DESPICABLE DOLLAR DIPLOMACY

No sane person will say that the attitude of the Great Powers towards the youthful Chinese republic does them the least credit. The softest term to use is that it is utterly and shamefully disgraceful, and has reflected upon the three great democratic peoples, viz., Great Britain, France and the United States of America.

How far the spirit of Mammon has power to obstruct the path of the spirit of righteousness is only too lamentably illustrated in the humiliating case of Great Britain, the United States and France. What a terrible Triple Alliance those three great and powerful peoples could become!

And now we are told that the election contributions of contractors to Sir James Whitney's campaign fund are very trifling, because the contribution only amounted to \$400. They say that it couldn't have been a real contract which yielded only that sum for election purposes.

INLAND REVENUE RETURNS. The inland revenue returns for the month of April, as given out yesterday, are incomplete, but they show that during that month the revenue of the department was in the neighborhood of \$65,000. During the month of April, 1912, the revenue for the same department was \$59,000, so that in a year's time the revenues for the district of Calgary have increased by the huge amount of 30 per cent.

Trudeau of Loyd George Resigns. London, May 2.—Mr. Kebley Fletcher, whose challenge to Loyd George that the latter's transactions in Marconi shares has hitherto been ignored, has resigned from parliament on account of the condition of his health.

THE CALGARY MARKET. City's Credit Better Than Other Western Cities

Mayor Insists That Difficulty is Due Entirely to Attitude of Bank

"The city's credit is good. There is really no cause for all the criticism which is being made just now," said Mayor Sminot yesterday, when he was asked how the resolution passed by the board of trade had appealed to his judgment.

"As I have said before, there is absolutely no doubt of the city's position nor of the ability of our fiscal agent to raise the money we need. It is purely a matter of willingness. The Bank of Montreal adopts a paternal attitude toward us, and it is this rather than any real financial stringency which has caused the present conditions. The bank assumes that it has the right to investigate our proposed extensions of sewers and water mains and street railway, and to say whether we shall or shall not have these things this year. That is what it amounts to."

"We are in a better position to do business than Edmonton or Vancouver or other western cities. Until Edmonton placed its recent issue it owed money to contractors and had enormous local debts outstanding on school buildings, etc. Outside of our bonds and treasury notes, we have a clear slate."

Building permits yesterday were slack and the few taken out were but small matters and the sum received considerably less than \$5,000. Alterations will be made in the Lyric Theatre which will mean a greater degree of comfort and beauty in the auditorium and hall. The other permits were mostly for houses and shacks. It is hoped that within the next few weeks more permits will be taken out so as to make the building trade more brisk in this city.

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Editorial Notes

Though there was much of the information at the meeting of the Board of Trade which was misleading and the conclusions were far from the mark there was some criticism which was not without value. The comment upon the work of the Industrial Bureau, much as we all regret to say it, was not without justification. It is possible that the bureau is working under difficulties at the present time, but it is even more certain that the results are not as great as the citizens had expected and no fraction of what the bureau promised.

Misunderstood. A couple of days ago in this very column The Albertan referred to the gift of prophesy of one of its Conservative weekly contemporaries who guessed the outcome of the election exactly right, but for the good of the party held his peace about it. Last night The Calgary News-Telegram rebuked The Albertan and takes criticism to itself. In the future we shall place a more conspicuous label upon any near tumor.

"EQUAL WORK AND EQUAL PAY."
Address to Suffrage Society by Miss Coutts; Tribute to the Late Dr. Amelia Yeomans.

That woman had been taught to consider herself the inferior of man for so long, and not having chosen the various fields of industry now open to her, so much as remaining, content with their economic conditions, was the reason put forward by Miss Coutts as to why woman is content to accept whatever remuneration her employer cares to give her for her services.

In a very able manner Miss Coutts addressed the Calgary Women's Suffrage society yesterday afternoon in the Public Library, a large and enthusiastic number of women being present.
"Although meekness is an admirable feminine quality," said Miss Coutts, "it can be carried too far, when it becomes allied with 'fear,' and its offspring are selfishness and oppression."
In Miss Coutts' opinion, when a woman depreciates her own value to her employer, she puts before him a temptation which, if he be an exploiter of labor, he finds it hard to resist. On the other side, the sense of injustice which a woman feels who is doing equal work in equal quantity and quality with a male worker, and is yet not receiving equal remuneration, results on the woman and embitters her, making a tremendous loss to society.
"This request of equal work and equal pay is a determined effort to break down artificial fancies," said Miss Coutts.

Continuing, she urged that those women who felt that they could do certain work should go out and do it, even if it lay outside of marriage and home, for when the right man came she knew feminine instinct would be too strong to let them forego their highest sphere.

Miss Coutts spoke of the economic rulers who objected to paying a woman an equal wage lest they turn her mind aside to single blessedness. No such provision, she urged, was made for men. If the idea was that each young man expected to marry some day, and was preparing for this day, she added, so with each woman, and her preparations were often more sane than his.

