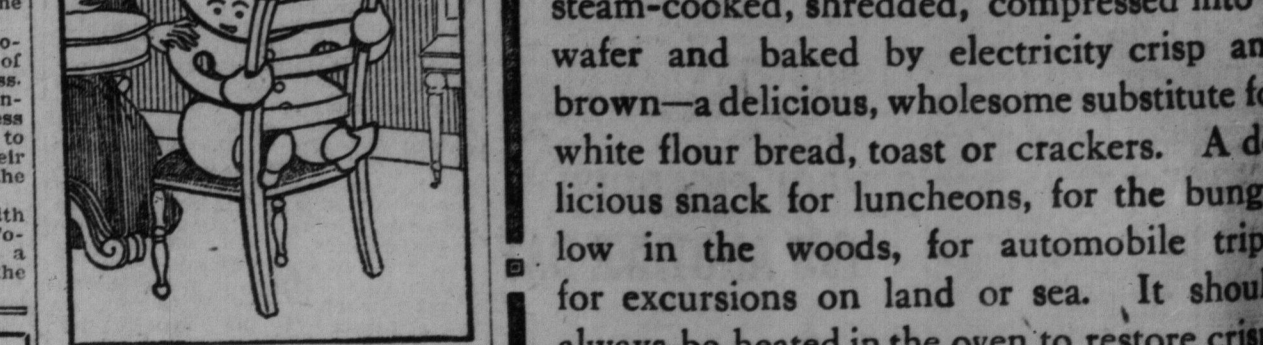

BALKAN HORRORS MAY BE PROBED
International Committee of Investigation Proposed - Hague Tribunal to Act.

PARIS, Sept. 4.—(Can. Press.)—The Balkan news agency has received a letter from M. Disceco, former Roumanian minister of instruction and president of the Roumanian inter-parliamentary committee, stating that as the atrocities committed in the Balkan war were a direct violation of the international convention on the laws and customs of war, signed by all civilized states, Oct. 18, 1907, article 3, even providing that the belligerent violating the convention shall pay an indemnity, he will, in the name of his group, propose a resolution at the 18th inter-parliamentary conference that an international committee shall be formed to investigate the atrocities.

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AMBITIOUS PLANS FOR BOARD OF TRADE

Extensive Program of Civic Improvements to Be Advocated During Season.

The Toronto Board of Trade is preparing for an active year in civic improvement and the general development of Ontario and Canada, and will in October resume the publication of the Board of Trade News, the official publication of the organization, which is not issued during the months of August and September.

The scope of the future work of the board of trade may be understood from the appointment of special committees to give attention to the various named, viz., harbor and Welland canal, railway and transportation, legislation and education, good roads, civic and social service, Ontario and Canada, express rates and parcel post, viaduct, publicity, federal square, foreign trade, membership of the board, and a committee of one hundred.

GREEKS GUILTY OF ATROCITIES

Letters Which Fell Into Bulgarians' Hands Tell Dark Story.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Sept. 4.—(Can. Press.)—In order to prove that Greek soldiers were responsible for a number of atrocities against the Bulgarians in the fighting last July between Greece and her former allies, Greece, Serbia, and Montenegro, there has been made public in Sofia extracts from letters written by Greek soldiers and officers to friends at home. These letters were captured in a mail bag of the 19th regiment of the 7th Greek division by Bulgarian troops in the vicinity of Razlog. The letters have been given out by the Bulgarian telegraphic agency in pamphlet form. Each letter is printed in fac simile of the original Greek, followed by a translation in French, which gives the dates and the names signed to each communication.

Wholesale Massacres. "We have burned all the villages abandoned by the Bulgarians. We have operated against every member of the Bulgarian nation who has fallen into our hands. Out of 1,200 prisoners which we look at, Nigeria only 41 remain. The Greek villages and churches which we have left no other of this kind."

Another letter from a sergeant says: "We burned the two villages of Doullin and Baizita, and put every Bulgarian and a girl from Serres. We shut them up in a translation. The children and old people, and churches were all destroyed without pity and without grace."

BIG CROP ASSURED IN SASKATCHEWAN

Two-Thirds Already Cut—Wheat is of Reasonably High Grade.

