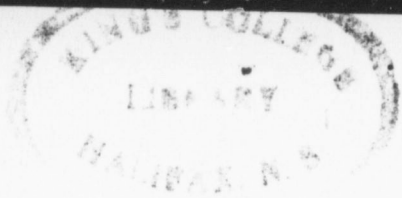

WEDNESDAY, JULY 1st.

**APPENDIX A.**

**REPORT**

OF THE

**BOARD OF DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS**

FOR THE DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.

TO THE LORD BISHOP, AND MEMBERS OF THE DIOCESAN SYNOD.

The Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions think it well at the outset of their Report to briefly advert to the changes adopted at the last Session of the Synod for carrying on the work assigned it.

It will be remembered that previously to July, 1884, *i. e.*, since July, 1871, there were two Boards—one for Domestic, and one for Foreign Missions—to act as Corresponding Committees with two Central Boards formed by the Provincial Synod. In consequence, however, of the Provincial Synod having at its last session, in September, 1883, formed a Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society to take the place of the former organization and to be a centre for all missionary work in this Ecclesiastical Province, there no longer existed the need of two Diocesan Boards. One was therefore dispensed with at your last Session, and a Board, to be called “The Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions for the Diocese of Fredericton,” was formed, with the same Constitution as the Boards had had heretofore, to be a Corresponding Committee with the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society for the Church of England in Canada, and to promote in every possible manner interest in missionary work throughout the Diocese. Throughout the year no correspondence has passed between the Board and the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada. The appeals which it has issued have been sent direct to the clergy, and the only connection with it which your Board at present contemplates is to report all money which passes through it for various missionary objects, except, of course, any sum be received for transmission to that Society, when it would be forwarded as desired.

From a statement issued by that Society, it appears that from October, 1883, to March, 1885, the sum of \$10,805.00 had been raised for Domestic Missions, and \$7,925.00 for Foreign Missions, making a total of \$18,730.00.

SPECIAL MISSIONARY SERVICE.

In consequence of the Anniversary meeting of the Diocesan Church Society having been held last year in the evening, for the public gene-

rally, a special missionary service was held in Trinity Church on Monday, June 30th, at 8 p. m., instead of the annual missionary meeting. The collection, amounting to \$44.65, was devoted to the payment of expenses connected with the Board.

#### THE DAY OF INTERCESSION.

The appointment of Rogation Tuesday as the Day of Intercession for Missions has proved for many reasons so unsuitable that a change in the day has, we are glad to say, been the subject of consideration in the Convocation of Canterbury, as well as in the Convention of the American Church. From the *Guardian* of Feb. 13th, 1885, we learn that the Archbishop of Canterbury had communicated upon the subject with the Archbishop of York, the Archbishop of Armagh, the Primate of Scotland, the Metropolitan of Canada, the Bishop of Cape Town, the Bishop of Calcutta, the Bishop of British Columbia, and the Bishop of Rupert's Land, and that they all were agreed that the Day of Intercession should be during the week in which St. Andrew's Day occurred, with preference to the eve of St. Andrew's Day. The following Resolution of the House of Bishops of the General Convention of the American Church has been communicated to the Convocation of Canterbury:

"That this House recommends to the Church the observance of the Sunday next before Advent, or of any day in the week in which the Festival of St. Andrew occurs, as a time of special intercession for missions."

We shall therefore, in all probability, be in due time notified that the Day of Intercession shall be in the future any day in the week in which St. Andrew's Day occurs, with preference to the Eve of St. Andrew's Day.

#### DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

During the past year the receipts for the Diocese of Algoma have been as follows: For General Purposes, \$355.48; for the Stipend of Bishop, \$245; for the Shingwauk Home for Indian boys, \$86.15; for the Wawanosh Home for Indian girls, \$18.66; for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, \$41.92. In addition to the above amounts one Parish has transmitted \$150 direct to the Treasurer of the Homes, making thus a sum total for that Diocese of \$897.21. By reference to former Reports, it will be seen that the sum of \$300 which this Diocese has undertaken to contribute annually towards the Bishop of Algoma's Stipend has been raised by a few subscribers. It is with much regret that we have now to report that for various reasons the Treasurer has not been able during the past year to collect more than \$245, leaving a balance of \$55 to meet the required amount. This balance your Board instructed the Treasurer to pay out of the sum on hand for

Domestic Missions, the object being strictly within the sphere of Domestic Missions, and the money under that head being in their judgment available for such purpose. We hope that a larger number of subscribers may, in the future, be secured for this special object, so that it may always be paid punctually as heretofore. In the event, however, of your Board being unable to raise the sum required, it would be well to give it instructions as to how it should act.

