II.—A Total Eclipse of the Sun, August 17. Invisible in British North America.

III.—A Transit of Mercury over the Sun's Disc, November 4. Partly visible in North America.

1	Wed.	NEW YEAR'S DAY.	H. M.	H. M.	<p>10.—The sarcophagus which contained Nelson's coffin was made at the expense of Cardinal Wolsey, for the burial of Henry VIII. The coffin was constructed from the main-mast of the <i>Orient</i>; part of which was picked up after the battle of the Nile by the <i>Swiftsure</i>, and expressly prepared by Captain Halliwell for his great commander, to whom he sent the coffin, with the following letter:—</p> <p>Sir,—I have taken the liberty of presenting a coffin, made from the main-mast of <i>L'Orient</i>; that when you have finished your brilliant career in this world, you may be buried in one of your trophies. But that that period may be far distant, is the earnest wish of your sincere friend,</p> <p style="text-align: right;">B. HALLOWELL.</p> <p>The astonishment that prevailed among the crew of the <i>Vanguard</i>, when they were convinced it was a coffin which had been brought on board, was great in the extreme. "We shall have hot work of it!" said one; "you see, the Admiral intends to fight till he is killed, and there he is to be buried!" Nelson showed how fully he appreciated the spirit and feeling of the donor, by making that coffin his constant cabin companion; and it was only at the entreaty of a favorite servant, that he would consent to its removal.</p> <p>21.—Interest was first named in an Act of the British Parliament of 21st, James I., 1623, wherein it was made to signify a lawful charge for the use of money lent; and 23 per cent per annum was fixed, instead of 10, which had been previously charged by money-lenders. In future reigns several alterations were made; but restraints being found prejudicial to commerce, all Acts on usury were repealed by 17 & 18 Vic., 1854.</p> <p>23.—The journal of the House of Commons contains the following entry on the day when King Charles was executed: "Die Martis, 30 Januarii, 1643, post meridiem. Ordered, that the common post be staid until to-morrow morning, ten of the clock."</p>

1	Sat.	Moon enters 1st qr. 1.11 a.m.	H.M. 7.19	H.M. 5.09	1.—The <i>Royal Sovereign</i> , man-of-war, burnt at Chatham, 1696. The raising of levees to build this vessel was the immediate cause of the Rebellion of 1658.
2	SUN.	4th after Epiphany. Full Moon, 4.31 a.m.	7.18	5.10	4.—Ten shilling notes, which had previously been in use in great Britain, were suppressed in 1815. 7.—It was not until 1723 that Jews acquired the legal right to possess land in England. 12.—The battle of the "Herrings" fought, 1429.—This was so called from the following incident:—When the English were besieging Orleans, the Duc de Bourbon, in attempting to intercept a convoy of salt fish, on the road to the English camp before Orleans, was severely beaten. 16.—The transportation of convicts from England to Australia ceased, 1653. 18.—The emigrant ship <i>Hibernia</i> , Captain Brenn, bound from Liverpool to New South Wales, with 282 persons on board, was destroyed at sea by fire, 1838. One hundred and fifty lives were lost through the inauspiciousness of the boats to contain more than a third of the people on board. 21.—Lord Gough defeated the Sikh army, under Shere Singh, at Goojerat, when the whole of the enemy's camp fell into the hands of the British, 1849. The battle of Chillianwallah between the Sikhs and the British, commanded by Lord Gough, had been fought on January 13, 1849, previous to the battle of Goojerat. The Sikhs were completely routed, but the loss of the British was very severe; 29 officers were killed, and 66 wounded and 731 rank and file killed, and 1,448 wounded. The Sikh loss was 3,000 killed and 4,000 wounded. 28.—The rights of primogeniture abolished in France, 1679. 27.—The troop-ship <i>Birkenhead</i> struck on a pointed pinnacle rock, off Simon's Bay, South Africa, when 438 soldiers and sailors out of 680 perished, 1852. 23.—The plural phraseology, <i>we, us, our</i> , was first adopted by King John, 1199.

