A PARLIAMENT THAT MAKES LAWS AND DOES NOT ENFORCE THEM. The World this morning reproduces in full the official record of the debate of the house of commons on Thursday night last, dealing with the subject of the enforcement of our federal laws.

THE NEW LIGHT IN THE SKY. It is the duty of the legislature of Ontario, irrespective of all party considerations, to keep up with the best and most intelligent thought and the latest discoveries in regard to the utilization of our great public resources, so that they may be devoted in the widest way to the comfort, happiness and advancement of the people.

The Member for South York Raises an Interesting Discussion in Connection With Tariff and All Federal Legislation—in the United States All Federal Laws Are Put in Effect By Federal Machinery—in Canada We Rely on the Provinces, Hence the "Nullification" Status.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—In the commons to-day the new customs tariff was up for discussion. Hon. Mr. Fielding was guiding the bill thru the house. W. F. Maclean raised an important issue as to who was responsible for the enforcement of the clauses of the act against importers or manufacturers or both conspiring to enhance prices against the public of goods or products covered by the tariff law. And here is the official debate.

On Section 11.—Mr. Fielding: Section 11 deals with the procedure in relation to the establishing of a charge of conspiracy, combination, etc. The clause as it reads says: "That whenever from or as a result of proceedings in any court of justice, it appears to the satisfaction of the governor in council, etc."

The suggestion is offered that the expression "any court of justice" is too broad. I think my hon. friend the leader of the opposition suggested that we might consider whether other words could be used of a more qualified character. After consultation with the department of justice, we propose to strike out the words "any court of justice" and insert instead thereof "the supreme court, or exchequer court of Canada, or in any superior court or county court in Canada."

Mr. Fielding: In this case they will be proceedings that might be instituted by anybody. It deals with disclosures that might be made in the ordinary courts of justice. Mr. W. F. Maclean: There are any instructions in the act to the attorney general of Canada to proceed in these cases on his own motion? Mr. Fielding: No, he has to be instructed by the government.

Mr. W. F. Maclean: Why should it not be the law? Mr. Fielding: We have another procedure in another court. Mr. W. F. Maclean: I know, but when we have a tariff law, and we have a railway law, and I intend to elaborate the argument a little later—I say that the law should read this way: "The attorney general of Canada, is hereby required to enforce this act."

United States they have a law under which punishment is provided. The attorney-general of the United States is charged with the enforcement of that law. Every district attorney in the United States is charged with the duty of prosecuting the law. And the attorney-general of Canada has confessed here tonight that if he were so empowered, he would have no such law. And I suppose if the funds were at his disposal, he would do the same thing. Mr. W. F. Maclean: What is the punishment, then? Mr. Brodeur: I am afraid my hon. friend (Mr. W. F. Maclean) has not examined this question very carefully. Had he done so he would have found that in our criminal law there is a definite provision on this subject. Mr. W. F. Maclean: That is it? Mr. Brodeur: Yes, in the case of a conspiracy in restraint of trade, the members of it are liable to be sent to jail for a term not exceeding two years, or a fine of not more than \$500, or both.

Mr. W. F. Maclean: Just before 6 o'clock I directed the attention of the hon. member for South York to section 2 of that clause which provide with reference to violations of the law relating to combinations and unfair enhancement of prices to the public. I asked the minister of customs, and especially the minister of justice, what was the law under which he expressed in these two clauses, as to the prosecution of persons guilty of such improper combinations, and the question. I ask the attorney general for the Dominion to explain if there is any other law that is to be found in these two clauses for the suppression of unfair combinations to the public of goods that come within the meaning of the Criminal Code.

Mr. Aylesworth: I presume the hon. gentleman is referring to the provisions of the Criminal Code under which the unlawful combination of any body of men unduly to enhance prices is a crime. The administration of that statute is within the duty of the hon. gentleman. It is not part of the duty of the attorney general of Canada, so far as the administration of that statute is concerned, where it is specially made his duty by statute to engage in the administration of criminal justice. I do not know any other law that is to be found in the Dominion which is to be administered by the hon. gentleman. If at any time it becomes the duty of the hon. gentleman to enforce the law, or any other law of Canada, then so long as I have charge of that department, I will do my duty to the best of my ability.

Mr. W. F. Maclean: We have now a statement from the attorney general for Canada as to his position in prosecuting not only violations of the tariff law, but of other Dominion laws, and I say this law against combinations ought to be in that condition in this country. The responsibility of enforcing it should rest upon the government, and especially upon the attorney general.
