GERMANS AGAIN REPULSED AT DOUAUMONT FEDERAL WAR TAX ON PROFITS PLACED ON FAIRER BASIS Wilson is Victorious After Hot Fight in Senate

FOE CHECKED IN LOCAL ATTACKS AT DOUAUMONT

Germans Increased Violence of Artillery Bombardment North of Verdun.

HAD RANKS DECIMATED

British Recover "International Trench" and Take German Salient.

LONDON, March 2.—Fighting was resumed on a violent local scale by the Germans on the front north of Verdun today, when, after they had increased their artillery fire along the whole front east and west of the Meuse, they made several heavy infantry attacks against the French positions in the region of Douaumont, and met with severe repulses by French troops, who inflicted large losses on them.

WAR SUMMARY: Today's Events Reviewed

SUDDENLY increasing the intensity of their bombardment, the Germans yesterday resumed their attacks on the front lying to the north of Verdun, by concentrating their efforts in an endeavor to carry the French positions around Douaumont, where their several violent onsets were repulsed, their ranks being decimated by the French artillery and small arms fire.

If the Germans wish to resume their efforts to capture Verdun, and if they stick to their present route of approach, they will have to force their way along a narrow front of three miles, part of which is impassable by reason of the hills in the way.

CARMEN SYLVA CALLED SUDDENLY BY DEATH

Queen Mother of Roumania, Celebrated as Poetess, Died Yesterday.

WROTE NUMEROUS PLAYS

Also Attained Distinction as Novelist—Was Daughter of Prince of Wied.

LONDON, March 2, 10.30 p.m.—A Bucharest despatch received by Reuters' Telegram Co., by way of Amsterdam, says that the Queen Mother Elizabeth of Roumania (Carmen Sylva) died this morning, aged 73.

The pen name "Carmen Sylva," by which the Queen Mother Elizabeth of Roumania was most widely known, was chosen by her in expression of her love for song and the woods. She was one of the most charming figures in the courts of Europe, and practically the only one of recent generations to gain fame as a poetess.

In her own words, she was born "far from a throne," for altho she was a princess of Wied, one of the many tiny principalities with which Germany abounded, her youth was that of an ordinary robust country girl who learned to cook and sew, and who romped in the open with her companions at the village school. She was born Dec. 29, 1843, and in her childhood she showed predilection for the poetical fancies that had such an influence on her later life. At home she received Spartan training, and with a father who was an invalid for life, and a brother who was incurably ill, she experienced many sorrows and hardships.

W. J. HENDRY IS DEAD AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Former Principal of Jesse Ketchum School Passed Away Yesterday.

After a lingering illness W. J. Hendry passed away at his home, 91 Hazelton avenue, yesterday morning. The late Mr. Hendry was principal of Jesse Ketchum School before Yorkville came into the city. He was the first principal of the Mimico Industrial School, and was one of the four leading principals who were appointed supervisors of the public schools in 1882. Mr. Hendry had been treasurer of the Ontario Educational Association for fifteen years and attended school with the former chief inspector of schools, Dr. James L. Hughes.

ALUMINUM CARCO CONFISCATED

LONDON, March 2.—The British Prize Court today condemned 50 tons of aluminum shipped by Liss Berger & Co., in America, on the Swedish ship Augusto to a Swedish port, but destined, according to the judge, for German owners. The consignment was seized in the Orkney Islands.

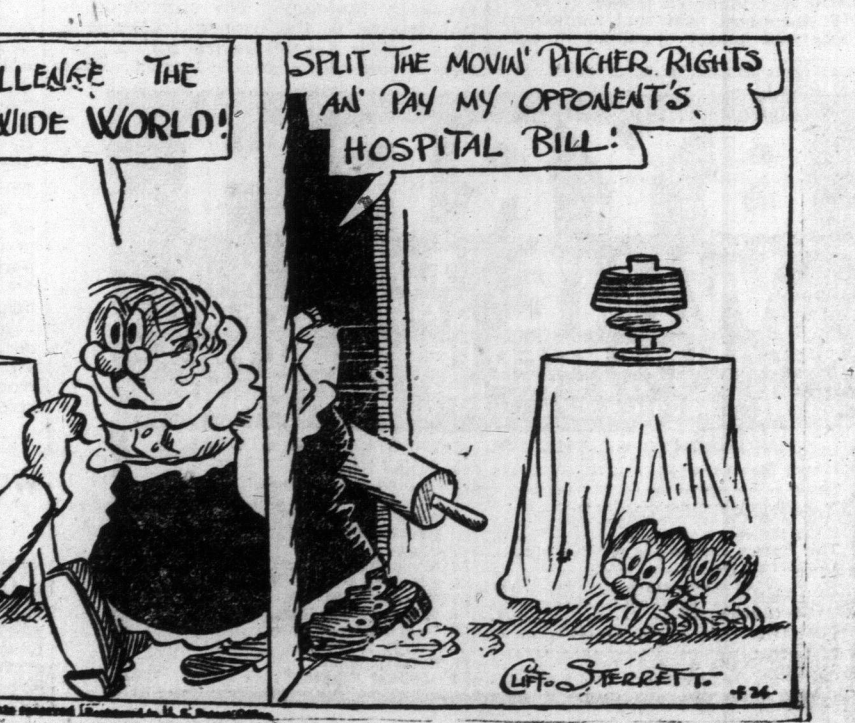

WILSON GAINED IN SENATE BATTLE

Gore's Resolution Virtually to Truckle to Germany Faces Certain Defeat.