On the other hand, the woman might be laying by for old age, or assisting her brother through college, or her brother's children through school, or her father because he was too degenerate to help himself. "Why

Dr. H. A. Gibson's Scholarship Result

A unique and interesting examination took place in the board room of the Public Library last evening, for Dr. H. A. Gibson's scholarship in Social History. The examination was divided into three general divisions, the industrial, and social history of England, France and Germany throughout the nineteenth century, as well as the contemporary situation in those countries.

The question put to the candidates by Professor Eastman demanded a thorough knowledge of the work, and covered wide reading and thoughtful consideration of facts presented both in lectures and books.

The students examined are to be congratulated on their application to the work as shown by their answers. A group of subject, and ability to express themselves. To those who "took" history a few years ago and to whom history had no personal interest, except as a story, the making of this subject into a live personal issue appealing to, and affecting us all, is a great change and much to be applauded.

The examination consisted of sets of questions tracing the various social changes in their own development down the century. All the candidates answered exceedingly well, showing admirable knowledge and an intelligent appreciation of the questions involved.

The scholarship was awarded to Orrin E. Wright, Mr. Alfred received honorable mention.

Then, in the name of common justice," asked Miss Coutts, "should women be placed under a man, and not be granted the rewards of her labors, even with the idea of not requiring help from the country later on?"

On the conclusion of Miss Coutts' address, some discussion arose as to the conditions of work and pay in Calgary. One member stated that she thought the schools of the city gave equal pay for equal work, irrespective of sex; while two other members challenged the statement, declaring that it was not so, but that men started higher and could reach a greater height of salary than a woman could.

With regard to stenographers, another member stated a case of a woman stenographer who, after five years in one office, during which she had created her work and proved her value, attained the princely salary of \$85 per month. On talking of leaving she received \$5 of a rise, but when she finally left, a boy, several years her junior and without experience in her special line, began with \$90 per month. Other cases were mentioned, a question arising as to whether store hands received equal wages without consideration of sex.

Before closing the chairman paid a tribute to the memory of the late Dr. Amelia Yeomans, stating, among other things, that Dr. Yeomans, though out of sight, was not out of thought, she was woman and human, and we were proud to have her one of us," said the chairman. In connection with the Suffrage society, she stated that Dr. Yeomans had done splendid work, and round the growth of the movement her spirit still seemed to hover and give its blessing, as she herself had given it from the Library platform.

The secretary was authorized to tender the sympathy of the society to the relatives of the dear old lady. A vote of thanks was afterwards tendered Miss Coutts on her really excellent address.

Two Scholarships Are Awarded

Two university scholarships were awarded yesterday. The Harold W. Riley scholarship of \$50 in the department of English was awarded to Miss Jessie Gibson, while the scholarship offered in European social history by Dr. H. A. Gibson was gained by Orrin E. Wright.

The Riley scholarship is given in the results of the opening examinations. Alfred E. Moseley gained the highest marks in the examination, but, as he had not complied with all the requirements, it was given to the next in order of merit, Miss Gibson.

The Gibson scholarship is given for European social and economic history from the era of the French Revolution till the present time. The written examination was held a week ago, and on Wednesday there was an oral examination. Mr. Wright stood first, while Mr. Moseley gained honorable mention, being a good second.

Local Regulation for "Movies" Wanted

"Managers Give Public What It Wants," Says Rev. A. D. McDonald

That local regulation is the one way in which to cope with the moving picture problem, was given as his opinion by Rev. A. D. McDonald yesterday afternoon in the Y.W.C.A.

Addressing a meeting of the committee for dealing with objectionable pictures, Mr. McDonald stated that while the "movies" had a good educational value and made a strong demand on the part of the public, the managers of the show was its chief attraction, he said, while many of the films were full of adventure, they had also a certain amount of interest in keeping children away from school and causing them to obtain money by questionable means. The managers of the show were asked their co-operation in keeping children from attending such shows during school hours, and after 8 p.m., unless accompanied by parents or guardians. From each of the managers he had received a courteous reply and promised assistance with promises had been fulfilled, many of the shows now posting notices prohibiting children inside during the hours mentioned.

On many films were shown, others had a bad effect on the child mind and these, Mr. McDonald thought, should not be permitted. It had already been proved, he urged, that a board of censors for a state or county was not enough, and the idea of local regulation which had been approved during the last session of the House, should be put into operation. Each city should have a censor who would say what should and what should not appear in that particular city. Then and then only could such things be dealt with adequately. Meanwhile, if a sufficiently large body of influential public requested the managers of shows to discriminate and to cut out some of the objectionable pictures, the police would be justified in informing the police who would be legally forced to act in the matter.