1	SUN.	{ Quadragesima Sunday. Moon's 1st qr. 11.44 p.m.	H.M.	H.M.	4th.—James Monroe elected President of the United States, 1817; and again in 1821. The line of policy known as the "Monroe Doctrine" was first promulgated by James Monroe in 1817-24, and it expresses the determination of America not to permit any European power to interfere in restraining the progress of liberty in North or South America. 8.—Mortars for throwing bombs were first used at Naples in 1485. 11.—General Haynau died at Vienna in 1854. This was the General who committed such brutalities after the suppression of the Hungarian Revolution. For several days after his death—it is said—his body presented a very awful phenomenon—the warmth lingering in the right arm and leg of the corpse, even bleeding slightly when pricked. The other parts of the body were completely mortified, so much so, that it became necessary to inter the body before the two limbs referred to had become either stiff or cold. 18.—The Queen Charlotte was a first rate ship of the line of 110 guns, and was burnt by an accidental fire off the harbor of Leghorn, when more than 700 British seamen out of a crew of 850 perished by fire or drowning. In his despatches to the Admiralty, Lord Keith, the commander, thus describes the dreadful catastrophe: "The ship took fire just before day-break, while she was under steady sail, between the island of Gorgona and the port of Leghorn. It was occasioned by the fire of a match, which had been kept lighted for the purpose of firing signal guns, and which communicated to some hay that lay upon the half-deck. The fire spread very rapidly, and notwithstanding the greatest exertions she burnt to the water's edge and then blew up. Lord Keith was himself on shore at Leghorn. 19.—The style "King of Rome" was revived by Napoleon I., who conferred it on his son (Napoleon Francis Charles Joseph) upon his birth, 1811. 26.—Boiling to death was made a capital punishment in England by Statute 22 Henry VIII., 1531, and several persons underwent the torture before the Act was repealed.

NOTES TO THE CALENDAR.

10.—Great Chartist demonstration in London 1849. Louis Napoleon acting as special Constable.

12.—Four French ships of the line, riding at anchor in the Basque Roads, attacked by Lord's Gambier and Cochrane, and all, with several merchant vessels, destroyed, 1809. In the accomplishment of this hazardous enterprise—perhaps the most remarkable on record—it is supposed that the largest quantity of explosive material ever used in any single attack was employed, and which is thus described:—"Lord Cochrane caused about 1500 barrels of gunpowder to be started in 6 puncheons: upon the tops of which were placed 3,000 hand-grenades. The puncheons were jammed together by wedges, and moistened sand was rammed down between the casks so as to render the whole, from stem to stern, as solid as possible. In this immense instrument of destruction Lord Cochrane committed himself, with one Lieutenant and four seamen, and proceeded with his explosive ship towards the enemy's line, upon reaching which he fired the fuse, and left the vessel. Six minutes earlier than was expected the most tremendous explosion that human art ever contrived took place, followed by the bursting at once in the air of the shells and grenades, and the destruction of the vessels."

8.—Judge Jeffreys died, 1689. On the arrival of the Prince of Orange (afterwards William III.) in England, on November 5, 1688, Judge Jeffreys, on whom history has attached the indelible stigma of "infamous" to his name, for his inhuman proceedings against the adherents of the Duke of Monmouth, endeavored to make his escape on board a ship, but was detected in a low public-house at Wapping by an attorney whom he had insulted in open court. The latter making Jeffreys known, he was seized by the populace, carried before the Council, and committed to the Tower of London, where he died, as above stated.

20.—First action between the British and Americans—in which the latter were defeated—at Lexington, 1775.

12	Tues.		4.39	7.13	21.—The ceremony of the Doge of Venice wedding the Adriatic Sea, instituted in 1178, was for several centuries annually commemorated upon Ascension Day, on which occasion the Doge dropped a ring into the sea from his State barque. These celebrations were attended by all the nobility of the State and foreign ambassadors, in beautiful gondolas, and presented a most imposing sight. The ceremony was intermitted for the first time for centuries, in 1797, in consequence of Venice being occupied by the troops of Bonaparte, and who, by the treaty of Campo Formio gave part of the territory to Austria, and annexed the remainder to the Cisalpine republic. In golden times the Doges were sovereigns, but they were gradually deprived of power, and at last became mere pag-ants of State; and the office of Doge ceased to have even a nominal existence when Venice, "sunk in its glory, decayed in its work," yielded almost without a struggle to republican France.

