ALLIED SUCCESS CONTINUES

MORE Gains Made and Prisoners Taken in Champagne District Where Fighting is Still in Progress—Repeated German Counter Attacks Against British Lines Repulsed With Heavy Losses and Capture of More Prisoners and Heavy Guns—German Crown Prince to Be Relieved of His Command—German Drive on Dvinsk Checked by Brilliant and Stubborn Defense by the Russians.

ALLIES CONTINUE TO MAKE GAINS AND REPULSE COUNTER-ATTACKS

Heavy Losses Inflicted on the Enemy Whose Offensive Was Completely Checked—Fighting in Champagne District Continues—More Than Seventy Big Guns Captured—53 Officers and 2800 Men Taken Prisoner.

LONDON, Sept. 27, 11.20 p.m.—A British official communication made public tonight says: "Northwest of Hulloch we have repulsed a number of counter-attacks and inflicted heavy loss on the enemy. East of Loos our offensive is progressing. Our captures now amount to 53 officers and 2800 men and 18 guns and 32 machine guns. The enemy abandoned a considerable quantity of material which has not yet been classified."

Official French Statement. PARIS, Sept. 27.—(11.10 p.m.)—The French official statement, made public tonight, says that the situation to the north of Arras remains

unmodified, and that the fighting in the Champagne continues. The statement adds that the Germans today began another offensive movement in the Argonne, but that it was completely checked, and that the German losses were heavy. The text of the communication follows: "To the north of Arras the situation is without modification. The enemy has reacted only feebly against the new positions occupied by our troops. The number of prisoners taken in that region exceeds 1500. In Champagne the battle continues without ceasing. Our troops are at present on a front taken before the second position of the German defence, marked by Hill No. 185, to the west of the Navarin farm, the Souain hillock, the tree of Hill No. 195 and the village and hillock of Tahure."

"The Germans undertook today in the Argonne an offensive movement which was completely stopped. On four occasions they attempted an infantry assault on our position at La Fille Morte, after having violently bombarded them with projectiles of heavy calibre and suffocating shells. The enemy was able to reach only a few points of our trench along the whole of the first line. He was stopped there by the fire from our supporting trenches and has been repulsed elsewhere with very heavy losses. Seventy guns taken. The number of cannon captured from the enemy has not yet been computed, but exceeds 70 field guns and heavy pieces, of which 28 were captured by the British army. There is nothing of importance to report on the rest of the front."

VIGOROUS STAGE IS REACHED ON WESTERN FRONT

Attacks and Counter Attacks May Last Weeks or Months.

