Earl Grey Denies Report of Recent Speech That He Favored Present Contribution.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 14. Addressing the Canadian Club here to-day, Earl Grey, governor-general, said he had been quoted in certain journals, particularly those in Halifax, where he spoke last week, as making an impassioned appeal to Canada to contribute to the support of the British navy.

It was time, he said, that, with her small population, as compared with that of Germany or the United States, the United Kingdom could not be expected permanently to keep up the greatest navy in the world without the support of Canada, but he did not believe the time had come for Canada to contribute anything, and he had never said so.

There were other ways for Canada to expend her present wealth. She should concentrate it on what will increase her strength, for, some day, they will have to help keep up the British navy.







But the ordinance upon this subject illustrates the point we have in mind.

We are not criticizing the administration of the ordinance, but it is interesting to read it. It requires that a child shall be, or appear to be, eight years old before he shall be granted a license.
