Sheng, the Shanghai Taotai, Says Serious Rebellion Has Broken Out in Kwangsi, and That 100,000 Troops Are Needed to Cope With the Danger.

It is Directed Against the Manchus, and Threatens to Become Worse Than the Taiping Rebellion—Situation at Hong Kong is Yet Grave—Powers Still Negotiating.

Shanghai, Oct. 11.—Sheng, the taotai, has received a telegram from Sun Sheng, reporting that a serious rebellion has broken out in the southwestern part of Kwangsi Province, that his 30,000 troops are inadequate, and he needs at least 100,000 to cope with the danger, which is directed against the Manchus and threatens to become worse than the Taiping rebellion.

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A DELUGE IN NEW BRUNSWICK; PROVINCE LIKE A GREAT LAKE!

Traffic on the C.P.R. and Other Lines at a Standstill Owing to Washouts, Mud Slides and Bridges Carried Away—Rain Fell 118 Hours Steadily.

St. John, N.B., Oct. 11.—The entire province of New Brunswick resembles a lake at 9 o'clock to-night. It rained steadily for 118 hours, and 10 inches of rain have fallen. No trains are moving on the C.P.R. between St. John and Vancouver, on the branch lines of the road to St. Andrew's, Saint Stephen, Fredericton or Woodstock, caused by an aggregation of washouts. The bridge at Holyton, on the main line, was swept away. Between St. John and Vancouver and branch lines there are 23 washouts, some 100 feet long and 25 feet deep. The condition is the worst in years; thousands of dollars' damage is done.

THE BOERS ARE STILL ABLE TO HARASS THE BRITISH FORCES

Roberts Cables That Forty Engineers Were Ambushed—Two Were Killed, Seven Wounded and Eleven Were Captured.

London, Oct. 11.—The following despatch has been received from Lord Roberts:

"Fortra (Wednesday), Oct. 10.—An engine, with a truck, conveying a party of engineers belonging to Page's Rifle Brigade, while proceeding yesterday to Kampund, was ambushed by Boers.

"The casualties, unfortunately, were heavy. 'Sevent and one private' were killed. Captain Page, Lieutenant Stubbs and five engineers were wounded, and Lieutenant Sewell and ten of the Rifle Brigade were made prisoners.

"Dewet's mounted men and Colonial, after three days' fighting, have driven Dewet north of the Vaal, near Venters' Kloof.

William Burns, Messrs. Allan and Burns were announced by the Globe as the candidates several days ago, and all an alleged free convention of last night had to do was to endorse the action of the machine, composed of the seven before-referred-to individuals. Now, look at the names and addresses of the six: Robert Jeffrey, 74 Grenville-street; W. J. Elliott, 82 Collier-street; George Lindsey, 28 Tynard-avenue; Dr. Lynn, 1433 West Queen-street; J. E. Elliott, Church and Alexander-streets; Walter Boland, West Bloor-street, near the Junction.

They were all on the platform as well as the following: Rev. Dr. Dewar, J. S. Wilson, S. C. Biggs, S. H. James, James W. Mallon, Ald. J. J. Graham, William Lount, Q.C. Of the latter bunch, Ald. Graham alone is a voter in West Toronto.

Convention Open by Ticket. The convention was open by ticket only, but about 150 persons who were not accredited were managed to get in, with or without tickets. The proceedings opened with the election of officers for West Toronto. The following were elected: President, George C. Campbell; vice-president, A. W. Holmes; secretary, F. S. McArthur; an Executive Committee of 14 was elected, composed of the chairman of the 14 divisions.

In Suburbanland, Mr. F. S. Leveson-Gower (Liberal Unionist) defeated Mr. John McLeod (Liberal), who won the seat in the late Parliament and in the Southport division of South-west Lancashire. Mr. B. Marshall Hall (Conservative) wrested the seat from Sir George Augustus Pilkington, who secured it in the by-election last year.

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THE B.C. MINES ARE BOOMING

C.P.R. Smelters Are Being Worked to Their Fullest Capacity, So President Shaughnessy Says.

GRAND FORKS ONE TO BE DOUBLED. And the Smelter at Trail is Being Similarly Enlarged—The N. W. Crop Not So Bad.

Montreal, Oct. 11.—(Special.)—The president of the Canadian Pacific Railway returned to the city to-day. "Our smelters in British Columbia," said Mr. Shaughnessy, "are being worked to their fullest capacity, and are being enlarged and added to to meet the demands upon them. The Grand Forks smelter is now handling 800 tons of ore daily, and within 60 days will have been completed to double its present capacity. The smelter at Trail is being similarly enlarged. At Greenwood the smelter recently begun will be shortly completed, and will be able to handle 1,000 tons a day. We are also building a pyritic smelter at Boundary Falls for the treatment of the low-grade ore."

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HAVING A HEAP OF TROUBLE

Some United States Soldiers in the Philippines Captured, and Some Are Deserting.

General Mojica's officers are surrendering and his soldiers attempting to escape to Samar in boats, are being captured and his guerrillas and Ladrones when questioned admitted that they were in the hands of the Americans. Two Americans were killed and three wounded.
