his undertakings He married a daughter of a famous He married a daughter of a famous fish-killer of Harbor Grace, the late Captain Patrick Kelly, who survives him. There are also seven children surviving, viz.: Miss Lizzie, a Graduate Nurse; Charles, now conducting the business; William, Assistant Post-Master, and Ronald, Principal of the R. C. Academy, all at Harbor Grace; Michael, Mgr. and shareholder in Joyce Bros., & Co. of Boston, Mass, and Mrs. Thomas Keefe and Mrs. Har-

ry Strapp of the same city.

The late Mr. Kennedy was an exemplary citizen in every way, ever ready for any public service. In his early years and in middle life no novement in his adopted city wasomplete without his so-operation. His advice was sought on all occasions. OFFICIAL.

LONDON, Aug. 7. Australian, Kent, Surrey and Sussex troops during the week advanced west and north of Pozieres on a 3.000 yards front, capturing the enemy's main second line system, and several hundred prisoners.

Obituary.

MICHAEL T. KNIGHT.

The news of the passing of Mr. Michael T. Knight yesterday, while it could not have been altogether unexpected, was heard with sorrow by idents of the city. The venerable tizen had attained the age of 84, and tied full of years and honor. He belonged to an earlier generation, and for some years had lived in the quiet the bustling world roll on without; but he always remained the same kindly and genial friend to all that knew him and, in knowing, loved and espected him.

There was no more loyal native of St. John's than Michael Knight. He was born on January 29th, 1832. This, we might remind our readers, was the year the Reform Bill was passed in England; the year that saw the death of Goethe and of Sir Walter Scott: Wellington was still living. Educated first under Joseph Bacon and later at Castle Rennie under Messrs. Newman and Nugent-ancient and honored names they are now!-Mr. Knight entered business as a clerk in the employ of P. Rogerson & Co. His first connection with the public life of the Colony began in 1865, from which ime until 1876 he held the position of Collector of Customs on the Labrador. He resigned it to become Secretary o the Board of Works. In 1882 he stood for the District of Bay de Verde, but was unsuccessful. Three years later he was returned member for Twillingate and for four years was Financial Secretary. Another unsuccessful candidature followed in 1889, but he was elected in 1893 and became Survevor General the next year. This was the last time he sat in the Legislature. but he soon afterwards was appointed Deputy Minister of Public Works, retiring a few years ago on a pension. No man was more faithful to his country, his city and his friendships than Mr. Knight. He is remembered as one who brought to the vocation of olitics no feeling of animosity whatever. His enemies were such in a political sense alone. He never resented criticism, which consequently was never directed bitterly against him; he was the first to appreciate a jest against himself. His memory is enshrined in the hearts of many in our city and island as that of a true, onorable and kindly gentleman. His wife, a sister of Mr. Stephen March, died a few years ago. He leaves a brother, Mr. J. R. Knight, of Military Road, and a sister, Mrs. Heyfield, widow of the late Rev. Jesse Heyfield, to whom the Telegram offers its sympathy in their bereavement. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon, from his late residence on Circular Road.