The contributions for the North-West Missions were as follows: For the Diocese of Saskatchewan, \$14.54; for the Diocese of Qu'Appelle, \$25.81; for the North-West Missions generally, \$23.69, making a total of \$64.04. The sum of \$40.90 has been also paid into your Board for the Sabrevois Mission, Montreal, and \$190 for Domestic Missions generally, thus making the total amount for Domestic Missions, \$1,192.15. The number of Parishes or Missions which have sent in contributions for Domestic Missions was 54. This leaves 18 in which no collection was made during the year for this very important branch of Missionary work.

From the Appeals issued by the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, and which we may add have been our only official source of information, there can be no doubt of the pressing needs of the Church in Algoma and the North West, nor of the great opportunity presented to the Church of going in and possessing the land. "We are altogether in a bad plight here," writes the Bishop of Rupert's Land, "and in need of all the help Canada can give. We have difficulties all along the line of our work, and for the present are, as regards ourselves, practically helpless." The vast area comprised within the six Dioceses into which that great region is divided; the scattered character of the inhabitants, and their comparative poverty, together with the small number of the clergy, present problems of gigantic magnitude in carrying on the work of the Church. And while every effort ought to be made to supply the ministrations of the Church to the immigrants from England, Scotland, Ireland, and elsewhere, still, if possible, is it more imperative that missionary work should be more largely extended to the Aborigines,—the various tribes of Indians which inhabit those great territories. "It is a great disgrace to our Church," writes the Bishop of Qu'Appelle, "that we should have such a large population of Indians living at our doors, and making scarcely any effort to evangelize them." The Bishop of Saskatchewan, whose Diocese is chiefly inhabited by Indians, writes: "That the great majority of the Western Indians are still heathen. There is at present a noble opportunity for the Church to step in and gather the Indians into her fold. With present means the opportunity can be only partially used, and the sad reflection is that it will soon

pass away." In view of the recent rebellion, by which many lives have been sacrificed, are we not called to greater effort on behalf of our fellow-countrymen — the Indians? We have surely not this land for a possession with any command to exterminate the inhabitants; rather has it been given to us that thereby the Indians of this vast continent may hear of the salvation of God.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We are glad to report that \$767.40 have been received for Foreign Missions. Of this amount \$569.80 were contributed for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts; \$97.60 for the Society for Promoting Christianity amongst the Jews, and \$100 for Benson's East Indian Missions, which, with the sum of \$380.22 reported to us by Mr. J. R. Ruel, Treasurer of the St. John's Church Missionary Society as having been remitted to the Church Missionary Society and the Society for promoting Christianity amongst the Jews, makes the sum total from the Diocese under this head of \$1,147.62. Fifty-seven Parishes or Missions had collections for the S. P. G., fifteen for the Jews' Society, and one for Benson's East Indian Missions. As in the case of Domestic Missions, we have here also to note several Parishes from which no collection has been received, and trust that by calling attention to the fact, what we venture to think is a neglected duty may be speedily attended to.

Among the chief events connected with the S. P. G. during the past year, we would note the celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the Consecration of Bishop Seabury, the first Bishop of the American Church, which took place in Aberdeen in October, 1884. It was an event of much significance, as showing how great a work the Society had been the means of accomplishing in planting a Church in the United States. Truly the little one had become a thousand, and the grain of mustard seed a great overshadowing tree. In order to extend the area of its work the venerable Society has ever in view the withdrawal of its aid, and throwing the Church it has planted, as early as possible, on its own resources. Of the thirteen Dioceses in Australia, only three receive aid from the Society. The six Dioceses of New Zealand are wholly independent of the Society, and we trust the time will soon come when the same may be said of all the older Dioceses in Canada.

The gross income of the Society was £110,039—a sum somewhat larger than the income of 1883, but, we are sorry to say, more than £2,000 less than the sum which the Society had at its disposal last year. The deficiency is attributed to exceptional commercial distress.

