**HAT NARROW SQUEAK**  
 Toronto Very Nearly on the Eve  
 of a Smallpox Epidemic.

**PROMPTNESS OF ACTION PREVENTED IT.**

Medical Health Officer Sheard Waylays the  
 R. & O. Steamer Passport.

Gets the Tip by Telephone From Belleville That a Man Supposed to Be Suffering From the Dread Disease Had Boarded the Steamer There, Bound for Toronto—Health Officers Wait Up All Night and Find the Infected Man in the Steerage—He Was Rowed to the Isolation Hospital and the Steamer Placed in Strict Quarantine Under Police Patrol—Passengers Must Be Kept Till All Chances of Contagion Have Passed—Whitney, Who Has Come From Montreal, Spent All Saturday in Belleville—Has Anyone Been Infected There?—The Passport Will Be Laid Off for the Season—Dr. Sheard Believes There is No Danger in Toronto.

Thanks to the prompt action of Medical Health Officer Sheard and the cordial co-operation of the officers of the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company, Toronto has been rescued from an awful danger that threatened the lives and happiness of her citizens and the trade and commerce of the city.

The very mention of smallpox is enough to strike terror to the hearts of all who know the loathsomeness of the disease and the devastation that follows its appearance. It was the introduction of this awful disease into Toronto that Dr. Sheard's prompt and effective measures have undoubtedly prevented, and every citizen may well feel thankful that so efficient and so strong an official was at the head of the Health Department in this emergency.

At 3:30 o'clock on Sunday morning a representative of the Toronto Express Dr. Sheard, Professor Shuttleworth and Ambulance Driver Hague driving rapidly along King-street. Naturally the reporter concluded that only something of great importance would take this trio out at that hour of the night, and determined to keep an eye on them. Their mission proved more than important. They were driving hither and thither, making preparations to prevent the introduction of no less a scourge than smallpox into the city, and they were working with an energy, promptness and determination that must arouse the admiration of all who become acquainted with the precautions taken, the arrangements made, and the splendid quarantine put into operation.

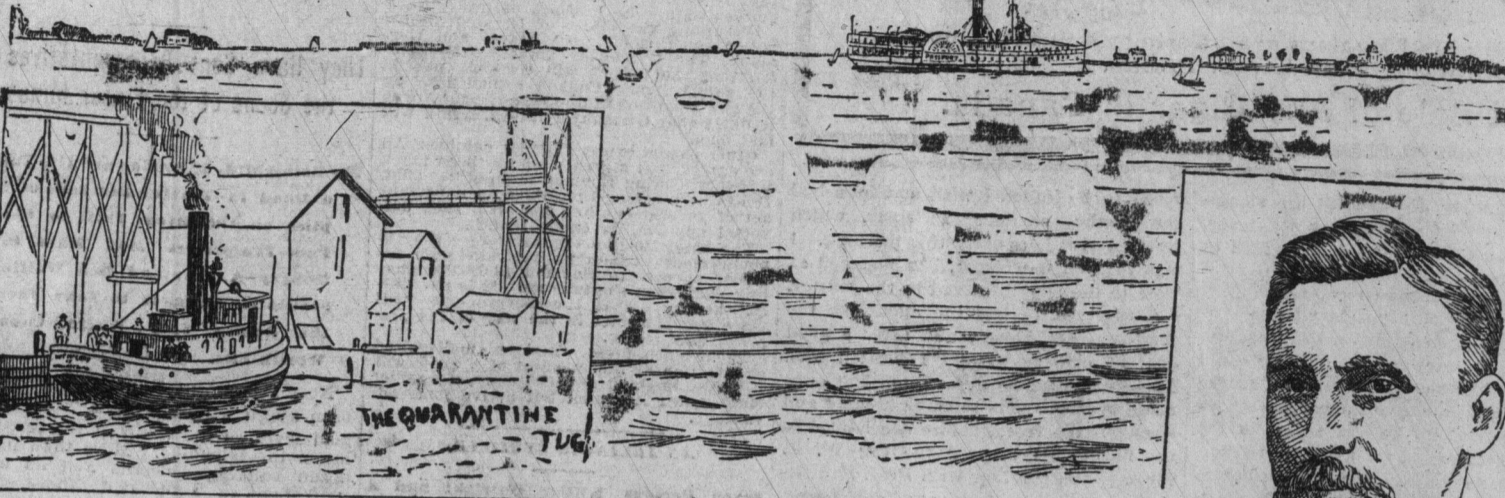
The **Terrible Message.**  
 At 10:30 on Tuesday night Dr. Sheard received a message from Belleville by telephone, informing him that a man who was suspected of having smallpox had boarded the steamer Passport of the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation Company, bound for Toronto. Instantly the doctor realized the necessity for prompt action. Not a minute was to be lost. He was at the Island when the message was delivered to him, but in fifteen minutes he was in the city and had commenced making arrangements to stop the steamer before she reached the harbor, and, if necessary, inspect every living soul on board. Assistance was needed at once to complete all arrangements. Professor Shuttleworth was summoned, and in a very short time every official of the Health Department was on the job. Steam Disinfectors Hawthorne and an assistant were despatched to the Isolation Hospital to make all necessary arrangements for the reception of a smallpox patient should one be found on the steamer. The next thing to be done was to make every provision to prevent the steamer landing infection possible. Dr. Sheard was determined to take most extreme measures if it was found necessary to do so, but he wisely decided to attain his purpose with the least possible trouble or display of authority.

