On the motion for Riel's expulsion, 53 from Quebec voted against it, 5 from Nova Scotia, 2 from New Brunswick, 3 from Ontario, 3 from Prince Edward's Island, 1 from Manitoba, and 1 from British Columbia—68 in all. The names were the same as those on the second vote on Mr. Holton's amendment, except that the seven who having voted for delay, having tailed to obtain it, gave their third vote for expulsion. There was within nine of a full House. Only two Quebec members voted against Riel; Mr. Mackenzie, of Montreal, and Mr. Scriver, of Huntington. The great strength of the vote on his behalf came from that Province, but was not strong enough to effect anything in his favor. On the vote for amnesty there were 21 from Quebec, 3 from Nova Scotia, 1 from New Brunswick, 1 from Manitoba, and one from British Columbia. The Vote on Riel's Expulsion.

The Schooner Metter Lost. — On Sunday last the propeller Milwaukee found a small schooner in distress about thirty miles west of Kingston. COUNTY OF WELLINGTON BY-LAW NO.

A BY-LAW for the purpose of providing for the erection of a new Town Hall and Market House in the Town of Guelph, and for the issue of Twenty five thousand dollars of Debentures

for that purpose.

WHEREAS, it is expedient to erect a new Town Hall and Market House in the Town of Guelph required for the use of the Corporation of the said Town, and on land belonging to the Corporation.

And whereas, it is necessary and expedient for the Corporation of the Town of Guelph to raise by way of loan the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars for the purpose of providing for the amount required in the erection of the said new Town Hall and Market House.

the said new Town Hall and Market House.

And whereas, it will require an amount of two thousand one hundredand eightyone dollars to be raised antually by special rate on all taxable property within the nunicipality of the Town of Guelph for paying the said debt and interest under this By-law.

And whereas, the amount of the whole rateable property of the municipality of the Town of Guelph, irrespective of any future income thereof, and irrespective of any increase in the nature of tolls, interest or dividends, or returns from the said work; and also, irrespective of any interest from the temporary investment of the sinking fund or principal money to be raised hereunder, or any part thereof, was according to the last revised Assessment Roll \$2,099,100.

And whereas, the existing debt, including debentures issued for Municipal Loan Fund debt of the said municipality is for principal, the sum of one hundred and seventeen thousand seven hundred and nine dollars, and for interest the sum of nit dollars.

And whereas, it is intended to make the said debt repayable in twenty annual instalments, such instalments to be of such amounts that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest during each of the other years of such period, such instalments to be as follows:—

And whereas, a copy of this By-law with due notice hath been duly published according to law.

Be it therefore enacted, by the Corporation of the Town of Guelph aforesaid, by the Council thereof, by and with the assent of the electors aforesaid, and the consent and approval of His Excellency the Licutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario in Council, and by virtue of the Acts of Parliament in that behalf, as follows:—

1.—That it shall be lawful for the

said Mayor, and he is hereby authorized and required to cause Debentures to be made for such sums of money as may be required, not exceeding in the whole the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars, and not less than one hundred dollars each, and to negotiate and dispose of such Debentures, and that the said Debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the said Corporation of the Town of Guelph, and signed by the said Mayor, and counter-signed by the said Mayor, and counter-signed by the said Treasurer.

3.—That the said Debentures shall be made payable in twenty years, by instalments as aforesaid, at the office of the Treasurer of the said municipality, and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest, which interest shall also be payable at the office of the said Treasurer.

4.—That the said Debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of six per cent, per annum from the date thereof, and the same shall be payable half yearly.

5.—That for the purpose an equal special rate of one and a tenth mills in the dollar shall in addition to all other rates, be raised, levied and collected in each year upon all the rateable property in the said municipality during the continuance of the said pebentures or any of them.

6.—That the proceeds of the said Debentures shall be applied in paying for the erection of the said now on Hall and Market House, but no person taking the said Debentures or any of them shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

7.—That this By-law shall take effect upbn from and after the Sixth day of June in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon, and at the places hereinafter mentioned, being every place in the municipality at which elections of members of the Council therein are held; and the persons hereunder named are hereby appointed
