SEA OF MARMORA HAS BEEN SOWN WITH HUNDREDS OF MINES.-MORE GUNS RANGED ALONG THE STRAIT.

London, April 22.—The Morning Post publishes from a resident of Constantinople a letter, dated March 27th, which shows the military preparations in the Turkish capital and neighborhood and the state of mind of the military party there. It asserts that 350,000 men have been massed in the Gallipoli Peninsula, to meet any land attacks by the Allies. and that there are 200,000 more in and around Constantinople. The letter reads:

Ravages of Rust.

One large railway firm suffers a oss of more than eighteen tons of metal daily, due solely to the effect of rust. Thus far, the only known preventive is to keep the metal surface always covered with a suitable paint. Some idea of the costliness of this remedy, however, may be gained from the fact that it requires about \$5,000 annually to paint one large railway bridge alone. A typical case of this kind is the Forth Bridge, upon which a corps of painters are constantly employed, as the weather makes repainting of one end of this large structure necessary before the workers have reached the other. Aviator Described.

Northern army. "De M" was sent with a sergeant, bombard a corner of the Belgian coast, where the Germans had been showing exceptional activity. They had to pass over a region where Roland Garros accomplished his most sensational exploits and where the Germans had installed a hundred anti-craft guns.

The aeroplane was piloted safely through a storm of shells, while the sergeant dropped bombs, according to instructions, and then turned towards the French lines, rising to a height of 9.000 feet, to avoid the hail shrapnel.

Suddenly a German shell smashed he front wheels and hurled through the machine, severing the aviator's left foot. The aeroplane began to lunge downward but "de M" gritted his teeth, and righted the machine keeping it headed toward camp. The sergeant, who thought they were done for, supported the pilot with his left arm, while with his right he started to pencil a farewell letter to his mother. British generals, the journal says, are not in the habit of enlightening the world with all sorts of details about

themselves. "Kitchener." the journal continues. 'is taciturn even for an Englishman. Moreover, he does not pay overfrequent visits to the British troops in France, but prefres to remain in Whitehall at the War Office, when he controls the enormous war machine which he is hurling against us from all corners of the globe and which he has, in the first place, to piece together. It is the historic experience in all British wars that their organisation is never ready at the beginning of the operations and that the real preparations have always to be begun after the outbreak of hostili-

"Field Marshal Horatio Herbert Kitchener is the embodiment of British will power, British toughness and British concentration. We do not know whether he has accepted the task of fighting the German nation in arms with pleasure. He is in no way equal to the undertaking, because he lacks the first quality of the great general, namely, the psychological sense. Kitchener does not possess the slightest understanding of the souls of the people he is fighting or controlling. He is the personification of the soulless British imperial machine which wages war by means of bargains and intrigues. It is for that very reason that his compatriots believe in him."