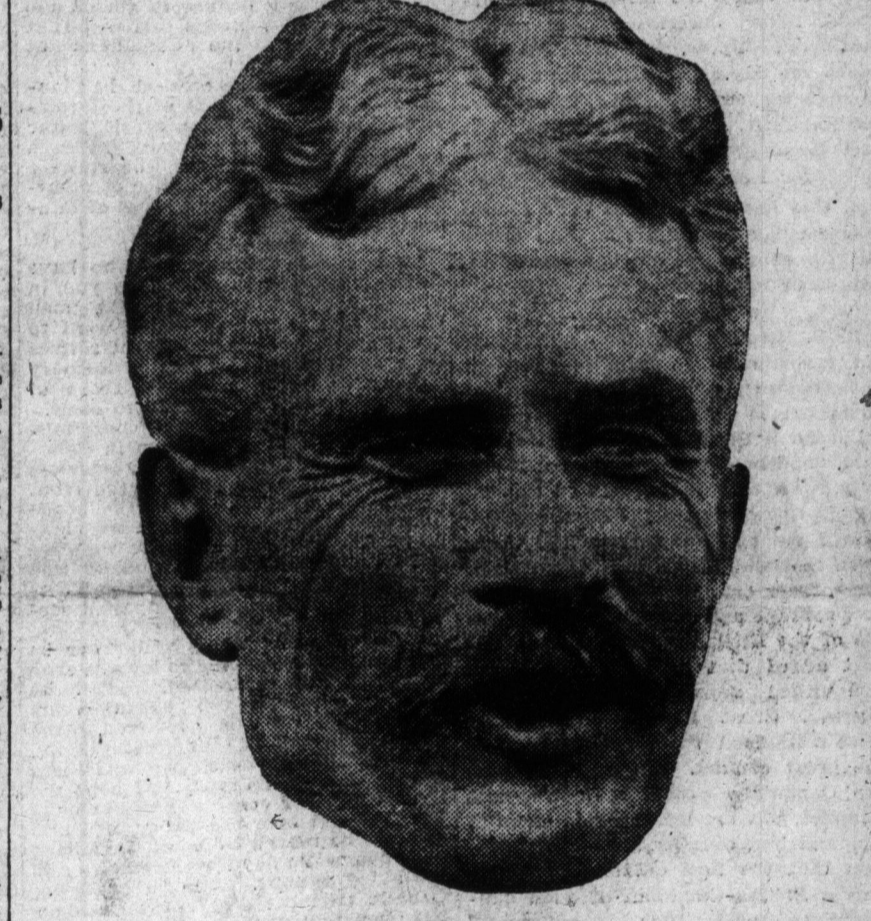
GREAT GERMAN LOSS

Reinforcements in Millions Will Be Thrown into Flanders Lines.

LONDON, Sept. 27, 11.17 p.m.—The great offensive of the French and British forces against both sides of the elbow joint of the German positions on the western front has not slackened, but Gen. Joffre's after-noon bulletin reported no new outstanding success. The British official statement told briefly of heavy losses inflicted on the Germans northwest of Hulloch, where heavy German counter-attacks were carried out during the course of the day. Berlin maintains that by means of counter attacks the allies' drives have been checked with heavy loss, but as the Germans make no claim of having recovered the ground taken from them, the indications are that the allied gains on Saturday and Sunday have been generally maintained and at some points improved, and that the fighting has reached the stage of vigorous attack and counter-attack, which may continue for weeks or months.

ARENA'S THOUSANDS CHEER AS BORDEN TELLS STORY OF CANADIAN WAR DEEDS

CANADA'S PREMIER

Great Gathering Marks a Milestone in the Patriotic History of Toronto—R. B. Bennett, Calgary, Pays Great Tribute to Canada's First Chief.

The big patriotic meeting at the Arena last night will long be regarded as a milestone in the patriotic history of Toronto. Not one-tenth of the people who desired to hear the prime minister and R. B. Bennett of Calgary could gain admittance, but the eight thousand people who taxed the capacity of the great auditorium were handled without a moment of confusion or disorder. Every seat was taken before 7 o'clock, but the audience had come prepared to wait, many bringing the evening newspapers with them. The sedentary waiting was, however, relieved by stirring music by the bands, patriotic songs and a number of views and moving pictures, which had been thoughtfully provided by the management.

Promptly at 8 o'clock the prime minister entered with Premier Hearst, Mayor Church and R. B. Bennett, M.P. The audience at once arose and cheered heartily while the band played the "Maple Leaf" and the "National Anthem." James Norris, president of the Central Liberal-Conservative organization of Toronto, presided, and it must be said of him that he was a model chairman. With only a few words of preface he introduced the prime minister.

Magnificent Ovation. Sir Robert Borden, upon rising, received a magnificent ovation. He spoke considerably over an hour to an audience whose interest and attention never flagged or wavered for a moment.

So we can all buck up, continue gladly in the work of sacrifice, help on business, lister; neither to the croaker nor the scornor, but encourage one another in patriotism and in business.

Germany will go down in shame; the rest of the world will break forth into a newer, a higher and a brighter life because of the menace of the kaiser.

RUSSIANS GAIN SUCCESSES ALL ALONG EASTERN FRONT

Teuton Aggressive Daily Becomes Weaker, While Russians Display Old-Time Confidence and Vigor That Brought Them to Summit of Carpathians

At the Dardanelles

LONDON, Sept. 27.—(6.12 p.m.)—A British official communication, dealing with the recent activity on the Gallipoli Peninsula, says: "The recent operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula have been confined mainly to attacks from either side by aircraft, to bombardments by artillery, and to mining. On one occasion the Turks opened a heavy artillery fire along our front at Suvla and Anzac, which appeared to be the prelude to a general attack. It was followed by an attack by a small force only on the right centre at Suvla. The enemy was easily dispersed by our rifle fire. Twice subsequently much the same thing happened."

