its supporters impressing upon them the necessity of constant attendance in the House of Commons.

The British Budget.

 LONDON, March 10.
 The Civil Service estimates for 1910 and 1911 which were given out today with a total amount required of upwards of three hundred and thirty million dollars show like the Navy and Army estimates a marked increase in the National expenditure. Should the Chancellors budget provide for the usual consolidated fund charges the grand aggregate expenditure which the Chancellor will have to meet will be upwards of eight hundred and fifty million dollars or nearly fifty million in excess of last years total. The Civil Service estimates include forty six million one hundred thousand dollars for old age pensions.

Spanish Premier's Appeal.

 MADRID, Spain, Mar. 10.
 Premier Canalejas in an important speech outlining the Government's programme made in the Cortes today appealed for the united support of all the Radical and Democratic forces in the approaching struggle, to Europeanize and modernize Spain. Without such support, he declared, the fight against the growing powers of Clericalism and Reaction was foredoomed to failure.

Sad Fatality While Bird Shooting.

It falls to our pen to add another to the list of fatalities that have occurred in this neighborhood within the past twelve months. On Friday, 25th, the news spread rapidly through the settlement that a young man named Arthur Hynes, living with his uncle Paul Aucoin, Lightkeeper at Long Point, had on the previous day drifted out the bay while out shooting sea birds at some distance from the shore and that there being no other boat in the vicinity of the light-house and the keeper's nearest neighbors being from home at the time, no assistance could be rendered the drifting man. This information was brought here by a messenger from Mr. Aucoin, who seeing that no assistance could be rendered from his quarters sent word to friends here to go to the rescue of the unfortunate man, whom he thought from the direction in which the wind was blowing, may have driven into Fox Island or into some of the coves on the eastern side of the bay. A search party started out and managed to reach Fox Island, but their quest was fruitless, and from the view obtained from the islands it was seen that the whole shore northward was lined with heavy slob ice through which no boat could force its way to land in that direction, and it became evident that in the ordinary course of events no reasonable hope of the poor fellow's safety or recovery could be entertained. The young man was a general favorite and his sad and untimely end has caused a widespread feeling of regret and sorrow and evoked feelings of the deepest sympathy for his mourning relatives.

Frozen Herring Duty.

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 10.

Complaining that the gov't. has placed itself in the position of contending that fish should be frozen before being caught to be "naturally frozen" a Boston firm of fish dealers has asked representative Roberts of the Treasury Dept. against a recent ruling. The letter says that the Treasury Dept. held that fresh herring naturally frozen was not dutiable as frozen fish at three fourths of one cent duty per pound but that this was modified by a letter on March 5th from the dept. addressed to the collector at Boston saying that their seemed to be some misunderstanding. The latter letter held that fish frozen in tubs or on decks, of vessels after they had been caught cannot be classed as naturally frozen and therefore are subject to the old duty of three fourths of one cent a pound.





Story of the "Grace." Terrible Time on Record Long Voyage From St. John's to Halifax.

Thirty-two days out on a passage that is usually done in four or five, the little Newfoundland brigantine Grace arrived in port yesterday after hope for her safety had been practically abandoned. Hardships that will be indelibly seared in their memory were endured by the eight men who manned the little craft. Tossed about like a chip by gales from all points of the compass, three times leed up so badly that part of the cargo had to be thrown overboard to lighten her, and finally when making shore to strike a reef and be compelled to man the pumps continuously to keep the water down, the crew of the Grace had an experience that none of them ever want to repeat, and when they finally got to port yesterday they were all completely worn out by exertion, exposure and anxiety.

Battle With the Elements.
For nearly a month, baffling winds were encountered and the vessel was driven helplessly in whatever direction the wind happened to be from then. At times so coated with ice as to be almost unmanageable, then driven to southern latitudes in which the "glitters" melted away, then frozen up again, the weary unceasing battle with the elements went on and there were many times the men despaired of ever reaching land.

Cargo of Codfish.
The Grace left St. John's on February 2nd with a cargo of dried fish from Alan Goodridge & Sons consigned to F. W. Bissett & Co. A heavy southeast gale was met that day which helped the vessel along well, and then, two days later, the wind veered around to the northwest and the Grace was driven off shore. It was bitter cold, and as the spray and seas came on board they froze as they fell. Decks, masts, rigging and sails were coated with ice, and before any of the sails could be shifted, the crew would have to go aloft and pound the canvas and running rigging with clubs to break of the ice.