CHARGE A BOOMERANG President to Have Republican Support in Demanding Freedom of Seas.

WASHINGTON, March 2.—Out of a day's developments in President Wilson's fight with congress, crowded to the utmost with elements of the sensational and dramatic, the administration in the senate tonight forced through pledges of enough votes to kill once and for all, Senator Gore's resolution to warn Americans of armed ships of the European belligerents, and demonstrate that congress stands behind the president in his negotiations with Germany.

Action in the senate, it is believed, will be followed promptly by stiffening of the sentiment in the house against the president's foreign policy.

Broke Party Lines.

In one of the greatest non-partisan battles the senate has seen in years, Chairman Stone of the foreign relations committee declared he was not in accord with the president's determination to support the president's determination to warn Americans of armed ships of the European belligerents, and demonstrate that congress stands behind the president in his negotiations with Germany.

Opponents on Run.

In the house, where the president is backed by the majority, the senate gave signs of breaking up the opposition and the president's confident tonight similar action there. While the senate debated there came news to the state department from Berlin which indicated that the president's position in congress was being used deliberately to weaken the president's hand in Germany. Confidential sources stated that the president's position in the German capital, as having come from Washington, declared that congress stood five to one against the president.

Gore's Insinuation.

Senator Gore, while the senate sat in amazement, related a story that President Wilson at his conference with congress leaders a week ago had declared that Germany had intended to build a road through the same territory as the Canadian Northern, W. F. Munn, president of the Canadian Northern, had insinuated that the existing road would all be taken over, in a fair price, by the Canadian Northern. He thought a policy of this kind could be carried out in the provinces and would have complete control of all railroads without doing any injustice to vested interests.

Official Denial.

Asks Republicans' Aid.

Outside of the Democratic ranks one of the developments was President Wilson's invitation to Republican Leader Mann to confer with him at the White House.

U. S. REACHES DECISION IN CASE OF APPAM

WASHINGTON, March 2.—The state department today sent to Count Bernstorff, the German ambassador, its decision in the case of the British liner Appam, which was captured by a German raider and brought into Hampton Roads in charge of a crew. Announcement of the contents will be withheld at the request of counting for the German Government, pending a decision in the libel action brought by agents of the original British owners in the federal court at Norfolk.

EXTRADITION REFUSED

Six French Poets: Studies in Contemporary Literature, by A. H. Lowell. Toronto: The Macmillan Company of Canada, Ltd. \$2.50.

NO LICENSE REDUCTION PENDING REFERENDUM

Licenses Will Be Extended for Six Months, With Quick Cancellation for Breaches.

Pending the referendum vote on prohibition next summer, there will be no reduction of licenses in Ontario. It is understood that the Ontario License Board, in view of the possibility that all licenses in the province may be eliminated, is not disposed to make an exception of those whose licenses would have been cut in the ordinary course of events, as part of the restriction policy of the board. The board, however, will not allow licensees to take advantage of this change of policy by ignoring restraint.

The board, in announcing a general extension of licenses of six months or more, will at the same time announce that the licensee who breaks the law will find himself out of business in a week. Cases which are now punished by suspension would mean cancellation on the first offence.

"If we permit a general extension," said Chairman Flavell this morning, "there are some licensees that should not be allowed to continue any time, and if they are, they will have to live up to the law in the very strictest sense. No matter if prohibition is carried out, licensees are to be eliminated in a short time, the board will take immediate action wherever the law is ignored or transgressed."

FAVORABLE IMPRESSION BY KATHERINE GOODSON

Clever Pianist Fully Justified Reputation as One of Leading Women Players.

Revels in Difficulty

Brahms Rhapsody in E Flat Was One of Evening's Perfect Numbers.

Katherine Goodson had an excellent reception at the Conservatory of Music last night, when a fashionable audience crowded the hall for the benefit of the Belgian relief fund. The performance was under the patronage of Their Excellencies the Duke and Duchess of Connaught. Katherine Goodson is one of the leading women pianists of the day, and she fully justified her reputation for clever and artistic work in a varied, but popular program. Her touch is delicate and she is capable of the most intricate technical displays, and also evidently of powerful tone production, altho the lady grand upon which she played did not afford her as responsive a medium in this respect as a concert grand piano would have done. Altogether she left a highly favorable impression and she will be welcome in any future visit. Her program opened with two Scarlatti numbers, and she whittled her taste and tendencies, Scarlatti can never be ignored and it is pleasant to hear him rendered so appreciatively. The sonata that Mendelssohn would have written had Beethoven not done it first was the next item, and Miss Goodson played it in fine Mendelssohn style, with a molten sweetness of tone that fell like its own moonlight on the ear. The allegretto and presto movements were given with artistically contrasted spirit. Brahms' Rhapsodie in E flat, Op. 119, No. 4, followed, and this unusually attractive composition was played with fine vivacity and intelligence. It was one of the perfect numbers of the evening. A Chopin suite included four numbers, the Ballade in flat, No. 47, being the longest. Miss Goodson is thoroly at home in Chopin. She revels in technical difficulties and delights in bringing out the subtleties of thought beyond the mechanical barrier. This was evident not only in the Ballade, but in the charming Scherzo in B minor, Op. 20, the tender passages of which were given with rare grace; while the Valse in A flat, Op. 34, was rendered with a sparkling spirit that secured an encore.