"More than once enemy aeroplanes have attacked our aircraft base, but the bombs dropped did no damage. In return our aeroplanes counter-attacked with bombs and killed out a hangar and did some damage among the shipping at Burgaz. During the night of the 24th the Turks let loose watchdogs against the French patrols. The dogs were all shot."

to fall back with heavy losses. In a second action we repulsed an enemy attack in the region southwest of the Barnovitchi station. A third sudden attack against an Austrian battalion near the Village of Lubouzy, on the River Stchara, in the region of Lykhovitchi resulted in the bayoneting of a party of Austrians, with the capture of 264 men and two officers. Because of this attack the enemy was forced to retire beyond the river. By a fourth assault we captured the Village of Stikentzi, in the region of the lower Silesintz. Here a fierce engagement, which attained its extreme limit in a fight for the possession of houses already in flames, was disputed with unheard of ferocity. The village remained in our hands, the enemy being annihilated. We captured only two men and four machine guns.

"Stubborn Engagements. In the region of the Kovel-Barany railway, many stubborn engagements occurred on the left bank of the Styr. The Town of Kolki and its environs are being strongly bombarded by the enemy. In the region of the Galicia frontier

Desperate Fighting

"The desperate fighting and manoeuvring during the first few weeks of September have demonstrated with peculiar force how successfully our troops can fight against a stubborn enemy. With unexampled courage and devotion to duty, Russian troops continue to perform deeds bordering on the extreme limit of human capacity. Our allies are furnishing a brilliant example of the same qualities. According to information just received, a French and British offensive resulted in two days, not only in a gain of territory, but also in the capture from the Germans of more than 20,000 wounded prisoners and many guns."

Fighting is Violent

LONDON, Sept. 27, 9.45 p.m.—A despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company from Petrograd says: "Fighting of extraordinary violence is proceeding around Dvinsk. An important success for the Russian cavalry is reported, involving the defeat of a strong enemy column near Lake Tchighirny."

"The Russians, taking advantage of their intimate knowledge of the country, led the enemy to the marshy ground, where they surrounded him on three sides, exterminating or capturing three complete infantry companies and taking much booty. It is reported from the southern front that the Russians have reached Kovel and that the Austrians have evacuated Brody. During the retreat

CROWN PRINCE WILL BE RELIEVED OF COMMAND

Orders Foolhardy Attacks and Refuses to Be Guided by Advice of More Experienced Officers.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—The German crown prince will soon be relieved of his command on the western front, if the change has not already been made, according to a German officer just brought prisoner to England. This officer said that the real reason for the crown prince's removal, recently reported, was due to fear that he would be superseded because of his failure against the allies.

The crown prince, this officer said, repeatedly ordered attacks known to be foolhardy by other experienced officers, but would not listen to advice. On two occasions prominent members of his staff pleaded with him not to sacrifice men, in view of certain repulse, but the crown prince paid no heed.

"It is not surprising," the officer said, "that the crown prince has broken down, as he was conscientiously on duty and refused to take a proper rest. He was blindly obsessed with the desire to smash the enemy's lines with the result that a serious nervous condition set in."

The German probed that the crown prince's place would be taken by Von Mackensen, who would leave the eastern forces so entrenched for the winter, that the Russians would be unable to force them back or break thru.

KINGSTON SHIPPING TIED UP BY STORM

Barrieffield Camp and Power Plant Suffered From Gale.

Special to The Toronto World. KINGSTON, Ont., Sept. 27.—One of the worst wind storms this season has been raging here the last forty-eight hours and all vessels are tied up. Trees were blown down in all parts of the city, the parks suffering a great deal. A heavy rain accompanied the gale. A portion of the roof at Tete du Pont Barracks was blown off and the power plant suffered. At Barrieffield camp many of the tents were blown down.

KINGSTON, Sept. 27.—The military cross has been given to Lieut. Charles Stuart Craig, a first year student in science at Queen's University, who went over in the first contingent. He belongs to Cobourg.

RATEPAYERS TALK ABOUT NEW SCHOOL

Consider Proposal of Board of Trustees to Erect the Building.

MATTER LAID OVER

After Much Debating, It Was Decided to Wait Six Months.

A meeting of the ratepayers and school trustees of school section No. 15, Fairbank, was held last evening in Vaughan Road Public School for the purpose of considering the proposal of the board of trustees to apply to the municipal council of the Township of York for the issue of debentures for such amount as the ratepayers may deem adequate for the purpose of enabling the board to purchase a school site and to build a 12-room school in that section on Jarvis avenue. PREMIER REVIEWS TORONTO RECRUITS

Saw Twelve Hundred and Congratulated Men and Officers.