The Church Missionary Society recently held its eighty-sixth anniversary, which seems to have been attended with all the usual warmth

and enthusiasm. There was one drawback. It was, of course, a financial one. Its income, though upwards of £231,000, was £2,000 less than that of the previous year. An analysis of its receipts showed that the falling off had taken place in the manufacturing and not in the agricultural counties, and so attributable more particularly to commercial depression. Foremost among the important events of the year was the large number of men who offered themselves for missionary work; and still more remarkable were the type and character of the men. Two men, one from Cambridge, and one from Oxford, are going out entirely at their own charges.

The Missions in West Africa are growing in strength, and in India the native Christians are growing in independence. From Japan a loud call comes for help, and while in China the work of the Society has been much interfered with through the French naval operations, yet there have been added to the Church by Holy Baptism 312. The great need throughout is reinforcement.

The London Society for promoting Christianity amongst the Jews has, we regret to say, also suffered from a deficiency of funds, but has nevertheless persevered in its most interesting and difficult work. It is possible that the recent formation of another Society for carrying on Missions among the Jews—and called Parochial Missions to the Jews—may have to some extent diverted support from the older organization; be that as it may, it is a cause of thankfulness to see the Church at last awakening to her responsibility to the seed of Israel. In all missionary work the Divine direction, "beginning at Jerusalem," is surely still for the Church's guidance, and we cannot but feel that a special blessing will rest upon her in following it. Perhaps the most interesting fact connected with the Jews during the year was the publication of what is called "The National Jewish Christ-believing movement in South Russia." The character of the publication is easily gathered from its title. Its author is a Jewish lawyer, who writes under the conviction that Jesus of Nazareth was the True Messiah. Already it has borne fruit. More than 200 families have formed themselves into a Communion under the title "The National Jewish New Testament Congregation." Surely these are asking the way to Him, with their faces thitherwards. We are glad to note that the practice of having collections on behalf of missions to the Jews on Good Friday is growing in popularity. It is appropriate, and seems but right that, on the day our Church bids us pray for the Jews, we should make an offering to bring about their reconciliation with God. It is, we know, difficult to find room for the multiplying claims on the Church's bounty and prayers, but we trust that the cause of the Jews will receive, if possible, wider sympathy and more liberal offerings.

## CONCLUSION.

We cannot conclude without expressing our gratitude to Almighty God for what has been done by the Diocese in the past year for the extension of Christ's Church outside its own limits. In many respects it presents a gratifying result. It is as true of a Diocese as of a Parish that a very correct estimate can be formed of its spiritual condition by its interest in Christian Missions. For Christ's kingdom in general, as well as for our own Diocese, we urge the cause of Domestic and Foreign Missions. The millions of tons of water drawn up daily from the earth are the very condition of its fertility and prosperity. All that we can do to preach the Gospel to every creature will as surely enrich our spiritual life. Let none be weary in well doing, for in the words of the Bishop of London, "The present state of the world is such a call as no Church ever had before to go and preach the Gospel." Rather let our motto be, "Abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord."

## APPENDIX C.

## REPORT

OF

## STANDING COMMITTEE ON CHURCH BILL.

The Standing Committee of the Diocese beg to report to the Synod, that the Bill "to Consolidate and Amend the various Acts of Assembly relating to the Church of England in this Province," was submitted by them to both branches of the Legislature, and was passed by them, and has become law. A few amendments, not affecting the principle of the Bill, were agreed to by your Committee. The substitution of the words "the Standing Committee" for the words "the Synod," was not pressed by your Committee, as there was a strong feeling in the upper branch of the Legislature in favour of retaining the words "the Synod." The Bill, accordingly, passed with these words retained; and the Standing Committee have discharged their duty.

The Committee appointed to take into consideration the present Constitution, Rules of Order, and Canons adopted by the Synod, and to report upon the codification and amendment of the same, beg to submit the following Report:—

Your Committee find that the various amendments made to the Constitution of the Synod, and the Rules and Canons adopted from time to time since its organization, are sufficiently numerous and important to justify, in their opinion, a complete revision and codification under direction of the Synod; and they beg to submit the following general plan for such codification and revision.

### I. DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES.

They recommend that this be printed, as it appears at page 20 of the Journal of Synod for 1871, without alteration.

