This last item may forecast the Old Ironsides, Knob Hill, Mother Lode, Sunset and other companies who are oper Sunset and other companies who are operating on a large scale, and employing thousands of men in the Greenwood or Boundary Creek sections of British Columbia. The fact of the matter, therefore, to-day, is that over half of the byg mines in the coast province are now idle; that three of the reduction works which they supply with ore have followed suit, and that within a few days, if the mineowners' program is carried out to the full, the remaining big mines in the province, and the only other reduction plant will be in the same position.

Protest Against S-Hour Law.

This wholesale cessation of the mining and smelfing industry in British Columbia is, without doubt, the result of the determination of the mineowners of the province to crush the Miners' Union, and procure the resolution of the objectionable eight-hour law. As regards this piece of legislation, it was explained in The World on Thursday that at the last meeting of the British Columbia Legislature a law was passed making it a penal offence for a mine owner to employ any man more than 8 hours underground in 24, and also making it a penal offence for any miner to work underground for more than 8 hours in every 24. Previous to this enactment the miners had been working 10 hours underground in every 24, and when the enactment was put on the statute books the mine owners prepared to reduce the wages of the men in proportion. To such reduction the men objected, and demanded a 10-hour wage for an 8-hour day's work. The mine owners, of course, refused the demand, and a strike of the miners in the Slocan, Nelson and Ymir districts followed. A great number of men went out on strike, and as a consequence the great silver mines of the Slocan and other properties in the other two districts mentioned have been practically idle ever since. This was the beginning which led up to the present situation. Protest Against S-Hour Law.

A Measure to Catch Votes.

The emetment was the work of Fighting Joe Martin, who has been heard of as making friends. ### REPUBLIC'S 200-TON MILL.

Rathmullen Mine Likely to Be Shipping Within 30 Days-Greenwood Smelting War.

THE MINING EXCHANGE FUSION.

Amalgamation Likely to Go Thru-Quotations and Sales of Mining Stocks Yesterday.

Mr. D. C. Jackling, who is now in Republic Camp, in connection with the new 200-ton mill for the Republic Mine, is reported as saying that the plant should be finished and ready for business by July 1 of this year, and as making the following

"The plant will be situated above No. 4 tunnel of the Republic Mine and slightly to the south of it and will be on five different levels. There will be a total elevaterent leveis. There will be a total eleva-tion of 41 feet between the extreme upper and lower leveis. The extreme width up and down the hill will be 253 feet and the extreme length along the face of the hill will be 315 feet. There will be four build-lags combined into one general structure. The first or upper building will be 57 feet long, the second one 315 feet long, the third 205 feet long and the fourth 55 feet long. The general structure is unusual in form, but this was necessary in order to accom-modate the conditions that existed in this particular case.

but this was necessary in order to accommodate the conditions that existed in this particular case.

"On the upper level will be an ore bin with a capacity of 800 tons and the revolving ore dryers with a capacity of 125 tons each every 24 hours. On the second level will be the fine crushing machinery consisting of rolls and ball mills. On the third level will be an ore bin of 800 tons capacity for the finished crushings, and three Jackling straight-line roasting furnaces of 75 tons capacity each, with space for an additional furnace. On the fourth level will be the leaching department consisting of steel tanks 22 feet square and 6% feet deep. On the fifth level will be the solution storage tanks, the precipitating tanks and filter presses for collecting the valuable product.

and filter presses for collecting the valuable product.

"Above and to the right of the main mill will be a sampling mill with a capacity of 200 tons every 12 hours.

"The plant is to be automatic thruout, no manual labor being required except in loading and unloading the leaching tanks."

The mill will be run by steam, 320 horsepower being required for this purpose. We shall have a total boiler capacity of 480 horse-power, but some of this power will be used for running an air compressor with which the machine drills of the mine will be operated, and for driving dynamos with which the mill and mine will be lighted. There will be one 18) horse-power simple Corliss engine for driving the fine crushing section of the mill. The sampling, roasting and precipitating sections of the plant will be run by an 80 horse-power, a 60 horse-power and 20 horse-power engine respectively. The steam plant will be situated to the right of the upper section of the mill, the entire power for both mine and, mill being under one roof and under the direction of one man.