3.—Earthquake at Erzerom, in Turkey 1859. In the space of fifteen seconds almost every building of importance in the town was destroyed, and 700 persons perished.

6.—The Cross of the Legion of Honor is conferred upon Rosa Bonheur, the famous animal painter, by the Empress of the French; this being the first instance of a woman, unconnected with the army, having received this distinction—1865.

8.—Sir Joseph Paxton, the designer of the Great Exhibition building of 1851, expires at Sydenham, in his 63rd year—1865.

14.—Lord Anson arrived at Spithead in the *Centurion*, after a voyage round the world on an exploring expedition of three years and five months, 1741. Lord Anson, after waiting with great perseverance for several months on the American coast, and in the China seas, was, at last, rewarded by falling in with the Spanish treasure ship *Acapulco*, and captured her after a smart action; and having sold the ship in China, he sailed for England. The treasures of the famous galleon were estimated to be worth about a million sterling; and were conveyed to London in thirty-two waggons, with music playing, and amidst the shouts of the rejoicing populace.

19.—The first of the stupendous tubes of the Britannia Bridge deposited, 1849.

21.—On a seizure for tithes being made at Newtonbury, Ireland, a conflict ensued between the yeomanry and the people, when 85 persons were killed and wounded, 1881.

28.—Marshal Soult, as special ambassador from France at the Coronation of Queen Victoria, met his old opponent, the Duke of Wellington, 1838.

30.—Intelligence received in England of the discovery of a second great source of the Nile by Mr. Samuel Baker—1865.

Having thus driven the enemy into Port, the <i>Glutton</i> proceeded to Yarmouth to refit. Her loss in the action was two men wounded. On the side of the enemy one frigate lost seventy in killed and wounded, and one frigate sunk in Flushing harbor, and they sustained much other damage. The largest of the French frigates was 300 to 400 tons larger than the <i>Glutton</i> . It is in memory of this exploit that the Admiralty called one of the recently built floating batteries the <i>Glutton</i> .

14.—Cromwell took Drogheda by storm, and put the garrison to the sword, 1643.

15.—Bonaparte born, 1769. In memory of his uncle, the present Emperor has decreed that to be the only national holiday in France.

19.—Pius VI. died at Valence, France, a prisoner to Bonaparte, 1799.

25.—Mr. Moens, an English tourist who was taken prisoner the March previous by brigands, at Naples, was released from captivity, having paid 30,000 ducats ransom—1866.

THE SIGNS OF THE ZODIAC.

The Ecliptic is an imaginary circle in the heavens, which shows the Sun's apparent annual course. It runs along the middle of another imaginary broad circle, the Zodiac, intersecting the equator at an angle of $23^{\circ} 28'$ nearly, and touching the tropic of Cancer on one side of the equator, and the tropic of Capricornus on the other side. Astronomers, since early ages, have divided this circle into twelve equal parts, each part containing thirty degrees; and have named these after the twelve constellations of the Zodiac—as shown in the margin.

