





THE WEATHER Less Liquor Distilled, But Inland Revenue Makes Record

Distilleries and Breweries Yield Great Bulk of \$19,635,000, Receipts Showing Increase of \$2,393,000 Over Last Year-Canada Consumes About 47,000,000 Gallons of Malt Liquor Yearly.

From the distilling and brewing bus n.ss the government during the fiscal year reaped a revenue of \$10.-470,000. Tobacco and cigars, with a yield of \$8,649,416 came next as an excisa evenue producer. When Hon W. E. Nantel comes to present his first repert to parliament, he will be able to show the largest revenue receipts of any minister of inland revenue since confederation, namely \$19,635,863, which is by \$2,393.188 greater than the revenue for 1911, and \$4,072,834 greater than that for 1910.