REGINA, Sask., Sept. 4.—(Can. Press.)—The total grain crop of Saskatchewan is now practically assured promises to exceed that of 1912 by several million bushels, says Hon. W. E. McArthur, minister of agriculture.

The crop will be of an unusually high grade, and if frost keeps off for the balance of the season Saskatchewan will have every reason to be well satisfied with the results of the year's operations. To reap a bountiful harvest in a season in the early months of which the outlook seemed far from promising, is exceptionally gratifying.

Two-thirds of the Saskatchewan crop is now cut, and it is all in first-class condition. The balance will be harvested as fast as binders can be run to work and this unit grain is in good condition. In many districts cutting operations have been completed, and where the grain has been later in maturing, 40 to 50 per cent has been harvested."

CONCILIATION BOARD MEETS IN TORONTO

The Men Who Will Decide Difference Between G.T.R. and Its Employees.

The initial meeting of the Grand Trunk Railway conciliation board, which is to deal with the wage question and working conditions of employees, was held at the King Edward Hotel here yesterday. PAPER MONEY SHOULD BE THE FUNCTION OF THE STATE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Interpreting the handwriting on the wall, James B. Forgan of Chicago, and Sol Wexler of New Orleans, two representative bankers, standing before the Senate today, before the Senate committee on banking and currency, admitted the soundness of the proposition that in any new banking system, the government must have control.

Both men named, while admitting that government control was bound to come and would be accepted by the banking interests, urged that those interests be given a minority representation on the federal reserve board.

They argued for a central reserve bank instead of the twelve regional reserve banks proposed. Their belief that regional reserve banks might discriminate against some particular locality. On this, Chairman Owen drove them into a corner, for Messrs. Forgan and Wexler were forced to admit that in the regional reserve plan, there would be quite as much, if not more, danger in one great central organization.

Mr. Forgan is the oracle from the United States put up by the Canadian bankers at Ottawa when the Bank Act was undertaken last session. He was against an all-Canada currency, and against any state interference or control of banking in the United States. He refused to obey the law in dealing with real estate. The millionaire stock and bond holder may very well argue that if the assessor throws forty or fifty per cent off the real property of his neighbor it is quite within the millionaire's rights to throw forty or fifty per cent off his income return.

A fair taxation system necessitates a one hundred per cent assessment. The government should insist on the assessors keeping the law.

WHAT ABOUT THE NEW MEASURES?

Mr. Chamberlain has not included all the plank in his platform that he might. On a comprehensive reform ticket such as he has evolved it comes somewhat of a shock to me that there is no mention of the tango, or the bunny bug, or the hesitation waltz or the hitchy-ko. While these insidious evils are demoralizing the land, where is Mr. Chamberlain? Has he no voice to lift against the turkey trot, with its suggestions of indecent poultry culture, or no protest against the grizzly bear which is ravaging districts more extensive than the woods and forests? Does Mr. Chamberlain believe in the Peacock Gild in moderation, or does he stand for the total abolition of these measures?

GET YOUR NAME HANDED DOWN.

Bishop Sweeney has two years in which to complete St. Alban's Cathedral. Visitors to the applied arts building at the Exhibition must have been struck with the beauty of the noble design of the structure which is to form the nucleus of Episcopalianism in the Diocese of Toronto. Members of the Anglican Church should not need to be reminded of the \$250,000 which are needed to carry on the work on which such satisfactory progress is being made on Howland avenue. There are chunks of money lying by doing nothing in the accounts of plenty of men who have no use for it, and who would be astonished at the sensations they would experience by making a contribution to this project. Hardly one of them but would be proud to say if he could that he helped to build St. Paul's Cathedral or Westminster Abbey. Yet here is the opportunity in the infancy of the nation to participate in the erection of a building which in centuries to come will be a national monument. To have been one of those who helped will be an honor, and many will only be remembered in the future by the fact that their names are inscribed on the roll of the founders of St. Alban's Cathedral.

GLASGOW'S ELECTRIC SERVICE.

In 1892, twenty-one years ago, the Glasgow City Council undertook the public supply of electricity. This was not the first municipal enterprise, for in 1865 the commercial capital of Scotland had taken responsibility for its water supply and four years later took over the coal gas manufacture.