The time which the sun takes, of apparently passing through any one of these signs, is termed a solar month. But the ecliptic shows, in reality, the course of the earth annually round the Sun. The sun's apparent motion is dependent on each period of the earth's course, in which he must be betwixt the earth and some one of the signs; therefore, although the earth only has changed its place, yet to an observer standing on it, the Sun appears to have moved. The earth is always in the opposite sign to that one in which the Sun appears. The sign of Aries is that division of the ecliptic which intersects the equator, where, owing to what is called the earth's declination, the Sun appears to pass to the Northern side of the equator, producing our vernal [or Spring] equinox. The apparent motion of the sun, which makes him appear above or below the horizon in our hemisphere, constitutes the distinction between day and night; and the time when he continues below or above the horizon, constitutes the length of the day. In his northward progress he passes the equator about the 20th of March, and attains the greatest northern declination about the 21st of June; after which he returns southward, recrosses the equator about the 22nd of September, and is at his greatest southern declination about the 21st of December. Now, as the period of the day depends upon his continuing above the horizon, the longest day is the 21st of June, the Summer Solstice; the shortest the 21st of December, the winter solstice in our hemisphere. As the rate of the sun's apparent motion northward or southward is, also, most rapid at the time that his orbit intersects the equator, and least when he is at his greatest distance from it, the variation of the length of the day is most rapid about the equinox, and least so about the solstices. When the sun, therefore, enters the tropic of Cancer, the days begin to lengthen, and continue to do so until, at the summer solstice, the "doubtful empire of the night," and the early dawn, with all its heart-enlivening concomitants, so beautifully described by Thomson, takes place. On the length of time, also, during which the sun is above the horizon, the different warmth of the seasons depend; but, nevertheless, the greatest heat of the year is after midsummer, or in July and August. This is explained by the fact, that as long as the quantity of the heat communicated to the earth's surface is greater than that which it parts with, the general heat of the weather increases; and this is the case long after the summer solstice. Many other causes, however, regulate the heat of the atmosphere, for there is, in many instances, a considerable difference between the heat of places having the same latitude, for example, Edinburgh and Moscow, the former of which, in point of temperature, differs very greatly from the latter; and this is still more remarkable in reference to the mouth of the St. Lawrence, which is in latitude 49° N., more than 2° south of London and that of the Thames. The St. Lawrence is blocked with ice in winter, whilst the navigation of the Thames is open.

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GAME AND FISHERY LAWS.

The close season for Deer or Fawn, Elk, Moose or Caribou, in Ontario, begins on the 1st January, and ends on the 1st September. They are not allowed to be trapped or taken by any traps or snares whatever. The close season for Wild Turkey, Grouse, Partridge or Pheasant, is between the 1st of February and the 1st of September; for Quall, between 1st February and the 1st October; for Woodcock, 1st March and 15th July; and Wild Swan-Goose, Duck, Widgeon or Teal, 1st April and 1st August. The law also provides that no Beaver, Muskrat, Mink, Sable, Otter, or Fisher, shall be trapped or killed between the 1st May and the 1st November.

It is unlawful to fish for, catch, buy or sell the following fish in Quebec, between the dates named: Speckled Trout, 20th September and 1st April; White Fish, in any way, between the 19th November and 1st December, and by net between 30th May and 1st August. The close season for Bass, Pike, Pickerel (*doree*), and Maskinonge, is regulated by Order in Council, to suit different localities.

The close season for Red or Grey Deer,

Moose, Elk, Reindeer and Caribou in Quebec, is from 1st February to 1st September; for Woodcock or Snipe, 1st March to 1st August; Grouse, Partridge, Ptarmigan or Pheasant, 1st March to 20th August; Wild Swan, Wild Goose or Wild Duck of the kinds known as Mallard, Grey Duck, Black Duck, Wood Duck, Teal, Widgeon, or any other kind of Wild Duck, 20th May to 20th August; Muskrat, 10th May to 1st March.

It is also unlawful to fish for, catch, buy or sell any of the following fish between the dates named in Quebec; Salmon, 31st July and 1st May, (fly surface fishing is, however, permitted between 30th April and 31st August;) Trout or Lunge, 15th September and 15th December; Bass and Pickerel (*doree*), Pike and Maskinonge, 30th April and 1st June.

It is also unlawful to kill or snare any birds whatsoever, excepting Eagles, Falcons, Hawks, Wild Pigeons, Kingfishers, Crows and Ravens, in either Quebec or Ontario, between the 1st March and the 1st August in each year.

TIMBER MEASURING.

