





Once the principle of complete individual control was acknowledged, the only serious obstacle to agreement was removed. Nor could there be any unwillingness to accept the proposition that in whatever way each state organized its naval and military forces, these should be made and kept thoroly efficient, and prepared for effective co-operation ..

The determination to have and exercise full local control is not only essential to nationhood, but provides for imperial development along its natural lines. Any other solution of the problem would be unacceptable, and unworkable. If it means greater individual responsibility, it also means a wider outlook and real influence in the shaping of imperial foreign policy. That influence will undoubtedly make for peace but no teason exists to fear that on this point the mother country will be found wanting.