**Found Agent Dolan.**  
 With some difficulty he located Joseph F. Dolan, agent for the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company, of whose fleet the Passport is one of the oldest and most popular steamers. Mr. Dolan was informed of the circumstances, and to his credit it must be said that he readily consented to give the health officials every assistance.

**Secured a Tug.**  
 To secure a tug on which to go out and meet the Passport was the next necessity. Dr. Sheard and Prof. Shuttleworth walked up and down the waterfront for two hours before they secured the kind of boat they wanted. It was Sunday morning and every boat was tied up. At about 4 o'clock, just as the dawn was breaking, the officials sped a tug towing a schooner into the harbor. It proved to be the W. F. McElroy, Captain Jackman, with the schooner Kewatin. As soon as she left her pier Dr. Sheard secured her, and accompanied by Mr. Dolan, Prof. Shuttleworth, Inspector

To keep them in good humor we have restrained our hands from what we might perfectly well have taken, and have even hurried to make gratuitous promises not to accept good things if they were offered to us. The end of it is that the much courted foreigner is less in love with us than ever."

Big Banking Firms Are Now Taking an Interest IN KLONDIKE GOLD FIELDS. They Have Sent Representatives to the Scene of the Placer Mines.

New York, Aug. 1.-Wall street has been seized with a genuine "forty nine" gold fever as the result of the discoveries in the Klondike. More than half a dozen banking concerns and as many individuals in the financial world are now actively turning away from \$3000 to \$125,000 each which clients and customers wish to invest under their guidance and supervision in the great gold fields of Alaska.

Many of those in Seattle at present are adopting the plan of taking their own horses. A good, well-broken pack horse may be bought for \$35. "Case plug," with many unselected trails, from \$15 to \$25. Judging from appearances, every horse in Seattle is for sale. Faithful old animals that have seen all degrees of better days are unobtainable for delivery wages and offered along with wild buckskins and pelts from Eastern Washington.

At Seattle to get Transportation to the Klondike Gold Fields Many are taking their own horses. The power of reprisal on Germany's part is of course strictly limited by the necessary regard to the people of the territories. will not be "God Save the Queen." The British Minister's Comment.

The Tribune commences an action of Great Britain in denouncing the Belgian-German treaties as follows: "That means that henceforth the British Empire is to be a commercial unit, distinct from the rest of the world. Great Britain may make whatever bargains she pleases with her colonies, without letting anyone else in under the 'most favored nations' clause. For commercial purposes the colonies are no longer separate states. They are members of the one great state nation, comprising the British Empire as a whole. The world is to be sought, but commerce is to be preferred, and wherever the interests of the former, not the latter, is to be sacrificed, the Empire it is to be sacrificed within the Empire of the British Empire with all outside is unhesitatingly sacrificed." Truly the modern world might well adopt the motto "Advance, and inscribe upon her banners 'Advance, Britannia!'"

# REASON OF THE ABRIGATION.

It was the objection raised by the Colonies to Article 7.

The reason for Great Britain's action in abrogating the treaty is the objection to the colonies to article 7, which reads as follows:

"The stipulations of the preceding articles 1 to VI, shall also be applied to the colonies and territories of Her Britannic Majesty. In those colonies and possessions the produce of the states of the Zollverein shall be subject to any higher or other duties than the produce of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or of any other country of the like kind, nor shall the exportation from those colonies and possessions to the United Kingdom be subject to any higher or other duties than the exportation to the United Kingdom from Great Britain and Ireland." This clause, which was modeled upon article XV of the treaty with Belgium (1839), provides that articles of duty and manufacture of Belgium shall not be subject to higher duties than those of British origin. This treaty is terminable one year after the date of its ratification, and the high contracting parties reserve to themselves the right to modify the stipulations of the treaty, by common consent, any modification, however, not at variance with its spirit or principles, and the utility of which may be shown by experience.

In the British House of Commons on July 30, 1894, Sir E. Grey said in reply to Sir A. Rolit: "The general opinion of the British public is in favor of the British colonies; (2) they do not prevent differential treatment by British colonies in favor of other countries; (3) they do not prevent differential treatment by British colonies in favor of other countries."

# INTER-COLONIAL CONFERENCE RESOLUTION.

The resolution passed at the Inter-colonial Conference in the summer of 1894, requesting the abrogation or modification of the treaty, reads as follows:

"1. That provision in article VII of the Imperial legislation enabling the dependent colonies to enter into reciprocal trade agreements with one another, including power of making differential tariff with Great Britain or with one another."
