PRESBYTERIANS.

In New Zealand there were the same unions, and she was reminded of her visit to these people when she came to Toronto. She had a message from the ladies of Dunedin, who are grateful for correspondence and kindly help of Toronto sisters. We are all banded together, said Mrs. Oates, in one Empire, under one flag, and our one aim is to send the Gospel of Christ to the heathen. We are doing just what the Lord means us to do when we are taking up the work at home as well as abroad. The speaker has been asked to give her impressions of another part of the Empire, the great Empire of India, which she has visited. She made a hasty run through India, and had been impressed by several things. First, there was the greatness of the field, a great expanse of territory. You have a great expanse of territory in Canada, but in India the field is almost boundless. The population of the Empire of India is the most difficult to estimate. Another thing that impressed the speaker was the great variety of the difficulties encountered. The depressing climate was very trying on the white people.