LOCAL STAGE GOSSIP OF THE WEEK.
The Green Room Club certainly justified its existence this week when it recommended, through the Play-going committee, the bright little farce comedy, "Little Miss Brown." Not in many months has a play received such an enthusiastic reception from local theatre-goers, and yet, notwithstanding the endorsement of the Green Room club, and the enthusiasm aroused on the opening night, the production did not extend in any great volume to the box office, which, after all, is the thermometer in the theatrical business. It seems unfortunate that in two important productions Mr. W. A. Prady has sent us this season "Thought and Paid For" and "Little Miss Brown"—the attendance has been most disappointing, although the standard of the productions in each instance fully justified large audiences at every performance.

"Little Miss Brown" is one of the cleanest and brightest little farce comedies that has ever visited Calgary, and nobody could wish to see a better-balanced company than presented the play here. There is some encouragement in the fact that the audience in attendance at the last performance was the largest of the season, but the attraction received nothing like the patronage it deserved.

"The Merry Widow" the joy of all milliners and modistes and elixir of life to the "tired business man," will be here in all her glory next week, and her appearance promises to be the big amusement event of the month.

The press agent has extolled the wonders of his production, but a few facts about the composer of this famous operetta may not be amiss at this particular time, in order that the credit may be given where it belongs.

For a man who has written so world sweeping a success as "The Merry Widow," little is known in this country about Franz Lehár. He was born in 1870 at Komorn, which is a royal free city of Hungary, and he calls himself a child of the knapsack.

Lehár was just 25 when he composed "The Merry Widow," which had its production at the Theatre an der Wien in Vienna, along with a few dozen other operettas. Certain Viennese theatres had a habit of producing operettas very rapidly one after the other, giving to each a two weeks' run, and "The Merry Widow" got its premiere along with many commonplace works in this fashion.

When Lehár was composing "The Merry Widow," Leo Stein, who was the author of the book, found endless fault with the composer, and rejected number after number, sending the music back to Lehár with curt notes saying, "This waltz has no movement at all" or "Is this a military or a funeral march air?" Stein was a dilettant with a reputation—Lehár was little known.

Lehár is so modest as almost to be devoid of personality in the sense of being unusual, striking, interesting. Two striking facts that are little known in this country are that Lehár started writing first not operetta, but grand opera. With these ambitious undertakings he had no success. So he dropped into the less pretentious work and great has been his reward. Another fact that should interest Americans is that Dvorak, the composer, was the man who advised Lehár to become a composer. Lehár tells of this as follows:

"My mother often told me that I always could find a four-year-old boy to each melody the right accompaniment on a piano. I composed my first song at six years, and dedicated it to my mother. When 11 years old I left the house of my parents to study at a German gymnasium at Sternberg.

It very often happened that I faint-ed in the streets from hunger, but as my mother visited me once in Prague, I had the courage not to complain.

"My director observed that I neglected my violin, and he recommended to me to study with Dvorak. In 1887 I submitted to Dvorak two compositions, "Sonata in Antiqua" in G major and "Sonata in Antiqua" in D minor.

"Dvorak looked at the work and said: 'Hang your fiddle on a nail and write a composition.' This was spoken out of the soul, but my father insisted that I become a first-class violinist.

"Weber said once: 'The first dogs and the first operas belong in the water.' This also refers to my first opera. In April, 1894, I was musical director of the Austrian navy band and conducted a concert for Emperor William II, who expressed great satisfaction. On November 25, 1896, my opera "Kukuska," later called "Tatiana," was produced for the first time in Leipzig, but was no success.

"I had to give up my position as conductor of the navy band on account of financial difficulties, and had to take my jewels to the pawnshop. I accepted a position as conductor in Trieste. I was sick and tired of composing operas, and now started composing operettas. With this I had more luck, but about this some other time."

It was a happy thought which prompted the Calgary-Hamilton Old Boys' club to extend some social courtesies to Mr. Charles Meakin, the leading tenor with "The Merry Widow" company. Mr. Meakin was for many years a rule and a law in the Calgary Paper office, and now started composing operettas. With this I had more luck, but about this some other time."

TABLOID MUSICAL COMEDY THE FEATURE OF NEXT WEEK'S ORPHEUM BILL.
Louis A. Simon and Kathryn Osterman will appear as the stars in "A Persian Garden," the miniature musical comedy that headlines next week's bill at the Orpheum. "A Persian Garden" is fully up to the high standard set by "Puss in Boots," "California," and a number of the tabloid acts that have recently visited the Orpheum. The book is by Edgar Allen Wolf, and the music by Ansel Friedman. Mr. Simon enacts the role of a valet and Miss Osterman is seen as a much-married ex-chorus girl, and the twin combination of natural talents. They are supported by a clever company of 14 people. Miss Osterman is spoken of as one of the best-dressed actresses in vaudeville, and that is where they do dress.

"The Talkies" have settled down to be a regular part of the Orpheum bill, and the patrons look forth to their advent with no end of pleasure. Next week another change will take place for the benefit of the attendants.



IN THE THOUSANDS

Immigration Agent Says Most Settlers Are Coming to the Most Westerly of the Prairie Provinces

Mr. Black thinks that not only Britain but also the continental countries like Scandinavia, France, Russia and Germany will send large numbers of settlers in the next few years.