DEALS—Are generally sold by the standard hundred of 120 deals of the dimensions as follows:—One Quebec standard deal contains 2 feet 3 inches 6 pts. cubic; one Quebec standard hundred contains 229 ft. 2 inches cubic or 4.58 loads, and are equivalent to 2,750 ft., superficial board measure of 1 inch thick.

One Quebec standard hundred is 100 pieces of 12 ft. by 11 in. by 2½ in., and is equal to 1 hd. 1 qr. 16 pcs. of St. Petersburg standard; and 240 Quebec standards are equal to 11 loads.

One St. Petersburg standard hundred is equal to 120 pcs. of 12 ft. by 11 in. by 1½ in., and is equal to 72 Quebec standard, and equal to 3 3-10 loads of timber.

A load of deals is 600 square feet by one inch in thickness, equal to 50 cubic feet, or 300 square feet of 2 inch, or 400 of 1½ inch.

A load is equal to 21 deals, 1 ft. 10½ in., Quebec standard, and equal to 36½ St. Peters-

burgh standard deals.

To convert Quebec standard hundred into St. Petersburg standard, add ⅓ of quantity and divide by 30.

The customary allowance for freight is a hundred St. Petersburg standard at twice the rate charged for timber per load.

STAVES.—One standard stave is 5½ ft. long by 1½ in. thick. One mille standard, 1,200 pieces, is equal to 16 1-8 loads of timber. One mille, or 1,200 standard staves, is equal to 343 ft. 9 inches, or 6 43-50 loads. 175 standard staves are equal to 50 ft. 1 in. 6½ parts, or 1 load 1 in. 0¾ parts.

One mille West India staves, 1,200 pieces, is equal to 5½ loads of timber. Owing to the variations in breadth and thickness of staves, it is customary to allow one mille, Quebec standard, to be equal to 13 loads.

LATHWOOD.—One fathom of 4 feet long and 6 feet by 6 feet is equal to 13 loads.

INDIAN LANDS OFFICE AND OUT-STATIONS.

THE UNSOLD LANDS consist of about 300,000 acres in the Saugeen Peninsula, the prices of which vary according to quality and situation, from 75 cents to \$3.50 per acre. The Department has contributed liberally towards opening a main line of road, with its starting point upon the Owen Sound and Saugeen gravelled road, and running northward up the Peninsula towards its northermost point, opposite the southerly extremity of the Great Manitoulin Island. The agency for these lands is at Toronto, under the superintendence of W. B. Bartlett, Esq., who is provided with maps and with lists of the disposable lands. The conditions of sale are one-fifth down, and the remainder payable by four annual instalments, with interest on each as it falls due, and actual and early occupation.

The Great Manitoulin Island has been in part surveyed. Seven Townships having been laid out, containing about 160,000 acres; and Townplots also surveyed at Little Current, now designated Shaftesbury, and at Sheguendah, where are at least three good mill sites. There are other townships advanced in survey. The agent for the sale of lands upon the Island is C. T. Dupont, Esq. The price of farming is 20 cents per acre, and actual and immediate settlement. Oil and mineral lands are charged \$1.00 per acre, cash down, and patents issue without reference to occupation or improvement.

The Indian Department holds also for sale in trust for the Indians, lands in the vicinity of the Sault Ste. Marie, Batchewaung Bay, and Garden River, consisting of about 200,000 acres. The agent is Joseph Wilson, Esq., of Sault Ste. Marie, and the terms correspond with those laid down for the Manitoulin Island. The most direct access to both of these localities is by steamer from Collingwood, the Lake Huron terminus of the Northern Railway.

On Lake Superior there are Indian lands also for sale, consisting of about 64,000 acres in the vicinity of Fort William on the Kaministagua River. The agent is Mr. McVicar, resident at Fort William, and the terms are the same as those for the lands around the Sault Ste. Marie.

The unsurveyed Indian reserves in Upper Canada, which have not been yielded up for sale, are of considerable extent, and some of them contain timber of value, which can only be cut under official license from the superintendents, who attend to the local business of the lands under their superintendence.

In Lower Canada, the Indian reserves are of more limited extent, and there are no lands within them at present for sale.
