A London cablegram of this morning says that while Asquith is taking a holiday in Egypt—it may be more than a holiday—a number of influential persons are again agitating to have the former Prime Minister given a Peerage in the King's New Year honors list.

The "Eastern Potentate," who became entangled with an English adventuress and paid £150,000 into the Midland Bank in order to shun the publicity of a divorce court, has been mentioned in this time that there are other ways of becoming notorious in the eyes of the public than by divorce proceedings.

The idea, of course, is to restore harmony to all that remains of the once great Liberal party, some of whose principles are fundamental, and should be immortal. A house divided against itself cannot stand. Men who are attempting to restore the Liberal party to its old prestige and authority, feel that two things are immediately necessary if they are to have any measure of success in what they are attempting.

It is known, as the cablegram says, that many within the Liberal party, meaning the Liberal following, are keenly opposed to anything like supreme leadership by David Lloyd George. Should Asquith go to the other House, it is thought to be inevitable that Lloyd George must become the undisputed leader.

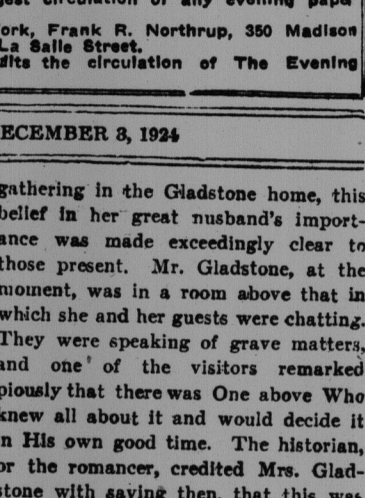

POWER CO. CHARGES UNFAIR TREATMENT

Complains of Not Being Able to Get Information From City Electrician.

The City Council had before it at yesterday afternoon's meeting a complaint from the New Brunswick Power Company that they were not receiving fair treatment in the matter of information about the installation of electric services in the city and dealt with a number of matters of routine.

The Commissioner of Finance and Public Affairs recommended the payment of the amount of \$9,248.25 to repay the city for money advanced on construction account of the Civic Power Commission, and that the controller be authorized to pass for payment all accounts presented by December 18 and to pass for payment the several payrolls on December 20.

The Commissioner of Harbors, Fisheries and Public Lands recommended that renewal leases issue to Eskel McLeod, George Alton, Ida May Merryweather, Albert E. Morgan, John F. Gleason, Margaret Haley, Rebecca W. Y. Zanski and Abraham S. Hart, George F. Perkins and Harry B. Tipplett, of various lots now under lease to them. Carried.

The following letter was received from the New Brunswick Power Company: His Worship the Mayor and Commission of the City of St. John in Common Council, City.

Dear Sir: We regret having to enter a complaint in connection with the matter of permits for the installation of electric energy in premises in the city. It was formerly the custom to permit us to see the records pertaining to applications from other contractors to the city electrician so that we were in a position to approach any people and on approaching them endeavour to have them become customers of ours.

For the past few weeks there has been a strange lack of information on the city electrician's books, and then would have forwarded to us a list of permit cards numbering anywhere from five to twenty in one lot. Yesterday we received a large number of these cards and on approaching the various householders or tenants discovered that they were already connected up with the civic hydro service. One in the city proper had apparently been connected for fully a month before we received the regular advice. In another case in West St. John we found hydro connected where the application did not appear on the city electrician's books until the day after the connection with hydro had been made.

We protest most vigorously against this unfair discrimination. The city electrician should be absolutely impartial officer and as such his records should be available to both companies at the same time, and we would strongly urge that his office should be entirely apart from any other civic department.

We are making absolutely no complaint against the city electrician personally as we think he is a very reliable officer, but we do ask that we at least be given a 90-90 chance on competitive business. Yours very truly, NEW BRUNSWICK POWER CO.

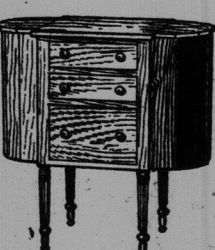

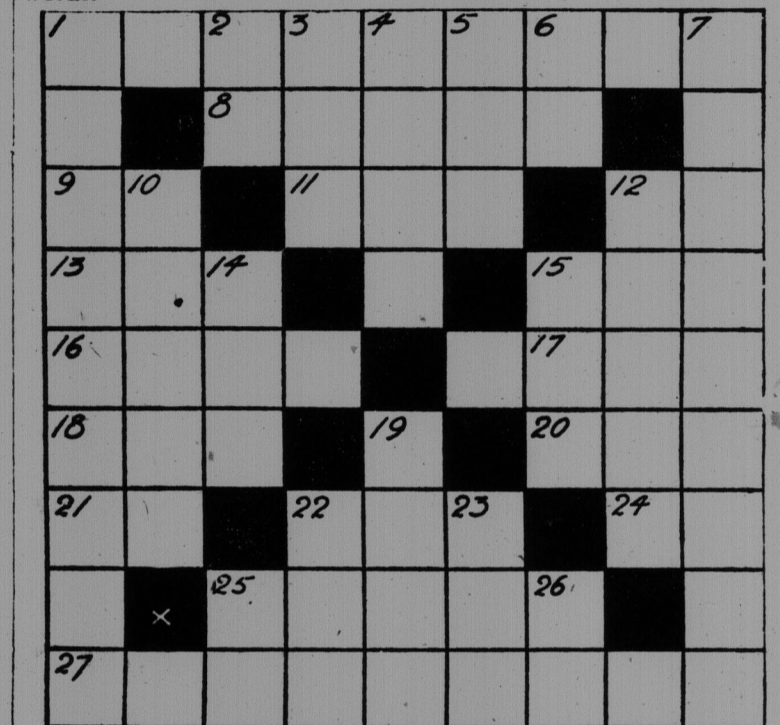
