TRADE MARKS.

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A new serzuro of American nets bas just been made in Lake Eric by the Government steamer Petrel. There were fourteen sturgeon gill nets and eight herring gill nets, and the seizure took place up at the cast end of the lake. Captain Dunn, of the Petrel, was informed by the people living along the shore that boats had been seen coming over from Buffalo, and the nets had likely been set by them. In any case there was no name on them and the owners have not yet claimed the property, so that they are certainly Americans.

In the Supreme Court on Saturday, the case of Lake Eric & Detroit River Rulway vs. Soles was proceeded with. The Lailway Company appeals from the judgment way Company appeals from the judgment of the Ontario Court of Appeal, which confirmed Judge McMahon's decision in favor of the plaintiff in the trial Court. The question as tried in the courts below was whether the goods of the respondent, burnt at the Railway Company's station at Berlin, Ontario, on the 7th February, 1895 were destroyed through the appellant, a negligence. On this appeal counsel for appealants argued that they were entitled to rely upon the conditions of shipping bills as exempting them from liability for bills as exempting them from liability for negligence. Against this it was contended that the conditions were not pleaded and that they applied to the Company as carriers, and not as warehouse men as to which a special contract was made. Judgment was reserved.

Last year business was much brisker in the Ontario salt industry than during 1894. Reports from the Maritime hatcheries indicate that the supply of salmon spawn will be far in excess of any previous year. This is just the season when the hatcheries are in full swing and a wire was received from the officer over the the Reatigouche hatchery this week conveying the information that there will not be sufficient accommodation in that institution for the spawn, and many of the parent fish may have to be liberated. The foregoing is a rather peculiar position of affairs and is distinctly a favorable sign for the Maritime fisheries.

A novel device looking to the capture of mackerel is about being tried on the Massachusetts coast. Capt Chase, of the steamer Peter B. Bradley, of Province-town, Mass, is the originator and leader in using the contrivance, which is nothing tising the contrivance, which is nothing less than an electrical engine designed to allure the mackerel to a certain spet, when the capture is almost certain of accomplishment. " In March last, the Montreal Butter and Cheese Association issued a cu-cular to the cheese manufacturers of Canada, strongly advising them in their own interests, as well as of the chee e trade generally, to discontinue the manufacture of fodder chees, knowing that the manufacture of these cheese fended to lower in a serious manner the price, as well as the high standard of our product in the British markets. The result of factorymen following the advice then given unquestionably caused the depletion of stocks in the British markets, and resulted in factorymen obtaining such a substantial advance for their fall

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ufacture of April or fodder cheese. The members of the association believe that it is strongly to the interest of the pr. ducers to only make cheese during those months most suitable for the production of the highest grade, and have no doubt but the net returns will be larger, and the character of our goods stand higher, if the

The result of the United States election has caused a rifore active movement. An element of uncertainty has now been removed that has adversely affected trade for many mont. .. As anticipated in our last large American orders have been cabled to the leading British wool and | clothing centers as it is naturally thought that the tariff will ultimately be raised against British manufacturers. This is already causing an advance in these lines in Britain. The wheat markets have been buoyant and Manitoba wheat shows a net gain of about 2c. In all staple lines there is more doing and a more cheerful tone is apparent than for some time. Refined sugars are steady to firm. Granlated is unchanged in first hands at 3; to 4c but vellows are scarce and higher with nothing to be got under Sc to 31c. Iron and metals are in fair demand. Hides are advancing and there is a better feeling in leather considerable sole leather having been exported. Tess are in good demand and dried fruits firm.

IRON AND HARDWARE.-The demand for Canada plates and in plates has continued brisk. Both articles are scarce here and packers and canners appear to have run out of slock. The canning trade has been active this season and more material than usual has been required. Since the date of our last report the winter schedule of freights has been put in force by the rail ways and this gave rise to a brisk shipping movement at the close of last week as the advance means money on heavy goods. Prices are steady to firm at quotations given in our prices current. A Toronto geologist asserts that the two systems of rocks known as the Laurentian and Huronian have long been thought by a number of geologists to have been of volcanic origin and to consist of a form of slag overlying the other formations. This may be of great depth in some places and in others it may be comparatively thin. If such is indeed the case, and from the latest results it in all probability is, it is quite possible that the first underlying strata or shale would be carboniferous or coal bearing. Fish curers are nearly sold out, but buyers in Scotland hold largely, and these must be greatly benifted by the extraordinary shortcoming in Norway. What is even more important, the Continental consumption of he rrings during winter and spring will probably exceed supplies. With mar-kets cleared of fish next year's trade gives promise of being very favorable to the interests of Scotch fish curers.

In Munit ha the average price of wheat is 60 cents for No. I hard, but as a matter of fact, husiness is now pretty much at a standstill. With bad roads and a very general desire on the part of the farmers to hold their wheat, deliveries have fallen off very greatly. At some points hardly any wheat is a w being received. This state of things has it advantages, for it will give an opportunity to relieve the pressure on the elevators, and to straighten out complications which always arise during a great rush. Half a dozen prominent gram men when interviewed agreed in the opinion that already fully sixty per cent of the salcable crop has been delivered and moved. This is an unusually large proportion for this time of the year, and will give an idea how great was the rush during a short space of time.

The Ottawa Board of Trade spent some time on October 28th in preparing suggestions to the Government regarding the development of trade, in response to a department circular. The following proposals were mapped out:—A hold and vigorous immigration policy; the establishment of a Bureau of Immigration; Government assistance to the Montreal, Ottawa, and Georgian Bay canal project, so as to promote the settlement of Northern and Western Ontario; better and more rapid transportation facilities for butter, cheese, eggs, and fruit for export; enlarged facilities for the shipment of exports to Anstralia, Japan, West Indies, South Africa, and South America, by the granting of liberal subsidies to lines of steamers, to these countries, and the appoir tment of commercial agents at their leading ports. The Ottawa Board of Trade spent some commercial agents at their leading ports.

The growth of the lemon industy is one of the marvels of Southern California. In 1885 there were less than fifty acres of groves in this region; in 1890 there were 3,000 acres, and in 1895 there were 8,000 acres. It is likely that the acres planted to lemon trees will be further increased to 16,000 or 20,000 acres in two or three years more. Rough estimates put the capital invested in California in growing and curang lemons, with all the appurtenances, at \$3,800,000. The fact that the annual average importations of this fruit to the United States in the last five years have

horticulturalists reason to believe that they may in time drive Mediterranean lemons form the markets, as they have driven out the foreign prunes and raisins.

The total catch of seals by the British Columbia fleet, this year, will not total 60,000 skins. Last year, regarded by all as a most unsatisfactory reason, produced 74,124 skins, and in 1894 there were 94,474 skins taken. Dividing this year's catch proportionately among the sixty-four vessels of the fleet, with their SCO whites and 118 Judian funters, it would just about meet the cost of the outlitting and wages, leaving nothing for the ship owners who have invested their capital in this much-harrassed and prolitable Pacific Coast industry. The loss of two of the British Columbia schooners and the seizure of three others are accompanying unpleasant incidents of the serson now at a close.

The shipments of live stock from the port of Montreal from the opening of navigation, show a decrease of 981 head cattle, 101,140 sheep, and 1,893 horses as compared with the same period last year, and an increase of \$ 089 head cattle a decrease of 49,229 sheep, and an increase of 4,508 horses as compared with the same in 1894.