### II. CONSTITUTION.

They submit the following draft, including the present Constitution, with such amendments as either have already been adopted, or, having been suggested to the Committee, have appeared to them worthy of consideration.

1. The Synod shall consist of the Bishop of the Diocese, the Bishop Coadjutor, the Priests and Deacons of the Diocese, duly licensed by the Bishop, and resident in the same; and of lay Representatives, or their Substitutes, to be elected as hereinafter provided.

In case the lay Representatives elected, or either of them, shall not be present at any meeting of the Synod, the place of any lay Representative not so present may be taken by one of such Substitutes, the Substitute first named in the certificate of election, if he shall be present, being first entitled to attend; and such Substitute, so taking the place of any lay Representative, shall sit and vote until the end of the meeting of the Synod at which he shall take his place, in like manner as if he had been elected a lay Representative; and the lay Representative whose place shall be taken shall not be entitled to sit or vote at such meeting; provided that, in order to entitle a Substitute to sit and vote at any meeting of the Synod, the non-attendance of the regularly elected Representative shall be certified by the Secretary to the Synod, and any question regarding the right of the Substitute to attend shall then be determined by vote of the Synod, which determination shall be final. 1873, p. 11. 1874, p. 5, 6. 1880, p. 12. 1880, p. 12. 1881, p. 10.

(6.) The lay Representatives shall be elected every year at a meeting to be summoned, in the case of the Cathedral by the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor or Sub-Dean, and elsewhere by the Rector or Missionary in charge of the Parish or Cure, or in case the same shall be vacant, or the Rector or Missionary is absent, or unable or shall refuse to summon such meeting, then by the Church Wardens, or either of them, or by any three persons entitled to vote at the same. Such meetings shall be held upon Easter Monday or within thirty days thereafter, at such hour and place as the person or persons summoning the same shall direct. And the Representatives and Substitutes chosen at any such meeting shall continue in office until others shall be elected in their stead. Section 3. 1876. p. 18, 19.

In the case of a vacancy occurring in the representation of any Parish by death, resignation, refusal to act, or otherwise, such vacancy may be filled at a special meeting called for the purpose, in the case of the Cathedral by the Bishop, Bishop Coadjutor or Sub-Dean, and elsewhere by the Rector or other person or persons as provided in the next preceding sub-section; and such special meeting shall be held at such time and place as the person or persons summoning the same shall direct. Section 4.





any meeting of the Synod until the annual payment required from such Parish to the Contingent Fund of the Synod shall have been made, and such payment shall have been certified by the Treasurer, or by the Bishop or other person presiding at such meeting.

3. The quorum required for the transaction of any business in the Synod shall consist of not less than one fourth of the whole number of qualified Clergymen of the Diocese, and of not less than one fourth of the number of lay Representatives whose election shall have been certified to the Secretary of the Synod; but any lesser number shall have power to adjourn from time to time until a quorum can be obtained. Section 9.

4. No Act or Resolution of the Synod shall become valid without the concurrence of the Bishop, and of a majority of the Clergy and lay Representatives present; provided that ordinarily, the votes of the whole Synod shall be taken collectively; but that, at the desire of the Bishop, or at the request of any three other members of the Synod, the votes of both orders shall be taken separately and in this case a majority of each shall concur. Section 10.

5. The Synod shall meet upon the Wednesday before the first Thursday in July in each year, at Fredericton and St. John alternately, unless the time or place for any such annual meeting shall, by resolution of the Synod, be otherwise arranged. Section 11.

The Bishop, or the Bishop Coadjutor, or in the case of the absence of the Bishop and Bishop Coadjutor, or of a vacancy in the See, the Archdeacon, or if there be no Archdeacon, then the Bishop's Commissary at the time such absence or vacancy shall occur, or the Standing Committee, or a majority thereof at a Special Meeting of the Committee summoned for the purpose, shall have power to call a Special Meeting of the Synod on any occasion when he or they may deem it necessary for the welfare of the Diocese, at such time and place as he or they in summoning such meeting shall direct. The Bishop, or in case of his absence, or of a vacancy in the See, then such Bishop Coadjutor, Archdeacon, Commissary or Standing Committee as aforesaid, shall summon a Special Meeting of the Synod at such time and place as he or they shall, in summoning such Meeting, direct, on a requisition in writing signed by ten of the Clerical and a like number of lay members of the Synod, specifying the object of the Meeting; provided that no such Meeting shall be held until at least six months after the last preceding Meeting. 2. The selection of special psalms for certain public services, provided by the Bishop, as set forth in the Appendix to the Journal of Synod for 1873, page 15, shall be duly approved for use on the occasions specified therefor.