Damaged in Gale.
During this gale the foretopmast stay carried away at the bowsprit, and before it was repaired the crew had an unpleasant time. An iron "grappling" was placed on the end of the stay where it carried away, and to affix this to the bowsprit again the men had to work between seas and at times they were buried under the giant combers into which the vessel thrust her bows.

Drifted to the South.
During this gale the little vessel "boxed the compass." The gale shifted into every quarter, and the weight of ice accumulating on the decks became so great that part of the cargo had to be thrown overboard to lighten her. Finally so frozen up that she was almost unmanageable, the Grace drifted southward before a northeast, and in warmer climes the ice dropped off masts and rigging, and she was once more headed back on her course.

It was only to meet with the same experience, and for three weeks the brigantine drifted back and forth,

sometimes as far east as the longitude of Cape Race, some times to the 49 N. Favorable slants of wind would be caught sometimes in which as much sail as possible would be set, then the wind would shift and under a foretopmast staysail and balance reefed mainsail, the little craft would lay to. Twice more she was leed up and only freed from her frosty coverings by being driven into the Gulf Stream. Again and again she shipped seas over her bows and poop that left a veneer of ice behind them, and she rode over many combers that would have overwhelmed her had they broken on her deck.

Early last week the vessel got the first good weather she has encountered on the voyage, and gradually she began to creep nearer to her destination. On Wednesday night Capt. Jackman made out what he thought was the entrance to Halifax harbor. It had been thick for several days with no opportunity to shoot the sun, but from his land reckoning it seemed as if the head ahead was Chebucto Head. The brig was coming along under easy sail when suddenly she struck with a jar that shook her from

It is reported that a large New York concern is endeavoring to secure favorable terms preparatory to erecting a large smoke house at Bay of Islands. Judge March may shortly leave for New York to complete arrangements.

First Drill in the New Armoury.
A. and B. Companies of the C. L. B. had their first drill in the new armoury, Harvey Road, last night. Lt.-Col. Rendell and the other officers of the brigade were present and the lads were put through physical drill, marching, manual exercises, &c., and showed their usual proficiency. The band also practised in their room and officers and lads alike are delighted with the new building, which looked fine when fully lit up.

Sixty Lives Lost

Calgary, March 7.—A terrible avalanche at Roger's Pass, near the summit of the Selkirk mountains, swept sixty-one men away into the gorge below late on Friday night, and it is believed all of them are dead.
A small snowslide had come down late in the afternoon covering the C. P. R. tracks, and a crew of a hundred men with a rotary snow plough were at work clearing the right of way when an immense mass of snow, ice and boulders swept down on them.
The accident occurred on Friday night at a particularly bad spot in the Rockies. Roger's Pass is between Field and Golden, three miles from Glacis, and at this spot the track goes through a gully or dip with mountains over 8,000 feet high on either side.
Eleven bodies have been recovered. Those of Conductor Buckley, Assistant Roadmaster Fraser, of Revelstoke; Fireman Griffiths, Brakeman Mahon, Engineers Phillips and Peteruff, F. Wagner and H. Martin, laborers, and three unidentified Japs.
Up to very recently the C. P. R. have prided themselves on the fact that no passenger had ever been killed on their mountain division. They have those dangerous divisions patrolled day and night, but this spring their work has been rendered more difficult owing to heavy rains and very mild weather.

Fell From Roof.

At 5.20 p.m. yesterday as Messrs. S. Knight and A. J. Barnes, carpenters, were engaged shingling the roof of Mr. John Keefe's house, Waldegrave Street, they narrowly escaped death by falling from it to the street, a distance of 16 feet. The scaffold they had erected they believed to be safe, but when Mr. Barnes removed to one side of it, the whole thing gave way and came with the men to the ground. They pitched out on a deep drain recently cut, and at first it was thought both were killed. They lay unconscious, but Mr. Keefe was fortunately home, and with his son, Philip, bore the men into his house, and using restoratives they revived, but were dazed for a long while. Knight's neck was badly hurt; Barnes had his wrist sprained, and both received several bruises. Dr. Tait was quickly on the scene and attended the men after which they were driven home.
