



The Casualty List.

Once more the price of victory has fallen heavily on our brave Regiment. It was known that it must marked it out for-how great a part we have yet to learn-and a casualty we have yet to learn—and a casualty list was looked for almost as a matter of course. It has come, or the first part of it, and the blow is a terribly severe one, the worst since last July. It is true that not one of the names of the officers contained in it, names of the most splendid types of our manhood, bears the fatal "Killed" opposite it, but many of them are under the almost more torturing deder the almost more torturing designation "Missing." In each case hope remains, but the hope which has so often been cruelly disappointed that none will place too much reliance in it. None the less it exists, and the rather striking fact that none of these officers is definitely reported killed indicates that the nature of the fight-ing may have been peculiar and dif-ferent from that of former occasions. Thus there is always the possibility that some of these men were seen to fall (and therefore are reported wounded), and were afterwards picked up by other troops in the impetuous advance. The very nature and un-usual classification of the list encourages some such impression, and the best consolation we can offer is that it is quite impossible as yet to form any definite conclusions. All will pray that their worst fears be not realized, for the names on the list are household names with us, the are household names with us, the best in the Regiment. They tell a story which we hardly need the messages to confirm, and the messages will soon come. They will tell of deeds worthy of the regiment that has been mentioned in despatches. They do not need to tell of the heroism of those that led it: we know it already.



STRIKES IN GERMANY.

The Berlin Vorwaerts, a copy of which has been received here, says the male and female workers of the Deutsche Waffer and Munitions Fabriken of Berlin decided on Wednesday after three hours debate not to resume work, but to send a deputation to the Imperial Chancellor. The result of the interview with the Chancellor was to have been communicated to a meeting of workers which was fixed for to-day. The Cologne Gazette reports various strikes in Leipzig. It says also that a large meeting was held at Stotteritz, Saxony, for discussion of the scarcity of food and that after the meeting the participants marched in procession through the town. The newspaper does not state whether the munition workers took part in the demonstration or whether work was resumed.

TROUBLE ON MEXICAN BORDER

ELPAZO, To-day. Snipers who fired at an American sentry stationed at the Viaduct in the sentry stationed at the Viaduct in the suburbs of this city were fired upon in return by a squadron of United States soldiers late to-day. One American was seen to fall after a volley had been fired across the border. When the Mexican Consul Bravo reported the affair to Brigadier General George Bell, Jr., General Bell informed the Consul that the American sentry had been fired upon and had obey-ed orders in returning the fire.

The uniform failures of the Ger mans to resist the steady and metho dical pressure of the French is the outstanding feature of the operations to-day in the great offensive on the Aisne and in the Champagne. It is clear that General Nivelle's armies are in no danger of losing the initiative and that gradually but surely all the sali-ents along the Soissons-Auberive front are being crushed. The principal salient to which the enemy had clung formed an angle where the front running south from St. Quentin hing-ed to the line and running eastward towards Rheims. Caught as in a vise by the troops advancing northwest from Laffaux and northwest from Vailly and Chavonne, the angle collapsed yesterday and Fort Conde was captured. Substantial progress was made in the centre ground being won East and West of Craonne, which is gradually being enveloped. In the Champaigne section on the right strong positions still held by the enemy are falling one by one. A War President.

Springfield Republican: Lincoln's idea, that if he saved the Union, people would forget his mistakes, but that if he failed to save the Union, 10,000 angels could not turn aside the penalty that would descend upon him, was a true estimate of a war President's position. A sound judgment as of the real objects of the war is primarily essential to ultimate success. Lincoln's judgment was so clearly and definitely formulated that his mind easily grasped the fundamental strategy of military conquest. An English military critic has written, within the past few months, that the British Government in the summer of 1914 knew as little about war as Lincoln did in the psring of 1861, but that, after two years of the present European conflict, he only wished that the British Government had learned by the summer of 1863. A successful war President does not need to be a trained soldier; he does not even need to have studied professionally the principles of military science. A states man from civil life like the elder Pitt, or Cavour or Lincoln-and one might include Bismark in the list-may so accurately envisage the objects of a war that no soldier may surpass him in his grasp of the war.

Put a limit Upon Profits

Philadelphia Ledger: - What the United States must do is to fix a fair and even a liberal profit for manufacturers. Beyond that no producer should be permitted to go, and the indications are that he will not be so permitted. It would be folly multiplied by reckless waste for the country to saddle upon all the people the burden of paying outrageous prices for articles needed in war in order that a vey few might reap large profits. Our country has indulged in its industrial "champagne jag," and it is now time to sober up. Unheard-of profits have been made during the last two years-made out of the belligerents in Europe and out of private individual consumers here in America. Now, with the United States itself at war, there must come as one of the very first strokes of conflict a firm Government grip upon the price of all commodities. We have already fixed it upon the total salable product of our second largest industry, the railroads, so that others cannot complain of like treatment.

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
