

Devasting fire swept part of Water Street this morning, starting in a fine house owned by Monsignor McCarthy, opposite Rorke's store, then crossing the street destroyed Hogan's dwelling and barn, Brocklehurst's dwelling and next, also Soper's dwelling, next to Penny's store. Town was saved by splendid work of Carbonear volunteer fire brigade and citizens generally.

Fire starting in a store occupied by Charles Penny, of Carbonear, occurred at that place this morning and resultedi in the total destruction of practi-cally all the residential and business section on both sides of Water Street within a space of a little over 100 yds. The property destroyed includes Penny's store where the fire originated, a house adjoining the same, Rorke's store and its contents, Brocklehurst's drug store and residence, Soper's residence, the McCarthy Hotel and a residence adjoining, Hogan the butcher's dwelling, and an adjacent barn, the whole representing a loss of about \$150,000 very little of which is cover-

ed by insurance. The fire was discovered by Thomas McCarthy, son of Mrs. McCarthy, the McCarthy, son of Mrs. McCarthy, the proprietress of the hotel,. He woke about three o'clock this morning to find his bedroom illumined by the flame from Penny's store which by this time was nearly demolished. He dressed hurriedly and routed the occupants of the hotel and sent in an alarm. The volunteer fire brigade and a large gathering of citizens were soon on the scene but they were unsoon on the scene but they were unable to cope with the flames which were spreading fast in all directions. Having started at Penny's store the flames spread east to Soper's dwelling and west to Rorke's store, thence across the street to Hogan the butcher's, then to Brocklehurst's drug store where the drugs, of which a large quantity was stored, helped the con-lagration. From Brocklehurst's the fire went to the McCarthy Hotel and to the house adjoining. By 7 o'clock, four hours after the fire began, all the property mentioned had been destroyed, and other buildings that were in danger had been torn down to help prevent the total destruction of the town. The fire brigade and citizens worked hard, and despite the excite-



It is not an impossibility. I just leave the suggestion with you for the present. Will you think it over?