Liberal is a source of weakness rather than strength to the party led by Mr. Rowell. What Mr. Rowell wants is certainly not servility, but it must just as certainly be a subordination to party interests that will ignore everything else. Unfortunately Mr. Rowell has not shown that complete independence himself which would justify the subordination of his followers. But insubordination in such a party as the Rowell group in the legislature means ruin. Mr. Rowell must shake himself free from the influences to which he is himself still in thrall before he can attract a really influential or effective following.

On the government side Sir James is strong enough to tolerate a considerable amount of level-headed independence. It is independence of thought and suggestion that he needs above everything, since independence of action he has no need to fear. Wise counsels from the inside will probably have more weight than marvelous oracles from outside. Mr. Chamberlain may be an oracle, but his neighbors know Mr. Henry to be a level-headed, sensible man, and they are likely to give him a chance to tell Sir James some of the things that Sir James will listen to more complacently from a friend than from an opponent.

BREAKING THE ASSESSMENT LAW.

It is about time that the government took another squint at the assessors in the province. The circular that was issued last year does not seem to have had any effect whatever. It has certainly had none in Toronto. Excesses constantly occur of the discrepancies between the assessed value and the selling value of property. Yesterday there was announced the sale of a place of property for \$200,000 on which the assessment was \$102,250. The assessor takes an oath to assess property at its full value. Two other sales reported last night were of properties, one for \$25,000 assessed at \$17,750, and one for \$75,000 assessed \$17,775. Any common garden real estate dealer could guess better than the assessor has done.

Let us suggest it to Sir James Whitney from a new point of view. The province is in need of revenue. All revenue raising efforts must be founded on correct assessments. The provincial government cannot continue to ignore the dereliction of the assessors in refusing to obey the law. Much more depends on this than appears at first sight. The inequity of the assessment begets discontent among the less wealthy classes who come under a higher tax rate owing to the enormous exemptions of their richer brethren. And it is absurd to expect correct returns on income from the wealthy when the assessors set the example of breaking the law in dealing with real estate. The millionaire stock and bond holder may very well argue that if the assessor throws forty or fifty per cent off the real property of his neighbor it is quite within the millionaire's rights to throw forty or fifty per cent off his income return.

THE LONG SAULT DAM.

The determined attempt to get control of the water power of the rapids on the St. Lawrence near Cornwall is one of the most daring and unscrupulous instances of shameless greed that have ever been shown in Canada. The pertly and rapidly are only identified with the members of the committee who are entrusted with such a charge.

ders it especially valuable to
the manufacture of "shagreen." Since
the skin is at once tough and easy
to work, it can be used for many
purposes where decorative effects
are desired.

In spite of its lumpy armor, the
sturgeon furnishes a valuable and
attractive leather. It has been
found that when the bony plates are
removed, the patterns remain on the
skin, just as the patterns of alliga-
tor scales remain on alligator leather,
a circumstance that adds greatly to
the value of the product. From the
sturgeon that abounds on the Pa-
cific coast and in the Great Lakes,
we get a tough leather that is used
for the making of laces to join
leather belts for machinery. It is
said that the lacing frequently out-
wears the belting itself.

There is found in Turkish waters
a strikingly unattractive fish called
the angel-fish, classed among the
littoral sharks. This fish yields an
extremely high quality of green
leather, much esteemed in the Otto-
man dominions.

In Russia certain peasant cost-
umes are trimmed with the skins of
a good fish, the turbot, and in
Egypt men wear sandals made from
the skins of fish caught in the Red
Sea. In the United States, too, the
cod has been used in a similar man-
ner, for in bygone days a good many
shoes and gloves have been made in
Gloucester from the skin of the cod.
Eelskin is used for many purposes,
among them the manufacture of
leather binding for books, and for
braiding into whips.

The garfish has a skin that can
be polished till it resembles ivory.
It is used in making picture-frames
and jewel-caskets. The skin of this
fish was used by certain Indian
tribes to make a sort of armor.
It is so tough and hard that, accord-
ing to some accounts, a breast-plate
made of it will turn a knife or a
spear.


