THE CROWNING OF HIS MAJESTY KING GEORGE V. AND

THE FORM AND ORDER. THEIR MAJESTIES' CORONATION.

THE PREPARATION.

In the merning upon the day of the Coronation early, care is to be taken that the Ampulla be filled with Oil, and together with the Spoon, be laid ready upon the Altar in the Abbey Church.

The Archbishops and Bishops Assistant being already vested in their Copes, the pro-cession shall be formed immediately outside of the west doer of the Church, and shall wait till notice is given of the approach of Their Majesties, and shall then begin to move into the Church.

THE ENTRANCE INTO THE CHURCH.

The King and Que n. as soon as they enter at the West door of the Church, are to be received with the following Anthem, to be sung by the cheir of Westminster.

Fsalm cxxxii, 1-3, 6, 7.
I was gled when they said unto me. We will go into the house of the Lord. Our feet shall stand in thy gates. O Jerusalem. Jerusalem is built as a city that is at unity in it-self. O pray for the peace of Jerusalem; they shall prosper that love thee. Peace be within thy walls and plenteousness within thy palaces.



THE RECESS. 