MANY ANSWERING CALL

Willingness of Canadians Makes Sir Robert Confident.

Sir Robert Borden in a half-hour visit to the Toronto armories yesterday afternoon inspected the departments of the recruiting depots, made a brief address to the officers and recruiting sergeants, and then held a formal review of the 1200 overseas recruits. The premier's speech to the recruiting officers contained no illusion to Sir Sam Hughes' recent statement about a surplus of recruits in Canada. The premier congratulated the depot staff and the recruiting sergeants on the work they had already done. He said he appreciated their efforts. He hoped they would continue the work. Although Germany had immense resources the men of the British Empire were answering the call to the colors with such willingness that he had no doubt of the final issue. After being escorted thru the recruiting depot by Major Le Grand Reed, the premier crossed over to University avenue and saw 1200 of Toronto's most recently recruited active service men march past in column platoon formation. At the reviewing point with Sir Robert were Major-General, M.P. Major G. C. Royce and led by the artillery. There was no music, but in spite of this hand-picked parade marched with wonderful steadiness. The premier raised his hat to each platoon as it swung past him. The 10th Regiment held another fine parade last night. Six hundred and thirty-two men were in line. Of these 48 are overseas recruits. Major John Harris was in command. After company and physical drill the regiment held a review. The parade was via Yonge, Queen, Spadina and King streets. On the return 32 men joined the reviewing party.