In the Order of Proceedings, the present section V to be numbered VI, and section V to be as follows:

V. Notices of motion to be submitted to the Synod, may be sent to the Secretary at least one month previous to its Annual Meeting; and the Secretary shall cause such notices to be printed in the order in which they are received, and forwarded to the members of the Synod with the usual notice of the Synod meeting; and motions of which notice has been given in such manner shall have priority of consideration, but shall not necessarily exclude other motions.

Act of the Dominion of Canada 34 Vic., cap. 58, intituled "An Act to extend to the Province of New Brunswick the operation of the Act of the late Province of Canada, concerning the Synod of the Church of England in Canada."

Act of the Legislature of New Brunswick 48 Vic., cap. 36, intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend various Acts of Assembly relating to the Church of England in New Brunswick."

In preparing their Report the Committee have endeavoured generally not to depart further from the present Constitution and Canons of the Synod than seemed necessary; and in presenting it they ask that they may not be considered as debarred from suggest-

ing or supporting individually any alterations which, upon debate in the Synod, may appear to be required.

**APPENDIX E.**

**REPORT OF THE SYNOD COMMITTEE ON  
SUNDAY SCHOOLS.**

TO THE RIGHT REVEREND THE LORD BISHOP, METROPOLITAN OF CANADA, AND THE SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.

The Committee of Synod on Sunday Schools beg to report,

That the work of Sunday Schools during the past year gives promise of much good fruit for the Church in the Diocese.

Your Committee had hoped to be in a position to present to the Synod at this Session such a table of statistics as would have shewn at a glance the present condition of our Sunday Schools, but, owing to the fact that several Missions have not as yet given the requisite information, they have thought it better to postpone their intention for another year, and to endeavour to draw up a complete return of statistics, which will include all Sunday Schools at work throughout the whole Diocese.

In order to bring about this result they recommend that returns should be made each year to the Chairman of the Sunday School Committee according to a form to be supplied by the Committee, either by the Clergyman of the Missions or Parishes, or by the Superintendent of Sunday Schools, with a view to bring before the Synod the whole work of Sunday Schools in the Diocese.

From the Report of the Diocesan Church Society for the year 1884 your Committee gather that 48 Parishes or Missions have returned 74 Sunday Schools, with an attendance of 435 Teachers and 3,700 Scholars. They find from the same source that 16 Parishes or Missions have made no returns, but they would estimate that had such returns been made, 25 Sunday Schools, 50 Teachers, and 500 Scholars might have been added to these figures, making in all 95 Schools, 485 Teachers and 4,200 Scholars.

It is evident that such a statement cannot fairly represent what ought to be done in the way of imparting religious instruction to the young; and this becomes a greater certainty from the fact that while the Deanery of St. Andrews returns an average of 59 Scholars to a Parish, the Deanery of Chatham shows an average of only 42 Scholars to a Parish. This comparison is not made by your Committee to the disparagement of the latter Deanery, but only to prove the inefficiency of our present system of Sunday School work, and to place before the clergy and laity of the Church the great need of more complete organization.

Indeed, when the whole Diocese is considered, wherein are several well populated city parishes, there is found to be an average of merely 65 enrolled scholars to a Parish.

Your Committee note with great thankfulness that in two Deaneries, those of St. John and Kingston, Sunday School Teachers' Associations have been established with excellent results. In each Deanery special opportunities for receiving instruction are afforded the Teachers, which have borne fruit in the number of names sent in by them as candidates for examination for diplomas or prizes. At the last examinations of Teachers, held on May 16th and June 2nd, 1885, five candidates competed in the Deanery of St. John, and 12 in the Deanery of Kingston, and all did very creditable work.

Your Committee are well assured that the value of these Associations for Sunday School work is inestimable, and they would earnestly recommend the formation of similar organizations in every Deanery of the Diocese.

While drafting this report, your Committee have received tidings that a Sunday School Association for Teachers has recently been formed in the Deanery of Shediak, from which it is expected a return will be made next year.
