

FIFTEENTH YEAR
WILL RESCIND THE EMBARGO

IF CATTLE NOW LANDING PROVE TO BE HEALTHY.

Mr. Gardner Declines to Withdraw the Restrictions Immediately—Concerning the Recent Quarantine Regulations—Correspondence With Newfoundland's Governor Will Not Be Discussed.

LONDON, April 23.—Sir Francis H. Evans asked the Government to lay before the House the correspondence which had been furnished in regard to the prorogation of the Newfoundland Legislature. Mr. Sydney Buxton, Under Colonial Secretary, declined to disclose the correspondence. The telegrams which had passed were of an extremely confidential nature. He would say, however, that the Government had proposed that the Legislature upon perfectly proper advice.

The question of rescinding the Embargo. Right Hon. Herbert Gardner, President of the Board of Agriculture, replying to questions, stated that the Government would make an immediate investigation into the question of the re-admission of Canadian cattle into England. He thought to a great extent a case had been made in favor of rescinding the regulations requiring that Canadian cattle should be slaughtered before they were landed. The enquiry would be conducted as a special matter and would occupy as little time as possible.

Right Hon. Henry Chaplin asked when the enquiry would begin. Mr. Gardner said the enquiry would begin when he had received the results of the investigation.

An Appalling Aspect of Affairs. ATHENS, April 23.—There were several slighter shocks of earthquake last night and today. Telegrams received from the shaken districts represent an appalling aspect of affairs. Whole villages in ruins and the survivors are camping out in many cases entirely without food. The total number of deaths is a doubt in many cases. It is reported that 120 were killed at Mallesina alone.

The King and Prince Nicholas, accompanied by their suites, arrived at noon on Monday at the village of Anafanika. They proceeded on horseback in order to visit several of the ruined villages.

Agricultural Depression in Prussia. BERLIN, April 23.—In the Prussian Diet today the bill providing for the establishment of Chambers of Agriculture was discussed. Count von Heyden, Minister of Agriculture, said that the position of husbandry in Prussia was so serious that it needed earnest attention. During the past year, he added, the mortgages on farms had increased by 1 1/2 milliards marks.

Emperor William Will Retire Thirty Generals. BERLIN, April 23.—Emperor William is about to retire 30 generals from his service. Several staff officers are also said to be marked for retirement. In all these cases the Emperor is carrying out his policy of reducing the military establishment.

Lord Justice of Appeal Russell. LONDON, April 23.—The appointment of Sir Charles Russell, Attorney-General, to the office of Lord Justice of Appeal in the Court of Appeal in Ordinary, in the room of the late Lord Bowen, is announced officially.

INDIA'S NEW TARIFF. Strictly An Act for the Raising of Revenue. WASHINGTON, April 23.—In a letter to the Department of State accompanying a copy of the new tariff law of India, the General Post of Calcutta says: "The act is strictly an act for the raising of revenue. This action has been necessary because of the increasing revenue required to meet the payments on the gold debt due from India to England resulting from the fall in the gold value of silver, which is the money of the country. The most remarkable feature of the act is that it allows manufacturers of cotton cloth to pay a duty of 40 per cent on the value of the cloth, a provision which has excited intense but ineffectual opposition."

WHITNEY ADMITS DEFEAT. Attempts Being Made to Arrive at a Settlement. ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., April 23.—The White House has received word that Whitney's defeat and there is no chance of dissolution, yet still refuse to place a Revenue bill.

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A Statue to William at Chicago. CHICAGO, April 23.—A statue of Shakespeare was unveiled in Lincoln Park to-day. The statue was erected in accordance with the provisions of the will of Samuel Johnson, who left \$10,000 for that purpose. It represents the poet sitting and holding a small book in his right hand.

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

will Bar Canadian Hoaxer... The Chicago Inter-Ocean has discovered that if the Wilson bill, as amended by the Senate Committee, becomes law

it will virtually prevent Canadian horses, either trotters or runners, from racing in the States

Under the present law, the United States tends to animals brought into the United States temporarily for a period not exceeding six months for the purpose of exhibition or competition

or for agricultural or racing association, but a bond shall be given in accordance with regulations prescribed by the Secretary of the Treasury

In the bill now under discussion the word "racing" is struck out, and horses crossing the line for racing purposes will be liable for duty every season

As the bill has not become law it is not too late to have the word reinstated, and Canadian horsemen should take steps to have this done at once

CANADIAN CRICKET ASSOCIATION.

Reporters Presented of a Progressive Season... The second annual meeting of the Canadian Cricket Association was held last evening in the Walker House

There were present Major Cosby in the chair, Messrs. K. Martin, Hamilton, G. S. Lyon, Reader, K. H. Cameron, secretary Ontario Cricket Association; H. F. Petman, hon. assistant secretary Ontario Cricket Association; J. Heall, Wanderers Club, Halifax; John E. Hall, hon. secretary

Two communications were read from Mr. Van Hornich regarding the suggestion of matches to be played between Toronto and Eastern Ontario, Toronto and Western Ontario and in matches between clubs of the association and visiting eleven

The suggestions contained in these communications were referred to the committee of the association to consider and report

Secretary Hall submitted his annual report. It showed that Ontario had made a praiseworthy effort to revive the game, and that the success of the new association in Manitoba had been rapid and continuous

An effort is being made by the Winnipeg Club to arrange a tournament for next August, and that the 10 to play against the Philadelphians be picked from the clubs competing there

A notice of motion, the report stated, had been introduced by the secretary of the association so as to provide for the admission of regularly organized clubs in any part of the Dominion to active membership on payment of an annual fee of \$5, such subscription to entitle the club to one representative on the Executive Committee

The financial statement showed that while the balance in the treasury was small there was no charge against the Association

Among the resolutions passed were the following: Any future eleven selected by the association shall be chosen from individual clubs in good standing with this association

It was also decided to admit clubs to membership on payment of an annual fee of \$5, such subscription to entitle such club to one representative on the Executive and two at the annual meeting

The story goes that Oxford has sent word to Yale and Harvard that she would be glad to race England in September

The proposition is that the American crew should go to England in August and the race will be rowed on the Thames as soon after as practicable

But breeders represent certain inherent characteristics, and though requiring the food early part a second planting of seed should be made as soon as the ground is warm

It is not again in time to plant seeds of tender plants too soon in this climate

Early peas will sometimes fail to germinate when the ground is cold, and the seed rots in the ground

In order to avoid disappointment in securing a second crop of peas, it is suggested that the seed should be planted in the middle of May, and the fine spring weather should not tempt too early planting, unless of course of vegetables that are not easily destroyed

125,900 MINERS ARE ON STRIKE.

Illinois, Ohio and Pennsylvania Affected—Strikers Generally Are Quiet—Only One Small Riot Reported... COLUMBUS, O., April 23.—There are now 125,900 miners on strike in the United States, according to the statement of President McBride of the United Mine Workers

All the men of Murfreesboro, in Southern Illinois, who the miners claim is the key to the situation, are out

A small riot was reported on Saturday in the Chesapeake and Ohio territory

Miners' mine holds a mass meeting Thursday to determine whether to join in the suspension

There is not a mine at work to-day in either the Clearfield or Jeck Creek, Pa., coal regions

No coal trains are running and everything is at a standstill

The miners are quiet but determined and no one expects any change in the situation until near the last of the week

A Mine Fire... COLUMBUS, O., April 23.—When the miners at the Somers mine went to resume work to-day they discovered that in the great strike they had lost their coal

NOT A WORKMAN'S PARADISE... The London Times has reached this conclusion concerning the U.S.