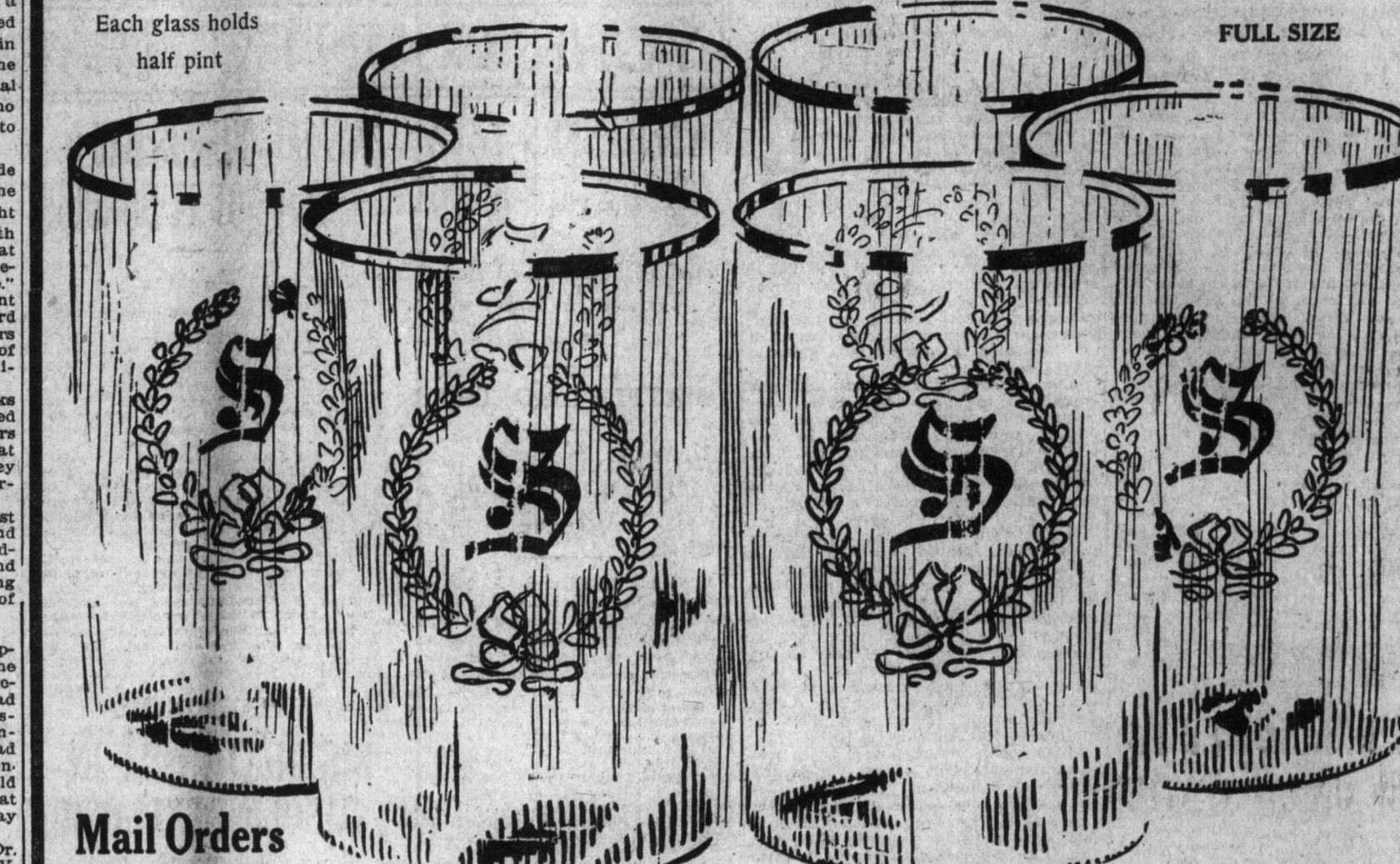

FRENCH CONTINUING CHAMPAGNE GAINS

Germany Being Cleared Out of Region Already Occupied.

HOLD ON IN ARTOIS Advance Maintained on Highway to Lille and La Folie Orchards.

PARIS, Sept. 27, 2:45 p.m.—The new offensive movement is continuing along the entire front in Champagne. The war office announces today that further German positions had been occupied.

In the Champagne district the fighting has been going on with tenacity along the front. We have occupied at several places, notably at Trou Bricot, to the north of the Vaucoures farm, several positions in the rear of our new lines, where certain detachments of the enemy had been able to maintain themselves.

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AUSTRIA WILL RECALL AMBASSADOR DUMBA

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COURT DISMISSES THE CITY'S APPEAL

Sustains Ontario Railway Board in Farnham Avenue Order.

NEWS OF OSGOODE HALL

Toronto Railway's Appeal Against Nuisance Conviction is Adjourned.

The first appellate court at Osgoode Hall yesterday upheld the decision of Mr. Justice Middleton on an appeal by one Weston against a decision of the police magistrate in convicting him for obstructing a police constable in the discharge of his duty in Warton.

The appeal of the Toronto Street Railway Company against the verdict of the jury convicting the company of creating a public nuisance by overcrowding the street cars has been adjourned for two weeks. R. J. Cartwright, deputy attorney-general, is representing the crown and H. H. Dewart, K.C. the company.

Mr. Justice Riddell has announced that the appeal of the City of Toronto against the Ontario Railway Board allowing the Toronto Street Railway Company to lay tracks on Yonge street from the C.P.R. tracks to Farnham avenue would be dismissed with costs. Written reasons for the decision will be given out on Monday.

The city contended in opposing the order that a franchise had been granted to the Metropolitan division of the Toronto and York Region Railway Board in existence at the time the city granted a franchise to the Toronto Street Railway Company in 1891, it was argued that the city's franchise to the latter corporation did not apply to the portion between the C.P.R. tracks and Farnham avenue, and furthermore, not only could the city not grant a franchise for a period longer than 20 years, but that it had not power to grant a franchise dating from 1915.

The appellate judges are engaged hearing an appeal by Mrs. Mabel Bulmer against a verdict of a jury under Judge Denton holding her liable for an accident to a Mrs. McPhee, and awarding damages of \$500 against her.

Mrs. Bulmer rents out seats at Centre Island. When Mrs. McPhee sat down on one of them it collapsed with the result that she was seriously injured.

Willard F. Craig presented his certificate of fitness to Mr. Justice Epton yesterday and was sworn in as a solicitor of the supreme court.

The first divisional appellate court list for today is: National Equipment Company v. White, Tully v. Costello, Caldwell v. O'Brien, Johnson v. Haines, Scotland v. Johnston Mills v. Russell Company.

In this connection it was said that rural elevators in the northwestern states now hold 20,000,000 bushels, a sufficient supply for some time longer receipts at the elevators are expected to be heavy, except in the September option, the depression of values was less pronounced than might have been looked for, the fact being that notwithstanding the heavy receipts, the accumulation of stocks at big centres was not yet up to what a majority of traders appeared to expect. As a result, the May and July delivery, although finally giving way, held for considerable intervals at a moderate advance over Saturday night's level.
