

# Bottomley.

#### HIS LIFE IN PRISON-AN APPEAL LODGED

Mr. Horatio Bottomley has lodged an appeal in the offices of the Court of Criminal Appeal against his conviction and sentence. In consequence of the vacation of 10 days, it is scarcely possible that the appeal can be heard before the third week of June. Meanwhile the prisoner is being held in custody in hospital (the usual course with an appellant against conviction) at Wormwood Scrubs Prison. Mr. Bottomley, who invariably attended Epsom in style, spent his Derby Day in the solitude of a prison infirmary cubicle. He was awake early, having passed a restless night, and when his frugal breakfast was served he remarked to the warder what a heavenly afternoon the crowds would enioy at Epsom.

The meal consisted of two slices of bread and butter and a mug of tea. There was a trace of emotion in his voice as he mentioned the Derby, says the Evening Standard, for in his time he has had his financial stake in the event on many occasions, added to which his own colours-vermilion and black-had scored minor successes in the Epsom meetings.

Mr. Bottomley's first visitors on Derby Day were the governor of the prison, accompanied by the doctor. The medical examination showed that he is still suffering from the effects of nervous exhaustion. He complained of the great heat and said how much he would like to be in the open air.

After the governor's visit he put on his prison jacket and trousers and the disc bearing his identity number. He delved into his appeal papers and made copious notes, which he talked over later in the day with Mr. J. A. Richardson, his solicitor. Mr. Bottomley seems confident about his ultimate success of his appeal. If it fails it will be followed by a great petition to the Home Secretary praying for a remission of the sentence on account of his health and age. In his pocket when he was convicted recently were six grand stand tickets for the racing at Epsom. Mr. Horatio Bottomley on Friday applied through counsel to the Judge in Chambers, at the High Court for bail in order that he might the better prepare his case for appeal. The application was refused. Mr. Lloyd Richardson, Mr. Bottom-

ley's solicitor, has described to the Sunday Pictorial an interview which took place at Wormwood Scrubbs between Mr. Bottomley and his wife and daughter, the latter being the wife of Mr. Jeff Cohn, a well-known racing man. "Mr. Bottomley's wife," said Mr. Richardson, "was overcome with grief and Mr. Bottomley was much affected."-Glasgow Weekly Herald.

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

# Parliament Must Pay. TAXPAYERS HAVE TO MAKE DAM.

AGES GOOD. LONDON, (Associated Press) -LONDON, (Associated Frees) While the Irish people burn buildings and destroy property in Ireland, it is the people of the sister Island who have to pay the bills. Part of these costs are taken frm the natinal treas-ury by Parliament and part are viountary contributions given to the funds being raised in England by the sym-pathisers of sufferers in both sections of Ireland. The Irish Secretary, Sir Hamar Greenwood, recently proposed in the House of Commons a grant of £750.000, as compensation for damages to property in northern Ireland during the disorders of the past three years. During the excited debate which followed he explained that by agreement between Colonial Secretary Churchill, and Sir James Craig, Prime Unister of the Ulster Government, the British Government promised to . pay Ulster £1,500,000 for damages committed up to the first of January. This does not cover the amount the national treasury will grant to Ireand by any means.

MILLIONS FOR RELIEF. Sir Hamar Greenwood told the House there would be also an appropriation of another £1.500,000 for relief work for Catholics and Protestants in Northern Ireland, as well as a further estimate of £2,000,000 to compensate Crown employees, most of them have lost their positions through the establishment of the new government. The total awards made by the courts in Northern Ireland to persons who have suffered .damages amount to \$2,000,000, so that with the British Government defraying £1,000,000 there will be £500.000 for the Ulster government to deal with. The courts have passed on the claims submitted in the North, which has simplified matters. In the South most of the British courts have been suppressed, and where courts have been sitting many claimants were afraid to appear. Accordingly it is now possible only to estimate the claims of Southern Treland, Sir Hamar Greenwood estimated these at about £11,000,000, but hoped they would ultimately be reduced by half. Hence the grand total of damage to be paid to individuals by the British government for the civil war, or civic disturbances in Ireland, is about £10,000,000. 

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

Worth Noting.


If tiny corks are tacked on the back of the lower corners of picture frames they will prevent the line of black dust forming on the wallpaper, which leaves an ugly mark.

When baking cakes, particularly when the gas stove is used, the tin which contains the cake should be put inside another tin which has a layer of sand. This will keep the cake from burning.

To make icing white, strained lemon juice should be added. To tint it a pretty cream. strained orange juice may be used. For a delicate pink. pour a little boiling water over some strawberry or raspberry jam, strain, then mix with sugar. These colourings have the advantage over ordinary ones, as they impart a nice flavor to the icings.

Moths can be kept away from furs or clothes by putting a piece of linen damped in turpentine in drawers or wardrobes. This should be renewed once or twice during the year. Moths will never attack carpets or curtains which have been well sprinkled with salt.

Before arranging maidenhair fern in vases, soak it for two hours in cold water, then singe the ends of the stems with a match. Ferns thus treated will last three times longer, and keep fresh and green for several days.



FOR CHEAP ELECTRIC POWER.

The city of St. John, Newnswick, will shortly borrow \$900,000 to establish an electrical power distributing system in that city.

From 10,000,000 to 15,000,000 of hydro electric power will be purchased from the New Brunswick Power Commission at a cost of about 1.2 cents per k.w.h. The power distribution will be in charge of a civic commision which has been appointed by the city and will have entire charge of the construction and financing of the system as well as its operation after

It is estimated that the cost of the system will be \$900,000 and approval has been given by the city council of St. John to a proposal to spend this sum of money for the construction of the system.
