TWO N. Y. BROKERS FAIL

Charles Minzesheimer & Co. Have Nearly \$2,000,000 Liabilities.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14 .- Two New York brokerage houses failed to-day with liabilities aggregating nearly \$2,-000,000. One is the stock exchange firm of Charles Minzesheimer & Co.; the other the firm of Thomas G. Gaylord, who was engaged in business under the name of Latham, Alexander & Co., cotton and stock brokers. In leach case an assignment for the

benefit of creditors was made. Bain-bridge Colby, attorney for the firm, was named as assignee by the Minzesheimer Company. With the announcement of the as-

signment, creditors of Minzesheimer & Co. filed a petition in involuntary. barkruptcy against the concern, and Edward G. Benedict was named as receiver. The petition in bankruptcy alleges that the liabilities exceed \$1,-000,000, and consist chiefly of loans rom banks and trust companies. The collateral securing these obligations is estimated to be worth 20 per cent.
