



It might be expected that during the above three weeks, either the visible supply, or the exports, or both together, would show an increase over same weeks in 1897 equal to the increase in the receipts at primary markets, of 7,926,044 bushels. On the contrary, the visible supply and the exports together show a net decrease of 1,557,540 bushels. This conclusion would of course be based on the assumption that the deliveries of wheat at points not tributary to the western primary markets have been equal to those in same weeks of last year. This may be disputed on the theory so generally advanced, that farmers in the winter wheat states are holding back their wheat. However true this may have been with regard to the early part of the season, it does not appear to be the case now, as the deliveries of wheat alone at the five primary winter wheat markets, during the three weeks, Sept. 26 to Oct. 17, were 7,195,000 bushels, as compared with 4,723,000 bushels in same weeks in 1897. The discrepancy between the statistical assumption and the actual position may be accounted for, in some
